THOUSANDS JAM LAKE CISCO FOR FOURTH

Death Toll Is Up To 513 Today

TEXAS DEAD BY VIOLENCE IS NINETEEN

Fireworks Take Only Three Lives Over Entire Nation

The toll of America's holiday deaths had risen today to at least 513.

At least 19 violent deaths and injury to 41 persons was recorded as the Texas portion of the holiday toll.

There were 563 deaths for the entire nation last year.

Fireworks took only three lives, compared to the pace-setting automobile traffic toll of 225. Drownings ranked second in the death column with 123. Twenty-one were shot to death, 15 committed suicide, 11 were killed by trains and 41 by various other causes.

The fireworks victims were killed by their own "inventions." A Maryland boy died and two companions were injured in the explosion of powder poured from firecrackers into a piece of pipe. In Pennsylvania a home-made cannon killed a man and a bomb made out of an automobile wheel pin killed another.

New York's death toll, set as the nation observed the one hundred and sixty-second anniversary of its independence, comprised 20 traffic victims, 14 drownings, a suicide, a victim of burns and a girl mysteriously shot while watching fireworks.

Pennsylvania "Worst"

Pennsylvania reported 30 deaths. Michigan and Illinois were third with 25 each. Pennsylvania's traffic record was the worst in the nation, however, with 25 victims.

A 25-year-old man was charged with murder after his mother was killed by a rifle bullet as she worked in a field near Narrows, Va. The son and his step-brother, both authorities they were practicing shooting.

A Rome, Ga., girl drowned when she overboard by the explosion of a motorboat's gasoline tank. Her companions were critically injured. A speedboat hit a rowboat in Michigan, killing one.

A New Jersey boy was killed and 17 were injured when two racing cars locked wheels and plunged into a group of spectators. Four were killed and three were hurt in a head-on auto collision on Long Island.

Wisconsin Tragedy

A motorboat explosion killed a Wisconsin resident, three negroes were killed in a Kentucky cutting scrape, an 11-year-old Salem, Va., boy was fatally shot by a chum while playing with a pistol.

A stray bullet which parted the hair of a young woman killed her escort in Indiana. Lightning also killed a man in that state. An Arizona rodeo accident claimed one life.

TWO TEXANS KILLED BY FIREWORKS

Only two persons had been reported injured by fireworks. Birdshot and pistol bullets hurt four, one person was stabbed, and 24 were injured in traffic accidents.

Included in the traffic deaths was that of Joe Termin, 37 Dallas auto racer, who died when his machine left the track and plunged through a fence during Independence Day races at Haskell. At Shamrock, 17-year-old Gene Wells, riding on the front fenders of a truck, was crushed to death when the vehicle struck a horse.

JULY FOURTH HOTTEST DAY OF THIS YEAR

Temperature Soars to 104 Degrees During Monday Afternoon

It's Hot!

That's about all a person hears in Cisco when he meets anyone up and down the streets.

Anyone who says it is hot has a reason today. According to the thermometer at the Cisco Gas corporation the temperature Monday, July 4, reached 104 degrees from 1 until 4 p. m. for the hottest day in Cisco so far this year, and indications today were that it would get just about that high or higher before the afternoon was over.

Saturday the temperature reached 100 degrees and Sunday the mercury crossed the 100 mark for the first time this year when it soared to 103 degrees Sunday afternoon.

The weather forecast for west Texas promised little relief for sweating Ciscoans. There is little prospect for a break in the heat wave of the past week. Temperatures were expected to pass the new high of July Fourth either today or at least before the week is over, provided nothing happens to break the wave.

Paralysis Due to Increase in Next 3 or 4 Months

AUSTIN, July 5 — "Infantile paralysis can be expected to occur more frequently during the next three or four months," predicts Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. "This disease is always more frequent during the hot months."

"The germ responsible for infantile paralysis is so small that it escapes detection even with the most powerful microscope. The first symptoms are usually vomiting, headache, stiffness of the neck, pain in the legs, irritability and drowsiness. Complete recovery may follow such an illness. In the more severe cases, the germ penetrates the nervous system, resulting in paralysis of nerves controlling one or more groups of muscles. Some remarkable recoveries have been noted."

