Girl Scout cookie sale begins January 10th

The 2014 Girl Scout Cookie Sale kicks off on January 10th, and Colorado City Girl Scouts will be out and about selling the delicious morsels. The Girl Scout Cookie Sale is the largest girl-led business in the world, and the local troop will set a table set up at Fuller Foods on January 18th from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Troop 7100 will be meeting the cookie needs of Mitchell

County. The troop has 15 student members and four adult members and is part of the Texas Oklahoma Plains Council which has 22,953 girls and 8,092 adult members.

Nationwide, the best-selling Girl Scout Cookie is Thin Mints, but here in Colorado City Caramel de Lites are the favorite. The cookies accounted for nearly 25% of Troop 7100's sales in 2013.

The annual sale provides several benefits for Girl Scouts participating in the fundraiser. Girls work toward financial literacy badges. The cookie sale teaches them goal setting, decision making, money management, people skills and business ethics; skills they can carry with them for a lifetime of success. Girls also earn "cookie bucks" that can be redeemed to pay for summer camps all over the council.

And, of course, girls earn money for the local troop. Approximately 63 cents for every package sold stays with the local troop. The money is used to help with the cost of uniforms, purchase books and badges, and to provide fun activities for troop members.

This year, the girls would like to take a trip somewhere. They have considered Sea World in San Antonio, the Fort Worth Zoo, etc. They understand that the details of the trip will be determined by how many cookies they sell.

Through Project Troop to Troop, customers sponsor packages of Girl Scout cookies that are sent by Girls Scouts of Texas Oklahoma Plains to men and women in uniform in 2013; over 48,000 packages of cookies were delivered to service men and women stateside and overseas.

Customers can purchase cookies for Project Troop to Troop in addition to their personal order, or if you cannot eat cookies due to dietary restrictions, it allows you to support Colorado City's Girl Scout and U.S. Soldiers.

The price of cookies has increased to \$4 a box this year, and cookies are produced by ABC Bakers. The company became official Girl Scout cookie bakers in 1937. The delicious sweets have 0 grams transfat per serving and have no preservatives.

Drilling increases in Mitchell County

The following article was published on the internet at www.clineshale.com.

Overall, the total drilling rig activity stayed flat over the holidays with very few changes in rig mobilizations. The most active area in the region in Martin county did see a decline in activity losing three active rigs but is still at the same level of drilling as it was eight weeks ago when news first stated coming out about Pioneer's success there. More importantly, the number of horizontal rigs working there is still

similar to recent weeks. Another interesting shift over the past month is the increase in activity in Mitchell County. This area is to the east and somewhat north from the known hotspots of the Cline, but it does directly border Howard County that currently has a considerable amount of drilling activity. Mitchell County only had one active rig at Thanksgiving which had increased to five by Christmas. The activity still solely consists of exploratory vertical rigs at this point, but the quick increase

points to one or two operators that are seeing something they are very intrigued by. One possible suspect is the tightly-held Fire Wheel Energy that has previously extended the commercial successes of the Cline eastward into neighboring Sterling County. In the coming weeks as operators begin their 2014 budget outlay and Q4 earnings are announced, expect plenty of shifting activity as producers seek out the best potential geology for the current market conditions. MCHD names January employee of the month

