LEADING IN BANK DEBITS.—Dallas has led all cities of its size in the United States in bank debits since last summer. Of the cities in Texas reporting last week to the Federal Reserve bank, all except one showed an increase in bank debits over the previous week. Looking at business in Texas from every point of view, one finds every indication for an increasingly prosperous year.

COST OF KILLING DEER.—Figures gathered by the Texas game commission show that during the open season for deer that lasted from Nov. 26 to Dec. 1, 9,400 deer were killed and 26 hunters received fatal accidents and 96 more were wounded while hunting. That is for every 362 deer killed during the season one man was killed and for every 98 deer killed another man was wounded. But even at this rate the deer are likely to be exterminated before the hunters are all fatally wounded, as only approximately 21,617 bucks were left in the state. While man's immunity toward helpless deer is large he pays for it in large loss of human life and in much suffering from accidents.

KILLING OUT WILD LIFE.—The game commission reports that there was from 20 to 50 per cent increase in the number of hunters over the state last year and that they took heavy toll of deer and turkeys, both of which are rapidly disappearing in some sections. Unless there is some change in the present law, most of the deer, turkeys and quail will soon be killed.

POLITICAL DOPESTERS.—Political writers in Texas began early this year handing out "inside dope" on the political situation. Some of them appear to have little trouble in filling their columns, but others are finding it difficult to hold reader-interest from day to day. One informs the public with almost the prophetic vision of a seer that although he has not missed a Democratic National convention since 1896, William Jennings Bryan will not attend the convention at Houston. So, Democrats should not go to Houston expecting to meet the old Commoner.

DALLAS-FORT WORTH BUS FARE.—Many Texans have been watching with much interest the efforts of the owners of the Dallas-Fort Worth bus line, who are also stockholders in the interurban line operating between the two cities to get the railroad commission to raise the bus rate from 50 cents to \$1.15. The Commission has authorized an increase of bus fare to 80 cents and \$1.45 for the round trip, the interurban one-way fare being 93 cents.

MOVING VALLEY VEGETABLES.—The Missouri-Pacific Railway lines moved 200 cars of vegetables, making three solid train loads, out of the Lower Rio Grande Valley Thursday to the Northern markets, that being the heaviest day's shipment for the season.

CATTLE AND TURKEYS.—The highest price paid for a Hereford bull at the annual sale of the American Hereford Breeders' association at Des Moines this week was \$1,225. This grand champion was bought by breeders at Whitney, Texas. A Lampasas turkey grower recently bought a prize male turkey at \$500.00, this being the second \$500.00 turkey to come to Texas this season. It begins to look like turkeys may become as valuable as cattle and that Texas will be satisfied with nothing less than the best of both.

PECAN EXPERIMENT STATION.—Texas pecan growers and thousands of Texans are now pecan growers—will be glad to see passed the bill by Congress appropriating \$50,000 for a pecan experiment station to conduct investigations for developing new varieties of pecans, improving cultural methods and combating insect pests. Pecans are grown in fully 100 Texas counties and any movement that will aid in improving varieties and making the crop more regular will be welcomed.

SHERIFFS OPPOSE BANK ROBBER REWARD.—At the meeting of the West Texas Sheriffs' association at Vernon, objection to the \$5,000 reward offered by the Texas Bankers' association for dead bank bandits was freely expressed. Perhaps the president, R. E. McWilliams, expressed the sentiment of most Texas peace officers when he said: "I wouldn't kill any man for \$5,000, but if I were to ask a bank robber to put 'em up and he wouldn't do it, I'd shoot him for no reward."

She declared that Banks is innocent, and that her husband was undoubtedly killed by a secret enemy whom he had told her of, and that the alleged confession of Banks was obtained by duress.

At the invitation of the Ranger school board J. E. T. Peters, secretary of the Cisco chamber of commerce, and E. H. Varnell, vocational instructor, went to Ranger Monday night to confer with the school board relative to employing a vocational teacher for the Ranger high school.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The drive to raise the membership of the house of representatives from 435 to 460 was launched today, as the house census committee attacked the problem of reapportionment. The demand sprang from the agricultural districts of the West and South. Representative Blanton of Texas, introduced a bill seeking to cut the house membership to 300.

