Fight On To Save Town From Fire TROOPS INVADE CHINESE AREA

FOREST FIRE THREATENS TO ENVELOP PARK

**GLACIER NATIONAL
PARK MENACED BY
FOREST FIRE**

(By Associated Press)
COLUMBIA FALLS, Mont., Aug. 22.—Every available man of the Great Northern railway and the United States Forestry service were fighting a desperate battle today to save the town of Belton, on the border of Glacier National park, 20 miles east of here, from being destroyed by a forest fire.

Park administration buildings located in the town were in the immediate path of the flames. All equipment was removed from the buildings and loaded on freight cars to be moved if the fire continues its advance.

Tank cars of the Great Northern were pressed into service to carry 40,000 gallons of water from Coram near here to supplement the water supply.

The residents of the town except those who remained to fight the flames, were taken from the fire zone on special trains.

EXTENSION OF LINES ASKED

**Q. A. & P. REQUESTS
AUTHORITY TO BUILD
SHORT ROUTE**

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The Quana, Arme and Pacific railway company has filed an application with the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to construct an extension of its line between Matador, Texas, to a point about 15 miles northwest.

The railroad proposed to finance the extension by advances from its treasury. The line would run from Matador through the west central section of the county, crossing Whiteflat, Tom Ball Creek and terminating near the North Peace river.

Man Fatally Burned In San Antonio Fire

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 22.—Benson Hester, 26, was burned to death today, and his brother, Carroll Hester, was seriously injured as the result of a fire believed to have been caused by a lighted cigarette.

Awakened by the groans of Carroll Hester, relatives entered the bedroom and found him near the door, unconscious. Benson had never left the bed, and his body was burned beyond recognition.

Misfortune Dogs At Williams' Air Tests

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Aug. 22.—With the climax to the misfortunes which have dogged his attempts to get his tiny Mercury racer into the air reached yesterday on his third fumble attempt of five minutes, when he was unconscious for five minutes in the cockpit of the craft traveling nearly 100 miles an hour, Lieutenant Alford Williams was ready to try again today.

Williams was forced to abandon efforts yesterday when the terrific speed at which he was traveling forced the pure air from the small compartment in which he practically has to lie down and gases from the 24 cylinder motor forced their way in and overcame him.

PAJAMA DANCE GETS "RUSH"

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 22.—Pajama inspectors became traffic cops as 2,500 persons turned out last night for a widely advertised "pajama dance." Only 25 couples showed up in pajamas. The inspectors were deputy sheriffs dispatched to a casino under terms of an injunction granted promoters of the dance. The injunction forbade Sheriff Cook to interfere with the event, but ordered him to station deputies at the dance hall to see the dancers were sufficient clothes in addition to pajamas to meet "the requirements of decency."

The deputies were on hand but with nothing to do. A crowd swarmed the place, and traffic became snarled. Soon the officers were directing traffic.

ZEP DELAYED IN LEAVING FOR AMERICA

**WEATHER CONDITIONS
PREVENT TAKEOFF
AT MIDNIGHT**

KASUMIGAU, Japan, Aug. 22.—The round-the-world air liner Graf Zeppelin, delayed on her departure for Los Angeles by a minor accident early this morning as she was leaving the hangar here, again was held up tonight, this time by unfavorable winds.

The huge ship was about to be taken from the hangar and her passengers were all aboard when Dr. Eckener, shortly before midnight, decided it would be unwise to take the great ship out in view of cross-hangar winds.

Might Leave Friday.
There was still a possibility, however, that the ship might leave early Friday morning if a favorable opportunity presented itself.

Nineteen passengers and a crew of 45 will make the voyage to America.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The Prince of Wales, take it from a Beaumont, Texas, boy scout, is not such a snappy dresser as most Americans seem to think.

"He had on a pair of sloppy shorts when he visited the Jamboree," said Billy Bass, one of the Beaumont troop who returned from the World Scout Jamboree in England. "But he had such a way about him you overlooked his pants."

