Driver Failed To See Turn In Road And Car Hit Ditch

Mrs. K. J. Miller and Miss Winona Miller met instant death in accident on highway.

TWO OTHERS SUFFER ONLY SLIGHT HURTS

Party from Fort Worth Were On Way To Visit Woman Living Ten Miles North of Lockney.

(Special To The Avalanche)

FLOYDADA, April 24.—Mrs. C. J. Miller, 60, and her daughter, Miss Winona Miller, 22, of near Fort Worth, were instantly killed early tonight when a Buick touring car in which they were traveling from Lockney was overturned on the highway near this place.

Mrs. Miller's son, about 27 years of age, who was driving the car, and her husband suffered slight injuries.

The driver failed to observe a turn in the road, about four miles from Lockney, and the car ran into the ditch, overturning and pinning its occupants underneath.

The party were on their way to visit Mrs. E. M. Whorton, who resides ten miles north of Lockney. The Millers live just outside the city limits of Fort Worth.

The bodies of the two women were brought to Floydada and the two men were treated there. Their injuries, while painful, were not considered serious. Funeral arrangements had not been made tonight.

Lid Clamped On Winkler Output

Texas' Biggest Producing Field Limited To 150,000 Barrels Daily Under Ruling of State Board.

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, April 24.—Production of the new Winkler county oil field, which has produced as high as 300,000 barrels daily, was limited to 150,000 barrels Tuesday, effective May 5, by order of the state railroad commission, which prescribed a prorate production arrangement, ignoring all existing sales contracts.

The order is the result of several conferences between the commission and producers in the field, and is designed to stop reported waste and overproduction, charged particularly against the Winkler field in the current oil market depression.

Amount of each producer's share allowed to be taken out under the order will be determined by figuring the ratio of his potential or possible production to total possible production of the field, and partially by ratio of his acreage to the total acreage.

Not more than one well can be drilled during effective time of the order on each 160 acres, and no well can be drilled nearer than 300 feet to any property line, nor nearer than 600 feet to any other producing well.

The Winkler field is now producing about 200,000 barrels of oil daily.

Breach of Contract On Paving Alleged

Evidence in the case of Count-Baker corporation of Oklahoma City against the City of Slaton, which began in the 98th district court yesterday, will re-open the case this morning.

The suit is for breach of contract alleged made between the City of Slaton and the corporation for paving work in Slaton. Damages amounting to \$7500 are asked.

W. F. Schenck and W. W. Campbell of Lubbock are attorneys for the plaintiff and R. A. Baldwin of Slaton represents the defendant.

Invade Town of Tinsan From Southwest

SHANGHAI, April 14. (AP)—Continuing their drive across Shanghai toward Peking, nationalists entered Tinsan from the southwest today. Demoralized, the northern army made no resistance. Thousands of northern deserters were streaming across the country today. Lawlessness and brigandage prevailed.

Lindbergh Carries Serum In Effort To Save Life Of Bennett, Fellow Aviator

Makes 500 Mile Hop From New York to Quebec in 4 Hours, Battling Rain and Snow

QUEBEC, QUE. April 24. (Canadian Press)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh landed here tonight from Curtis Field, New York, with a supply of serum for the treatment of Floyd Bennett, ill in a hospital here with pneumonia.

Lindbergh landed at 6:30 p. m. after a flight of more than 500 miles completed in four hours, through snow and rain. As soon as his plane stopped on the Plains of Abraham near the city, the Lone Eagle jumped into an automobile and was sped to Jeffrey Hale hospital where Bennett is battling for his life against double pneumonia.

(By Associated Press) America's heroes of the air are concentrating in the St. Lawrence valley, one group to aid a comrade in his battle for life and another to bring to fruition the first airplane flight from Europe to these shores.

Captain Charles A. Lindbergh landed at Quebec after a flight through rain and snow from Long Island with anti-pneumonia serum for the relief of Floyd Bennett, critically ill in Quebec hospital. Commander Richard E. Byrd, Bennett's beloved chief, was already at his bedside after a hurried trip from Boston.

Up the valley at Lake St. Armes was Clarence D. Chamberlin, waiting to greet the men who came from Germany, the land that he was first to reach in non-stop flight from America.

On Greenly Island in the Strait of Belle Isle which links the Gulf of St. Lawrence with the outer sea, was Bernt Balchen of the Byrd transatlantic crew, and the three men who first accomplished the westward air passage of the Atlantic. The battle for human life, a life distinguished by a flight to the North Pole, far overshadowed in public interest the drama of man's battle with distances in the air which had engrossed all attention for the week previous.

