Four Killed When Gas Tank Bursts Into Flames

From the Stockton, (Calif.) Record we learn of the death of four people on Aug. 24, when a wheel of their car came off and the gas tank of the car exploded.

Mrs. Paul E. Allen, sister of William Maynard, 19, formerly of Bogata and son of Mr. and Mrs. Cub Maynard, Bogata R2, sent the paper with a letter giving particulars. The Record says:

Four members of a Stockton family died when their car lost a rear wheel, overturned and burst into flames on Highway 88 just south of Salida.

Killed were Elsie Darlene Garner 12, her sister, Mrs. Joy Dolores Maynard, 16, and their grandparents, Joseph S. Bailey, 72, and Ethel Bailey, 63, all of 3332 E. Marsh, Stockton.

The father of the two girls, H. C. Garner, 41, a carpenter, saved another daughter, Elda Fay, 14, by pulling her through a car window. He was burned in an unsuccessful attempt to rescue Elsie in the same manner. Both the father and daughter were treated for minor burns.

William Maynard, 19, husband of Joy Maynard, one of the young victims and driver of the car, escaped with minor injuries and burns. Joy was expecting a baby within two weeks.

Investigating officers said that when the car wheel spun off, the gas tank struck the rear axle and exploded. They blamed the overloaded condition of the 1938 model car for the accident.

The Bailey and Garner families came to Stockton in 1946.

Surviving Bailey, a pensioner, and his wife, are three children, Mrs. Viloa Miller of Stockton, Mrs. Nila Francis of Antioch and George Bailey of Oklahoma City, and a granddaughter, Uthola Wells, 18.

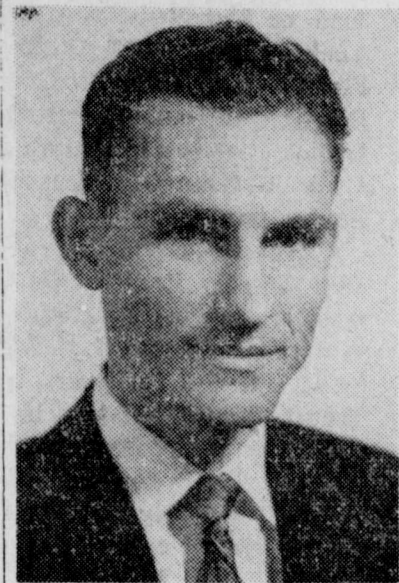
The family was en route home after a visit to the Modesto home of a cousin, Nila Eastman.

Spacing Rules for Sugar Hill Field

The Railroad Commission Office at Mt. Pleasant has received an informal report on part of the new field rules for the Sugar Hill Paluxy field.

The rules set up ten acre proration, plus tolerance for the last well. Spacing requirements are 330 feet from least property line and 660 feet from the nearest well. The allocation formula will be 50 per cent acreage plus 50 per cent per well. The field now has five completed wells.

Completion reports on two of the wells in the Sugar Hill field: The F. H. Anschutz No. 4, drilled by John B. Stephens Jr., and A. O. Phillips tested 103.15 bbls. of 20.6 gravity oil in 24 hours from 4425 feet. The John Parr No. 2 drilled by Byars, Peveto and Stephens tested 159.47 bbls. of 17 gravity oil from 4466 feet in 24 hours.

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Hot, Dry Weather Reduces Cotton Production Here

Hot, dry weather of the past month has cut cotton production in this area, appears to be the opinion of most growers. Less than a half inch of rain fell during August, and late cotton has suffered more than that planted early.

Forecasters of this year's cotton crop are already busy making their predictions, but one can't tell about a cotton crop until it is gathered, and it looks bad when it is hot and dry.

There were 10 days in August when temperatures soared above the 100 degree mark. Highest was 104 on August 16.

Rain amounting to .10 of an inch fell Aug. 24 and another .22 of an inch on Aug. 8. There was a light shower Aug. 22.

August rainfall, however, was greater this year than it was last. Only .20 of an inch was recorded last August, but it was followed by 7.67 inches in September.

OPS Announces Lower Prices for Cotton Seed Feed

Dallas.—Action by OPS in setting new dollars-and-cents ceilings on cottonseed feed products in Texas and Oklahoma will generally result in lower selling prices, F. C. Tomlinson, OPS regional foods chief, has announced.

Tomlinson said the new regulation, effective Aug. 25, rolls back and fixes processors' ceilings in this area which are from \$2 to \$5 per ton less than previous prevailing prices for all cottonseed feed products, including cottonseed cake, flakes, meal, sized cake, pellets, cubes, hulls, hull bran and cottonseed feed.

New ceilings, f. o. b. the mills in the States of Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona are \$82 per ton for bulk cottonseed meal, \$83 for bulk sized cake, \$84.25 for pellets and cubes, and \$25 per ton for bulk cottonseed hulls.