Texas would gain two new congressmen if the 1920 census apportionment is made.

CISCO ENTRIES SHOW UP WELL IN DAY'S WORK

The averages and final scores of the boys participating in the live stock judging held here Saturday under the direction of E. H. Varnell and other vocational instructors, were figured Monday afternoon. J. B. Hancock of Dublin, was the high point man of the contest, securing 246 out of a possible 300 points. He was closely pressed by N. L. Taylor of Cisco, and Doyle Preston of De Leon, who tied for second place with 242 points. Floyd Thurman of Cisco was third with 233 points.

Dublin also won the highest rank in team work, scoring 223 points out of a possible 300. De Leon was second with 216 points; Cisco third with 215 points, and Comyn fourth with 191 points.

In the various stock classifications, the winners were as follows: Hogs, Murray Toland, De Leon; sheep, Hubert Thomas, Dublin; beef steers, Paul Pearson, De Leon; dairy cows, J. B. Hancock, Dublin; poultry, Jack Pearson, De Leon. Cisco did not participate in the poultry judging.

Winners in the poultry judging contest were as follows: Dublin (4 boys), 524 points out of a possible 600; Comyn (4 boys), 475; second, De Leon (8 boys), 433; third, Mr. Varnell expressed himself yesterday as well pleased with the results of the contest, feeling that the instruction received and the information gained by the boys who are taking the vocational course in the various schools, as in every way worth while. Other meets of the kind will doubtless be held during the present school term.

TWO STORES ARE ROBBED AT PUTNAM

PUTNAM, Feb. 14.—Burglars entered the general merchandise store of B. L. Boydston early this morning and rifled the safe of \$175 in cash and carried away a quantity of cigarettes and candy. Nothing else was missing when the salesmen checked over the stock today. An entrance was effected by breaking through one of the transoms in the rear of the building, which is situated on the northeast corner of the square.

The burglary was evidently committed just before day this morning, as Charles Bryan, night watchman, stated at 4 o'clock the store was all right, but on his next round, about an hour later, he noticed the wooden bar across the double doors on the south rear side of the building, was in place, and upon investigation discovered that the store had been entered. Empty chicken coops in the rear of the building, enabled the burglar to reach the transom. After leaving the store the intruder left by the rear south door. J. P. Work, bookkeeper for the firm, stated that it is possible that he failed to lock the safe when he left the building Monday night, as the safe was intact, and showed no indication of having been blown. The cash register was broken open and a small amount of change taken.

The store of G. P. Gaskins, on the north side of the square, was also burglarized, presumably by the same parties. An entrance was gained into the Gaskins store by breaking a pane in the rear door and raising the bar. Mr. Gaskins said, but the burglars seemed to be short of smoke, as only cigarettes and a small amount of candy was taken. Mr. Gaskins said his losses were about \$40, in merchandise, as he missed no cash. The cash register, which contained about \$9, was not molested.

FAVORITE SONS

One of the most curious phenomena of American politics, to a critic from abroad or a man from Mars, is the "favorite son" factor in our presidential campaigns. Nearly every state that has a popular man in public office feels obliged to trot him out before a national convention for the presidential nomination, even though 99 voters out of 100 may know that he isn't of presidential size or, for other reasons, hasn't a ghost of a show. Worse still, office holders or political leaders who have attained some prominence in the state often take it upon themselves to declare themselves "favorite sons," and use the existing party machinery to put themselves forward, regardless of their eligibility or merit. Often the nomination of a "favorite son" by a state delegation is a graceful compliment which deceives nobody, but pleases many and does no harm. The delegation swings soon to a real candidate. But sometimes there is a monkey wrench thrown into the national party machinery, defeating able candidates, creating bad feelings and leading to nominating deals which do neither party nor country any good. The popular primary, in spite of obvious defects, provides a remedy against this evil—if enough voters in any state take the trouble to make use of it.

ATROCITY OR IGNORANCE?

