Horticulturist Explains Green Plants' Vital Role

Green plants play a vital role in our survival and well-being.

They, explains Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist, are the great air purifiers of the world. They have the ability to take carbon dioxide from the air and convert it to oxygen which is vital to all animal life. In the process of photosynthesis, plants manufacture the basic carbohydrate materials which we ultimately use as food.

In a season of active growth, Janne notes that the grass in a well-maintained 50 by 50 feet lawn will liberate enough oxygen to meet the needs of a family of four day after day.

He says estimations made by Dr. Karl Boer, University of Delaware scientist, show that each of us requires at least 78 large trees each day to utilize the carbon dioxide given off in the various processes needed to maintain our well-being.

"Here is the way he sees it. One tree is needed to take up the carbon dioxide from our breathing; 20 for our automobile; 20 for heating and air conditioning our home; 5 for household electricity; 2 for garbage disposal and 30 trees to utilize the carbon dioxide produced in the manufacture of the industrial goods each of us uses.

These estimations, points out Janne, do not consider the effects of public transportation, forest fires, and other contributors to the CO₂ in the atmosphere. For example, a commercial jet aircraft flying from

New York to Los Angeles creates enough CO₂ to require the combined efforts of more than 50,000 trees for one day to utilize it all.

Greater use of plants in home gardens, in home and public landscaping, and in community beautification is suggested by the horticulturist, as a positive contribution for reduced air pollution.

In addition to acting as air purifiers and food manufacturing complexes, trees also improve the environment, says Janne. They cool the air and provide welcome shade. The foliage serves as a filtering system screening out dust from the atmosphere. They can serve as windbreaks, reducing the wind velocity; thereby, reducing heat loss from homes and farm yards. Trees and shrubs also serve as excellent sound barriers against traffic and industrial noises, advises Janne.

For their aesthetic value alone in helping beautify our surroundings, trees, shrubs and ground cover plants are worth the time, effort and expense required to plant and maintain them, contends the horticulturist. Add this to all of the other benefits derived from green growing plants, he adds, and it is easy to see why it is important that we keep America green.

And reminds Janne, the optimum time for tree planting is now at hand.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

"(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

Tax Man Sam Sez:

There has been some confusion on what IRS is going to do for taxpayers on figuring their tax returns this year. IRS will not take your shoe box full of records (?) and put it down on your Form 1040 for you--however, you can have IRS's computer figure your tax return by simply following the instructions with your Form 1040.

"Your Federal Income Tax" says: "If your income on line 18, Form 1040 is \$20,000 or less, and consists only of wages or salaries and tips, dividends, interest, pensions and annuities and you choose the standard deduction instead of itemizing your deductions, you may have IRS compute your tax for you. If you want IRS to do this, fill in lines 1 through 18 and 24, 26, 27 and 28, if applicable. If you are entitled to a retirement income credit, attach Schedule R and enter "RIC" on line 22 of Form 1040."

If you meet the requirements and you figure that the computer can "out figure" you, just mail it to the Austin Service Center and the computer will do the rest.

Art Linkletter Slated To Speak In Plainview

Radio and television personality Art Linkletter will make two appearances in Plainview March 12, speaking on the subject "Youth and the Drug Problem."

Plainview Junior Service League has arranged for the matinee in addition to the night appearance due to the tremendous response received by the organization.

Tickets for the afternoon program, set for 3:45 p. m. will be \$3.50 and the 7:30 p. m. appearance, \$5. Tickets are available at the Olton High School principals office. Olton High School students holding valid tickets will be dismissed early in order to make the 3:45 speech. Night tickets will also be available at the high school.

Linkletter became interested in the drug abuse problem following the death of a daughter Diane, who leaped from a five story building during what was believed to have been a "flashback" from LSD. Since that time he has written magazine articles, spoken around the country and worked with government leaders in the preparation of narcotics and drug abuse legislation.

Art Linkletter traces his long, varied career back to 1933 when he worked as an announcer for KGB radio in San

Diego. In 1936, he served as radio and public address system director for the Texas Centennial in Dallas and authored "Cavalcade of Texas," centennial theme.

Linkletter's TV and radio show "People Are Funny" rated in the Top Ten in radio for more than 11 years and was one of the Top 25 since its debut in 1954. His show "House Party" was the longest running continuous daytime audience participation show in network broadcasting and captured an Emmy award.

The versatile entertainer has starred in and co-produced several TV specials, holds positions in a number of business organizations and is the successful author of such books as "Kids Say the Darndest Things," which was a number one nonfiction best seller for two years. Active in service and charitable organizations, he has received many awards for his efforts.