Subject to the addition of any actual transportation charges, the following prices, Tomlinson said, are what feeders can expect to pay for cottonseed feed products under the new regulation: Cottonseed meal, \$88.60 to \$96.25 per ton; cottonseed pellets and cubes, \$90.85 to \$98.50 per ton; cottonseed cake and sized cake, \$89.60 to \$97.25 per ton; and cottonseed hulls \$30.50 to \$38.50 per ton. Mr. Tomlinson explained that the actual selling prices permitted by OPS are dependent on whether feed purchases are made at the mills or from retailers, and the type of sacking involved.

PRAYER

Prayer is indeed a wonderful privilege. It is the God-appointed medium through which man may speak unto his Creator. Our Father in heaven speaks to us as we read the things that are written in His word, the Bible, and grants unto us the right of speaking to Him through prayer. There are, however, many mistaken ideas and notions among religious people regarding prayer. Some would make of prayer what God never intended it to be. Frequently people who are alien sinners are advised and urged to come to the altar, the mourners bench, or the anxious seat; and sometimes, they are even advised just to get down by their radios and pray for God to forgive their sins. Consequently, many honest people believe that their sins have been forgiven just because they have been to a mourner's bench, or because they have prayed for forgiveness, when the truth of the matter is, a mourner's bench is not even so much as hinted at in the Bible; and God nowhere ever promised forgiveness of alien sins upon the condition of prayer. Consider how inconsistent it is for an alien to pray for forgiveness. God says in His message to us . . . "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mk. 16:16). Now if I will not hear the Lord when He speaks to me telling me to believe and be baptized, do I have any right to expect Him to hear me when I call upon Him? This is what is meant at (Jno. 9:31) where the record says "We know that God heareth not sinners: but if any be a worshipper of God, and a doer of His will, him He heareth." God hears and answers the prayers of those who hear Him when He speaks and earnestly endeavor to do His will. Friend, can you not see then, that if you have refused to hear the Lord when He commands that you "be baptized for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38) that you have no right to expect Him to hear you when you pray. To such a one God would say "and when ye spread forth your hands, I will hide mine eyes from you: yea, when ye make many prayers, I will not hear, your hands are full of blood. Wash you make you clean . . ." (Isa. 1:15-16). The sinner needs to be washed and made clean before the Lord will hear him, and that's why baptism is necessary. "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins . . ." (Acts 22:16).

At home she took the lid off a teapot that was in the box and found some wadded paper. It turned out to be \$500 in paper currency. She can keep the money if no one claims it within a year.

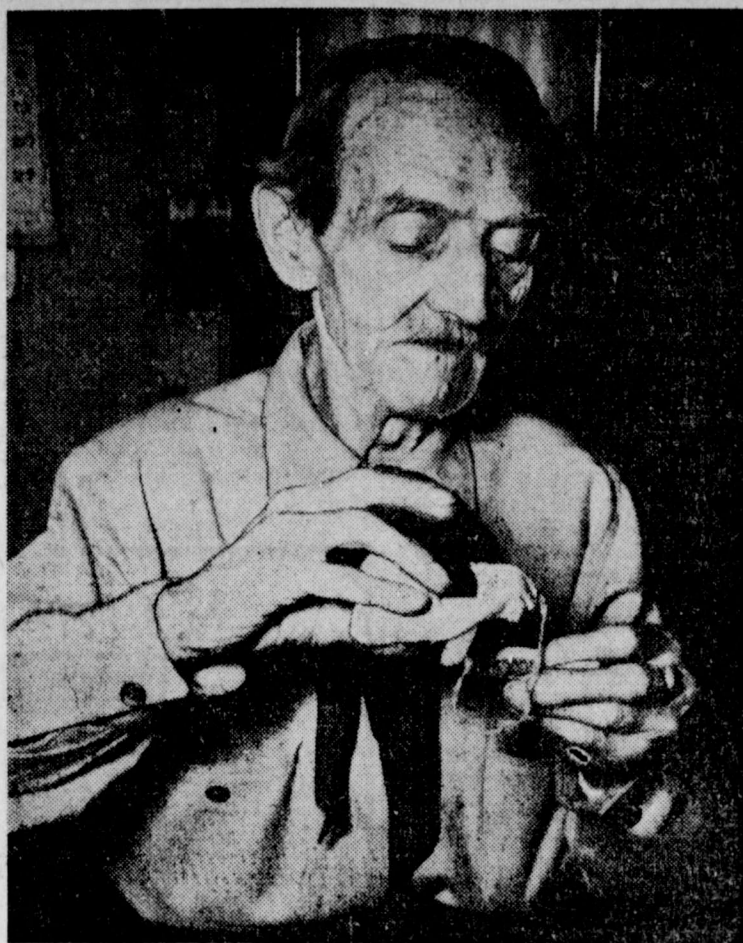

Poor Inoculation Vetch Failures

Farmers who plan to seed legume crops this fall on either cropland or pasture are reminded that they should secure their orders for phosphates or 0-14-7 fertilizer now. The material must be purchased within 10 days after the order is issued but does not have to be applied within the 10 days.

