Bond Issue Election Called For New Jail Structure

County Dads Take Action Following Jail Inspections

Proposed Building To Cost \$250,000 For Both County Prison, Criminal Courts Quarters Here

Realize Necessity

Question To Be Settled By Voters April 26; Plans Made For Relief; Order For Election Unanimous

A BOND issue election totalling \$250,000 for a new criminal courts building and jail was ordered yesterday afternoon by the Lubbock county commissioners' court, to be held on April 26, according to announcement following a regular session of that body yesterday.

After an inspection of the jail building shortly after noon the commissioners discussed the matter briefly and voted unanimously to order the election.

Necessity Realized. "We fully realize the necessity of some immediate action," said Judge Robert H. Bean, "and some relief must come for the jail in the near future. The matter is being placed squarely up to the voters of the county in this election and the question will be for or against the issuance of \$250,000 in bonds for construction of the building."

At time of visit of the commissioners to the jail yesterday morning, totalling more than 40 were crowded in the building, which originally was designed to accommodate only 27.

Action Follows Report. The action of the commissioners followed a report made by the grand jury of 12nd district court last Thursday. The jurors recommended and urged that immediate action be taken in steps toward erection of a new building to relieve the present crowded and unsanitary condition of the jail.

Members of the court say that consideration of the proposed new federal building is secondary when importance of room for county government is considered, and it has been pointed out that a new building would remove the present jail to clear the landscape for the new \$250,000 postoffice structure, contract for which will be let in December.

Three Meet Death As Plane Crashes

Biplane Owned By Wallace Berry Goes In Tailspin As Scores Of Motorists Look On From Highway

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, March 24.—Three persons were killed today in the crash of a cabin biplane owned by Wallace Berry. The motorist, who was not aboard when the ship went into a tailspin at 500 feet, landed in a field near Alhambra, Los Angeles suburb, with terrific impact and burst into flames.

The victims were George Maves, 23, pilot, his wife Mrs. Cynthia Maves, and Lynn H. Maves, 20, pilot and friend of the Maves. Maves was the personal pilot of Berry.

Taking off from Burbank airport, the trim, bi-colored, orange winged craft climbed as it flew southward over San Gabriel valley.

A spluttering motor caused it to lose altitude from two airports it was seen that the craft was in trouble over Pasadena.

Scores of motorists on the valley boulevard, one of the main highways south from Los Angeles, saw the crash crash a short distance from the highway.

Wickersham Thinks Prohibition Laws Can Be Enforced Despite 'Wide-Spread Human Appetite'

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 24.—Expressing the opinion that prohibition "can be measurably enforced, although human appetite is widespread," Chairman Wickersham of the Law Enforcement Commission has informed the senate that no one can say whether the act can be enforced or not until it has been given a trial under the justice department.

A comprehensive report of the eight months study of prohibition by Chairman Wickersham was disclosed in the publication of his recent testimony before an executive committee of the senate judiciary committee. The house bill transmits prohibition enforcement from the treasury to the justice department is before the committee.

Would Soften Terms. He advocated a softening of the terms of the Jones Act which was passed last year by congress, increasing the penalties for dry law violations.

The chairman reported "steady improvement" in dry enforcement; praised the dry administrators; decried that political influence was filling the service with inefficient and corrupt officials and ascribed the leaks from industrial alcohol as the most difficult source of liquor to control.

"I think if the attorney general has a free hand as he should have," he contended, "in reorganizing the prohibition bureau, you have as good assurance of effective conduct of the enforcement agencies as could well be had, provided his personnel is sufficiently compensated and are put on a proper basis. I think until that is done no one can say absolutely whether the law can be enforced or not."

Asks Modification. As for the Jones law, Wickersham in asking for its modification, said: "I do not think you ever can enforce laws more effectively by punishment."

Lighter-Than-Air Mail and Passenger Line Across Atlantic Is Established

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, March 24.—Charles E. Mitchell, chairman of the National City company, and Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the Graf Zeppelin, tonight announced the signing of contracts with financial and aircraft interests of the United States and Europe for the establishment of a lighter-than-air mail and passenger line across the Atlantic. The contracts were signed by the International Zeppelin company, Luftschiffbau Zeppelin (The German Zeppelin company), the Carlsberg and Carlsberg.

Excavation To Begin Soon For \$550,000 Structure Here

LUBBOCK'S building valuations were sent skyrocketing Monday with the issuance of three permits from the office of the city engineer totalling \$552,000, one of them for the proposed new Lubbock high school building.

