

Eisenhower Sees Business Dip Near End

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today termed the nation "marvelously prosperous," predicted recovery this year from a "brief and self-correcting" business dip and pledged to use the government's vast powers to combat a depression if one should develop.

School Census Lists 5,260

Initial preliminary scholastic census returns show 5,260 youngsters between the ages of six and 18 (as of Sept. 1, 1954) in the Big Spring Independent School District.

W. C. Blankenship, superintendent, pointed out that this was by no means an accurate tabulation. Deadline for enumerating scholastics is Jan. 31, and it is possible, too, that there are duplications of names on local rolls or as between rolls of this and some other district.

He urged, however, that if anyone knows of a child who will have attained his or her sixth birthday on or before Sept. 1, 1954, and who will not have reached his 18th birthday before that date to call the administrative office (4-4964). It is important that each child of school age in Texas be enumerated in the census, said Blankenship.

Father Goes To Jail For Son's Misdeeds

RICHMOND, Tex. (AP)—A father here is serving a six-months jail sentence for crimes his young son committed.

Invoking a new state law which went into effect last June, County Judge George G. Roane yesterday ordered Fernando Rodriguez to begin serving a sentence imposed, but suspended, last November.

Rodriguez' sentence was suspended by Judge Roane when assessed on condition the father "exercised proper parental authority" over an 8-year-old son.

The youngster had been arrested repeatedly for theft, burglary and arson. Three other fathers, convicted at the same time of their sons' crimes, were Bruno Cano, Pablo Garcia, and Jose Villalobos. Their sentences are still in suspension.

Penalties in the new law range up to a fine of \$500 or six months in jail, or both.

County Atty. Arthur Van Slyke said the burglary of a Rosenberg, Tex., barber shop by Rodriguez' son was the cause for revocation of his suspended sentence.

Russian Secretary Missing In Japan

TOKYO (AP)—A secretary of the defunct Russian diplomatic mission in Tokyo has disappeared and the mission has asked Japanese police to search for him, police officials reported today.

The mission—which is not recognized by the Japanese government—told police that Yuri Alexandrovich Rastvorov, 34, was suffering from a "nervous breakdown."

But the newspaper Tokyo Shimbun said it had learned from a reliable source that Rastvorov disappeared last Monday because he feared for his life.

The mission—clearly in a state of panic—said Rastvorov was last seen on Jan. 27 in the city of Tokyo.

He is believed to be in Japan, but his whereabouts are unknown.

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Atom Battery

Seen through a magnifying glass is the tiny experimental atomic battery announced by RCA. By a new method the battery makes it possible to convert atomic energy directly and simply into small but useable quantities of electrical energy. The cylinder at right has a thin coating of radioactive material on its face. It is placed next to the transistor-like wafer. Radiated electrons bombard the wafer and release many more electrons which provide the battery's current and voltage. The experiment may be the forerunner of thimble-sized atomic batteries capable of operating for at least 20 years. (AP Wirephoto)

Proposal To Slash Excise Taxes Gets Solons' Steam Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—A drive to cut excise taxes was picking up steam in the House today but an administration leader cautioned that any lost revenue might have to be made up by new or increased taxes elsewhere.

Rep. Halleck of Indiana, GOP floor leader, told newsmen many excise or sales taxes now are so high "there is no doubt they are doing much to stifle certain segments of business." But he added: "Of course, in view of the fiscal situation of the government, in any study of excises we would also have to give attention to additional revenues as necessary to offset losses."

Halleck declined to discuss possible new sources of revenue.

BURGLARS TAKE COFFEE 'BREAK'

MONESSEN, Pa. (AP)—Coffee-loving burglars took time to brew a large pot for on-the-spot drinking as they ransacked a restaurant today.

And they took 15 pounds of the high-priced stuff with them, along with a slab of roast beef and other food.

Four burglars—judging by the number of dirty cups—also broke into cigarette and pinball machines and a juke box, taking about \$100, owner Arthur Zelds told police.

San Angelo Marine Testifies At Trial

SAN DIEGO (AP)—Summarizing arguments begun today in the court-martial trial of Marine Pfc. L. C. Kemp, 23, on a charge of unpremeditated murder.

Kemp, from San Angelo, Tex., is accused of shooting to death Irving V. LeFever, 27, civilian gardener, at the San Diego Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Dec. 2. The defense rested yesterday after Kemp testified.

Kemp told the court he shot LeFever for ignoring an arrest order and threatening the security of his detail of prisoners. He was guarding three brig prisoners the morning of the shooting.

"I thought the man was going to attack me, thus endangering the security of my prisoners," Kemp said. "Had I let him reach me there would have been difficulties far beyond my control in keeping custody of my prisoners. There was nothing to do but shoot him. I couldn't drop my weapon and fight the man."

Poll tax payments in Texas are expected to reach near record totals in some Texas counties.

But the overall total is going to fall far short of the record number bought in 1952—a presidential election year.

The deadline for paying the \$1.50 to \$1.75 poll tax is Sunday midnight. Without it, a citizen can't vote in county, state and general elections.

A governor, U.S. Senator, state officials, congressmen, and many state senators will be elected this year. So will all county officials.

Many civic groups and clubs have been waging strong publicity campaigns, urging citizens to pay their poll tax and protect their right to vote.

Dulles Charges Russia Trying To Bypass U.N.

Board Rules Laundry Not Under National Labor Act

A ruling declining to take jurisdiction in a labor organization case affecting the Ideal and City Laundries in Big Spring has been handed down by the National Labor Relations Board in Washington, D.C.

The case was that between C. B. South, et al. doing business as Ideal Laundry and Dry Cleaners, and the International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 826.

The IUOE petitioned the Board last August for representation of laundry employees, and asked for an election on such representation. The company countered that its operations did not come within the scope of the Labor Relations Act, and a hearing before an NLRB officer was held in Fort Worth in September.

The Board's finding of Wednesday was to the effect that the laundries are not substantially engaged in interstate commerce, and it said "x x x we find that, although the Employer's operations are not unrelated to commerce, the policies of the Act would not be effectuated by the assertion of jurisdiction in this case. We shall therefore dismiss the petition."

The Union had held that the company was in interstate commerce because of services performed for Webb Air Force Base, and also for companies that are engaged in interstate commerce, such as Corden, T&P and Cabot Carbon.

The Board's finding was by a 3-1 vote.

U.S. Balkers Move North

PANMUNJOM (AP)—Twenty-one singing, chanting Americans and one Briton who renounced their homelands to stay with the Communists today rolled northward in flag-bedecked trucks toward a life behind the Bamboo Curtain.

The former Allied soldiers, along with 325 South Koreans, carried Red "peace dove" banners as they marched from their barbed wire compound in Korea's bleak neutral zone.

They sang, cheered and shouted charges of imperialism and germ warfare at the Western world as they boarded big green trucks for the trip north.

Five Allied newsmen saw them. Communist correspondents Allan Winnington and Wilfred Burchett arranged for a few newsmen to witness the unusual spectacle.

The prisoners, in individual and group interviews, said almost exactly what they told a handful of other Allied correspondents who interviewed them at Panmunjom Monday.

They said they wanted to be "peace fighters" and cannot do so in the United States.

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Demands Big Four Discuss Germany

BERLIN (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov proposed to the Big Four today the calling of a world conference this year on general reductions of armaments.

BERLIN (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles charged in the Big Four conference today that Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov is trying to supersede the United Nations with a council of five powers including Red China. Dulles demanded for the third straight day that the conference get to the problem of Germany at once.

Dulles, opening the fourth day's meeting, loosed a blistering attack on Foreign Minister Chou En-lai of Communist China.

He asked: "Who is this Chou En-lai whose addition to our circle would make possible solution of all our problems?"

He described Chou as a leader of a regime which gained power through a bloody war, became an open aggressor in Korea, and even now continues to promote aggression in Indochina.

"Such is the man Mr. Molotov proposes would enable us to solve all the world's problems," the American diplomat scathingly declared.

Dulles claimed that in arguing here for a five-power meeting, Molotov has been playing on the hopes raised when the United Nations was formed in 1945 in order to justify transferring those hopes to a council of the five powers.

The fact is, Dulles continued, Molotov is trying to replace the United Nations with a council of five which he said would take over responsibility for running the world.