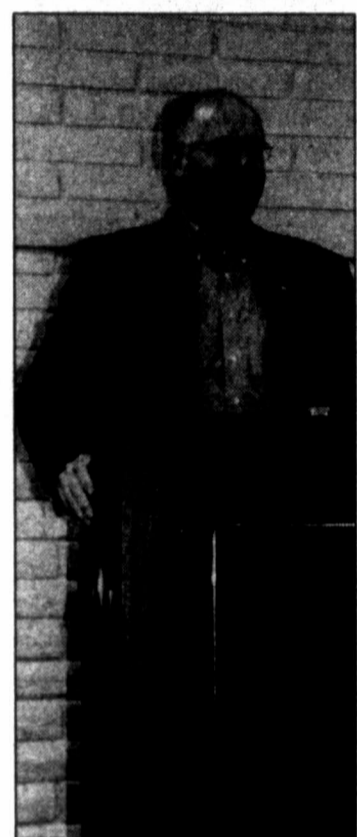

Conaway speaks to Lions Club concerning national issues

U.S. Representative of the 11th District Mike Conaway spoke to Lions Club on Friday, giving interesting insights into the happenings within the national legislature. Conaway has represented District 11 since 2005. The first subject addressed by Conaway was the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare. He said the law was passed in 2010, but there have been many implementation issues. He cited incompetence among current federal employees as the reason much of the act has not been implemented. With premium increases costing about 10% more than before, and penalties maxing out at 1%, Conaway said he doesn't see why many of the uninsured would pay premiums instead of a penalty. Conaway said he hopes that the Farm Bill will be approved by the end of January. Talks about

food stamps is part of the hold up, as well as issues he calls "unworkable" such as income limitation. The bill is working under an extension that expires at the end of January. Congress has received some criticism for not being able to balance the budget, and Conaway said the government is operating under a resolution to keep spending the same as last session. He said he expects the old \$1,012,000,000 budget to increase to \$1,014,000,000 in 2015. Though many voters would like to see it, a fundamental tax reform is not in the works for this legislative session, according to Conaway. There has also been no progress made on entitlement reform or immigration. He said he hopes Congress will address immigration reform soon. Lion Bob Brookshear asked

what kind of security was in place at the Canadian border. Conaway said that though the economic pressure was not there to secure the Canadian border the same as the Mexican border, but there is always the threat for terrorists to enter the country through Canada. Conaway expressed his concern over what he sees as the biggest threat of all: the threat to self-governance. He said that only a moral population has the ability to self-govern. He believes that the moral path U.S. citizens are on won't allow for self-governance in the future.

The Cline Shale Alliance will hold a quarterly luncheon on Friday, January 10th in Sweetwater. The meeting will begin at 11:30 a.m. at the Nolan County Coliseum Annex in Newman Park at 1699 Cypress Street. Cost for the luncheon is \$25 per person, and advance payment is required. Those attending will be able to hear the latest on Cline Shale regional activity and developments. Currently, there are several facilities and infrastructure projects under construction including a \$28 million BNSF rail facility, natural gas power

plants, a 450-mile 300,000-barrel per day pipeline, a 1,200,000 barrel oil storage facility, regional transmission grid and numerous operations centers. Community leaders will be in attendance to give the latest on regional readiness strategies. There will be a roundtable discussion from leaders who traveled to North Dakota on a fact-finding excursion, and news from the West Texas Energy Consortium's initial economic projections. Wow, that's some burger!

Kenneth Tidwell has owned a restaurant in Andrews for fifteen years. "My dad had a restaurant years ago in Wink, Texas," says Kenneth. "I got to wash dishes there. I didn't get to be the boss, so I just decided I'd just put one in where I could be the boss." His place is called A Little Taste of Heaven. "We have good food and it tastes like what you're gonna get when you go up there."

He and his six employees serve a variety of food. "Chicken-fried and hamburger steaks, steak fingers, 10 different sandwiches, chicken strips and chicken nuggets. We've got fried pickle spears and they're our top sellers."

Kenneth is known for one special item. "I got the big eight inch hamburger. Biggest hamburger in Andrews. I can say that because I'm the only one that handles it. We got started with that and I didn't think it would go, but man, that thing sells like hotcakes. I have the buns special made. It's an eight-inch bun and I put a pound of hamburger meat on it along with all the fixings you want. We have to cut in into fourths to serve it because a person can't pick up an eight-inch burger. Their hands aren't big enough. It's like four little hamburgers. It sells for \$9.25. Lots of families come in with four kids and they just buy one burger and give each one of them a fourth of it and that fills them up. My small hamburger comes on a five and a half inch bun. It comes with french fries and a dessert for \$7.25."

He says most people leave about twenty-five percent of the big burgers. But one man is the exception. "He came in and ordered a triple meat, triple cheese eight inch hamburger and he ate every bite of it. I don't see how he walked out. Three pounds of meat on that thing and all that goes with it. But he did it. He paid more than \$9.25."

