## ASCS Sign Up To Begin Thursday

Producers wishing to participate in the 1979 Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service programs may sign up beginning Thursday.

Sign up period will continue until April 30, according to Don Stewart, ASCS executive director.

Provisions for the 1979 program will be explained at a county wide meeting scheduled Feb. 22 at 1 p.m. at the C. C. Thompson Room of City National Bank.

A representative will be present at the county meeting to explain the Small Business Administration program.

Deadline for filing requests for SBA loans is March 6. Interested persons may contact Dino Theocoran or Jim Brannen at the SBA district office, Suite 2211, Post Office building in Abilene.

The street address is 300 South Pine and the phone number is 915-677-8537.

Sign up for costshare will begin tomorrow (Monday). The county committee will approve requests according to conservation problems.

For the 1979 cotton program, no set aside is required. Disaster coverage is the planted acres times the yield, times 75 per cent. Payment rate is 19.2c, which is one-third of the target price of 57.5c.

Regarding the 1979 feed grain program, set aside is required to comply with barley, corn, and grain sorghum and cotton require 10 per cent of the plant acres and barley is 20 per cent.

For the wheat program, 20 per cent set

aside of the 1979 wheat acreage is required.

Regarding the Live-stock Feed Program, Stewart noted that he has received notice that producers may not count any losses for small grain due to ice, snow and cold weather. Thus, Stewart said that this will cut down on the amount of feed producers may buy and the costshare they may earn.

was in favor of seeing exactly what the council has to work with as far as money is concerned.

"We may have to cut out some services and cut back personnel," said Dockrey.

He noted that the council had "kicked around" the idea of curtailing personnel and a review of unnecessary expenditures was being made. Furnishing lights at the baseball fields and tennis courts was one expenditure the city could cut, Dockrey said.

He noted that the city was on an "economy move" and that spending would have to be stopped now—"the sooner the better."

Councilmember Jesse Munoz said he was concerned that the city be in the black before the end of the fiscal year, which is April 30, noting that it was the responsibility of the council to see that this happens.

"I'm pretty confident that we'll be able to do this at the rate we're going now," said Munoz. "We're in a bind right now with meeting the budget and hiring a city manager."

Jody Neff, councilmember, said that the city is taking minor steps to curtail spending

and "minor steps add up to major savings."

She added, "We're real pleased with the way things have come around."

Regarding cuts in city services and personnel, Mrs. Neff said, "I don't anticipate the need for cuts yet."

Councilmember Buddy Hertenberger said that if the city can't get a manager soon, the council "must do something" in regard to the deficit.

Munoz noted that the council seemed to be making progress as far as hiring a manager is concerned, noting that the quality of the applicants is apparently high.

"Hopefully, we will have someone to help us to prepare the budget for next year," Munoz said.

While the council continues the search for a city manager, Brenda Tarter, former city secretary, is serving as acting manager.

Munoz said that Mrs. Tarter was doing a "commendable job as manager and she's really been a big help."

The city's finances and the calling of a city election for April 7 will be the main items on the agenda of the monthly

meeting of the council of Colorado City Tuesday night.

Mrs. Tarter will present the city's financial statement as of Jan. 30 which show the following.

During January the city's general fund had receipts of \$82,980.88 and expenditures of \$61,974.47 giving the fund a minus figure of \$13,129.05. This compares with a minus figure of \$36,112.53 on Dec. 31 and \$75,706.42 on Nov. 30.

Thus far during this fiscal year which began on May 1, 1978, there have been revenues of \$470,097.18 in the general fund as compared with expenditures of \$536,748.24.

Mrs. Tarter will make a presentation and review of the preliminary budget for the city for 1979-80 and to go along with this there will also be an agenda item on which the council will consider ways to further reduce the city budget.

When asked about this item, Mrs. Tarter declined to give any specific plans but said it probably would affect all departments.

In other matters the council will call for an election on April 7 which will affect the four coun-

cilmembers whose terms are expiring, Mrs. Neff, Dockrey, Hertenberger and Rick Perkin.

