Lamesa CCC Camp Wins Championship In Cage Tournament

In the championship clash, McCright led the scoring with 11 points as the entire team took a hand. Rasberry and Borden made 6 each, and Rodgers 8.

Billiard Experts Will Perform In Lamesa

Marcel Camp of Detroit, one of the world's first ten pocket billiard experts, who will appear at the Stanfield Recreation Club in the basement of the Collins Building on March 28, is the first of seven cue ace who will appear here this winter at 11:30 A. M. on the National Billiard Association's nation-wide "Better Billiards" program.

The other six experts in the order of their scheduled appearance in Lamesa are George Sutton, the "hand-liner wonder"; Charles Seaback, Erich Hagenlacher, former world 18.2 balkline billiards champion, Harry Oswald, Frank Taberski, former world pocket billiards titleholder, and Welker Cochran, present king of both the world 18.2 balkline and three-cushion experts.

Camp is one of the youngest pocket billiards stars. Born in Detroit, Michigan in 1905, he started playing billiards at the tender age of twelve.

The Detroit cueist has competed in three world pocket billiards championship tournaments and one national title event. He won the northern sectional title in 1929 and 1930 and then annexed the New York State championship the following year. Camp created a sensation in his first world tourney when he defeated the great Ralph Greenleaf, then champion, in their lone encounter. He also holds victories over Taberski, and two other former champions, Erwin Rudolph and Bennie Allen, in the world tournaments.

In the last world's pocket billiard championship tournament, held in New York last December, the young Michigan cue ace finished eighth in the standings; winning three of his nine games in the round-robin event. He, apparently, was below his top form.

During his two hour demonstration Camp will give Free billiard instruction to both men and women, as well as an exhibition of pocket billiards and fancy shots. He comes well qualified in instruction work, having made his livelihood during the past two years as instructor and is rated one of the games' most capable instructors. Adv.

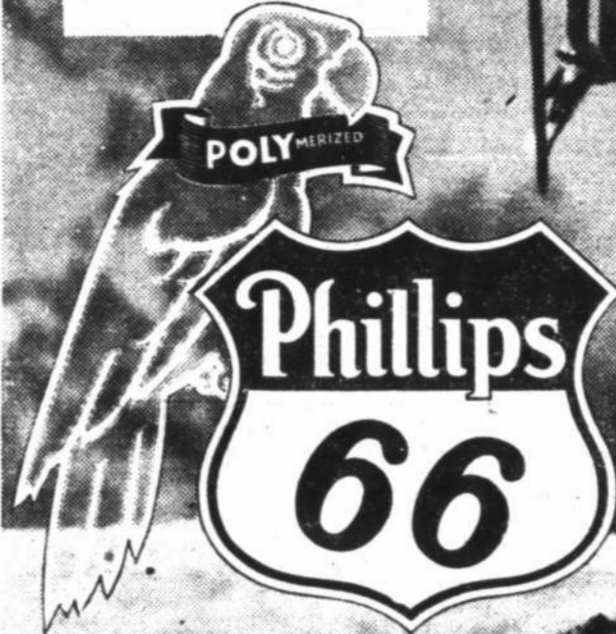

As they walk their fields and ride their fences thinking about the soil and deciding what lands to withdraw from depleting crops, will they be a bit rueful as they remember that only one hundred years have passed over the State? The ruin wrought by erosion would not have come so soon if better care had been taken.

Cotton—hailed as king; and cotton seed, the recognized crown prince of King Cotton's reign, have been such staunch cash crops that it has been easier to allow them full sway than for each of us to think our way through the problem of each piece of land for which we were responsible.

But like all monarchs left by their subjects to their own devices they have

the greater part of the world's supply of oil, gas and sulphur, while a small percentage of these products is consumed within the state.

Realizing the failure of our present system to carry out the mandates of the people, and in many cases its inability to realize its own desires, I will favor and work for the submission to the electorate of Texas a Constitutional Amendment upon the Unicameral Legislature. It is my honest conviction that a One House Legislature will solve the problem of a representative form of government, and will mean the death knell of the domination of a Legislature by special interests through hired lobbyists.

I was born in Freestone County, Texas, August 18, 1888. Moved with my parents to Limestone County in 1900, and came to Fisher County to teach in 1909. Married a native girl of Fisher County in 1912, and moved my family to Crosby County in 1926. I took upon myself the responsibility of my own education at the age of 17 and became a public school teacher at 20. With the exception of 2 years as a Postmaster under the Wilson administration I continued this profession for 17 years. Was for 7 years in various kinds of business and for the past 4 years have been County Judge of Crosby County. Most of what education I have was obtained by hard study at home and in Summer Schools in various colleges. By thus applying myself I have secured a permanent teachers certificate and a license to practice law. Some 21 years of my life having been spent in public service I believe I know from actual experience the problems of the people.