Kenneth gets some big orders and caters to a number of schools. "I've had orders for ninety hamburgers at once. Big Spring brought two football teams over here one night and I fed them all. Lubbock Estacado came down and they ordered sixty-five orders of steak fingers. I cooked them and delivered them myself."

The restaurant seats forty people and has lots of repeat customers. It's open weekdays for lunch and supper. "I try to buy the top brand of everything," says Kenneth. "I try to serve what I want to eat. I come from a family of 8 kids and my mother didn't want us to starve, so she taught us how to cook."

The restaurant has a complete line of desserts: banana pudding, chocolate cake, Dr. Pepper cake, pecan pies, caramel apple pie, peach, blackberry and cherry cobblers, cherry cheese cake, pound cake, strawberry shortcake, Italian cream and German chocolate cakes." Kenneth does the baking. "I make a fresh strawberry cake and I usually have to eat half of it to make sure it's OK for the customers."

An outhouse in the new garage

As soon as World War II was over the neighbor across the street bought a 1946 Cadillac, one of the first new cars in town. It was a beautiful green with chrome everywhere. I had forgotten a lot of the details, but distinctly remembered he raised a section of the taillight and there was the gas cap hidden away! I went online to refresh my memory before writing this story and was surprised to see the advanced styling. There were no running boards, the fenders extended back into the doors, and over the rear doors. It just simply was the most beautiful thing I had ever seen. Especially when compared to the well-used 1939 Chevrolet the folks were still driving and would be for the next three years.

The owner's house was a modest two-bedroom 1920's edition, with limited indoor toilet facilities. There were three girls in the family, so bathroom time was limited. The outhouse that served as a reserve or private sanctuary, for the man visited it often, was out by the dilapidated shanty-looking garage.

When he drove up in the new car he realized very quickly how inadequate it was. It was built to house a flivver, not a Caddy.

It was not long before he had a brand new, beautiful white-siding garage, with a concrete driveway up to it. And the car disappeared inside. But I was astonished the next week or two to see the daughters and wife making their trek out to a side door. He had built a super-deluxe privy on the far end of the new garage!

Needless to say, it was not too long before they built an en-

tirely new home out in a new posh section of town. I saw the car only occasionally in town and still marveled at its beauty.

But why buy a new car and build a new garage before he had remodeled the bathroom inside? Because he was newly rich from something to do with the war and a very vain man. He got what he wanted, no matter how many trips the family made along the path outside.

How do we set priorities? What things do we put first in our lives, our work, our country? Are we parking a new Cadillac in front of a 1920's shed? Does family come first? Does church attendance even enter the picture? Do the kids have to have the latest name-brand clothes, with the logo boldly displayed on the front or sleeves?

Does indulgence in drugs or alcohol prohibit clear thinking, reasonable actions? Does rage, jealousy, unfaithfulness ruin marriages and affect lives forever? Is self the main focus, and forget or underrate the rest?

Even patriotism is suspect these days. Terror plots make bigger headlines than heroic activity. Radical forces make renewed threats.