FOR THE HOME GARDENER--Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist, suggests that home gardeners become familiar with the 1971 All-America Flower Selections. Many of them should be available through nurseries and garden centers of the state. This recognition, he points out, indicates that the flowers are new and different but does not necessarily mean they are better than some of the older varieties which have withstood the test of time. They are worth a trial, however, he adds.

NUTRITION HAZARD

The candy and soft drink hazard is a real threat to your child's nutrition, especially to his teeth. If he acquires the sweet-snacking habit, he no longer enjoys the good foods in his normal diet, so he is likely to eat less and less of them and become undernourished. Be sure your child is eating foods and snacks that are good for his health and strength. Foods like: fresh fruit, enriched cereal or crackers, ice cream.

Cancer strikes young and old, rich and poor. If detected early and treated, lives may be saved. The immediate goal of the American Cancer Society is to save 318,000 lives or half of the persons who develop

cancer each year.

This week I'd like to share some thoughts with you. Perhaps they'll help you. Running a home, keeping records of bills and preparing income taxes -- all are frustrating and impossible without order. Make plans this year to establish a family business center. An organized system personalized to fit you and your family problems will eliminate many money management problems. Such a system will aid decision making, income tax preparation, and provide a more orderly means of saving for future goals.

To set up the family business center, select a desk, drawer or shelf of adequate size to store family records. It should be near a convenient work surface. Keep current bills, check books, cancelled checks, credit payment books, receipts, guarantees and a list of when payments must be made in the center. At income tax time, you will have all records necessary to figure and itemize deductions.

What's the difference in paying cash and buying on credit over a long period of time? The comparison results are

somewhat shocking.

A study conducted at the University of Minnesota in 1968 illustrates the side effects of credit buying over a period of 45 years. Based on the service life expectancy of nine commonly purchased consumer items, the study estimated that a family will buy three refrigerators, ranges, toasters, vacuum cleaners and living room rugs; two electric sewing machines, and four television sets. In addition, if they are a one-car family and a car is kept for approximately three years and 10 months, 13 cars will be purchased.

If these items are bought on time payments, the total cost of principle and interest will be about \$39,000. But if these same monthly payments are invested in a savings account for a similar length of time as the installment payment period, the family will be able to purchase the same nine items during the 45 year period and have almost \$33,000 left over. This is due to 45 years of interest compounded quarterly at 4 percent. If \$8,000 in interest charges not paid are considered, the total savings would equal \$41,000.

The interest charges on the 13 cars alone, if saved, would be enough to buy all the other items used during the family's life span for cash. The difference between buying first and paying later, and in saving then buying, is equal to about one-third of the purchase price of the items. Even the "wise use of credit" is expensive and creates considerable erosion of purchasing power over the life span of families.

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Accent On Health

Making medical history comes to few people, but this distinction has come to an Ohio boy who medical authorities say has survived a case of human rabies.

Rabies in man is considered a fatal disease, but the six-year-old Lima, Ohio, youngster defeated the odds in the astounding medical event. He was asleep last Oct. 10 when bitten by a bat, which was captured by his father and submitted to a laboratory, where the tests were positive for rabies. The boy received a 14-day series of inoculations.

On Oct. 30 the youngster complained of neck pain and over the next several days experienced lethargy, general discomfort and loss of appetite.

When his condition worsened, the lad was admitted to a Lima hospital with 104-degree fever. Although the fever decreased, he became more lethargic, developed stiffness of the neck, lost the ability to speak or understand, had a weakness of the left arm and other symptoms and finally lapsed into a coma.

To facilitate breathing, a surgical opening (tracheostomy) was made in his throat. After a week, the boy gradually began to improve. Steady but slow progress continued and before Christmas was able to walk with assistance and speak in short sentences. Later he was able to leave the hospital.

From the time the boy entered the hospital, test after test was run in an effort to pinpoint the cause of his illness. Blood tests were made with negative results--for encephalitis and other diseases. Other tests also were run.

Using information concerning the circumstances of the original bit, clinical illness and laboratory findings, medical authorities said the evidence strongly suggested that the boy had an active case of human rabies. His case still is being watched closely.

The child's clinical improvement was significant and unusual, said health authorities. Humans with rabies have been known to survive for up to 133 days. But, says the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga., there has been no laboratory-confirmed case in which the patient showed actual physical improvement after the first

month of illness.

During the boy's treatment, heart and breathing functions were monitored continuously. Prevention of hypoxia--oxygen starvation--was accomplished by the throat operation and careful nursing care.

While this youngster is considered the first to survive human rabies, there is no speculation that the future holds any hope for other rabies victims. The Texas State Department of Health advises all animal owners to have their pets vaccinated against rabies and to avoid contact with any "friendly-acting" wild animal.