American marines ought to be taught the native speech of countries in which they go a-ban-dit-ting. Then civilians back home would be spared such disagreeable news items as that which told of a Nicaraguan rebel who approached an American lieutenant shouting "amigo" (meaning "friend") and was promptly shot. That sounds a little too much like the crude behavior attributed to "Huns" by intensely humanitarian patriots during the World War. If the incident really happened, we know the lieutenant of marines must have thought the surrendering Nicaraguan was about to hurl a hand grenade. Surely knowledge of a few common Spanish words would have avoided the regrettable outcome of the incident. Or wouldn't it?

CITY ILLUMINATION

New York may be the world's brightest city at night, but the less luminous towns may be glad they do not have to pay the light bill of the metropolis. The vice president of the New York Edison company reveals the fact that it takes 20,880 electric signs and 1,309,918 electric lights to create the brilliant effect for which the city is famous. These figures of course refer only to outdoor lighting. Broadway leads with 1,969 electric signs. Other thoroughfares have a sufficiently awe-inspiring number. Oh, well! Some other towns probably have more moonlight and starlight than New York, and that is illumination not to be scorned.

Personally we don't know much about the 200,000 useless words a professor says there are in the dictionary, but we're practically certain that two of them are "personally" and "practically."

NOVEL WAGE SCALE

Employees in an Indianapolis factory have been giving their own wages, to the apparent satisfaction of themselves and their employers. It is one of the most interesting of the new experiments along this line. Workers compared cost-of-living data and sub-l average budgets to the officials of the company and their recommendations were accepted. There is a minimum wage scale of \$19 a week for unmarried workers. Those married receive an addition of half the minimum wage. There are additional allowances made for children, at the rate of \$1 a week for each minor child up to a maximum wage of \$2.50 a week. When husband and wife both work, the marriage differential doesn't apply. The company is now planning a complementary scale, based on efficiency, which will add more to the wages of the best workers. Personal relations in the plant are said to be fine, with unusual contentment and effectiveness among the workers. One conclusion which may be drawn from the experiment is that even the extra allowance made for married workers isn't enough to cover the natural expenses of family life. The unmarried workers seem to maintain higher living standards than the married.

MECHANICS FOR CO-EDS

Domestic science and household economics are old stuff as courses of study for high school girls and college women. Now comes something different. It is a course in household mechanics given to co-eds at

Ohio State University. The 24 young women enrolled in that course are learning to mend a water pipe or faucet; to do all kinds of electric wiring, soldering, plumbing and pipe fitting; to read the gas, electric and water meters; to repair household machinery such as washing machines, electric irons, sweepers, sewing machines and the rest. Any man knows how much such a course of instruction is needed, but hardly any man believes it is possible to teach the fair but unscientific sex how to go about such tasks. Yet it is worth trying. The present pupils in this course are taking to it with genuine interest and relish and are said to be mastering the theory as well as the practice. Food in the future homes of those 24 students may come out of cans now and then, but the cans will be opened correctly with no casualties, and other mechanical tasks will be approached scientifically and accomplished successfully.

HELLO, SEWANE, HELLO

Way down upon the Pee Dee River, far, far away, is how Stephen Foster originally wrote the opening lines of his famous song, "The Old Folks at Home." But Stephen Foster's aesthetic soul was not satisfied with the harsh, blunt name of "Pee Dee" for the river of his charming lyric. Foster asked his brother-in-law to suggest something more appropriate. The brother-in-law who evidently was more comic than poetic proposed the Yazoo River. For the love of Pete! protested Foster. "That's worse than Pee Dee." Whereupon, the brother-in-law, who was an accommodating chap, hunted up and scanned a map of the southeastern states. "Here," he said, "is a river called 'Sewanee'."

"The very thing," exclaimed Foster. And he scratched out "Pee Dee" in the manuscript of his song and wrote "Sewanee" instead.

It is doubtful if Foster ever saw the Sewanee river, but had he could not have found a more suitable river to shimmer in his immortal song. There are wider rivers than the Sewanee, and deeper, but there are few, if any, that are more interesting and romantic. Unlike the railroad, which was just as wide as another but not so long, the Sewanee is much longer than many a river which is wider. Rising in the great wild Okefenokee Swamp, which has never been explored by any white man, the Sewanee river makes its way through southern Georgia and northern Florida 240 miles, and empties into the Gulf of Mexico near Cedar Key—where they use as fine oysters as anyone would want to tickle his palate.

