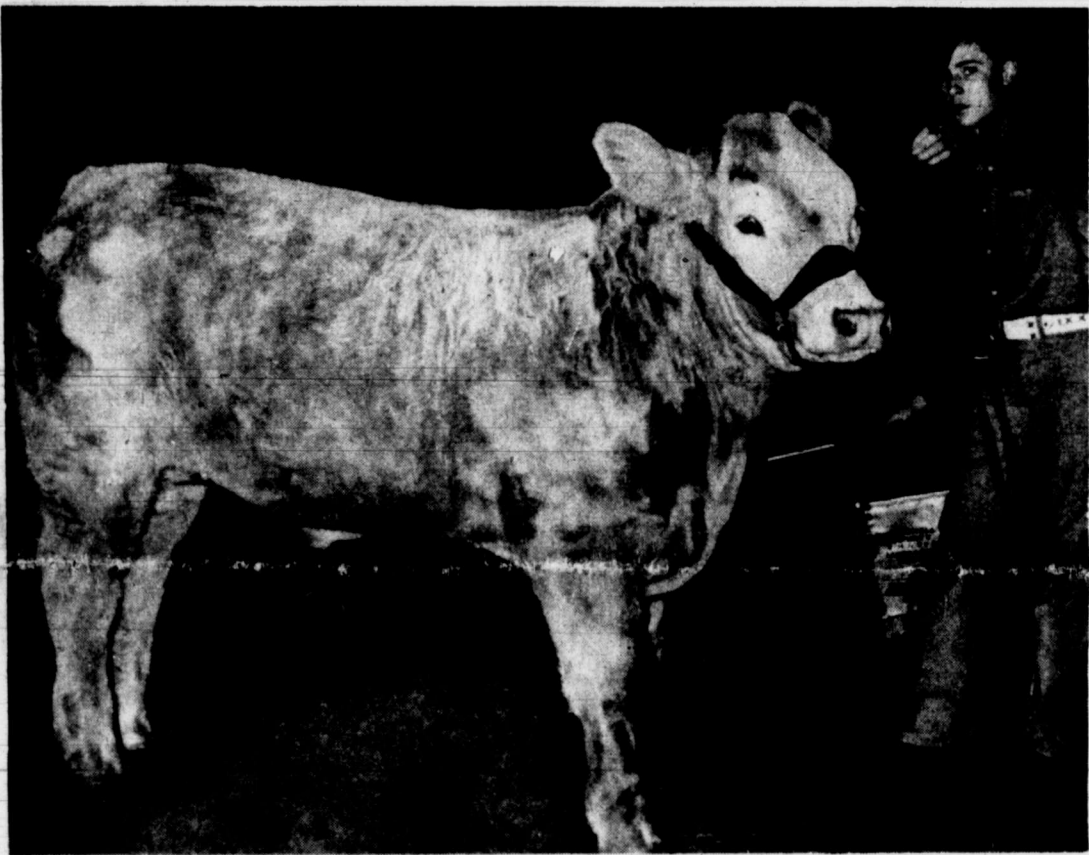


Happy Stock Show Winners

Phone Hike Coming?

TESCO Request To Council Monday

Your can start looking down the line for another utility company to follow Texas Electric Service Company with a rate increase request.

TESCO's 6 per cent proposal--already approved by Westbrook City Council Thursday night following Loraine's okay last Monday--goes officially before City Council here Monday night.

Waiting in the wings most likely is Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Phone officials have not said an increase will be sought here, but you can bet your best inflated dollar that it will come in 1972.

Snyder has just now raised phone rates in that city--only a county boundary away from Colorado City.

The phone company asked for a whopping 22 1/2 per cent boost in its Snyder rates. It didn't get that amount, but it

still received a substantial increase.

What Southwestern Bell did receive from Snyder City Council was a 9 per cent increase, about 13 1/2 points below its original proposal.

Bill Gilliland, phone manager for Snyder and Colorado City, presented the request to Snyder. And it is likely he will be coming to Colorado City's City Hall in the months ahead.

With the increase already this close, you know from past rate patterns that the phone company will not skip Colorado City.

The 9 per cent increase allowed Southwestern Bell in Snyder moves the base cost of business phones up from \$11 to \$12 per month; one-party residence from \$5.10 to \$5.50 and two-party residence from \$4.35 to \$4.75.

