Electrical Problem Delays Launch

The cameras were ready, the writers were ready but the rocket wasn't and some 200 newsmen and spectators waited over four hours for a five-second performance from the Percheron rocket that never came.

The day began with television cameras, soundmen and newsmen, along with

newspaper reporters and photographers, boarding the 80-foot charter boat Scat Cat at the Rockport City Marina and departing on a two-hour boat trip through Aransas Bay, up the Intracoastal Waterway and across Matagorda Bay to a private dock on the north end of Matagorda Island.

The news crews and invited guests disembarked at the dock and boarded two

buses that had been brought in from Corpus Christi earlier and began the second leg of the trip, a seven mile bus ride through the ranch complex of Toddie Lee Wynne Sr. and on down a blacktop road to pasture number six of this isolated working ranch.

During the half-hour bus ride that moved at the pace of an unorganized parade, cameramen hung out of doors and windows trying to get the first glimpse of the rocket.

As the buses came to a halt in pasture number six, the newspeople climbed out to view the 55-foot Percheron rocket perched atop a 20-foot launch tower.

The launch site occupies a small portion of the working ranch owned by Toddie Lee Wynne and American Liberty Oil Company. The ranch consists of more than

6,000 acres of low lying pasture land, roads and landing strips and a fleet of fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters.

Several ranch houses, barns and a small oasis of trees, surrounded by a freshly painted white fence, make up the main ranch area that sits on the Matagorda Bay.

At the launch site technicians were busily making last minute preparations, laborers worked to complete a drainage ditch around the base of the launch stand to carry away the massive volume of water that would be needed to cool the launch pad during the firing and an alligator lay motionless in a nearby pond, wondering what was about to happen to his heretofore peaceful world.

**Absentee Voting Ends
In Navigation Election**

Absentee voting in Aransas County's upcoming Navigation District elections ends Tuesday, August 4.

As of deadline Thursday, 21 persons had cast absentee ballots for the election in the office of County Clerk Ruby Hart. Absentee voting is for those who will be out of the county on the regular August 8 election day, who are age 65 or over and/or who are physically unable to go to the polls.

Ten candidates are vying for the five places on the Navigation District board, with only one candidate — Hillis Dominguez seeking re-election for Pct. 2 — running unopposed.

Biggest race is in Pct. 4-4A where Danny Cox, Kirk Holman and John Dzerk are all vying for the commissioner's post. No incumbent is seeking re-election in this race.

The at-large post is also a race between newcomers, with Hal B. McKnight and Dr. J.M. Shellenberger in contention.

In the remaining two races, incumbents are seeking re-election against challengers. In Pct. 1-1A, the newcomer is Gail Driver against incumbent David Maguglin. In Pct. 3, incumbent Bobby Landrum has drawn opposition from Homer V. Faber.

**Palm Tree
Blacks Out
Rockport**

A palm tree growing against power lines around Live Oak and Orleans finally took its toll, resulting in a power outage that affected most of Rockport Wednesday afternoon, July 29.

Joel Zapata, manager of Central Power & Light, said an area from just south of Fulton to a little distance south of Rockport was affected by the 12-minute blackout that occurred about 12:30 p.m.

Affected areas included Harbor Oaks, Little Bay and Key Allegro as well as downtown Rockport.

Zapata said a palm tree has been growing against power lines "finally" rubbed through the insulation around the wires and blew some line fuses.

Power was restored around 12:45 p.m.

**Chamber Of Commerce
Feeds Hungry Crew**

What consumes 100 pounds of boiled shrimp, three trays-fuls of sandwiches and 200 cans of soft drinks — in addition to cheese, fruit and an uncounted quantity of coffee?

According to Pat Brown, president of Rockport's Chamber of Commerce, it's a boatload of press and television news people on their way to — or coming back from — the rocket test.

Brown, three other Chamber directors and Chamber Manager Carolyn Behee accompanied the Scat Cat as it left Rockport Tuesday for Matagorda Island and the rocket launch site.

With them went the 200 cans of soft drinks, coffee, three "bakery-sized" trays of sandwiches, two large cheese and olive trays, crackers, fruit trays with a sweetened sour cream dip and 100 pounds of boiled shrimp — all to feed the members of the press going out to watch the rocket test.

"These people were doing something for Rockport," Brown said. "We wanted to do something for them."

He added that the food and drinks were "very well received" — so well, in fact, that the Chamber is planning to serve sweet rolls and coffee on the trip out to

Matagorda on the proposed August 12 launch date.

Other Chamber directors going out Tuesday were Donna Knox, Jerry Beattie and Bill Mayhood. Money for most of the food and drinks came from donations, Brown said: \$100 each from First National and Live Oak State banks and \$116 from "passing the hat" at a recent meeting of Rockport's Rotary Club.

The shrimp was a donation from L.E. Casterline in Fulton.

Brown added that a "special thanks" was owed to Barbara Weaver and members of her family who prepared the cheese and made the sandwiches.

Brown added that once the Scat Cat got to Matagorda Island, he learned that the people working at the launch site hadn't eaten anything, so Chamber representatives went back to the boat for what remained of the sandwiches and shrimp to feed the workers.

"It was really worth it," he says of Tuesday's experience. Referring to the fact that two boatloads of media people are scheduled to go out to the launch site on August 12, Brown added, "If there's room for us, we'll have people (and food) on both boats."

**Commissioners Get
Ultimatum From ERA**

Chuck Johnson, representative of the ERA Helicopter Service, presented the Aransas County Commissioners' Court with an ultimatum at the courts last meeting, Wednesday, July 29, and the court accepted it.