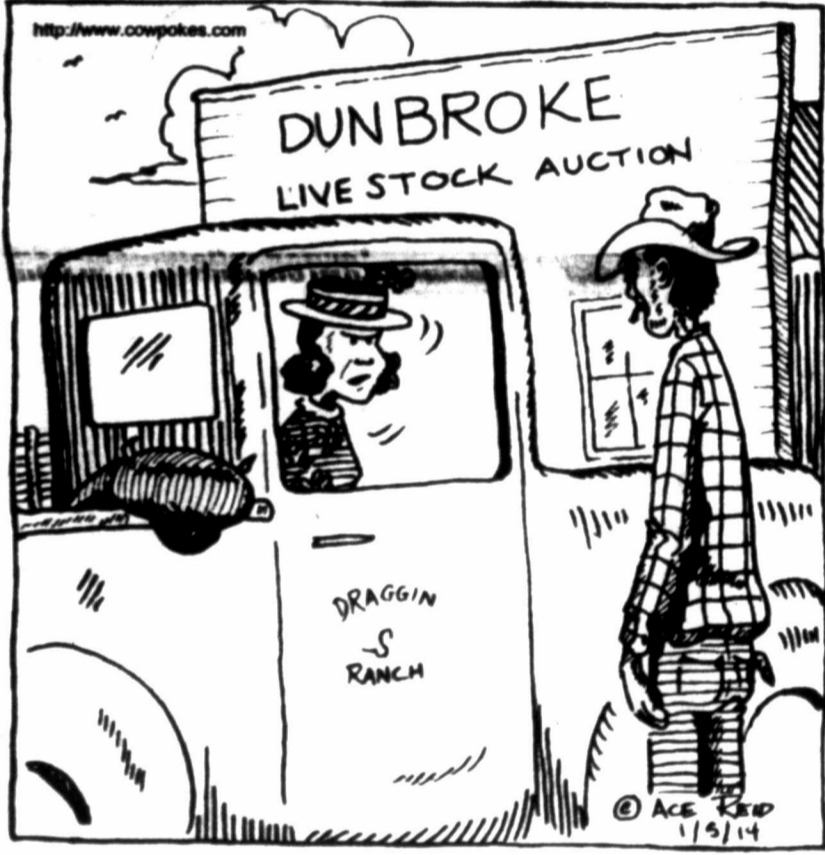

with TSTC to, hopefully, be able to offer certification in Environmental Sciences soon.

All courses are taken online with a classroom facilitator available to help students at all times. Students earning certifications may end up with 41 to 47 hours of college credit at graduation.

"This is an outstanding gift to our students," Wilcox said. "Our students are a valuable asset." She went on to say that the many choices and career paths offered to students were exceptional given the size of the school district.

Because there are various pathways for students to choose from, decisions about their future are made as early as freshman year. Wilcox said that students are able to change their path as they choose, but the classes have made it possible for them to begin taking courses that will start them

on a path to a successful career which they enjoy.

The first step to choosing what classes to take may begin with a test. CHS offers the ASVAB, a career aptitude test that uses questions to decide from 32 occupations. The test will be given to freshmen and sophomores on January 29th at the high school.

Students are also able to take the PSAT, which is basically a practice SAT test. The test is given to sophomores and juniors, giving students the chance to enter the National Merit Scholarship Program. Scores from the test often help school officials match students with colleges and careers.

Besides educational courses, Colorado ISD also provides information all students will need to further their education and careers. Incoming freshmen participate in a class called Educa-

tion 1100, where students hear frequently used college/terms that many have never heard before, like "syllabus." They also learn to calculate their GPA, which gives them a more hands-on approach to their grades and class ranking.

"Our main job is to help them be successful," Wilcox said of the students.

As state requirements become more stringent, schools will have to offer more options to students. CISD officials know this and are already working to obtain grant funding which will help with the extra cost of providing students with an exceptional education.

CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer has often said he aspires to provide Colorado City students with "a world-class education." Wilcox believes Colorado High School is on the right track.

fought vainly to keep it out of their homes, but it seeped in through cracks and crevices, through wet blankets hung over windows, through oiled cloths and tape, covering everything with grit.

Hospitals reported hundreds of patients suffering from "dust pneumonia." The black blizzards struck so suddenly that many farmers became lost in their own fields and suffocated, some, literally within yards of shelter. More than 350,000 people fled the Great Plains during the 1930s. As a result of the great dirt storm, over 12 million tons of topsoil from the Great Plains was dumped on Chicago, Illinois.

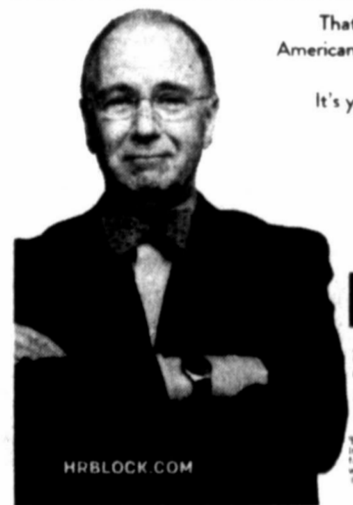

up for bids. She said that the subject will be revisited by the court on Monday.

