## Expect Oil Play In North Panhandle

### Perryton Schools Will Open Monday, September 11

#### ANGER SQUAD TO TAKE TEN DAY TRAINING

for Coming Year is Set  
Lower Valuations On  
Taxable Property

Rate Is 70 Cents

To Be Registered Week  
Before School Opening: Other  
Preliminaries Observed

The 1939-40 session of the Perryton Public Schools will open on Monday, September 11. A new session of the University Interscholastic League requires that all practice or camps must begin until September 1. This makes it impossible to have a camp for the Ranger squad if it should begin on the first day in September. To make it possible for the camp this year, opening date was set at the end of Monday to allow the boys days in camp. This will mean school will close in the Spring May 28.

During the week preceding the opening of school (September 4-8) the school will be registered, credits of students recorded, and other preliminary matters attended to. Plans for the coming year and plan to attend the Perryton Schools will bring their report cards to the school during the week before school opens. New students who will be in high school (grades 9-10-11) will bring a complete record of all work done in high school. This will be secured at once either by the children's former superintendent or county superintendent.

**Budget Adopted**  
The school budget for the year 1939-40 has been adopted with a saving of \$1,146. An increase of \$1,146 over the preceding year. Accounting for the increase in the salaries of a needed teacher and raises in teaching salaries. About \$1,200 of the increase is accounted for in the building of a new football stadium. The taxable values of the district are lowered five per cent. The school hopes to balance the budget by the collection of delinquent taxes. The resignation of Miss Nora B. Smith, teacher of the third grade, and Miss Ethel Wainwright, a graduate of West Texas State Teachers College, are expected to take her place. The election of bus drivers for the year was deferred until a later meeting of the school board. Seventeen new students will bring about 350 students to Perryton from the Perryton Independent School District, other Ochiltree county districts and two Alabama districts.

#### Boys New Equipment

Refrigeration Plant Installed  
At Perryton Creamery During  
The Past Week

Extensive improvements have been made the past week at the Perryton Creamery with the purchase and installation of a complete new refrigeration system in the plant. The new equipment included an ice machine, condenser, motor and a new automatic temperature control system which will keep refrigeration five degrees below zero at all times with no variation in temperature. This will insure fresh and wholesome products. Manager John Greer has stated that new equipment has also been added for more efficient handling of creamery products.

#### Temperatures Drop As .72 Rain Falls

A severe heat wave of several weeks duration was broken in Ochiltree county Monday following a .72 inch rainfall recorded at Perryton by Jack Allen. The temperature dropped approximately 20 degrees within a few hours Monday afternoon following the general rain. The total for the month of August to Wednesday, was 1.46 inches.

Varying rainfall throughout the county was reported to be from .25 in the southeast part to 2.53 inches at the Herman (Hudgrove) place west of Perryton. Curtis Roach and Area Valley reported 2 inches at their farms northwest. Spearman received 3.56 inches and Darrouzett reported 2.

A large delegation from Texas A. and M. College is expected to attend as well as Leroy K. Smith, manager of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation; I. W. Duggan, director of the AAA's Southern Region; and Fred Morrill and Grover Hill, also of the regional office.

#### AQUATIC SHOW IS ON PROGRAM

WATER CARNIVAL IS TO BE STAGED AT MUNICIPAL POOL ON NIGHT OF AUGUST 22

A sparkling water carnival is being arranged as a part of the Golden Jubilee celebration August 22. The event is scheduled to be held from 7:30 to 8:30 o'clock in the evening at the Municipal swimming pool.

There will be five divisions in the program. All persons who wish to enter any part of the show must register with Paul Bowen by 5 o'clock on the afternoon of the twenty-second.

The carnival will open with a bathing beauty review. First prize in this contest has been set at \$10, second prize is \$5 and third prize is \$3.

Two age groups will participate in the boys' diving competition. A \$2 prize will be awarded to the winner in the division embracing boys up to 16 years of age. First place man will receive \$1 in the division of boys who are more than 16 years old.

Enthusiastic Caravan Of 180 Persons Parades Down Main Street

#### PLAYS CONCERT

A booster caravan of approximately 180 Shattuck, Okla., persons arrived in Perryton Wednesday morning with lusty shouts, honking automobile, truck and bus horns, and obnoxious musical instruments.

The thirty-piece Stampede band, crack musicians picked from Shattuck's three complete bands, played a short outdoor concert on Main street, and several boosters made addresses welcoming the people of Perryton to the annual Shattuck Stampede which will be held next Saturday and Sunday, starting at 2 o'clock each afternoon.

