\$30,000 Already Received On Cattle; Exemption Tags Here; Corn-Hog Finished

County Agent D. W. Sherrill explains some features of the several government programs in this county.

Tax Exemption Certificates

Over half of the 4,300 tax exemption certificates have been called for and others are calling for certificates daily. Those who cannot call for certificates in person should give some person written authority to receive and sign for the certificates. Certificates will not be surrendered to anyone unless there is a written authority from the producers to deliver to a definite person.

A telegram has been received from the State Allotment Board which states that Tax Exemption Certificates cannot be transferred from one farm to another or from one person to another except by approval of the county committee. Exemption certificates must be transferred at the rate of 3½ cents per lint pound. The State Allotment Board has cut 14½ per cent from this county's allotment basis in order to come within the county allotment of 14,853 bales.

Further information as to regulations on the sale and transfer of certificates will be carried in a later issue of the News.

Cattle Program

Over 11,000 head of cattle have been offered the government in the cattle program by 1,000 producers. About 7,000 head have been purchased and condemned or shipped. About one-half have been condemned. Producers have already received \$30,000.00 of the \$53,602.00 which represents the purchase price of cattle already purchased. More than 700 applicants have already been looked after. All of the cattle offered will be taken care of eventually. The program is still open to those who wish to offer cattle.

Sheep and Goats

Those who wish to offer sheep and goats for sale to the government should do so at once as the program will begin in the very near future. More than 8,000 sheep and 3,000 goats have been offered to date.

Corn and Hog Program

Completion of corn and hog compliance has been made and certifications has been mailed to headquarters. Second checks on Corn and Hog, Cotton and Wheat programs should arrive here the latter part of this month. Producers will be notified immediately when payment does arrive.

Three School Buses to Bring Rural Students To Gatesville Hi Daily

ROUTES BEGIN SATURDAY

Three bus routes will run from rural schools to the Gatesville High School. One will run from Jonesboro, one from Purmela by Arnett and Plainview and one will run from Leon Junction to Flat then to Mound and to Gatesville.

All these buses will run on Saturday of this week and will arrive at the Gatesville School at 9 o'clock. On all days after that the buses will arrive at Gatesville at 8:30 each morning. Until the buses have run a few days so as to establish a definite time to pass each point on the routes pupils will have to watch closely for the bus to arrive. After the first few days, however, the buses will pass the same point at the same time each day. The driver of each bus is instructed not to wait for any child who is more than a hundred yards away at the time the bus passes a given point.

Only students who have finished the upper grade of the home school can ride the buses into Gatesville, except by special arrangement. No special arrangements will be made unless the buses happen to not be loaded with regular pupils. Students who live more than two and one-half miles from their home school, however, may ride the bus from their homes to the home school and get off there, while the graduates of the home schools will ride on into Gatesville.

There will be no transportation charge for any pupil who is allowed to ride the buses. The State of Texas will pay the transportation bill for these students. No student may ride the bus unless authorized by the Gatesville Schools and pay passengers are not wanted. All students who enter the Gatesville schools are expected to report Saturday morning, September 8, at 9:30 o'clock for enrollment. A general assembly will be held in each building for the purpose of giving instructions for further procedure. Following this assembly enrollment for all those who have not already enrolled will be finished. Books will then be issued, high school books through the library, and the last part of the days activity will be a short schedule of regular classes. In these short classes lessons will be assigned and regular formal work will begin with the first bell next Monday.

It is essential that all students report to school on Saturday. Those who fail to do so will not get text books until next week and will also miss the lesson assignments and will thus begin school behind the others.

After Saturday all school days will begin at 8:45 and close at 4:00 in the afternoon, this program being 15 minutes later than that of last year. The noon period will be from 12:15 to 1:00. Assembly periods will be from 10:45 to 11:15 on days when assemblies are scheduled.