The Beaumont scouts were carrying ash walking sticks and wearing monocles. They are the first of the American contingent to return.

Following the Jamboree, they "did" London, Paris and the battlefields. They carried numerous souvenirs in their packs, most of which were bits of Scotch tartan, foraged from the kilts of the Scotch scouts.

The Scots had very natty uniforms, they agreed, and somewhat with envy, one added: "But skirts won't go in America."

ASSAULT AFTER
TRAGEDY**

GALVESTON, Aug. 22.—Fourteen boys and girls were injured, one fatally and seven seriously, last night when the truck in which they were returning from a hayride and picnic on the mainland was struck by an automobile driven by R. W. Chambers of this city between Dickinson and Lamarque.

Returning From Picnic
Twenty-seven young people were returning to this city in two trucks, one towing the other. Chambers' car crashed into the rear of the second truck forcing it into the other and throwing all its occupants to the road.

Dorothy Reese, 20, left leg broken and body bruised.
Clara McCarthy, probable shoulder fracture.
Loretta Abrahamson, 20, body bruised.

Louise Schurman, sprained hip.

Others injured less seriously were: Walter Bell, Giovanni Demack, Charles Mallie, Marie Schurman, E. Whitney, Velma Stephenson, Jesse Cavness, negro, driver of the truck.
H. Voigt and F. Schurman were in charge of the party of 22 young couples.

RISINGER TURNS FOR WORSE TODAY

Following a restless night and continued unrest early this afternoon, condition of Alvin P. Risinger, 20-year-old Texas Tech student, injured critically Sunday night in a motorcycle mishap, assumed a more precarious aspect today, as attendants at the West Texas hospital announced that but little hope for his recovery could be maintained should he show no improvement within the next day or two.

Risinger's skull was crushed when he plunged headlong into a curb as result of impact after his motorcycle struck Joe Lowmire, 23, who was walking across Nineteenth street in the 1900 block.

Lowmire, whose right leg was broken in three places, is recovering rapidly.

Vast Holding Firm Formed In Northwest

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 22.—Formation of a new \$250,000,000 holding company, controlling 34 banks in the northwest and having resources in excess of \$341,000,000, was announced today.

Philip Lefebvre, convicted with Mrs. Vias as her partner in the crime, was in the same jail, also sentenced to death.

FLIERS FLOCK TO AIR DERBY AT CLEVELAND

**OVER 1200 PLANES ARE
EXPECTED TO BE
IN EVENT**

CLEVELAND, Aug. 22.—Plans for the National air races and aeronautical exposition opening here Saturday took on the quickened tempo of last minute preparations today as the congress of airmen and airplanes set in.

The women's air derby from California approached across Texas, a derby for men from Portland starts tomorrow, and army and navy squadrons were en route to the airport.

A stub mast is being erected for the navy dirigible Los Angeles, which will arrive Wednesday.

TEXAS PLANES LEAVE FOR CLEVELAND RACES

GALVESTON, Aug. 22.—Eighteen attack planes and one transport plane of the third attack group at Port Crockett here, hopped off at 8 o'clock this morning for the Cleveland air races. Their first stop will be at Tahoma, La., where they will be refueled.

HOPE WANING FOR MISSING FLIERS

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—With only the barest hope that the young Swiss fliers, Oscar Kaeser and Kurt Luescher, survived their westward trans-Atlantic flight attempt, crews of naval operations, have ordered naval vessels to maintain a sharp watch for the Swiss airmen and have requested merchant ships to do the same. At Roosevelt Field, aviators clung to a faint hope that the white monoplane "Jungschweizerland" might yet appear on the eastern horizon, but the hope grew dimmer with each passing hour.

The youthful fliers, one 21 and the other 22 years old, were last seen flying westward over a village in the Azores on Monday afternoon. They should have reached American shores early Tuesday.

