LARGEST CREW OF 36 AT WORK ON CAMP TODAY

Thirty-six men are at work
this morning on the CCC camp,
the largest number since con-

work today "roughing in" plum-
ing for the 11 buildings.

Ten men are at work on the
septic tank, excavations for
which are about half completed.

rival of plumbing drains, the su-
perintendent said.

PITTSBORO, Miss., Aug. 5.—
Bodie Bates, negro accused of
attempting to attack a 22-year-
old white woman here Saturday
night, was lynched by a mob last
night.

The mob, comprised of white
citizens, formed after the negro
was arrested and overpowered an
officer at the jail.

Bates was taken to a sparsely
settled section of Calhoun County
and hanged from a bridge over
the Yalobusha River, where offi-
cers found the body today.

been the center of quite a bit

will be used in a flying school

ABOUT 40 FROM COUNTY GO TO AMARILLO

Leave in Group To
Hear Secretary
Wallace

About 40 Hall County farmers
and local business men left Mem-
phis in a group this morning for
Amarillo where they will hear
Secretary of Agriculture Henry
Wallace this afternoon.

The group gathered at the
county agent's office, providing
transportation for those who had
no way to get to Amarillo, and
left at about 9 o'clock.

Wallace is to speak at 3 o'clock
this afternoon at the municipal
auditorium in Amarillo. The Hall
County visitors probably will
leave for home shortly after the
meeting.

The secretary of agriculture is
the first New Deal cabinet mem-
ber to appear in the Southwest.
Several thousand farmers from
over the entire Panhandle were
expected to be on hand to hear
his public address this afternoon.

Loud speakers were set up in-
side and outside the auditorium
to provide facilities for the overflow
crowd in the building that seats
2,500 people.

Wallace was expected to give
pertinent information concerning
the Government's agricultural
program. The future of the pro-
gram may be discussed, as well as
the aims and purposes of the crop
control legislation.

As head of the entire program,
Secretary Wallace probably is
capable of giving more first hand
information than any other per-
son. Since farmers are generally
"in the dark" insofar as the farm
program is concerned, Wallace's
appearance took on added impor-
tance.

TAX BILL GETS PASSED HOUSE; GOES TO SENATE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The
administration's tax bill, estimat-
ed to raise between 250 and 270
million dollars additional reve-
nue, was passed by the House to-
day, 282 to 96, and sent to the
Senate.

After controversy in that
branch appeared certain before
the measure, upon which the time
of congressional adjournment de-
pends. A voted upon.

Action came after a Republi-
can attempt to pigeonhole the
bill in the Ways and Means Com-
mittee was defeated.

Chairman Harrison of the Sen-
ate Finance Committee hopes to
complete hearings Wednesday
and report the bill out this week.
Floor consideration probably will
be delayed until next week. It is
likely the finance committee will
make many changes in the meas-
ure.

Zenge Will Face Murder Charges

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Judge
Justin F. McCarthy in Felony
Court today issued a warrant
charging Mandeville W. Zenge,
26, with the emasculation slay-
ing of Dr. Walker J. Bauer. Mc-
Carthy made the warrant return-
able tomorrow.

Charles S. Dougherty, assistant
states attorney, said he would go
before the grand jury tomorrow
and ask that a murder indictment
be returned against Zenge.

WEEK-END NEWS

OIL trouble over the icy Barents Sea Saturday night halted the attempt of three Russian fliers to make a non-stop hop over the North Pole from Moscow to San Francisco, a distance of 6,000 miles. The fliers turned back to Leningrad after making a distance of 875 miles, at an average of 108 miles an hour.

Cold has long been one of man's most difficult barriers, but great strides have been made to conquer the frozen lands by air. The fact that this flight failed will not stop attempts to find a short air route over the roof of the world. The failure of the attempted flight was due more to man's inefficiency than to the elements. In a few years, the 108 miles an hour may seem like a snail's pace.

An almost universally optimistic tone pervaded American business last week, according to an Associated Press survey. Retail trades moved swiftly forward, and department of commerce reports showed a steady increase in buying of building materials, furniture, household equipment and electric supplies as a corollary of the consistent gains in construction.

A local survey Saturday showed that Memphis was in line in the construction gains. Little new construction was made by private concerns, but small jobs, repairs and improvements brought about the highest construction peak in three years.

The days of the "lone wolf" Texas Rangers are nearing an end. Fame came to the Rangers as hard-riding and quick-shooting individuals in 10-gallon hats, who single-handedly or in pairs handled a riot or mob or traced cattle thieves.

Errors overcame the effective pitching of Lefty Blanchard, and the Memphis Owls dropped an 11 to 7 decision of the loop leaders yesterday afternoon at Paducah.

Next Sunday the Owls entertain the Wellington Gassers in their final game on the season's schedule. Without a title game after that until the Shaughnessy play-off starts in September, the Owls plan a strenuous series of non-conference tilts during the remainder of the month.

Blanchard gave up 10 hits yesterday, but he kept them well scattered, and without the aid of errors, Paducah would have received few runs.

But Tunnell, at second, and Berryman, shortstop, made a total of eight miscues that cost the Owls heavily. They complained that they could not figure out the antics of the ball on the concrete-like diamond of Paducah's pasture park.

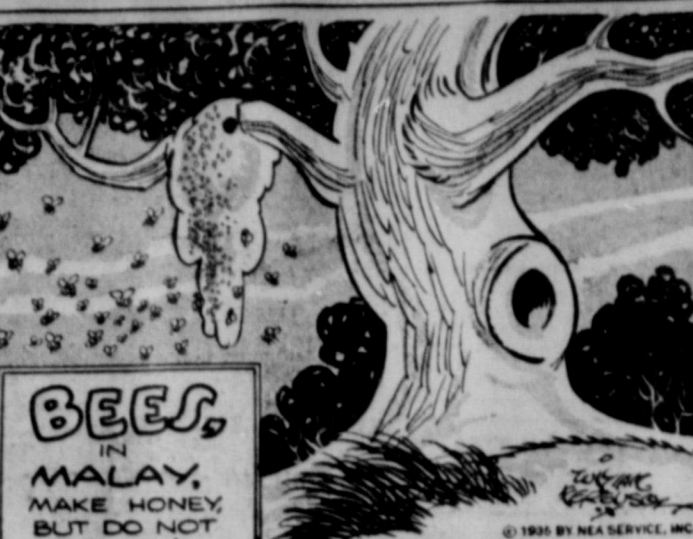