"Flies or other insects have not been demonstrated to play a part in the spread of this disease. Infection spreads from person to person with the droplets transmitted by coughing and sneezing. Children and grown people that are healthy may be carriers of the germs. When present in epidemic form, about one child in each hundred is apt to suffer an attack."

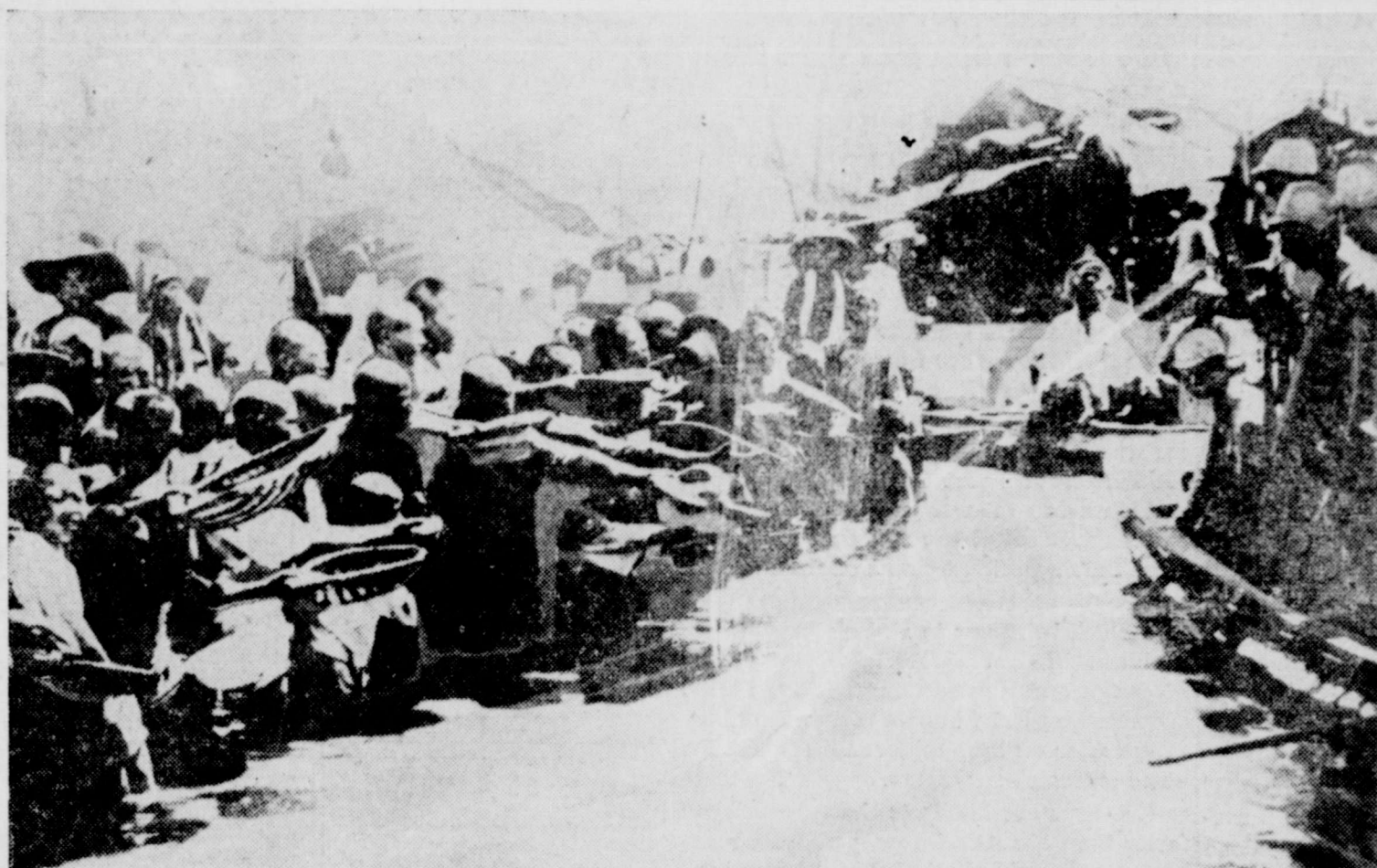
"Early recognition and diagnosis are essential. The use of immune serum may be a factor in preventing paralysis. A period of complete rest is essential for muscles that are affected. If parents note any symptoms of illness in their children, the family doctor should be consulted at once."

