Mrs. E. G. Overby Killed Friday In Head-On Auto Crash At Coleman

A two-car head-on collision just east of Coleman took the life of Mrs. Callie Alice Overby of Santa Anna about noon Friday. Mrs. Overby, 71, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Walter Holt of Coleman.

Not seriously injured but hospitalized as a result of the accident was the driver of the other car, Lester Schrimsher of San Antonio. The accident took place at the beginning of the new highway construction on just outside of Coleman.

According to the investigating officer, Mr. Schrimsher was traveling south on US 84 and Mrs. Overby was traveling north enroute to Coleman when the accident occurred.

Funeral services for Mrs. Overby were held last Saturday afternoon at the United Presbyterian Church with Rev. Bill Weeks officiating. Burial was in the Santa Anna cemetery.

Mrs. Overby was born in Lott January 15, 1900. She was a longtime resident of Santa Anna having lived here the past 57 years. She was the wife of the late Ernest G. Overby, Santa Anna businessman. She was a Presbyterian and a housewife.

Survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Calice Jane Wagner of Santa Anna; one brother, Floyd Blair of Lampasas, and two grandsons, Carlos and Mark Wagner of Santa Anna.

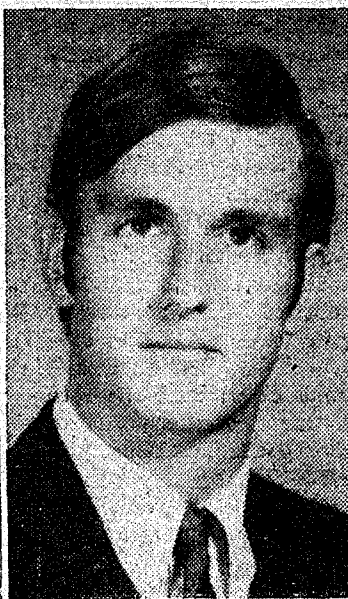

Hay, Livestock Burned Monday In Barn Blaze

A barn and pens at the southwest edge of town were considered a complete loss in a fire about 6:30 p. m. Monday afternoon. The pens and barn belonged to Reynold Buse, and also destroyed by the blaze was hay stored in a shed and several head of pigs and goats that were in the barn.

No New Trustee Candidates For School Board Election

Joe W. Wise of Rockwood, vice president of the School Board, filed for a place on the ballot for re-election as trustee. The filing late Tuesday afternoon, makes the second candidate for the April election. Mr. Wise is serving his second term on the local school board.

Mrs. Curtis (Bettie) Bryan, also of Rockwood, had filed for a place on the ballot last week, making two candidates for the three vacancies. Mrs.

In past years there has been much interest in the local trustee elections and voters have had a choice of candidates from whom to choose. School officials urge prospective candidates to note the filing deadline and get their names on the ballot for the coming election.

RAINFALL HERE EARLY SUNDAY

The Santa Anna area received rainfall of up to one inch early Sunday morning. The rain was the first measurable moisture since January 13 when the official measurement was .05 inch.

Ray Owen, Santa Anna rain reporter, had .60 inch at the official gauge at the east edge of Santa Anna. Three-fourths inch was received west of town and one inch was measured south of Santa Anna.

Farmers and ranchers were grateful for the rain, and although the total amount was not large, the moisture was enough to help the dry grain field and pastures.

Sunday afternoon snow fell in Santa Anna, but the precipitation was not enough to register on the official gauge.

Two Candidates Have Now Filed For City Voting

A six-inch water line to the Ranger Park Inn Nursing Home and an additional fire plug in the vicinity on the east side of town were approved at the called session of the Santa Anna City Council last Thursday morning. Mayor Thomas Wristen presided at the session at the City Hall.

The larger water line to the Ranger Park Inn was requested so that an indoor fire sprinkling system may be installed at the nursing home in order that it can pass the requirements of the State Health Board for Medicare and Medicaid. Also the larger system will be needed when a portion of the nursing home is converted to a clinic and hospital rooms.

Councilman H. A. (Sy) Burden filed for election to the council. He is presently serving an appointed term to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Ethel Judd who resigned. Mrs. Gale Allen, elected last year for her late husband's unexpired term, had earlier filed for re-election.

The other incumbent, Louis Miles Guthrie, has not stated his intentions for the coming election. He has served two elected terms on the City Council. Thomas Wristen is the only candidate who has filed for mayor. He is completing his first term in that position.

