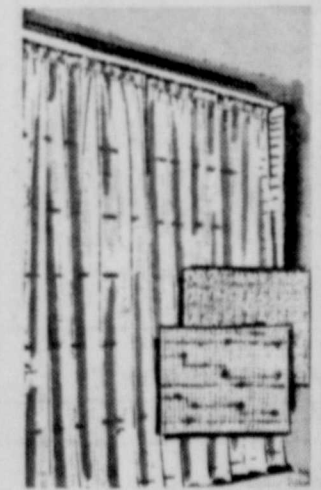

Tommy Bolt fought a tiring battle with "Old Man Par" from bunker to bunker, from green to green, on the DeSota Lake Country Club, Sarasota, Florida. Yes, General Sam Snead matched victoriously, onward for another decisive triumph. His three under par 68 against Bolt's 79 clearly indicated, after the first few holes, the issue was never in doubt.

Snead's 10th tee shot, while well hit for distance, were ambushed in a bunker... and in every case but one, he was unable to recover. Not only did he lose the "Battle of Bunker Hill," but he spent considerable time on the "Village Greens" with three 3 put holes. Thus you can afford to do against a cunning cavalry man like Snead who managed to play eleven of the tricky holes at DeSota Lake Country Club with eleven 1 put greens.

This is really the story of the match in a nutshell. Both pros had their share of trouble... Bolt never got the breaks, nor could he come up with the important recovery shot. On the other hand, Sam seemed to always have that shot-saving 9-iron or wedge in his bag.

Snead bogeyed twice himself, but his five birdies more than made up for this. His first birdie was scored with a 15-foot putt on the 6th hole. He came right back on the 7th with an 80-yard wedge 8 ft from the pin, and from there, he calmly holed out. On the 10th, his steady 4-iron put him 7 feet from the pin, and he one-putted for a birdie three. On the 14th, par 5, 465 yard hole, he was over the green with his iron on the second shot by 15 feet, but he came back with his 9-iron and plunked the ball down one foot from the pin for his birdie 4. On the 16th, he hit a 9-iron 130 yards to within twelve feet from the pin and capitalized on this shot by sinking his putt.

Sam's hot putter earned him another \$2,000, bringing his total on All-Star Golf to \$14,500. Next week, as your Munsey-Golf Reporter, I'll be giving you the inside story on Snead's skirmish with the pin, and you might be just the boy to put an end to "Slamming" Sam Snead's TV career.

on a mission tour of evangelism. In 1958 the church shared their pastor with a new church in Kenosha, Wisc. The invitation for the Wisconsin and Jamaica tour came from the Department of Evangelism of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The local church supports a program of home and foreign missions, building and maintaining missions in the city, underwriting church loans in Wisconsin, and paying the full salary of Missionary Paul Bell to Guatemala, Central America.

During the eight and one-half years the pastor has served the First church, there have been 983 additions to the church—402 for baptism, and 581 by letter. Forty-one young people have surrendered for special service, including ministry, missions, nursing, music, education, and general religious work. Rev. Perkins plans to leave Ranger March 13.