Announcement also was made yesterday that excavation work on the structure will be started Wednesday or Thursday of this week toward forming foundation work. Yesterday's permit was issued to D. N. Leaverton, local contractor, for \$550,000. He was awarded the general contract at a meeting of the school board of the Lubbock Independent School district on March 13.

Bonds Provide Funds. Funds for the new building were provided by a bond issue for \$650,000, which was voted last year. The bonds were sold the first of this year and since that time plans have been rushed by the architects, Peters, Strange & Bradshaw.

Mr. Leaverton returned late Sunday from Dallas, where he spent several days in purchasing materials for the building, which is to be erected on a lot bordered by 18th and 19th streets and Avenue T and U.

Others Issued. The other two permits yesterday were issued as follows: \$2,000 to Sam Gentry for erection of a brick business building at 812 Texas avenue; \$200, to G. H. Watkins, for erection of a garage at 2405 Main street, Sam Morgan, contractor.

Valuations for the month of March now total \$604,725, for 24 permits, while those of the year stand at \$859,635, for 77 permits.

TO DEFEND BANNER

Stimson, MacDonald Still Hopeful Of Success

LONDON, March 24. (AP)—Despite dissension within the naval conference in the form of the Franco-Italian party dispute, and steady sniping from without by critics, Secretary Stimson and Prime Minister MacDonald defend their banner of a five-power treaty to the end.

Today they started the third month of negotiations. American and British delegations held a conference at Downing street this morning. Then MacDonald received Dino Grandi, head of the Italian delegation, at his office in the house of commons this afternoon.

White Slavery Is Alleged In Arrest

Lyons is charged with having transported 17-year-old Juanita Robertson from Altus, Oklahoma, to Plainview.

The girl is under a small bond as a witness for the government.

Revised Bill Carrying Over Thousand Amendments To Go To Conference With House For Readjustment

BY D. HAROLD OLIVER Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, March 24. (AP)—The Hawley-Smoot tariff bill was passed by the senate late today by a vote of 53 to 31 and now goes to conference with the house for adjustment of differences between the two congressional branches.

The measure, as it won the senate's final approval after an eleven-hour arraignment from half a dozen democrats and republican independents, carried 1,283 amendments to the house text approved at the other end of the capitol last May 28. It had been before the senate since Sept. 4.

Boost Farm Duties. A general revision upward of farm duties, including sugar, and scores of increases and reductions in the industrial rate groups were provided. It received the support on the final roll call of 44 republicans and 7 democrats. Twenty-six democrats and 5 republicans voted against it.

House leaders announced the bill would not be brought up in that branch for the routine procedure of sending it to conference until next Monday. This despite, they said, was to allow the 435 house members to study the completely rewritten bill. Shortly after the senate session opened, a motion by Senator Thomas, democrat, Oklahoma, to return the bill to the finance committee with restrictions to limit the revision to agricultural rates was rejected 70 to 9.

Crossing Accident Kills Texas Girl

Ranger Child Is Fatally Injured When Train And Auto Collide; Two Women Are Seriously Hurt

BANGER, March 24.—Marjorie Ruth Crabbe, 4, was killed and her mother, Mrs. Louie Crabbe, and her aunt, Mrs. Fred Williams, were seriously injured when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by an eastbound Texas & Pacific passenger train here today.

The child's body was recovered from a ditch partly filled with water 45 minutes after the accident, the impact having hurled her from the automobile about 40 feet down the right-of-way.

Mrs. Crabbe and her sister were rushed to a hospital immediately after the crash. Both lived in Banger, and their husbands were employed by a gas company.

Ag Teachers Vote To Meet Annually In Tech Conclave

Northwest Texas Conference In Lubbock Endorsed By Vocational Teachers At Judging Contests Here

TEXAS Technological college will be host to a conference of vocational agriculture teachers of Northwest Texas in June if the plans of 16 of the teachers who had teams here in the judging contests yesterday are perfected. The teachers, in a meeting held at the college, decided to inaugurate plans for the conference, approval of which must be given by the state department.

G. P. Groat, of Panhandle, and Green, presided at the session, which was a joint meeting of the North and South Plains Vocational Agricultural Teachers association. Unanimous approval for the conference here was voiced by those present in view of the fact that no state conference is to be held this year.

The conference will probably last a week and will be featured by discussion of the problems arising in the teaching work, methods of securing more efficient results and the encouragement of more vocational agricultural courses. The establishment of a vocational agricultural teaching training department in the Tech will be one of the objects of the conference also. It is planned to hold the conference annually.

It is expected that between 35 and 40 teachers will attend.