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 5 (Sp.)—More than 600 city officials and water works engineers are scheduled to attend the annual convention of the Southwest Section of the American Water Works association here October 17-20, M. B. Cunningham, Oklahoma City Water Superintendent, in charge of arrangements, said today.

Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and Oklahoma will send delegates. Scheduled to represent Cisco is G. R. Kilpatrick, city water superintendent.

Low Income Termed South Economic Evil

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—The "tremendously low income of the south's rural population was listed as that area's "economic evil" by Gov. Carl Bailey, of Arkansas, at the first session conference of southern leaders here today in the new experiment of regional planning. The new wage-hour law, the governor asserted, would not create hardship on the south, but "correct some of the evils."

Government statisticians and research experts met with a score of southern visitors to discuss working and living conditions, erosion, flood control, taxation, and credit facilities in the south.

Forecast Acceptance of Evacuation Plan

LONDON, July 5 (P)—Early acceptance by both the Spanish insurgents and the government of the British plan to withdraw foreign volunteers from Spain was forecast today as representatives of 27 countries assembled for a full session of the European non-intervention committee.

Franco was reported prepared to accept the plan unconditionally upon receiving it.

INSURGENTS MOVE TOWARD VALENCIA

HENDAYE, France, July 5 (P)—Insurgents swung down the Mediterranean coast toward Valencia today and occupied Burriana, important highway point 20 miles north of Sagunto.

Occupation of the town followed insurgent reports that they had smashed the government lines south of Teruel, mid-Mediterranean highway in the Sarrion sector. Dispatches also said that 2,000 government troops had surrendered northwest of Nules.

GERMANS GO FROM CHINA

Military Association of 2 Nations Ended

HANKOW, July 5 (P)—German General Baron Alexander von Falkenhausen, and 23 assistants left Hankow for home today, ending a nine year period of German military association with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's army.

Only Baron's reported urgent recall instructions were said to have led the general to ask release from the contract.

Ciscoan's Father Dies at Baird

Funeral rites for William Marion Coffman, 84, father of Mrs. J. L. Langston of Cisco and manager of a Baird lumber company for 27 years, were to be held today at 3:30 o'clock at the Baptist church at Baird. The Rev. George W. Parks of Roscoe was to officiate with burial in Ross cemetery at Baird beside the grave of his wife.

Coffman died Sunday at Baird. He was born at Meadowbrook, Tenn., February 4, 1854. In 1882 he came to Texas, settling at Whitesboro, three years later he came to Callahan county, and taught school there and in Coleman for several years. He moved to Baird in 1891. Coffman was a senior deacon of the Baptist church at Baird.

Four daughters survive. They are Mrs. R. E. Barker, Ranger; Mr. A. R. Day, Fort Worth; Mrs. G. B. Langston, Cisco, and Mrs. J. S. Bates, Marshall.

ENTRY FROM SWEETWATER WINS REVUE

Estimated 9,000 Here Last Night; Crowd Sees Fireworks

While an estimated 7,000 persons looked on, Miss Joyce Rogers, representing Sweetwater, was selected "Miss West Texas" and awarded an engraved loving cup Monday night at the annual Oil Belt revue held as a part of one of the biggest celebrations ever held at Lake Cisco.

Approximately 9,000 persons jammed the Lake area for the many attractions offered.

Miss Rogers was selected from a field of entries from Cisco, Eastland, Graham, Abilene, Baird and Sweetwater. The judges were from out of town. The revue was on the platform built out over the swimming pool. The Cisco Lobo band created an appropriate atmosphere for the contest with its music. It played before the beauties were chosen and then during the revue.