Miss Jane Bell Stuart, Stampede queen who was elected by cowboys entered in last year's rodeo contests at the celebration, was introduced. Tony and Adolph Yarrow, young Mexican twins who were clad in flashy cowboy regalia, sang "La Cucaracha" for the downtown gathering.

"We boosters have been anxious to get to Perryton," said Dr. J. Mark Duncan, captain of the train and chairman of the booster committee, "because it is the best town on our tour." The party stopped in Perryton more than an hour for lunch. All three had suffered internal injuries, and they were the only ones of seven persons injured in the wreck, one of whom died, who were retained in the hospital after Thursday.

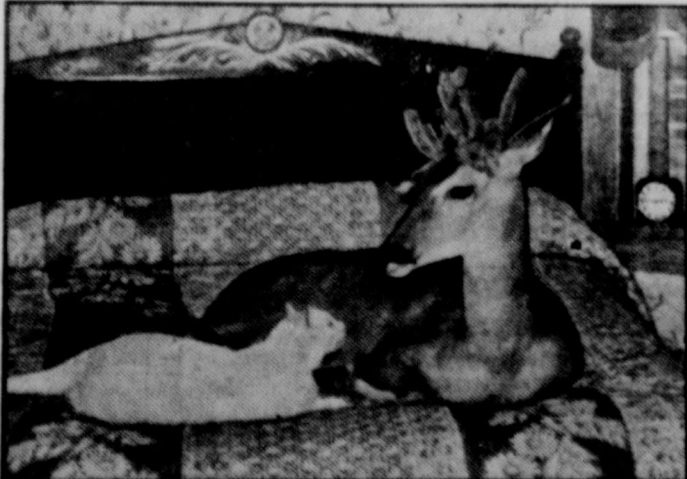

## Jungle Film

Naish and Wong Bring to Ellis Thrilling Portrayals In The "Island of Lost Men"

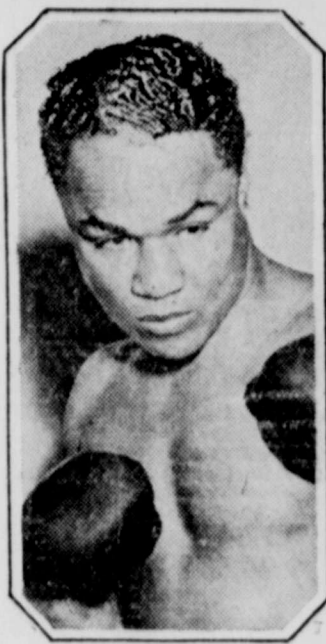

LOU AMBERS gets his chance for revenge in Yankee Stadium the night of Aug. 22, and there are more than a few ring-wise critics who share the opinion that the Herkimer Hurricane will be successful in his return bout with Henry Armstrong.

The experts remember the terrific battle Lou put up while losing his lightweight crown to Armstrong last year. It was close then, as the New York lad pierced Hammering Henry's cloak of supposed invincibility.

Ambers proved he wasn't afraid of Armstrong's impressive list of knockouts. He traded punch for punch with the Negro. He lost his title but gave every indication that winning it back in a return match wasn't just a pipe dream.

AMBERS is certain he has solved the buzz-saw tactics of the double champion. He is confident that what he learned in their first meeting will pay rich dividends.

They don't call Ambers the Herkimer Hurricane for nothing. Not only does he present a difficult target to hit because of his shiftiness, but he packs a real wallop. In fact, he hits just as hard as Armstrong.

Armstrong isn't much of a boxer, and stripped of his ability to keep boring in and flailing away with both fists he would become a soft touch for a versatile Ambers.

Armstrong will climb into the ring a favorite, but odds won't mean much once the bell has sounded.

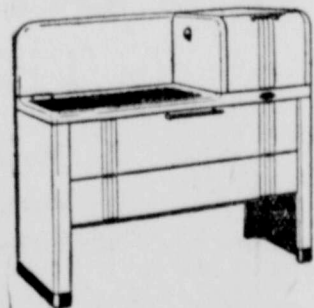

## Washington Letter

### Tobacco Growers Spurned Quotas Once; Now They Ask for Help

WASHINGTON.—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace and A. A. A. officials are enjoying the smug satisfaction that comes of saying "I told you so."

In 1938, the tobacco growers decided they could get along nicely without A. A. A. marketing quotas. Recently growers from Georgia and Florida came to Washington to confer with each other and agriculture officials.

They decided to ask senators from tobacco growing states to enact the necessary legislation to make tobacco amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment Act effective.

