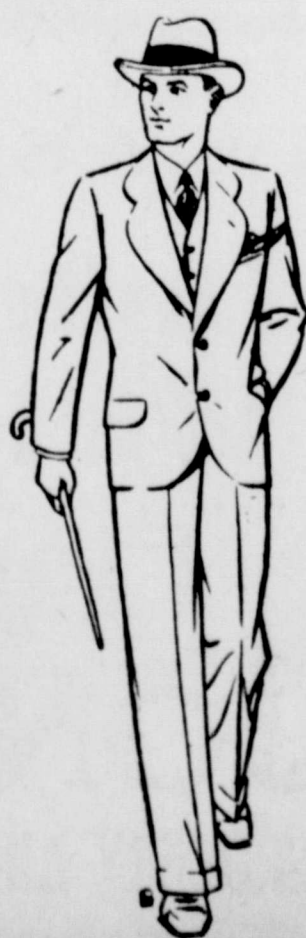

FAIR TICKETS NOW ON SALE

Season tickets for the five big days and nights of the Runnels County Fair to be held here next week, starting Tuesday, October 4th and closing Saturday night, October 8th, were being placed on sale in the local banks, drug stores, cafes, and other business houses of the city Thursday morning by J. D. Motley, secretary of the association.

These tickets will sell for \$1 each and will entitle the holder to entrance at Fair Park as many times each day and night as he wishes to go. This will do away with the pass-out checks that had been used at previous fairs. If an individual buys a straight ticket now he must pay 25 cents every time he goes into the fair grounds.

Several hundred of these tickets have been printed and they are now on sale.

Officials of the association urge buyers to get their tickets early to avoid the big rush expected on Monday and Tuesday of next week.

Moisture and Alfalfa Rotation May Check Cotton "Crazy-Top"

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Rotation with alfalfa and methods of irrigation that keep a constant supply of moisture in the lower root zone, bionomists believe, will be the most practical measures for controlling acro-mania, or "crazy-top" disorder of cotton.

The disease, first observed in 1918 and known to exist only in Maricopa and Pinal counties, Arizona, is already of considerable importance as a potential problem for cotton-growers.

Upland cotton varieties are grown over a wide range in the United States, and it is this species in which "crazy-top" is most

tortion of the leaves, involucre, and floral organs.

The change in the branching habit results from the fact that the fruiting branches of the upper part of the plants are partially or completely transformed or replaced by vegetative branches. Partial transformation is the more frequent condition, and is shown by the abortion of the floral buds at very early stages, leaving a tiny bud scar on each internode of the branch.

Association of the more striking and serious injuries with cemented soils, impervious soil strata, steep grades of land, and areas continuously cropped to cotton indicate that these factors have some influence on the appearance of the disease as well as on its severity.

Whether "crazy-top" is an infectious disease distributed by insects or a disorder carried by the soil, is yet to be determined. It is conceivable that peculiar physical conditions exist in certain soil areas and that they may produce more extreme stress reaction than are produced in other cotton-growing regions. There is also the possibility of toxic effects, from some harmful substance that has been absorbed from the soil, or of excessive accumulation of such a substance in the tissues.