A snow storm raging over Greenly Island, beginning just as repairs to the Bremen were completed with parts brought in the Ford relief plane, held that group of aviators in their island refuge.

Lindbergh, with the fastest airplane the army met at Mitchell field could provide, pitted his skill against another snow storm which was reported as raging over southern Quebec.

Flood warnings were broadcast to inhabitants of the lower valleys of the Ocmulgee, and Oconee rivers in Georgia, while the population of Newton, Ga., on the Flint river, fearing a repetition of 1925's disaster fled.

FLOMOTON, Ala., was menaced by the rising waters of the Escambia river, and untimely streams, and twenty miles to the north, Brewton, wealthy lumber and creosote city, was inundated with nearly a thousand persons driven from their homes.

Nearly a hundred miles east of Flomonton, the little town of Caryville, Fla., evacuated last night, was threatened from six to twelve feet of water, with at least four additional feet expected before the crest of the Choctawhatchee river is reached.

Estimates of the homeless varied from 2,000 to 6,000 persons with many others expected to seek higher ground during the night. Any places have been isolated two days and nothing is known here of the plight of many rural communities.

MR. HOOVER

The last issue of the Saturday Evening
Post carries almost all its editorial space
pointing out what Mr. Hoover has done
for the country in the various capacities.
First, he went over and fed the starving
Belgians and distributed food among the
people. We do not know how well he did
that job because we have no first hand
information, except what was given us by
Mr. Hoover's efficient Press Agents. The
next was his administration as Food Di-
rector when he well nigh starved the
people of America to death on 50 per cent
flour, sawdust and corn meal. There was
enough sugar and grain to feed the world
for another year without another crop
and Mr. Hoover increasing the price of
these things inflating the values and
starving the people of the United States
to death without any cause was the only
thing we saw that he accomplished. The
Post points out other things—his great en-
gineering feats in Europe for the 14 or 15
years he spent outside the boundary of
this country, and we know nothing about
that. We do know he could have stayed
in the United States and helped to de-
velop the resources of the United States
had he wanted to, but if he brought any
real benefit to the people of Europe we
have no criticisms to make except we
have no praise for Mr. Hoover for help-
ing the people of America, when in real-
ity he was helping Europe; and as the
Post points out, he was not bringing any
European gold to the United States but
was using American money in Europe at
a time when other nations were more
prosperous than this. The Post points out
how he directed the flood control work
in the Mississippi Valley. That is the
biggest joke that any Press Agent could
have put over. No mortal man could
have directed because a line 450 miles
long with refugees every foot of the way
with thousands of refugees and their
problems changing in every locality every
day, he could not have personally di-
rected that work. It was emergencies that
had to be coped with and not routine
work. Had it been routine work alone,
Mr. Hoover might have claimed some
credit for directing the work but it was
not that, it was the problem of taking
care of 100 refugees with no money to
provide food and this problem might
have arisen at Memphis when Mr. Hoover
was at Vicksburg. The Red Cross people
in each locality had to direct this
work. Mr. Hoover came by and put his
stamp on everything, ate at a large ban-
quet, made a speech or two and had his
Press Agent write an article or two about
how he had rescued the people of the
South, there was nothing to it, it was one
of the most flamboyant pieces of Press
Agent work that was ever published. He
even went so far in his vanity as to have
his picture taken between two picnics
eating a sandwich out on a levy some-
where just to show he was out in the ac-
tual fight, but Mr. Hoover did no actual
fight, he encountered no danger, suffered
no discomforts and the best he could
have claimed to do was to encourage the
ones who were at work with his words of
commendation,

HUTCHISON, Kans., April 24. (AP)—A favorite son, Rep. W. A. Ayres, was endorsed for the presidential nomination by the Kansas state democratic convention today, and the state's delegates to the democratic national convention at Houston were instructed to support him for the nomination.

Hoover Has Great Majority In Voting

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 24. (AP)—With returns in from one-seventh of the precincts in the state, the entire slate of Hoover delegates at large voted on in Ohio's presidential primary had assumed the lead tonight over the seven candidates listed in the ballots as pledged to the late Senator Frank B. Willis.

Earlier in the count five of the seven Willis pledges were slightly ahead but reports from Cleveland, Cincinnati, Toledo and other populous Hoover strongholds turned the names of Hoover, Willis, and Ross were listed on the Republican preferential ballot, but none were listed on the democratic.

