French Voters Okay DeGaulle's Proposal

PARIS (AP) — French voters have overwhelmingly approved President Charles de Gaulle's peace pact with the Algerian nationalists.

De Gaulle's supporters heralded the verdict as a ringing vote of confidence in all aspects of his four-year-old regime.

De Gaulle put before the voters a two-point proposal. One called for confirmation of the cease-fire signed with the Algerian rebel command at Evian on March 19.

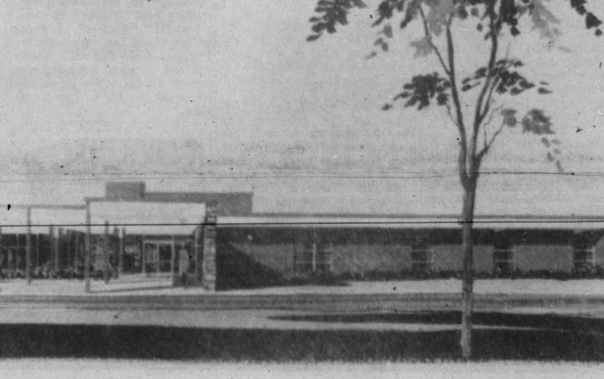

Indonesia To Act If Parleys Fail

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — President Sukarno reviewed MIG jet fighters from the Soviet bloc today and declared Indonesia will take Dutch-held West New Guinea by force this year if peace talks fail.

The Dutch continued reinforcing their forces in West New Guinea. Special Dutch airliners brought 180 soldiers to the Criban area of Curacao en route to the Far Eastern territory.

The Dutch Cabinet postponed until Wednesday a special meeting to discuss the new U.S. proposal for settling the West New Guinea dispute.

Urgent Plea To Soviet Is Pondered

LONDON (AP)—President Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan were reported today to be weighing an urgent new plea to Soviet Premier Khrushchev to help stave off resumption of atmospheric nuclear weapon tests.

British sources said the step is under high-level study in Washington and London and a decision must be made if it probably would take the form of a personal message asking Khrushchev to make a test-ban treaty possible.

Ultraconservatives Shunned By Both Political Parties

WASHINGTON (AP) — The prospect that ultraconservatives will influence the course of the major political parties in this fall's congressional elections appears to be fading.

Leaders of both parties, in fact, are busy posting keep-away signs against religious citizens who profess to feel that some of the nation's highest officials are entrapped in a Communist conspiracy.

The signs apply also to those who, among other things, want to abolish the income tax and to impeach Chief Justice Earl Warren.

This was demonstrated in the frosty reception Republicans and Democrats gave last week to former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker when he questioned the loyalty of Secretary of State Dean Rusk and others in testimony before a Senate Armed Services subcommittee.

Sen. Spark M. Mirmond, D-S.C., who spurned the inquiry into alleged mistreatment of military men at which Walker appeared, made it clear several times he was not endorsing the general's statements.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., a spokesman for Republican conservatives, didn't even turn up to hear Walker, as he could have done as a member of the parent Armed Services Committee.

Walker's performance on the witness stand convinced most of the politicians who heard him that the former general is not likely to become an effective spokesman for the far right.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass., said he couldn't go along with Walker's charges. Sen. Howard W. Cannon, D-Nev., said they weren't supported by the record.

Sen. John M. Stennis, D-Miss., head of the Senate group that heard Walker's testimony, said he has no intention of calling for an inquiry into the records of persons accused by the former general of being soft on communism.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., used Walker's appearance to tee off against what he called the "radical right" of the Democratic party. Walker is seeking the Democratic nomination for governor in Texas. His chances are regarded as poor.

Javits said in a New York television broadcast Sunday that "the radical right is not only a threat to the Republican party, it is also a threat to the Democratic party."

"In the schism between the

Southern wing and the rest of the party, the Democrats also have their ultraconservatives and in people like General Walker they have a definite radical right wing," Javits said.

But Sen. John Sparkman, D-Ala., who votes with the Kennedy administration on just about everything but civil rights, said in an interview he wasn't worried by any right-wing threat to his party.

"The truth of the matter is," he said, "I don't think these people are going to have any real influence in either party."

Car Cooling System Needs Conditioning For Summer

With summer coming on its time to give a kind thought to your car's cooling system. That's the advice given by Frank Stephenson, The Radiator Man. Stephenson recommends that motorists drain that old anti-freeze this spring. And that recommendation comes not only from Stephenson but from the Society of Automotive Engineers as well.

