

Retirement:

Mrs. Blassingame; 2 1/2 Million Meals

In 21 years Mrs. Bonnie J. Blassingame has had a part in preparation of over two and a half million meals served to school children of the Colorado Independent School District.

Now this eager to please, affable person is retiring and will move to Abilene where she and her husband have bought a new home at 3901 Don Juan.

Mrs. Blassingame doesn't recall when she couldn't cook. She became an expert, however, as the family increased and proved to her how very much they liked her cooking.

The seven daughters and one son are Mrs. Lee Nell Gann, special education consultant, Abilene; Mrs. Louise Huff, Mesquite; Mrs. Jimmie Lou Bennett, registered nurse, Hampton, Virginia; H.C. Blassingame, Jr., mortician, Baytown; Mrs. Jewell Reynolds, Houston; Mrs. Jo Ann Alders, Ft. Worth, a homemaker and student at Tarrant County Junior College; Mrs. Jean Richey, Misawa, Japan, USAF Base and Mrs. Jane Bassinger, Lubbock.

The children looked forward to getting home from school to eat the delicious cookies or pies the mother was sure to have for her hungry, expectant brood after a long day in school.

Not until three children had graduated from high school and were away and the other five were in school did Mrs. Blassingame consider work outside the home.

Because she was efficient in purchasing, preparing and cooking food, she joined the cafeteria staff of Kelley Elementary, where for 21 years she has begun work promptly at 8 a.m.

The first nine years she was part of a group who wanted to serve the best meals possible for the little people and faculty at Kelley.

The last 12 years Mrs. Blassingame has been supervisor of all the lunchrooms in CISD, but as usual, her first stop has been at Kelley where she headquartered. There, at her desk, she went over the duties for the day. In rapid succession her stops were at Wallace, Hutchinson, junior high school, high school and back to Kelley. She picked up lunch count, money, and took note of needs at the five schools.

Cafeterias here are a part of three programs: National School Lunch, Special Milk and Breakfast. Approximately 215 children are fed breakfasts at Kelley, Hutchinson and Wallace. Mrs. Blassingame laments that children don't drink enough milk. She smiles a pleasant approval as she says, "The high school boys like both white and chocolate milk. Lifestyle has much to do with what a young person eats. I notice that likes have definitely changed. Now the trend is toward snack foods," Mrs. Blassingame said.

"Salads, both fruit and vegetable, often go untouched." That is almost unforgivable to the thrifty supervisor who finds it a challenge to plan good "Type A" lunches required by National School Lunch Program. Meals must have two ounces of meat or high protein for meat substitute, 3/4 cup of fruit and vegetables, bread and milk, to which the supervisor adds a nourishing, tasty dessert. "It's a well balanced meal," Mrs. Blassingame states.

She says the students like hamburgers best, then chicken fried steak. Next is sandwiches, then pizza. She smiles, and her blue eyes twinkle as she recalls the popular red bean day of the past. "It was served with a vegetable salad, cornbread, butter, and a dessert. We had more on bean day than any other time. Now red beans have no drawing power. Kids like potato chips, pickles, sandwiches, and not a crumb will be left. This fact reflects the moving society and changing tastes as reflected in Alvin Toffler's book, FUTURE SHOCK.

Variety is another concern in menu planning within a certain budget. Bonnie J. likes for all the kids to enjoy the food as her own used to do from her own kitchen.

Other duties she shared are preparing banquets for the high school, meals for the county teachers association and making hotdogs for organizations to sell at ball games. Mrs. Blassingame helps.

"Perhaps it's like Mrs. Ed Richardson tells about. When Superintendent Ed Williams asked her to supervise the lunchrooms, she went to Hutchinson first and began to work. All of the others thought she belonged to Hutchinson only. Actually she worked her way into her co-workers' hearts."

Mrs. Blassingame is retiring five years later than her husband who retired out the farm five years ago. They sold it February of this year.

Changes are coming fast for one who has lived in the same place for many years. Adaptable to change, Mrs. Blassingame plans to get up later in the mornings, play a lot, travel some and have company, lots of it.

Will she miss C-City? Of course she will and also the changing flow of young people from kindergarten through grade 12, in her 21 years with food service.

What will she be serving Mr. B for dessert? Ice cream or fruit!

New Facilities At State Park Here To Be Opened Soon

The new facilities in Lake Colorado City State Park one of the most used parks in this area of the state, are expected to be opened to the public within the next week.

State Park Superintendent Joe Robinette has tentatively scheduled ribbon cutting ceremonies at the park for Tuesday. However, that date is subject to change, depending on completion of paving projects in the area where the new facilities are.

A number of local officials including representatives of the county, city, industrial team and chamber of commerce, are expected to take part in the ceremonies.