Friday afternoon the Record contacted the four councilmembers to ask their plans about running for another term.

Dockrey stated that he intended to run for another term. Mrs. Neff said that she was undecided. Hertenberger said that he didn't intend to try for another term and Rick Perkin

was out of town and was unavailable for comment.

There will be an amendment considered which will protect firemen from lawsuits when they arrive on the scene of a fire before the alarm has been sounded.

Finally the council will open and award bids for the enlarging of the sanitary landfill ditch and will discuss needed repairs on the roof of the museum.

## An Editorial

### Immediate Cuts Needed By City

Our city, as most people here know, is in a financial bind.

When deficit spending of \$100,000 was brought to the city council's attention on Dec. 1, efforts were made to stop spending.

However, while those measures did serve as a stop gap measure, they have not been nearly enough to solve the problem. As of the end of January, the city is still some \$15,000 in the red with most of the tax money already in. It has been estimated that only about \$100,000 will be brought in by the city during the next three months until the end of the city's fiscal year April 30.

From that point until Oct. 1 when more tax money will start to come in, the city will have only a minimal amount of income so something must be done to reduce spending from about \$40,000 and more a month to a maximum of \$25,000 a month or less if possible.

When asked about cutting expenditures weeks ago, several councilmen told the Record they didn't want to do anything drastic until a new city manager could be hired and then let him take care of the situation. They said their belief is that if the council did something, it would not be the method desired by a new city manager.

However, a new city manager has not yet been hired despite the best efforts of the council. A number of people have asked as I have, can we afford to hire a city manager now? Several councilmembers have said we can't afford not to hire a new manager.

In my view, if a manager can be hired within the next few weeks, it will be another two weeks or so before he could start work and then it would be too late for him to have any input into the new city budget which must be approved during the council's first meeting in April, according to the city charter.

There doesn't seem to be enough money available now to hire a manager. One of the main interests by the council in hiring a new manager is for application for federal grants. However, most of these require money from the city, money which the city just doesn't have now.

Why not wait until October or thereabouts to hire a manager and let Mrs. Tarter continue on as acting manager until then? She, it appears, is doing a good job and has already had to tackle the job of preparing the budget for the coming year.

Mrs. Tarter plans to go to the council Tuesday night with a number of plans to reduce city spending, among those being cutting out social spending such as paying light bills at the ball parks in the city and financing a number of other programs, as well as cutting some city services and reducing the number of city employees. One city service affected would be to pick up trash once a week rather than twice weekly.

This is a drastic plan but drastic measures are needed to deal with a drastic situation. This plan needs to be put into effect as soon as possible rather than waiting until the new fiscal year begins May 1.

There has been much conversation about the city's finances and what I've heard indicates that people believe that immediate cuts are needed in city spending. There are no words to express the bad situation due to the unfortunate loss of jobs because of the city's financial loss. However, when a city or business is in a financial bind and the biggest expense is labor, that's where the cuts must be made.

Plus, the city's situation will have to result in few if any pay raises during the next year. This is especially regrettable in view of inflation but again, it is a fact of life and must be faced.

The city is faced with having to exist and pull back to minimum situations with all workers having to do more than their share if the city is to get out of the predicament it is in now.

To do otherwise only compounds the problem.

## Council Considers Another Prospect

The City Council of Colorado City resumed their city manager search Thursday night with the interviewing of Joe C. Benton of Sweetwater.

Benton, 36, is presently director of utilities of Sweetwater and has had this position since August 1978.

Previous to that he served for two years as city manager of the City of Henrietta, Texas.

Benton stated that during this time at Henrietta he was involved in the applying and receiving for that city including a \$4,000 grant for a plan for land use and housing study, a \$6,000 grant for a plan for a utility study, a \$4,000 grant to install new traffic control signs and a \$12,500 grant from

the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife to build new tennis courts.