Thirty-Eight Schools From Northwest Texas Cities Represented In Agricultural Contests

NINETY-THREE teams from 38 schools, with a total registration of 375 contestants, alternates and coaches, competed in the fifth annual vocational agricultural contests held at Texas Technological college here Monday. Contestants numbered 278, as compared with the first contest held in 1926, when 25 were present. In 1927 there were 75 contestants, while 1928 registered 100 and 1929 had 198, including alternates.

Contests were in plant production, poultry, livestock, dairy cattle and farm shop. With teams from such far places as Spearman and McLean to the north, Olney and Throckmorton to the east, Sterling City to the south, Seminole to the southwest and Farwell, N. M., to the northwest, the event becomes the greatest sectional contest of its kind in the history of Texas.

McLean Wins Sweepstakes. McLean's team won the grade champion sweepstakes, with the four teams having highest averages, receiving a large banner which was made and donated by the Caprock Uniform and Embroidery company. Other prizes consisted of loving cups for winning teams in all but Farm Shop, where the district contest of a silver steel hand saw. Each high point individual in all contests received a scholarship to the Texas Tech.

New Attack on Fog Hazard Announced In Study by Massachusetts Institute

By HOWARD W. WAKESLEE, Associated Press Science Editor
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 24. — Announcement of a new kind of attack on fog at Massachusetts Institute of Technology's meteorological observatory was made today. It aims literally to learn how fog particles are put together, with the hope that this knowledge may show how to take them apart in some more effective manner than now known.

New In Field

The attack is new in the wide field over which it proposes to penetrate farther than ever before into the most minute and prosaic details of fog structure and action. Professor C. G. Roseby is in charge of the observatory.

"To the layman," says the announcement, "fog is simply fog," but the scientist has classified fog in more than a score of forms, including arctic sea smoke, tropical air fogs, India summer haze, early morning mists and ground fog common in the vicinity of great cities.

One of the studies at this new meteorological observatory, the first of its kind established by an educational institution, seeks to develop an accurate method of measuring absolute humidity. It is hoped to be able to accurately measure separately the total amount of water and vapor in the atmosphere.

The size of fog droplets will be studied to learn to what degree the size of droplets affects visibility. Another division of the research will make a study of distribution of temperature in fog and clouds at various heights. These experiments will be made with instruments attached to sounding balloons and aircraft. Determination of thickness of fog banks is one of the most important objects.

Lewis and of Francis Shunk Brown, Philadelphia, and substitution of Chief Justice Robert Von Moschizker of the state supreme court.

Police said the girl has been married to J. L. McKinley, 21, of Tulsa, sentenced to a United States reformatory last July, when convicted of counterfeiting.

Death, caused by a heart attack, overtook the once famous streak of the gridiron suddenly and unexpectedly at 2:30 p. m. today in his room at the Chicago Athletic association, where he had been bedridden for only a few days. He was 46 years old.

Eckersall had been in failing health for the past year, but not even his most intimate friends realized the end was so near. Last fall he jeopardized his health by leaving his sick bed and continuing his duties as football referee and sports writer for the Chicago Tribune, for which he also became famous. He never seemed to regain his old time spark after that.

Dunkley At Beside
Charles W. Dunkley, sports writer for the Associated Press and his close friend for 20 years, was the only one with Eckersall when he died. Dunkley came to make his daily call to learn of his condition and found him dying. He said Eckersall mumbled something about a 20-yard gain and died peacefully.

Football stars have beamed and faded, but very few gained the fame that came to Eckersall, a slip of a youth, weighing about 135 pounds. He first attracted attention while playing on the Hyde Park high school team in Chicago. For a college he decided on the University of Chicago where he combined his natural talent and speed with advice from Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg.

In his first year, 1903, he starred and in 1904, he gained a berth on Walter Camp's all-American team and became a fixture on that mythical membership, which was usually confined to the East, for the rest of his collegiate career—1905 and 1906.

Also Track Star
Football wasn't Eckersall's only athletic glory. He was a track star and many are those who still remember the day he and Will Hoge ran two dead heats in the 100-yard dash, only to have Eckersall win the next dash in .09 4-3 seconds. He played third base with Cap Anson's Cubs as soon as he left college, but the lure of journalism was greater and he forsook what might have been a great baseball career.

Eckersall went to the Chicago Tribune from baseball and became an authority on football and boxing. Each season, he officiated in most of the more important Big Ten and Notre Dame gridiron clashes.

GODFREY WHIPS CLARK

There were no knockdowns. A consensus of experts gave Campolo five rounds, Risko three, with two even.