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REPORTS SAY 40,000 MEN MOVING WEST

**CHINESE FORCES ARE
DRIVEN BACK IN
VICINITY**

(By Associated Press)
TOKYO, Aug. 22.—A dispatch to Rengo, Japanese news agency, from Mukden states that 40,000 Russian soviet troops stationed at Iman, half way between Vladivostok and Habarovsk have invaded Chinese territory and are moving steadily westward.

Yesterday this force is supposed to have occupied Mishan, a town northwest of Lake Hanka. Chinese forces in this vicinity have retired eight miles.

The news contained in this dispatch is from Chinese sources and is unverified elsewhere.

Dispatches from Nanking today estimated the total number of Soviet Russian troops around the whole Manchurian border, with the exception of the eastern frontier between Vladivostok and Habarovsk, at 30,000.

CABLEGRAMS TELL OF SOVIET MOBILIZATION

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Tokyo cablegrams to the Daily Mail today, purporting to be based on official Japanese information, said Soviet troops had completed mobilization on the Manchurian frontier and shortly would march on Harbin.

Blanche Noyes of Cleveland and Edith Polts of Portland, Ore., damaged their planes in landing at Pecos and were not expected to leave that place for several hours.

Mrs. Noyes landed about 10 miles west of Pecos after she discovered a fire in the cockpit of her plane. She said she found a lighted cigarette in a spare flying suit. She suffered slight burns in extinguishing the fire. In landing her plane, the under gear was damaged.

Dynamite Explodes Under Street Car

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 22.—Explosion of dynamite under the wheels of a street car here last night blew an eighteen inch piece of steel rail through the floor and roof of the car, injuring one passenger and stunning ten others.

The explosion was characterized by police as the most serious affair of the kind since the beginning of the carmen's strike nearly two months ago.

The detonation, heard for several miles, caused a near panic among motorists and pedestrians in the vicinity. Cinderella Denton, 22-year-old negro was found by police unconscious.

Breath of mystery haunting casts of French play probed after death

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—The breath of mystery which has haunted the paths of actors in the racy French farce "Easy For Zee Zee" since its opening in a theatre of the Latin quarter here a year ago drew the attention of police today as they investigated the death plunge of Robert Chapman, 28, leading man in the comedy.

Chapman, son of a prominent Piedmont, Calif., attorney, either jumped, fell or was thrown to his death from the sixth story window of the apartment of his friend, Allen Hoffman, playwright and actor, early yesterday.

Displaying a bruised face and other marks of violence, Hoffman told police Chapman and he had just returned from a party in the home of another member of the cast. The doorbell rang and Hoffman found two strange men at the door. Hoffman said he told them he had no liquor whereupon they beat him into unconsciousness. When he came to his senses, he said, the window was open and the crushed body of Chapman lay at the bottom of the



MANIAC RUNS AMUCK; KILLS ONE; 1 HURT

**POLICEMAN IS FATALLY
ATTACKED; TWO DIE
IN SHOOTING**

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Aug. 22.—A policeman was shot to death and another seriously wounded in what apparently was an attack by a maniac as they patrolled a beat near the downtown area here today.

The attack occurred as the officers, Rex C. Wright, 38, and Wm. W. Smith, 48, emerged from their automobile after drawing up to a curb. Wright was killed instantly by a bullet through his chest after he had been felled by a blow on the head from a heavy iron instrument. Smith was stunned by two blows over the head from the instrument. Both were plain

J. B. MOORE RELEASED ON BOND TODAY

**DORIS CAIN CONFINED
IN LOCAL HOSPITAL
SERIOUSLY HURT**

J. B. Moore, farmer residing one mile north of Carlisle, was charged here today with assault with intent to kill, and he was released on \$1,000 bond and bound over to the next session of grand jury, following continued investigation this morning in connection with the shooting last night about 10:30 o'clock of Doris Cain, 14-year-old daughter of E. M. Cain, who lives two and one-half miles north of Carlisle.

The girl is improving nicely at the West Texas Hospital, where an operation for removal of gunshot wound was performed last night shortly after the shooting. She sustained perforations of the intestines by the scattered gunshot which struck her abdomen.

