Holiday causes early deadline

Non-Medicare patient reduction cited

The reduction of the non-Medicare patient at Root Memorial Hospital will cause Root Memorial Hospital to finish its fiscal year well below budget, Assistant Administrator Richard Murphy told the Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors Tuesday.

Murphy explained that the hospital is not alone in the reduced patient load and cited "the economic crunch" as one reason for the decrease in pa-

tients.

For the 10 months ending July 31, Murphy said that operating revenues are \$593,198 below the 10-month budget and \$1,388,321 below last year. The month of July revenues were under budget \$27,929 or 14 percent of the monthly budget. Overall, the 10 months' revenues are 29.6 percent below budget and 49.6 percent under last year.

Murphy said that admissions are 651 below target and patient

average is 12.2 per day.

Average charge to the inpatient is \$343.49 per day, which is \$95.84 over projection. However, the current average is \$6.26 per day less than the actual last year.

Murphy said that the adjusted net loss for July is \$72,873.24.

Murphy noted that Root Valley Fair Lodge "is very stable in its activity." Expenses at the nursing home are less than one percent over budget. The aver-

age patient pays \$12,222 per year for care.

While the hospital's financial condition continues to be gloomy, Administrator Ray Mason said efforts are continuing to secure additional doctors to staff the hospital.

Mason said that Dr. Dee Roach will be finishing medical school in May of 1986 and will be starting his practice here in June of 1986.

In addition, an Oklahoma phy-

sician has expressed an interest in Colorado City and has requested more information from the recruiting firm hired by the hospital district.

Mason said that the home health service should be operational by October 1 and that a registered nurse from Snyder has been hired to direct the program. Board member Marion Bassham was appointed to an

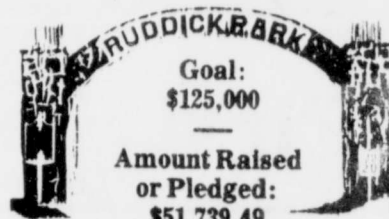

Arrests keep police busy

The Colorado City Police Department has made a number of arrests the past week, according to Police Chief Bobby Sparks.

Bank tax sent

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$30,714 to various Mitchell County entities from the first collection of the state's new franchise tax on banks.

In a special session last year, the Legislature brought banks under the franchise tax for the time and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

The Colorado Independent School District received the largest check, \$11,586.56, followed by

Colorado City, \$8,239.16; Mitchell County, \$4,727.27; Mitchell County Hospital District, \$2,590.73; Loraine Independent School District, \$2,144.51; and City of Loraine, \$1,428.16.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

Comedy pleases Playhouse crowd

The wit of Neil Simon shone through Monday night at the opening of the Colorado City Playhouse production of "Chapter Two," undoubtedly one of the best plays ever written by the award winning playwright.

The two-act comedy directed by Tandy Curlee stars Jim Baum as "George Schneider," a bereaved widower, and Penny Solomon as "Jennie Malone," a recent divorcee.

The only other characters are Walter Hearin as "Leo Schneider" and Linda Hearin as "Faye Medwick," the

matchmakers who eventually find themselves in a relationship with one another.

"Chapter Two" is an autobiography of a portion of Neil Simon's life and combines humor and drama to provide an entertaining evening.

The play begins as "George Schneider" returns from Europe where he went not to forget, but rather to remember his wife of 12 years who had recently died.

"Leo" tries to help his brother "George" forget his sorrow by introducing him to a variety of women, but "George" is not ready for another relationship.

"Jenny Malone," played by Miss Solomon, has returned from getting a whirlwind divorce and isn't ready for a relationship either—until the charming "George" calls her by mistake and a clever exchange of phone calls follows.

A whirlwind romance follows and two and a half weeks after their initial meeting, "George" and "Jenny" are married, but not without second thoughts.

But, there's soon trouble in paradise when after the honeymoon, "George" can't forget his first wife even though he deeply loves "Jenny."

"Chapter Two" is a play that most any adult audience member can relate to and the four characters play their parts superbly. Baum and Miss Solomon are both newcomers to the local stage, but their performances are first-rate.

Walter Hearin and Linda Hearin, both veteran Playhouse performers, help bring the play to life in their supporting roles. Standing ovations are a tradition at the Opera House, but Monday night's ovation by a packed crowd was one truly earned by the cast and production staff.

("Chapter Two" performances continue Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Tuesday nights at 8 each evening. The box office is open daily from 1 p.m. until curtain time.)

"Crazy" Ray spent several hours visiting with the park-goers, signing autographs, doing magic tricks and making balloon animals for the kids.

