DR. R. H. BURLESON FOUND DEAD SUNDAY

The news of the death of Dr. R. H. Burleson spread over our town and community Sunday evening came as a great shock barbed with pain and sorrow. And the manner in which he came to his death caused his friends to shudder.

Sunday evening about 6 o'clock the body was found in the W. B. Collier house here, where the doctor had roomed. The Collier family was away at the time and had been for several days. Dr. Burleson returned Friday from a trip and it is the thought that he died some time Friday night. Mrs. Willie Watkins, a neighbor passing near the house Sunday evening, first discovered the body. The authorities were at once notified, and inquest held. The decision was that the doctor must have met his death by his own hand. The face was covered and two chloroform bottles lay beside the body. One of the bottles was empty. Burial took place about 12 o'clock Sunday night. Memorial services will be conducted next Sunday.

It is said the deceased was about 73 years of age.

Dr. Burleson had made his home in this county for some twenty-five years and is well known throughout all this section. He had been a very brilliant and successful physician and despite his age and ill health of later years, he was medical authority excelled by few in the state. His friends were numbered by his acquaintances. And many there are in Kimble county who owe their lives to timely and faithful assistance of this old man. In the home of the rich or the squalid hut of poverty he was ever prompt and faithful. He was an exceptional man. His brain power and memory and endurance was remarkable. A brilliant intellect which had been polished by the best of education and training, making him in this a man among men. He had no relatives in this part of the state except a brother, Les Burleson of San Saba. The deceased was a cousin to Postmaster General Burleson and has other prominent connections. He was closely related to several prominent characters of Texas history. Dr. Burleson was at one time considered among the leading physicians of Texas.

There are some sad facts in connection with his life which made his life very different to what it might have been. Let that remain a closed book. We will remember him for the good that he did among our people.

Dr. Burleson will be missed among Junction people. Let us consider his many acts of kindness and good deeds, and over his shortcomings, whatever they may have been, throw a mantle of charity, and keep fresh in the limelight of memory his virtues.

TEXAS BREAKS MONTHLY RECORD FOR CATTLE DIPPINGS TO ERADICATE TICK.

Washington, D. C.,

The people of Texas have broken all records by carrying out both in July and August more dippings to eradicate cattle tick than performed by any other State in a single month. The U. S. Department of Agriculture's field reports from Texas show for July 760,846 dippings and August 740,751 dippings under Federal or State supervision. The reports from the field indicate that the dipping is being systematically carried out in this State in a larger number of counties than ever before.

Mississippi holds second place for the number of cattle dippings in a single month. In August the people of Mississippi had provided 1,056 dipping rats and at these rats 705,424 dippings of cattle were performed under Federal or State supervision. This is an increase of 35 rats and 15,000 dippings over the work accomplished in that State during July. The legislature of Mississippi recently passed a law requiring that tick eradication shall be taken up by every county after January 1. The people of Mississippi, however, are not delaying their active campaign against the tick until their State law makes this compulsory upon them.

Obituary.

Our old friend and brother in Christ—Andy Wilson, departed this life at about 8 a. m. the 26 inst at his home in Junction, surrounded by a number of his loved ones. He was born in Arkansas, and came to Kimble county about 28 years ago. Thus one by one of our honored old timers cross the divide intervening between the life here and the life hereafter. He was about 68 years of age, and had been a sufferer for quite a time, realizing all the while that the sands of life were fast hastening him to the inevitable. As he neared the brink of the river of death, he became more reconciled to die and to be relieved of his trouble. His faithful team of black horses that had carried him around for so many years, at his request, pulled his mortal remains to the last resting place. He was perfectly prepared to meet his Saviour at the resurrection of the dead; having served Him as a member of His church for some years. His many friends claim a part with the many relations and the sorrowing life companion in their sorrow over his departure. There is a better day coming to all who love and serve the Saviour when we shall have crossed the divide to the haven of eternal rest. May the good Lord bless, guide and direct our steps thitherward. His body was laid to its last resting place in the North Llano Cemetery, on the morning of the 27th, inst, in the presence of the large concourse of friends and his many relatives—John S. Durst leading in the burial service.