Returns from 469 precincts however, showed that 1,841 democrats had written in the name of Governor Smith of New York, 909 the name of former Senator Atlee Pomerene, and 526 Governor Donahay's name. Senator Reed of Missouri, who was born in Ohio, received 20 votes.

Running true to predictions, Hoover was showing his greatest strength in the cities, with the

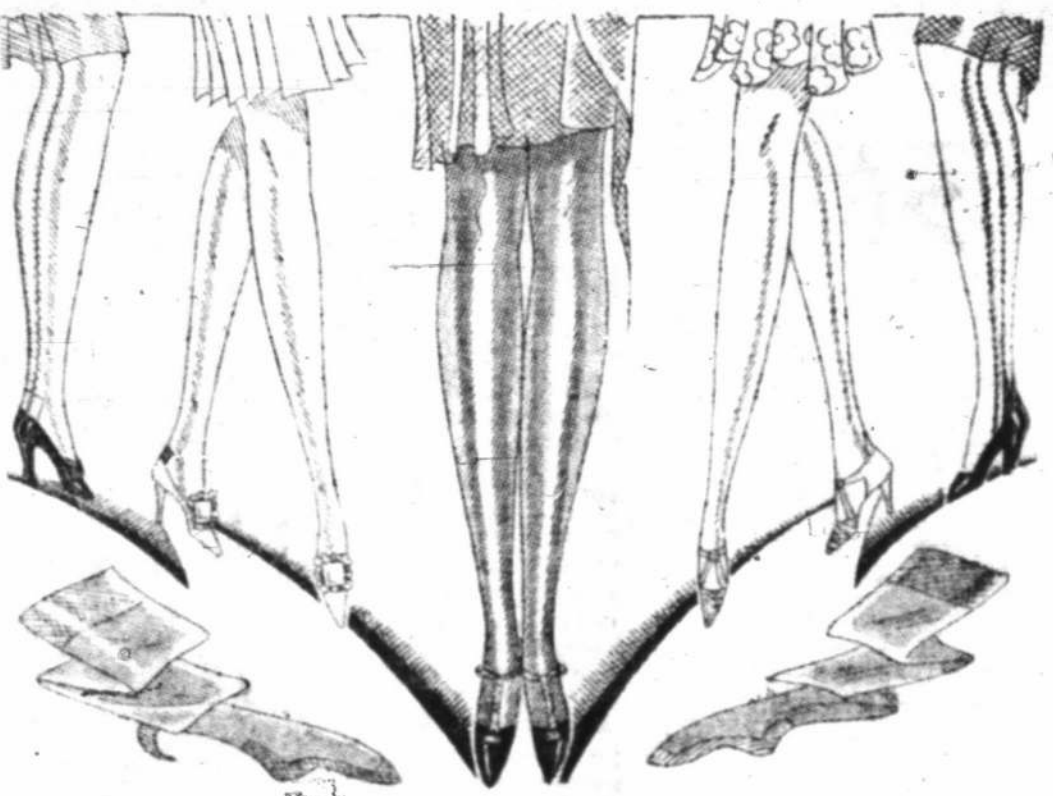

Horizons In Well Call At-

PNEUMONIA FATAL

Thirteen-Year-Old Boy Dies
Here

(Special to the Avalanche.)
BIG SPRING, April 23.—The
Roberts deep pool, in Howard county,
was extended a half mile north
this morning when the Fuel Oil
company drilled this number one.
Roberts two feet into the top of the
pay with production estimate rang-
ing from five to six thousand bar-
rels according to officials of the
company.

This test is located ten miles
south and eight miles east of here
in the southeast corner of the north
west quarter of section one-thirty-
six, block twenty-nine W and NW
survey, Howard county, and a half
mile north of the Magnolia first
deep producer. The five and three
sixteenths inch casing was set at
twenty-nine twenty feet and the
pay was topped at 2945 feet.

The formation in this hole runs
forty feet higher than in the Mag-
nolia test. A feature that is at-
tracting much attention from the
oil fraternity in this test is the fact
that this hole has three upper pro-
ducing horizons. The first at 1300
feet with a showing for 300 barrels;
the second at 1800 feet showing
more than 100 barrels and the third
at 2500 feet with an estimated pro-
duction of one thousand barrels.