ERA, one of five helicopter services leasing at the Aransas County Airport, presented the court with a request to move the operation site from its present location to one at the east end of the airport, near Highway 35 North. The request ran counter to the Airport Board of Director's original choice of a relocation site for ERA. The board had requested, that, upon relocation, the helicopter service move to an area at the south end of the airport.

Johnson, from ERA's home office in Louisiana, told the court that this site was far too sandy for the heliport and explained the "disastrous" effects of sand in jet engines.

Johnson termed the area requested better suited to a heliport site since it had, as he said, "better turf."

Supporting Johnson at the court's meeting was Tony Thorne, member of the Airport Board and Rip Collins, vice-president and general manager of Rockport Aviation, operator of the airport. Thorne told the court that since

the board's first decision, two members had changed their minds on the ERA heliport site.

Justice of the Peace Bill Walston, also a member of the board, was present and challenged Thorne's statement about two members changing their mind on the decision. Walston also said, regarding Johnson's reference to "better turf," "That's a complete fallacy — there's no good turf anywhere out there. It's all too sandy."

Walston also said he felt that with a site near the highway, the approach pattern for helicopters would be potentially dangerous, in addition to presenting a noise problem.

Johnson then told the court he disagreed with Walston on both points, and requested that the matter be decided "as expeditiously as possible."

When asked if another site would be acceptable to ERA, Johnson told the court "Absolutely not. We won't move on this decision. We get our spot or won't operate out of this airport." Johnson then added that the company was flexible about a site anywhere on the highway side, but reiterated that he would consider no other area.

After some discussion County Judge John Wendell advised the court to take a (See ULTIMATUM, Page 12)

Woman To See Brother After 50 Years

The last time Pecola Herron saw her brother, John T. Cameron, he was 22 years old.

This coming weekend, the Rockport woman will be seeing her brother again, after a gap of 52 years during which she — and the other members of her family — had given him up as dead.

"I don't know how I felt," she says of the day, not too long ago, when she learned that her brother was, indeed, alive. "I had butterflies and everything else! I don't know . . ." she mused slowly "I guess I had a feeling someday he'd reappear."

Cola (the name she's best known by), her other sisters and brothers and "everybody that ever knew him (the returning brother)" are planning to be at the reunion celebration Saturday, August 8.

"We expect around 175-200 people," Cola said. Family and friends will meet Cameron at Corpus Christi's airport where he's arriving from Wilmington, Delaware, then everyone is going to South Gulf Park in Corpus for a picnic.

Family members — all of Cola's brothers and sisters are still living — are coming from throughout Texas for the affair. One brother is coming from Pecos, another from Houston, sisters are coming from San Antonio and Dallas.

At the time Cola's brother disappeared, the family was living in Bloomington. "We

had a cousin visiting from Detroit, Michigan," she said during the recent interview at her residence on Verne Street, "and he broke his arm."

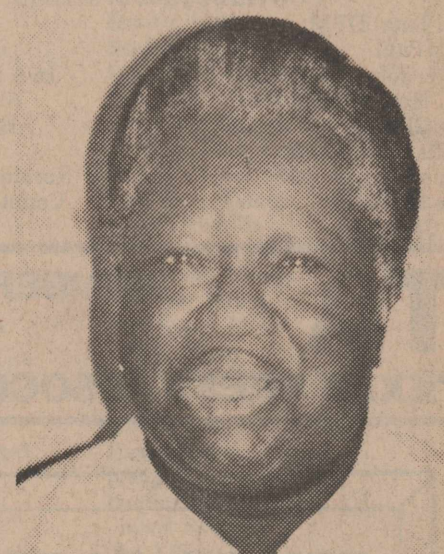
John Cameron volunteered to drive the cousin back home. "He was to return right away on a bus," Cola recalls, "but he never did. He wrote once or twice a year, every time from a different place. Finally, in 1932, he just dropped out of sight."

Over the years, the family adjusted to their missing brother's absence and went about the business of living. Cola eventually came to Rockport — about 35 years ago.

"I came here cookin' at restaurants," she says. "I cooked at every restaurant in town almost, until I retired from that." For the last 16 or 17 years, she's worked as cook at Jimmy Sorenson's residence.

After coming to Rockport, she met Lucky Herron and the two will celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary this month. (Cola adds she'll celebrate her 70th birthday on August 26.) "I'm beginning to feel it a little bit," she said of her age.) Asked about children, she says, "I have two that I raised, Joe and Danny Brooks." Her home on Verne is filled with trophies the two garnered over the years.

As to how the family found their missing brother — that started with a sister in Corpus Christi, Cola said. "She read an (See REUNION, Page 12)

Postal Waste

Dear Editor:
I am writing to apprise you of an egregious waste of citizen funds in one of the most affluent areas in the country.

The U.S. Postal Service, which recently increased stamp prices from 15 cents to 18 cents and plans to go to 20 or 23 cents, is about to start building what amounts to a resort training site in my State Legislative District in Potomac, Maryland.

The site is within two miles of Congressional Country Club, Burning Tree Country Club and Bethesda Country Club in what Federal District Court Judge Harold Greene called "an enclave of exclusivity," where the average income is \$45,000.

There, the Postal Service spent \$6+ million dollars for eighty acres of land in a residential area next to homes selling for \$300,000 and \$700,000.

The first thing the Service did was put in a cocktail lounge. An Olympic-size swimming pool and large gymnasium were already on the property. The Service's environmental assessment statement says they plan to build eight tennis courts, a jogging trail, and a 22,000 square foot recreational area.

