## Argentine outrage continues

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Gen. Leopoldo Galtieri struggled to hang on to his six-month-old presidency today as public outrage over the British victory in the Falkland Islands fueled the clamor for a return to democracy.

The 55-year-old army commander spent four hours late Wednesday night closeted with the nation's top generals. Similar meetings took place at the navy

and air force headquarters.

Galtieri has not been seen in public since British troops defeated their Argentine counterparts Monday. He canceled a scheduled public appearance Tuesday after about 5,000 Argentines rioted outside the presidential palace.

Scrambling to stem the outcry, the government hastily called a meeting of all major civilian political leaders.

But leaders from the five largest parties boycotted the meeting, at which

Interior Minister Alfredo Saint Jean promised to ease restrictions on political activity. He set no dates.

Raul Alfonsín, a leader in Radical Party, second largest after the Peronists, called for an end to rule by the armed forces, which seized power in a 1976 coup.

"Nobody has the right to use Argentine unity to shore up governments that are tumbling down," he said.

An influential group of Argentine businessmen, the National Convocation

of Businessmen issued a statement calling for new "personnel to recuperate lost confidence" in the government's economic and political policies.

"A change must come now," it said. The Argentina Human Rights Assembly criticized the government's handling of the hostile mob that gathered underneath Galtieri's balcony Tuesday night.

Club-wielding police, firing tear gas and rubber bullets, charged the demonstrators who responded by burning vehicles and stoning windows.

## Taiwan still seeks 'friendship'

Although no longer enjoying diplomatic relations with the United States, the Republic of China on Taiwan remains "good friends" with America, from whom it seeks to purchase weapons to deter an attack from mainland China, Taiwanese public information official Shuang Jeff Yao of Houston said Wednesday during a Midland visit.

Yao, 49, who has served as director of the Information and Communications Division of the Houston office of the Coordination Council for North American Affairs since 1980, said Taiwan is in need of fighter planes and parts as well as anti-missile missiles.

"We want to defend ourselves, and according to the Taiwan Relations Act (passed by Congress), the U.S. government is obligated to make available defensive arms for Taiwan to defend herself," said Yao, noting that the Republic of China on Taiwan lies only 100 miles from mainland China — "seven or eight minutes" by jet.

That proximity to what Yao believes

is Taiwan's greatest enemy has left his government "worried — we are concerned," he said. "Communist China never has ruled out force to take over Taiwan."

Yao, who was born in Peking and was a child on the mainland during World War II, said he has seen "my people suffer enough. For the first time in 100 years, our people on Taiwan can live decently, have jobs, and have self-respect, and why should we lose that?"

He noted that while the average per capita income on Taiwan is \$2,500 a year, a person on the mainland averages only \$250. "We have achieved what we have because we follow your pattern — free enterprise," he explained. "In a Communist country they tell you what to do. You are serving the state. This is the sad (truth) about mainland China."

When Chiang Kai-Shek's nationalist forces were forced off the mainland by the Communists in 1949, his government found refuge on Taiwan. In 1950, the United States agreed to protect Taiwan against possible attack from

mainland China, and that agreement was made official in a 1954 mutual defense treaty.

However, the growth of Communist China as a superpower prompted the United States to favor United Nations membership for the nation, and in 1971 it was admitted while the Republic of China on Taiwan was expelled. And, after President Richard Nixon had visited Communist China in 1972, the United States severed diplomatic ties with Taiwan and dissolved the mutual defense pact in 1979.

But, said Yao, the Taiwan Relations Act has resulted in the continuation of "unofficial" ties between the two nations, including extensive trade.

"We are the number 8 trading partner of the United States," noted Yao, adding that two-way trade amounts to \$13.2 billion annually.

While careful not to criticize the United States for establishing diplomatic ties with Communist China, Yao did offer America advice:

"We have nothing against your mak-

## PLO making diplomatic bid

Beirut airport came under heavy shelling today and Israeli armored columns moved against Yasser Arafat's guerrillas east of Lebanon's capital.

The new fighting came amid reliable reports that the Palestine Liberation Organization had offered to discuss with the Lebanese government "a new form of Palestinian presence in Lebanon."

The PLO leadership denied reports it was prepared to lay down its arms, but it engaged in a flurry of secret diplomatic activity involving U.S. presidential envoy Philip C. Habib and Lebanese President Elias Sarkis.

The Tel Aviv command said Palestinian guerrillas bombed Israeli troops around the airport, damaging three parked airliners. It said Israeli forces east of Beirut also came under a barrage of the rockets and Israeli troops fired back.

But Salim Salam, the managing director of Lebanon's Middle East Airlines, told reporters that Israeli gunboats shelled the airport and "two Boeing-720s belonging to MEA were wrecked and the airline's building sustained several direct hits."

A smaller jet and a Lebanese helicopter also were destroyed. A group of Lebanese and foreign press photographers saw the wrecked aircraft on the tarmac in front of the previously damaged terminal building, next to another Middle East Airlines Boeing burned out earlier in the fighting.

Salam appealed for neutralization of the airport compound, saying further damage would be a "national disaster."

The airport, closed since the Israelis invaded 12 days ago to stamp out the guerrillas, has been in the center of bitter fighting as the Israelis and their Lebanese Christian allies close in on Palestinian strongpoints located nearby.

Lebanese state radio said Wednesday the Israelis and their rightist Lebanese Christian allies seized a key Palestinian

position near the airport. Israeli sources said the Christians overran PLO-held buildings on the east side of the airport's runway. The PLO said it repelled an Israeli assault there, killed 26 soldiers and wrecked two tanks.

A PLO communique said Israeli armored columns tried to advance today into the leftist stronghold of Alei, 12 miles east of Beirut, behind a massive barrage of artillery and rockets. "Our forces engaged the enemy force in fierce and continuing combat," the communique said.

In a move apparently designed to demonstrate the PLO's authority in west Beirut, where Arafat and his leadership have been trapped by the Israelis since Monday, the guerrillas announced that their military police executed three guerrillas convicted of armed robbery.

The announcement did not indicate when the trials or executions took place. The men presumably were shot by firing squad in west Beirut.

"The first of the revolution will remain hanging over those who threaten the security of the masses or private property. Such attempts are tantamount to national treason in this critical time," the statement said.

In Tel Aviv, the Israel Bonds organization said Prime Minister Menachem Begin, who is now in New York, will launch a drive among Jewish Jews for \$100 million to offset the economic impact of the invasion.

Some estimates of the cost of the invasion range as high as \$1 billion, and Israel has imposed new taxes to raise \$650 million additional revenue by the end of July.

War correspondents in Beirut reported Israeli forces shelled PLO positions in the capital Wednesday night, hitting a munitions dump that set off a barrage of explosions and fires. Lebanese press reports said guerrillas returned the fire with Soviet-made rockets.

## Little effect anticipated in area from alien ruling

Tuesday's Supreme Court ruling entitling children of illegal aliens to free public education will not have a major effect on school districts in the Permian Basin area, although districts in border towns and larger cities in the state may suffer an increase in problems due to a large influx of those students, school administrators in Midland and Odessa said Wednesday.

"It will have no impact on us," Dr. James H. Mailey, Midland Independent School District superintendent, said. "We've been allowing them (children of illegal aliens) to attend for years. I don't see any that it will be a problem to us. However, it might be a problem for those (districts) immediately adjacent to the border, but I think that's been a problem all along."

Mailey and other MISD administrators said the district's policy over the years has been to allow children of ille-

gal aliens to enroll in the district at no charge. Many school districts, such as Ector County Independent School District, charged a tuition fee for those students.

According to Don Williams, ECISD assistant superintendent of support and management, the school district charged about \$1,000 per illegal alien per year before the Texas Education Agency ruled in 1979 that the students would be admitted free.

"We've been under a court order since 1979 to allow the students to enroll at no cost," Williams said. "Tuesday's ruling will have no radical impact at the moment that we can ascertain."

At the time of the 1979 ruling, about 161 illegal alien students were enrolled in ECISD, Williams said. While the present number of illegal aliens enrolled in Odessa schools cannot be released due to another court order.

## Authorities interviewing youngsters recovered from motel

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Some of the 31 children found packed in two motel rooms have been interviewed by prosecutors trying to determine if other charges would be filed against a man who recruited them to sell candy door-to-door.

Bilal Muhammed Ali, 40, of San Antonio, has been charged with indecency with a child for allegedly molesting a 12-year-old girl, who was part of his

traveling sales force.

He was being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond Wednesday in the El Paso County jail.

Assistant District Attorney Carol Pennock videotaped interviews with some of the San Antonio children Wednesday and planned to finish interviewing 26 of the 31 children today.

"Until we have interviewed them all, it will be difficult to say what, if any,

other charges will be filed against him," she said.

Five of the children were those of Ali and his wife, Fatimah. They were released into Mrs. Ali's custody Wednesday afternoon after officials decided there was no reason to hold them.

Harry Kincaid, child placement supervisor for the state Department of Human Resources here, said the family

remained in El Paso on Wednesday to see what would become of Ali.

Meanwhile, the other 26 children were to be reunited with their parents in San Antonio this evening, Kincaid said.

He said a bus chartered by the department would leave about 7 p.m.

The children's plight came to the attention of Kincaid's department Monday night when police found some

youngsters on the streets and returned them to a central El Paso motel.

There, police found the 31 children, the Ali's and another woman all staying in two motel rooms, Kincaid said.

Child welfare investigators interviewed the children Tuesday and then took them into state custody when Ali was arrested.

Kincaid said the children, who range in age from 9 to 15, had been placed in

Ali's care by their parents, who were assured they would be well fed and would earn money for school.

Ali is founder and president of a two-year-old firm called Action Youth Self-Help Inc., which recruits children for the candy sales force.

"We don't have any reason to think the parents knew what was going on," Kincaid said. "They all thought it was on the up and up."

**Kermit residents gather as suspect jailed**

KERMIT, Texas (AP) — A crowd of more than 100 people gathered to watch police escort a parolee accused of slaying a Kermit woman and her daughter to the Winkler County Jail, officials said.