The oil from the upper horizons
is sweet oil, while the deep oil
shows some sulphur. This producer
shows very small rock pressure
which is characteristic of this pool.
This extension is important to the
oil industry at this time also to
Cosden and company who recently
paid one thousand dollars an acre
for section 129 whose south line is
just a half mile north of this well.

DAILY MARKETS

WALL STREET REPORT

NEW YORK, April 24. (AP)—Fre-
quent shifts of speculative senti-
ment characterized today's stock
market in reflection of the general
uncertainty over the recent stiffen-
ing of money rates. Prices sold off
at the opening, rallied briskly be-
fore the end of the first hour, then
sold down again in the early after-
noon and turned sharply upward at
the close. Final quotations were ir-
regular, but gains predominated.

Total sales fell below the 3000,000
share mark for the first full session
since March 9.

Quarterly reports of the United
States Steel and General Motors
corporations were published after
the close of the market. Steel earned
\$2.11 a share on the common as
against \$1.05 in the last quarter of
1927 and \$3.93 in the first quarter
of 1927 which was prior to the dis-
tribution of the 40 per cent stock
dividend. General Motors earned
\$3.86 on the common as against
\$2.90 in the same period a year
ago. Both stocks were in brisk de-
mand at the close, steel showing a
net gain of 1 1/2-2 at 145 3/4 and
General Motors ending the day 4
points higher at 187 3/4.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, April 24. (AP)—Early
decline in the cotton market today
was followed by advances which
carried prices into new high ground
for the movement on the old crop
positions. After selling off to 19.80
shortly after the opening, July rallied
to 20.25 or 25 points net higher
and closed at 20.21, the general
market closing firm at net advances
of 20 to 21 points.

There was heavy selling at the
start owing to reports of improv-
ing weather conditions in the
south and relatively easy Liverpool
cables. Following recent advances
on unfavorable weather reports,
some traders evidently expected the
market to break sharply on the
first appearance of clearing condi-
tions in the belt and there was prob-
ably selling for a reaction as well as
realizing or liquidation of recent
purchases. First prices were 7 to
10 points lower and the active
months showed net losses of about
10 to 12 points during the early
trading, but the offerings were ab-
sorbed by trade buying, combined
with some fresh commission house
buying or covering and the mar-
ket soon turned steadier.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, April 24. (AP)—
The cotton market presented an
animated scene here today with
May climbing over \$2 a bale after
an early dip of 10 points on unfav-
orable cable news and closing at
20.02, a gain of 27 points over the
previous close. The general market
closed steady at net gains of 13
to 27 points.

Cables came in 5 to 7 points worse
than due and first trades showed
losses of from 7 to 9 points. Pros-
pects of fair weather prevailing
next month as revealed in the
weather map caused further re-
cessions with May touching 19.67,
July 19.56 and October 19.32, 9 to
13 points below yesterday's close
and today's lows.

As the session progressed, the
market turned easier on buying
based on later forecasts for cloudy
weather, which induced fears of a
recurrence of recent bad weather.
Additional private reports were re-
ceived of damage resulting to the
crop over the week-end from rain
and storms. There also were reports
of considerable price fixing in the
near month positions and shorts
covered in a report that a well
known cotton authority had said
that planters in the eastern and
central sections of the belt were
more behind with their crops than
ever before. At noon, May sold at
19.71 and October 19.43, 11 to 16
points up from the day's lows and
8 to 7 points net higher for the day.

built in the future.

New Forms Found Of Organic Life In Grand Canyon

Traces May Indicate Variety Millions of Years Older Than Any Discovered Heretofore

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Discovery of traces of organic life possibly millions of years older than any hitherto found, was announced before the National Academy of Sciences by Dr. Davis White of the United States Geological Survey.

This evidence, taken from rock, formed in the Proterozoic period at least 600,000,000 years ago, was obtained near the mouth of the Bright Angel creek by Dr. Davis White of the United States Geological Survey.

Although he has not completed his study of the new evidence, Dr. White, who is home secretary of the academy, is convinced that much of it is the product of rock forming processes still in progress, as described yesterday by Dr. Marshall A. Howe of the New York Botanical garden. These processes involve the action of algal, microscopical seaweed, in drawing carbonic acid from surrounding zones of water and thereby causing the crystallization about themselves of lime held in solution by that chemical element.

So many periods of extreme pressure have buckled and crushed the various strata of the earth's crust since the Proterozoic period ended about 425,000,000 years ago, that most of the rocks formed at that time have probably been erased. The Grand Canyon is one of the few places discovered where they have been preserved by nature in a condition making it relatively easy to recognize traces of such organisms.