Temperature falling
Her temperature was gradually falling this afternoon, and her respiration is reported normal.

Mr. Moore, through whose orchard the girl, in company with five companions was passing, confessed that he shot a double-barrel shotgun twice, explaining that he had been bothered with pilferers about his farm and stating that he thought the girl and her chums were prowlers.

Only One Hurt
Doris was the only one in the party injured. She was brought to the hospital by Craig Bond, a neighbor, summoned after the shooting. Accompanying the girl through the orchard were her sister, Fay Cain; two other girls, Johnnie and Mary Pruitt, and two boys, Harold Woods and Elmer Bush. According to Mr. Bond, the young people were returning from church and were passing through the end of the Moore orchard at the time the shots were fired.

**TEXAS SCHOOLS TO GET
\$17.50 TO FINISH
TAX RATE TODAY**

AUSTIN, Aug. 22.—An appropriation of \$17.50 per capita for 1,430,000 Texas scholars was fixed by the board of education yesterday, and the automatic tax board will meet today to finish levying the state tax rate.

Decision of the board of education that the law passed by the 41st legislature directing the board to fix the appropriation of \$17.50 if it could do so within the 35 cent constitutional tax levy for school purposes, was mandatory will mean that for the year 1930-31 the appropriation cannot be more than \$16.50 with the maximum levy, Governor Moody said.

SHE ADVOCATES WOMEN'S RIGHTS IN THE AIR

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The battle for equal rights for women now, in quite modern manner, has taken to the air.

First, feminists rallied around the slogan of equal rights for women, equal rights to work, equal pay for equal work. Next, the equal rights fight on land took to the sea when certain Lady Stokers insisted on having their passports in their own, not their husbands' names.

Now a valiant feminist carries the cudgels skyward, insisting that women should have equal rights to fly the planes men fly, compete in airplane races open to men, and be eligible for mail and transport pilot positions. In other words, she would write across the heavens, "No sex discrimination against aviators."

Barred From Air Derbies
This flying feminist is Opal Logan Kunk, wife of the wealthy Dr. George F. Kunk, an official of Tiffany's. She flies her own trim little \$10,000 "Beech" with speed, precision and skill. Yet she was barred from the Cleveland derby because she was a woman. And she cannot compete in the women's derby in her own plane because its 300 horsepower motor is considered too powerful for a woman to manage.

"It is ridiculous to restrict women in these ways," Mrs. Kunk said in a spirited manner. "What has sex to do with aviation? Flying is no test of physical strength. I use three fingers on the stick. Flying needs mental, not physical, aptitude. Who says women lack these?"

"Women themselves are partially responsible for the concentrated effort there is to restrict their air activities," Mrs. Kunk charged. "The publicity given has been more important to them than really learning to fly their own planes with skill. Too much publicity about women in the air has made them want to capitalize their sex, not realizing that this very thing would cause them to be looked upon as a sex education affair, where good sportsmanship is a first requirement and chivalry and deference shed before entering."

Files in Serious Way
Mrs. Kunk takes her aviation seriously. Her proudest possessions are her pilot's license, her sporting aviation license and the little ticket that announces to the world that she has been made a member of the FAI, the Federation of Aeronautical Internationale.

Glad in her wide-wale heavy white pants she spends from 10 to 14 hours daily out at the Newark air port, studying both ground work and air work, while her country home has not been opened this summer and her town house is merely a place to sleep. Tall, dark, with her black eyes and a great deal of her fine old Dutch ancestors in her determined manner, she considers it a patriotic duty to fight for women's rights in the air.

"In time of war women could be of tremendous importance," she asserted. "The next war will be in the air. It is a matter of national defense. Women could fly hospital ships, dispatch ships, carry mail and passengers. In time of disasters, like forest fires, they could be invaluable too."

Enthusiasm Over Future
She is quite earnest in thinking women valuable as peace time fliers.

