Let's get the fair off to

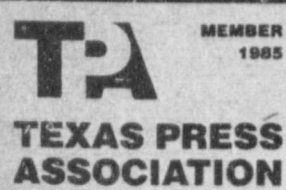
a good start this year!

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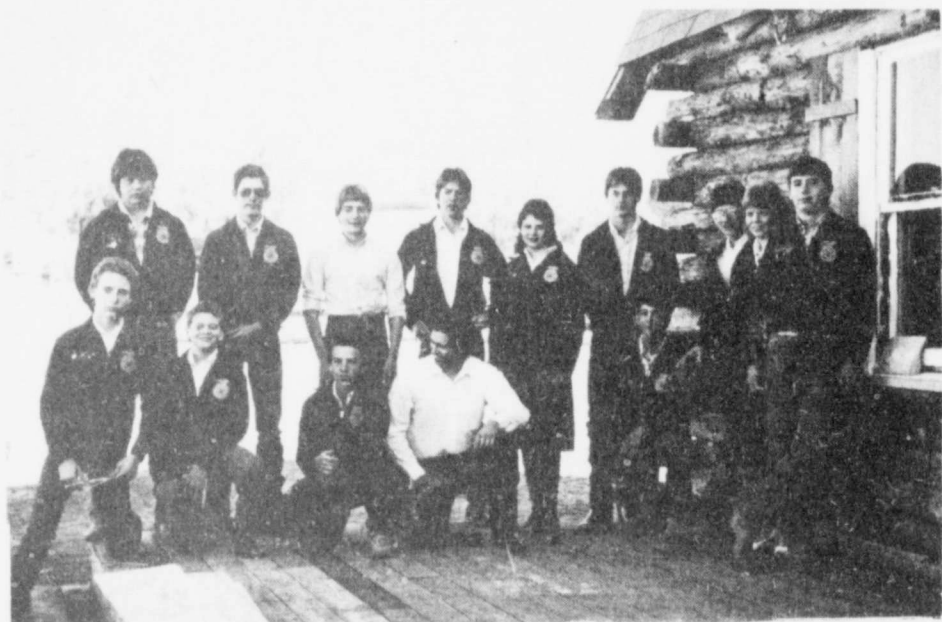

Sherman, Wofford win intramural rodeo in Capitan, New Mexico

The Lockney Future Farmers of America Chapter took a trip to Capitan, New Mexico, recently and held a summer rodeo while there.

Lockney chapter president, Billy Bob Sherman, was named the best All Round Cowboy of the event. Sherman won first place in the bull riding, calf roping, and was teamed with Matt Williams to win first place in the rescue race. Sherman also took second place in the musical chairs (on horseback).

Robert Wofford won first place in the team events. He won first place in Custer's Last Stand, in which all the riders are on horseback with a sock in their back pocket. The rider who has the last sock left in his pocket wins. Wofford also placed a second in the rescue race in which he was teamed with Chad Diepenhorst.

Matt Williams placed second in the bull riding, first in musical chairs, first in barrel riding, and was named second best All Round Cowboy. He also came in second place in the team events.

Chad Diepenhorst placed first in the steer riding and was named third All Round Cowboy. Troy Bigham won second place in the steer riding. Allen Stallings won second place in Custer's Last Stand. Boyd Jackson won second in the barrel race, and Stallings was third in the team events.

The trip to the Lone Tree Ranch in Capitan, New Mexico, was made from May 25 through May 29. Upon arriving at the ranch, the group took a trail ride through Billy the Kid Canyon. This is the route Billy the Kid used for escape during his many escapades in this part of the country. They also toured the ranch headquarters, attended an orientation of the ranch history from director Tim Worrell, and participated in video game and volleyball contests.

On Sunday the group dressed in full FFA uniforms and attended the First Baptist Church in Capitan. It was music day at the church with Randall Robbins joining in the festivities by playing the guitar and singing a solo. Before church services the group toured the Fort Stanton correctional facility and the Fort Stanton State School. They also toured the Fort Stanton Experiment Station.

On Monday the group took a trail ride into the Capitan Wilderness area. This area contains the second longest east-west mountain range in the United States. It contains over 1 million acres of undeveloped forest land. The group camped at the 8,000 foot level.