Fireworks

Although intense heat kept the crowd from gathering very fast during the day, later in the early evening cars began to crowd the roads leading to the Lake and by time of the revue the holiday visitors totaled about 9,000.

The revue was not all that attracted the crowd last night. A gigantic display of fireworks were set off on the opposite side of the swimming pool from the bath house. It included both noisy outbursts and beautiful Roman Candles and sparklers. The loud shots of the fireworks echoed in Cisco's giant dam, adding to the effect of the display.

Eastland, Ranger, Breckenridge, Baird, Putnam, Moran, Scranton, and many other nearby towns were well represented at the celebration.

Candidates

Heading the candidates who spoke were the Hon. C. V. Terrell candidate for re-election as railroad commissioner and Ralph Yarborough, seeking the office of attorney general. Wayne Sellers, Lewis Crossley and Cecil Lotief spoke. Several seeking county offices made announcements concerning their candidacy.

Terrell spoke just before the bathing revue to the large crowd assembled in front of the bath house. The others spoke in the Lions-Rotary park during the afternoon.

Of the remainder of the attractions offered by Lake Cisco for the Fourth, probably the miniature train was the greatest. Almost all the youngsters there either rode the little locomotive or watched it longingly. Other attractions included the carnival, swimming, skating, picnicking, golfing, fishing, boating and visiting the zoo.

The swimming pool was crowded all during the day.

"Miss Cisco"

The events of the three-day celebration got under way Saturday night with the selection of Helen House Baker as "Miss Cisco" to represent Cisco in the Oil Belt revue. Miss Kay Phillips another Cisco beauty, ran her a close race.

Monday at 7 p. m. the girls entering in the Oil Belt revue were served a dinner at the Laguna hotel.

Bombers Don't Drop Olive Branches

FROM a purely technical standpoint, Ameri-
can inventive genius has seldom done
anything more striking than its production of
giant bombing planes for the U. S. army and
navy.

The navy's enormous flying-boat bom-
bers are already a familiar story; so, too, are
the "flying fortresses" the army recently
brought out. And now comes word that both
army and navy are about to produce planes
that will make these existing "giants" look
small.

For the army, according to a story recent-
ly issued by Science Service, an 80-ton bom-
ber is being built by the Douglas people. The
plane will have a wing-span of more than
200 feet, will be able to cruise at better than

275 miles an hour, and will altogether be the
most amazing flying machine ever designed by
man.

The navy, too, is developing a new craft
—a 50-ton "flying battleship," according to
reports, which will be somewhat smaller than
the new army bomber but which neverthe-
less will be the sort of aerial giant that makes
one gasp in sheer wonder.

THAT such craft should be built is a glow-
ing testimonial to the brilliance of Ameri-
ca's aviation leaders. The conquest of the
air has become something more than a mere
phrase. A race that can do things like that
has good reason to be proud of its powers.

But before we get too proud, we might
properly remember just what it is that gets
built into a bombing plane these days.

There is more in it than cunningly
wrought metal and ingeniously devised plans.
There is also a tremendous load of human
misery—which may never actually be releas-
ed, but which nevertheless is there, the grim-
est and darkest single factor on the human
race's horizon today.

THE things that bombing planes have done
lately in Spain and China have made us
heart-sick. Yet those are the things that all
bombing planes are built to do, and when we
wax prideful over our fine new bombers we
must not let ourselves forget that fact. We
simply fool ourselves if we say that our bom-
bers would never do such things; military
ruthlessness is a part of all wars nowadays,
and if we do go to war you may be sure that
our magnificent planes will do just about
what the magnificent planes of other nations
have done.

Which brings us to a dark and tragic
problem. We can achieve things, in the way
of design and construction, that are almost
superhuman; but what we do with those
things after we have achieved them is at the
other extreme—subhuman.

Perhaps our intellects have developed
faster than our consciences, perhaps we are
brilliant with only half of our brains and are
unutterably stupid with the other half;
whichever it is, the sad fact is that we use our
best achievements to make the world a worse
place to live in.

Let the new bombers thrill you, when
they appear. Take pride in them. You have
a right to. But remember, at the same time,
what they are for.