The Dulles argument hit hard at the five-power conference suggestion which all three Western ministers have already rejected. But the Western delegations are extremely sensitive to peace hopes, especially with respect to Indochina. They were clearly determined to explore all possibilities of a settlement in case Molotov has anything serious in mind.

Dulles, Foreign Secretary Eden and Foreign Minister Bidault lunched together at noon and apparently decided on their tactics to take a tough line on the five-power conference. At least that was the line being taken by Dulles, who sought to move Molotov on to a discussion of the German question.

Dulles told Molotov it was obvious the proposed five-power conference could not be a temporary one. He said it was "incredible" that the four here, plus Chou En-lai, would be able to solve political, military and economic problems with which the United Nations had grappled for nine years.

The tasks which Molotov outlined yesterday for the five-power meeting—framing from atomic disarmament to Asian settlements—would compel it to become permanent, Dulles said.

He said Molotov had pulled out of the hat "rabbits for all of us." Dulles gave as examples of Molotov's magic rabbits peace for Korea, peace for Indochina, an end of the atom race, a settlement of specific problems and a tremendous increase in economic prosperity.

He said Molotov promised these achievements would be made possible if only the Western Powers would invite Red China's Chou to the conference table.

Such a parley, Molotov told them, could consider the "situation in Asia," an obvious reference to Indochina and Korea.

Diplomats closely associated with three Western ministers said they were agreed Molotov's intentions must be explored, his purposes made clear for the world to see, and his genuine peace offers—if any—quickly taken up.

Bidault, whose war-worn country is extremely sensitive to any move to end the Southeast Asian fighting, called Dulles and Eden to a luncheon meeting to discuss the question.

Molotov told them yesterday that a five-power parley could consider the "situation in Asia," an obvious reference to Indochina as well as Korea.

His lures to entice the Western nations into a Big Five conference seemed designed, moreover, to appeal not so much to their foreign ministers here as to the millions of people they represent.

The fourth session of the Berlin conference today was destined to hear still more argument on the China issue, which already had tied up three sessions even though the Western ministers repeatedly told Molotov they would not accept his proposition.

Molotov was today's chairman. He ignored demands yesterday by U.S. Secretary of State Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Eden and French Foreign Minister Bidault that the conference get on to the problems of Germany and Austria.

There was no indication the Russian would change his position today while running the meeting. Western diplomats conceded he could tie up the conference indefinitely if he chose. They did not know how soon they would be able to get to the German and Austrian problems, which they claim are the main business at Berlin.

Bidault asserted that not until Peiping stopped aiding the Communist-led Vietminh rebels in Indochina could a Big Five meeting be considered.

Eisenhower's Idea On GOP Supported

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. John S. Cooper (R-Ky.) said today President Eisenhower had spelled out "what the Republican party ought to be" in saying the GOP was "liberal" in dealing with people and "conservative" in money matters.

"That's the best statement of what the Republican party ought to be that has been made by anybody," Cooper declared in an interview. "If we are conservative with the country's fiscal resources we can be more liberal in the long run in dealing with people."

Asked today whether he was taking back to the Capitol another letter from Eisenhower, Knowland replied: "I would prefer not to discuss that."

Without giving a final rejection, Bricker turned aside as unsatisfactory to him in its present form a measure offered by George yesterday.

George's suggested compromise would (A) nullify any future treaties and international agreements that conflict with the Constitution and (B) provide that executive agreements—other than treaties—

Borden Discovery Well Logged; Howard Counts 3 Completions

A new discovery well was logged in Borden County today with the completion of Russell Maguire's No. 1 H. D. Deak, which had a 24-hour flowing potential of 416 barrels of oil. The wildcat is about 13 miles southeast of Gall, some four miles northwest of production in the Reinecke field.

Three completions were also noted in Howard County—two in the Moore field and the other in the Snyder field. Guthrie No. 1-B Hewitt in the Moore field made pumping potential of 123 barrels, while nearby Cosden No. 1 Dunagan pumped 78 barrels of oil on potential test. Fleming No. 20-B Snyder in the Snyder field pumped 118 barrels of oil on test.

Wildcats were spotted in Howard and Martin Counties.

Fleming Oil Company No. 20-B D. H. Snyder, 1,880 from north and 2,310 from east lines, 22-30-T&P survey, was completed in the Snyder field for a potential of 118 barrels per day by pump. There was no water on recovery. Gravity of oil is 30 degrees and gas-oil ratio is 120-1. Top of pay is 2,620, and total depth is 2,910 feet.

Lone Star Drilling Company spotted a new wildcat location about 12 miles north of Big Spring. It is the No. 1 J. O. Haney, which is slated for drilling depth of 7,300 feet. Operations are to be by rotary. The project is on a 158-11 acre lease and elevation is 2,691 feet. Drilling is 467 from southeast and northeast lines, 22-32-T&P survey.

Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Co.

J. O. Haney, 1,694 from north and 2,641 from east lines, 14-32-2n, T&P survey, made it to 8,277 ft. lime and shale. Top of the reef is 8,260 feet.

WALL STREET: The stock market turned lower today for the second straight session with trading quiet.

Just about every major division in the list was lower with losses going from fractions to around a point.

Trading started rather briskly, and then the pace slackened to a moderate pace. Minus signs were general in the steels, motors, railroads, coppers, aircrafts, chemicals, and electric issues.

Yesterday the market declined under profit-taking following the sharp gains of the previous day. Today that same trend was in evidence.

Decca Records opened on a block of 7,500 shares off 1/4 at 16, and Lehigh Coal opened on 4,000 shares up 1/4 at 8 1/2. There were comparatively few blocks on the tape.

Both Defendants Testify In Title Suit Of Garlingtons

Testimony of both defendants was heard this morning in the trial of a trespass to try title suit involving four sections of land in north-east Howard County.

J. S. Garlington and others are trying title to land now owned by N. H. Reed. They claim Garlington was of unsound mind when he lost title to the land through a deed of trust sale.

Suit was filed against Reed and A. L. Wasson, who sold the land to Reed.

A deposition taken from Wasson was read during the trial this morning. In the deposition, Wasson told of a \$5,000 loan he made to Garlington in 1937, about two and a half years prior to the time Wasson gained title to the four sections at a foreclosure sale.

Wasson said he made the loan to Garlington "out of sympathy" during the time that Garlington was Howard County judge. He said Garlington "never did what he promised to, and I finally had to buy first liens against his land to protect myself."

Reed testified concerning a contract he made with Donald Garlington in December, 1939, in which he offered to purchase the four sections of land and "put up \$3,000." He said he never could get a deed to the property, however.

Reed also said that in a conversation with Wasson just prior to the public sale of Garlington's land, that Wasson promised to sell him the land "for the same price" if he (Reed) wouldn't file suit for specific performance on the contract with Donald Garlington.

Reed, a Sterling County rancher, said he paid \$24,320 to Wasson for the 2,560 acres of land, the same price he had offered to pay Donald Garlington, son of J. S. Garlington. He testified that Donald had power of attorney to act for his father, but that attorneys advised against trading with Donald Garlington.

could become internal law only by act of Congress.

This was offered as a substitute for Bricker's proposal which, in a clause opposed vigorously by President Eisenhower, says "a treaty shall become effective as internal law in the United States only through legislation which would be valid in the absence of treaty."

Eisenhower contends this would give the states power to repudiate some treaties. Bricker says that is not true. George said his proposal would eliminate the effect of the "which" clause.

George, who will be 76 years old tomorrow and who has rounded out more than 30 years of Senate service, appeared to have come up with a suggestion that Eisenhower's Senate lieutenants might clutch as the basis for further efforts to compromise a fight that has split Republicans.

Senate debate on the Bricker proposal began yesterday before a packed gallery.

Researcher Sure
Relation Exists
In Cancer, Smokes

ST. LOUIS (U)—A St. Louis surgeon active in research says the only persons who don't believe a definite relationship exists between cigarette smoking and cancer are those who have not made statistical studies of the question.

Dr. Evaris A. Graham made that statement last night as he read a paper before the Washington University Medical Society.

Dr. Graham, professor emeritus of surgery at the university's School of Medicine and his associates published their first statistical study on the controversy in 1950.