The Sewanee is a peculiar river, a beautiful river, a striking river. Its color is that of the richest, clearest coffee. When one first sees it one instinctively looks among the bright green palmettos on its banks for the sugar bowl and cream pitcher. It is from the dye of the roots of the palmetto that the Sewanee is said to receive its color. But the Sewanee, in spite of its color, is not a somber stream. Its appearance is soft, gentle and tropical as it slips along; now deep, now shallow, turning first this way, then that. It is playful as it ripples over rocks, and thoughtful as it loafs along in the tinted shadows of moss-draped live oaks. Here and there a mysterious clear sulphur spring boils up through the river's bottom.

I have the edge on Stephen Foster and anyone else who has not seen the Sewanee river; for I have strolled along its shores, boated on its surface, and fished in its waters. My ticket's bought, my grip is packed. By the time this article appears in print I shall again be on its banks; for my own "old folks" have a home way down upon the Sewanee river.

SOVEREIGN CHICAGO

Italy has sent a regular diplomatic "minister" to Chicago. He is Commander Leopoldo Zuluini, who has been consul-general there, and is now raised to ministerial rank in recognition of friendliness to Mussolini shown by the Italian population of Chicago and the middle west.

This Chicago is treated by the Italian dictator as if that city were a "sovereign state." And Chicago, especially under Mayor Thompson, will play the part. She has been acting like a sovereign state for some time, especially in her appropriation of Great Lakes water.

CENTENARIANS

It is found that 16 centenarians died last year in the Province of Quebec. Eight of them were 100 years old, two were 101, one was 102, one -04 and one 109. Five were men and 11 were women—women usually beat men in longevity, in spite of the tradition that they are "the weaker sex."

There must be many more centenarians alive there.

Meanwhile we have a new wave

of statistical jubilation in this country over the raising of the life limit, and new prophecies of increased longevity hereafter—all the fruit of "modern civilization." Those centenarians in Quebec lived for the most part, simple and primitive lives. Civilization evidently had little to do with their health and years. Modern medical science didn't do much for them. What can we say to that?

REPUBLICAN BERLIN

"Steel Helmet" men put on a demonstration in Berlin the other day, parading ostentatiously in front of the imperial palace in honor of Prince Eitel Friedrich, second son of the former kaiser. There were 2,500 of them, under the protection of as many policemen. A hot time ensued. The Berlin police behaved as the Dublin public might be expected to in such a situation. Republicans and Communists gathered by tens of thousands to protest. The marchers were assailed with eggs, flowerpots and other missiles from windows all along the route and were attacked fiercely by infuriated crowds. The police had hard work to restore order.

Evidently there is very little regard for royalty in Berlin. Or elsewhere in Germany, for that matter.

DIPLOMATIC DOG

The American minister to Ottawa is living in a building that cost \$30,000, which is said to lack distinction and some other qualities. He has to maintain it out of his salary or his private means.

The Canadian minister to Washington is living in a building that cost \$500,000, and he has \$100,000 a year to keep it up. Some Canadians are making invidious comparisons. They seem to think that, in view of the effort of their country has made to show its respect to ours, we might reciprocate—especially when we can afford it so much better than Canada can. And many Americans agree.

It's an old story. But our government, little by little, is doing better by its diplomatic branch, and putting up a more fitting front in foreign maps. Appropriations are recommended for that purpose in several countries.

THE DAM FIGHT

The Swing-Johnson bill for federal construction of the great Boulder dam is the subject of a fight in the house on March 15, substantially the same measure which passed the house last year. The delay is intended to provide time for negotiation between warring interests.

Seven states are at odds with each other regarding the division of water and power of the Colorado river. Powerful financial interests are fighting the movement to develop and exploit this rich project through public instead of private enterprise.

The states got together once on the subject, under the leadership of Herbert Hoover, and ought to be able to get together again if they will go about the matter in the spirit which Americans are always recommending to European nations. If they were agreed, house and senate might agree, and get this big enterprise started.

The National Safety council figures that 23,500 persons were killed by automobiles in the United States last year. A high price to pay, but people think it's worth it.