While in the wilderness area, the group went trail riding and took repelling classes. The students who took repelling classes began at a 50 foot training bluff. From there they went to the 150 foot level and repelled down.

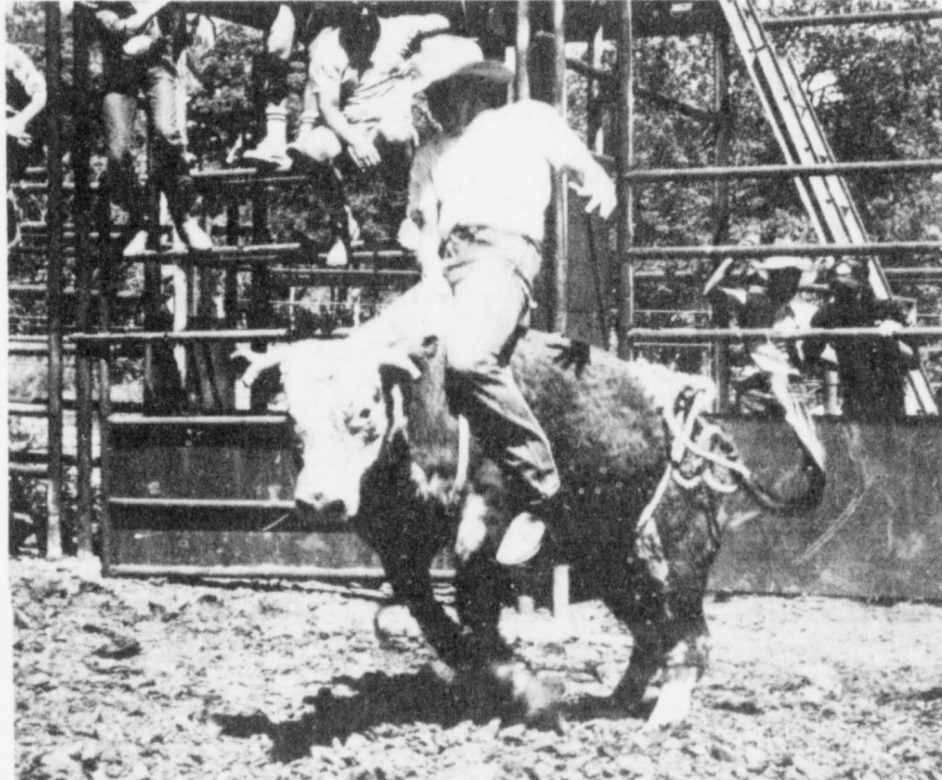
That night the students enjoyed a Randall Robbins special "hobo" dinner and played war games around the campfire. Robbins also told the group ghost stories.

Tuesday the group traveled to Ruidoso for a day of swimming, shopping, skating, and miniature golf.

Are you interested?

As there seems to be some interest in Lockney is obtaining a center for senior citizens, the Chamber of Commerce is seeking to determine if interest is sufficient to pursue the matter.

The following information is presented about a nearby town's solution to the need for a senior citizens center.

Persons wishing to express their interest in being part of a Lockney senior citizens organization should contact Jack Covington, Lockney chamber president; or J.D. Copeland or write Box 85, Lockney 79241.

Two years ago, with advice from the Silverton and Tula senior citizens groups, residents in Quitaque organized Quitaque Senior Citizen Association Inc. and obtained a state charter. Three Quitaque organizations—Lions Club, We The Women, and the Chamber of Commerce—sponsored the senior citizens group.

The association has a membership of less than 40 who pay yearly dues of \$5. Although the charter states that members must be sixty years of age and older, most members fall in the age range of 65 to 75 years of age. Although some members travel, there are enough around to do the necessary jobs.

With a loan from the bank, the association members paid \$7000 for a two-story building in downtown Quitaque. Renovations were begun, with most of the work being done by the members.

Remodeling, including new wiring, plumbing, carpet, appliances, heating and cooling, hot water heaters, installation of kitchen cabinets, etc. took about six months and cost another \$7000. Some professional labor and many materials, including the carpet, were donated or bought at discounts. One of the members, J.J. McKay, was a "jack

of all trades" and lent his knowledge to the project.

One of the main sources of money was the \$500 donated by Quitaque Cemetery Association every time that the senior citizens cleaned, mowed, etc. at the cemetery during the past two years. Bailey relates that they worked at the cemetery three or four times each year, but that the project is getting to be a little too much for the group. Activities such as pie suppers and bake sales brought in more money.