BILL HELD UNSOUND

Denison Measure Opposed In House

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP).—The contention that the Denison bill to provide additional large facilities to the Inland Waterways corporation was economically unsound and would disturb the rate structure of the entire southwest was voted before the house commerce committee today by John L. Darrouzet of Galveston, Texas.

Opposing the measure as a representative of various Texas commercial organizations, Darrouzet declared that "it would be revolutionizing to enforce, or seek to enforce, a condition of this kind which cannot be beneficial to the farmers or to the producers of that section of the country who are dependent upon rail transportation."

ARCHBISHOP DIES

Body Is Surrounded By Other Exiles

SAN ANTONIO, April 24 (AP).—Surrounded by a guard of honor composed of men exiled like him, the body of Archbishop Jose Mora y Del Rio, head of the Mexican Catholic hierarchy lay in state today while mourners filed past his casket and knelt in the cathedral to murmur prayers. The Archbishop died in a local hospital last night from old age, and the cares that had bowed his shoulders.

A party of 60 seminarians from seven states of Guanahato divided the task of guarding the Archbishop's body between them today and tonight. They will remain with the body until the funeral services tomorrow, at which they will sing.

Wilkins, Resting From One Dash, Is Planning Another

This Time Adventurous Try Will Be Toward The South; Purchase Offer From Byrd Is Declined

(By Associated Press.)

GREEN HARBOR, Spitzbergen, April 24.—Captain George H. Wilkins, scarcely landed from his great feat of flying across the top of the world by airplane, already is planning a new air venture, this time over the Antarctic at the other end of the world.

The captain has received a telegraphic offer from Commander Richard S. Byrd, who also is planning an Antarctic expedition, to sell the Wilkins polar plane for the commander's South Pole trip. But Captain Wilkins replied that he was unable to accept the offer as he himself is planning a new expedition. This time to the south.

He plans to start on his venture as soon as possible, probably at the beginning of September, and has roughly drawn up a program for the projected exploration. Beyond this he refuses to give out any information.

He said, however, that with such an excellent airplane as that which carried him and Lieutenant Carl B. Eielson across the polar region from Barrow, and with such a glorious pilot as Eielson, he entertained the best hope of success.

The wireless station at Green Harbor has received such a large number of telegrams with questions from different parts of the world that the chief of the station, at the request of Captain Wilkins, has sent out a message saying that in the future they will refuse to answer any questions regarding the aviators.

OSLO, April 24 (AP).—The steamer Mina, owner by the Northern Exploration company and at present at Honningsvaag, Finmark, Norway, has received a telegraphic order to proceed as near Green Harbor, Spitzbergen, as possible, to take Captain George H. Wilkins and Lieutenant Carl B. Eielson and their airplane to Norway. The Mina left today and may reach the mouth of Ice Fjord about Saturday. The fliers are expected to reach Tromsø, Norway, early next week.

Associated Press In Annual Meeting

Fire Directors Re-elected At Session of World's Greatest News Organization

NEW YORK, April 24.—The Associated Press, at its annual meeting yesterday took favorable action on important proposals affecting its regulations, unanimously re-elected five members of its board of directors whose terms had expired and chose another director to fill a vacancy caused by death.

The association, by unanimous vote, adopted the report of a special committee appointed a year ago authorizing a bond issue to be allocated to all members. The amount of the issue was fixed at \$500,000. By another unanimous vote, the organization adopted the report of the special committee that the right of protest over the election of new members be extended to all members who have been in good standing for five years.

The following directors, whose terms had expired, were unanimously re-elected: Clark Howell, Atlanta, Ga.; Constitution; Elbert H. Baker, Cleveland, O.; Plain Dealer; Stuart H. Perry, Adrian (Mich.) Daily Telegram; J. R. Knowland, Oakland (Calif.) Tribune, and Richard Hooker, Springfield (Mass.) Republican.

Frederick I. Thompson of the St. Louis (Mo.) Register was chosen over L. K. Nicholson of the New Orleans (La.) Times-Picayune as a director to succeed Irwin P. Kirkwood of the Kansas City (Mo.) Star, who died last summer.

URBANA, Ill., April 24 (AP).—The army and the university of Illinois will meet on the football field in 1929 and 1930. Major Phillips Fleming, director of athletics at West Point announced today.