More than 3,000 cases have been involved in 12 statistical studies made since the original report, he said, adding: "It is significant that every one of the studies concludes that a definite relationship exists."

were commonly known as "Country Campbells." There wasn't any gasoline in the country, because there wasn't any need for it, since there weren't any gasoline engines, and certainly there wasn't any electricity except the lightning that flashed across the skies in those days. There weren't any road signs or road maps, either, because there weren't any roads.

One day Col. Jim Kelly, now of Stanton, and a friend, were riding their horses through western Oklahoma Territory when they sighted a town in the distance. They didn't know what town it was, there on the unfenced prairie, but decided to ride on in and see. It turned out to be Cloud Chief.

Now in Cloud Chief there was a man by the name of Thompson Benton Ferguson who was publishing a newspaper on a "Country" Campbell press. Benton afterwards was appointed governor of the Territory by President Theodore Roosevelt, and acquired the nickname of "Halo Tom."

Kelly, being a newspaperman himself, called on Ferguson, who had his combination home and newspaper plant on the highest point near the town. Above his house stood the tallest windmill Jim Kelly had ever seen. In inspecting the plant Kelly found the ingenious Ferguson had the press hooked up to the windmill. He could print his paper if the wind was blowing, which it usually was then, as now. But there were quiet days and when these came no paper was printed.

Sometimes, Ferguson explained to his visitors, he would wake up in the night and hear the wind blowing and when he did he'd fog it out of bed and go to work and get that paper printed before the wind died down. Most of those frontier papers powered their "Country" Campbell's with a man turning a crank—but not Tom Ferguson.

Ferguson acquired the sobriquet of "Halo Tom" when the President named him territorial governor and Dave Marcum, editor of the Woodward Democrat wrote: "Teddy was looking for a Diogenes and mistook Tom's red hair for a halo."

All of which merely establishes the fact that today's newspapermen don't have such a hard time after all, and probably not nearly as much fun as the publishers of the earlier days.

Power Of Defense Secretary Is Being Tested Inside Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP)—A test of power is on at the Pentagon to determine whether the authority of the defense secretary is supreme in the military establishment.

The handling of the cases of American soldiers who decided to stay with their Communist captors in Korea or of those who later changed their mind it became apparent today, is involved in this behind-the-scenes situation.

But in earlier incidents, too, the issue of central control cropped up. Secretary of Defense Wilson has publicly taken the responsibility for ordering the Army to discharge dishonorably the 21 Americans who have decided to stay with the Communists. Some Army legal experts hold that nothing in military law allows the issuance of dishonorable discharge orders without trial by court-martial. Wilson says he thinks he has the authority.

There was the related incident of the Army's sudden announcement of the arrest, on court-martial charges, of Cpl. Edward Dickinson, the Virginia soldier who reversed his original decision to stay with the Reds. There the issue was one of the Army's timing and the wording of its announcement. Outside the Army, every high official, including President Eisenhower and Wilson, was startled and disturbed by the announcement last Friday night. The Defense Department was reported to have asked both the Army and Marines to hold up on any action or announcement in prisoner of war cases until all efforts to win back the remaining 71 had been made—and not take any action at all before the following Tuesday.

Eisenhower said at his news conference yesterday he thought there must be something else in the Dickinson case other than his original decision to remain with the

Reds. Dickinson is charged with having intercourse with the enemy and seeking to secure favorable treatment while he was an inmate of a Communist prison camp.

The President also said he was disturbed when he read newspaper reports of the Army's action and immediately called Wilson to be certain that justice was done. Dickinson yesterday was given a medical clearance and transferred from the Army's Walter Reed Hospital here, where he had been arrested, to Ft. Belvoir, Va., 15 miles away. The Army named Col. James Jewett Carnes to head the group which will make a pre-trial inquiry to determine whether Dickinson shall face court-martial. There was disposition today to believe that the plan to announce the arrest of Dickinson Friday night was known in high Army quarters. First reports were that there had been a slipup at some lower echelon and that the action was prematurely carried out.

Defense officials emphasized there was no question of the right of the Army to prefer the charges against Dickinson, that the issue was over the failure to advise top defense officials that the Army proposed to make the announcement prior to the time urged by the department.

Earlier incidents which caused annoyance in top defense quarters included publication of a story, attributed to a high Navy official saying that the atomic submarine

Nautilus was only a test vehicle, not intended for combat use. Wilson denied this report and let it be known he wanted to find out who in the Navy was the source.

Before that there was unhappiness over the report issued by a commission appointed by the Army to recommend on Army reorganization. The report criticized the defense secretary for not taking the secretary of the Army into full confidence on important matters involving the Army.

Against this background is an assertion that the defense secretary holds top authority, transcending that of secretaries of the individual services or their generals or admirals.

It was enunciated in a recent revision to the 1948 Key West agreement, which prescribed the roles and missions of the services and the relationship of the services. Into that agreement there was written a new and specific statement that:

"No function in any part of the Department of Defense, or any of its component agencies, shall be performed independent of the direction authority, and control of the secretary of defense."

The attack came from the Spanish cruise liner Monte Urquiza, which ripped away from her tug escort during a gale in the Thames River and crashed broadside into the stone structure.

Two and a half hours later seven tugs pulled the liner free and hauled her to a drydock for inspection of the damage. Traffic resumed on the river and the bridge.

January Is Month For Armchair Gardening

Now is the time for armchair gardening, Mrs. A. A. Marchant told Garden Club members Tuesday. Mrs. Marchant gave horticultural tips for January at a meeting in the home of Mrs. D. S. Riley, 1708 Johnson.

Mrs. Marchant explained that this is the best time to look over seed catalogues and select varieties for later planting. She urged members to buy the resistant varieties, the newer and improved types that resist wilting and rust.

Another project for the gardener this time of year is to paint and repair garden furniture and fences and to spray trees and rose bushes before they put on their leaves.

Evergreens might be moved now while they are still dormant, she pointed out. Sweet peas should be planted by Feb. 14.

Mrs. Clyde Angel was the main speaker at the meeting. She took her material from a clinic sponsored by the Texas Tech Department of Horticulture and Park Management she attended last spring.

She suggested peat moss to counteract the alkalinity of West Texas soil and recommended grass hay as the best mulch. When using liquid fertilizers and insect sprays it is important not to guess at amounts but to measure carefully, she said.

Flower beds may be soaked at any time during the day, Mrs. Angel reported, but sprinkling should be done only in the morning.

On the subject of "intimate gardening" Mrs. Angel pointed out that gardens are becoming less formal and smaller. Because of airconditioning in homes, we enjoy gardens from the window and

they should be planned with that in mind.

Walls and vines are good to use and pools and fountains add life, to the garden she recalled.

Bell Clams Up In Video Talk With NCAA

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—After one long and expensive courtroom experience, the owners of the 12 National Football League clubs don't want to be dragged into court again over television.

That's why Commissioner Bert Bell has refused to discuss TV restrictions with representatives of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn.

It also is why the club owners decided unanimously yesterday that they would not appeal the ruling handed down by Judge Allan K. Grim of the U. S. District Court last fall.

The possibility of an appeal was discussed at a special session prior to today's start of the annual "draft" of college players. After hearing their lawyers explain the decision, the club owners agreed to abide by it and amended a couple of sections of the league constitution to make it conform.

The government had filed an antitrust suit against the league on the grounds that its rules restricting television broadcasts were in restraint of trade.

Judge Grim's ruling was that it was permissible to protect the gate receipts of a game by blacking out the immediate area in which it was being played. But the NFL cannot control radio broadcasts, nor can it restrict television into a club's home territory when that club is away.

One section added to the constitution yesterday specifies that each club "consents to be bound by the provisions of the final judgment and . . . submits to the jurisdiction of the court."

The effect of the changes in the league's TV rule is to put all territory except that within a 75-mile radius of where a game actually is being played up for grabs. But the club owners indicated that they hardly expected anyone to try to televise an "outside" game into a club's territory when that club was telecasting an "away" game there.

Surveys have indicated that most fans prefer to watch their home club.

As for the recent efforts of the colleges to get together with the pros on television, Bell said that any such discussion of TV controls might be regarded as illegal.