Candidates for mayor or the city council has until Wednesday, March 3, to apply for a place on the ballot.

In Our Opinion

ALMOST EVERY SESSION of Congress there are health care bills introduced of various sorts, and all of them are to some degree a form of the old "socialized medicine" that was such a dirty word a few years back.

Among the strongest opponents of government-sponsored medical insurance has been the American Medical Association, and they have had some success in preventing a wholesale program that would include everyone.

However supporters have gotten through Medicare and Medicaid for the elderly.

Our congressman, Omar Burleson, has introduced a health-care insurance bill similar to one he introduced in the 91st Congress, which he says is a middle-of-the-road approach to the financing and providing for the delivery of medical care to all our citizens.

There is no doubt that many people in this country go without proper medical care today, but we wonder whether a bill such as this would solve the problem.

It seems to us that our biggest problem, especially in the small towns and lesser populated areas is finding a doctor who is not so overworked he just can't get around to all the people.

A practical solution to the problem, even though a longrange one, would seem to be to provide training facilities and subsidize students in medical training. Not only would adequate manpower raise the standard of health care, but it would allow many people who seldom get to see a doctor the possibility. With the difficulties they face today, many wait until they are forced into a hospital, or are in serious condition before seeking medical aid, and then their recovery, if at all possible, takes a lot longer than if their illness was discovered in early stages. This just adds to the load of the already overloaded.

Mr. Burleson's bill, according to news releases, aims at remedying the shortage and poor distribution of health manpower, and maybe it would help. It would also include hospital loan programs, and encourage the development of ambulatory health centers.

Almost every hospital in this area is bursting at the seams most of the time, new ones and all, and most could use double their present capacity.

The thing that worries many of us, and we have formed our opinion by simple observation, is that everything the government gets into ends up costing about twice what it would from private sources, and medical costs at the present are far beyond what they should be, even though in the central Texas area doctor's fees are not exorbitant.

If more doctors could be trained, more facilities opened up to take care of the ill, more manpower in the areas where there is a shortage, then most people would receive medical care when they need it, whether we have a government-sponsored health care bill or not.

We generally agree with Mr. Burleson on most issues, and do not take a stand against his bill, because we are not informed of the details it contains, but we do feel that personnel and facilities are of primary interest in medical care for the people.

IN A RECENT EDITORIAL, we stated that recipients of Social Security should be allowed to earn more than the present ceiling.

In a recent poll conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business, they found that in Texas 62 per cent of business men felt that workers over 65 should be exempt from social security and that they should be allowed to earn higher income without penalty.

As is now stands, a man who has paid into Social Security since its inception in 1937, is still penalized if he earns more than \$140 a month and still has to pay social security on what he makes.

It should be just like any other insurance. He paid for it and certainly shouldn't be penalized for collecting it when it is time.

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STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — Governor Preston Smith placed a new \$740 million revenue-raising program before the Legislature, and prompt action toward consideration in the House was promised by Speaker Gus Musbacher.

Governor proposed raising the general sales and auto sales tax rates to four per cent and boosting tuitions in state supported colleges and universities.

He stuck by his original recommendation to appropriate welfare funds for only 10 months of the biennium, meanwhile trusting that the federal government will take over 100 percent of welfare costs. Later assumes a shift of the nearly \$300 million state load to Washington.

Smith, addressing a joint session of the House and Senate, served notice he is again insisting on a biennial (two-year) budget — except for welfare — and hinted strongly he would veto a one-year appropriations bill favored by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, as he did in 1969.

Here's how Smith calculates the yield on his revenue plan which replaces he spend-now-pay-later scheme he outlined January 20:

- Boosting general sales tax rate from 3.25 per cent to four per cent, \$300 million for the biennium.

- Raising auto sales tax rate from three to four per cent, for a \$70 million gain.

- Hiking Texas student tuitions for \$50 to \$125 a semester and out-of-state-student fees in state institutions of higher education from \$200 to \$500 a semester, estimated to yield another \$100 million.

While lawmakers found the new plan more realistic than the no-new-tax message, many expressed the view it would not pass unless coupled with some form of business taxation. Some legislators labeled it insufficient to meet budget needs. Most criticism centered on "lack of balance" between consumer-business levies and the stiff tuition increase recommendation.

EMERGENCY BILLS PASSED — Legislature completed action on emergency bills to avert the threatened March 1 cut in medical assistance and aid to needy families with dependent children.