The State of Texas is making \$225 million in grants available for application by counties affected by increased traffic on roads due to energy exploration. In order to apply for some of the grant money, court members held a public hearing and approved the creation of a County Energy Transportation Reinvestment Zone.

Mitchell County may receive up to \$1,381,430 through the grant program. The money is earmarked to be used on road repair and can be used anywhere within the county.

The program is an in-kind grant program, which means the county will have to put in 20%, or about \$260,000. This part of the funding has already been budgeted for road repair, qualifying the county for the grant.

County Auditor Heidi Harris brought several line items before the court to be approved in order to close out and balance the 2013 budget. Funds were moved to four departments, the county judge's office, non-departmental, district attorney legal account and law library, to zero out the previous budget. Harris said that all the overage funds were being

used to pay for attorneys and legal fees.

Before adjourning, the court approved payroll in the amount of \$88,555.32, as presented by County Treasurer Jennifer Rivera.

The "80" Brand Clay Mann's colorful history

Clay Mann died when he was 39 years old. During his short life, he established a reputation as one of the most successful ranchers of his time. He had ranches in Texas, New Mexico, Wyoming and Mexico and was the first man to string barbed wire around his ranch in Coleman County, Texas. He may be better known for helping "80 John" Wallace become a successful rancher.

Mann purchased his first herd in Coleman County, Texas in 1867 when he was 19 years old. Born in Tennessee, his father brought him to Parker County, Texas, in 1858 and Mann was working a job with a trail herd by the time he turned 17. When he bought the "7L" herd and brand in Coleman County, he made a deal to pay the \$10,000 purchase price out of the increase of the herd. Mann set up a ranch in the northwest part of the county near Jim Ned and Hord's creeks. Neighboring ranches included Jim Jackson, Bud Hinton, Enoch Hunt and Kin Elkins. He met and soon married Mary Elkins, the oldest daughter of Elkins who was himself a well-known ranching pioneer.

Local history stories provide another reason Clay Mann left Parker County and moved to Coleman County. Matthew Mann, Clay's father, was involved in a horse race that somehow angered Noah Hampton "Hamp" Pitillo and two of his friends, Joe Raborn and Jim Hickey. Matthew was shot to death in an ambush on January 13, 1866, by Pitillo. Three months later, 16-year-old Clay Mann loaded a double barreled shotgun with slugs, found Pitillo and shot him twice in the chest, killing him. After the shooting, Mann left Parker County and rode south to find refuge with a cousin in Coleman County. The Parker County courthouse burned in 1874 destroying any documents of the incident.

In 1877, Mann moved part of his herd to Kent County, Texas, then established a ranch in Mitchell County using the "JD" brand, only the third registered in that county. Winfield Scott, Bud Forsythe, the Roberson brothers and J. Taylor Barr followed Mann. He soon expanded his operation into Borden County when he purchased 11 additional herds. The "24" brand and cattle were subsequently sold to Boley Brown and Pete Scoggins in 1879. The "JD" herd and brand was sold the same year to J.W. Wilson.

Stock raisers in Texas used a separate brand for each county in addition to the ranchers' brands. There was a recognized brand for each county. These were intended to prevent cattle rustling but the brands were also helpful in retrieving cattle that had drifted out of the county. "80" was the Brown County symbol. When that system was discontinued in 1881, Mann took the "80" brand to use as his personal brand and registered it in Brown, Coleman, Nolan, Borden, Kent and Mitchell counties. The brand was used on all of Mann's horses and

cattle, including race horses. This was a big brand on the cattle. It was described by "80 John" as spanning the left side of a cow from backbone to belly.

Mann's personal herd holdings were extensive. He owned 10,000 to 12,000 cattle at any time, but his business as a buyer and seller of livestock was not easily surpassed in cattle numbers. In 1883, he grazed 14,000 cattle with the "80" brand. He was also in partnership with other ranches involving thousands of cattle. He co-owned one herd with Kin Elkins and partnered with John Good on another. By 1884, Mann registered 15 brands with the Stock Raisers' Association of North-West Texas. The railroad reached Colorado City, Texas, in 1881. Mann moved his ranch headquarters there. T&P Railroad records show that between 1882 and 1887, Mann paid more than \$900,000 as the cost of shipping cattle. He sent trail drives out to Powder Rivera, Ogallala, Abilene, Caldwell, Coffeyville, and Dodge City. His herds were some of the first to use a new trail that connected Chisholm and Western trails.