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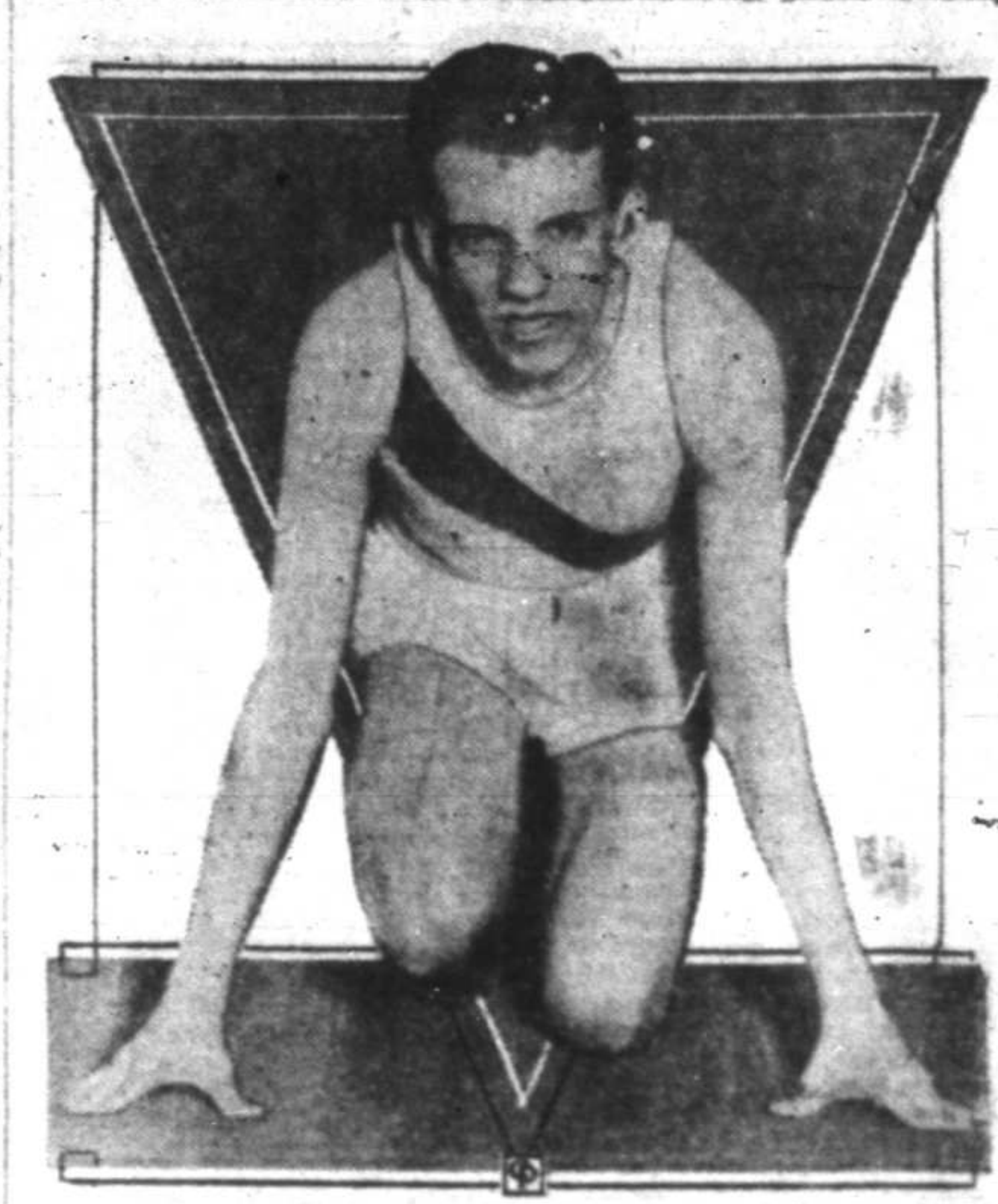
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Illinois' New Record Breaker

LUBBOCK'S MARKET WEEK

WHILE Lubbock's First Annual Market Week, set for March 25 to April 1, inclusive, was designed primarily as a feature of Hotel Lubbock's service, the idea has spread to such public favor that it is rapidly taking the outline of a community affair. With 1,000 South Plains merchants, sales people and individuals interested in advance fashions expected to view the 50 wholesale firms' displays, The Morning Avalanche expects Market Week to become, within the next few years, one of the big events of its kind in the Southwest.