Justice of the Peace Lee Rutledge said the crowd Wednesday night was orderly "and they had enough police around there to protect him."

Oilfield worker Michael Eugene Sharp, 28, of Odessa was arrested at a Sweetwater bus station at 1:45 p.m. Wednesday after local authorities saw a bulletin that Sharp possibly was headed for Louisiana and traveling by bus, said Nolan County Sheriff Don Underwood.

Sharp is charged with capital murder in the deaths of Brenda Kay Broadway, 31, and Christi Michelle Elms, 8, whose bodies were found Friday in a 26-inch-deep grave 16 miles southeast of Kermit.

He also is charged with aggravated kidnapping in the abduction of those two victims plus Ms. Broadway's 14-year-old daughter, Selena Kay Elms, at 12:30 a.m. Friday at a Kermit car wash.

Sharp, who had been sought since an aggravated kidnapping warrant was issued for his arrest Monday, was denied bond when he appeared Wednesday before County Judge Donald Menn.

He was held in the Nolan County Jail until he was transferred to Kermit.

Underwood said Sharp offered no resistance when arrested.

"We surprised him when he got off the bus. He didn't know who we were. We didn't have our badges or anything showing," Underwood said.

Underwood said his office checked the bus schedule and met the bus,

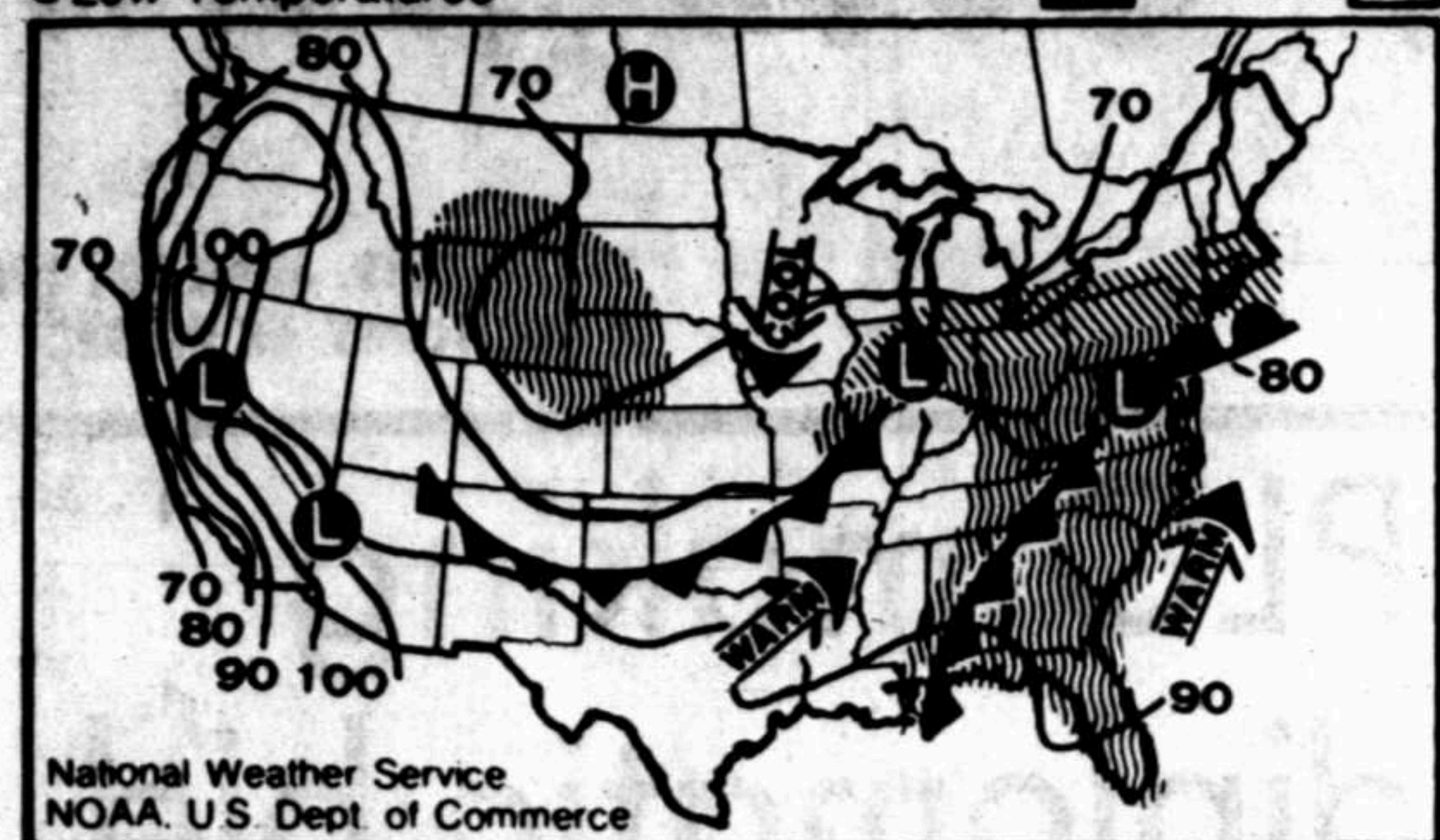

## Man indicted for deaths of three CBS employees

NEW YORK (AP) — A man arrested with a bloodstained van has been indicted for the rooftop slayings of three CBS employees and a woman who was cooperating with authorities in a \$6 million diamond fraud case.

Donald Nash — also known as Donald J. Bowers — 46, of Keansburg, N.J., was arrested in Frankfurt, Ky., a week after the April 12 murders. Nash, who police sources say has been associated with a gang of West Side criminals known as "The Westies," was to be arraigned today on four counts of murder after the indictment was returned Wednesday. If convicted, he faces 25 years to life in prison.

District Attorney Robert Morgenthau said the indictment "does not mean other persons were not involved, and this is a continuing investigation."

The indictment charges Nash with shooting CBS employees Leo Kuranuki, 54, of Great Neck; Robert Schulze, 59, of Clifton, N.J.; and Edward Benford, 55, of Hawthorne. They apparently were killed because they went to the aid of the fourth victim, Margaret Barbera, 38, of Queens, and witnessed her abduction.

The three men were gunned down on a rooftop parking lot at a Hudson River pier. The woman's body was found in another part of Manhattan the next day.

It was originally thought that Nash was only an accomplice in the slayings, but Morgenthau said Wednesday that Nash "is the shooter."

Nash had been scheduled for release this week after serving two months of a 90-day sentence for forging a taxi license.

When he was arrested, police found in the van a .22-caliber shell casing which ballistics experts said was fired from the gun that killed all four victims. Other shells fired from the same gun also were found in Nash's home.

The van also contained bloodstains that may have come from Jennie Soo Chin, a friend and co-worker of Ms. Barbera's who is missing and presumed dead.

Ms. Barbera had agreed to testify in a fraud case against her former employer, diamond dealer Irwin Margolies. He was indicted last month on charges of swindling an Irving Trust Co. subsidiary, but has not been linked to the murders.

the count in Midland is anyone's guess.

Dr. Joseph P. Baressi, MISD deputy superintendent, said that to his knowledge no student has been refused the right to enroll in the two years he has been in Midland, partly because school administrators do not ask a student if he is a resident or not.

"We do not know in most cases if the child is from across the border or not," Baressi said.

"It is our feeling that if these youngsters are going to be in town and have not been deported by the proper offi-

cial, then to the community it's an advantage to have them in school and not on the streets," Mailey explained.

Area school administrators agreed that while the effects on border towns and larger cities could be substantial, local districts should not expect any great increase in enrollment of illegal aliens. However, if such an increase should occur, Baressi said the main problem would concern the MISD bilingual program.

Citing about 1,000 students who are "limited in English" out of the total enrollment of 16,500 students enrolled

in MISD during 1981-82, Baressi said the bilingual program would have to expand its teaching staff if there was an influx of students with limited English capabilities.

"We have problems enough in finding bilingual teachers now," Baressi said.

"There is no question that if it amounts to a large number of students and a fixed amount of funds from the state — the more students the less money per student," he added. "Indirectly it would be taking away from the Texas citizen."

According to some school administrators in border towns such as Brownsville, and large cities, such as Dallas, the federal government should help with some of the costs of educating the illegal aliens.

Mailey, however, said he thinks the funding would be best handled at the state and local level.

"I don't want to have to fool with the federal government," he said. "I think the responsibility should stay with the state. I've had enough red tape to deal with from the federal government as it is."

## U.S., China considering arms sale compromise

PEKING (AP) — China and the United States are drafting a crucial compromise document meant to solve Chinese objections to Washington's arms sales to Taiwan, diplomatic sources said today.

Details of the document and exact positions have not been disclosed, but both sides are exchanging drafts and discussing the wording of a formula to solve the problem, said the sources, who asked not to be identified.

President Reagan and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. are closely involved in the process, the sources said.

China's Communist government has angrily objected to U.S. military sales to Taiwan, which Peking considers a breakaway province. Chinese leaders have strongly hinted they will downgrade U.S. relations unless those sales stop. Talks have been held in Peking since November to reach a compromise.

Taiwan, an island of 18 million people, is governed by the Chinese Nationalists who fled the mainland in 1949 when the Communists triumphed in a civil war.

The United States recognized Taiwan as the seat of China's legitimate government until 1979, when Washington broke ties with the Nationalists and established relations with Peking. But under the Taiwan Relations Act, the United States pledged to sell defensive weapons to Taiwan.

## Temperatures forecast in mid-90s

Midlanders should expect temperatures to continue in the mid-90s through Friday and possibly into the weekend.

No rain is in sight and warm temperatures are expected to linger, according to the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport.

Tonight's low is expected to be in the upper 60s, becoming warm Thursday with the mercury climbing to the mid-90s.

Southeasterly winds should travel 15-20 mph through Thursday.

Wednesday's high of 89 fell short of the 1975 record high 105-degree reading for the day, and the overnight low of 68 was quite a bit warmer than the record low of 49 set in 1981.