Mann leased 137 sections of land in Kent and Garza counties in a partnership with Jim Jackson and Cal Sloan that involved several thousand cattle. The land was eventually turned over to Mann to manage by the partners. A few years later, in 1886, the three cattlemen sold the Espuela Land & Cattle Company 2,000 steers with 1,500 scheduled for delivery by August. The remainder was to be delivered on the first of October that same year.

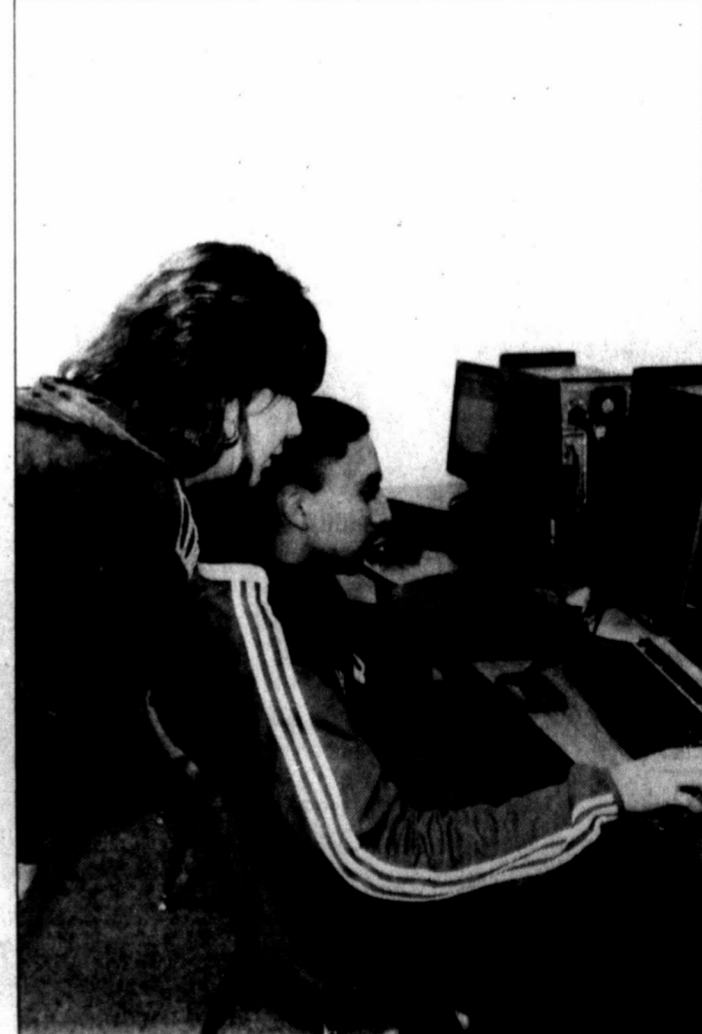
During his travels, Mann became friends with George Hearst, father of William Randolph Hearst, who convinced him to expand his ranches into Wyoming, New Mexico and Chihuahua, Mexico. Mann found good grazing land in Mexico was cheap. He took advantage of an arrangement with President Porfirio Diaz to purchase grazing land near Hearst's 900,000 acre Babicora Ranch and purchased 250,000 acres in Chihuahua. He sent 12 men, including "80 John" to set up the operation. Two men were killed in attacks by Indians within five months. Mann ordered the men to drive the cattle back to the United States. He sold 50,000 acres to Hearst and the other 200,000 acres were confiscated by the Mexican government.