EL PASO (SC) — Gene Majors, ball-hawking junior from Wilburton, Okla., continues to pace the point-making department for the win-hungry Texas Western Miners.

Majors 6-foot transfer from Eastern Oklahoma A&M Junior College, has tallied 149 points in the Miners' 12 games, for an average of 12.4 points per contest. He also leads George McCarty's inexperienced squad in rebounds, with 72.

In second place in the scoring race is another junior college transfer from Big Spring—6-foot, 1-inch Bobby Maines, with 109 markers for a 9.1 average.

Jim Babers, 6-foot-5 soph from Tucuman, N. M., and Billy Gregory, 6-4 freshman from Dimmitt, Texas, are tied in third with 93 points each. Next in line is A. J. Mason, hustling 6-foot frosh from Clovis, N. M., with 74. Mason's 24-point spree paced the Oregidgers to a 75-57 upset win over Arizona University in their last start.

In the free-throw department, the leaders are Gregory; with 31 of 40 for a .775 average; Babers, 25 of 33 for .757; Chuck Gallagher, 18 of 24 for .750; and Majors, 57 of 79 for .721.

Babers has the highest field-goal percentage of the regulars: .414 for 34 goals in 82 attempts. He's followed by Mason (27 of 73 for .369), Gregory (31 of 92 for .336) and Majors (46 of 137 for .335).

Bernie Crimmins Is Granted Interview By Aggie Board

Texas A&M College was still without a football coach Thursday to take over the post vacated by popular Ray George.

And Aggie officials were saying that they had not made up their minds at Wednesday's 12-hour athletic council meeting and that "the field is wide open."

Meanwhile, Southern Methodist signed a new backfield coach to take Dick Todd's place during the spring training season, and East Texas signed an assistant coach to help Sid Sikes.

Dan W. L. Penberthy, chairman of the Aggie athletic council, indicated Texas A&M's problem was far from settled.

"There is a chance the council will meet next week if interviews can be arranged," he said, adding that "spring training very probably will be delayed beyond Feb. 15."

Already spring training at Aggie-land has been delayed from Feb. 1. The athletic council Wednesday talked to Todd, Coach Bernie Crimmins of Indiana, and Mike Michalske, line coach at A&M. Crimmins was in and out of College Station so quickly few knew he was talking to the council.

A person who answered the telephone in the athletic director's office at A&M late Wednesday afternoon said: "No, Mr. Crimmins is not here. He's come and left." Crimmins lost 7 of 9 games in 1953.

Todd talked things over with the council although he had said already he wanted no part of the job. Michalske's status was not announced after the Wednesday conferences.

Harold B. (Bo) Hagen, freshman football coach at Georgia Tech, signed on at SMU for the backfield job. The former All-Southern quarterback at South Carolina will report Feb. 1.

SMU athletic director Matty Bell said he hoped Todd could be back in the fall. Todd said business interests would keep him away in the spring.

Don Fambrough, former Kansas line coach, was named assistant coach at East Texas State Teachers College to work under Sikes.

Sikes, once regarded as having an inside track to the Texas A&M coaching post, was appointed head football coach at ESTC Tuesday. Fambrough is a native of Longview, Tex., where Catfish Smith, former ESTC head coach, has signed a contract to coach at the high school. Smith won 29 straight games at East Texas and tied Arkansas State in the Tangerine Bowl.

Smith's signing at Longview and another development Wednesday, caused a Texas sports writer to remark:

One thing about it, these Texas college coaches had a good chance for advancement. If they made a good college record, they may get a job at some of these oil-rich East Texas high schools."

Smith's salary at Longview has been reported as high as \$9,500. Under regulations of the college regents, he couldn't make more than \$7,500 at a state teachers college. That's the figure Sikes reportedly will get. Fambrough probably will get less.

At Conroe, another oil town, Bob Schulze signed a three-year contract Wednesday night as head football coach and athletic director. His salary—on a nine-month basis—will be \$8,500.

Schulze, who coached Houston's Lamar High to the state Class AAAA title last season, brought along an assistant in Roy H. (Swede) Hill, head football coach in 1953 at Houston's Jeff Davis High. He signed a three-year contract at \$7,500 per year.

Observers said his big league career was shortened by the fact that few catchers could hold his pitches. Fewer still cared to try. His won-lost record, it was acknowledged, would have been much better.

He won 18 and lost 12 decisions, stood third in strikeouts with 152 and had the lowest earned-run average in the league with a 2.60 mark.

Last year, with Portland of the same league, he won five and lost six.

A native of Chanute, Kansas, Ramsdell now makes his home in Kiowa, Kansas.

Willard worked as an attendant at the Big Spring State Hospital here for a time.

He was recommended to Big Spring, then managed by Charley Barnabe, by the late Virgil Smith.

Pay Of Jackie Robinson May Be \$40,000

BROOKLYN (AP)—Jackie Robinson, first Negro in organized baseball, has signed his eighth major league contract with the Brooklyn Dodgers, the club announced today.

He will get a reported \$40,000 for 1954, 10 times more than he made with Montreal in 1946 when he broke the game's color line. The new contract represents a raise of about \$2,000 over last season.

Robinson will be 35 Sunday. He has been a regular since the day he joined the Dodgers. In 1953 he played five positions—76 games in left field, 44 at third base, 9 at second, 6 at first and 1 at short.

Walter Alston, the new Brooklyn manager, has said he doesn't know where Robinson will play this year. "But you can bet he will be in there somewhere," he said. Last season Robinson hit .329, his fifth straight year above .300. His lifetime major league average is .319.

Two other major league regulars signed their contracts yesterday and one balked.

Terrific Ted Kuszewski, slugging first baseman of the Cincinnati Redlegs, came to terms for a reported \$35,000, highest ever paid by the club to any player. Kuszewski hit 40 home runs last season when he batted .316. He received more votes than any other player in the 1953 All-Star Game poll.

Outfielder Sam Mele reached agreement with the Chicago White Sox. He was the 29th Sox player to sign.

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Hunt For Bank Loot Is Turned To Georgia

HOUSTON (U)—A mechanic who plucked \$46,000 from the air conditioning unit of a wrecked car has turned the search for \$57,000 taken in a faked New Year's Eve bank robbery here to Wrens, Ga. Police Chief C. W. Brown of Wrens told Houston authorities by phone the \$46,000 was found after a 1953 Oldsmobile crashed into a telephone pole. Four Savannah, Ga., residents were killed.

The mechanic spotted the stacks of bills while stripping the wreckage for salvage.

"We don't know where the money came from," Brown said.

An FBI spokesman here declared, "We're checking the possibility that the money is part of the Houston loot."

The FBI said some \$10,000 of the money was in \$100 bills, the rest in 20s, 10s and 5s. The loot in the

Houston National Bank job was in small bills.

The wrecked car had not been stolen, the Georgia police chief said.

Meanwhile, one of five persons charged in the bank robbery filed a federal court petition seeking to recover a 1953 Oldsmobile seized in New Orleans by federal authorities.

An attorney for James David Mitchell, 25, claimed in the petition the car was seized unlawfully Jan. 14.

Mitchell is held in Harris County Jail here under \$50,000 bond. He's under federal charges of bank robbery and conspiracy.

Coffee Sales Steady Here

Despite the high price of coffee, grocers here say that sales are just as high as ever. In fact, most say that more coffee is being sold now than before the last price boost.

"All this publicity about prices going up again has caused people to buy up more than they would ordinarily," one grocer said. "Actually sales are as good now as they have ever been."

Coffee is being sold across the counters of Big Spring anywhere from 86 cents to \$1.10 per pound. Dealers here expect another rise in prices in the near future.

Although there has been quite a bit of talk about people substituting tea for coffee because of the price difference, there has apparently been no action along this line.

Most local dealers have noted no large increase in the sale of tea. "It's just about like it always was," one man said. "Winter just isn't the season for tea, and it is the season for coffee."

A pound of tea will make around 100 cups, while a pound of coffee will make between 45 and 50 cups, dealers point out. Price of tea per pound is between \$1.10 and \$1.30. Popular now are the tea bags, which can be purchased in 48 bag containers for around 55 cents.

JERUSALEM (AP)—Since 1949 an armistice line has coiled between Arab and Jew in the Holy Land. It halted a war, but it has brought no peace.