The training resort director Dr. Buttz said a par three golf course is also planned. Selected postal supervisors from around the country will come for six-week periods by air and \$25 taxi rides. No public transportation will be available to the panoramic vistas of this "Taj Mahal" postal training resort.

It is an outrageous example of Government waste.

While the "cash-on-the-barrelhead" price for construction is \$28.3 million, the Service will finance it over a period of years, bringing construction costs to well over \$50 million, including interest. Our stamp increases will pay the bill.

The land and golden-domed building on it already, which puts "Tara" to shame, was purchased by the Service on October

2, 1980, just before the election without any public hearings. To me, this project is the epitome of Government extravagance — and it is within 10 miles of the White House!

I was one of a handful of Maryland-elected Republicans who supported President Reagan in last year's primaries. I still strongly support him.

Nevertheless, this postal training resort violates his pledge to root out government waste. Hopefully, your many readers will write the President and their Congressmen to protest.

BOLGER CONSIDERS 23-CENT STAMP

CINCINNATI (UPI) — U.S. Postmaster General William F. Bolger says it is possible the price of a first-class stamp would climb to 23 cents next year.

Bolger, in Cincinnati yesterday to address a National Postal Forum convention, complained the recent jump to an 18-cent stamp isn't producing enough revenue.

"One thing for sure," he said, "somewhere this year we'll probably have to propose an increase in rates again. And if we file for another rate case, you're probably talking of a 22- or 23-cent stamp. That wouldn't take effect until late next year."

Bolger, who is unhappy the commission rejected his request for a 20-cent stamp earlier this year, defended the possible five-cent increase, saying "You don't make a rate case just for today. You try to project for a two- or three-year cycle. We'll have to look at inflation and labor negotiations and then project what our costs will be."

If Bolger does request a 22- or 23-cent stamp, it will

have to be approved by the Postal Rate Commission, which then must send it on to the Postal Service governors.

"The question is whether you're going to live within your income or not, and we can't," Bolger said. "It's just impossible. We've been left with a \$1 billion shortfall from the 18-cent rate instead of the 20-cent rate."

Bolger also issued a strong anti-strike declaration in anticipation of the expiration of postal employee union contracts July 20.

"It's illegal to strike, it's illegal to call for a strike," he said. "If there is a work stoppage, I'll move in quickly to see that the people are required to obey the law. If they don't, they will be fired."

"Secondly, if we do not have the ability to provide the services that the law requires us to provide, I would take steps to lift restrictions on the private carriage of mail. If we can't provide the service people want, then I would allow other people to provide it. I think that's my responsibility, my obligation under the law and I wouldn't hesitate to do it."

In fact, my husband was told, upon inquiring, that the person who waited on us didn't know if there had ever been a box of 100 sheet protectors at this price. She apparently had not seen them.

I am accustomed to glancing at some of today's advertising (indeed, most of it) with a cynical eye. Yet I find myself shocked that a newspaper would indulge in this type of false advertising. Shocked, for I regard your industry as one protected under First Amendment rights; an industry that produces persons willing to suffer prison in order to guard those rights and the freedom to guard the sources that produce the truth as reported!

Surely you diminish the luster of your profession and the ethics of your industry when you permit such ads under your, The Pilot's, logo.

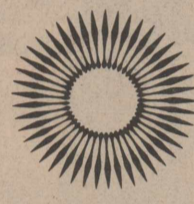

SOLAR FACTS

LANDSCAPING THE SOLAR HOME

Landscaping has long been used to add to the beauty of a home as well as for shading and wind protection. In the Plains states, early pioneers often used plantings of various evergreens such as pine, hemlock and fir along the west and north perimeters of their homes to provide a windbreak.

Today, in the era of solar energy homes, landscaping has taken on a new importance. With areas of glass, particularly on the south-facing wall of the structure, proper landscaping is essential to the occupants' comfort during the summer months. It can also help in colder weather.

An especially effective way of landscaping the solar home calls for the use of deciduous trees or shrubs. Deciduous plantings are those that shed their leaves in the fall and winter, as compared to evergreens.

By using deciduous trees and shrubs, the solar home will be shaded from the sun during the hot summer months, yet free from unwanted shade during the winter, when sunlight can strike the south-facing area directly and be used for heat gain.

Professional Help

In landscaping the newly built passive solar home, it is advisable to work with a reputable landscape architect, nursery or landscaping firm. It will be well worth the investment because their expertise will help avoid costly mistakes in selection of proper plantings as well as placement of the species used for shading and windbreaks. Sometimes landscaping companies and nurseries provide this advice at no extra cost if you are purchasing the trees and shrubs from them.

Deciduous-type vines are also effective in shading the glass walls and areas of the structure. These are used on a trellis-type overhang that extends the length of the glass area so that the leafy vines block out the rays of the summer sun but shed their leaves later to admit winter sunlight. Such vines should be trimmed periodically so that they do not grow too thick and shut out the winter sun.

Windbreaks

As mentioned earlier, the non-deciduous variety of plantings are used primarily for protection against the winter winds. The rate at which cold air infiltrates a building increases with the velocity of the wind. Planting a dense row of evergreens along the north and west sides of the building will materially reduce the wind's velocity and its infiltration of the structure. A solid type of picket fence also may be used effectively for breaking the force of the wind against the building.

When trees and shrubs are used in close proximity to the passive solar home, they should be trimmed and maintained fairly regularly so that they effectively do the job they were intended to do. Trees near the building should be inspected in the fall and early summer and trimmed of dead limbs and branches that might possibly drop or be blown into glass areas during a windstorm.