## Doubts cast about Donovan's survival

WASHINGTON (AP) — Labor Secretary Raymond J. Donovan faces long odds in keeping his job in the Reagan Cabinet, says a key Republican senator who has reviewed the latest charges that Donovan had ties to organized crime figures.

"The odds are in favor of his departure," said Sen. Orrin G. Hatch, R-Utah, who as chairman of the Senate Labor Committee is Donovan's most important contact in the Senate.

"I just don't see how he's going to overcome the fact that 46 Democratic senators and at least one Republican senator are against him at this point," Hatch told reporters Wednesday.

The lone Republican is Sen. Dan Quayle of Indiana, who said last month Donovan should resign if he does not apologize to the labor committee.

BUT DEPUTY White House press secretary Larry Speakes said President Reagan has not lost confidence in Donovan and will withhold any further decision until completion of a report by special prosecutor Leon Silverman.

However, the Detroit News said in today's editions that the feeling that Donovan should resign is present "at the highest levels" in the White House.

"The feeling here is that enough is enough," the newspaper quoted an unidentified "key White House adviser" as saying. "It is felt that no matter what happens with the special prosecutor, Donovan should resign," the source said.

Silverman, a court-appointed lawyer, is investigating allegations that Donovan was involved in underworld-influenced bid-rigging and union payoffs on behalf of his former company, Schiavone Construction of Secaucus, N.J.

His report is expected to be concluded by next week.

Donovan, who has repeatedly denied all organized crime connections, is due back Sunday from a European trip.

Hatch stopped short of calling for Donovan's resignation.

But he said Donovan's prospects for staying on are dim because only Silverman's investigation can clear him. That is unlikely, said Hatch, because some of the key witnesses in the probe are no longer alive.

"All I can say is that unless these matters can be cleared up somehow or other, it is going to be difficult for him to stay," said Hatch.

"NO USE KIDDING ourselves. There is no question that unless he can resolve these issues it is going to be very difficult for him to serve in the highest traditions of that office," Hatch continued. "It can't help but impair any normal human being to have this kind of media criticism and FBI funneling these reports around him."

Hatch revealed that he received a detailed FBI memo this week that elaborates on the mob allegations against Donovan.

He said the information was not new but "more graphic" than an FBI report he examined last week.

Hatch also said he is concerned that the FBI turned the information over to White House counsel Fred Fielding in January 1981, but withheld it from the Senate Labor Committee. At that time, the committee was weighing Donovan's fitness to be labor secretary.

Hatch, who has defended Donovan for the past 17 months, also said he has not prejudged the secretary's innocence or guilt. He said he talked with White House counselor Edwin Meese III to "express the gravity of the situation," and to request a meeting with Reagan "to bring him up to date."

Meese said Wednesday that Fielding told him in January 1981 that the FBI had turned up allegations against Donovan.

"Of course, we indicated they should check out whatever might be there," Meese said in an interview on Mutual Radio. "But I think at the time there appeared to be very little reason to believe in the validity of those allegations."

The latest public disclosure against Donovan is an FBI report that Donovan had "close personal and business ties with known La Cosa Nostra figures."

The report was turned over to Fielding on Jan. 12, 1981, but Hatch said he first saw it last week.

Meanwhile, Republican Party Chairman Richard Richards said the national party "is deliberately detaching itself" from the growing controversy.

RICHARDS, ANNOUNCING formation of a committee to develop Republican labor union support, ducked the question of whether Donovan should step down.

"We think the Donovan thing is immaterial to what we're trying to do," Richards said.

Senate Democrats have endorsed a letter to Reagan from their minority leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia urging Donovan to take a leave of absence "in the best interests of our country."

Meanwhile, Rep. Toby Moffett, D-Conn., introduced a "resolution of inquiry" in the House seeking information from the White House and Justice Department "regarding any interference with the investigation by the FBI" into Donovan's background.

To ensure the FBI's independence, "Congress needs to know the extent of this administration's efforts to short-circuit the Donovan probe," said Moffett.

## Emergency appropriations bill returning to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Threatened by a dispute over the personal finances of members of Congress, an emergency appropriations bill containing funds for food stamps, student loans and \$3 billion in housing aid is heading back to the Senate.

Unless senators agree to limit their outside earnings to \$18,200 a year — 58 of them earned more than that last year — the \$8.9 billion bill could die, leaving several government agencies penniless for the next three months.

And even if the Senate agrees to the earnings measure, President Reagan is expected to veto the entire package because he opposes the housing aid provision. Backers say a vote to override any veto would be close.

The bill also includes the controversial provision to repeal a special audit-proof 75-per-day tax deduction that members of Congress voted themselves last year.

The provision requiring senators to restrict their outside earnings to the same \$18,200 that applies to House members was added by the House when it approved the conference report on the appropriations bill Wednesday and sent it back to the Senate.

The housing plan provides interest rate subsidies for new homes, for already-

constructed but unsold new homes and for areas with high cost-of-living.

Meanwhile, House and Senate Republicans were expected to resume talks today after reportedly coming to within \$2 billion of an agreement on next year's federal budget deficit.

GOP lawmakers met privately for several hours Wednesday and came close to settling on a spending plan calling for \$20 billion in higher taxes, billions of dollars in spending cuts and a deficit slightly above \$100 billion.

Senate sources said they had the deficit at \$104.8 billion deficit and House Republicans insisted they could not accept anything over \$102.9 billion.

Even after Republicans come to an agreement, it must be accepted by Democrats.

Elsewhere on Capitol Hill, the first stage of a filibuster against a bill extending provisions of the 1965 Voting Rights Act toward a close Wednesday and the Senate was expected to begin debate on the bill today.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., and his supporters, have successfully blocked Senate consideration of the voting rights measure for over a week by making careful use of Senate rules.

## Heroin purchase nets man 60-year sentence

A Midland drug addict who procured two "papers" of the narcotic heroin for an undercover agent, kept one of the papers for his own use and then "shot up," was meted a 60-year prison sentence by a jury in 142nd State District Court here.

The accused, Manuel Gomez "Skull" Hernandez, 36, who was acting as a go-between apparently to satisfy his addiction to the morphine-derived drug, had purchased from a drug dealer the two tin-foil packets of heroin for the \$50 the Texas Department of Public Safety undercover agent had given him, delivered the heroin to the agent in an alley last Dec. 8, and kept one of the papers for his reward in getting the narcotic.

"He shot it (the heroin) in him and her (his cousin, Micaela Hernandez) right on the spot," noted prosecutor David Joers.

District Attorney Vern Martin speculated that the relatively severe jury-met punishment indicates that Midlanders aren't prone to tolerating a drug-dealing society and that they are "tired of narcotics in general and heroin in specific."

"These people (drug addicts) are doing a lot of property-related crimes, such as burglary, in order to supply this horrible habit," Martin said after the jury in Judge Pat Baskin's court had recommended the 60-year sentence on Wednesday.

In referring to Hernandez's addiction, Martin noted that "what he got in return for this heroin was a shot of heroin."

And the chief prosecutor suggested that the prison sentence may benefit Hernandez.

"I don't know what the life expectancy of confirmed heroin addicts is," he said, "but it's a lot longer in the penitentiary than on the street. Anyway, we probably did him a favor whether he likes it or not."

Martin said that the jury gave the defendant a more severe sentence than he probably would have realized in a plea-bargain agreement had he pleaded guilty to the offense, which carries a punishment range from five years to 99 years or life in prison.

His cousin, Micaela Hernandez, 33, who pleaded guilty to delivery of heroin to the same undercover agent on Dec. 2, received a 25-year prison sentence in a plea-bargaining agreement. Both had previous convictions.

Joers and Jack Chappell prosecuted "Skull" Hernandez, who was represented in the trial by court-appointed attorneys Richard Graham and Mike Williams.

The district attorney said that Midlanders are wary of drug dealers, who are in the underworld business for profit, and addicts, who hustle to feed their habit, because of the threat to society and to their children.

"People like these are always looking for somebody to enlist as customers," Martin said.

## Radio Marti towers begun

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — Without waiting for Congress to approve Radio Marti, the Navy has started building four 250-foot antennas for the government station that would broadcast anti-Castro messages into Cuba, a Navy official says.

The advance construction of the transmitting towers in the Florida Keys drew a sharp response from the head of a House subcommittee on telecommunications.

"Clearly, the expenditure of any funds for the construction of facilities for the purpose of making Radio Marti operational without the passage of authorizing legislation would be illegal," said Rep. Timothy Wirth, D-Colo.

Wirth's comments came in a letter Friday to officials at the State and Defense departments after he learned of the Navy construction 12 miles north of Key West.

Lt. Cmdr. Mark Neuhart, public affairs officer for U.S. Caribbean forces, told The Miami Herald on Wednesday the transmitting towers in the Keys are intended for Radio Marti, but he said they won't be used for the project until Congress gives its approval.

In Key West, two of the towers are completed and all construction, which began in early May, will be finished by summer, Neuhart was quoted by the Herald as saying.

The administration last fall proposed that Congress approve Radio Marti — a station similar to Radio Free Europe — to broadcast what it said would be the truth about the government of Cuban President Fidel Castro.

## Jewish group claims murders

NEW YORK (AP) — A man claiming to represent the Jewish Armed Resistance of the Jewish Defense League said his organization was responsible for the assassination of two Arabs in Rome today, but the JDL denied it had such a splinter group.

"However, we have had and continue to have contact with groups in Europe who agree with our policy of measure for measure and terror for terror," said Meir Jolovitz, national chairman of the Jewish Defense League in New York.

"The Jewish Armed Resistance is not a splinter group of the JDL," Jolovitz said.

## Authorities investigate shooting death of alien

EDINBURG, Texas (AP) — Investigations were under way today by federal and local authorities into the shooting death of a Mexican who was killed after a federal tick inspector discovered him allegedly smuggling a horse into Mexico.

The inspector told the Hidalgo County sheriff's department that his gun discharged accidentally Tuesday afternoon when he lost his footing on the banks of the Rio Grande, according to chief investigator Erasmo Bravo.