"Aviation opens up tremendous opportunities for women to earn a handsome living," she said. "Now women could demonstrate and sell planes. They could fly mail, they could fly passenger transports. I think the functions of aviation have already begun to be discovered. I have seen many dead people helped by being taken up in planes. There are tremendous medicinal possibilities, plane hospitals to treat certain diseases, plane rides in high altitudes for others. Women could fly these. For mental cases, for instance, flights might give sufferers the perspective they need for cure. I may sound enthusiastic," she concluded, half laughing, "but I am in earnest. I think aviation might even help a broken heart and surely no one would deny women the right to carry the sufferer up into the clouds!"

AUSTIN, Aug. 22 (AP)—Cotton in Texas has failed rapidly during the past 20 days because of insect damage and extensive drought, and the state's yield likely will not exceed 4,356,000 gin bales this year, George B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture, said today.

A report disclosed four and one seventh acres would be required to produce a bale this season, a condition described by the agricultural commission as a very low average.

"The indicated production," Terrell explained, "is almost as low as 1927."

The estimate this year by district is: eastern 380,000; northern 520,000; western 380,000; central 1,281,000; southwestern 490,000; and northwestern 880,000 bales.

SENATE WILL STUDY TARIFF NEXT 2 WEEKS

HOUSE MEASURE GIVEN TO MEMBERS; WILL START SEPT. 4

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The senate membership, which will enter upon its tariff debate September 4, will have the larger part of the next two weeks to study the house measure as revised by the Senate Finance committee republicans in preparation for the struggle to come.

The committee majority had only a few minor administrative provisions to act upon today before completing its task of rewriting the bill. Meanwhile, predictions were increasing that final congressional action on the measure could not be completed before the end of the special session and that the debate would extend into the regular session beginning in December, with prospects that final enactment would be further delayed in that event.

Rate sections of the bill already have been made available to democratic members of the committee, who had no part in rewriting the measure, and the administrative sections will be ready soon for their consideration.

In its revision of the administrative sections, the committee majority, after approving house provisions to enable the tariff commission to consider competitive conditions as well as production costs in determining basis for imports, voted to retain the presidential power to advance or reduce rates as much as 50 percent but rejected proposals to increase the commission membership to seven and to eliminate the present law's provision that not more than three could be members of the same party.

To Change Basis It also inserted an amendment by Senator Reed, republican, Pennsylvania, to base ad valorem on American instead of foreign values, which, he said, "would not change the measure of protection in the slightest degree" but would merely speed up the commission's work of determining values and eliminate the present fraud.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina, who is a minority member, called the democratic commission's meeting tomorrow, explaining "we do not contemplate offering a substitute for the entire bill" but intend to prepare a number of amendments and substitutes for amendments to be sponsored by the majority members. Amendments offered in the senate by committee-men have priority, and substitutes must be disposed of before they can be voted on.

"No man can lead you but one who has been 'Jim Crowed,'" he said. "Never ask any fellow to give you what belongs to you. Take it. You can only get leadership by electing a man who will fight your battle."

"The man who offers to buy your vote insults you. The only way to punish him is to take his money and beat him at the polls."

TAHOKA, Aug. 22 (Special)—Lynn county will hold her own teachers institute again this year, the one last year having proved highly successful, according to announcement of County Supt. H. P. Caveness, this year's meeting to be held Thursday and Friday, November 7 and 8.

TEXANS VISIT IN SING SING

PRISON GROUP STUDIES FAMED INSTITUTION; VISIT OTHERS

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Ten members of the Texas prison centralization commission Wednesday inspected Sing Sing, the ninth penal institution studied in their tour to gather material for drafting recommendations looking to a new system in their state.

"Sing Sing is a fine prison," chairman W. A. Paddock said. "It has many features which will be valuable to us, but as a whole the system in Sing Sing is not adaptable to conditions in Texas."

The commission evinced interest in the prison's industries and expected to suggest introduction of the manufacture of tin cans and other materials in the Texas penitentiary.