Outdoors

Write Ahead

Before heading for Louisville, Kentucky, for the annual Outdoor Writers Association of America convention, I had written to the state Division of Fisheries for information on fishing in the state that claims to have more surface acres of fishing water than any other in the country.

Whether this claim by the governor is true or not I cannot say, but at least the very detailed book that I received — "A Guide to 28 Public Fishing Lakes" — assures the visitor of 12 months of helpful information in all parts of the state.

Most of the lakes have been created, usually from free-flowing streams. In this book each lake is carefully drawn to scale, with the long ones requiring as many as five pages of sections for accurate delineation and water depths.

The copy gives the age of the lake and notes the availability of boat rentals or launching sites.

Included in the information is a heading, "The Fishery," which lists species and fishing trips.

The physical data covers surface acreage, mileage of shoreline, maximum and mean depths and maximum and minimum average surface temperatures.

Also included is a display graph of the recommended maximum fishing depths for each month of the year with the thermocline and no-oxygen depths shown.

All of this helpful information (without which the visiting angler would spend extra time learning on his own) has been carefully accumulated over the years by biologists and provided in a non-technical way in this book so as to be both interesting and useful.

I was interested to read the statement "The basic management tool used in Kentucky... is fertilization."

While it is not spelled out, I assume that regular analyses are run on each lake and the applicable nutrients are added as needed to bring the base of the food pyramid up to the most effective range to produce more harvestable fish for the angler.

These 28 public lakes have been carefully situated around the state in areas that were not blessed with relatively large natural waters and within easy range of population centers.

It certainly seems as though anyone in any part of the state can go "catch fish" with the aid of this handy and informative book. I'm glad I asked for help!

Patman Works To Reduce Tax

WASHINGTON — Congressman Bill Patman is working to prevent the double tragedy of family-owned businesses, farms and ranches being sold to pay estate taxes.

"When the head of the family dies, that's tragedy enough," Patman said. "But at this time of tremendous personal loss, many families also face the grim specter of the tax man — offering them no alternative but to dissolve the family owned ranch or small business to pay the currently very heavy estate taxes."

To alleviate this problem, Patman is working to change the tax laws by co-sponsoring two bills. One eliminates estate taxes on most family owned farms, ranches and small businesses. The other provides corporate and estate and gift tax relief to the small business com-

munity. Patman is co-sponsoring the Estate Tax Exemption Bill, H.R. 3882, with Congressman J.J. Pickle of Texas. This bill requires that an estate be worth \$600,000 before any estate taxes could be imposed.

On larger estates, the bill reduces the tax from the current 18 to 70 percent to a range of 8 to 50 percent.

It also allows an unlimited marital deduction for estates left to surviving spouses.

The Small Business Tax Relief Act, H.R. 3930, is being co-sponsored with Congressman Parren J. Mitchell of Maryland.

This bill addresses a broader scope of small business needs. In addition to increasing the estate tax and gift exemption, H.R. 3930 reduces corporate tax rates and increases the amount of used equipment and machinery eligible for the investment tax credit.

"What we're trying to do," Patman said, "is protect small businesses and family owned farms and ranches."

"Even if these particular bills do not pass as separate legislation, I'm hoping the core provisions of each will be so widely accepted and supported that they will be incorporated into the tax proposals of both the Democratic leadership and the Reagan administration."

"This will ensure that no matter which proposal is finally adopted, these much-needed changes will be made in the tax structure," he continued.

"It's not fair to the family and it's not good for the economy in general to put these businesses in jeopardy just because the original owner dies," Patman added.

Dear Dr. Lutz,

I own both horses and dogs. I keep salt blocks out for my horses to lick. Do dogs need salt like a horse? — Hugh

Dear Hugh,

Dogs do not need salt supplementation. There is

enough salt in all the balanced commercial dog foods. Excessive salt would be nauseating to a dog. — Dr. Lutz.

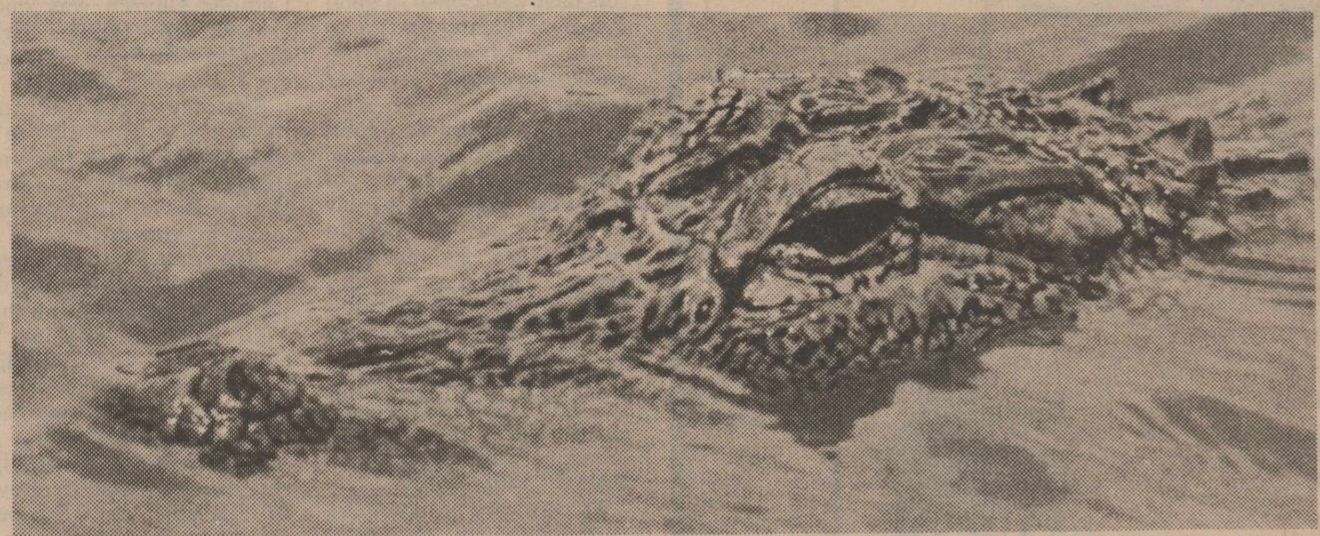

worked at filling sandbags and attaching thermal blankets for the liquid oxygen tank that would supply the vehicle with its life blood.