The association has paid for the remodeling, but money is still owed on the building itself. Fund-raising activities continue: in the past month the group has held an ice cream supper, a stew supper and served a Sunday luncheon.

Operating expenses are kept as low as possible by members of the association keeping the building clean, but the monthly utility costs are about \$100. The group was able to purchase used chairs at a good price, and tables have been given or loaned; however, more tables are needed. Still Bailey says that the association is not at this time considering applying for a grant.

Because of the building indebtedness, the association currently is hoping that 100 Quitaque residents will allow the association to draw a draft of \$10 a month for one year. "If we could get this money, it would allow us to pay off our building in only a few months," Bailey notes. So far, about 20 people have responded by giving permission for the draft or by giving \$120 outright. The association was on a list last year of temporarily-approved non-profit organizations, and hopes to be permanently approved in the near future. The non-profit distinction allows all donations to be tax-deductible.

New building approved

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney Independent School Board of Directors the board accepted the bid from Tusha Builders of Lubbock to construct the new combination music and physical education building at Lockney Elementary School. The bid amount was \$150,869.00.

Other bidders on the building included Pharr and Company of Lubbock for \$159,101.00, Hallmark Builders of Lubbock for \$156,963.00, and Eagle Builders for \$142,000.00. All of the bidders, with the exception of Eagle, had representatives at the board meeting to discuss their bids with the board.

The building will be a 70 foot by 100 foot metal and brick building. It will run along the north side of the existing building with an enclosed hallway connecting the new and old building. It will have eight foot brick coverings on the outside and inside of the building with metal running 12 feet above the masonry work both inside and out.

The music room will cover an area of the north end of the building, measuring 19 feet by 50 feet. Also on the north

end will be two restrooms, a 13 by 19 foot storage area and a closet to house the water heater and heating unit for the music room.

The physical education portion of the building will cover the south end of the building, measuring 80 by 60 feet. The concrete floor of the P.E. area will have a small regulation basketball court and volleyball court marked off. The remaining space left on the north side could accommodate fold away bleachers that may possibly be added at a later date.

The building will be constructed to provide more classroom space in the elementary school which will be necessary starting this year due to the increased enrollment in grades K-2.

In other action the board also approved the only bid received for repainting and repaving the south end of the elementary school. The area has basketball goals which are used frequently by students during the hours they are out of school. The only bid was from Fred Lipham Paving in Floydada.

According to Randall Robbins, Lockney vo/ag advisor, "Southwestern Public Service does an outstanding job in training and supporting the Future Farmers of America."

FFA students attend conference

Last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday four Lockney FFA Greenhand students were in Clarendon to attend the Area I Leadership Conference at Clarendon Junior College.

Lori Smith, Boyd Jackson, Jeremy Widner, and Aaron Kidd were just four of the 135 students and 40 agriculture teachers from Area I that were in attendance at the conference. According to Jerry Hawkins, director of Agriculture study at Clarendon College, this was the largest conference ever held at the college. An unusual feature of this conference was that about 1/2 of the FFA members in attendance were young ladies.

Of the conference, Lockney FFA

member Aaron Kidd said, "when you go through your year as an FFA Greenhand, you really don't know what you are getting into. Attending a leadership conference like this one suddenly makes everything clear, that FFA provides more opportunities for personal citizenship development than any other youth organization I know of."

Ag teacher Randall Robbins commented, "All the Lockney FFA members came back from this conference with renewed motivation and each one has committed themselves to help make Lockney FFA the best chapter in the State of Texas."

Peralez gives up three year battle with cancer

On Sunday, June 9 Lockney lost a very courageous young citizen. Jessie Julius Peralez gave up his three year battle with leukemia at the Morton's Childrens Hospital in Dallas.

Jessie was diagnosed as having leukemia on June 30, 1982 by Dr. Acar in Floydada and was immediately taken to the Wadley Institute of Molecular Medicine. Upon arrival, Jessie was examined by four doctors that all concurred that Jessie had only 24 hours to live, but the young man proved to be a fighter. Seven days after admission to the hospital Jessie woke up hungry and continued to improve daily. He had to stay in the hospital for 6 months.