Ruben Marquez Guardiola of Reynosa, Mexico, was shot once in the head and died instantly, Bravo said.

The inspector general's office of the U.S. Agriculture Department also sent agents to investigate the incident. The tick inspectors are USDA employees who patrol the Rio Grande on horseback to keep out livestock bearing dangerous fever ticks.

They won the authority this spring to carry firearms after testifying before congressional committees that they needed protection against drug smugglers and other criminals they encounter along the river.

Raymond Smith, tick force district supervisor, said the shooting was the first since the agents were granted permission to carry weapons. Tick riders have said privately that they have always carried guns on patrol.

No charges were filed in the incident. Bravo said the case will be turned over to the district attorney after the investigation by local authorities is complete for possible presentation to the grand jury.

Hernando Molina Gonzalez of Reynosa, who witnessed the shooting, had purchased the horse and was seen driving toward the river by the federal agents, Bravo said.

When the agents caught up with Molina, he had already unloaded the horse but took the inspectors to the spot along the river two miles east of Hidalgo where Marquez was leading the animal, the investigator said.

"Marquez was trying to cross the river with the horse," Bravo said. "He left the horse and started walking toward the inspector, who was walking backward. He (the inspector) said he thinks he lost his step, he had the gun out and it went off."

Bravo would not release the name of the inspector involved because he said he feared for the inspector's safety.

"There were several people on the other side waiting for him (Marquez) and they were yelling that they were going to kill the inspector," the investigator said. "If we release the name, they might be looking for him over here."

Smith said he has ordered the riders to patrol in pairs following the shooting in case of possible reprisals.

He said the incident might cause some to question giving the riders the right to carry firearms.

"I'm sure that there will be some bad publicity," he said. The inspectors testified before congressional committees that they needed guns for protection against drug smugglers and other criminals they encounter along the brushy banks of the Rio Grande.

"My son works in Del Rio. He was shot at and missed in February and then shot at and hit in March," Smith said.

The supervisor said that inspectors watch for animals being smuggled into Mexico for several reasons.

"A lot of times, these are horses that are going to match races in Mexico and then they'll bring them back illegally. That is a disease threat to our livestock," Smith said. "It's also a commerce violation to take stuff undeclared by the river."

## Customs officers at Mexican border confiscate switchblades, liquor

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Some people might give their right arms to bring a switchblade knife into the United States from Mexico. And it's only one of two ways they legally can.

The second way is to give their left arm. Although illicit drugs make the headlines, U.S. Customs officials have to be on the lookout for hundreds of other items border bridge crossers try to sneak into and out of the country.

Some of the items, like drugs, are completely prohibited from importation, others require a duty be paid and others can be brought in only under certain circumstances. Switchblade knives, for example, are barred from coming into the country unless the weapons are taken across the border for use by people with one arm. It's the only type of closeable knife they can operate.

Other Mexican consumer products have much looser restrictions on them. Most of the time, all a purchaser must do is declare to a U.S. Customs official at the border that he is bringing the item through. But customs statistics show that people still attempt to take much across the border undetected.

"They like to play games," said El Paso U.S. Customs chief Manny Najera. "All we have to do is look and we almost always find something."

From October 1981 through February 1982, U.S. Customs agents seized 1,381 restricted or prohibited items after searching automobiles coming across the bridges.

The smuggling game most people like to play, besides drugs and human cargo, is bringing liquor across without declaring it, Najera said. The traveler can save himself about 50 cents a bottle in state taxes by sneaking it past inspection. But if he is caught with undeclared booze, customs can confiscate the bottle and fine the violator the full domestic price of the liquor.

Besides enforcing some 400 laws for 40 U.S. agencies, customs agents also must keep an eye peeled for goods restricted under Mexican law.

A diversity of items ranging from beeswax to pre-Columbian art treasures are either restricted or prohibited from export. Najera said the Mexican government worries about having shortages of many products and limits how much one person can remove to the United States.

"We have a policy of not allowing U.S. citizens to violate Mexican restrictions," Najera said. Which means his bridge watchers have confiscated such unusual caches as jojoba beans used in cosmetics, large jars of mercury and loads of certain strains of pinto beans.

Although fruits, trinkets and liquor are cheaper in Mexico, many U.S.-made products are more expensive. Customs anti-smuggling units spend a lot of time during the Christmas season patrolling the river between the ports to catch smugglers trying to take television sets, radios, blenders and electric can openers into Mexico, Najera said.

The United States also restricts what can be taken south of the border. Organized crime has a habit of laundering large amounts of cash through Mexican banks, so new laws stipulate that persons must declare any amount over \$5,000 before taking it through, Najera said.

Products made in the United States can be brought in from Mexico, and Najera said smugglers often try to disguise foreign-made parts with U.S. markings. A truckload of what appeared to be U.S. sewing machines was discovered by an alert agent to house German-made motors, Najera said.

Some of the customs laws regarding importation are a bit outdated, Najera admitted. Travelers from Mexico take a gamble if they try to pack lottery tickets through. Lotteries are considered gambling by the U.S. government and the law was established back in the days when that activity was considered an evil.

"If a guy buys Irish Sweepstakes tickets, goes to Mexico and tries to bring them into the U.S., we can take them away," Najera said.

Confiscation of the contraband is not as stiff as the anti-smuggling penalties can go if customs considers the transgression serious enough.

"Remember, if you try to smuggle something in, we can not only seize the goods, but the smuggling container as well," Najera said. "That means the vehicle it came over in."

In past years, customs has taken cars, busses, airplanes and trains, he said. The old law also defines beasts as containers, so back when burros commonly crossed the border, they also got confiscated.

But Najera said the United States actually has more liberal importation laws than most countries. The United States is the only country that allows each citizen to bring in \$300 worth of goods a month duty-free.

## Marijuana curbs sperm production

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Heavy and sustained use of marijuana affects a male's ability to produce normal sperm and raises a possible risk for his offspring, says a Columbia University researcher.

"We have shown that marijuana alters the ability of these men to make normal sperm," Dr. Wylie C. Hembree III said Wednesday. "Whether this inability gives rise to abnormal offspring has not been shown, but I believe it must be investigated."

The warning was based on a study of 16 men who were monitored during and after a month of heavy marijuana use, he told a news conference during the Endocrine Society's annual meeting in San Francisco.

The effect on the number, mobility and appearance of sperm cells apparently is not permanent.

Hembree said anything that affects sperm cells, which deliver half the genes of any child, must be considered at least a potential threat.

Until that question is resolved, he said, "Men who are at risk of reproduction or who are attempting to reproduce should restrain themselves from marijuana use."

"That's clearly indicated and I don't see how anyone could suggest anything else. We don't know the long-term effects on subsequent generations."

He said it's uncertain just how marijuana causes

such changes, but his study found, to his surprise, that the effect is not related to changes in sex hormones. In rats and monkeys exposed to large amounts of marijuana, substantial hormone impacts have been reported.

"These effects (in human males) are unrelated to and not mediated by hormonal changes," he said.

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# Jaworski's career brings satisfaction

HOUSTON (AP) — In one of his first cases, Leon Jaworski defended a black sharecropper accused of murdering a white man and his wife. In his last case, he helped force the resignation of an American president, Richard M. Nixon.

He says he faced hatred in both cases, but adds that both roles — as a public defender and as special prosecutor in the Watergate case — created "inner satisfaction that you have done your duty."

Jaworski was a 23-year-old lawyer when a court appointed him to defend Jordon Scott, an illiterate who had scrawled his "X" on a confession.

"In those days, a black murdering a white farmer and his wife was something that aroused the passion of the community," he recalled. "But I believe this man was entitled to the same standing in court as a rich white man."

Despite criticism from friends, crank phone calls and threatening anonymous letters, Jaworski "put up quite a stubborn fight" for Scott. Still, the sharecropper was twice convicted and died in the electric chair.

Jaworski says that lesson prepared him for a test nearly a half century later when, as an established attorney, he became the public adversary of President Nixon — a man he liked and a candidate he had voted for.

"That taught me to cross the barrier of doing things that were unpopular, to live with them and to realize that after the ordeal is over, you feel inner satisfaction that you have done your duty," he said.

Jaworski, 76, hasn't returned to the courtroom since 1974, when he successfully secured tape recordings linking Nixon to the Watergate scandal.

"You just don't argue another case after you've argued 'the United States versus Nixon' before the Supreme Court," he said.

Jaworski does keep an office and acts as counsel to Fulbright & Jaworski, a firm he watched grow from 10 to 300 lawyers. The tanned, silver-haired lawyer is slimmer than during the Watergate days and keeps a schedule that might tire much younger men.

Doctors discovered in February that the "Colonel," as he is known to family and associates, had cancer of the pancreas. After completing a series of radiation treatments last month, Jaworski said, doctors "gave me a clean bill of health."

He accepts speaking engagements, is a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, board chairman of the Texas Medical Center and a fund-raiser for two Houston hospitals and his own non-profit foundation. During the last presidential election he headed "Democrats for Reagan."

He also retreats to his 400-acre ranch in the Texas Hill Country, where he wrote his Watergate best-seller, "The Right and the Power," his memoirs, "Confession and Avoidance," and the autobiographical "Crossroads."

Jaworski began practicing law in his hometown of Waco with two friends, defending bootleggers during the Prohibition and Jordon Scott.

He went on to represent Lyndon B. Johnson in court battles against the Republicans, and to prosecute, among others: Nazi war criminals, a Mississippi governor who refused to admit a black student to a state university and Korean influence peddlers.

But Jaworski considers his successful battle for the Nixon tapes — "the smoking gun" — the apex of his legal career.

At times, he said, "I'd rather talk about anything but Watergate. But I'm constantly surprised how interest in the subject has continued at such a high level. I thought interest in Watergate would wind down within two years."

Jaworski, then president of the American Bar Association, said he closely followed the events of the June 17, 1972, burglary at the Democrat National Committee's Watergate headquarters in Washington, D.C.