Still photographers snapped away with motor driven cameras, reporters grabbed anyone they could to ask a question and TV cameramen busily struggled to set up their clumsy tripods and cameras in preparation for the five-second performance from the Percheron.

After an hour of excitement and glamor it became apparent that the test burn was not going to be on schedule. As the hot afternoon sun began to take its toll on the reporters and cameramen, rumors began to ripple through the crowd that the test firing of the engines would be delayed for about four hours.

The Space Service Inc. project has been plagued from the start with delays and postponements, and like the other delays, this one didn't seem to distract the young technicians and investors from their goal of firing the rocket 14,500 feet into the air, followed by splash landing three miles out in the Gulf of Mexico.

David Hannah, president of Space Services Inc. said, "What we did at the start, we set out a schedule that we thought we could hold to at the beginning. We realized it would have to have some slippage in it; we didn't know what they were because we didn't know what the problems were that we would encounter."

Hannah continued by saying that everytime a problem came along they would just have to make the slippage in the schedule as short as they could.

Space Services Inc. Chief Scientist Dr. David J. Ross said that strong winds and rain delayed the raising of the rocket until Monday, and work on the fuel system, electronics system and wiring was incomplete until Tuesday afternoon.

In summarizing some of the problems and delays that have beset the rocket project, Hannah responded by saying, "I don't think we've got anything that you could call insurmountable."

After several hours of delay Space Services spokesman Walt Pennino gave the official word that the rocket engine test would not go off as scheduled and everyone was asked to board the buses for the return trip to the waiting Scat Cat.

Cameras were removed from tripods, note pads and recorders put away and tired news crews climbed aboard the buses.

Space Services Inc. spent \$6,000 on the boat, buses and other preparations to show the engine test to the news media and it was very apparent they were as disappointed as everyone else that they would be unable to light the fuse, produce a five-second blast and show the world just how serious they really are in becoming the first private company in the world to launch a rocket.

The Rockport Chamber of Commerce provided a luncheon of shrimp, fruit and sandwiches on board the Scat Cat during the trip out to the island and now they provided cold drinks and cheese and crackers for the hot and thirsty news crews as they piled aboard the charter boat for the return trip to Rockport.

The two hour trip back was an invitation to many to remove shirts and shoes and sunbathe on the deck of the 80-foot vessel. Others stretched out on lounges in the main salon and napping.

Jumping and surfing dolphin danced in the wake of Scat Cat as Captain Bobby Grumbles returned his boat and passengers to the mainland.

Ed Asner Never Rode A Camel

Hollywood and Ed Asner have succeeded in convincing practically everyone that the field of journalism is the most exciting career a person can find, when in reality it's pretty boring. A rocket firing is one of those rare moments in an otherwise dull life.

Tuesday's rocket firing, or non-firing in this case, was one of those times in journalism when a writer gets set to have an exciting time away from the pressures of the office but it turns out to be a humdrum day and the drudgery of it all convinces you that the pressures of the office would be welcomed.

The events of the day convinced me that one class that should be offered in journalism schools should be a class in the art of graceful waiting.

That could be followed the next semester with a class in the art of being disappointed without showing it.

The officials of Space services Inc. convinced me, as well as most of the other 200 reporters and photographers, that the boat that would take us to the rocket firing would depart the Rockport City Marina at 9 a.m. sharp.

The Navy taught me it was wrong to stand on a dock and watch a vessel that you are supposed to be on leave without you. So I arrived at the dock at 8:15 a.m. The boat left at 9:40.

There are two areas where I do not fit the traditional mold of a journalist. I don't smoke and I don't drink coffee. And of course while waiting for the boat to depart I spent an hour in a hot, smoke-filled salon watching 200 people enjoy their morning coffee while I longed and anguished for a cup of hot tea.

One of my other bad habits is to spend the evening before a big story cleaning my cameras, loading fresh film and checking the light meter and flash equipment, then packing it all carefully away for the next day.

So during the two-hour trip to the rocket site I sat,

bored to death, watching 199 reporters and cameramen clean their cameras, load fresh film and check their meters and flash equipment while I sat and stared out the window at nothing.

Most journalists are somewhat like athletes or race car drivers the way they psyche themselves up for a big happening. If it is a big event with plenty of advance notice, such as a rocket firing, they begin long before the scheduled time of the event to decide what equipment they will need, how they should dress and what the possibilities for picture angles will be.

When the day comes, the adrenaline is running and the creative juices are flowing and, like a running back waiting for the kick-off or a race driver waiting for the green flag to drop, the journalist waits to spring into action and compete with the other 199 that are trying for the same story, the same pictures.

And like the athlete, the journalist hates to have a delay or a rain-out. He hates to have to pump himself up again another day to cover a story that has been delayed or postponed. The really big stories never happen down the street or around the corner, they always happen where only a helicopter or a camel can reach.