Despite his missing so much school, Jessie still maintained good grades with the help of two tutors.

Jessie had been in remission for 10 months when a routine blood test in November of 1983 indicated an in-

creased platelet count and Jessie had to return to Dallas. He was home for Thanksgiving.

This paper conducted an interview with Jessie and his mother, Tommie, in November of 1983. We found a very strong and determined young man. At that time Jessie fully understood his disease and the treatments he was receiving. Anything he did not understand, he questioned the doctors. He wanted to understand all the aspects of the disease and treatment.

The treatments he had to undergo during the course of his fight with cancer included painful bone marrow tests, spinal taps, blood tests, and chemotherapy treatments. The chemotherapy treatments caused a wide range of side effects that included the loss of his hair. Many people have seen him at school and around town with his baseball cap on at the times when his

hair was thin or shortly thereafter when it was growing back.

Jessie, at the time of the November interview, knew that he would depart this world and referred to his future destination as that "good ole home" with Jesus.

In April of 1984 Jessie had a lifelong wish fulfilled through the Make-A-Wish Foundation in Dallas. He had always wanted to dance on the "Soul Train" television show and the Dallas organization made this possible. Jessie, Tommie, and his sister-in-law were flown to Los Angeles, California, where the show was filmed.

The show was aired in May of 1984, and Jessie got to watch himself on TV.

Tommie Peralez said in November that the family had gained its strength from Jessie during the course of the disease. He understood what was happening to him and never let that

stop him from doing the things he wanted. In the summer of 1984 Jessie even played little league baseball. Tommie told coaches, Greg and Susan Padridge, that Jessie wanted to be treated like a normal child. Even though he suffered pain after playing ball, he played through the summer and had a good time, even though he did give his mother a scare a time or two when he slid into the bases.

This courageous young man did not let his disease slow him down. He lived as normal a life as possible. He was active in the summer playing with friends and could be seen at many of the school functions including watching his sisters, Diane and Cindy, play basketball.

The strength and determination of this young man will be long remembered by any Lockneyite who knew him.

In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

Daniel Ortega, the president of Nicaragua, has a victim's vision of Uncle Sam with a big stick raised to strike his little nation. In his embittered eyes, President Reagan's efforts to provide U.S. aid to contra rebels opposing Ortega's regime follows a pattern of oppression.

Ortega's tinted spectacles, droopy mustache, poker face and droning voice mask a man forged hard in the fires of a lifetime of revolution. He was only 15 when he was first jailed for activism against the U.S.-backed dictatorship of Anastasio Somoza Debayle. Both of his parents were locked up by the regime. A younger brother, Camilo, was killed fighting Somoza's National Guard.

Today, at 39, Ortega is an avowed Marxist-Leninist, although he is considered the most moderate and prag-

matic of the Sandinista leaders. He is attacked by critics as "another Fidel Castro", a man who came to power promising freedom, and yet soon turned to censoring the press, suppressing political opponents and trampling on individual liberties in general.

Because of his years in the guerrilla underground, Ortega never held a job for more than a few months until the 1979 takeover. Since then he has changed from a uniformed, pounding commandante into a sober, suited diplomat who soft-sells Sandinista policies abroad. Dressed in army fatigues he recently visited Moscow, where he saw Gorbachev and embraced him with a bear hug. After visiting in Moscow for a few days he returned, wearing a double-breasted business suit.

Rifle team presented

Warren Mitchell and his sons, Matt and Joel, presented the program for the Lockney Rotary Club last Friday. The program subject was the Floyd County 4-H Rifle Team project.

Mitchell began the program by naming the members of the team which include Matt Mitchell, Wymon Rex-rode, Kim Zimmerman, and Dean Smith. He also told the assembly that the team had placed second in district and 13th place, the best ever, at the recent state roundup.

He described in detail the various aspects of the competition that the team participated.

Each team member had ten shots at the target in each of three positions: prone, standing, and kneeling. The target had ten circles about one and a quarter inches in diameter. Beginning with the center circle of each ring, the center circle counted ten points, the next out nine and so on. The highest possible score was 300 points with 100 possible points for each of the three positions.

Mitchell complimented the local participants by saying that Wymon Rex-rode had 240 points and Matt Mitchell had 245 points at the state meet. The

overall winners at state had a total of 270 of the possible 300 points.