Cutting through the middle of a conflict of emotions and religions, the line has become a guidepost for thieves, saboteurs and murderers on their way to harass the enemy.

"An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth," is the practice on this frontier. An incident leads to retaliation and retaliation to another incident.

The Holy Land has become a place where fishermen on the Sea of Galilee have armed police protection. Shepherds carry rifles instead of crooks. Farmers know how to use machineguns and mortars. The man plowing toward you in the next field may be planning your murder.

There are nearly 600 miles of armistice line separating Israel from Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and Egypt, four of the nations which fought Israel in 1948. Set up in 1949 through the efforts of the United Nations mediator, Dr. Ralph Bunche, the line was expected to be replaced by permanent boundaries under peace treaties within a few months. It has lasted nearly five years now.

There has been bloodshed all along the line, but the real trouble area extends for about 80 miles from the Jordan city of Tulkarm in the north, through Qalqilye, the Latrun Valley, Jerusalem and down to Idna in the south.

On the Israeli side of the border are the greatest concentration of Israel's population and a large proportion of the border settlements it has established, backed up by the Israeli army. On the other side are Jordan's heavy population centers, excepting Amman, and the border outposts of the well-trained and well-equipped Jordanian army, the Arab Legion.

And, mixed in with the population and army at points usually not more than 20 miles from the border and often within walking distance, are most of the 474,000 Palestinian refugees in Jordan. Six years ago the refugees lived on the other side of the border.

At many places in the country the line is marked only by stones painted white. Jewish farmers on one side of the line and Arab farmers on the other may find themselves working with only a patch of weeds between them. At other points, notably in and around Jerusalem, in the Latrun Valley

and in Galilee, there are narrow demilitarized zones between the two countries.

Neither army is able to guard every foot of the frontier between Israel and Jordan. It requires no special cunning to slip across the fields at night and move toward the nearest lights. Some of the Arab refugees in Jordan spent most of their lives in the fields across the border. To them a crossing is as easy as going across a street.

This is called "infiltration." Israeli police say infiltration causes most of the border troubles and is deliberately organized. Authorities in Jordan acknowledge there is a great deal of it and say they are making every effort to stop it.

In the early days after the war, refugees who had buried their money in orange groves or secreted it under a house streamed across the border to recover it. Even now there is an understandable compulsion for refugees to prow around their old villages or to try to get oranges from some of the trees they planted.

Some Arabs with homes on the border can see Jewish farmers cultivating fields taken away from them in the armistice negotiations. Budrus is a small border village near Kibya, where Israeli soldiers destroyed a large part of the town and killed 62 persons in October. The village lands of Budrus were reduced from 3,000 acres to about 1,000 by the armistice.

A large part of an olive grove was taken from the village. The school was put in the demilitarized zone and it was necessary to move the children into a makeshift schoolhouse and pay rent for it. The Arabs in the village formerly sold their vegetables and fruits in Lydda, now four miles away in Israel. There are many other examples of mosques, schools, lands and wells being sliced from villages.

The loss of a piece of land is a tragedy to the Arab farmer. For a piece of land to lie idle in the demilitarized zone or beyond, when it could produce food for the working, is incomprehensible.

In this setting, Maj. Gen. Vagn Bennike, chief of the United Nations truce supervision organization, said recently:

"The present situation on the Israel-Jordan demarcation line is due to a large extent to the problem of infiltration. One of the causes of civilian crossing of the demarcation line is for illegal cultivation. Almost all cases of illegal cultivation with which the Mixed Armistice Commission has had to deal are cases of cultivation by Arabs of lands which have been separated from Arab villages by the armistice demarcation lines."

The illegal traffic across the armistice line is by no means one way. From 1949 through October 1953, Jordan complained that 212 crossings of the line by Israeli military units violated the armistice. Jordan further complained of 32 cases of unarmed crossings.

The pattern is different on the Israeli side. Israel, in the same period, complained of 422 crossings by unarmed individuals or groups, 170 crossings by armed

individuals or groups. These are the infiltrators, armed and unarmed. Israel made 58 complaints of crossings by military units.

There has been some calculated or inadvertent incitation to trouble by the new proprietors of former Arab orange groves, one United Nations official said. Near Qalqilye, he said, Israeli farmers harvested the oranges from groves owned by Arabs, then stacked the crates in full view of the Arabs. The Arabs "naturally felt they should go and get some," he added. "In a few cases ambushes have been laid near such orange groves."

Israel has a string of agricultural settlements along the border, all armed for trouble. The settlements often are manned by ex-soldiers and their size is a military secret. Women are trained to use rifles. One small settlement had rifles, machine guns and mortars.

Israeli authorities acknowledge that these soldier-farmers sometimes take the law in their own hands. An official commented: "It is difficult for them to sit by idle after getting established with many difficulties and see their cows, fruit or irrigation pipe stolen or, sometimes, a friend killed."

Many of these Israeli farmers are refugees themselves, having fled from persecution in Europe. Lt. Mohammed Barghouty of the Arab Legion, a member of the Jordan-Israel Mixed Armistice Commission, calls the border incidents "a part of high Israeli policy."

"Without them," he said, "Israel would get no aid from the United States. Most of the aid for Israel comes from American Jews and they must be convinced that Israel is at war with the Arabs. When the borders have been quiet for a time, they always start trouble."

Lt. Barghouty also charged that Israel is undergoing a "serious crime wave" and many crimes traced to the border by Israeli police actually were committed by Israeli criminals. Abraham Eelinger, head of the Israeli Criminal Investigation Department, denied the existence of a crime wave. Police statistics show 13,000 seri-

ous crimes in 1953 compared with 4,292 in 1948, but Israel's population has about doubled in that period. Police statistics show that 239 Arab infiltrators were captured in October and November while 436 escaped across the border.

The Israeli Knesset (Parliament) is considering legislation which would set up special army courts to deal with infiltrators and provide life sentences for armed marauders. Unarmed infiltrators would be subject to five-year sentences.

Dr. Abraham Biran, Israeli commissioner for the Jerusalem district, asserts infiltration could be greatly reduced if Jordanian authorities would cooperate. Investigation and pursuit are now stopped at the armistice line, he said.

Many Arabs, he said, even risk crossing the line to buy bread in Israel, where it is cheaper. Minor adjustments of the line, putting wells and cemeteries back in their villages, also could be made, he said. "If the Arabs only would sit down and talk it over."

Man In Jail After Spotted On TV By Viewer In Texas

NEW CITY, N.Y. (AP)—George Carl Poper was in jail without bail today on a fugitive charge, all because someone in Texas spotted him on a recent television show.

State police arrested 30-year-old Poper yesterday on a complaint that he is wanted in Travis County, Tex., on an embezzlement charge. Officials said that Poper, father of four, admitted a criminal record but denied having committed any offense in Texas.

A justice of the peace ordered him held for 30 days after being informed that Texas officials plan to start extradition proceedings immediately.

On Jan. 11 Poper and his wife appeared on the "Strike It Rich" television network show in New

York. He said that he was destitute and needed help. Since the TV show, the Popers have been living near Spring Valley, N.Y.

State Police Corp. Clarence Sullivan said Poper after being picked up admitted he twice had served time for burglary.

Officers said his wife appeared genuinely surprised at learning Poper had a criminal record. The couple have 10-month-old twins; a boy, 3, and a girl, 2.

Gun Case Postponed

DALLAS (AP)—The second trial of Thurman Randle and Tom D. Park Dallas gun dealers accused of smuggling guns and ammunition into Mexico has been postponed to the March term of federal court. Their trial originally had been set to begin next Monday.