This particular assignment necessitated the use of a car to get to a boat that took us to an island where we rode an antiquated bus to a cow pasture. When I saw the bulls and assumed them to be our next means of transportation I was about ready to tell Ed Asner what he could do with journalism.

Big stories also never happen on nice, cool fall days when a sweater or windbreaker would feel nice. They always happen on the dog days of summer.

After the two-hour boat trip across Aransas Bay, up the Intracoastal Waterway and across Matagorda Bay, we arrived at a private dock where we were loaded into two elderly buses to be driven, at the same pace of a poorly organized parade, down a cow path to a pasture that for all I know could have been located on the other side of the world.

As far as the eye could see not a tree was standing, the tallest thing on the island, other than the rocket, was ankle-high grass. Everyone was thirsty and the only water for seven miles around was a small pond of inviting blue water that was the home of an alligator who looked like his mother failed to teach him the value of sharing.

The alligator had a self-indulgent expression of content on his face as he lay in the cool water watching 200 people take his picture and lust for some water.

Smokers ran out of cigarettes, photographers ran

out of film and everyone ran out of patience as he photographed the rocket from every angle possible.

As soon as one photographer found a new angle, six or seven others would stand in line to shoot the same shot. It was like a national park where Kodak puts up a sign telling you the location to get the best shot.

Then, after three or four hours of interviewing anyone who would talk, the word came that the rocket firing had been cancelled and we were told to get in the buses for the trip back to the boat.

If you haven't ridden one of the older buses in a long time you have probably forgotten how little leg room there is. Or perhaps people just had shorter legs in those days.

But the lack of leg room didn't matter because news people have a way of solving that problem. They

stack all their camera gear, typewriters and luggage in the seats, then stand around hanging onto the leather straps trying to figure out why they don't have a place to sit.

After all my years in the business, going back to Korea, I have seen very little change in the people who go into journalism and while we waited in the hot, clammy buses, my faith in journalism was restored when I heard the call from the back of the bus, "Has anybody got a deck of cards?"

The rape of two Rockport women within minutes of each other early in July has emphasized the need for a Crisis Center to serve Aransas County, says Esther Decker.

Mrs. Decker, who — along with local ministers — was called to assist the two victims, is spearheading the movement to organize such a facility here.

She and Rose Taylor have scheduled a series of "crisis center workshops" with the first to begin Friday, August 7.

The workshops, to be held each Friday, will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room at Live Oak State Bank.

Originally planned primarily to provide for the needs of rape victims, the proposed center will also aid victims of other violent crimes, including burglary.

Men and women are urged to attend these workshop meetings Mrs. Decker and Mrs. Taylor said.

At the first meeting in September, officers of the Crisis Intervention Center will be elected. Mrs. Decker and Mrs. Taylor added that the organization is seeking donations.

They extend a special invitation to the workshop meetings to all volunteers with the Rape Crisis Center, Coastal Bend Hospital Auxiliary, VFW Auxiliary and area church and civic clubs.

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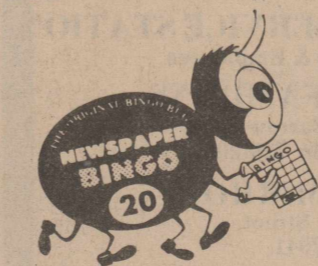

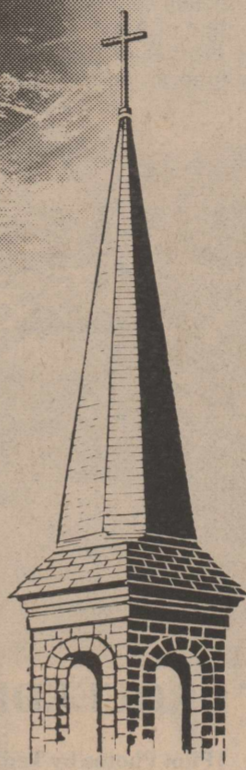

Some of us may identify food with love and as adults, automatically eat large quantities of food which we really don't want or need because that's how we won approval from one or both parents as a child. We grow up but childhood habits die hard, especially if we're not even aware of them.

There are, of course, many other psychological reasons for overweight and anyone who has a weight problem should give this some thought. If they can become aware WHY they overeat it will be easier to gain control

of the situation.

Q. I've had some dizziness recently. Could this be caused by a deficiency in some vitamin or mineral?

A. A deficiency of niacin or vitamin B-6 may cause dizziness. Research shows that including these two B-complex vitamins in the diet may prevent or alleviate the sensation of dizziness.

 - 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Microwave Tower Installed At Bell Office

Installation of an antenna tower for a multi-million dollar microwave system was underway Thursday in Rockport in a move by Southwestern Bell Telephone to improve long-distance service for local customers.

