Brrrr! Snow covers area

Colorado City and Mitchell County students received an unexpected holiday Friday after a major winter storm dumped up to 2-3 inches of snow on the area, making driving conditions hazardous.

Snow began falling Thursday afternoon after the icy-cold front hit the area late Wednesday. Gusting winds, which dipped the chill factor to near minus-20, kept most of the highways and roads relatively clear of snow until late Thursday afternoon when the snow began accumulating on many streets.

After a high of 12 degrees on Thursday, the temperature at 6 a.m. Friday stood at a chilly 8 degrees, the lowest of this winter season.

Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook students weren't the only ones to gain a holiday Friday as the Mitchell County offices closed for the day

and many businesses were closed or had delayed openings.

And while the area remained covered under a blanket of white, many residents apparently decided that home was the best place to enjoy the scene.

The Colorado City Police Department had reported no accidents by 9 a.m. Friday and a Root Memorial Hospital spokesman said the emergency room had not treated any weather-related accident cases.

"Residents are using extreme caution," said City Manager Brenda Tarter. "We've had no reports of accidents and we hope that trend continues."

A spokesman for the National Weather Service in Abilene said the cold was not expected to leave the area until Sunday. A second low pressure system prompted a forecast for more snow on Friday.

Chamber banquet set Friday

New chamber officers to be installed include Ronnie Aston, president; Tom Lovell, vice president; Cecil Oursbourn, secretary-treasurer; and D. M. Smith, parliamentarian. Incoming directors are Trev Smith, Becky Manning and Joy Morris.

Midland businessman Clayton W. Williams Jr. will be the featured speaker. Williams, who formed ClayDesta National Bank in 1981, entered the oil and gas business as an independent in 1957 and since that time has been associated with all facets

of the industry. His businesses include oil and gas exploration, production and transportation, real estate, commercial and Brangus cattle, banking and oil field services and supply, which combined have gross revenues in excess of \$1 billion. In 1982, Williams was the largest individual oil producer in Texas and Clajon Gas Company, which he formed in 1961, was the largest independent transporter of gas in Texas.

Williams, a graduate of Texas A&M University, gave \$2.50 million in 1984 to underwrite the construction of a building to house the Texas A&M Association of Former Students to be named in his honor.

Elections in store for voters

Mitchell County voters will be deciding on a number of city, school board and hospital board elections scheduled for the first Saturday in April.

Most boards will be calling the elections at their February board meetings.

Colorado City voters will be deciding on four spots on the city council. Mayor Elmer Martin and council members Dee Hearn, Don Bennett and the spot formerly occupied by Ray Mason are all up for election this year for two-year terms.

The Colorado City Independent School district will have two spots up for election. Those spots are presently occupied by Joe Kirschbaum and Dr. Billy Bruce Bridgford and are three-year terms. CISD voters will

also be deciding on a one-year term to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dr. Pat Thomas. The spot formerly occupied by Thomas will be up for election again in April of 1986 for a three-year term.

The Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors will have four positions up for election. The spots presently occupied by Glenn Hemphill, Bobby Lemons, Herbert Mearse and Preston Morris will be decided on in April. Those are two-year terms.

In Loraine, the mayor and three council positions will be up for election this year. Tommy Green is mayor and the three council positions are occupied by Kent Boyd, Joel Ray Atkins and Rick Rickard. Atkins was

appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of Jack Brewer. Rickard was appointed to fill the vacancy left by Green who was appointed mayor after the resignation of Royce Beighs.

In the Loraine Independent School District, the three-year terms of Danny Butler and Eugene Smith will be expiring. IISD voters also will be deciding on a one-year unexpired term currently held by Frank Garza who was appointed last year to fill the vacancy created by the death of James Clifton.

Two places on the Westbrook Independent School District board of directors will be expiring this year. The two spots are currently occupied by Larry Casey and Donnie Hale.