He said that in Henrietta he was also responsible for the installation of number of new programs including a new purchase order system which resulted in a yearly savings to the city of over \$15,000 and a city planning and zoning ordinance.

Benton stated that he was the first city manager Henrietta had ever had and that the main reason he left was that the city council had had a turnover and had informed him that they felt that all the problems which they had had were solved and that they could do without a city manager again.

He went on to state that the reason he was looking for another job after only a few months in Sweetwater was that when he had gone there he had had the understanding that he would be promoted to the city manager's position in January upon the retirement of the present city manager. This had fallen through, however, when the present city manager didn't retire.

Benton said that at present he was making \$1,333 per month at Sweetwater. When asked what his salary requirements would be he simply stated that he would let the council name a figure and he would then decide if that would be sufficient.

American's are the most fortunate of all the world's people. Also, they are possibly the least appreciative of their status.

Just for purposes of comparison let's assume a hypothetical situation.

If...all the world were reduced to a town of 1,000 people, in this town

would be 60 Americans. The remainder of the world would be represented by the 940 other persons.

The...60 Americans would have half the income of the entire town. The 940 others would share the remainder of the town's income.

Three...hundred and thirty people in the town would be classified as Christians. Six hundred and seventy would not.

At...least 80 towns-people would be practicing Communists. That's more than our whole nation. Seventy others would be under Communist domination.

White...people would total 303, while non-white would be nearly 700.

The...60 Americans would have a life expectancy of 70 years. The 940 others could expect to live not more than 40 years.

The...60 Americans would have 15 times as many possessions as the average of all the rest of the people in the village.

The...60 Americans would produce 16 per cent of the total town's food supply. Although they eat 62 per cent above the maximum daily food requirement, they would either eat most of what they grew, or store it for the future at enormous cost.

Since...most of the 940 non-Americans would be hungry most of the time it could lead to

some ill feelings toward the 60 Americans, who would appear to be enormously rich and fed to the point of sheer disbelief by a great majority of the other towns-folk.

Of...the 940 non-Americans, 300 would have malaria, 85 would have schistosomiasis, 3 would have leprosy, 45 will die this year from malaria, cholera, typhus and other infectious diseases. One hundred and fifty-six will die from starvation and malnutrition. None of the 60 Americans will ever get these diseases and will probably never worry about them.

The...60 Americans would spend one hundred eighty seven dollars a year on liquor and tobacco, but less than one hundred dollars for the drugs needed for the

finest medical care in the world and they would be loudly proclaiming that medicine costs too much. We're a very interesting people.

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# Census Bureau To Hire Locally

The U.S. Census Bureau has a number of temporary jobs open during the next few weeks in Mitchell County to help prepare address lists for use during the 1980 census.

Temporary census workers usually will work three to four weeks each and will be paid on a per-address collected basis. For an eight-hour day, the average worker will earn \$27 to \$30 per day plus 17c-per-mile for any driving done in a private vehicle.

Applicants for the jobs must be 18 years old or over, a U.S. citizen, and pass a written test.

The work involves driving or walking to compile lists of addresses of each dwelling unit in designated areas of the county.

These address lists will play a vital role in taking the 1980 census.

They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionnaires to be sent to each household in America on March 28, 1980. Then, a few weeks following the April 1 Census Day, census officials will use the address lists to determine which households have not returned their completed questionnaires.

Census takers must then be sent to each non-responding household to collect the information required on the census form.

The 1979 address collection activity in the county is part of a Census Bureau program involving 35,000 temporary workers nationwide to compile lists containing approximately 30 million addresses. Another 50 million addresses have been purchased from commercial mailing list companies.

## Sweetwater Association Loans Funds

Recent figures show that Sweetwater Production Credit Association loaned more than \$64.6 million for agricultural production in 1978.

According to F. C. Shillingburg, Sweetwater PCA president, the association is one of 30 Texas PCAs which collectively provided more than \$1.5 billion in short and intermediate term credit to Texas farmers and ranchers in 1978.