Medicare

changes

Many changes are occurring in the part of the Medicare program that relates to inpatient hospital care. To help assure that medical services are available to those who really need them, the federal government has created a program of medical review for hospital care provided to Medicare patients.

Under this program, medical records will be subject to review by a physician other than the attending physician. This physician reviewer will assess whether or not it was medically necessary for the patient to be in the hospital to receive medical treatment. If the physician reviewer has any questions, he or she will attempt to contact the attending physician to discuss the case.

Following the discussion, it may be determined that treatment could have been safely and effectively provided without admission to the hospital. The patient, the physician and the hospital will receive a notification letter. The letter will state that medical review determined that the hospital admission was not medically necessary. Medicare beneficiaries will not be held financially responsible for those services determined not to be medically necessary prior to receiving the letter. Those who choose to remain in the hospital after receiving the letter, will have to make other financial arrangements with the hospital.

The medical review program in Texas is administered by the Texas Medical Foundation-Peer Review Organization of Texas (TMF-PROT). TMF-PROT is a private, nonprofit corporation made up of physician members. The TMF-PROT philosophy is that only physicians are qualified to determine the medical necessity of care provided by other physicians.

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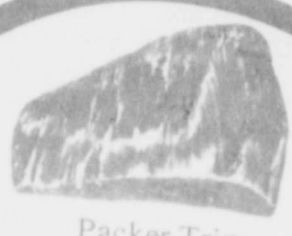

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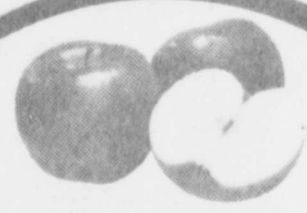
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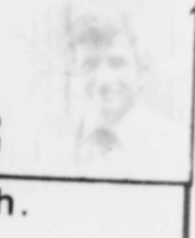


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Loraine Baptist Women meet to discuss missions

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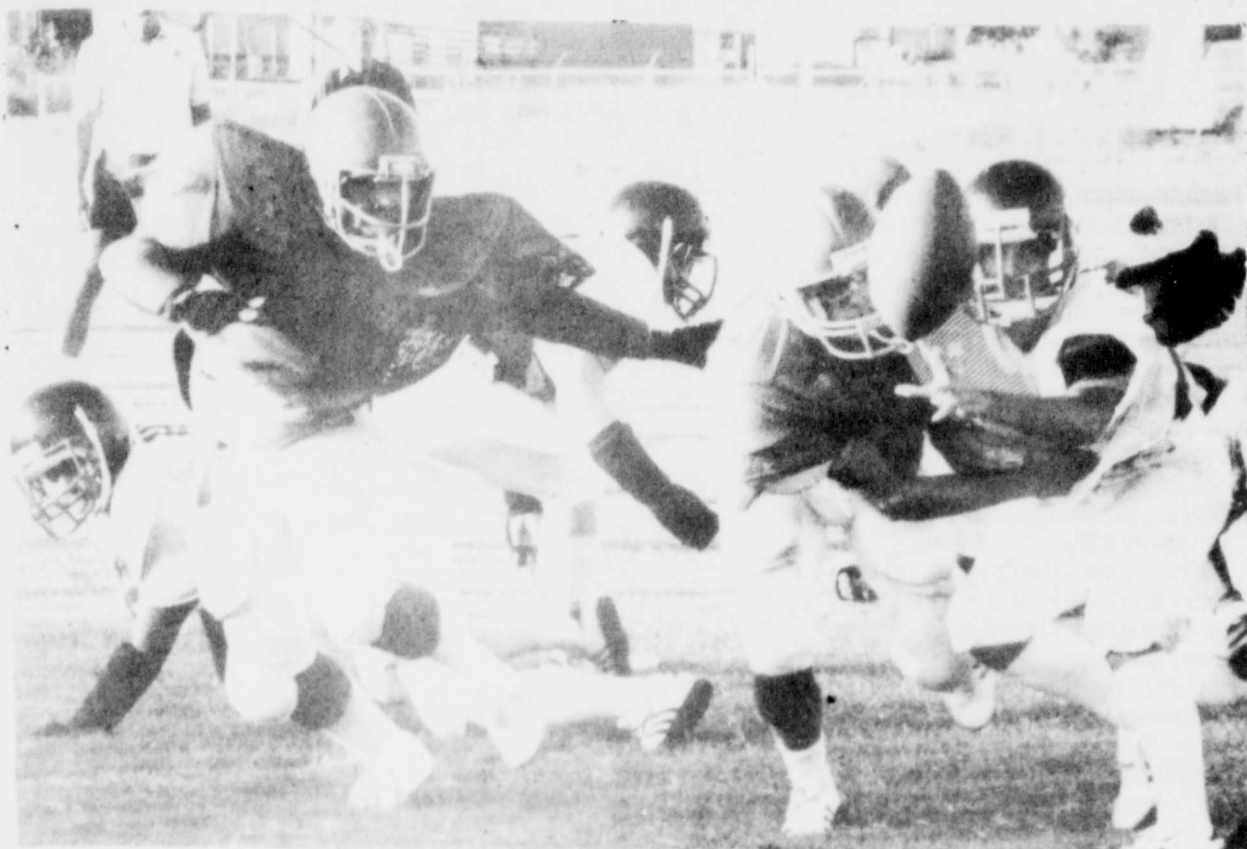