Pen Manufacturer Gives In To Uncle

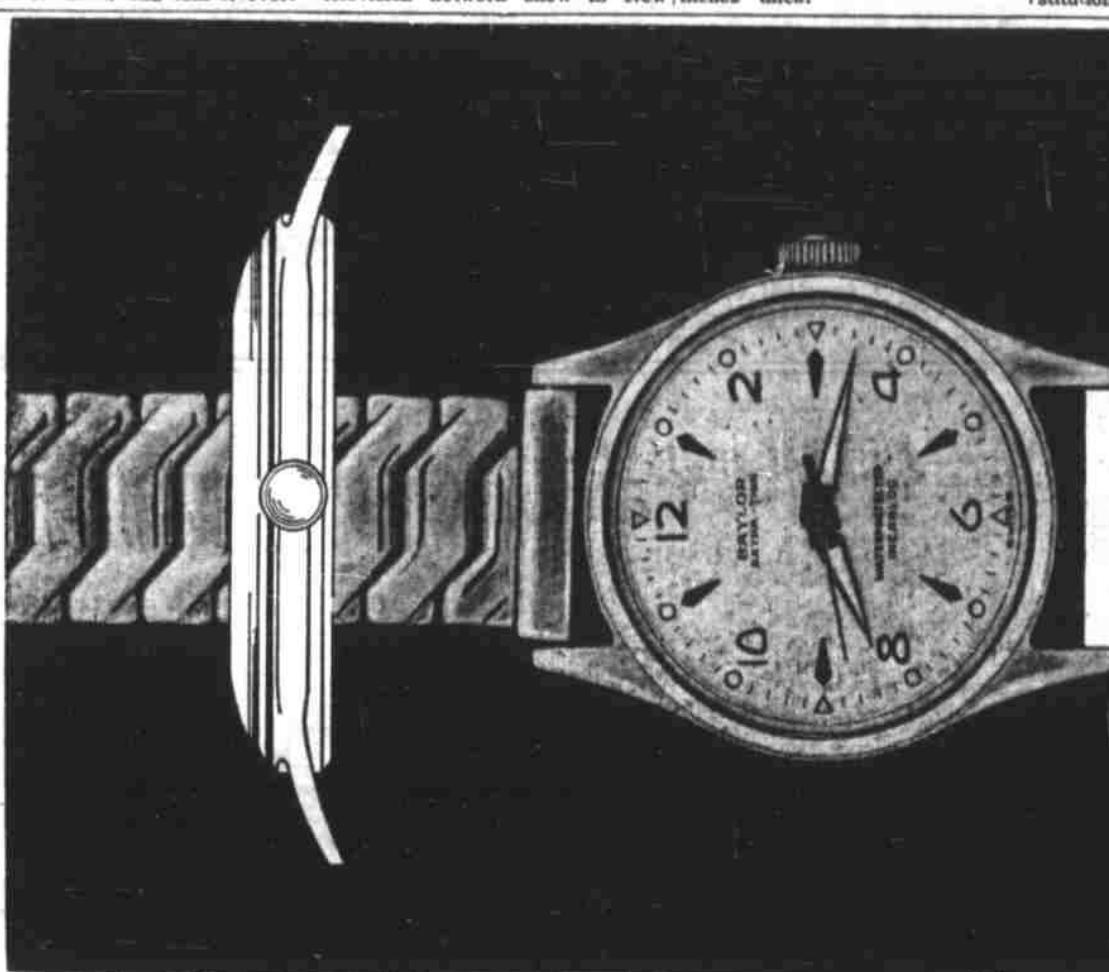

Fort Worth Approves \$15-Million Bond Issue

FORT WORTH (AP)—A fifteen-million-dollar bond issue for expansion and improvement of Fort Worth's water and sewer facilities was approved in a special election Tuesday.

The vote was light compared to recent city elections. The \$10,000,000 water bond proposal polled 4,002 for the 2,978 against and the \$5,000,000 sewer bond proposal polled 3,922 for and 2,904 against.

17 Irrigation Wells Are Added In 1953

STANTON (SC)—With 17 new irrigation wells developed in Martin County during 1953, for an average water production of 400 gallons per minute, another 950 acres was brought under this type of farming, according to Martin Vavra, work unit conservatist with the Soil Conservation Service.

This brings the total irrigated acreage in Howard, Martin, Midland and Glasscock counties to something in excess of 13,220 acres, Vavra said, with substantially all of it in Martin County.

Vavra expressed some doubt on the accuracy of the attached charts, explaining that some wells have been developed that were not reported in past years, and that there is also the possibility that some other wells have been abandoned.

He said that during 1954 the Soil Conservation Service plans to make an accurate count on the number of wells, on GPM production, on the number of acres under irrigation in the four counties. Vavra said, however, that the attached charts are as accurate as any record available at this time, and that until the proposed SCS survey is completed the figures given here

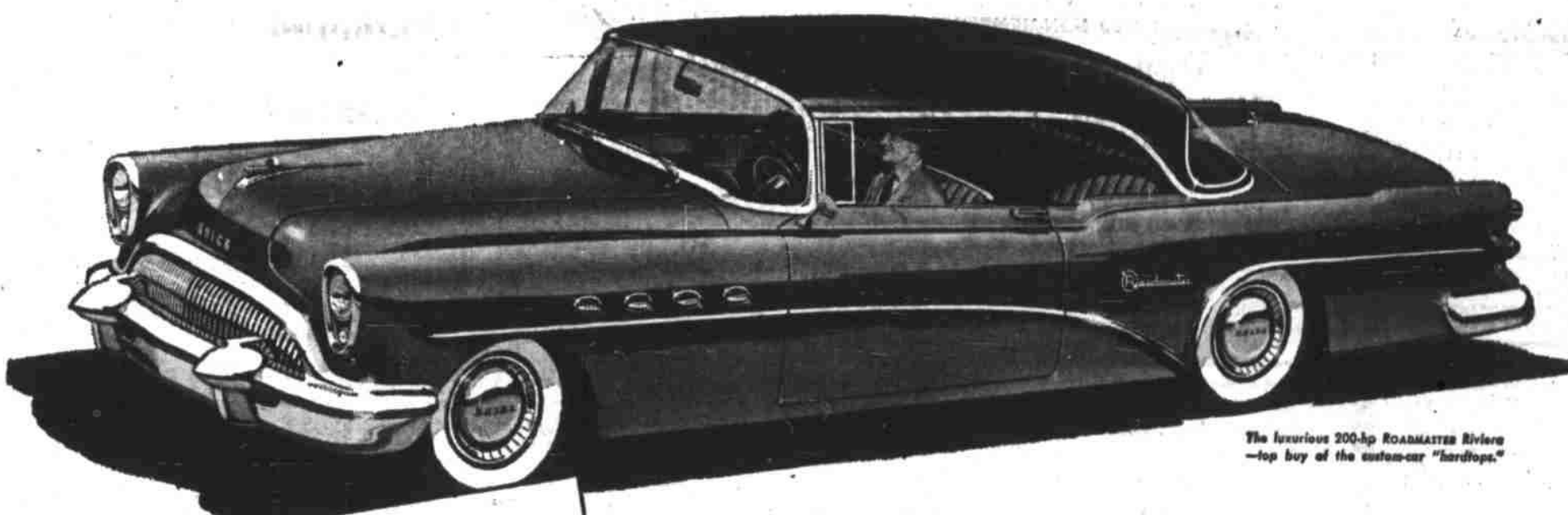
can properly be used even though they do not include possible well productions in Howard, Glasscock and Midland counties either in 1953 or before.

He said that of the 17 Martin County wells developed this past year, two will be used for flood irrigation and the other 15 will be used with sprinklers. He said two of the wells are exceeding 500 GPM production, while the other 15 are running between 300 and 400 GPM and that it is because of this lower production that the sprinkler systems are being used.

In 1954, Vavra says, he thinks the irrigation farmers will concentrate their water on their cotton land which will be a smaller average than they were watering in 1953, and that, consequently, they will do a better job of watering. He says that last year several farmers spread their water too thin, over too large an area rather than concentrating it on less land. He says that those farmers who sought to irrigate too large an area with their limited supply suffered a loss in crop production. He says several wells have been drilled in Martin County this month and that still others have been staked.

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Frost In Brazil Hits Coffee Supply, Already In Shortage

You know about the coffee increase? There's a simple, direct reason for it: the cost of the raw product, green coffee, has gone up.

That's the United States is emphasizing, since its members, too, are concerned about a situation over which they don't have any control. Since all coffee is imported, the domestic industry is one that processes, packages, markets and distributes the coffee. And, this industry's margin of profit is at its slimmest level. As green coffee went up, coffee companies have had to increase their price.