In noting the current inflationary pressures, Shillingburg said, "Although all types of production costs continue to rise and are going to increase more and more, we are confident that adequate credit for agricultural production will be available in 1979."

However, he noted, "money costs, coupled with inflation, may make the price higher."

Sweetwater PCA provides loan funds to Texas farmers and ranchers in Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Ector, Fisher, Glasscock, Howard, Kent, Loving, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Winkler counties.

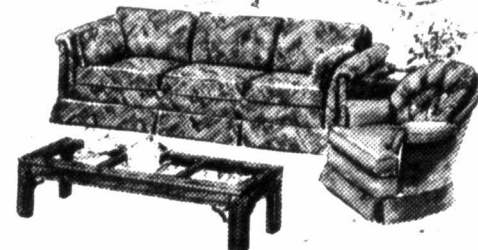

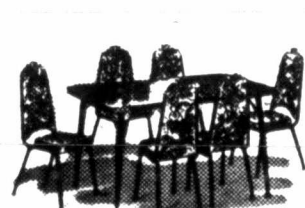

## Loraine School Board Sets Trustee Election

The Loraine School Board set the dates for the trustee election April 7 from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. C. L. (Ted) LeFevre will serve as election judge. Eugene Smith and George Mar-

tin's terms expire this year. Absentee voting will begin March 19 through April 3, from 8 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. with Joe Pharris serving as election judge.

In other business the school board approved a contract for a tax accounting service with the Education Service Center in Abilene. Cost for this service will be 27c per statement for

the first year and 25c per statement thereafter. Because of the increase paper load required by the School Tax Assessment Practice Board on truth and taxation legislation this

will save expense and time. Beginning next school year, Loraine schools will have only three bus routes. There are four at the present time with one route only having a few students riding, according to Superintendent L. R. Dunn. Eliminating one route will save on time and expense.

Also discussed was the updated report and re-evaluation from STAP Board for the Loraine district. There were six categories that had an adjusted ratio. Two were adjusted favorably one being on land from 33 per cent up to 36 per cent. Four were decreased on percentage.

During executive session the board accepted the resignation of Assistant Coach Caddo Matthews which was effective Jan. 26 and Coach Ken Lightfoot effective at the end of the school term this year. The band director's contract was tabled until next month's meeting. Also acted upon during the executive session was the lunchroom hourly salary rates. A 10c per hour rate was approved and will begin in March. The lunchroom supervisor will receive \$3.35 per hour and other workers will receive \$2.95 with the new raise.

High School Principal Joe Pharris and Elementary Principal Mike Hartman were extended contracts for next year.