Farmers should apply the phosphates when the land is prepared and the seed will then be ready for sowing when sufficient moisture is available.

Farmers who are making plans to seed vetch before ample moisture is obtained should do a little inquiring about the dangers of "dry planting" a legume crop where the ground is not properly inoculated by some recent legume crop that has been grown on the same acreage. Most of our vetch failures this year were caused by improper inoculation.

INSPECTORS CAPTURE 8 ILLICIT STILL

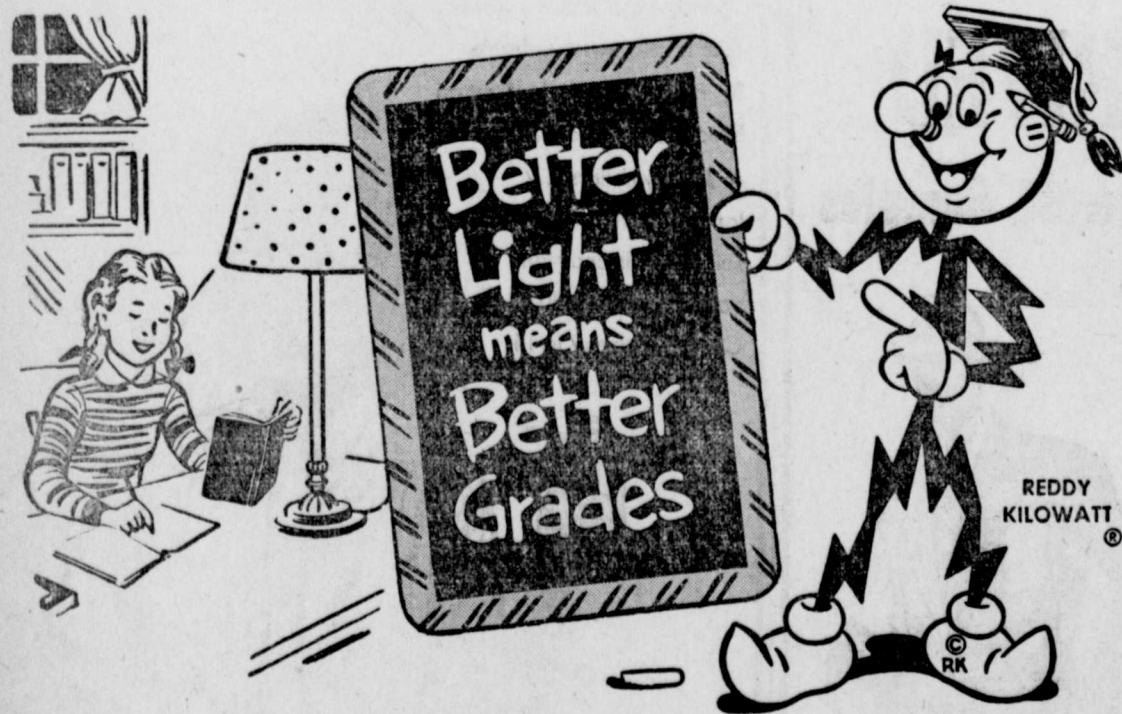

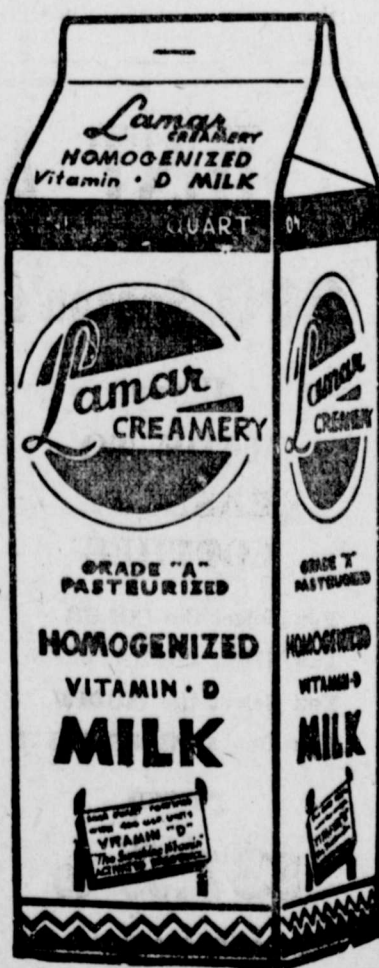