The Mann ranch-hands had several confrontations with Comanche raiding parties. Usually it was a fight to prevent the ranch horses from being stolen. On one occasion, Mann's brother, William, was wounded. At another time cowboys from the Mann Ranch trailed a Comanche band who stole saddle horses from the ranch. After following them to the reservation at Fort Sill, the horses were recovered and driven back. A stud named Bill Fleming owned by Mann was stolen during a raid but returned on his own to the ranch a few months after. Bill Fleming was sired by Steel Dust and rumor was he could run a quarter-mile in 22 seconds. Mann raised Morgans, thoroughbreds and quarter-horses to use on the ranch or to sell to other outfits. Mann was also one of the founding directors for the Colorado National Bank in Colorado (City), Texas. It merged with City National Bank in 1931.

Clay Mann died on July 21, 1899 in Denver. Mary Mann sold off most of the cattle herds and other ranches but kept the ranch east of Colorado (City). Their sons, Charles and George, were 13 and 11, too young to take charge of any cattle operations. "80 John" Wallace, who was still working for the Mann ranch, took over the management responsibilities until the sons were old enough.

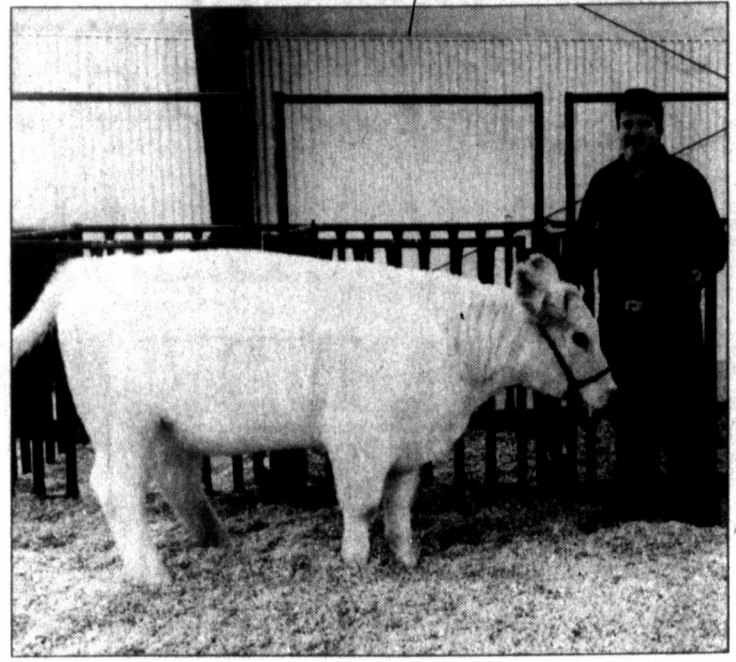

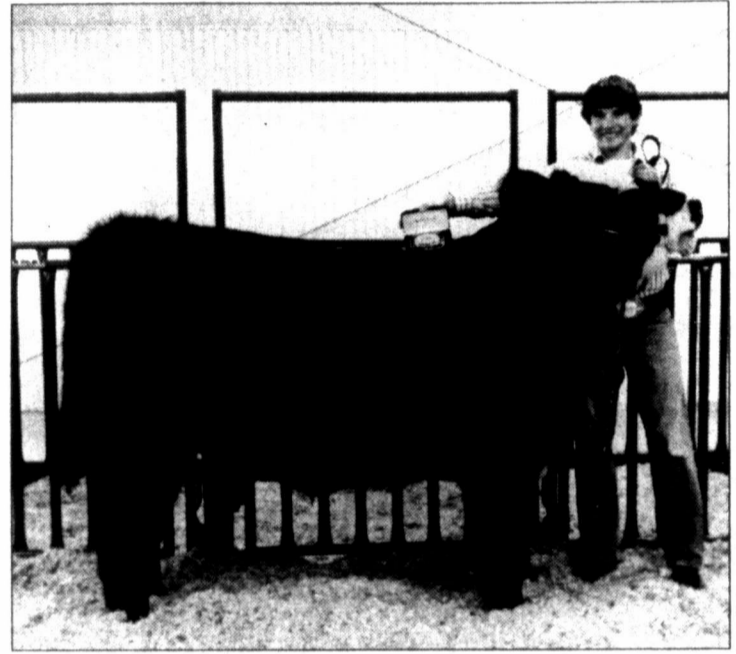