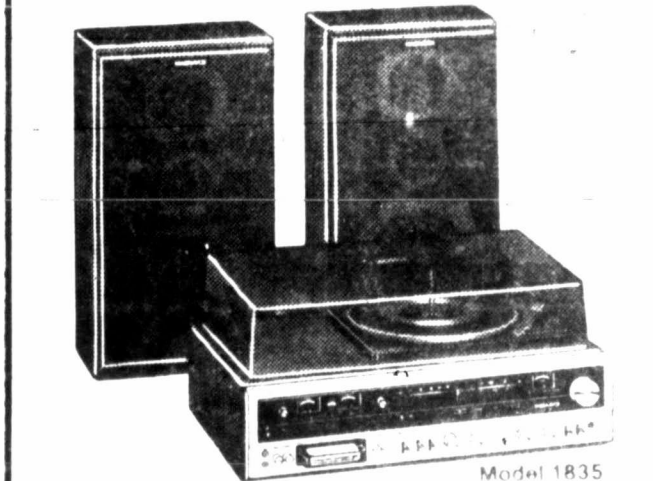

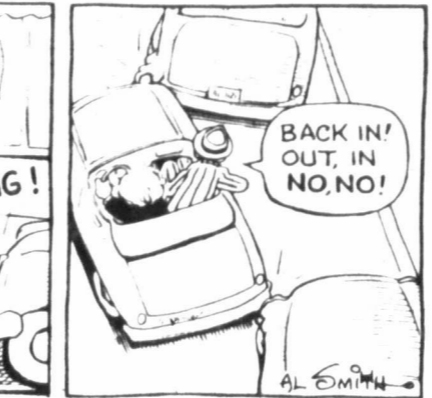
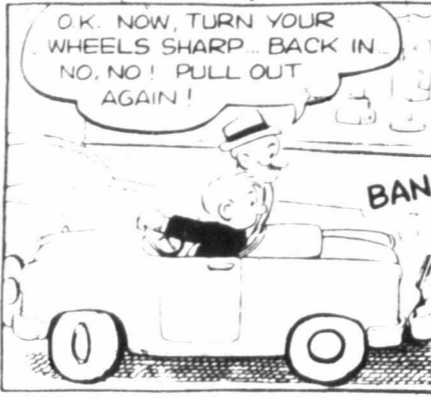

# Blood Pressure Screening Clinic To Be At Wallace Center Tuesday

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 4 Nursing staff will hold a blood pressure screening clinic at the Wallace Center on the Robert Lee Highway, Tuesday. Clinic hours are from 10 a.m. to noon.

About one in ten of all adults in the world has high blood pressure or hypertension, as it is known medically. In the United States alone, it is a major contributing factor in an estimated 250,000 deaths and many more than 1,500,000 heart attacks and strokes that occur each year. Yet, once detected, this disease can usually be effectively controlled.

High blood pressure is especially a serious pro-

blem for Black people. At present, it is a major disease suffered by this country's Black population, as well as the most important factor in their shorter life expectancy.

You can have it and not know it! Millions of people who have high blood pressure do not know they do. You can feel healthy, look terrific, and have it, because it hits relaxed people and tense people, and often there are no symptoms.

Treatment reduces the danger—in most people, high blood pressure can be lowered and kept under control with continuing treatment. This greatly reduces the risk of serious complications.

If further follow-up screening is needed, the individual will be referred to his private physician.

The public is invited to attend and there will be no charge for these services.

## Beauty Tips

**By JANIE FARDA**  
The spinal column consists of 33 interlocking vertebrae. The first 24 are separated by shock absorbers called disks, all supported by ligaments and muscles. The spine is vulnerable to bad posture, the wrong size and wrong heights of furniture, any unaccustomed movement, too much of the wrong kind of exercise or not enough if any and even persistent emotional problems.

As we grow older some of the gel surrounding the vertebrae may lose its water content causing sciatica. Treatment is usually long physical therapy. Most causes of backache are, overtaxing the spine, and abuse such as slumping. Rarely are backaches the result of structural abnormalities and some are even tension related. In fact some 80 per cent of simple backache is caused by anxiety and tension. This is of course opinion and not verified scientifically, therefore making it mostly theory.

Generally hard working, very responsible, conscientious personality types are susceptible to anxiety which will manifest itself in lower backache.

The best treatment to backache of any type is prevention. Some guidelines to follow are:  
Watch your posture; avoid lifting heavy objects; don't bend from the waist but flex knees when lifting from the floor; equalize the load you're carrying; choose moderate heeled shoes for everyday; choose a straight chair when sitting for any length of time; sleep on a firm mattress preferably on side with knees drawn; choose a sport you are in shape for and then as you condition your back, advance.  
To prevent backache use a regular regimen of exercises to strengthen the muscles supporting the spine.

## 1978 Ag Census Due Thursday

Farmers and ranchers are reminded that the deadline for return of the 1978 Census of Agriculture report forms is Thursday (Feb. 15).

A large proportion of those who received forms nationwide already have mailed them back in postage paid envelopes, according to the Bureau of the Cen-

sus, U.S. Department of Commerce, which is conducting the census. Those who have not done so are urged to return the forms by the deadline.