When Archibald Cox was fired as special prosecutor in October 1973, Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr., now secretary of state, asked Jaworski to take the job. He accepted after receiving assurances he would have the independence he wanted.

"For the first couple of months, I didn't think I had a friend. The conservatives couldn't forget my past record and that I was Lyndon Johnson's lawyer, and the liberals considered me an 'establishment lawyer' hand-picked by Nixon," he said.

## After 10 years, editors analyze Watergate

WASHINGTON — It started with what looked like a rather routine police beat story: a group of men caught in a bungled burglary.

But almost from the minute the reporters got on the scene it was clear this was no ordinary break-in. Many of the men involved wore business suits and had unusual connections high in the federal government.

More than two years, thousands of hours of reporting and hundreds of stories later, that incident led to the president of the United States resigning to avoid impeachment, and the imprisonment or other punishment of dozens of his aides and loyalists.

Now from the perspective of 10 years, two of the editors who directed the reportage of the events surrounding the Watergate scandal believe that that incident and its coverage have changed fundamentally the relationship between the news media and government officials.

But, they said, it may not prevent something like the Watergate scandal from happening again.

"I don't think of Watergate as the break-in," said Barry Sussman, former District of Columbia editor for the Washington Post. "I think of it as the total abuse of the government function."

"In that sense, I think we will have presidents trying to do whatever they can to get an edge," Sussman said. "But I don't think we'll see that kind of massive abuse at every level."

"I would never be so presumptuous as to say what could or could not happen," said Harry Rosenfeld, then assistant managing editor in charge of Washington coverage for the Post, and Sussman's immediate superior. Some aspects of the Watergate episode, such as the elaborate taping system that eventually produced the "smoking gun" that brought President Richard Nixon down, will not be repeated, Rosenfeld suggested.

"But that doesn't guarantee it will change the morality and legality of the people involved in government," he said.

Sussman was editor the night of June 17, 1972, when seven men were caught in or around the Democratic National Committee offices in the Watergate office and hotel complex. He later became a virtual full-time Watergate editor and wrote a book about the experience, being re-issued under the title "784 Days That Changed America."

Working for Sussman that night were two relatively young and unknown reporters — Carl Bernstein and Robert Woodward — who were to win for their paper the Pulitzer Prize for their work on Watergate.

Sussman believes that Watergate has changed the relationship between the news media and political figures, "to a degree."

He recalled that in 1968 when Spiro T. Agnew was Nixon's choice for vice president, a number of newspapers, including the Post, were investigating allegations of improper land-dealing involving Agnew.

"When he was elected with Nixon, that just stopped cold," Sussman said. "You had the feeling that the media would not look into some things that put our highest leaders into disrepute."

"I think that has changed," he said. "I don't think someone being elected would stop that kind of inquiry from going on."

Rosenfeld said it was his impression that Watergate "has affected" the relationship between the news media and public officials. "Whether it has changed it or not, I don't know."

But Rosenfeld said he does believe that Watergate has led to the news media taking a harder look at public officials than they did before. That, plus some institutional changes, such as the special prosecutor office to examine question of impropriety by high federal officials, are among the positive outgrowths of the Watergate episode.

Those elements also focus on what Rosenfeld believes is the primary question raised by Watergate: "Do the people in government have to obey the law just like the rest of us? The people involved in Watergate felt they did not."

But the outcome of cases like Watergate should make it clear, he said, that everyone has to obey the law. And that includes the news media, he added. If that lesson is learned, something like Watergate would be less likely to recur, he said.

Sussman expressed a similar feeling.

"Those Watergate guys were not such terrible guys," he said.

"What they had was just such terribly misplaced loyalties."

While some of the Watergate participants, such as Howard Hunt, the break-in leader, were what Sussman called "true believers," the rest were mainly trying to protect "their president."

People in those positions in the future will have different perspectives because of Watergate, Sussman suggested.

Sussman and Rosenfeld said they agree with the common perception that Watergate has contributed to a lessened public regard for government and other public institutions — although Sussman, who now is in charge of polling for the Post, has trouble with the polls that purport to show that.

But both of them are careful to put that change and some of the other effects of Watergate into the context of the entire era, which included the long, painful national experience surrounding the Vietnam war and the civil rights movement of the late 1960s and early 1970s.

## Watergate musical in rehearsal

ATLANTA (AP) — Richard Nixon will lightheartedly concede "a mistake or two" and a group of Cubans will be singing the "Wiretap Blues" in a musical intended to get a few laughs out of the Watergate scandal.

But the creators of "Watergate: A Musical" insist the show isn't intended to exploit the break-in and bugging at the Democratic National Committee headquarters 10 years ago today that eventually led to former President Nixon's resignation.

"It's not really satirical," said Tommy Oliver, who created the musical with Edward J. Lakso, during a break in rehearsals Wednesday. "The line we like to use is we've made a lot of statements and no judgments."

Still, they hope to have the audience laughing through most of the production as Nixon, shown cleaning out his desk on his last day in office, defends himself to a 12-year-old White House visitor.

Gene Barry, who starred as a lawman and cane-toting dandy in the television series "Bat Masterson," plays Nixon. His lines include this somewhat lighthearted explanation of the break-in at the Watergate residential and office complex in Washington: "Some of the fellows made a mistake or two, but nobody's perfect. I'm not. Are you?"

Nixon also is seen telling his wife, Pat — played by Barry's wife, Betty Claire Barry — that the pressures of office and politics must always weigh on him.

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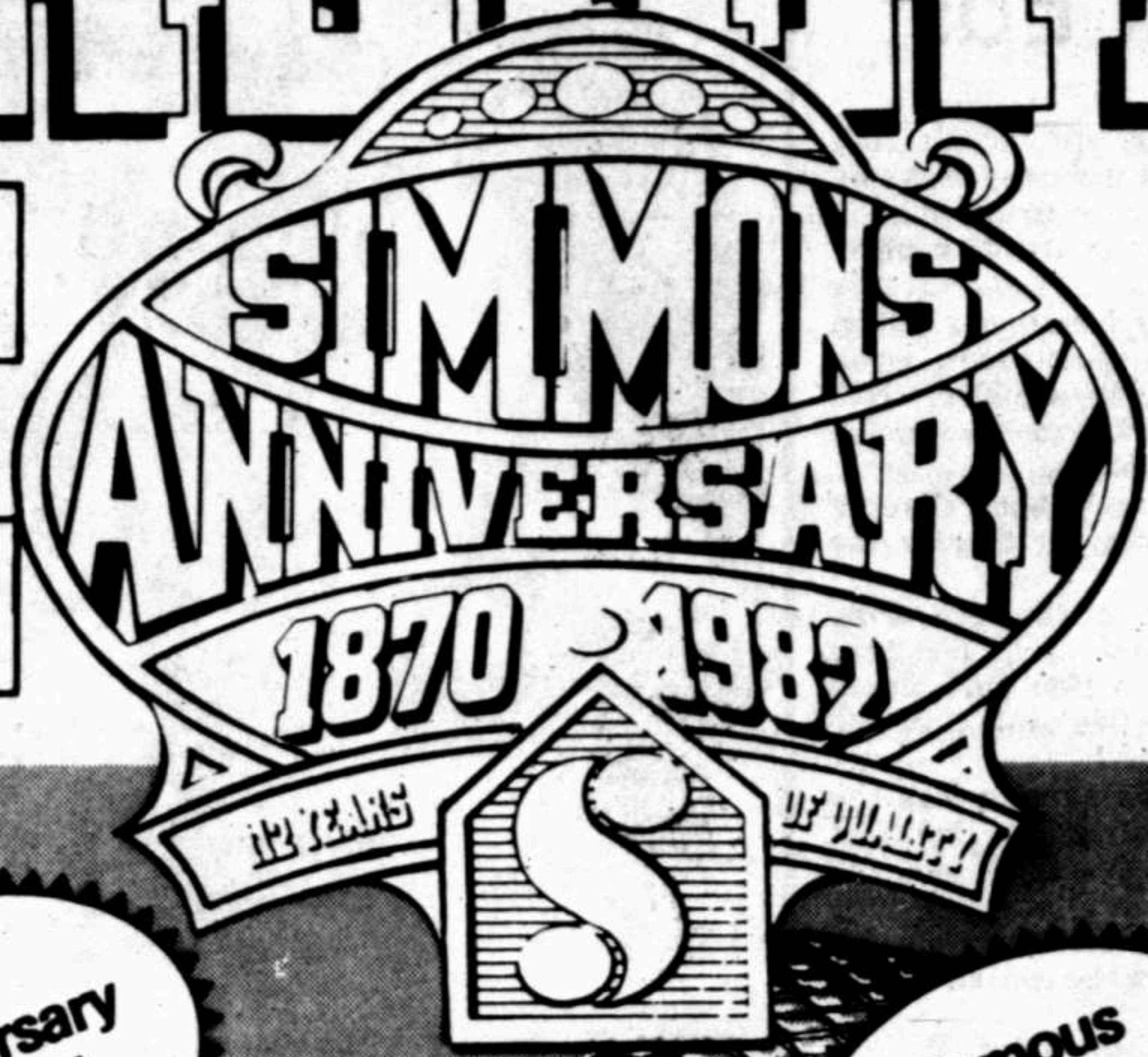
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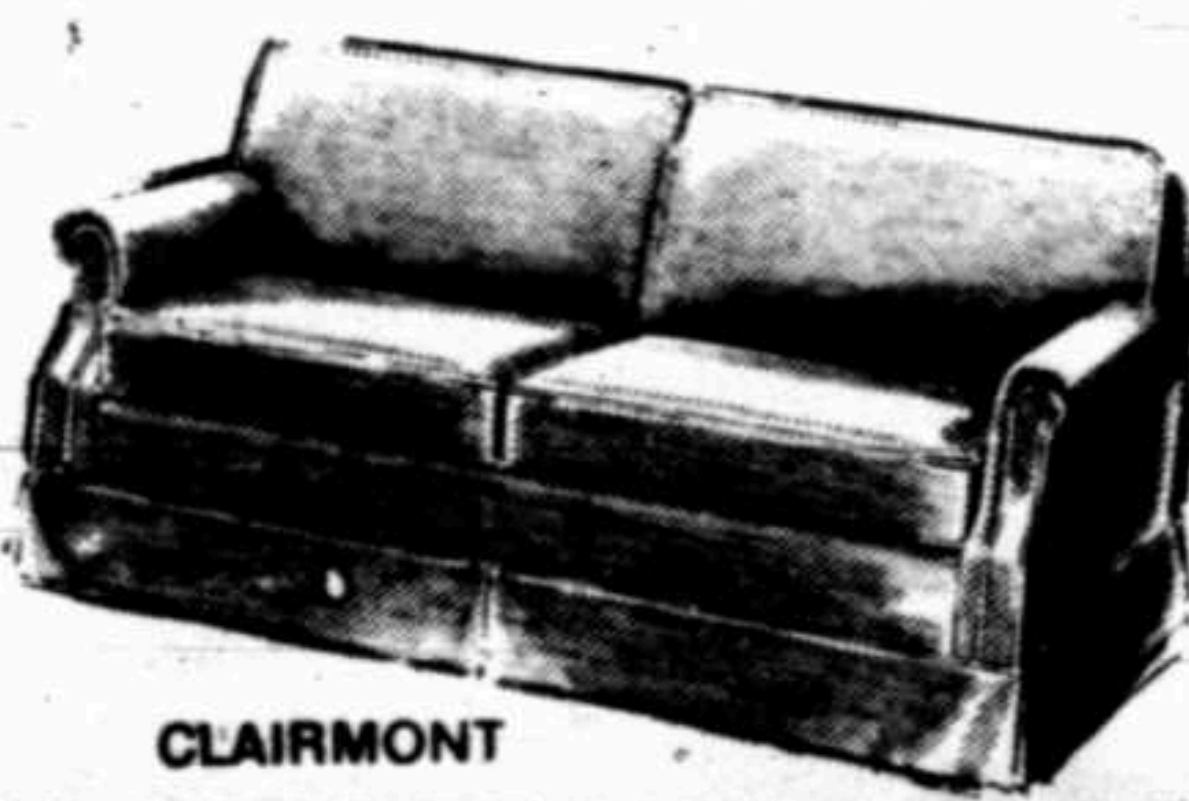