For a number of years the City of Dallas has annually been host to a Market Week until the proposition has reached such importance that a year-round organization is kept busy with details and the East Texas metropolis has attained the undisputed position of "The Market Center of Texas." Lubbock's filing at a similar plan—although necessarily of lesser proportions—builds great promise of future popularity and benefit to merchants and wholesalers alike. With the number of displays already arranged assuring success of the first Market Week here, hotel Manager Sheffield deserves commendation for his progressiveness in planning the affair. It is to be hoped that local merchants and Lubbock citizens generally, lend a hand in making the occasion all that it should be.

This city is already blessed with a trade radius of generous proportions. The potentialities of the territory are manifold and are as broad as man's imagination. There is Lubbock to assume a market position for the territory and the establishing of a Market Week is the first step in that direction.

MILK SOPS RULE THE WORLD
Most fathers have a mortal fear that their sons will turn out to be milk-sops. And so the young hopeful has not advanced much beyond the cradle age before he enters upon a period of Spartan training. It is impressed upon him that he should never permit himself to be bullied or imposed upon, a principle, by the way, that many fathers would have difficulty in sustaining.

Now, there are a good many boys who take to this form of training like girls to new styles. They find it easy to handle themselves. They are natural fighters, and generally acquire a reputation for being bullies. And without exception they live to see the day when they seek a fight and get a licking. On the other hand, there are boys born with a decided indisposition toward fighting. They are subjected to no end of mental anguish and mortification in being forced to undertake a task for which they have no liking and less natural ability. Fortunately, perhaps, they are often cleverer than their sires, and can devise subtle schemes for defeating the training that is laid down for them. They discover that their brains are better protection than their brawn.

Milk-sops, though their early careers are inconspicuous, generally survive and not infrequently lead useful and distinguished lives. There is good reason to believe they rule the world. If they did not, trial by battle might still be in vogue.

WHERE JUDGE WAS WRONG

The principle of freedom of the press won an important victory when an appellate court in Ohio set aside the conviction of the editor and an editorial writer of the Cleveland Press for contempt of court because that newspaper had criticized a judge for granting an injunction restraining a sheriff from interfering with race track gambling.

The court held that the editorial was not in contempt because it did not interfere in a pending case, nor interfere with the court. The decision declared in effect that a judge is not sacrosanct. "If he can set himself above the rest of mankind and sit in judgment on grievances in which he is the injured party," said the court, "we are establishing a dangerous precedent."

It is a general and well-established rule of journalism that the decision of a court shall not be criticized unless it clearly contravenes a constitutional right. This is not through fear of contempt proceedings, but because of a conviction that the courts should be upheld in the interests of organized society. If an elected judge commits acts which shock the general sense of justice, the people can be depended on to refuse to re-elect him.

But when a judge attacks a right guaranteed by federal and state constitutions, it is the duty of a newspaper to protest, for the court is a creature of the constitution, and the constitution is superior to all courts. The decision of the Ohio court of appeal is a complete vindication of the right of a newspaper to criticize a judge under such circumstances.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

STEWART THINKS G. O. P. HEAD SHOULD BE TAKEN OUT AT ONCE TO STOP "TERRIBLE MASSACRE"

WASHINGTON, March 24.—A merciful referee, if there were any such functionary in the political ring, would stop the fight between Jouett Shouse and Claudius Huston, as a terrible massacre. Claudius, as the country knows, is chairman of the Republican national committee, and Jouett virtually is chairman of the corresponding Democratic organization, though John L. Raskob continues to hold the title. It was a shame to put those two in the ring together. Jouett has lambasted Claudius' Republicanism with everything portable. If both of Claudius' arms were amputated at the shoulders he could be no more powerless to land on Jouett's Democratic button or his solar plexus or any other place.

There is no joke about it. It just simply is brutal.

The comparison between Messrs. Shouse and Huston, as directors of their respective party committees, has nothing to do with any comparison between the parties themselves.

It is a comparison solely between Jouett and Claudius.

The fact that Jouett is having a glorious time torturing the G. O. P. elephant (because Claudius does not mean that the elephant will not be laughing his head off in due season at what is bound to befall Aunty Democracy, when her turn comes. Aunty's tortures will be internal. No Jouett Shouse can save her from them.

At present, however, Mr. Shouse is having everything his own way.

He opened up shop in Washington soon after the severe trouncing the Democrats received in November, 1928, with the announcement that he was going to do his utmost to get the enemy on the run by this year's congressional elections.

Fate played into his hands.

The Republicans' majority burst wide open in the senate. The tariff has kept them in a turmoil for more than a year. The farmers are still dissatisfied. The stock market went to pieces. Unemployment is unpleasantly rife. Prohibition took a turn for the worse. The naval conference is in bad shape. Things have gone wrong very generally for the party in power.