I assure you that I shall devote my time to the interests of the people whom I have been elected to serve. High-powered lobbyists hired by special interests will under no circumstances influence my stand upon any question, and I shall have no time to spend with or for them. You will always find me on the side of the good people of West Texas, and ready and willing at all times to give your County as much time and attention as any other in the District.

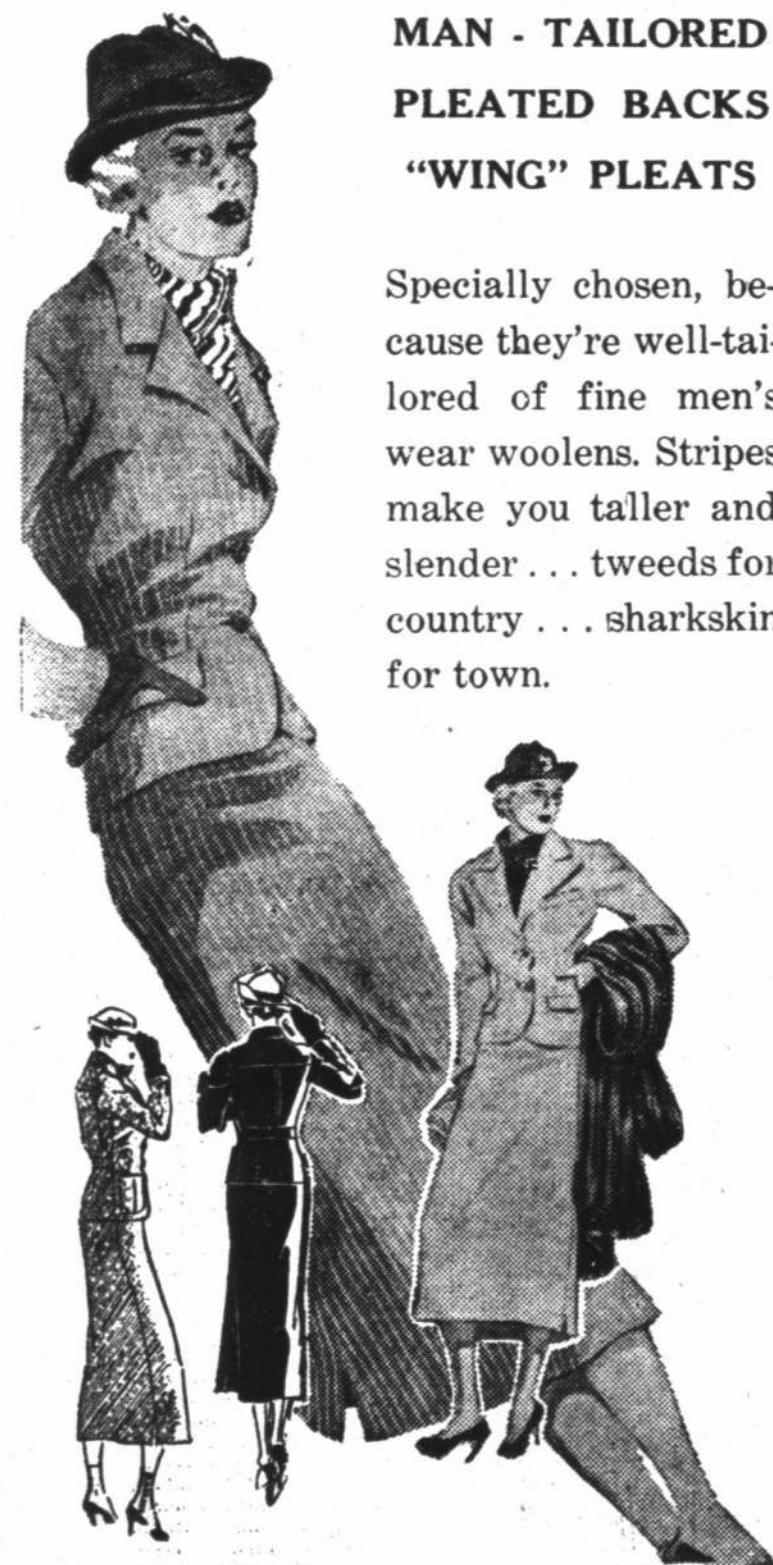