The award will be presented at the annual Texas Polled Hereford Association Summer Tour in June.

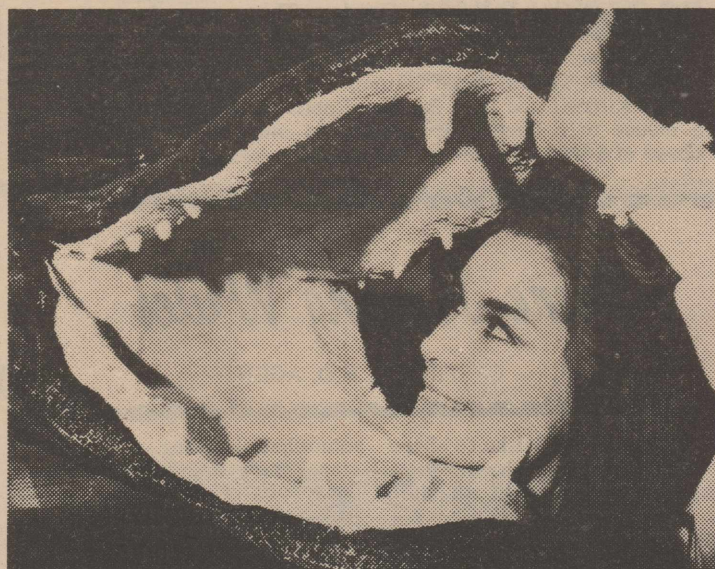

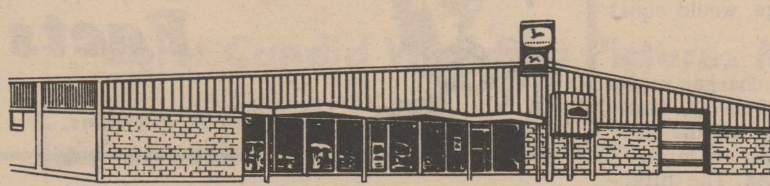

'Millionaire Crop' Adds Boost To Texas Economy

If there was a squeal in peanuts, scientists would find a marketable use for it.

They've found a use for just about everything else in peanuts. Everyone knows about peanut butter and peanut oil, but there are a lot of other things coming from the peanut, like:

There's a cereal becoming popular with children; salted, in-the-shell peanuts are popular, especially at ball games; there are de-fatted peanuts for the weight watchers; peanuts promise a major contribution in the manufacture of meat substitutes; and now, developments are being made to spin the protein out of peanuts into cloth.

And that's not all. Peanut products are used in cosmetics; and ground peanut hulls are so popular as roughage in livestock feeds, that the demand exceeds the supply.

Furthermore, the peanut has a "week" of its own. March 3-13 has been designated as National Peanut Week.

Commissioner John C. White has announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture, in conjunction with the Texas Peanut Producers Board, will give the peanut its biggest promotion as a quality Texas Agricultural Product (TAP) later this year.

The peanut might have been thought of once as the "lowly peanut", but not now. Wayne Eaves, executive secretary of the Texas Peanut Producers Board, said: "Peanuts are a millionaire crop, meaning about \$50,000,000 a year to the economy of Texas."

Texas is the nation's second largest peanut producing state,

and peanuts rank sixth in major cash crops for the state.

Texas has 117 counties that produced 317,000 tons of Spanish-type peanuts on 357,000 acres in 1970, with a value of more than \$50 million. Comanche County is Number One in the State in growing peanuts with 61,000 acres, followed by Eastland County with 40,000, Atascosa County with 22,000, and Erath and Frio Counties with 18,000 each.

Peanut butter is an all-Texas favorite. A physician seeking an easily digested, high-protein food for some of his patients apparently "invented" peanut butter in 1890. The lucky patients' friends liked the new health food, and its popularity grew.

The greatest scientist, George Washington Carver, more than a half century ago began experimenting with peanuts and gave impetus to the development of peanut butter, the use of peanut oil in paints and other uses.

Nutritionally, peanuts rank near the top in six categories of foods. It has over 26 per cent protein, a percentage higher than eggs, dairy products and many cuts of meats and fish.

No doubt about it, peanuts are the "Funfood" and a mighty important one.

Vehicle Owners Urged Avoid Rush, Register Now

Now is the time for all good motor vehicle owners in Texas to come to their own aid by registering their vehicles early.

The registration renewal season opened Feb. 1 at county tax offices and designated substations. Tax collectors are obliged by law to begin selling license plates on Feb. 1.

The "season" runs through February and March, although the wise motorist will save time and trouble by registering his vehicle early and by using the handy three-part form he received in the mail from the Texas Highway Department.