And why did green coffee go up? Last July and August, frost severely damaged millions of coffee trees in Brazil, the world's largest source of coffee. The country is now entering the aftermath of that damage. The effect is pronounced because of an already tight situation in supply and demand of coffee.

Annual world consumption is now a little over 33,000,000 bags of 132 pounds each. In the present crop year, which began on July 1st, 1953, the world is producing only 32,000,000 bags. In fact, the world has been using more coffee than it produced ever since the 1946-47 crop year. In only three crop years out of the past 13 was there a surplus.

The extra demand was met by drawing on reserve stocks. Those stocks are now gone. That is why the frost damage is being felt so keenly. Brazil hoped to get 16,500,000 bags this year. Only 14,100,000 will be harvested.

The aftermath of the frost will continue to be felt for a while. Trees affected will not be back to normal production for one or two years.

Why didn't coffee production keep pace with consumption? The reasons go back to changing conditions in the world, and in the producing countries.

In the early 1920's, coffee demand ran ahead of supply. Growers planted millions of new trees. By the 1930's, output was far ahead of consumption. With the depression, all commodity prices broke. Huge coffee stocks could not be sold at any price. Coffee farmers began to shift to other, more profitable products.

World War II shut off European markets, and Brazilian growers uprooted coffee trees to plant other crops. From 1934 to 1953, the number of producing coffee trees in Brazil fell one-third. Many of the two billion trees left are so old they only bear lightly.

Beginning in 1942, low price levels and surplus stocks of coffee in Brazil were accompanied by a great increase in U. S. consumption. Late in World War II production on the way down met consumption on the way up. But in the years since, except for the 1946-47 season, more coffee was used than was produced.

Recently Europe, too, has been seeking more coffee. Her coffee imports increased by 11.7 per cent in 1952.

In spite of the tight supply-demand situation, American consumers will have adequate supplies of coffee. This assurance comes from Joao Pacheco Chaves, president of the Brazilian Coffee Institute. In a recent press statement, Chaves said Brazil is giving special attention to coffee exports for the U. S. market, even to the extent of foregoing European orders to meet American demand.

Vaccinations For Sinus Trouble Work For Some

NEW YORK (U) — Vaccinations against chronic sinus trouble work for some people, a medical team reports after years of study.

The vaccine treatment banished the sinus trouble in four persons for as long as 3 to 18 years. It improved others, sometimes immensely, but failed in two cases.

The method used a vaccine prepared from the types of bacteria found in the sinuses, Dr. Hugh M.

Kinghorn, Dr. George E. Wilson and Morris Dworski, B. S., of Saranac Lake, N. Y., write in the American Medical Assn.'s Archives of Otolaryngology.

Bacteria recovered from the sinuses are identified and grown in pure cultures. From these are prepared a sterile solution containing the germs, and a filtrate or solution of the liquid in which they were grown.

Each patient is tested with tiny injections first to learn whether he is sensitive to the vaccine and filtrate. Only those who show sensitivity—such as a red wheel rising from an injection of dilute vaccine—are likely to benefit.

Treatment consists of repeated injections under the skin of vaccine and filtrate, starting with small doses, which are gradually increased. Injections are given about once a week for four to six months, and another series may

Eight other patients were improved, seven to a great degree, and four have remained permanently improved. Two of the 16 stayed free for up to 18 years, while two relapsed.

Husband Adds Final Touch To Enchiladas

The typical male desire for meat and a husband's culinary ingenuity led to a succulent and different recipe for enchiladas.

Mrs. W. E. Gibson's enchiladas were good enough but when Mr. Gibson wanted to add meat to them she left it up to him. The result of his experimenting is below.

The Gibsons reside at 1908 11th St. The family includes three children.

He is a mechanical engineer with Cossden. On the side he likes to barbecue things on the charcoal grill he received at Christmas.

When she isn't busy at home Mrs. Gibson likes to read. She belongs to the Woman's Forum and the Washington P.T.A.

These enchiladas of the Gibsons are perfect for cool weather. And another thing—they are easy to make up ahead and then put in the oven at the last minute. And for company meals they're hard to beat.

ENCHILADAS

Ingredients:
1 pound ground beef
1 medium onion (chopped fine)
1 tablespoon chili powder
1/4 cup catsup
3 tablespoons steak sauce
1 tablespoon Worcestershire

Salt and pepper to taste
1 small can chili
1 small can enchilada sauce
1 package tortillas
Grated longhorn cheese

Method:
Heat chili and enchilada sauce together in sauce pan. Put ground beef and chopped onion in skillet, cook until done but do not brown. Add salt, pepper and chili powder and mix. Add catsup, steak sauce and Worcestershire sauce. Mix well. Add just enough flour to hold mixture together. Remove from heat. Place small amount of fat or oil in skillet. Place tortilla in fat just a minute to soften, do not fry too long or tortilla will become crisp and break in rolling. Use a very low fire. More fat may be added as needed. Place a heaping tablespoon of beef mixture on softened tortilla and roll. Place in baking dish. Makes approximately 12 enchiladas. Cover with grated cheese and pour the chili and enchilada sauce mixture over the top and place in oven set at 400 degrees for 20 minutes.

Mrs. Gibson likes to serve her enchiladas with a tossed salad and crackers.

Go Exotic With Chinese Spareribs

You can cook an exotic dish—one that everyone will adore—without too much trouble at all. No hard-to-find ingredients needed for this delicious main course! Just pick up a couple of slices of good old-fashioned fresh pork spareribs and a tumbler or jar of pineapple preserves at your market and you have the two important components. Add a green pepper, some red wine vinegar, brown sugar, cornstarch and salt, and you are all set for Chinese-style spareribs in a sweet-and-sour sauce.

When we tried it, we put the spareribs in a large oblong roasting pan in a slow oven in the late part of the afternoon. They cooked and browned beautifully while we entertained a caller at tea. Only once—halfway through the baking period—did we go back into the kitchen, and that was to turn the ribs. They were done to a turn about half an hour before supper, when we took them out of the oven. We poured off the fat in the bottom of the roasting pan, cut the ribs into easy-to-manage pieces, returned them to the pan and left them on top of the range while we made the sauce. When everyone was ready to sit down, we simply heated the ribs in the sauce.

If you like, you can bake the spareribs in the morning while you are doing clean-up chores and also make the sauce at that time. Then you can heat and serve ribs and sauce in a chafing dish, or in a good-looking saucepan or skillet that can go right on the table.

Steam plenty of rice to serve with this dish. There's ample sauce with the ribs, and its flavor will delight your tasters. The pineapple preserves that give this sauce its piquancy, are widely available and of excellent quality.

What else goes on this menu? As a first course, we like clear chicken soup with crisp salted

Old Type Lemon Pie Hard To Beat

Old-fashioned lemon flavor is what we've been hankering after. So we baked ourselves a pie. You know the kind—rich with butter, eggs and sugar tasting of fresh lemon juice and a bit of the tangy rind. Maybe the filling is a little runnier than the cornstarch variety—but oh the flavor!

When it comes to the meringue we admit a modern touch. We sprinkle moist shredded coconut over the fluffy topping for a tasty taste and a glamor look.

One piece of advice about adding the meringue to the pie: place spoonfuls of it around the edge of the filling and carefully press right to the crust all the way around. Then pile the remaining meringue in the center and spread lightly to cover pie completely. When you are cutting your pie use a wet knife and the meringue will slice easily and prettily.

OLD-FASHIONED LEMON PIE

Ingredients:
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
2 whole eggs
2 egg yolks
6 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
1 to 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind

One 9-inch baked pastry shell
Coconut Meringue

Method:
Cream butter and sugar together in top of double boiler. Add whole eggs, egg yolks and lemon juice; mix thoroughly. Place over hot (not boiling) water; stirring constantly cook until thick. Stir in lemon rind. Chill; pour into cooled baked pastry shell. Top with Coconut Meringue; bake in hot (400F) oven about 7 minutes or until meringue peaks are golden brown.

COCONUT MERINGUE

Ingredients:
2 egg whites
4 tablespoons sugar
1/4 cup moist shredded coconut (cut in short lengths)

Method:
Beat egg whites until frothy throughout. Gradually beat in sugar, a little at a time. Continue beating until mixture is stiff enough to hold peaks that do not curl when beater is slowly withdrawn and inverted.