Wolves defense works good in first scrimmage

Neither team scored at last Friday's football scrimmage between the Colorado City Wolves and the class AA Stanton Buffaloes—mostly due to two fired up defenses.

"They really got after us," said Colorado High school head football coach and athletic director Tom Ramsey.

The outcome was a complete reversal from last year's scrimmage between the two ball clubs—when the high-flying '84 Wolves were already oiling an offense destined to carry them to an area championship.

"I think it went pretty good," said Ramsey.

Though the Wolves weren't able to move at will against the Buffs they did break some long gainers occasionally.

"Stanton came at us with a lot of stunts and blitzes," said Ramsey.

"We stayed very basic and tried to work on some things. They chose not to. It didn't help them any and it certainly didn't

help us much."

"Usually at this time of the season, you're just looking to execute."

"The big plays we did manage were when we got by them as they rushed in."

Running back Sam Rivera, the lone starter returning from last year's stellar offensive unit, did find a few holes opened by the Wolves young offensive line.

On at least two occasions, the Wolves were just one downfield block away from scoring a touchdown.

The Wolves' and Buffaloes' biggest gainers were both marred by penalties back at the line of scrimmage.

One Stanton receiver dropped a sure score in the endzone and Colorado City's offense was also slowed by a few mental mistakes.

The first offensive play by the Wolves resulted in a fumble.

Though it wasn't the case last year, Ramsey didn't seem surprised that the offense wasn't at high gear.

"Usually that's the case early

in the season. Your defense is ahead of your offense for a few weeks."

The Wolves ran 15 plays to begin the scrimmage then switched to defense for 15 plays before repeating the procedure.

The defense was in fact a little more assertive. The offense seemed to move the ball a little better the second series.

Ramsey noted that the main concern of the coaching staff is the number of inexperienced players on the varsity. Several Wolves made a two-step jump to the varsity from last year's freshman squad without ever playing a down for the junior varsity.

The young Wolves will be looking to gain some of that valuable experience when they scrimmage class AAAA Snyder at Tiger Stadium today.

Ramsey said the Snyder scrimmage should prove to be a plus as they ready for next week's season opener at Slaton because of the similarity between Snyder's and Slaton's coaching preferences.

Grandsons were pallbearers.

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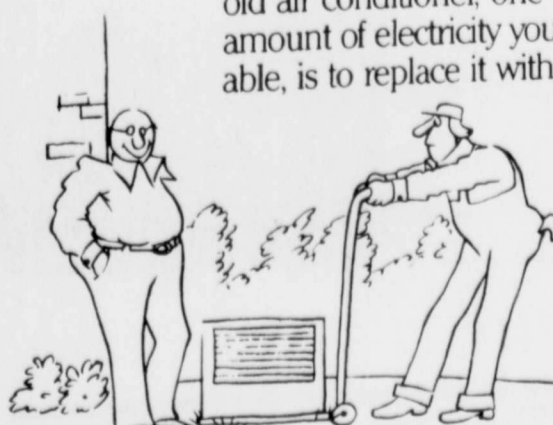

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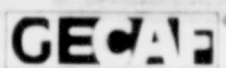
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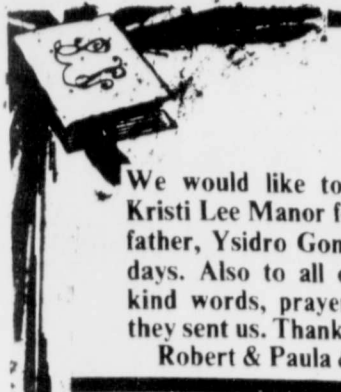