Water under pressure will not boil at as low a temperature as water at atmospheric pressure, Stephenson said. It was in 1949 that the first pressure caps were used on water cooling systems to raise both the pressure and the boiling point. Those early caps were rated at four pounds of pressure. Today caps of 17 pounds pressure are being used, and auto cooling systems are operating in the 232 to 278 degree temperature range without boiling.

## Who Will Succeed Konrad Adenauer?

BONN, Germany (AP)—Who will eventually succeed Chancellor Konrad Adenauer?

That question is popping up again while Adenauer, 86, takes a six-week rest in Italy.

Two leading possibilities have lost part of their political stock recently—Vice Chancellor Ludwig Erhard and Defense Minister Franz Josef Strauss.

When Adenauer, campaigning last year, gave a half-promise he would retire before his term runs out in 1965. Lately, the situation has reached a point where many believe he will stay on.

Adenauer's Christian Democrats last year designated Erhard as the eventual successor, although Adenauer once described Erhard as lacking the experience required for a chief of government.

For several years, popularity polls showed Erhard's stature in the public image as the "father of the German economic miracle." However, West Germany's boom has been leveling off sharply.

## Two Die In Blaze At Refinery

PORT ARTHUR (AP)—A spectacular fire killed two men and heavily damaged a catalytic cracking unit Sunday at the Texas Co. refinery, one of the world's largest.

The cause of the blaze and amount of damage had not been determined. Industry sources said a similar fire would cost \$8- to \$12 million. Company officials declined comment.

Justice of the Peace Fulton Lee identified the dead as Firmin Domec, 44, of Nederland and Edwin East Jr., 43, of Port Arthur.

At least one man was injured. He was burned about the face while fighting a fire.

The flames were extinguished by the plant's own firemen after an hour and a half.

Lee said Domec and East, both instrument workmen, were on an elevator on the side of the six-story unit as the fire broke out shortly before 11 a.m.

The fire was thought to be under control about noon but sprang up again. Flames shot all the way to the top of the unit. They could be seen at Bridge City, 25 miles west of here.

A workman said the cracking unit had been shut down for overhaul and was being brought back on stream when the fire broke out.

"I haven't read the book," a woman's voice replied. "Why don't you call the medical profession since the book deals with cancer?"

## Whoopers Welcome 5th Offspring

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—Crip and Josephine, the two bathing-whooper cranes, are taking to something about preserving their nearly extinct species.

Their fifth offspring cracked through its egg Sunday at Audubon Zoo to increase the world population of the rare bird to 46.

Crip and Josephine are taking turns incubating a second egg, which zoo director George Douglas believes will hatch by the end of the week.

The two adult whooper cranes, who are shy Douglas keeps them away from public view, hatched the first of their species ever born in captivity four years ago. Since then, Crip and Josephine have produced two other whoopers, one 3 1/2 years old and the other 1. The parents are the only whoopers to ever produce in captivity.

Josephine got off the nest and helped push her baby out of the egg when the shell cracked.

The rusty-colored baby crane is about twice the size of a newly hatched chick.

"It's a very healthy bird," said Douglas, who put the baby under a 24-hour watch. "We are hopeful it won't catch asperteriosis."

He said there is no known cure for the disease—a lung fungus caused by an airborne germ. It doesn't affect domestic fowl and many wild birds, but Audubon lost two cranes from the disease in the past.

"We leave the incubation of the eggs up to mother nature but we are doing everything possible to safeguard the birds," Douglas said.

Asked about the sex of the new bird, Douglas replied, "We haven't learned how to determine that yet—not even with adults."

## Tribute Is Paid To Hammerstein

NEW YORK (AP)—A one-act lifetime cast of stars-past tribute Sunday night to Broadway's beloved bard, the late Oscar Hammerstein II.

"He was a gentle man with an iron hand," one performer recalled. That's how the company saluted him—with a warm affection that avoided sticky sentimentality.

The capacity crowd, which had paid up to \$50 per ticket, sat spellbound by a half-hour display on the stage of the 46th Street Theater.

Among the players were many associated with the Hammerstein chorus: Helen Hayes, Dorothy Stickney, Mary Martin, Elaine Stritch, Celeste Holm, Barbara Cook, Allyn Miller, among the ladies; Howard Lindsay, Dennis King, Alfred Drake, John Raitt, George Gaynes, Leon Bibb among the men.

The words they recited were a half-hundred of the lyrics for the thousand songs which Hammerstein wrote. There were snatches, too, of his letters and thoughts he recorded in speeches or interviews prior to his death, Aug. 23, 1960.