Saved 10 Million For Texans, Says Ralph Yarbrough

A battle single-handed as Assistant
Attorney General against 30
lawyers and lobbyists whereby he
won \$10,000,000 a year for the
people of Texas was described in
a speech here July 4th by 35-year-
old District Judge Ralph Yarbo-
rough of Austin, candidate for At-
torney General.

Yarbrough pointed out that
pipelines had been paying for only
98 per cent of the oil taken but,
as a result of the fight he launched,
they now pay for 100 per cent.
This is of great importance to the
Permanent School Fund and the
Permanent University Fund be-
cause of the large income they re-
ceive.

"I am unalterably opposed to
a plan that has been advanced to
take the ballot away from all per-
sons who receive any payments
from any department of govern-
ment," Judge Yarbrough said.
"Because that would disfranchise
disabled World War veterans, con-
federate soldiers, farmers getting
crop benefit payments, persons re-
ceiving old age assistance, school
teachers—in short, it would take
the right to vote away from half
our citizens, I am against such a
proposal."

WHAT IT MEANS— The War In Spain

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The
Simple truth about the Spanish
war at this stage of the game can
be covered in two sentences:

1. Franco's drive to end the war
has bogged down, so that he will
require at least another year if he
keeps on going at his present
pace to clean up both Valencia
and Barcelona.

2. Most of the other nations in
Europe, whatever their sympathies
in Spain, have therefore decided
to do some serious horse-trading
to isolate the Spanish fireworks
and remove them from the other
powder-kegs on the continent.

The business of horse-trading
among governments is naturally a
complicated one and requires a
lot of high-sounding terms, such
as non-intervention, belligerent
right, etc.

But from the viewpoint of
American experts, it's beginning to
look as if Great Britain and
France are quite willing to see
the Franco-Mussolini-Hitler com-
bination win out in Spain, if, in re-
turn, Mussolini and Hitler get out
of the Spanish theater of action.

Sizing It Up

Here's how they figure that out:
Every time you get down to
cases, the meddling of outside na-
tions in Spain has nothing at all
to do with principles, but rather
with the peculiar geography of the
Mediterranean ocean and the
Spanish peninsula.

The special points of interest in
the Mediterranean are the Bala-
ric islands and Gibraltar. The
islands are the property of Spain
and lie just off the east coast of
that country. Probably a major
reason why Mussolini supported
Franco was the opportunity the
alliance offered to base his subma-
rines and airplanes in the Bala-
rics.

For the Balaerics are the mili-
tary keys to the African colonies
of France—colonies that would
pour men and supplies across the
Mediterranean to France if she
were engaged in a bitter-end war.
With the Balaerics in Mussolini's

hands, and filled with Italian
submarine and airplane bases,
France's line of supply from Africa
would be menaced.

Guns Toward Gibraltar

Then there's Gibraltar, now in
British hands, which gives Britain
control of both ends of the Medi-
terranean. If Germany could erect
big gun emplacements and other
war machinery in Spain just
across from Gibraltar, and rumor
says she has already done this,
British control of the ocean would
be menaced beyond comfort.

Therefore, it's quite natural for
the British and French to offer
any proposition, even if it means
a Franco victory, if only Germany
and Italy would take their volun-
teers—so-called—out of Spain and
the Balaerics. It's quite natural
for these two powerful nations to
allow Franco to bomb vessels
carrying their flags, and otherwise
offer them insult, so long as they
figure they can eventually lure
Mussolini and Hitler away, with-
out risking a war.

That explains why Franco's
planes, which probably are Ital-
ian blasting away at ships flying
the British flag without any inter-
ference. Any show of anger on the
part of the British just now might
wreck the British treaty with Italy,
under which Italy promises
eventually to get out of the Bala-
rics and ease the tension in the
Mediterranean.

Then, too, the British and
French are well aware of the fact
that Mussolini and Hitler haven't
got any too much money to throw
Franco's way, even on a credit
basis. They must feel that both
Mussolini and Hitler would be
willing to call it quits in Spain, if
they could only get out in a blaze
of glory.