Among the new facilities are camping facilities in several areas of the park, a new entrance way to the park and the residence of the park superintendent.

The total cost of the improve-

ments of the park amounted to almost \$500,000 including several miles of paved roads.

One facility which is not yet completed is a fishing pier across one end of the lake. The pier is expected to be completed within the next month, hopefully before July 4 weekend.

The limited area of the park now open for the public has been bulging with campers, fish-

men, picnickers and outers.

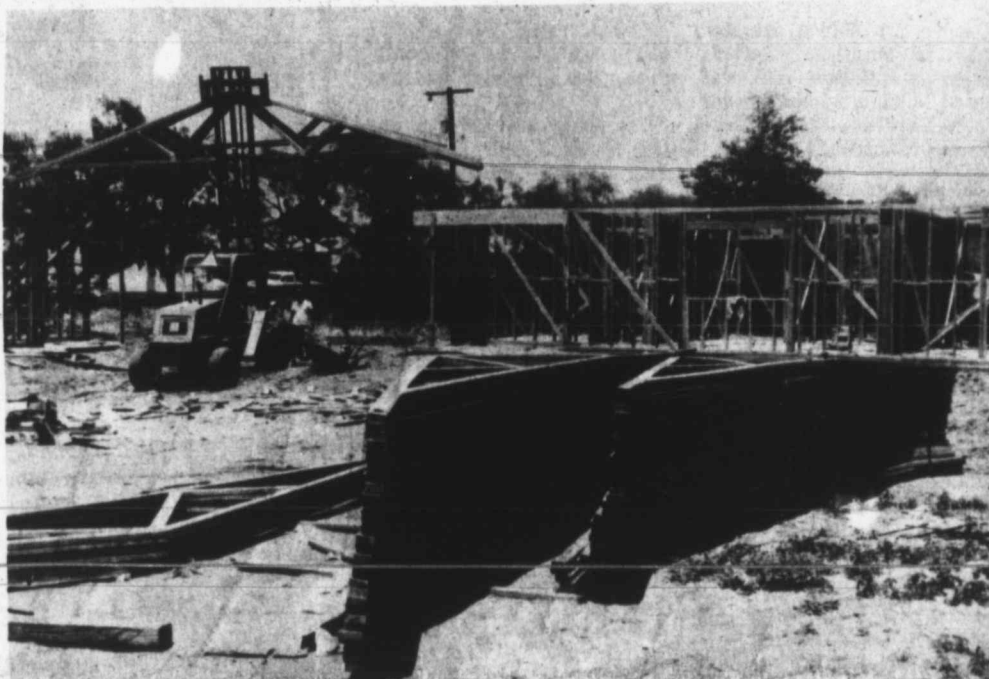
During the Memorial Day holiday, some 947 car permits were issued and there were some 400 campers in the park. Had the weather been better, park officials believe there would have been even a much larger crowd.

The wind was high much of the holiday weekend, which discouraged boaters and fishermen.

Facilities for campers is now limited, in the new part of the park there will be electrical and water hook-ups for 35 cam-

pers, plus a dump station and rest room and shower facilities. Also 20 picnic tables are available at one other station and there are 10 new shelters with water hook-up.

In addition, there is a new swimming beach with beach sand.

REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY; PROVIDING FOR AN ANNUAL PERMIT AND LICENSE FEE TO KEEP DOGS WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR A TAG TO BE ISSUED UPON PAYMENT OF LICENSE TAX, THE TAG TO BE ATTACHED TO THE COLLAR OF EACH DOG; PROVIDING FOR VACCINATION OF DOGS AGAINST RABIES WITHIN 15 DAYS PRIOR TO THE ISSUANCE OF A PERMIT TO KEEP A DOG IN THE CITY; REQUIRING ALL DOGS, THREE MONTHS OR OLDER, WITHIN THE CITY TO BE VACCINATED AGAINST RABIES ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 1973, AND FOR OBTAINING A PERMIT TO KEEP A DOG ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 1973, REQUIRING VETERINARIANS TO ISSUE A CERTIFICATE OF VACCINATION WHEN VACCINATING DOGS AGAINST RABIES; PROVIDING MAXIMUM CHARGE FOR SUCH VACCINATION; REQUIRING REPLACEMENT OF LOST OR DESTROYED TAGS; PROHIBITING REMOVAL OF TAGS FROM COLLARS OF DOGS; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDING AND REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED DOGS; PROVIDING FOR DISPOSAL OF IMPOUNDED DOGS NOT REDEEMED AFTER

FIVE DAYS; PROVIDING FOR SUMMARY DESTRUCTION OF RABID DOGS OR DOGS SHOWING A DISPOSITION TO BITE; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE OF A FINE OF ANY SUM NOT TO EXCEED \$200; VALIDITY CLAUSE; EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. License Fee There is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, 3 months or older, kept or owned within the City of Colorado City, Texas, an annual license fee of Two Dollars and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any such dog to pay over to the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, the said license fee annually as it accrues. The Director of Finance shall collect or have collected under his supervision all such license fees.