Mitchell also said that any young person that joins the rifle team must be aware of the necessity for safety when dealing with guns. "We stress safety first and foremost when these kids join the team, and if someone messes up and does not obey the rules they are

removed from the team. Safety is our main concern and in teaching these kids gun safety now, it will stick with them from now on," said Mitchell.

He also commented on and displayed some of the equipment that members of the team use. They use standard competition ammunition that is 22 caliber standard velocity. They also wear shooting jackets and earmuffs for added safety.

Mitchell also discussed the team that will be competing next year. In addition to the four existing team members mentioned above, Joel Mitchell and Grant Cage will be joining the senior team. He said, "We will have a young team, but we feel that these kids will do a great job in competition. Everyone else in our district had better look out for them."

in the amount of \$8748.00. The work will include repairing the exit on the south end of the parking lot.

The board also approved some repair work in the field house.

The tile in the showers at the field house is falling off the walls with the walls underneath the tile being in bad shape. Coach Bob Purser has checked into the matter and presented the board with a cost estimate for the repairs. From a firm in Lubbock Purser had two cost estimates of the work. One for \$1300.00 involved replacing the tile with new sheetrock and tile. The other, approved by the board, involved replacing the existing walls with a cement board and new tile. The bid included a lifetime guarantee on the cement board. Total cost of the repairs will be \$1740.00. One inch square tiles will be installed on the floor of the showers to replace painted cement presently there.

Superintendent Hallmark discussed some of the summer repairs that will be done in the three Lockney school buildings.

The elementary school will be receiving new blackboards at a cost of \$700.00, baseboard and tile around the doors in junior high will be replaced at a cost of \$500.00, and the high school science labs will be getting new table tops at a cost of \$1000.00.

Randall Robbins, ag teacher, had approached the board about building a small building to the west of the ag building in the fenced area. The proposed building would be about 12x24 and would be used for painting projects and to store the ag jeep and portable welder. The board tentatively approved the building if it were good quality and looked presentable with the other school buildings.

The board also discussed personnel during the meeting. Two resignations were accepted by the board. One came from the elementary school. Alayne Slover has resigned as the junior high girls coach and science teacher. D'Lynn Morgan resigned as junior high English teacher. The board hired Zelda Ellison and, subject to funding, Glenna Robbins, Connie Duenas, and Violet Cooper as aides.

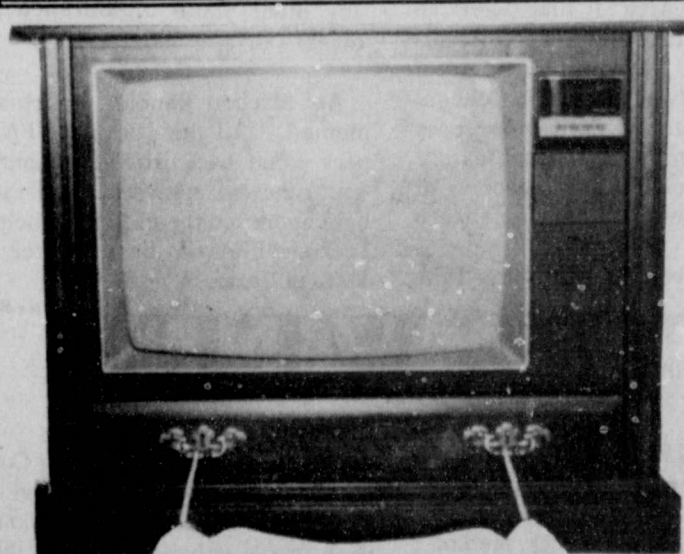
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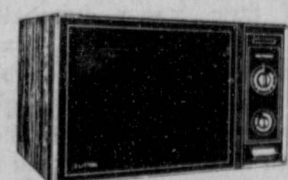

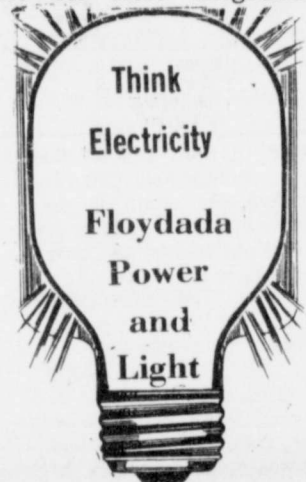