Final bill cleared by the House and sent to the Governor would divert \$35 million of teacher retirement fund income from April through August. An earlier bill made the appropriation to welfare purposes.

Surprisingly, a bill to create a \$185 million bond fund for building new colleges and universities, which sailed through

House and has backing of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, bogged down in senate committee. Measure now is in sub-committee, but Lieutenant Governor Barnes still predicts passage.

LIQUOR BILL EMERGES — Long-awaited bill to legalize sale of liquor-by-the-drink on a local option basis was introduced in the Senate Joe Christie of El Paso and in the House by Rep. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi.

Legislature was empowered to pass such an act by the constitutional amendment lifting the open saloons ban at last November's general election.

Christie said the bill is "clean, enforceable" and contains no "arbitrary, unreasonable and indefensible restrictions" such as limiting mixed drink sales to establishments selling food.

Initial permit fees would cost \$5,000 and annual renewals \$500. Hale will introduce later tax legislation calling for a 10 per cent gross receipts levy on sale and service of mixed beverages.

Tax bill also would increase gallonage tax on distilled spirits from \$1.68 to \$2.70 and up wine tax per gallon in accord with the alcoholic content of vinous liquor.

Bill will further exempt beverage permit holders and private clubs from the general sales tax and repeal the private club service fee of five cents a drink. Hale and Christie estimate a biennial additional tax revenue of \$28 million.

Miniature bottles, subject of contention in prior legislative clashes over mixed drinks, would be banned. Mixed drink sellers would buy their stock from Texas wholesalers.

Legislation is expected to stir one of the sessions "more spirited" debates.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court agreed to consider a court of civil appeals decision concerning the city of San Antonio's annexation of

five miles of U. S. Highway 281 right-of-way.

High Court reversed an intermediate court and withdrew an earlier opinion, concluding that a home for retired teachers in Waco must pay property taxes to the city and school district.

A Dallas woman got a new hearing in a court of civil appeals in her lawsuit against a Connecticut life insurance company over \$20,000 in coverage on her late husband. Supreme Court sent the case back for consideration of whether death was accidental or self-inflicted.

U. S. Supreme Court upheld the tough state rule in private club operations.

Federal district court here banned the use of federal funds to buy Mustang Island park land. Appeal is being filed.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a 65-year prison sentence assessed a man in the shooting of the Cross Plains city marshal.

ENVIRONMENTALISTS RALLY — First Texas Environmental Education Conference drew a crowd of 1,000 to meet with state officials on ecological issues.

Environmentalists, who claim state effort to save natural resources and prevent pollution are uncoordinated and inadequate, are sponsoring some 60 pieces of legislation. One would establish the Office of Environmental Quality with veto power over other state agencies to protect natural resources.

HOUSING, COMMUNITY PLANS TOLD — Governor Smith presented a special message to the Legislature recommending "bold, massive" programs to improve housing and encourage community development.

Governor also urged board authority for local governments to improve services and

efficiency through interlocal contracts, subdivision standards outside cities and year-round voter registration.

SHORT SNORTS

Senate passed a constitutional amendment to guarantee that equality under law cannot be denied because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin. . . . House approved repeal of an old law requiring county commissioners to force land owners to kill prairie dogs. . . . Establishment of telephone and utilities regulatory commissions came under heavy fire at Senate committee hearing. . . . Game, fish and water safety law violations brought the state \$416,054 in fines during the last fiscal year, a \$44,000 increase. . . . March draft call for Texas is 908, Selective Service announced. . . . Mental Health-Mental Retardation accepted \$744,531 in federal grants. . . . Credit union may not invest in a subsidiary corporation which is unrelated to its original purpose, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held in a new opinion. . . . PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law. (c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1972.

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

Our Student Demonstrators?

May a college student be suspended or expelled from school for taking part in a campus demonstration? The question arises nowadays with growing frequency, and the courts are beginning to lay down some guidelines in this sensitive area.

To start with, students have the same freedom of speech, press and assembly as everyone else in the community. They do not bargain away their constitutional rights just by enrolling in college. Take this case:

A state college decided to nip trouble in the bud by requiring permits for any and all "parades," celebrations, and demonstration. When students staged a peaceful demonstration without a permit, they were promptly suspended.

But in a court test, the permit rule was struck down as a violation of the freedom of assembly. The court said: "Colleges, like all other in-

stitutions, are subject to the Constitution."

But if colleges are subject to the Constitution, so are the students. If college powers are limited so are student rights.