Today the members will visit Auburn and Dannemora prisons, scenes of recent outbreaks by convicts. "Were it not for a recently enacted parole law," Paddock declared "we might have had similar outbreaks in Texas. We have many

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of the same problems—too many prisoners, too few cells and not enough for the convicts to do."

The visitors hope to arrange a conference with Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who recently completed an investigation of the New York prisons.

SPORT SLANTS

Like most other marks in this fast-moving era of sport, the half-mile running record likely will fall under the flying feet of some new Mercury but the two men most capable of knocking it off quickly, Douglas G. A. Lowe of England and Lloyd Hahn of Nebraska, apparently have hung up their spiked shoes for good.

It took a dozen years for Ted Meredith's old record of 1:52 1-5 to be lowered to 1:51 3-5 by the galloping German, Otto Peltzer. Hahn ran the "300" in 1:51 2-5 on a banked indoor track a year and a half ago but unfortunately indoor performances have no official standing in the blue-book of international records.

Low seemed capable of a world's record last summer. He made a show of Hahn, as well as Peltzer at Amsterdam in the Olympic 800-meter finals, setting a new record. Shortly afterward, at Stamford Bridge, on a terrifically hot afternoon and after one hard race, Lowe reeled off his half-mile leg of a relay in close to 1:50. He had the aid of a running start but he wasn't extended. Had he been given the chance for an official try that day, it seemed Lowe might easily have cut two seconds off the record.

There have been few greater competitors or more graceful strikers than black-haired Douglas Lowe of Oxford. He likes to run, "for the sport of it," but he prefers now to concentrate on the more serious business of becoming an English barrister while Hahn turns to farming.

FLOYDADA, Aug. 22. — Nation wide recognition of the Stansell dairy herd owned by O. L. Stansell, of this city, who is president of the Texas Panhandle Dairy Show, was received this month when the record of three of the herd was given special notice in the Jersey Bulletin by the American Jersey Cattle club. The bulletin contained the following notice:

"Three young daughters of Allen's Premier 24774, Texas Jersey Sire, have just completed register of merit records with an average yield of 432.76 pounds of butterfat, starting on a test at the average age of one year and eleven months. This exceptional yield for heifers of this age was made on twice a day milking. Calculated to a mature basis this yield is equivalent to a production of 592.87 pounds of butterfat in 365 days."

"O. L. Stansell of Floydada, Texas, the owner of this sire, and the three promising young daughters, tested the trio, Prince's Combination Ula, Allen's Premier's Lola, and Allen's Premier's Darling, giving them only the care usually given cows in a dairy herd."

Prince's Combination Ula 739847, the youngest daughter, was started on test at the age of one year and nine months and in the ensuing 365 days produced 461.54 pounds of butterfat and 9,886 pounds of milk.

"Allen's Premier's Lola 614958, started on test when just two years of age, yielded 419.92 pounds of butterfat and 7,851 pounds of milk in 365 days. Lola was with calf for 206 days, of the year of the test."

"Allen's Premier's Darling 729723 produced 416.82 pounds of butterfat and 7,133 pounds of milk in 365 days when started on test at the age of one year and eleven months."

"Allen's Premier was bred by W. L. Allen of Floydada, Texas, and sold to Mr. Stansell in 1924 when a few weeks of age. Five daughters

CHANGE MADE ON FLY ZONES

MOVEMENT OF FRUITS
FROM FLORIDA IS
ALLOWED NOW

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—General revision of the Mediterranean Fruit Fly quarantine designed to facilitate the movement of citrus and other fruits from Florida was announced today by Secretary Hyde.

The revision also included vegetables and nursery stock.

Under the new regulations provisions are made for the movement in interstate commerce of all restricted fruits and vegetables not produced in areas which may be determined as infested. As provided by the present quarantine all infested fruit is required to be promptly destroyed but destruction of host fruits and vegetables areas surrounding the infested zones will be discontinued.

Control Continued
The present control of distribution by inspection and by control of destination will be continued. With the development of adequate facilities for sterilization of fruit through heating and cooling it is expected that a broader field than that now authorized will be opened to Florida products.