Belligerent Rights

The latest Franco-British scheme
for a truce, and, failing that, a
new plan for withdrawal of volun-
teers, would seem to be all set up
for an eventual Franco-Mussolini-
Hitler victory in Spain.

The disinterested expert will
tell you this is true because of a

single little clause in the with-
drawal scheme under which
France would be recognized as a
"belligerent," with all the rights
of a fighting government that are
now extended to Republican (Loy-
alist) Spain.

Taht might sound to you and me
like a purely technical point, but it
is really very clever and practi-
cal from the diplomatic point of
view. Here's why:

England, France and most other
countries except Italy and Ger-
many, technically classify Franco
as an insurgent attempting to un-
seat the regular government of his
country. To most nations, the re-
publican government of Spain is the
legal government.

But if Franco had so-called "Bel-
ligerent rights," he could establish
a legal blockade against Loyalist
Spain along the east coast, and
thereby completely surround and
besiege the republicans until they
submitted. Any ship that at-
tempted to pierce the blockade
would be nothing more than a
smuggling vessel and entitled to
no protection whatever.

(Great Britain's decision to take
no action against air raiders who
sink her ships in Loyalist waters
in effect is recognition of Franco's
rights as a belligerent, without
admitting the fact to the world at
large.)

So, the horse-trading is a scheme
to assure a Franco victory in time,
but, at the same time, to get Italy
and Germany off the Spanish
stage.

Whether it works, or not, re-
mains to be seen.

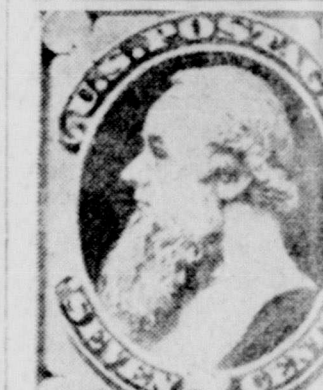

We have been told that, regardless of our economic condition, the channels of trade to world markets must be kept open. At this point the farmer wonders why the farm law was written and passed to help the southern farmer, now is the time when he needs most the 75 per cent loan on his cotton. The 52 per cent would not relieve the farmer in his depressed condition.

In view of these facts, our deliberate conclusion is that the maximum loan of 75 per cent of parity is essential if the cotton farmer is to derive any benefit on this year's crop.

The cotton farmer has accepted the most drastic reduction in acres that has ever been proposed, and in most instances was led to believe that in an emergency he would be provided with a maximum loan of parity, but it is now being proposed that he be given the minimum loan or no loan at all. 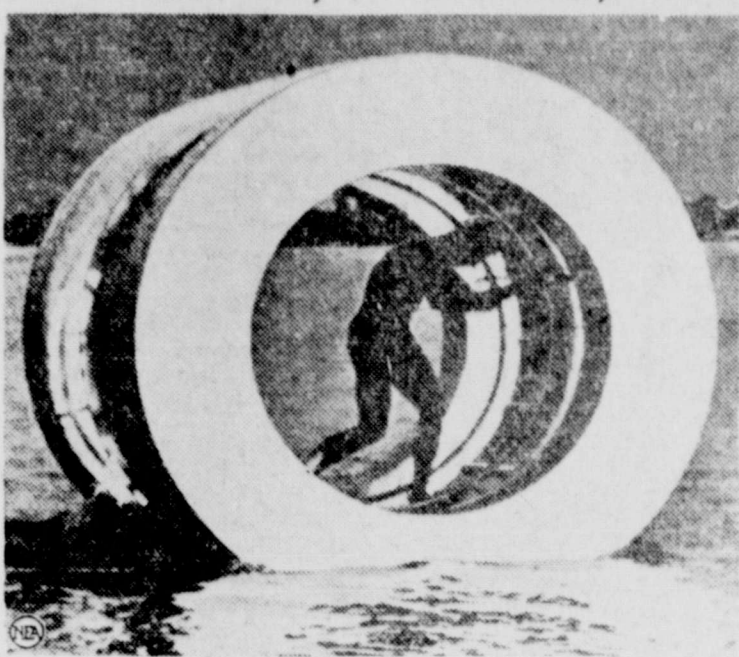