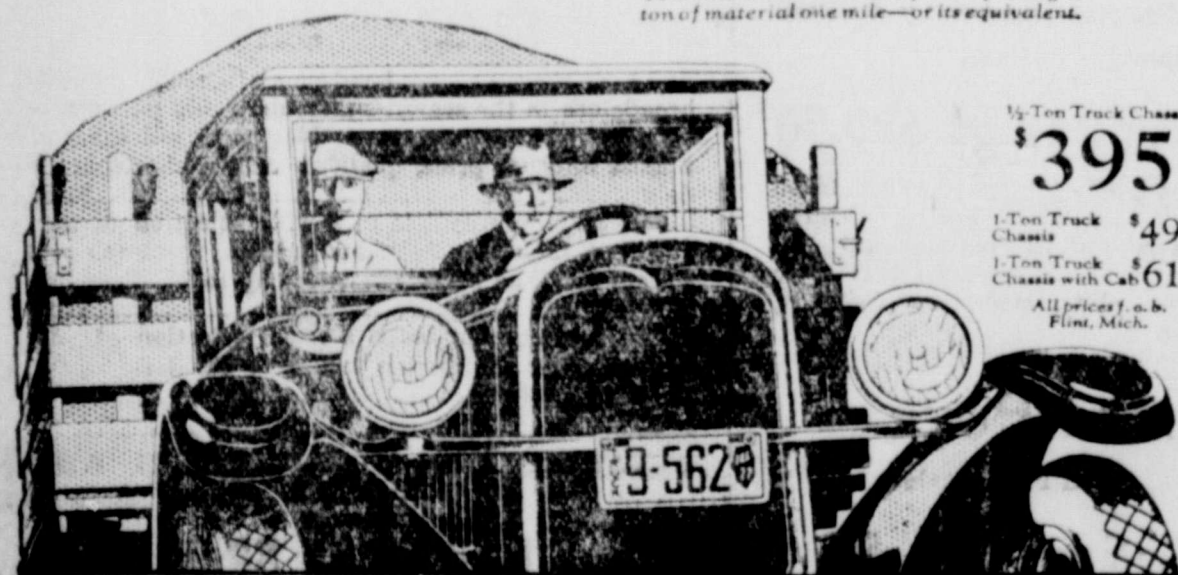

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—It has been a cool summer, but the Chicago bather has been more ubiquitous than ever.

Pretty girls in scanty costumes, perhaps with a kimono or slicker hanging loosely from the shoulders, are not street novelties, though the stranger may gasp and gaze.

On a warm day, along the north and south shores of Lake Michigan and even near the loop, bathers of all degrees of age and form may be seen on the streets, taking tea, or going to market in costume of two pieces, a piece and a half, just one piece, or what have you.

Among other things, Chicago advertises itself as "the world's largest summer resort." Mile after mile, well kept beaches fringe the thickly populated residential districts from the southern to the northern limits of the city.

And its citizens live up to the slogan by enjoying the summers in much the manner of those who seek the freedom of isolated summer resorts.

ONE HELD FOR RAISED CHECK

HAYNIE DENIES PROTEST AS MADE BY FERGUASON

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Sept. 29.—Asserted efforts of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to aid in the organization of a proposed Ballinger irrigation district were attacked in a letter to R. W. Haynie, president of the Chamber, signed by around 500 Runnels county farmers and ranchers and issued by Chas. Ferguson, secretary of the committee fighting the district here late yesterday.

The Chamber's opposition to the Syndicate Power Company's proposed construction of dams along the Colorado River was also assailed.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has never thought about an irrigation district for this country, R. W. Haynie, the president told J. D. Motley, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce Thursday morning in a long-distance telephone conversation.

Mr. Motley declared that in his talk with Mr. Haynie, the citizens of Runnels County would have to look after an irrigation district if they wanted one, that the West Texas Chamber had done nothing toward a district organization here or in any other section, but was looking out for the best interests of West Texas towns, cities, farmers and ranchers in opposing the construction of the dams along the Colorado River by the Power Syndicate Company and not allowing the farmers, ranchers and cities to impound their own water system and supply their own needs from the Colorado River and its tributaries.

The only irrigation project ever organized here was "killed" by the Texas Supreme Court some time ago when it failed to uphold a district formed in 1921 and 1922, when there appeared gaps in the field notes describing the district.

The organization formed in 1922 was the Coke-Runnels Water Improvement District No. 1. An election was held and the district formed but those of this county opposed to the district employed attorneys and an injunction was secured preventing the officers and directors of the organization from proceeding further with the plans. The case was heard in the 35th District Court here, the injunction granted; it was appealed to the Court of Civil Appeals where the injunction was upheld, and this year the state Supreme court upheld the irri-

gation law and dissolved the injunction but threw out the district for the reason already mentioned.

No steps have been taken either here or in Coke county, by any organization to reorganize the district, as far as can be ascertained.

The local chamber of commerce joined other West Texas commercial organizations in protesting the action of the Board of Water Engineers in granting the entire water rights of the river and its tributaries to the Waer Syndicate Power Company, not because Ballinger and Runnels county wanted to organize an irrigation district but because Ballinger is growing daily and the water supply is limited.

The local chamber has not discussed irrigation during the past few years, but has discussed improvement of the city water system with hope that it could be increased.

Anna May Wong, whose face is more familiar to the average film fan than some of the stars she has supported, will make her stage debut in New York this winter, if Gilbert Miller's plans to produce "The Living Buddha" do not miscarry. There also is a project afoot to feature her in a Los Angeles stage production later.