What the Democrats needed was a manager to keep hammering away, at every development to the administration's advantage—to hammer hard and to hammer incessantly.

Mr. Shouse proved to be the ideal man for this purpose.

He got Charley Michelson, a cracking good political writer, to handle his publicity, and, the avil chorus the Democratic committee set up was a caution. Some folk said it was being overdone at first, but it seems not. Possibly a few mistakes were made initially, but they were soon forgotten. The performance increased in popularity. Democratic politicians joined in loyalty—for they can be cohesiveness enough between elections.

For persistence and effectiveness, it really never has been equalled. Of its kind, in politics, Mr. Shouse and Assistant Michelson are entitled to enormous credit for it.

The Republican committee's obvious course was to out-clamor the Democrats.

Of course it is not so easy to clamor explanations (that is the disadvantage of being the "ins," and consequently on the defensive) as it is to clamor denunciations; nevertheless it was highly necessary. Mr. Shouse's clamor evidently was "taking" and cried out loud to be answered.

Instead Chairman Huston adopted a policy of dignified silence.

Seeing the error his rival was falling into, Mr. Shouse redoubled his efforts.

Again luck was with him.

The Washington atmosphere, at this juncture, was filled with flying political clouds hurled by members of the Democratically-chairmaned (Senator Thaddeus H. Caraway to be exact) senate lobby investigating committee, and whomever one of these clouds hit was apt to be unpleasantly smothered by it.

A Muscle Shoals clod took Mr. Huston ker-plunk in this hirt front.

That was about the end of Mr. Huston's dignity—and still he did not clamor. Plainly he does not know how to clamor. The head of a party national committee ought to know how, when it is so essential. He ought to try, anyway.

Yes, the fight should be stopped. There is no sport in anything so one-sided. Mr. Huston should be taken out, and somebody should be put in, against Mr. Shouse, who can give the spectators a run for their money.

Your Health

CLEAN MOUTH IS FIRST STEP IN FIGHT AGAINST TOOTH DECAY

Modern dentistry is concerned with much more than removing or repairing decaying teeth. At least since 1915, it has been studying the germs that occur in the mouth and their effects in producing pyorrhea, decay of the teeth, diseases of the gums and similar problems.

Recently Drs. E. F. Howitt and W. C. Fleming have studied the germs in the mouths of some of the prisoners at San Quentin, California. Determining their diets from time to time to determine the effects of carbohydrates and proteins.

As a result of these studies, the investigators report that a change in diet does not appreciably alter the amount of debris left in the mouth after eating, nor the number of germs. Streptococci of various types were found frequently. When men had diets particularly high in protein substances, they had more spirochetes forms of organisms, these also being associated at times with pyorrhea or with infections of the gums.

Apparently the germs in the mouth are more influenced by food remnants in the mouth, and by the cleanliness of the teeth, than by the reactions of the body generally. The mouths of people vary as to the amount of acid they develop and the effects of the acid on the teeth, but these factors seem of lesser importance in relation to tooth decay.

Experiments of this type are of the greatest importance in emphasizing again the necessity for mouth cleanliness in general health. Cleanliness of the mouth is best brought about by the removal of portions of food after eating and by the cleaning of the teeth with a toothbrush and water.

Apparently it hardly pays to use antiseptics around the teeth and gums for tooth cleaning, unless the food debris on which the germs grow is thoroughly removed.