The Snyder increase ups 8-party rural business from \$8.50 to \$9.25 per month and 8-party

rural residential from \$4 to \$4.25.

What must be considered in the time-schedule of the phone company's rate pattern is whether Colorado City will be next in this area or will another town.

Stamford is also under the supervision of District Manager Gilliland and it may be next after Snyder. If so, a Colorado City increase probably will not come until after

the Stamford decision is final.

While the phone rate requests are likely to vary from town to town, Texas Electric is asking a flat 6 per cent across-the-board increase in towns throughout its system.

It is generally accepted that TESCO will receive an increase here in Colorado City. TESCO rate increases--

followed by its voluntary rate decreases has developed a rate reputation that could be termed enviable. It will probably stand in good stead with council here Monday and elsewhere throughout its system.

But whatever the City Council's decision here, it will move to the President's Price Board for final approval just as will the 6 per cent hikes already voted at Westbrook and Loraine.

Political Races

Ginzel, Barber Seeking Posts

District Attorney Frank Ginzel and County Attorney Dan Barber, who announced Wednesday they will seek election to their respective offices in the

1972 Democratic Party Primary, will be running off their records of service and experience.

Both men will be seeking election to full terms at posts to which they were appointed in late 1970.

Ginzel, who has resided in Colorado City since entering the practice of law following his graduation from the University of Texas law school, was appointed District Attorney of the 32nd District after the position was vacated by the appointment of Weldon Kirk as District Judge.

Ginzel formerly had served as county attorney since 1953 until the time of his appointment as district attorney.

Ginzel entered law practice here in March 1950 with Dell and Perry Barber.

He and his wife, the former Doris Coffey, have three daughters and two sons.

Ginzel is a veteran of World War II.

Dan Barber, a native of Colorado City, became county attorney Jan. 1, 1971, a position to which he was appointed by county commissioners after county attorney Frank Ginzel was appointed district attorney.

Barber believes he is the best man for the job, based on his record of service and efficiency in the job.

The job is a post once held by his father, Dell Barber.

Dan Barber joined his fa-

ther's law practice after graduating from law school where he qualified for Phi Delta Phi See BARBER Page 5

Enrollment Up For Schools

Enrollment in Colorado City public schools was up to 1,729 at the end of December.

The total--an increase over last year--reflects a slight upward trend from the opening September count.

Grade by grade figures on the 1971-72 students have been prepared by Supt. Lloyd McKee for school board members.

Fight For Life

Sundee Stewart Fund

Twelve-year-old Sundee Stewart this weekend entered the most crucial period in the fight for her life.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Stewart is undergoing treatment in the Institute of Surgical Research, Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio for burns, mostly third degree, covering about 90 per cent of her body.

Her gown caught on fire Mon-

day night as she stood before the fireplace to dry her hair in the Stewart home north of Colorado City.

A military evacuation team carried her to San Antonio Tuesday from Root Memorial Hospital.

Sundee underwent surgery Thursday and doctors told the family that the four or five See FUND Page 5

Cotton Harvest At Full Speed

Mitchell County's late, late cotton harvest has moved into full speed with clear skies.

Ginning Friday amounted to 4,102 bales.

County Agent Bobby Lemons said the harvest was in progress in all areas of the county.

"It is moving good," he commented. "It has been developing since the last cold spell."

"However, the market broke a little on low micronaire cotton," he reported.

Here is the ginning report from gins in Colorado City:

Broughton Gin (formerly Giltar) - 103 bales; Producers Cooperative - 840 bales; Farmers Gin & Supply - 352 bales.

In Westbrook ginning at Planter's Gin had reached 170 bales.

Loraine Cooperative Gin is the pacemaker for the young harvest with 1,664 bales Friday. Loraine Broughton Gin had 142 bales.

China Grove Cooperative Gin credited 597 bales--about half of its 1,195 total--to Mitchell County's crop.

Harvest is making its latest start here in the memory of most farmers. Predictions have ranged from around 15,000 bales to the upper 30,000 levels.

In recent months--after August rains broke a thirst which began before the 1970 crop's harvest--the general view has

been that prospects were too difficult to estimate accurately. Not until the cotton is taken to the gin can be production be established.