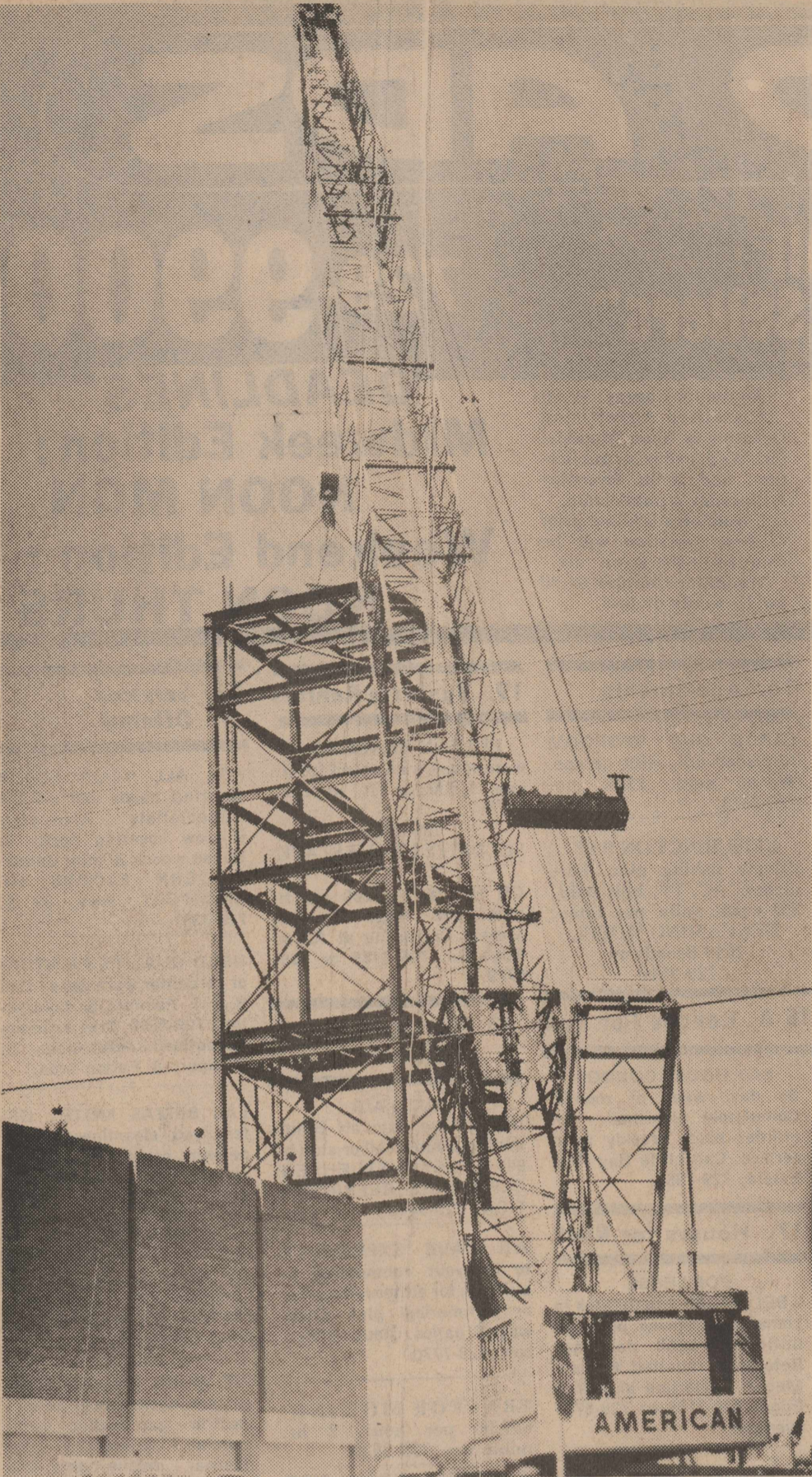
The microwave tower, which should be operational by the end of the year, will replace the underground cables that now transmit long distance

calls from the Rockport area. Dutch Koppenhaver, Rockport's customer services advisor for residence, installation and maintenance, said with the new system, calls will be transmitted from the Rockport microwave tower atop the Bell office here to intermediate towers already in place in Aransas Pass and Portland. From these stations, the

signals will be forwarded to a microwave tower now under construction atop the Southwestern Bell central office in Corpus Christi. Calls will then be relayed by microwave to their destination from that point. Koppenhaver said the new installation will eliminate the static and other background noises that presently inconvenience customers trying to call long distance from the

Rockport area. He added that the area's continuing growth has brought the existing underground cable to its capacity and installation of the microwave system is more efficient and less expensive than burying additional underground cables. The existing underground cables will be converted to help in local calls, Koppenhaver added. Among features of the new microwave system will be a standby channel that

can take over on calls if there is any problem with the main circuits. This should eliminate disruption of service, Koppenhaver said.

look at the situation themselves before deciding. The commissioners made a trip to the airport and upon reconvening, voted to lease to ERA the spot they had requested near the highway.

The company plans to construct heliport 325' x 400' and bring in three more helicopters, in addition to the three already at the base they are now co-leasing with Evergreen Helicopters.

In other action, the court held back their approval of Unit One of Prairie Subdivision, the housing development planned by developer Clem Williams on Fulton outlots 77 and 78.

Williams appeared before the court to ask approval of the completed plat of Unit One and preliminary approval of the plat for Unit Two.

Williams asked the court to waive the county requirements for a 60 foot-right of way, explaining that he planned only 50 foot right of ways in his side streets.

When asked if he had the necessary proof of drainage for the proposed subdivision, Williams told the court he's had not made a conclusive drainage study, but that he thought he was "in good order drainage-wise."

Discussion followed on the drainage problem in the area due to the fact that all present developments in the area drain south into Tule Lake.

Judge Wendell told the court, "I don't see any sense in the Commissioner's Court making rules and regulations and someone coming in and breaking them. Clem doesn't have proof of drainage and he doesn't have 60 foot right of way. I'm going to say turn it down."

Wendell also told the court, "Clem couldn't have picked out a worse piece of property."

George Stickhausen, developer of the Spanish Woods subdivision appeared before the court next with a preliminary plat for Unit 2 of that development and was granted a go-ahead by the court. Stickhausen explained that the land in question had a 13-15 foot elevation and County Surveyor Tommy Griffith agreed and assured the court that proof of drainage was adequate.