Geologist Sees 92 Billion Barrels Oil As Possible in United States; Colorado Claims More Than Half

No More Mistakes

International News Service Staff Correspondent.

DENVER, Feb. 14.—Approximately 92 billion barrels of oil are recoverable from the oil shale deposits in the United States, according to Dean E. Winchester, Denver consulting geologist, who has just completed a report for the federal oil conservation board.

Colorado's proportion of this huge total is some 47,000,000,000 barrels, Winchester said, and at current oil prices would sell for about \$30,000,000,000.

In his report, Winchester urged the federal government to increase its facilities at the oil shale experimental station in Rifle, Colo. "No one knows," he said, "what day we may need all the information which may be gained from the Rifle plant work and when that day comes, we will need it badly. An oil famine is not imminent, but prudence must always force the possibility of an oil shortage. An oil shortage would slow down the wheels of industry and bring serious industrial depression."

Winchester, who is author of all but one of the oil shale bulletins issued by the United States geological society, compiled his report in connection with determining the possible oil substitutes, which, according to him, rapid depletion of well oil, may soon be a necessity.

Colorado to Figure

When that day of substitute comes, he sees Colorado supplying a large percentage of the oil in this country from its shale deposits, and the quantity of this shale oil he would have placed higher in his report had he not adopted various limiting factors. His report did not consider shale less than one foot thick, shale which would yield less than 3,000 barrels of oil per acre, and did not consider that more than 60 per cent of the shale in the ground would reach the refiners.

In connection with the last factor, Winchester declared, however, that with the use of the best mining methods a possible 95 per cent yield is possible.

The geologist pointed out that coal and oil shale are the two outstanding substitute sources of oil, and emphasized the adequacy of the supply of shales as raw materials. He pointed out that since the richest and most extensive deposits of oil shale are in the sparsely settled sections of western Colorado, eastern Utah and southern Wyoming, the problem of transportation becomes one of extreme importance.

Hard to Guess Cost

As to the cost of getting oil from the shales, Winchester would hazard no guess, saying that such could not be determined until it had been produced in commercial quantities. He did say, however, that some experts believe such a cost would be no more and perhaps less than that now required in well production.

Increased interest in prospects for extensive development of Colorado's oil shale lands is indicated in a report made last week by Walter Spencer, register of the federal land office for the Denver district. The demand for oil shale land was greater during 1927, he said, than any previous year in the history of the Denver district.

Actual receipts for purchases of oil shale land totalled \$154,832.56, Spencer said, which showed that approximately 61,000 acres in the government domain had been transferred to private individuals. The oil shale land is sold by the government at an average of \$2.50 per acre.

Examination and Brain Test for Youthful Offenders After First Crime Urged to Curb Atrocities

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 14. — Paychiatry in general criminal procedure, as well as in rare cases, would do much to prevent such crimes as that of William Edward Hickman, on trial in Los Angeles for the kidnapping and slaying of Marion Parker. In the opinion of Dr. Karl A. Menninger, noted Kansas City and Topeka, Kansas, paychiatrist.

If all defendants in minor, as well as major crimes were subjected to rigid mental tests, Dr. Menninger believes abnormal tendencies of the brain, which lead to criminal careers could be detected and immediate steps taken to eliminate a similar or more serious deed.

Dr. Menninger, who is chairman of the committee on the legal aspects of psychiatry of the American Psychiatric Association, declared the organization, fully advocated, and stressed the importance of mental examinations for all violators of the law, regardless of the magnitude of their crime.

Examination Needed
"Edward Hickman should have been given a mental examination when he was arrested for forgery," Dr. Menninger stated. "According to the theory which the defense seems to be pursuing, Hickman presumably was insane long before he committed the Parker murder. At least, in all probability, he was exhibiting other evidences of his abnormal personality."

"If such were the case, then his tendencies toward mental sickness would have showed up in examination at the time of his first arrest and he would not have been at large to commit a more serious crime."

"What the psychiatrists are trying to bring about is the mental examination of all offenders in every anti-social act. In that way we believe mental abnormalities can be discovered and the offender properly isolated in time to avert serious consequences."