THEY want a conference between buyers and growers, too, which will determine the acreage and size of the crop which should be grown in 1940 to insure fair prices, and which will decide whether or not growers ought to withhold part of their 1939 crop from the market.

They also want a referendum on free-cured tobacco marketing quotas for the 1940 crop as soon as Congress has passed the tobacco amendments.

From 1934 to 1938, the tobacco growers received fair returns on their crops. Their income from free-cured tobacco in those years added up to about \$167,000,000 each year. The farmers who grew burley tobacco averaged \$61,000,000 each of those years.

But this year, grade by grade prices in Georgia have been about one-third below prices

these farmers got last year. The growers are anxious. They know that if these prices continue, they can't expect to average more than 15 cents a pound this year on their crop. The tobacco states expect to have a crop of over a billion pounds before the end of the season.

Not all of the billion pounds would be put on the market, or be absorbed by it, so the growers look to a carryover of about 2,000,000 pounds.

Instead of growing big crops for a couple of years and taking the consequences, they have decided to submit to the regulatory quota plan and keep their crops more uniform from year to year and more nearly in line with the level of consumption. This is the second vindication of A. A. A. officials' plans for tobacco. Early this year, the Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of the tobacco marketing quota provisions written into the Farm Act of 1938. This cleared up a good many technical points which were disputed before, and which had created an obstacle to the smooth working of the tobacco program.

BUT the major obstacle in the path of the balanced economy planners is the decision of any group of farmers that they can do better on their own, than with government guidance. It's when they disdain the paternalism of the A. A. A. and then, as in the case of the tobacco growers this year, have to come to Washington and ask for help, that agriculture officials feel like crows.