In other action the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department appeared before the court and presented a detailed report of their fire runs and equipment, by way of a request for a new fire truck. Fireman Tom DePuma, backed up by several members of the force and Fire Chief Johnny Ray, cited that the department went to 49 percent of the fires in this county in the past year, and that 79 percent of those fires were out of the city limits.

The department at present has three pumps, one provided by the county. The county-provided pumper is a 20 year old International and DePuma described the maintenance of the unit as "putting money into repair of equipment beyond it's useful life."

DePuma summed up the report with a request for greater monetary support from the county and a new pumper, budgeted at \$45,000.

The commissioners made no decision on the request, as they are in budget planning at this time, but the Judge told the group, "I can tell you right now, the county will not have \$45,000 for you." He suggested a two year plan among possibilities the department might consider.

The Rockport request followed one day the delivery of a \$24,000 fire unit for the Fulton Volunteer Fire Department. The original request for that unit by the department had outlined a cost to the county of \$22,000. The court heard from Auditor Gussie Deane, who presented the fire truck bill for \$24,621.14 to the court. Plans were made to contact both the fire department and the city of Fulton regarding the \$2,621.14 difference and possible reimbursement.

In other action the county heard a financial report from District Attorney Tom Bridges. Bridges had already presented a report in light of the budget considerations, but had to amend it, due to the receipt of the Council of Government's grant money.

The court also granted a request from General Telephone company for a cable crossing the county road at highways 136 and 181 near Bayside.

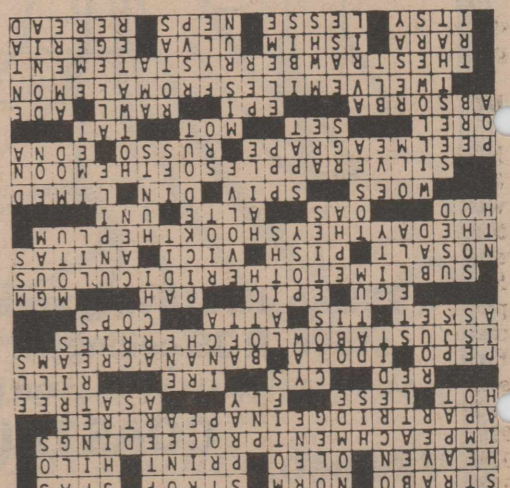
article in the paper about a company that traces missing persons. She contacted the company, told them about John T. and they went to work.

Hunting Comments

Sought By TP&W

AUSTIN — Texas hunters may comment on proposed late-season migratory bird hunting regulations before the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission takes final action on the proposals September 3 in Austin.

Those interested in commenting on the seasons, bag limits or means and methods of taking ducks, geese, coots, sandhill cranes, snipe and woodcock may write William C. Brownlee, Migratory Game Bird Program Director, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744, or call toll-free 1-800-252-9688. Comments also will be accepted in person at the commission meeting.

Hunters will notice very few changes in the proposals from last year's regulations. Season lengths will be the same, and duck bag limits will be calculated by the same 100-point system as in the past.

Officials said all the regulations will be contained in the department's migratory game bird hunting law supplement which will be available at hunting license outlets across the state by early October.

The following is a condensed wrap-up of the proposals:

DUCKS AND COOTS

In the High Plains Mallard Management Unit (a portion of West Texas west of a line from Del Rio through San Angelo, Abilene and Vernon to the Red River) the season is proposed for October 27, 1981, through January 17, 1982. For the rest of the state, the season would be November 1, 1981, through November 29, 1981, and December 12, 1981, through January 17, 1982. Shooting hours are

proposed for one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Point values assigned various species of ducks are proposed to remain the same as last season. The season is closed on black-bellied and fulvous (whistling) tree ducks and masked ducks in all counties. The coot daily bag limit would be 15; possession limit 30. GEESE In areas west of U.S. Highway 81, the season is proposed for October 27, 1981, through January 17, 1982. The daily bag limit for that area is proposed for five geese, not to include more than two Canada or white-fronted geese in the aggregate. Possession limit would be 10, not to include more than four Canada or white-fronted geese in the aggregate. East of Highway 81, the seasons would be November 7, 1981, through January 17, 1982. The proposed bag limit is five light (blue or snow) geese; the daily bag limit for dark geese would be one Canada or one white-fronted goose. Possession limit would be twice the daily bag limit. Goose shooting hours for the entire state would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. SNIPE The season for common or Wilson's snipe (jack-snipe) is proposed for November 1, 1981, through February 14, 1982. Shooting hours would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag limit would be eight; possession limit 16. WOODCOCK The season would be December 12, 1981, through February 14, 1982. Shooting hours would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag limit would be five, possession limit 10.

When To Fish Or Hunt

Upper Madre Closed

AUSTIN — Waters of the Upper Laguna Madre will be closed to the taking of red drum (redfish) for sale, effective at 12:01 a.m. Aug. 6, 1981, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced.

The close will be in effect through Sept. 30, 1981. The department is required under provisions of the Red Drum Conservation Act of the 65th Texas Legislature to establish yearly red drum harvest quotas for each Texas bay system, and to close any bay system when at least 90 percent of that quota is reached.

Department officials said the Upper Laguna's annual quota of 180,880 pounds was exceeded by mid-July. The Upper Laguna Ma-

dre is defined as those waters between the John F. Kennedy Causeway and the Intracoastal Waterway Mile Marker 613, approximately 19 miles north of Port Mansfield. The area includes Baffin Bay, Alazan Bay and all adjacent creeks and tributaries.

Announcement of the closure was published in the Texas Register on June 23, 1981, and all holders of Red Drum Licenses were mailed a notification of the closure on July 27, 1981, officials said.