"Massachusetts, for several years has had a law requiring the mental examination of all offenders. Psychiatrists believe a general enactment of laws of this kind would help greatly in crime prevention."

Opposing Experts
The spectacle of psychiatric experts on opposing sides in court trials, staging battles over technicalities, is deplored by psychiatrists generally. We advocate an impartial commission of psychiatrists to give advice to the court in such trials as that of Hickman.

"We would abolish hypothetical questions, and instead of expert witnesses on opposing sides, we would have the psychiatrists try to get together to determine the truth of a situation and then report it impartially."

"It is possible for two experts in any profession to agree perfectly on fundamentals and yet, by arguing about technicalities, to give the impression they are far apart. The result of such seeming contradictory

testimony in court gives psychiatry a black eye generally with the public.

"Of course, it is true that under the law each side in a criminal trial has the right to call all the expert testimony it chooses, but the judge and jury should have the benefit of the advice of an impartial commission."

Consider Personality
When men are convicted of crimes, they should be meted out punishment to fit the criminal and not the crime, Dr. Menninger said. The personality of the offender should be taken into consideration in deciding what type of punishment is most likely to be effective in protecting society," the psychiatrist said. "A study should be made of him rather than of the crime he commits."

A forward step in the line has been taken recently by Governor Smith, of New York, in his recommendation to the state crime commission that sentencing powers be taken from the judges and vested in a special commission headed by psychiatrists, which would make a study of the offenders and fit the punishment on the basis of scientific study and experience."

But Dot is happy again, whether her parents and playmates are or not, for Dot is talking now. Her speech having been regained as suddenly and by no apparent reason than that which existed for its sudden loss. She just began to talk, a fact those with whom she is associates are well aware. While the knowledge that Dot has regained her speech, and thereby the anxiety of her parents has been allayed, yet the wish is expressed that Dot would be a little more economical in the exercise of her vocal organs.

Now it is reported that Dimple is coming in for her share of trouble. Possessing a robust physique she has previously enjoyed the best of health, but that is all changed now for Dimple is laid low on a bed of sickness, a victim of flu. She is not seriously ill, however, and as Dot can now talk to her, it is expected that she will soon recover.

only four cases of smallpox in Ranger at the present time. The four homes are under quarantine. Several cases have been reported at Butler's camp, about five miles west of Ranger.

According to the county health officer, there are 60 or 70 cases reported in the rural districts in the Ranger territory. Fourteen homes have been placed under

quarantine and more are due. The most severe cases of the epidemic is at Colony, several cases being reported just across the line in Stephens county. Pleasant Grove, Bullock and Okra also report several cases in the schools. Practically all of the schools of the rural districts will be vaccinated within the next few days and the county health officer is of

the opinion that physicians will have the epidemic under control within 10 days time.

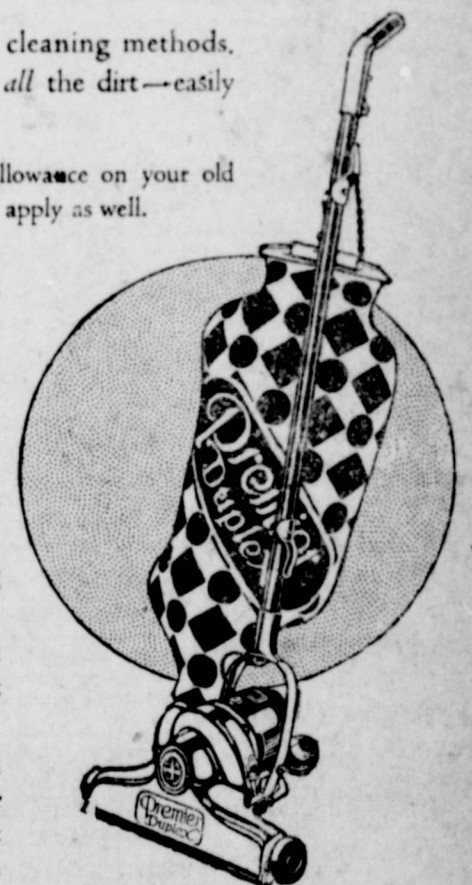