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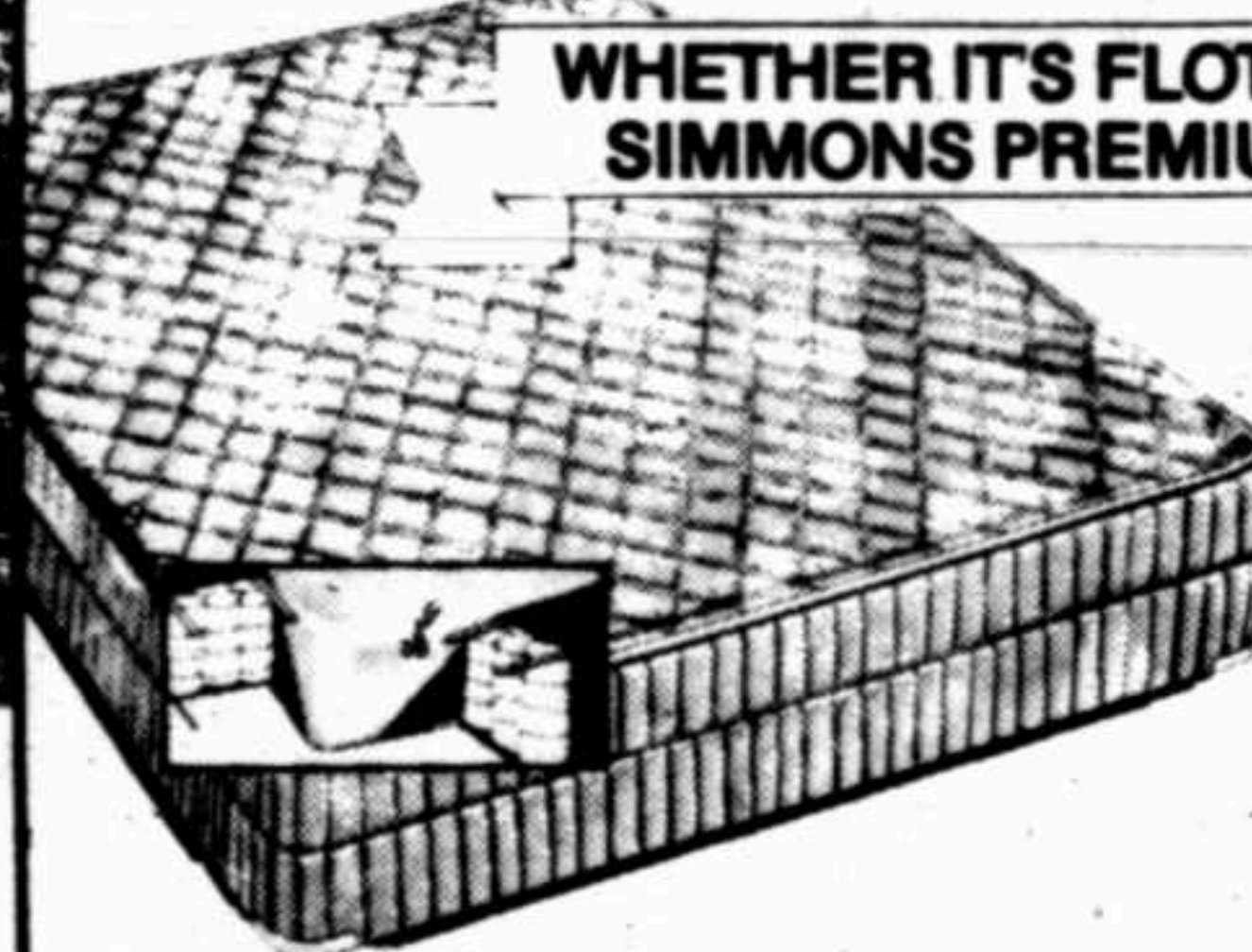
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## Over 3 million expected to see tall ships in East

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Thirty spectacular "tall ships," relics of the era before sails gave way to smokestacks, are expected to attract more than 3 million sightseers as Philadelphia celebrates its 300th birthday.

Rain or shine, officials predicted more than a million people would compete for vantage points today along 20 miles of waterfront along the Delaware River, from Marcus Hook, Pa., to Gloucester, N.J., to view the following Parade of Sail to Penn's Landing.

The ships will remain in port until Monday, allowing visitors to stroll on the decks and peer through the galleries.

Fred Stein, executive director of the sponsoring Philadelphia Century IV Committee, said, "It is very difficult to predict numbers but in 1980 when 20 tall ships visited Boston more than five million people came out to see them."

Scheduled to lead the river parade was the Esmeralda, a four-masted barquentine from Chile that has provoked some local controversy — and was expected to be greeted by demonstrators — because some say it was used as a floating torture chamber by the military regime that overthrew the elected Chilean civilian government a decade ago.

The Esmeralda, 353 feet long with masts 165 feet high, is one of the largest sail training ships in the world and the biggest in the parade. It carries a crew of 169 and 170 trainees.

"Past history of a ship doesn't determine its present use," Stein said, noting that the U.S. Coast Guard's Eagle, the biggest of the 18 American vessels docking here, and Portugal's Sagres II were used as Nazi troop ships during World War II.

Esmeralda's masts are too tall to sail under the Walt Whitman Bridge to the Penn's Landing berthing area, so arrangements were made for it to dock at the nearby Philadelphia Naval Base.

Parade rules called for ships to stay 1,000 yards or five minutes apart so spectators could get an unrestricted look and the best photographic angles.

Other large ships bound for Penn's Landing included Venezuela's Simon Bolivar, Colombia's Gloria, and Portugal's Sagres II.

Their arrival was preceded by a 1,700-mile race across the Atlantic Ocean, won by Venezuela's Supercilious.

Supercilious, however, didn't make it to Philadelphia. After crossing the finish line at Cape May, N.J., last weekend, its crew turned east for Europe and another race in the Mediterranean.

## Small-town cop can't carry gun because of law

GENESEE, Idaho (AP) — The police chief here would have to arrest himself if he pulled a gun to stop a criminal.

Genesee Police Chief Emerald "Ed" Buck, who served jail sentences more than 18 years ago for assault and drug possession, can't pack a pistol because state law forbids ex-convicts from carrying guns.

Buck, 43, said he doesn't mind the gun restriction, although he thinks the state should waive it.

"The people in town don't need a chief with a gun," he said. "Most of the job involves traffic offenses and getting people home when they've had too much to drink. Ninety percent of my time is spent in public relations. I don't feel uncomfortable not wearing a gun."

But the City Council that hired Buck last Dec. 9 to keep the peace in this northern Idaho community of 800 people is worried because the Idaho Peace Officer Standards and Training Academy refused to admit him for training due to his felony conviction.

When he took the job, he was unaware of the gun restriction. State officials informed him of it when he was rejected by the training academy.

"I was under the assumption that once you did your time, it was over with," Buck said. "I don't need the class, but the City Council is worried about me not carrying a gun. Latah County sheriff's deputies are afraid to call me out for backup."

The city council, in a quandary, voted Tuesday to extend Buck's probation period, which should have ended this month, until Sept. 1. By then, Buck hopes the state will approve a waiver so he can carry a gun.

## Queen Beatrix praises Atlanta's 'peaceful changes'

ATLANTA (AP) — Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands laid a wreath on the grave of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. and praised Atlanta as "one of the finest cities that has made peaceful changes, particularly in the area of race relations."

The queen's remarks Wednesday opened her two-week tour of 10 U.S. cities to commemorate the bicentennial of diplomatic relations between her country and the United States. The Netherlands recognized American sovereignty in 1782.