Just how late is the '71 crop can be seen by comparing it with the 1970 harvest. The previous crop was virtually all ginned by Dec. 6 with only a few hundred bales remaining. Now, a month later, the harvest is just gaining full speed.

Board To Consider \$\$\$\$

Salary Review Scheduled Monday

City's Lloyd McKee is at the bottom of the pay list--at least for 22 other school systems.

The gap is as much as \$6,000 plus between here and the other schools contributing to the survey.

McKee, as head of the local system, is being paid now \$16,750 annual salary plus a car allowance of \$75 per month. His car is furnished by Hutchinson Ford Sales.

Taxpayers pay only a small amount of that salary. Of the \$16,750 actual salary going to McKee, tax funds from Colorado Independent School District pay only \$802. All the rest -- a whopping \$15,948 -- comes from the state's minimum foundation program. And the district pays the \$75 monthly car allowance.

For the 1972-73 term, the state's minimum foundation

program will pay \$16,740 almost \$800 more than it is paying this year.

How does the Colorado City salary stack up with superintendents in the survey requested by Rees? Well, Stanton already is paying \$17,900 plus a car and per diem expense.

In Slaton, the pay is \$19,534 now with a 10-cent per mile car allowance. Post pays \$18,588 now plus \$1,200 for local expense.

Childress this year is paying \$17,446 plus \$600 local allowance.

With these school systems--Stanton, Slaton, Post and Childress--the local districts are paying out of their own tax funds from a low of \$2,312 in Stanton to a high of \$3,550 in Slaton. And, they also pay from local funds the additional expense allowances.

Tops in the area this year is Big Spring with \$23,000 salary now plus car and \$1,600. The district pays \$7,016 of the salary and all the rest.

Andrews pays \$20,500 plus \$200 car and expenses; Brownfield \$18,984 with \$1,450 allowance; Brownwood \$19,000 with car furnished; Monahan \$19,003 with \$1,200 allowance; Sweetwater \$17,484 with \$125 allowance per month; Snyder \$18,000 plus \$3,000 more in allowance plus \$18 per diem expenses; Lamesa \$19,000; Spearman with \$17,964 with \$1,500 extra and \$500 recruitment; Levelland \$19,896 plus \$1,000 local expenses; Hale Center \$19,984 plus all actual expenses paid; Fort Stockton \$18,982 with \$600 additional in expenses; Dumas \$17,000 with \$2,000 extra plus car plus house; Crosbyton \$18,404 plus car and house; Denver City \$19,400 plus car and all out of district travel expenses.

CONVERSATION CORNER



ALL US "feminine critters" might as well close our mouths and take a deep breath and count to ten.

Our beautiful blond psychologist - psychiatrist - columnist named Dr. Joyce Brothers has come right out in print and said that women are naturally aggressive.

She announces without reservation that aggression is just as much a feminine trait as it is masculine and that women possess potential aggression and capability for violence.

Dr. Brothers cites the women recently capturing then shaving the heads of young girls in Northern Ireland who happened to be in love with British soldiers there. It was a cruel and disgraceful act but it strikes this woman that it was more in line with feminine jealousy because the girls were probably prettier and younger than the razor raiders.

WOMEN, throughout the ages, have been schooled to believe themselves to be gentle, docile, passive, ladylike, and to hide any feelings of violence they may possess.

But women can be aggressive, so what else is new? Women are more subtle about it, that's all. Women do not fine it necessary to have a fist fight in the drug store or restaurant. They can cut down a fem-

inine adversary with a look and without a word.

They can kill a man dead without scratching his eyes out or laying so much as a dainty finger on him. There are a million ways and most women know 'em all by the time they are about 20.

WOMEN have weapons which do not include pistols, swords, or karate. They have weapons men never dreamed of when they are feeling feminine aggressions one way or another.

Silence is one. Most men had rather be hit over the head than be with a woman who does not say one word to him for hours or days or maybe a whole week.

Eyelashes come in handy, too. When a girl or woman flutters her lashes she is usually fighting for something such as getting her own way. Never have been convinced that Eve chased Adam around and around the Garden. Chances are she wiggled when she walked and called him "Darling."

That is still a popular form of what might be called feminine aggressions.

WOMEN have been known to take their aggressions and more or less subdued violence out on the furniture. Had a neighbor who always kicked the coffee table when she really wanted to attack her husband tooth and toenail. She stopped doing it

only when the table got a broken leg and she got a broken toe.