Molasses Brown Bread Is Variation

Steamed brown bread, fragrant and sweet with unadorned molasses and topped with butter is a variation on the bread theme.

This homemade treat calls for meal and rolled oats. The easy-to-make bread mixture is turned into empty vegetable or fruit cans and steamed in a large kettle.

MOLASSES BROWN BREAD

Ingredients:
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup quick rolled oats
2 cups corn meal
1 cup unsifted molasses
2 cups sour milk
1 cup raisins

Method:
Sift together flour, soda, and salt. Add quick rolled oats and corn meal; reserve 1/4 cup in which to coat raisins. Stir in unsifted molasses and sour milk. Mix raisins with 1/4 cup dry mixture; add to batter and mix well. Turn into 4 greased No. 2 cans filling each two-thirds full. Cover with metal foil or 2 layers of brown paper tied in place with a strong cord. Place on rack in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; pour boiling water in kettle to approximately one-third of the height of the can. Steam 2 hours. Yield: 4 loaves.

These Hints Help You Be On Time

Plan a week's meals in advance so you can do as much shopping and food preparation as possible at one time.

Prepare for a busy morning by setting breakfast table at night before putting away dinner dishes.

Have a supply of flavoring salts on your pantry shelf for adding a dash of seasoning to a recipe.

Boil more potatoes than you need for one meal so you'll have some on hand in the refrigerator for making hashed-brown or home-fried potatoes in a hurry.

Keep pencil, paper, string, needle and rubber bands in the kitchen.

Take butter out of refrigerator a few minutes before you want to spread it on sandwiches in order to soften it.

Squash And Rice

A super delicious and heartily different main dish is made by stuffing cooked acorn squash with a mixture of rice, cooked ham or sausage, onion, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco sauce, and some milk. The squash and the filling are covered with bread crumbs and dotted with butter or margarine before being baked in a moderate oven until lightly browned. This dish is extra good served with a cheese sauce.

Quick Main Dish

Here is a quick and easy main dish which is a topnotcher for superb taste! Heat together one can of condensed cream of mushroom soup and one-half cup of milk. Add about 2 cups cooked turkey or chicken which has been diced. Allow to cook until piping hot. Serve this creamed mixture over hot rice to which some cooked green peas and diced pimientos have been added. Really, really good!

Embellish Steak With Onion Dish

A juicy, succulent steak needs no embellishments in order to cause a mouth watering reaction, but its flavor can undoubtedly be enhanced with just the right vegetable. What could be more tempting than a steaming bowl of plump, white onions served in a delicate mushroom cream sauce?

Gilded Onions With Mushrooms

Ingredients:
6 tablespoons vitaminized margarine
1 1/2 pounds small white onions

1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon sugar
Several lettuce or cabbage leaves
2 tablespoons cream
1/4 cup sliced canned mushrooms
1/4 cup mushroom liquor

Method:

Place margarine in saucepan. Add peeled onions and sprinkle with salt and sugar. Rinse lettuce in cold water and cover onions completely with leaves. Cover pan and cook over low heat 20 to 30 minutes. (When done, onions will be firm but tender.) Discard leaves, add cream, mushrooms and liquor. Heat until mushrooms and sauce are hot. Serves 6.

Baking Easy With Package Frostings

Cake baking can be simplified with packaged frostings.

PENUCHE FUDGE FROSTING

4 tablespoons butter or margarine
4 tablespoons cold water
1 package quick fudge mix (chocolate or penuche)
Keep water boiling in bottom of double boiler. Into top part put butter and water. When butter has melted add contents of package of

quick fudge mix. Stir 3 to 4 minutes or until glossy. Do not beat. Frost cake immediately.

Variations are using orange juice and rind or crushed pineapple in place of the water.

Satin beige icing, a variation of the well-known seven-minute favorite, is ideal for topping spice cake although it is more trouble than uncooked frostings.

SATINY BEIGE ICING

Mix together in small saucepan 1 1/4 cups brown sugar 1/4 cup white corn syrup and 2 tablespoons water. Boil rapidly to 243 degrees (mixture spins a 6 to 8-inch thread or few drops will form a firm ball when dropped into cold water). When mixture begins to boil

start beating 1/4 cup egg whites (2 small). Beat until stiff enough to hold a peak. Pour hot syrup in a thin steady stream into beaten egg whites. Beat constantly with rotary or electric beater until icing stands in very stiff peaks. Fold in 1 teaspoon vanilla.

'Headaches' Are Shipped From Three-Story Factory

KANSAS CITY (AP)—They ship headaches by the million from an elongated three-story factory here. Whether you live in the heart of New York City or are the lone taxpayer in Ahimsanstown, Pa., chances are you're on their mailing list.

For the headache they specialize in here is the federal income tax form.

The forms are mailed from a one-time aircraft engine plant in an industrial area south of Kansas City. The Internal Revenue Service calls the quarter-mile-long plants its processing branch.

For nearly three months, part of the 1,000 employees of the branch are engaged in a super tongue-lolling job of attaching addresses to the various forms sent directly to taxpayers.

The staggering task is done on 60-hand-fed machines which attach labels that were part of your return after the revenue service audited it last year.

For the statistically minded

(and who isn't at income time?) here are some figures:
The branch sends out some 74 million forms.

Stacked, the booklet-type forms would tower 29 miles into the air.

To mail, they require 125 railroad cars, 25 of the largest highway trucks and weigh in the neighborhood of 3,400 tons.

It takes 88,000 mailbags to carry them.

To paste the names of 55 million taxpayers on the outside of the returns, the machines use 2,800 gallons of adhesive.

In the 1950 census Florida had 1,072,000 more people than in 1940.

2 cups sifted cake flour
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon each Cinnamon and Cloves

1 1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar

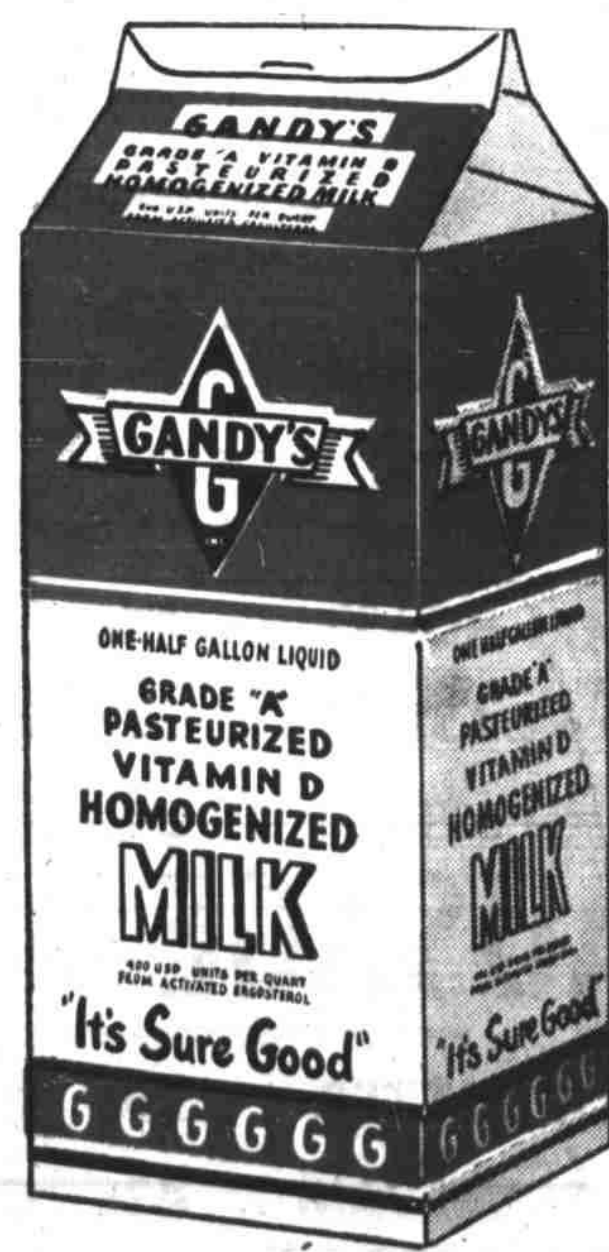
