
She has been an active member of the First Methodist Church, serving as a Sunday School teacher and officer and member of various study groups, the United Methodist Women and various circles.

The Texas Veterans Land Program is a government program that really works to help Texas Veterans, yet does so without costing the taxpayers a single penny.

Part of the reason for this is the fiscally conservative way we run the Texas Veterans programs. This cautious funding approach to the Texas Veterans programs has built a tough but fair policy toward delinquencies.

Forfeitures are unfortunate and the Texas Veterans Land Board bends over backwards to avoid forfeiting a tract. But, at the same time, these defaults can't be ignored because it would cost another Texas Veteran an opportunity to participate in this fine program.

It is a credit to all Texas Veterans that so few forfeitures take place. Since the program began in 1949, more than 94,000 Texas Veterans have received long-term, low-interest loans through the program. Yet fewer than one percent of the loans have become delinquent.

On August 17, a number of forfeited tracts will be offered in 105 counties across the state, ranging in size from 9 acres in Colorado County to a 57-acre tract in Lamb County.

All tracts are available for bid by eligible Texas Veterans and many of the tracts are available for bid by non-veterans with financing available from the Texas Veterans Land Board.

Last February, we held such a sale and 24 tracts were sold in a sealed bid sale for a total of \$467,224.

In most cases, these sales make money for the program. That's because when we sell a forfeited Veteran's tract, appreciation on the land will return to the program more than is invested. For example, most tracts are 10 or more acres and purchased for a total loan amount of \$20,000. The highest bid received at the February sale was \$34,122 for a 17-acre tract in Grayson County.

This returns to the Texas Veterans Land Program increased value for the original investment, helping keep costs down for Texas Veterans seeking loans in the future as well as building the loan fund up so we can lend even more Veterans money for land. And, it maintains the cost-effective nature of this popular program.

The August sale will be by sealed bid only with minimum bids set by the Texas Veterans Land Board. Bids can be submitted up until the morning of the sale, with Texas Veterans Land Board financing of up to 95 percent available. For information, call 1-800-252-VETS.

This fiscally conservative approach to managing the Texas Veterans programs is one reason why they're considered the best in the U.S.A.

NEWS For Small Businesses

Why Do Small Businesses Fail?

Money is the root of most small business failures according to a national survey of small business leaders.

Firms with fewer than 20 employees provide 90.6 percent of all new jobs created by new companies. But 62.6 percent of these same firms fail within their first four years.

To find out why so many small businesses fail, Minolta Corporation's Business Equipment Division sponsored a Gallup poll of over 1200 owners and top managers of manufacturing and service firms with fewer than 500 employees. The survey found that 48 percent of the firms with 20-499 employees cited "lack of capital" as the reason why small businesses fail.

Personal assets were the principal source of capital used to start the majority of existing businesses. Bank loans were the second most common key source. Health care practices, which typically require an investment in costly medical equipment are an exception to this rule. A majority (56 percent) of founders of health care practices say a loan was the primary source of capital.

"This dependence on personal assets may explain the high failure rate for small businesses."

Other reasons for failure included lack of business knowledge (23 percent), poor management (19 percent), inadequate planning and inexperience (15 percent each).

Nowadays, people don't talk - unless you count all the drabble that comes out at finger-food gatherings. Eventually, one feels compelled to write messages on flat surfaces. Rocks on the sides of mountains are popular. So are the bumpers of cars - and both sides of t-shirts.

Some people really get into this stuff. They'll tell you what their religious affiliation is, whether or not they have any more car payments, how close they want you to follow, how many grandbabies they have, their political affiliation, whether or not they take riders, whether they have loose or tight morals...you name it.

Until recently though, nobody had thought about sun shades for cars. Putting newspapers in the windshield to keep the sun out, took forever, and the stuff was too flimsy, anyway. Towels were also tacky, so most people just let the sun shine in, cracking the vinyl on the dash - not to mention the upholstery.

After almost 100 years of thinking about it, somebody finally came up with the idea of putting cardboard in the dash. All you do is cut it to window size and make it easy to fold and unfold.

To make sure people get their money's worth, you include a car trouble message on the back instructing passers-by to call the police.

That's another sign of the times. In the old days somebody would have stopped and fixed your car for you. Now they call the police.

Otherwise, you've got plenty of messages to choose from - just in case you can't think of something clever, meaningful, or at least suggestive, to say on your own.

There's no limit to the possibilities, of course. In time, halfbacks will make 90-yard-runs across the glass. Politicians will remind us to vote for America, religious zealots will plead with us to bring back Jim and Tammy. A cartoon likeness of Charleton Heston holding the Ten Commandments next to your radio aerial can't be that far away, either.

And don't think you're going to get away without the apocalyptic scenes, either. The end is near. That kind of stuff.

And if all of those things are on the way, there is no reason to doubt that the advertising industry will get in on this stuff before long, too. McDonald's shades, Budweiser and California Coolers, etc. Their comes the porno stuff, followed by the picking of your car for indecency, the windshield shield-burnings, and on and on.

The social significance of a flat surface can be mind boggling, you know?

TIPS... From the City of Colorado City

The TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH has issued the following requirement of the Solid Waste Landfill - Permit No. 420 for the City of Colorado City: "Where the site operator does not make effort to assure that vehicles hauling waste to his site are enclosed or provided with a tarpaulin, net, or other means to properly secure the load to prevent the escape of any part of the load by blowing or spilling by taking actions such as posting signs, reporting offenders to proper law enforcement officers, adding surcharges, or similar measures, the operator shall be responsible for the increased cleanup of waste materials spilled along and within the right-of-way of all public access roads serving the site. Waste materials spilled along and within the right-of-way of all public access roads serving the site must be collected and properly disposed of."