A woman who wouldn't be so unrefined as to slap her man during a bridge game can kick him under the table until his shins are raw and glare at him as if he had three heads.

If she feels really aggressive enough she can always go down town and buy something she can't afford.

THEN she can always cry. Tears are the greatest little aggressive talent any woman has and have won more battles than spears, arrows, or bombs.

When a woman ducks her little head and cries it's time for the boys to sound retreat or gallop off into the sunset.

Aggressive? Yeah. Women are. Only a woman is too smart to be uncouth about it, if properly trained. If she sometimes forgets and has a temper tantrum all over the place she's not necessarily uncouth. It's just because the kids have been holy terrors all day and she has a splitting headache and the beans boiled all over the stove, besides.

WOMEN, says Dr. Brothers, are handicapped by not being able to ease their aggressions with boxing matches, pro football and physically knocking some fellow flat.

Gentle, docile, passive, ladylike little women do not consider that a handicap. They can bribe an opponent with sweet flattery words. . . they can kill off an enemy with wildly exaggerated tales. . . and they can feel sorry for themselves to help release their violent tendencies.

It is, of course, permissible for any woman to be openly aggressive when anybody mistreats one of her younguns.

RIGHT NOW she can threaten to join Women's Liberation, stop cooking, washing dishes, or changing the baby, though that comes a little late for some of us.

Oh well. Agreeable, adorable, or aggressive a woman is a woman for all of that. And all intelligent men appear to be pretty pleased about it.

They better be. 'Cause Dr. Brothers says women are naturally aggressive and no telling what might happen if men keep on trying to be aggressive back.

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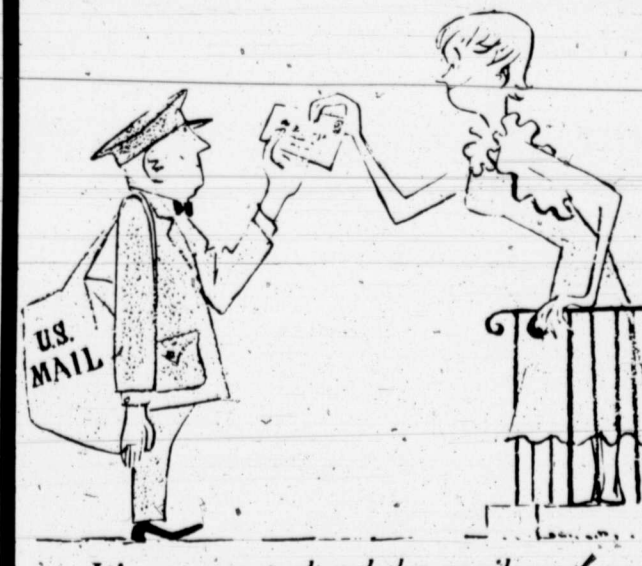

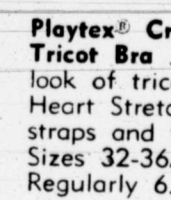

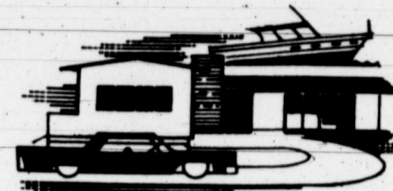

year's top came in January with a high of 1,692 students in all grades. Opening enrollment last Sept. 3 for the current school year was 1,711-18 below the current count.

All except one school has shown an upward trend since September, according to McKee. The lone dip has been at Colorado High where 515 students were enrolled at end of December, compared with 519 Sept. 3.

Here are the current totals by schools and grades:

High School: Now--515 total with 129 in 12th, 116 in 11th, 130 in 10th and 140 in 9th. Sept.--519 total with 132, 115, 131 and 141.

Junior High: Now--265 total with 137 in 8th, 128 in 7th. Sept.--263 total with 134 and 129.

Kelley Elementary: Now--504 total with 137 in 3rd, 130 in 2nd, 141 in 1st, 53 in kindergarten and 43 in bilingual kindergarten. Sept.--494 total with 132, 130, 142, 48 and 42.

Wallace Elementary: Now--167 total with 160 in 6th and 7 in special education. Sept.--163 total with 156 and 7.