Pledge

I will think—talk—write . . . Texas Centennial in 1936! This is to be my celebration. In its achievement I may give free play to my patriotic love for Texas' heroic past; my confidence in its glories that are to be.

The completion of the new Highway No. 7 from Gatesville to Waco will bring a new civic problem to our city fathers. Through traffic will naturally enter Gatesville on East Main Street and as they enter Gatesville will be subjected to a tourist's nightmare of poor streets. Gatesville bids fair to regain her reputation for rough streets unless East Main is greatly improved. There was a time when all of Central Texas bowed to Gatesville (not very enviously) as having the roughest square in Texas. The suggestion of this writer is that the city dads begin now to work East Main into at least a fairly presentable condition so that travelers from afar might not have their teeth jolted loose and their nerves shattered when they pass through our fair city.

Cotton farmers should be wearing a broad smile these days, because the County Agent has received the cotton tags and is distributing the same. These tags will enable the farmer to sell so much cotton tax free. If he doesn't produce enough cotton to use all of his exemption tags those tags may be sold at a good premium as the government allows the transfer of them.

* * * *

All in all, the farmers and business men of this county ought to be feeling pretty good. Farmers owe less than in several years. There is more canned goods in the pantry and more meat in the smokehouse. In spite of the drought the farmer will probably get almost as much for his cotton crop this year as he did last year. The conditions point to an exceptionally good fall. Things are not nearly so bad as the calamity howlers would have us to believe. The farmers have more, thus they will get a greater enjoyment out of life and the merchants will do a larger volume of business.

So far, the general strike among textile workers hasn't had much more effect than to lower the price of cotton about 3 cents. Violence is much less than usual, with only one person injured. It appears that the strikers are not demanding more than justice in that they are only asking for a thirty-hour week and 40 cents an hour for their work. Living costs in mill centers are ordinarily higher than elsewhere. Thus it appears that the request of the strikers is simply for a living wage under bearable working conditions.

Following Jas. E. Ferguson's withdrawal in favor of John Garner for the post of National Committeeman from Texas, former Lieut. Gov. T. W. Davidson, one of the "original Allred supporters," and erstwhile contender for the position, withdrew in favor of the Vice President. Official circles intimated that Davidson's withdrawal not only eliminated one contender for the job, but indicated there would be little opposition to Garner at the State Democratic Convention at Galveston the week of Sept. 11.

The 1936 Centennial bids have been received by the Centennial Commission from Dallas, Houston and San Antonio, the only cities making offers. The subcommittee proposed at a meeting last week to keep all bids for the proposed \$15,000.00 celebration sealed until they can be presented to a meeting of the entire commission to be called by Cullen F. Thomas of Dallas, president.

A peasant woman living near Budapest (Hungary) received the Government's first prize for having more children than any other mother in the country. She is Mrs. Antal Krammer, 48 years old, and has twenty-one children. She was married at sixteen. For her championship, Mrs. Krammer received a State prize of \$30 (American exchange). Gold medals were awarded to 6,000 other Hungarian mothers, who, combined, have a total of 80,000 children, a total of 13 1-3 children each.

"The drought," says John J. Thomas, recently appointed vice Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank at Washington, "is a blessing in disguise which may bring farm prices in line with industry and create a condition whereby they can all go up together." Mr. Thomas, if right, revives the age-old saying "it is an ill wind that blows nobody good."

This morning's paper announces that Italy's King and Queen and Austria's Archduchess Zita have approved the marriage of Archduke Otto, Hapsburg pretender to the Austrian throne, to Princess Maria, youngest daughter of their Italian Majesties. European circles have rumored for some time that such a connection between the two royal families would indicate that Italy would support Otto's pretensions to the throne of Austria. It is significant to note, they contend, that Premier Mussolini, iron man of Italy, has stated that he will not permit a union of Austria and Germany, while many statesmen hold that with the Hapsburgs again in power in power the danger of Austria's union with Nazi Germany would be averted.