In another case, some students were suspended for forcibly blocking access to the campus placement office. In court, they invoked their freedom of speech, arguing that blocking the office was simply one way of expressing their opinion.

But a court decided that freedom of speech did not stretch that far. The judge said:

"They have rights guaranteed by the First Amendment. Those rights, however, are not a license to trample upon the rights of others, the enjoyment of which is equally precious."

Likewise, the Fourteenth Amendment — against discrimination — does not prevent the college from exercising reasonable flexibility in meting out punishment.

In another case of student violence, the college imposed tougher penalties on graduate students than on undergraduates. This was challenged in court as discriminatory, on the theory that students who commit the same offense should get the same punishment.

However, the court decided the school's "discrimination" was reasonable enough under the circumstances. The judge said it made sense to expect greater responsibility from older students than from the younger students.

County Agent's News...

Our 1970 Result Demonstration Handbook is now completed and available free for anyone interested. These handbooks maybe picked up in our office. This years handbook has several milo variety tests, a cotton management system, small grain variety and results of still-besterol implants on cattle. I think there are some good demonstrations handbook and hope it will be of use to some of you.

The Field Crops Committee has planned a milo production meeting for March 18. We will have more information about this meeting later on but I wanted to mention it so some of you could mark your calendar.

Dr. Bob Metzger, Agronomist from Lubbock and Robert Kensing, Area Farm Management Spec. from San Angelo will be the speakers.

Milo is an important crop in Coleman Co. Last year 17,000 acres were planted. Milo has many benefits other than just a cash crop. The all concentrate (Mainly milo) feeding of lambs and steers has greatly increased the demand. The growing hog industry in Coleman Co. has increased the local useage of milo. Many people are using a mixture of oats and milo to dry-lot ewes where pastures are dry. I hope to have some cost-result figures on this next year. Plan on coming to the "Money in Milo" meeting if you can.

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Accent On Health

In the past ten years the mortality rate from emphysema and chronic bronchitis has more than quadrupled in the United States and continues to grow faster than for any other disease.

Pulmonary or lung diseases are the second most common cause of disability in Texas. Until 1967, no intensive treatment and rehabilitation program existed for the Texan who had chronic obstructive lung disease, manifested by difficulty in breathing.

Dr. George A. Hurst, who heads up a pilot rehabilitation program for the State Health Department in East Texas, calls the rapid rise in lung disease a "seriously developing public health problem."

That is why the Pulmonary Rehabilitation Program was

initiated in 1967 at the East Texas Tuberculosis Hospital near Tyler. It marked the first time there had been such an organized program in Texas—a pilot program to help people with chronic breathing trouble due to emphysema, chronic bronchitis, and obstructive asthma.

At the Tyler hospital, a multi-disciplined approach utilizes the services of three physicians in different aspects of the rehabilitation program. Vocational counselors, psychologists, physical therapists and social workers also pool their specialized knowledge in an intensive program to aid the patient.

The patient undergoes an intensive series of medical, physiological, social and vocational evaluations. He begins medical treatment, breathing training, and a graded exercise program designed to improve pulmonary functions and increase physical ability to the maximum. Teaching the patient to care for himself and to be a productive member of society is as important in the program as the medical treatment itself.

The pilot program has been very successful. At the end of fiscal year 1969, 63 per cent of the patients in the program were employed. An additional 19 per cent were seeking employment or were ready for employment. Another 18 per cent were too ill for employment, or had died.

Through this pilot program, the State Health Department is trying to salvage those patients whose chances of recovery without the program would be very poor. The Tyler project is one of only four such centers in the entire country.

50,000 LUNCHES WILL BE SERVED IN SCHOOL LUNCHROOM THIS YEAR

Santa Anna school children will fill their school cafeteria plates nearly 50,000 times during the 1970-71 school year, according to Food Service Supervisor Udell Copeland. Over 260 children a day are average in the local school lunchroom lines, making a total of over 1,300 a week.

The biggest food service in town is operated by Mrs. Copeland, Mrs. Claude Langford, and Mrs. Jessie Upchurch. Mrs. L. K. Wardlow is a part-time worker and five school students work for short periods each day during the noon hour.

Commodities from the federal lunch program are distributed to the local lunchroom from a Brownwood agency that serves 196 area schools. Mrs. Copeland uses as many of the commodity products as possible but has to purchase all the fresh vegetables, fruits and many other items through local markets or wholesalers.