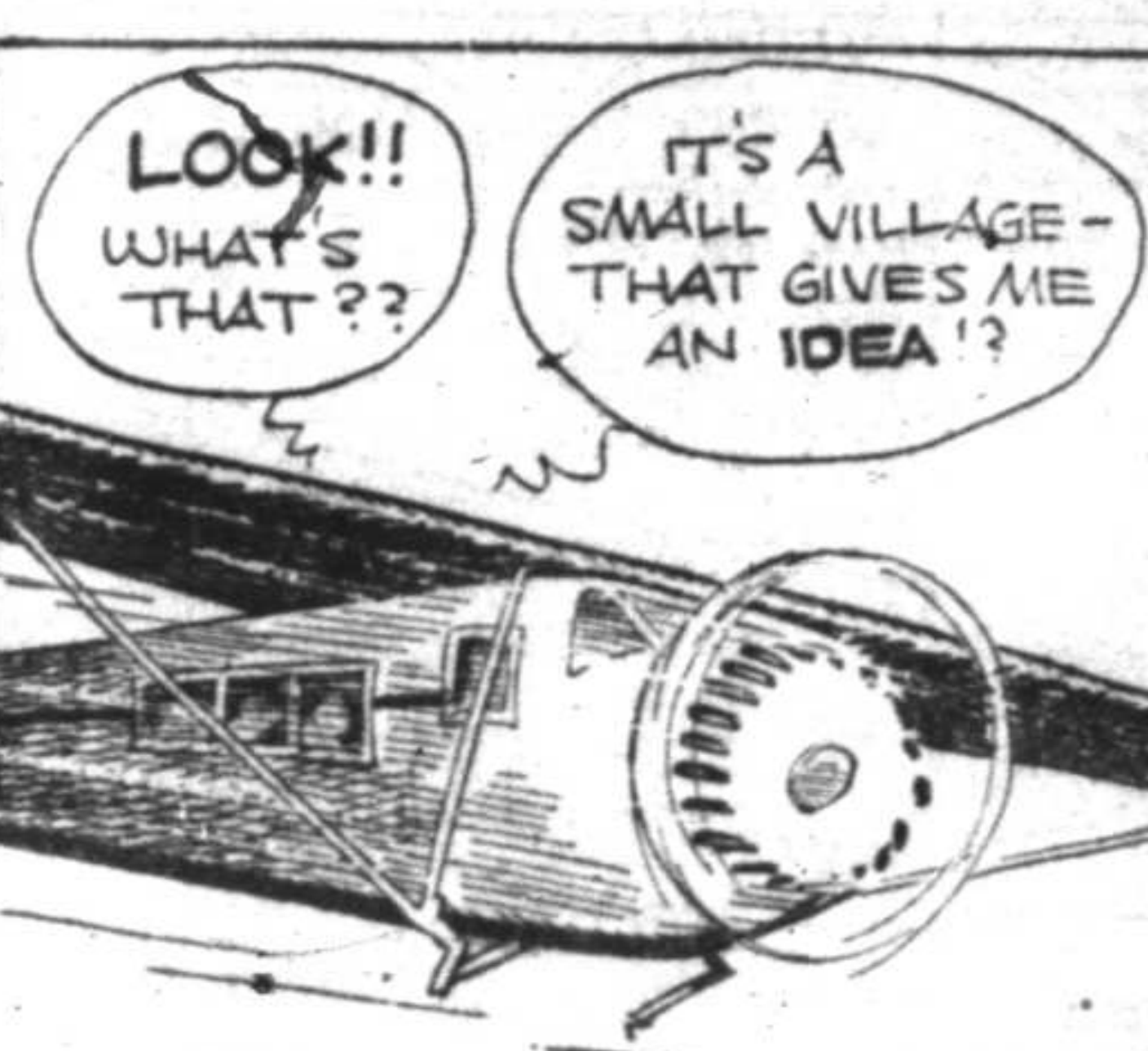

One Full Pardon, Eight Furloughs Issued By Moody

Fifty-Year-Old Man Given Freedom After Serving Since Age Of Sixteen At Huntsville Prison

AUSTIN, March 24. (AP)—One full pardon, a general parole and eight furloughs were issued by Governor Moody today to inmates of the penitentiary.

Corry Taylor, serving a life sentence for murder from Jefferson county, was issued a general parole, after more than 32 years servitude. He was a boy of 16 years old when received in the walls and is now about 50.

A full pardon went to E. J. Marglin, Parker county, serving five years for robbery by firearms.

The governor revoked a general parole issued on March 1 to M. L. Brown, Navarro county, serving 10 years for burglary. Since his release he had been charged with another offense, the governor stated.

Furloughs were issued as follows: 30 days to each, Ernest Williams, Mitchell county, Isom Nelson, San Jacinto county, Erwin Bellah, Hiss county, and Bill Jones, Dallas county; 10 days to Lawrence Quinn, Jefferson county; 20 days to Alvie Adams, Crosby county; 60 days, Arthur Jenkins, Hunt county, and 90 days to Alonzo Odum, Cherokee county.

Seek Passage Of Public Buildings Bill By Leaders

\$230,000,000 To Be Taken Up For Action In Senate Today Before Asking For Recess In House

WASHINGTON, March 24. (AP)—Passage of the \$230,000,000 public buildings bill will be sought tomorrow by senate leaders before asking a recess for the week to give the legislators a rest from the seven months of weary tariff debate.

The \$170,000,000 first deficiency bill was made ready for the White House today when the senate recessed from three amendments in dispute with the house. The funds of this bill, including \$12,000,000 for river and harbor work; \$100,000,000 for the farm board and \$150,000,000 for the American delegation at the London naval arms conference, become available immediately.