All one needs to do is take the three-part renewal application -- being careful not to separate the three parts of the form -- to the county tax office or sub-station.

Using the new form, it takes the clerk only a fraction of the time that it used to to process the form, collect the fee and send the motorist on the way with his 1971 license plates. For that reason, waiting time is trimmed drastically.

Human nature being what it is, however, many will wait until the last minute to secure their license plates. Texas motorists can count on longer lines toward the end of the season -- even though they may be moving faster.

There is an even less painful method. If the vehicle owner desires, he may order his license plates by mail.

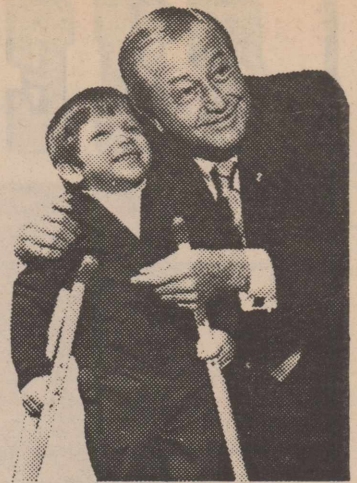
All that is required is to send the renewal application, the fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to be registered to the local county tax office prior to March 1. This allows 30 days for delivery of the plates in time for the April 1 deadline.

Records of the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division reveal that 65 per cent of the registrations handled last year were speeded by using the computerized renewal forms.

The outlook for this year is that the public will save even more time in the second year of operation under the new system.

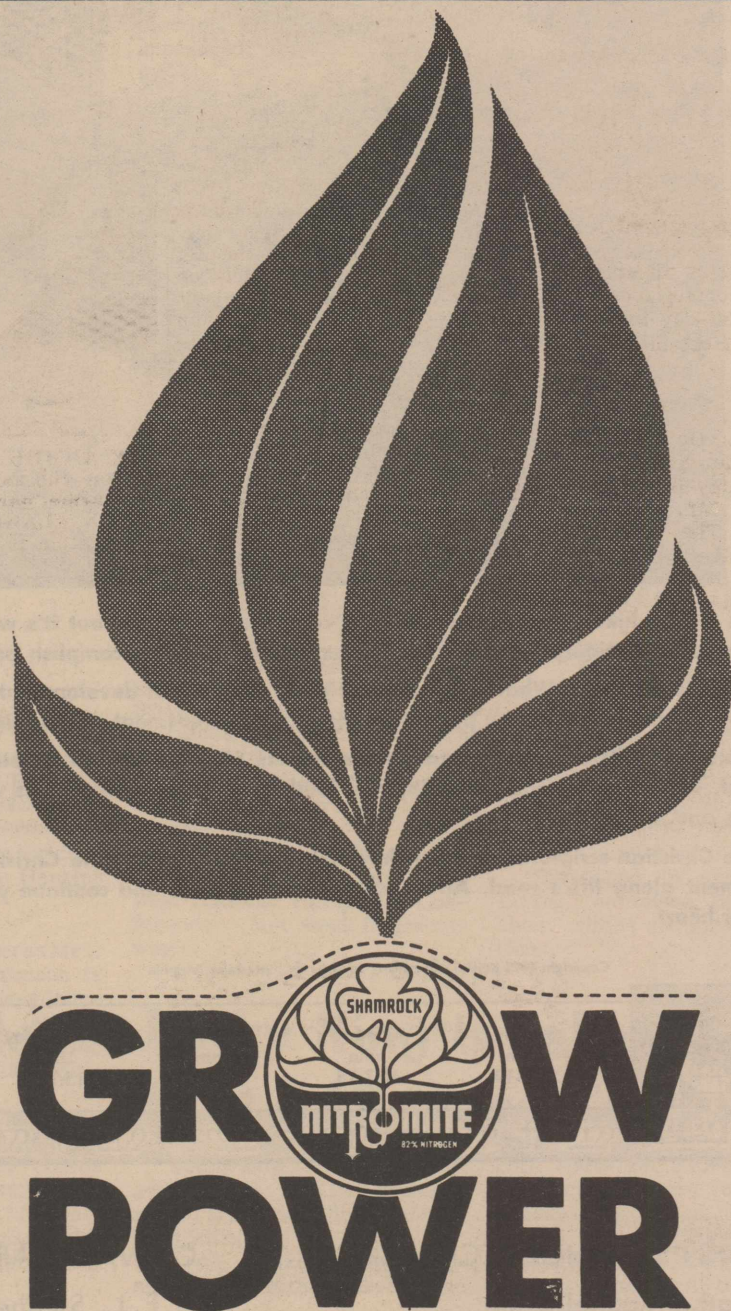
