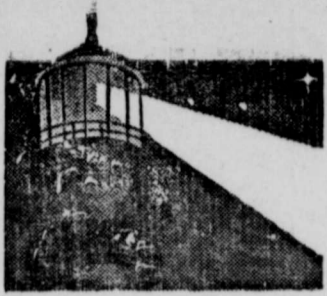

Cotton Quota Election Dec. 14

The election for the 1955 cotton marketing quota will be held on Tuesday, December 14, with voting places in Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook.

If more than two thirds voting favor quotas, loan value on cotton will be 82 1/2 to 90% parity.

If more than one-third vote against quotas, allotments will be in effect and the loan value will be 50% of parity.

Drought Emergency Feed Available Here

Mitchell County has been approved for drought emergency feed for livestock, cattle, sheep and goats.

Feed grains and hay are the feeds on which assistance is offered. Cotton seed products, cake, meal, etc., are not included in the assistance program.

Applications for feed are taken at the Farmer's Home Administration office upstairs in the Max Berman building, across the hall from the county ASC office.

If applications are approved by the FHA county committee, certificates will be issued by the FHA for hay and the ASC will issue Purchase Orders for the grain in the amount of one dollar per hundred pounds of grain.

The Purchase Orders and Certificates are to be used in the regular trade channels for feed.

Mrs. T. R. Bennett and Mrs. C. Thompson left Sunday for Washington, D. C., to visit Congressman and Mrs. George Mahon.

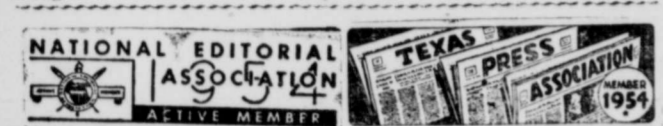

Veterans' News

Questions and Answers

Q. I have a nephew who is a World War 2 veteran drawing a VA pension because he is paralyzed from the waist down for reasons not connected with his service. He gets an extra amount because he needs regular aid and attention. He has just been admitted to a VA hospital for treatment. Will his extra allowance continue, or will it be cut off?

A. It will continue while he is hospitalized. In many instances, the extra allowance stops when a veteran enters a VA hospital. But it generally is continued for paralyzed veterans and those who lost their sight.

Q. Would it be possible for me to take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill on a part-time basis?

A. No. The law requires that on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill must be on a full-time basis.

Q. My daughter has been receiving VA compensation payments based on the death of my husband, a World War 1 veteran. She reached her eighteenth birthday during the summer vacation

between school terms. Will she be eligible for payments for the time between her birthday and the time she resumes school?

A. Yes. Payments may be authorized for the period between your daughter's birthday and her re-entry into school.

Q. I am the widow of a World War 2 veteran, and I have never remarried. I also am a World War 2 veteran myself. Would I be eligible for two GI loans—one on the basis of being an un-

remarried widow, and the other based on my own eligibility?

A. No. You would be eligible for only one GI loan—based on your own eligibility as a veteran.