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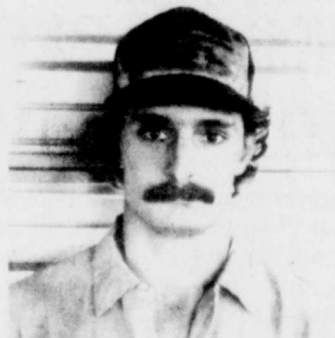

Yolanda Levesque learned to cook an unusual way—she read recipe books.

She did learn a little bit about cooking from watching her mother, but mainly read recipes.

When Mrs. Levesque married, she knew a little about cooking, but not too much.

She likes to try new recipes and experiments with them.

Mrs. Levesque likes to cook "but not as much as I used to."

Most of the time, she fixes lunch and supper. She has to fix big meals, because her family are big eaters.

Mrs. Levesque's favorite things to fix are sweets.

She likes to fix balanced meals and she uses a lot of chicken instead of beef.

Mrs. Levesque uses some convenience foods, but basically cooks from scratch and fixes quite a few casseroles when everyone is going different directions.

Mrs. Levesque is married to Ed, owner of Pioneer Maintenance and they have three children—Andy 13; Chad 10 and Christy seven.

Today she is sharing three of her recipes with RECORD readers.

CHICKEN ORANGE

1 broiler-fryer (3 pound) cut up

1 cup orange juice

1/2 cup soy sauce

One-third cup packed brown sugar

1 1/2 teaspoon ginger root

1 cup sliced celery

2 tablespoons cornstarch mixed with 1/2 cup water

Arrange chicken skin side up single layer in large shallow baking dish. Mix orange juice, soy sauce, ginger root and celery, pour over chicken and bake 50 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove chicken, stir cornstarch mixture into pan of juices. Put chicken back in pan and bake 10 minutes till sauce thickens. Serve over rice. Serves 4.

POTATO CHEESE SOUP

3 medium potatoes, peeled and cut up

1 cup water

1 small onion

1 cup of milk

3 tablespoons butter, melted

3/4 teaspoon salt

Dash pepper

1 cup cheddar cheese

In saucepan, add potatoes and onions and water. Cover and cook until potatoes are tender.

Mash potatoes, do not drain. Add milk and butter and salt and pepper. Heat till warm then add cheese. Simmer till cheese melts. Serves four.

COCONUT CREAM CAKE

1 package pudding included yellow cake mix

3 eggs

1 cup water

One-third cup vegetable oil

2 tablespoons grated orange peel

COCONUT CREAM FILLING

1/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons corn starch

One-eighth teaspoon salt

2 egg yolks

1 1/4 cups milk

1 tablespoon butter

1/2 cup flaked coconut

1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped

Combine sugar, corn starch, and salt in saucepan, beat egg yolks, then gradually blend in milk. Cook stirring until mixture thickens. Remove from heat.

Stir in butter and coconut. Place plastic wrap directly on filling.

Cool completely, fold in whip cream.

Prepare cake mix with egg, water and oil, adding orange rind. Divide batter into two greased and floured cake pans.

Bake 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until center springs back.

Cool 10 minutes then split each layer in half. Put layers together with coconut filling. Frost sides and top with Cool Whip and toasted coconut.

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Texas Utilities plans for future electricity needs

A resource plan for meeting area electricity needs through 1994 has been announced by Texas Utilities Electric Company. The plan includes revised cost and schedule estimates for the Comanche Peak nuclear plant and four lignite-fueled generating units.

The plan includes estimates of growth in TUEC's service area over the next decade and the company's plans for meeting growing needs for electricity through use of lignite-and nu-

clear-fueled generation, cogeneration, load management, conservation and combustion turbines.

Because of uncertainties about the time and effort necessary to obtain an operating license, the company now estimates Comanche Peak Unit 1 probably will not be placed in full power operation before early 1986. Unit 2 is expected to become operational in mid-1987.