Her activities Wednesday also included a luncheon at the governor's mansion, a visit with Mayor Andrew Young at City Hall and a black-tie dinner and reception for the Dutch community in Atlanta.

The queen and her husband, Prince Claus, were greeted at the King Center by King's widow, Coretta Scott King, and the Rev. Martin Luther King Sr.

An aide said the King Center visit was a "special request" of the queen. The next stop on the queen's tour is Houston, followed by Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Detroit, Grand Rapids and Holland, Mich., Albany, N.Y., and New Brunswick, N.J.

CHICAGO (AP) — Soviet journalist Andrei Frolov will join his American wife in the United States on Sunday after Soviet authorities finally granted him permission to emigrate.

From May 9 to June 4, the couple staged a hunger strike to pressure Soviet officials to allow him to leave the Soviet Union.

His wife, Lois Frolov, 27, said she received word Wednesday from the U.S. Embassy in Moscow about her husband's travel plans.

"I feel much better. I'm beginning to finally believe that he's coming," Mrs. Frolov said.

Earlier this month, Frolov received permission to emigrate to the United States. But Soviet officials delayed his departure by insisting that he acquire an additional transit visa because his flight would stop briefly in West Germany before arriving in the United States, she said.

"They kept giving him the runaround," Mrs. Frolov said. "But, he's lived there for 51 years. I guess he's used to these games."

Since last July, Frolov has twice been denied permission to emigrate to the United States on grounds that "it was not in the best interests" of the Soviet Union, his wife said.

## No more Pac Man in Marshfield

MARSHFIELD, Mass. (AP) — Owners of commercial video games, upset at the prospect of losing revenue from thousands of quarters, are working to shoot down a new bylaw that bans the popular games.

"It's a matter of trying to stay in business," said Louis Snyder, owner of the Marshfield Sports Center bowling alley, which has had the games for seven years. "We need that income," he said.

A machine in a good location can gross an estimated \$35,000 a year.

The new law was passed Tuesday at a town meeting, but won't take effect for 90 days, or until the Massachusetts Attorney General approves the action. Meanwhile, selectmen will mail notices telling the owners of

an estimated 200 video games to get rid of them. "The proliferation of these games in town has created a honky-tonk atmosphere," says Tom Jackson, chairman of the town's vandalism committee, who proposed the bylaw.

Snyder said he is organizing a business group in this town of 6,700 residents southeast of Boston to try to overturn the bylaw.

The bylaw makes ownership of a video game for commercial purposes a crime, subject to a \$200 fine. The law also applies to pinball games, but exempts home video games, coin-operated juke boxes, pool or billiard tables, bowling and athletic training devices.

## Primary candidacy father-daughter act

DETROIT (AP) — A father and daughter are on the Aug. 10 primary ballot for a seat in Michigan's House of Representatives, but another candidate for the office is crying foul over the issue.

Among the seven Democratic candidates on the ballot in the new 2nd District in Detroit are Rep. Clemens Bykowski, whose district was eliminated by reapportionment, and his 24-year-old daughter, Karen, who filed for office this week.

Bykowski, 58, said his daughter's candidacy caught him by surprise. But another of the candidates, state Rep. Burton Leland, suggested the move was planned.

"It's obvious to me he put her in the race so he could get the special (ballot) designation," said Leland, 33.

Under Michigan law, candidates who have the same last names may have their occupations listed on the ballot. Thus, Bykowski would be listed as a state representative and Leland would not, presumably giving Bykowski an advantage that Leland considers unfair.

Bykowski said he had been unable to reach his daughter by telephone at the Wayne County Probate Court, where she is an administrative assistant.

"They keep telling me she's unavailable," he said. "But if I get hold of her, you can bet she won't be in the race."

Karen Bykowski insisted Wednesday she had not told her father about her candidacy before filing, and added she might pull out before the Friday afternoon deadline for withdrawal.

Asked why she became a candidate, she said, "I'd rather not say."

## Man spends two days in sewer

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A youth cutting weeds in a heavily wooded area heard faint cries for help and discovered a 26-year-old man who had been trapped in a storm sewer for two days.

The victim, Allen Gaage, was in good condition Wednesday night at Veterans Administration Medical Center, a hospital spokeswoman said.

"He is extremely lucky," said Harold Knabe, public information officer for the Kansas City Fire Department.

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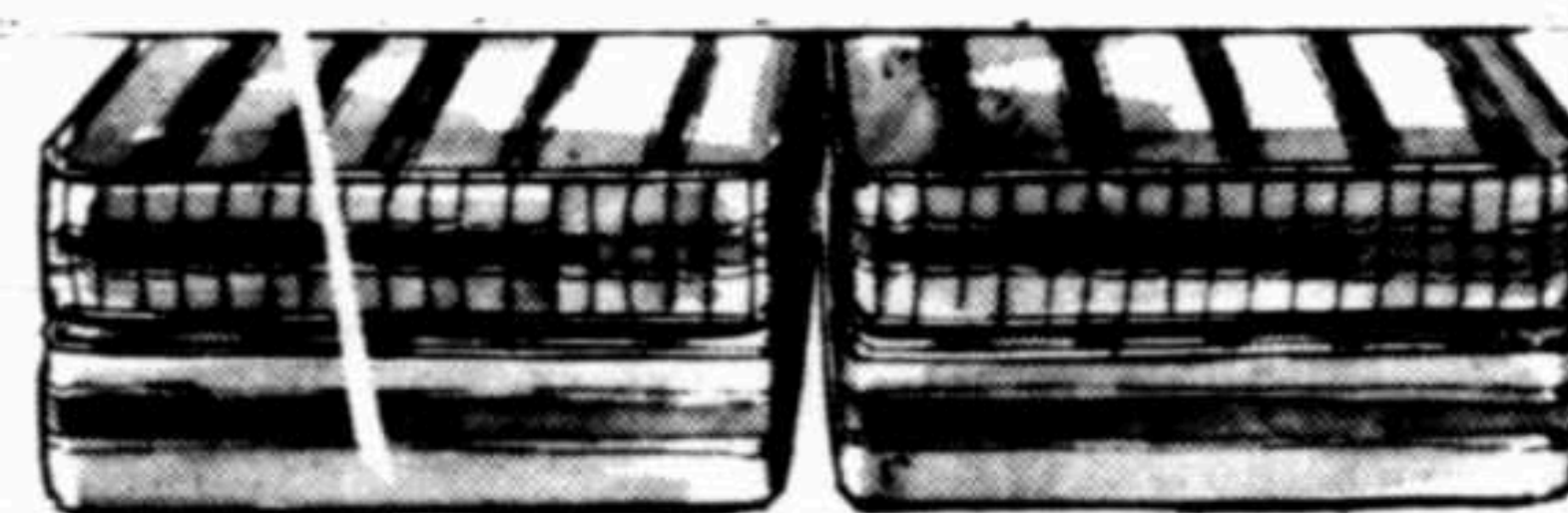

# Tax violates constitutional concepts, Scroggins says

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — The impact of the 1980 Windfall Profits Tax on the U.S. Constitution should be the major concern of a federal court hearing an appeal of the constitutionality of that tax, an attorney says.

Harold B. Scroggins, an attorney for the Independent Petroleum Association of America, said the tax violates constitutional concepts that forbid legislation favoring a particular minority or the taxing of a minority by the majority.

"We feel this issue is the most important issue before the court," Scroggins told U.S. District Judge Ewing Kerr here Wednesday as a two-day hearing on a government motion to dismiss the suit got under way.

Scroggins said the constitutional questions are even more significant than the monetary impact of the tax, which is estimated eventually to collect \$227.3 billion.

Texas Attorney General Mark White

called the federal government's approach to taxing additional income resulting from the decontrol of crude oil prices "extremely unwise," and noted the tax had the opposite of its intended effect.

The tax was effective in March 1980 on all produced, taxable crude oil in the United States with the exception of oil from certain areas of Alaska, which were exempted to spur exploration in those remote fields, officials said.

But it was challenged in a suit, which said, in part, the tax is unconstitutional because when it makes an exemption for parts of Alaska, it fails the constitutional requirement that taxes be levied equally.

The Independent Petroleum Association of America was one of about three dozen parties to file the original suit last fall. Kerr later reduced the list of plaintiffs to three individuals and an oil company, but the others have maintained their participation in the case as intervenors.

One of those intervenors is the state of Texas, and its attorney general told

the court no clearer example of an unfair tax exists than the Windfall Profits Tax of 1980.

Rather than reward producers for increased production, it requires them to forfeit a large part of their income, the Texas attorney general said.

"With that forfeiture, higher costs and lower prices, it soon becomes uneconomical to produce oil," White said. The result is a greater dependence on foreign oil, he said.

Louisiana and the American Farm Bureau Federation also have intervened.

The suit said the Alaska exemption requires other producers to bear a "disproportionate" share of the tax.

White also noted the burden is not placed only on major corporations.

In Texas, a state that has produced one-third of all the crude oil ever produced in this country, he said there are 600,000 royalty owners. Four hundred thousand of those, he said, get less than \$300 a month from royalties and often depend on them for to supplement their living.

# Group warns of shortages; oil industry sees no problem

WASHINGTON (AP) — Motorists, already hit with gasoline price increases of a dime per gallon, will see prices climb even higher and could face shortages before summer is over, according to a group critical of the oil industry.

The Citizens-Labor Energy Coalition said Wednesday it was likely that both gasoline and heating oil prices will "increase dramatically" in the next few months.

But the chief lobbying arm of the oil industry called that allegation "economic nonsense" and said it ignored the fact that even with the recent hikes, gasoline prices are still lower than a year ago.

The energy coalition blamed the major oil companies for creating the problem by selling off inventories and refusing to replace supplies in early spring.

In its report, "Where Have All the Barrels Gone?" the energy coalition contended that gasoline stocks at the beginning of the summer driving season were the lowest in history. It said that since March, oil companies

depleted their gasoline inventory by 52 million barrels, while heating oil levels have dropped 56 million barrels since January.

