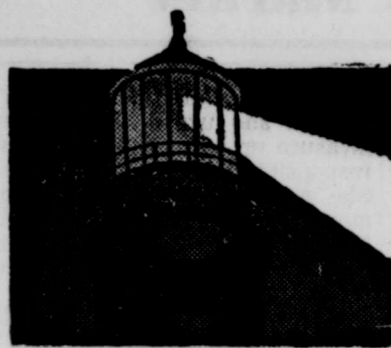

Most places of business do maintain attractive, clean stores, but our streets are not always clean. A group of energetic club women might help to stir more enthusiasm among our merchants and city officials to really put on a clean-up-paint-up campaign.

Going into the residential section of any town that has lots of trees, well kept lawns and blooming flowers along with painted and well repaired homes presents a beautiful sight to anyone who passes through.

In Loraine we have a lot of trees. Many beautiful homes with well kept lawns and flower gardens. We have a lot of run-down unpainted homes where not much attention is given to lawns and flowers. The good ladies of the club could do a lot of excellent work in this area.

Parks in many towns are show places. In Loraine we hope to have a respectable park in the near future. We were a little late in getting it started and not near enough work has been done on it. This is another area where civic minded groups could do a lot for their community.

Here we have a highway that carries hundreds of cars and other vehicles through the edge of our town every day. What the people see who travel through here is not very pretty. With a lot of energy and some money at least a part of the area along the highway could be beautified. In fact they could be made so attractive that people would pull off the highway to get a closer look. There are a lot of flowers that can be easily grown and do not require too much attention that could be planted and cultivated. Many people make the journey quite often to see the Blue Bonnet trail, the dogwood trail and others. We just might have a trail of our own if we try hard enough.

There are many other things citizens could do to make a more attractive town. But I hope these few suggestions will give the lady some base material for a program at her club.

Loraine High School Has Student Ag Teacher

The vocational agriculture department of Loraine High School is being used this semester as a student teaching center for Agricultural Education majors at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Lloyd majoring in Agricultural Education and minoring in Animal Husbandry. He is a member of the Collegiate

Chapter of Future Farmers of America and while attending Tech is employed by the South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock, Texas.

Each student teacher spends seven weeks at the student teaching center. The first week is spent observing after which the student takes up actual teaching duties. During this time the student is expected to acquire all the knowledge that he can that would aid him in setting up and operating a department of vocational agriculture after graduation from college. 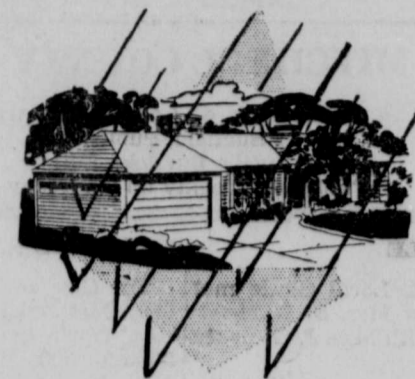