Miss Hayes gave his answer to a lady who asked him to write an article on what makes a home. It was one word: "People." Then there was an inquirer who wanted to know the saddest word in the English language. "But," he replied.

The first half of the program featured excerpts from his collaborations with Sigmund Romberg, Jerome Kern and Rudolf Friml. "Who's Your Favorite?" "All the Things You Are." "I've Told Every Little Star" were included.

So were some almost forgotten songs, as well as his first poem, for a 1920 Columbia University show, entitled "There's Always Room For One More."

The latter section concentrated on his partnership with Richard Rodgers. The composer himself opened the segment, as pianist for Drake's memory-rousing "Oh What a Beautiful Morning."

In swift succession the melody riffs included bits of the team's great hits: music.

There were no encores, but Miss Holm with "I Can't Say No" from "Oklahoma!" Raitt in "Soilouky" from "Carousel" and Myron McCormick leading the chorus.

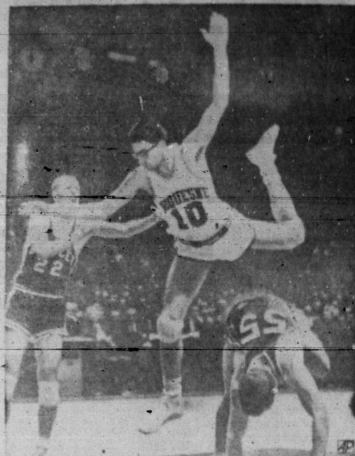

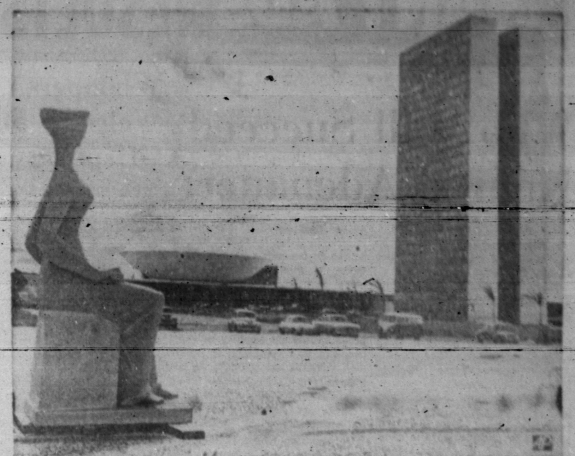

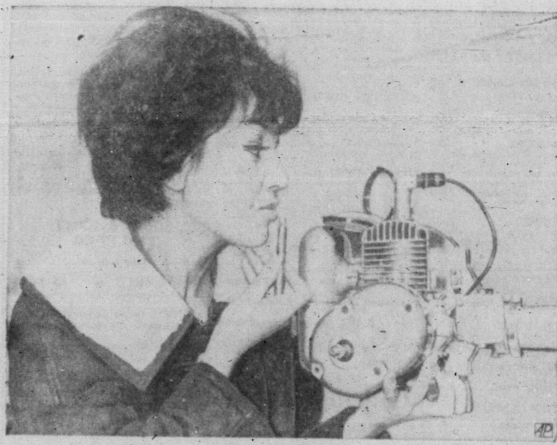

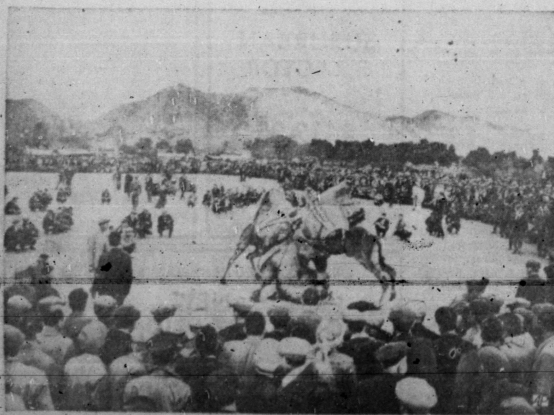

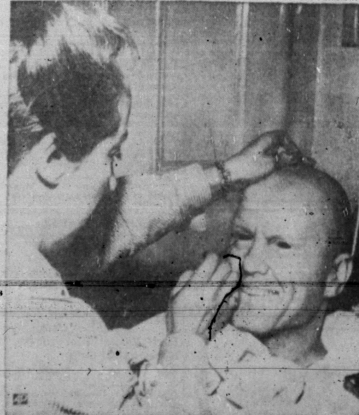