The coalition blamed the drawdown on a systematic oil industry strategy to cut prices and sell off supplies in early spring, drying up the surplus and using the ensuing shortages to drive prices up. It said the stocks of both gasoline and heating oil are lower now than they were during the 1979 shortages.

As a result, the coalition said, gasoline prices have jumped 10 cents a gallon in the last two months and heating oil prices have risen between 8 and 10 cents.

"At a time when there is no Arab oil embargo, no Iranian revolution, ample supplies of crude oil and a deep recession, consumers should not be facing substantial price increases for gasoline and heating oil. Prices should be falling," said Robert Brandon, executive director of the coalition.

The coalition said the recent hikes are just the beginning. It predicted further increases in both gasoline and heating oil and said the stage was set for "possible supply shortages."

Last week, Rep. Richard Ottinger, D-

N.Y., released a congressional study that said the oil industry was performing much as it had before the 1979 shortages. Ottinger called for legislation requiring oil companies to maintain minimum supply levels.

But Charles J. DiBona, president of the petroleum institute, said oil company critics were ignoring substantial differences between the current situation and the 1979 shortage. He said while supplies of refined products have dropped, crude oil stocks remain high with ample refinery capacity available to process the crude.

He also said those who contend that gasoline and heating oil supplies are at their lowest level even ignore the fact that demand has also fallen off substantially in recent years.

"There is no reason for the American public to expect shortages in the months ahead, barring a disruption in supply of imported oil," DiBona said.

Other industry analysts supported that prediction. They noted that the two-month increase in wholesale gasoline prices appears to be slackening, pointing to Getty Oil Co.'s recent decision to drop wholesale prices by 1 to 3 cents.

# Sutton's company documents presented

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Government attorneys have presented company documents that they claim Tulsa oilman Robert Sutton ordered destroyed to thwart a federal crude-oil price investigation.

The evidence came Wednesday in opening stages of Sutton's retrial on one charge of attempting to obstruct justice. A jury deadlocked on the charge three weeks ago, although Sutton was convicted on another obstruction charge.

Earlier, his defense attorney told a U.S. District Court jury that Sutton will offer testimony to extinguish "the last burning ember in a fire that was started by the government in 1978."

U.S. District Judge James Ellison later rebuked defense attorney Rodney

Devilliers Sr. for the opening remarks, which the judge indicated contained "inflammatory statements."

Sutton, 48, is on trial on one count alleging he attempted to obstruct justice by ordering a former employee to destroy oil business records being sought by Department of Energy auditors in 1978.

Ellison has sought to make sure that jurors are not aware that 15 counts of oil price control violations originally lodged against Sutton were dismissed May 13.

Testifying for the government, Jean Brown, a former accountant for Sutton, said she and another office worker spent about five days assembling records sought by an Energy Department auditor.

She identified the box produced by

government attorneys as the one containing documents she gave to another Sutton employee who was to transport it to Louisiana, where Sutton has an oil refinery and other interests.

She said she later saw the box in Oklahoma City where a 1978 federal grand jury was investigating Sutton.

Ellison was visibly upset with Devilliers at the trial's outset, twice interrupting to warn him he was not following previous court instructions about what issues could be raised before the jury.

After complaints by Justice Department attorney Richard Sauber, Ellison said Devilliers violated earlier court instructions by referring to the pending charge as "Count 16" and by using the term "vendetta" to describe the government's actions.

# Dresser, Halliburton subsidiary expand layoffs

DALLAS (AP) — Officials of Dresser Industries Inc. say they will lay off 450 workers this week, while a subsidiary of another oilfield service company has already laid off 660 of its employees in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas since June 1.

Spokesmen for Dresser and Halliburton Co. said Wednesday the layoffs are due to a downturn in drilling activity in the oil and gas industry. They said that the 2,924 rigs operating in the United States are down 25 percent from a year ago.

Dresser's Security Division, which manufactures rock bits, will lay off about 200 salaried and hourly employees at its Dallas plant, effective June

18. And the Guiberson Division plant of Dresser here notified about 150 salaried and hourly employees of their layoffs, effective Wednesday.

"These layoffs are a direct result of the downturn in oilfield drilling and completion businesses which use our products," said John Ray, industrial relations manager for Dresser. "We do not know how long the layoffs will last."

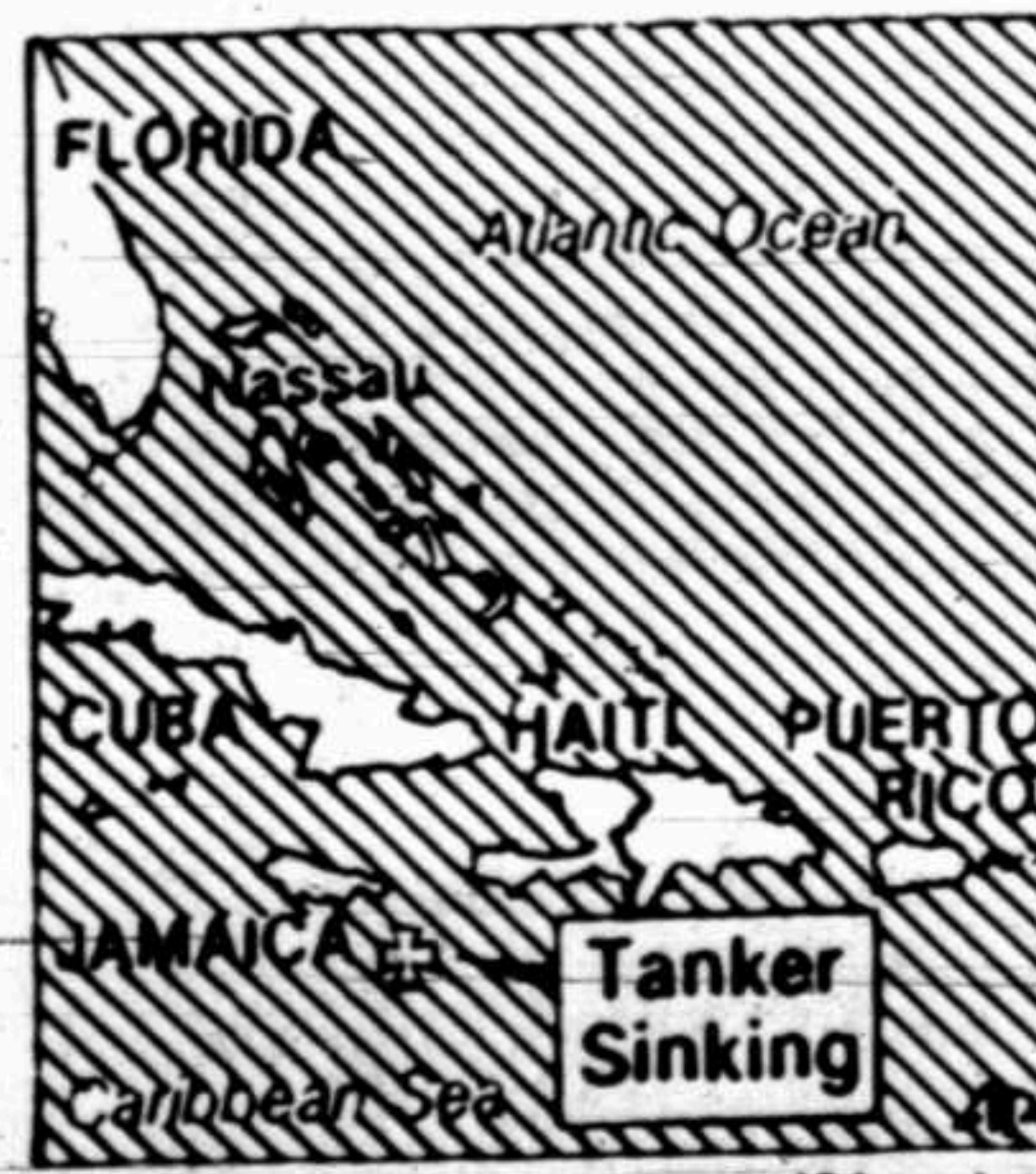
Halliburton Services Inc., a subsidiary of Dallas-based Halliburton Co., has laid off about 300 workers since June 1 at its Duncan, Okla., plant. Company officials said another 350 have been laid off at Halliburton Services plants

in Davis, Okla., Coffeyville, Kan., and Amarillo.

"It's primarily due to the slump in the drilling industry," said John Birdsong, vice president of personnel at Halliburton. "It's industrywide."

He said he did not know how long the present cuts would be in effect.

"The current pessimism in the domestic oil industry stems basically from reduced demand, declining or unstable oil prices, and high oilfield inflation," R.B. Kyle Jr., senior vice president of operations for Dresser, said in a recent presentation at an oil and gas seminar.

**AUSTIN, Texas (AP) —** The Supreme Court agreed today to hear South Texas banker-rancher Clinton Manges' argument that a lower court wrongly took away his mineral rights to 87,000 acres in Starr and Jim Hogg counties.

The court scheduled oral arguments for July 14.

In 1969, Manges bought from the Guerra family half the mineral rights and "executive" management rights to the land.

J.C. Guerra, joined by several relatives, sued Manges in 1974, contending Manges mismanaged the mineral rights and kept the Guerra family from receiving lease income.

Manges, they argued, did not lease to third parties as they had expected him to do, but proceeded to drill oil wells on the land himself. Manges also improperly put up the

mineral rights as security on a \$7 million loan, they argued.

A jury awarded the Guerras \$382,608 in actual damages and \$500,000 in exemplary damages and voided Manges' executive rights to manage the minerals.

Manges argued to a Waco appeals court that the trial court was out of bounds in taking away his executive rights to the minerals. But the Waco appeals court said Manges' leasing of land to himself to get around a court tie-up "smacked of fraud on its face."

The trial court, said the appeals judges, was right to void Manges' executive mineral rights, which was like a court's removal of a trustee for breach of fiduciary duties.

Manges' attorney, Pat Maloney, said in his brief to the state Supreme Court that the trial judge was "a retired domestic relations judge unin-