SECTION 2. Humane Officer A city employee shall be known and designated as the Humane Officer, who, among other duties shall carry out the terms and provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. Tag Upon payment of said license fee, the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog with a tag on which is stamped the year and the registration number, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog.

SECTION 4. Vaccination Certificates The Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, shall not issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of a dog, 3 months or older, unless and until such owner or keeper shall furnish a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating that such dog has been vaccinated against rabies by him, within the space of fifteen days immediately preceding the date of such application.

SECTION 5. Permit Upon the payment of said license fee, the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, also shall furnish the owner or keeper of each dog, 3 months or older, with a permit to keep each dog within the City of Colorado City, Texas, for the period herein provided. The permit shall contain a description of the dog with reference to breed, sex, name, size and coloring, the name and address of the owner or person to whom the permit is issued, and a statement of the date upon which such dog has been vaccinated as shown by the certificate of the veterinarian presented by the applicant, such permit so issued shall automatically terminate and become absolutely void and ineffective one year from the date of such vaccination as stated therein.

SECTION 6. Certificate of Vaccination All dogs, 3 months or older, within the City of Colorado City, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian on or before July 1, 1973, and once each year thereafter. It is further provided that every veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog kept within the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner, of the dog, and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, a brief description of the dog, and the date of vaccination; provided however, that the fee charged by such veterinarian for such vaccination certificate shall not in any case exceed the sum of Two Dollars.

SECTION 7. Lost Tags Whenever any person has complied with the provisions of the preceding sections of this ordinance, and the license fee tag is lost or otherwise destroyed, it shall be the duty of said owner or keeper of said dog to procure another tag from the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, by paying the

value of said tag and all costs that may have accrued as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 8. Prohibiting Removal of Tags It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, to remove from the collar of the dog covered by a permit issued under the terms of this Ordinance, the metal tag or badge issued by the Director of Finance as herein provided, except upon the expiration of one year from the date that the tag was issued.

SECTION 9. Impounding of Dogs (a) It shall be the duty of the Humane Officer or Officers of the City to take up and impound each dog, where so ever found within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas that does not have attached to its collar, the metal tag required by this Ordinance, showing that a permit for the keeping of such dog has been duly issued as herein provided.

(b) It shall be the further duty of said officer to take up and impound any dog tagged or untagged found within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, that is not securely fastened by a leash or kept within a closely fenced enclosure.

(c) It shall be the future duty of said Officer of the City of Colorado City, Texas, to take up and impound any tagged or untagged dog creating a nuisance by its actions, upon the duly received and filed complaint of any citizen.

SECTION 10. Redemption of Impounded Dogs and Disposal of same. (a) The owner or keeper of any dog captured or impounded under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be permitted and allowed, within five days after such dog shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog, upon payment to the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, the sum of Five Dollars per day, or any fractional part thereof, during which time said dog may have been impounded, and upon securing a permit to keep said dog as herein provided.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dog fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section, within the five day period then said dog shall be disposed of in a humane manner by the Humane Officer or Officers of the City, or sold for pound costs as provided in paragraph (a) of this section.

SECTION 11. Summary Destruction of Rabid Dogs The Humane Officer or any Police Officer of this City shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or any dog in the streets which shall manifest a disposition to bite.

SECTION 12. Duties of Owner It shall be the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog 3 months or older to comply with all provisions of this ordinance and shall provide a safe suitable leash and/or a closely meshed fenced enclosure for the keeping of said dog and it shall be the further duty of said owner or keeper to keep said dog either securely fastened by leash or within a safe suitable enclosure.

SECTION 13. Penalty. Any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction

shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$200.

SECTION 14. Validity Clause Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this Ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council of the City of Colorado City, Texas, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 15. Effective Date This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

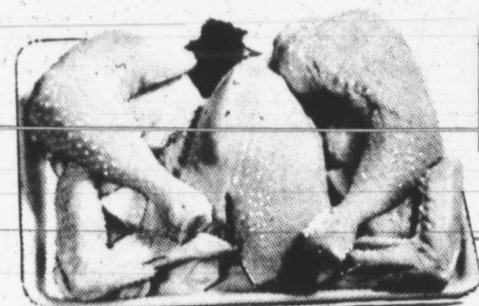