The Santa Anna lunchroom serves "Type A" lunches which require daily at least one-half cup fresh fruit or vegetables, 1 slice of bread, one-half pint milk, and two ounces meat. In most cases the servings on the lunches exceed the required amounts.

Mrs. Copeland prepares the lunchroom menus, often several weeks in advance, and she has learned to prepare and serve what the students prefer. The staff keeps an eye on the garbage cans and will omit or change foods items that are constantly discarded uneaten by students. A favorite menu is hamburgers or pinto beans.

This year, federal funds provided expanded food service programs in Texas schools, which provided more free or reduced cost lunches to a greater number of children. Children participating

in the free lunch program are selected under national guidelines based on family income and number of children in school. A breakfast program governed by local regulations, is practiced in some Texas schools.

The lunches in the local school cafeteria cost 40 cents a day for elementary school students and 45 cents a day for high school students. Faculty members and staff may also eat at the cafeteria each day for a cost of 60 cents each.

Although the lunchroom is operated on a limited budget, only one price increase has been necessary in the past ten years. Of great help to the program was the re-instatement of the special milk program in which state funds partially reimburse the lunchroom for milk consumed by school children.

Visitors are always welcome to visit the school cafeteria and parents and school patrons may have lunch there if the personnel has been notified in advance.

The local school system is fortunate to have such an efficient, well operating school lunch program available to children in the school district.

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

Q) I need more tax forms. Where can I get them?

A) Any local IRS office should have the forms you need. Many banks and post offices also stock the most frequently used forms.

To avoid processing and refund delays, don't forget to take the name label off the cover of your 1040 tax package and put it on the Form 1040 you file.

Q) Will any IRS office compute my tax for me?

A) No, the tax computation is done at the IRS regional

service center where the returns are processed. If you wish to have the IRS compute your tax, complete all the appropriate lines on your return and then mail it to IRS as you have in the past. Be sure to attach all necessary schedules.

Only those who have \$20,000 or less income consisting of salaries, wages, dividends, interest, pension or annuities and claim the standard deduction, qualify to have the IRS compute their requirements and are entitled to retirement income credit, follow the instructions at the top of Schedule R, attach it to your return, and the credit will be computed by IRS.

Q) I'm taking care of my mother's tax return this year. What special benefits is she entitled to by being over 65?

A) The tax benefits for older Americans are explained in a free booklet by that name which is available at IRS offices. Send a post card to your District Director and ask for Publication 554.

Q) I was out of work several months last year and received unemployment benefits. Do I have to include them with the rest of my income?

A) No, unemployment benefits are not taxable and do not have to be reported.

Q) My son now buys most of his clothes with what he makes on his after school job. Will this cause any change in his dependency status?

A) If you are referring to the support test, the fact your son buys his own clothes will probably not disqualify him. Included in support are food, medical and educational expenses as well as clothing. If you provide more than half the cost of these items, your son will still qualify as your dependent under the support test.

Q) Which of my home expenses can I deduct?

A) Homeowners may deduct the real estate taxes paid on their property and the interest portion of mortgage payments. Utility expenses are not deductible.

Improvements to a home or property are considered capital expenditures and may be added to the property's basis.

Q) I got a statement from my bank showing how much my savings account earned last year. Should I send it in with my 1040?

A) No, the statement is only for your records. The bank has

Q) My husband and I work and we pay a neighbor to take care of our children after school. Can we deduct this?

A) It may qualify as a child care expense which is deductible under certain conditions. The amount of the deduction is a maximum of \$600 for one dependent, or \$900 for two or more dependents.

This deduction is explained on Pages 8 and 9 of the Form 1040 instructions. If you qualify, don't forget to complete Form 2441 and send it in with your Form 1040.

Q) I report tips to my employer but I don't see them entered separately on my W-2. Should I add the tips to the amount of my wages shown?

A) No, if you reported tip income to your employer he has included them with your other wages. Therefore, you should not enter tips as a separate item.

Only if tip income has not been reported to your employer should it be added to your wages and salaries.

Q) Who can file as head of household?

A) Several types of taxpayers may qualify for the special head of household tax rates. They include taxpayers who maintain a household for someone else, widows and widowers, and married persons living apart.

Details on who qualifies as a head of household are given on Page 4 of the 1040 instructions.