Another player well-remembered in oriental roles—Etta Lee, a French-Chinese girl from Honolulu—made her first stage appearance in Los Angeles this summer in "The Scarlet Virgin," and plans to tour the country in vaudeville this winter.

Neither of these players has any desire to leave the screen, but they have found that the choice oriental roles of the movies usually go to stars and featured players who are not oriental, but can make up for the parts.

Anna May Wong's hope is that her Broadway appearance will be successful enough to give some motion picture producer the inspiration to star her as the Chinese princess in Donna Byrne's "Mesire Marco Polo," or better

still, in a story of American college life as lived by a Chinese-American co-ed.

The college story is Anna May's pet idea because she feels most Americans know nothing about the modern Chinese-American girl, and have not even begun to guess that she is as American in aims as any Cincinnati flapper, her language, habits and manner. Anna May could play such a part with greater ease than her oriental characters, for her family has been in this country a long time. She was born in Los Angeles and her parents are native Californians.

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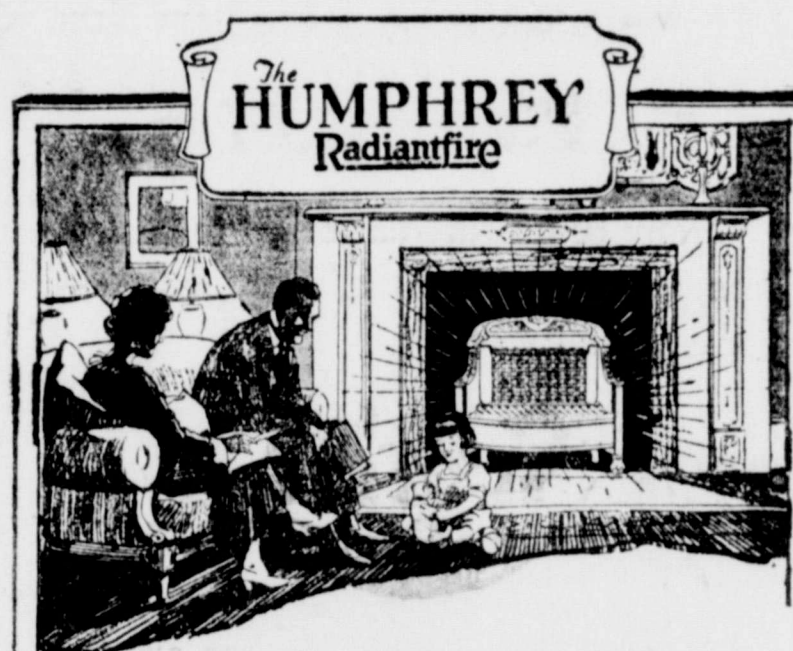

TWO STATES ARE HIT BY STORMS; 7 DEAD

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 29.—At least seven persons were killed and more than 200 were injured in a tornado which struck St. Louis this afternoon, causing widespread damage to property.

RUDY, Ark., Sept. 29.—Ten persons were injured, one probably fatally, in a tornado which struck here today, cutting a path through this village.

Only ten buildings remained intact when the storm had passed.

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Sept. 29.—Eight persons were injured today in a small tornado which blew down two farm houses three miles northeast of Checotah.

The homes of William Conklin and Walter Berry were wrecked.

FT. SMITH, Ark., Sept. 29.—Rudy, a Crawford county village, 12 miles north of here, has been swept by a tornado, according to S. T. Cantrell, division superintendent of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad.

He said the train on which he was travelling narrowly escaped the storm which struck at 9:30 o'clock.

Rudy, a large fruit shipping point with a population of about 200, has about fifteen business buildings.

Reports say that a number of buildings were unroofed but that there had been no loss of life.

BELIEVE NURSE WILL BE FREED

ENID, Okla., Sept. 29.—Confidence of the innocence of Mary Atkinson, 26, trained nurse, charged with murdering Mary Jane Bailey, daughter of Dr. Charles Bailey, Episcopal rector here, was expressed by Harry Glasser and H. G. McKeever, the nurse's attorneys, in a statement issued following the morning session of the preliminary hearing in predicting her acquittal.

"If reports in the papers are correct in stating that W. H. Bailey, Oklahoma City pathologist, has revised his report to say that poison had not been found in a lethal quantity in Miss Bailey's viscera," McKeever said, "the prosecution hasn't a leg to stand on."

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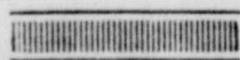
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