The resolution of Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, providing for government operation of the Muscle Shoals, Alabama, power project was made the order of business by the senate after passage of the tariff bill late in the day.

The Nebraska senator consented to permit the annual appropriation bill, of which five are before the senate, to be taken up from time to time during discussion of his Muscle Shoals resolution. The first of these, the agriculture bill carrying the appropriations for federal aid, will be considered tomorrow.

No Certainty.
There is no certainty that the El-Hott public building measure, which received house approval before the Christmas recess will get before the senate tomorrow. Senator Watson, of Indiana, republican leader, announced he would make the effort. This bill is considered as part of the program for stimulating employment.

President Hoover also has shown concern over the Dowell bill increasing the annual appropriations for Federal road aid from \$75,000,000 to \$125,000,000. This has passed both the house and senate but is deadlocked in conference over a senate amendment allowing an increase in the cost per mile to be allowed for road construction.

INCREASE SOUGHT

Real Estate Board Wants Membership Of Fifty

Glen Hess, secretary of the Lubbock Real Estate Board, announced yesterday that efforts are being made here to increase membership of the group to 50.

The drive for additional members was instituted yesterday by Mr. Hess and the board, which recently elected president of the board, who succeeds Joe Hess.

Active real estate dealers and associate members of leading property owners are eligible for membership in the board. A meeting of interested persons will be held within the near future to stimulate interest in the plans, Hess said.

BRYANT APPROVED

WASHINGTON, March 24. (AP)—The Senate Judiciary committee today ordered a favorable report on the nomination of Randolph Bryant to be district attorney for eastern Texas.

DALLAS, March 24. (AP)—Dallas office of National Air Transport today announced plans for a fast passenger service to make eight-hour connections between Dallas, Fort Worth and Chicago, and 15 hour connections to New York.

The line would follow the same route of the N. A. T. air mail and express lines through the southwest, with stops at Tulsa and Kansas City, and a new line will be established between Tulsa, Oklahoma City and St. Louis, the announcement said. Planes capable of cruising speed of 140 miles an hour will be used, according to the announcement.

REPORTED SOLD

NEW YORK, March 24. (AP)—The stockholdings of the Thomas Fortune Ryan estate in the Chicago & Eastern Illinois railroad, which carry with it control of the road, were reported in Wall Street today to have been sold to the Van Sweringen interests. Confirmation of the report was not obtainable, but it was accepted in railroad circles as more than a possibility.

Name Four Jurors In O'Neal's Trial

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, March 24.—With four men chosen, the jury that will try Cecil O'Neal, 27, on a charge of murder may be completed in criminal district court Tuesday, in time for the opening of testimony, attorneys indicated yesterday.

O'Neal, is a confederate of Philo Hooper in the slaying of Audie C. Penicill, 16, who was shot and killed July 8 at a Lake Worth camp, where a group of young people were having a party.

Mrs. Frances Benedict Hooper, who was married to Hooper in Marietta, Okla., a week ago, is expected to take the stand both for O'Neal and her husband, when he goes to trial. Clyde May, of the defense counsel announced today.

Disclosure that the couple was married came suddenly today after the O'Neal trial was opened. Mrs. Hooper, under the law, cannot testify against her husband or a codefendant. While the state will be deprived of her testimony on direct examination she will be questioned by the prosecution if she appears as a defense witness as planned.

WOULD WORK CONVICTS Moody Has Plan To Relieve Prison Congestion

AUSTIN, March 24. (AP)—Governor Moody and members of the state highway commission are endeavoring to work out a plan to realize the governor's proposal to relieve the overcrowded Houston situation of the penitentiary system by working several hundred convicts on the highways, it was revealed today.

Governor Moody said he had asked members of the highway commission to designate highways prisoners could be assigned to, and Gib Gilchrist, state highway engineer, stated that while the matter had not yet been put up to him, he expected to talk with R. S. Sterling of Houston, chairman of the highway commission, about the proposition soon.

Kansas City Man Denies Abduction

KANSAS CITY, March 24. (AP)—Michael H. Katz, millionaire drug company president, today denied published reports he had been kidnapped from his motor car near his home in an exclusive residential district here last Tuesday and paid extortionists \$100,000 ransom.

His denial was corroborated by members of his family while the police and detective departments pushed an investigation against the wall of silence surrounding the alleged daylight abduction.

Katz today consented to a conference in his office with Police Chief John L. Miles and E. P. Obylie, chief of detectives, but the officers reported Katz was not present when they called and had left a note saying he had become indisposed.