To facilitate advance market planning for upland cotton, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today Commodity Credit Corporation upland cotton sales policy for the 1971-72 marketing year. The 1971-72 program is based on authority contained in the Agricultural Act of 1970, and other existing legislation, and is designed to make CCC stocks of cotton available if needed to supplement regular carry-over stocks, and 1971-crop production. The overall cotton program as announced for the 1971-72 marketing year is expected to improve the competitive position of U.

S. cotton in both domestic and foreign markets. Some bases and details of the policy announced today are listed as follows:

1. The 1970 Act provides that the sales price cannot be less than 110 per cent of the loan rate for Middling 1-inch upland cotton (micronaire 3.5 through 4.9) adjusted for such current market differentials reflecting grade, quality, location, and other value factors determined appropriate plus reasonable carrying charges.

2. The 1971 loan level of 19.50 cents per pound basis Middling 1-inch cotton, net weight, at average location, was established for upland cotton on Dec. 8, 1970.

3. Existing legislation also requires CCC to sell or make available for unrestricted use at current market prices in each marketing year a quantity of upland cotton equal to the "shortfall" (amount by which production is less than estimated requirements for domestic use and for export for the marketing year). The legislation further requires sales be made in an orderly manner and so as to affect market prices unduly.

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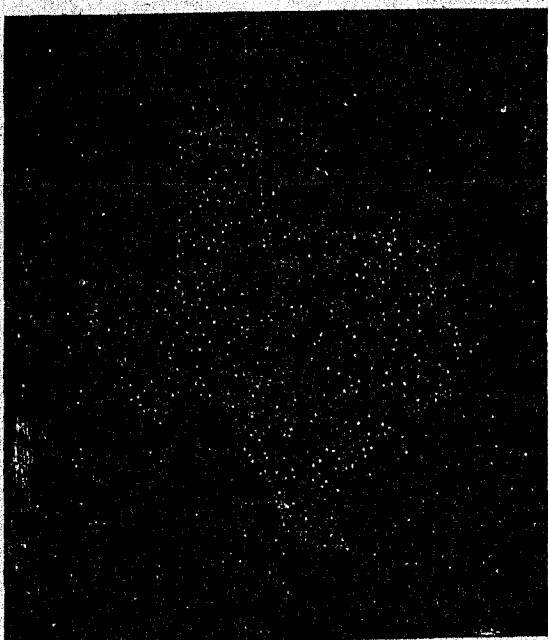

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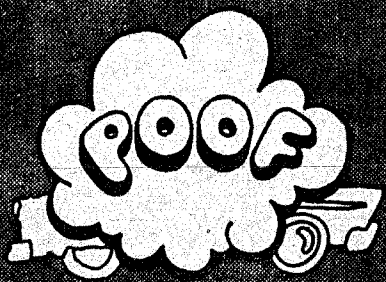

HPC Track Star Sets New Record In Houston Event

Howard Payne College senior Junior Lee of Cross Plains has again proved himself to be one of the top distancemen in the nation, according to a report from HPC track coach David Noble. Lee, husband of the former Carolyn Rowe of Santa Anna, received the latest recognition after competing in the recent third annual Astrodome-Federation National Indoor Track and Field Championships at Houston.

In the two-day meet, the slender, sandy-haired cinderman ran three mile races in less than 4.09 and turned in a fast 1.49.3 anchor leg in a record-breaking HPC two-mile relay team performance.

Lee's time of 4:05.9 in the open mile represented a record for that event in the Astrodome, as well as a new school mark for the Howard Payne millers. His performance in the two-mile relay also set an Astrodome and HPC record.

"Junior's season this year could represent a fitting climax to a brilliant career as a distance runner at Howard Payne," said Noble. "I believe he has a great chance of dipping under 4 minutes in the mile if he continues to work hard and if he gets strong competition."

The HPC runners will be in action again this weekend when they travel to Ft. Worth for competition in the annual recreation meet.

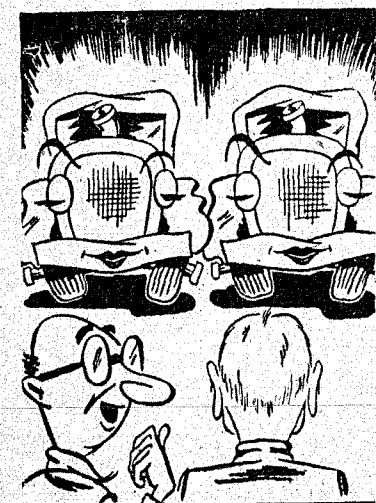
Six Week Term Ends At School