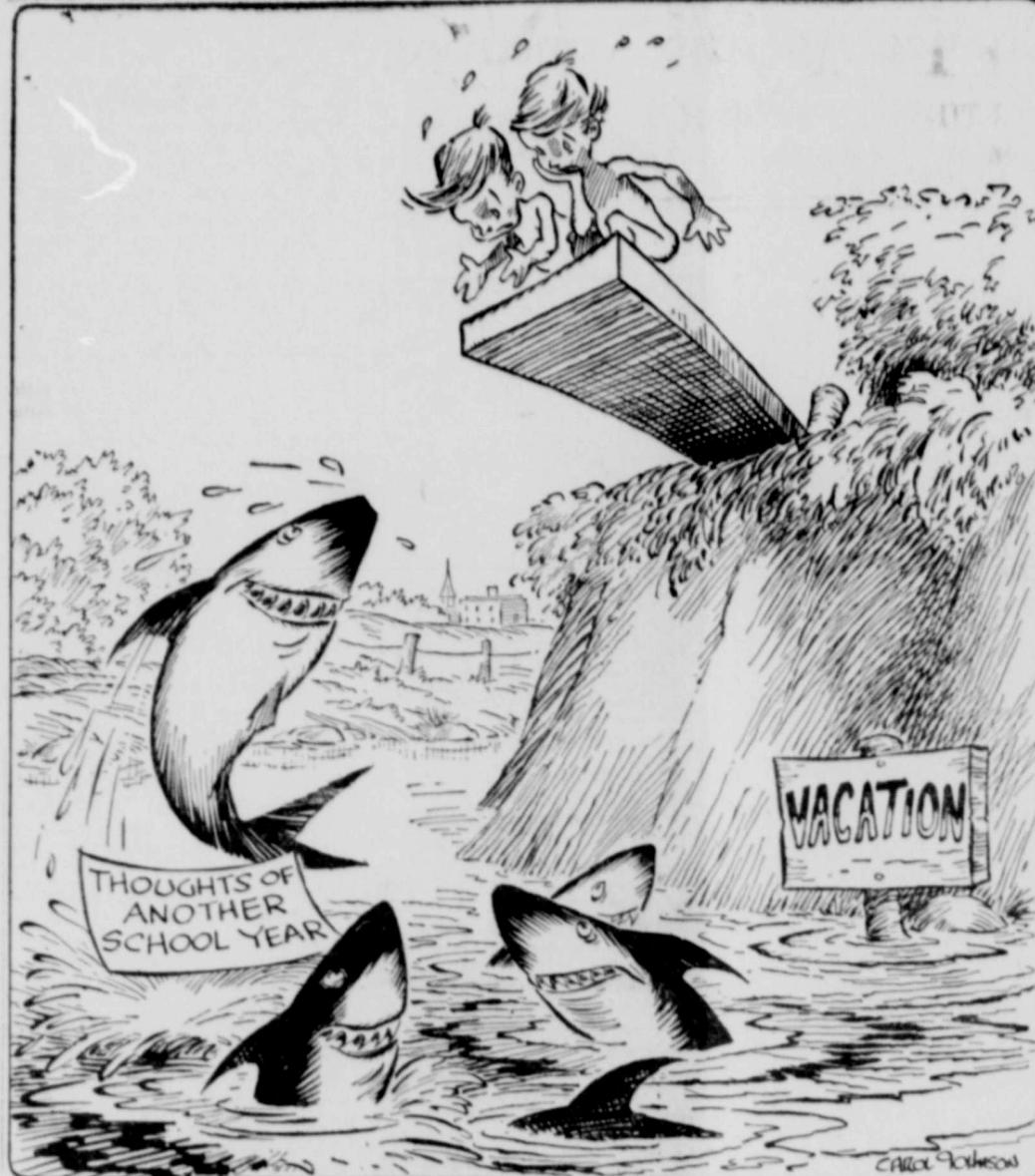

### Infesting the Old Swimming Hole



#### Sudden Death

Sixth in a Series of Articles on Safety by Captain  
J. C. TAPPE of the Texas Safety Council.

The thoughtless public official who "fixes" a traffic law violation with the city judge for a friend, may be the innocent cause of a tragic death.

Cities and towns of the State are daily becoming more conscious of the fact that the persistent traffic law violator is a lethal enemy of society, whether innocently or not. Traffic ordinances have been adopted by cities and towns and villages for the protection of their citizens, young and old. Included in these traffic laws is the regulation of pedestrian traffic and these too should observe the rules.

"Instead of traffic law violation fixing, our public officials and influential citizens should shame an offender when he comes to them and asks for such relief," Pierce Brooks, Dallas, runoff candidate last

year for Lieutenant Governor, and President of the Texas Safety Council, said. "These officials and public men are becoming daily more conscious of the constantly mounting death toll from automobile driver negligence, and failure of pedestrians to exercise ordinary safety. As a result 'fixing' is decidedly on the decrease and soon will be a forgotten art."

Those convicted in any court of a negligent collision whether fatal or not, should have their license suspended and placed on the ground for at least twelve months. If the accident is particularly inexcusable, they should be permanently grounded. Severe penalty, you may say, but even that will not bring back the life of an innocent child or another dear relative or friend.

The value of contour furrows and ridges in pastures is becoming more and more evident as the summer advances, points out George Twombly of the Soil Conservation Service, agronomist at Camp SCS-12-T, Perryton, Texas.

Numerous farmers of this area report increased grass growth in their land by the furrows. Twombly says in some instances the increase had amounted to as much as 100 per cent. This is true on the Andrew Peterson and C. R. Hartman places South and Southeast of Perryton, and Emma Selby's place about four miles North of Perryton. Other places in the Camp area have made a wonderful response.

Farmers whose pastures have been treated for soil and moisture conservation observed last spring that the first green grass appeared along the contour furrows where the water had been permitted to soak into the soil. During the summer, they also observed that the tallest and greenest grass was growing along the furrows and that the livestock usually can be seen grazing along the contours.

During heavy rains, farmers found that the furrows and ridges held practically all the water on the area where it fell. With extended periods of hot, dry weather, it can be observed that the grass along the furrows remains green and produces a good seed crop while vegetation on untreated areas has a tendency to become dry and turn brown with little seed maturing.

Farmers of the Soil Conservation Service Camp area have constructed contour furrows on approximately 14,000 acres of pasture land. Mr. Twombly reports.

Improvement of pastures is only one phase of the soil and moisture conservation program demonstrated in this area.

More trees were felled for timber in Germany in 1938 than in any previous year, the result being a definite blow to timber conservation rules.

## The Story of Naaman

International Uniform Sun-  
School Lesson for Aug. 13  
Text: II Kings 5:1-10, 14

AMAN, "captain of the host," of the king of Syria, a great and honorable man, was a leper. A famous prophet has turned these words into a story to make a very interesting point, namely: that Naaman was a leper because he was a great man and an honor captain, and that from that men may take heart to conquer their handicaps and their weaknesses and attain real happiness and triumph. It is probable, however, that Naaman was not a leper, but that he was afflicted with leprosy, and the leprosy, because of that fact, meant the greater tragedy.

Naaman's household was a household who had been brought into the land of Syria when the Syrians had been driven out of Israel. This captive might naturally have no interest in Naaman's life, or she might have had the feeling of being a stranger in a strange land. But the story tells us that a great Syrian of the time had been born in her home had been smitten with affliction.

The little maid may have received kindness in the household of Naaman, or she may have been of a loving and loving disposition. At any rate, she spoke to her mistress and assured her that if Naaman was afflicted with leprosy, she would heal him of his leprosy.