Sterilization, under the new regulations, will be required for all fruit produced within a mile of points at which infestation has been or is hereafter found. Such sterilized fruit may be shipped anywhere

in the United States except to Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, California, Georgia, Idaho, Louisiana, Mississippi, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Washington and the territory of Porto Rico. These states are excepted because their climates are favorable for breeding of the fly.

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YOUNG RUSSIAN MEDICAL PROFESSOR DISCOVERS MEDICINE THAT DISSOLVES AND CURES CANCER IN FEW DAYS TIME

BOSTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Discovery of a compound that dissolves and apparently cures cancer in animals in a few days was announced at the 13th International Physiological Congress at Harvard medical school today.

It is injected hypodermically into the cancer and its effect is quite literally to cause the malignant cells to breathe themselves to death.

Named Oxidation
Scientifically the process is named oxidation, and it means that the abnormal cells get more oxygen than normally filters through to them from breathing through the lungs.

The new angle which this discovery contributes to the fight against cancer is a method of relief by speeding up the natural activities of body cells instead of finding some drug to poison the cancer to death.

The president of the Johns Hopkins university in reply to a question, said that he considered the method important, that today's announcement is a report only of preliminary work and that no prediction can be made as to whether the compound ultimately will be useful to human beings upon whom it has not yet been tried.

Work of Russian
The discovery is the work of a young Russian, Boris Sokoloff, professor of experimental medicine of the Russian University of Prague, Czechoslovakia, at present working as a guest with the institute of cancer research of Columbia university.

He told the congress his attention had been attracted by the fact that in human beings with cancer the cortex of the supra-renal glands of the kidneys shows effects apparently traceable to the cancer. An extract of these glands in their healthy state is the basis of their health.

The extract is named corticosteroid. It is he adds iron and pyruvic acid, which is a coal tar product. He said that when injected into the cancer the pyruvic acid in combination with the iron produces so much oxidation that the cancer cells cannot live, and their death begins within a few hours.

Speed is Striking
The preparation has not yet observed effect on normal tissues, but it spread throughout the cancer to the very outer tips of its growth.

It has been used on 1,000 rats and mice, having four different types of cancer, including the malignant kind. An average of about 70 per cent of the experimental animals were to all appearances cured, said Dr. Sokoloff, and in some experiments the apparent cures were 100 per cent.

Where the apparent cures did not attain 100 per cent, he found too rapid liquefaction of the cancer, a cause of death, and that mortality from this source could be prevented by reducing the dose, so that the curative process was slower.

Dr. Sokoloff's theory is that cancer grows in an area which for some reason has been deprived of sufficient oxygen, and that a disturbance in endocrine glands may be a cause of starting the growth. The endocrine are ductless glands that produce secretions which medical science recently has found of high importance in regulating health, energy and growth.

Children's Survey Cites Dance Evils

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Roadhouses outside city limits and parental failure to keep their youngsters from public dance halls were cited today by the United States children's bureau as major difficulties in the "program" presented by the dance hall.

The report based on a survey of cities in 25 states, showed variance in the laws for control of such halls. Echoes of dances long dead were found in still valid ordinance prohibiting the Toddle Shuffle, Grizzly Bear, Bunny Hug, Texas Tommy and Camel Walk.

The Rabbi will arrive in Corsicana September 1. He is the son of Rabbi Martin Zieleson, life Rabbi of El Paso, where the father had served for more than 20 years.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Estimates made public today by Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee placed customs receipts under the committee revised tariff bill at \$805,498,469, a decrease of approximately \$40,000,000 under estimated revenues from the house rates, but an increase of about \$30,000,000 over existing collections.

The Utah senator estimated receipts under the house measure at \$845,014,545, and those under existing law at \$516,581,344.

Of 431 changes in house levies approved by the finance committee republicans, Smoot said 24 or 59 per cent represented decreases. He figured the average protection of 10 of the 154 rate schedules that make up the bill had been reduced, one was identical and four contained "slight increases."