Based on this schedule, the cost of the plant now is estimated to be \$4.56 billion. TUEC's share of the plant cost is \$1,930 per kilowatt, about 25 percent below the industry average for plants going into service in the same time period.

The previous cost estimate of \$3.89 billion, developed in 1983, was based on Unit 1 going into full power operation in early 1985 and Unit 2 about 18 months later.

"Construction of Unit 1 is essentially complete. However, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff recently has made potentially serious findings concerning our quality assurance program," said Michael D. Spence, president of Texas Utilities Generating Company.

"We are fully committed to the safe operation of Comanche Peak and are dedicated to fully satisfying the NRC's concerns. Our program to resolve these and other technical issues that have been raised in the licensing process, however, makes our current schedule for operation of Unit 1 unrealistic," he said.

Spence said the new cost estimate takes into account the cost of money used to finance the plant, other expenses that will be incurred while operation is delayed and other costs that were not anticipated when the 1983 estimate was made.

The schedule for Unit 2 has been affected by the need to allocate significant engineering, construction and management resources to resolving technical issues identified in Unit 1 during the licensing process. Previous cost and schedule estimates had assumed these resources would be devoted to Unit 2.

Also, the new estimates take into account the fact that additional resources are being required to incorporate into Unit 2 the lessons learned in the design and construction of Unit 1.

B. B. Hardee, manager of Texas Electric Service Company's Colorado City office, noted that Comanche Peak will still benefit the company's customers.

"Comanche Peak is essential to meeting our customers' needs for reliable electric service in the future," Hardee said. "The area we serve is growing rapidly. Despite this cost increase, Comanche Peak is still an economical long-term resource for

providing the electricity our customers need."

Hardee pointed out that Comanche Peak's cost per kilowatt continues to compare very favorably to that of other nuclear plants scheduled for completion in the same time period. A recent review of such plants shows that Comanche Peak's revised estimate is about 25 percent below the estimated average industry cost.

Scheduled operating dates for the four lignite generating units under construction also were revised.

Under the new schedule, Unit 1 of the Twin Oak plant in Robertson County will go into service in 1991 and Unit 2 in 1992, a postponement of two years each. The service date for the single-unit Forest Grove plant in Henderson County was changed from 1989 to 1993, and the date for the fourth unit at the Martin Lake plant in Rusk County was changed from 1991 to 1994.

These changes in schedule, along with the use of cogeneration combustion turbines and alternate energy resources to help meet customers' needs, have reduced capital requirements somewhat from those in previous estimates. While reducing the need for capital, however, additional reliance is placed on natural gas and oil as long-term fuel sources.

In the resource plan, TUEC estimates that without an aggressive load management program growth in the need for

electricity in its service area will average 3½ to 4 percent annually through 1994. However, the load management program is expected to reduce the amount of annual growth that will have to be met through additional generation to slightly less than 3 percent.

Under the plan, the company will meet expected growth over the next decade as follows:

-91 percent from Comanche Peak;

-30 percent with its lignite generating plants;

-17 percent from conservation and load management activities;

-14 percent from cogeneration which involves using steam produced as a by-product by some industries to generate electricity; and

-18 percent by construction of combustion turbines, which are relatively small gas- and oil-fueled generators.

TUEC's load management program incorporates concepts aimed at holding down the need for new generating capacity. It includes providing incentives to encourage customers to buy energy efficient equipment and to install thermal storage or off-peak cooling systems.

The load management program has proved very effective since it was introduced several years ago. So far, it has succeeded in limiting peak load by about 600,000 kilowatts, the equivalent of a large power plant.

A brother, J. T. of Colorado City, survives him.

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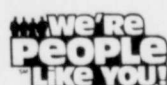
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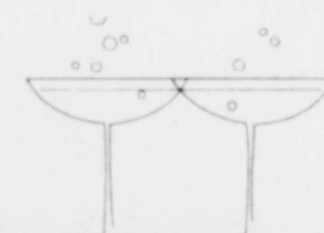