It was creditable to Naaman that he should have listened to the little girl's suggestion. Captains of hosts have not always been so considerate, and we like to see all the better on that account. When he told the matter to his king, the king gave him a letter to the king of Israel and gave him also great presents of silver and gold and said that he might bring these to the king of Israel. In turn, the king of Israel was greatly troubled by these things. He had no power to heal Naaman of his leprosy, and it looked to him as if the king of Syria was seeking to create a quarrel with him, possibly as a pretext for invading his kingdom.

It was under these circumstances that Elisha heard of the matter. So Naaman came with his horses and chariots to the door of Elisha. He may have expected that the prophet would come forth and bow before him in great respect and give him obeisance. But instead, Elisha sent a messenger, who did not even bring a very cordial message, for he told Naaman that as a means of his cleansing he must go and wash in the Jordan seven times.

Can we wonder that Naaman was exceedingly angry? He of course thought that Elisha would greet him differently and with great ostentation tell him what he should do. ## Modern One-Meal Turkeys in Debut at Poultry Show

IT'S a long time since last Thanksgiving, but do you remember how you carved the turkey on Thursday, picked at it on Friday, made turkey sandwiches on Saturday, and ate turkey hash for most of the next week?

The United States government is after that problem—and getting results. In fact, some of the new, modern, white, streamlined, small-sized turkeys were on display at the recent World Poultry Congress in Cleveland, O.

THESE birds aren't on the market yet, but they're on the way. It will take several more years of experimenting before the U. S. is ready to offer hatching eggs and breeding stock. So far, however, the experiment is a success.

It was that old "eat turkey all week" dilemma, which brought scientists to the rescue. American consumers started telling American butchers that they'd like to see something smaller in turkeys. The retailers, in turn, started poultrymen thinking about the idea.

Three years of research at the federal government's agricultural center in Beltsville, Md., were supervised by Sheppard Haynes, chief scientist aid, and S. J. Marsden.

## Birth Registrations

Parents of Children Starting To School are Urged to See That Records Okay

Austin, Texas—Parents of children starting school for the first time this fall are urged by the State Department of Health to make sure that they have a birth registration certification regarding their child and if not, to take proper legal steps as soon as possible to obtain this record.

In many Texas school districts, a notification of birth certificate is required to prove the child is old enough to enter school. As the Vital Statistics Department will be called upon to answer numerous requests for school certificates, securing this record early will speed up the process of securing the needed forms before school opens.

Acquiring a record of birth is not only an important part of the task of getting the child ready for school but is an essential item in the larger job of preparing the child for the future. The time will come when he will need a record of his birth. Proper registration now will prevent difficulty later on in his life.

In addition to its importance at the time of admission to school, birth registration may be necessary for obtaining a work permit, an automobile driver's permit, the right to vote and the right to marry; for proof of parentage, inheritance of property, settlement of insurance and in establishing identity.

## STOCKMEN AID RANGE PROGRAM

TEXAS LIVESTOCK MEN ARE IN ATTENDANCE TO HELP DRAW UP 1940 AAA RANGE PROGRAM

Spokesmen for livestock producers of Texas, who went to a national conference in South Dakota and helped draw up the AAA range program for 1940, came home last week with feathers in their caps.

Out of the conference came two recommendations with a special bearing on Texas; one, that pasture mowing be added to the list of conservation practices drawing payment under the program, and the other, that the rate of assistance for furrowing of range land on the contour be sizably increased.

An avowed tribute to West Texas ranchmen who have popularized improved run-off control techniques, the furrowing recommendation would set the payment rate for that practice at 2 cents a hundred linear feet, instead of 50 cents an acre.

Mowing of pastures to kill no-account weeds and brush, an operation found to be of particular benefit to grazing areas of South and East Texas, should earn 25 cents an acre, the conferees decided.

Both moves had been recommended earlier by the State Agricultural Conservation Committee, which had five representatives at the meeting.

Report of the conference, which called for no fundamental changes in the range program but did provide for a higher allowance of funds for deferred grazing, was expected to gain the ready approval of Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace, whose signature is needed to put the recommendations into effect.

As usual, participating ranchmen next year will receive range-building allowances, to be earned by a wide variety of conservation practices. No practice was dropped from the list. Deferred grazing, which now qualifies for 60 per cent of a ranch's range-building allowance, where supplementary practices are recommended and carried out, will qualify for 75 per cent of the allowance next year. The same provisions regarding supplementary requirements will apply. L. W. Anderson, of Pecos, who attended the conference as a ranchman and state committee member, reported.