Bureau officials say they cannot extend the due dates for filing the forms except in individual cases where undue burden is involved, but they note that best estimates will be acceptable from operators lacking records.

Assistance also may be obtained from county officials who are prepared to answer questions which may arise regarding the form. These include agricultural agents, executive directors of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, supervisors in USDA's Soil Conservation Service and vocational agricultural instructors.

The Census Bureau is mailing follow-up letters asking prompt return of the forms, noting that cooperation is required by law, delay sharply increases the costs, but, more important, a true picture of the nation's agricultural industry cannot be achieved until the forms are in.

Tabulation of results for a state cannot start until virtually all the forms have been returned. Data for each of more than 3,000 counties will be published on a schedule calling for early release of county statistics beginning in October and continuing through March 1980, followed by publication of state and national data within the next two years.

A "Were You Counted?" publicity campaign has been launched by the Bureau in an effort to locate any farmer or rancher who may have been inadvertently missed in the census. Those who failed to receive a form may call (812) 335-1271 or write WYC, Bureau of the Census, Agriculture Division, 1201 East 10th Street, Jeffersonville, Indiana 47132, and a form will be forwarded.

# Loraine Mayor Seeks Another Term In Office

Vance Dickenson, mayor of Loraine for the past 10 years, announced plans to seek another term in office at Thursday's meeting of the Loraine City Council.

Evert Henderson, councilmember for six years, and Mike Stutts, appointed last year to complete the unexpired term of Mrs. Faye Hamilton, also filed applications to run for another term.

Also up for election is the council seat of C. H. Hamilton, who has been in office six years. Hamilton did not announce whether or not he would

seek another term as councilmember.

Applications for the position of mayor and the three council slots are available at city hall. Deadline for filing is March 7 and the drawing to determine the position of names on the ballot will be March 9.

Election judge for the April 7 contest will be Christene Britton. Alternate judge is Betty Hackfeld.

Absentee voting will be from March 19 to April 5.

In other business, the council evaluated Loraine Police Chief Robert Erwin.

Erwin has been employed by the city for six months.

Mrs. Doris Henderson noted that she had heard many compliments about Erwin and that he seemed to be doing his job well.

Councilmember Mike Stutts said that Erwin was dependable and worked well with the Colorado City police, Mitchell County Sheriff's department and the Texas Highway Patrol.

By unanimous approval, the council voted to raise Erwin's salary from \$875 per month to \$900 per month.

City Secretary Brenda Lee informed the council that a health inspector from Abilene had reviewed the water system in Loraine.

Mrs. Lee said that the inspector noted that the area surrounding the pump house had to be cleaned up, getting rid

of the debris and weeds.

In addition, the inspector said that Loraine must have two people certified in water in Loraine. D. C. Fowler is water superintendent but an additional person is required.

The council decided to send Mrs. Lee to school to receive certification in water. That way, the city will not have to hire an additional person to work as assistant water superintendent.

A Fair Housing Ordinance was adopted by the council in order to make Loraine eligible for grants, particularly in community development.

A public meeting was set for 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Loraine Agriculture building to discuss the community development grant.

Also adopted by the council at Thursday's meeting was a mobile home ordinance. The or-

dinance states that permits will be required, costing \$2 each.

Contained in the mobile home ordinance is information about the permit, water supply, sewage disposal, placement of the mobile home, taxation and penalties.

Mrs. Lee told the council that Loraine has had problems with water meter boxes being vandalized and the cost to repair or replace them ranges from \$28-\$48.

An ordinance was passed by the council in 1955 stating that there would be a \$50 fine for tampering with the water meters. After some discussion, the council decided to begin enforcing the ordinance.

In final business, an industrial committee was formed at the council meeting with Henderson and Stutts serving as representatives.

Mitchell County Commissioners will meet Monday at 1 p.m. in a regular session to discuss, among other items, the Lo-Vaca Gathering Company's 1978 tax payment.

Selection of a county depository will be made and a request by the district attorney for financial assistance for the assistant DA will be considered.
