Arrests should clear up local burglaries

The arrest of two Big Spring should clear a number of local burglaries. Mitchell County Sheriff Wendell Bryant said Friday.

Bryant said the two men, Billy Lee Green and Ben Garza, were arrested Tuesday afternoon in Big Spring.

"Following their arrest, a search ensued on property in Howard County where numerous items were recovered believed taken in burglaries in Mitchell, Howard, Scurry, Dawson and Borden counties," said Bryant.

Bryant said the pair was charged with criminal attempt to commit a burglary of a habitation and

burglary of a building. Mitchell County Justice of the Peace Keith Ruddick set bonds totaling \$35,000 each. The pair also are facing charges from the other counties in which other burglaries occurred, said Bryant.

"There were several Mitchell County burglaries solved by the arrest of these two individuals as far back as six to eight months and as recently as last weekend," said Bryant.

When the pair was stopped in Big Spring, they were in possession of some rattlesnakes taken from in a recent Mitchell County burglary, said Bryant.

Hunting regulations detailed

Mitchell County Game Warden Randy Bullard said *The Texas Hunting Guide 1990-1991* has recently been issued which presents a summary of Texas hunting regulations as well as license costs and hunting seasons.

Bullard said a hunting lease license is required of anyone who leases hunting rights or charges a fee for hunting on property they own or property they control. The manager of a hunting lease must maintain a record book provided by the department with each hunter's name, address, license number, dates hunted and number and species of birds or animals hunted and killed. Hunters are responsible for providing the required information to the manager.

Bullard said he has been contacted by several persons inquiring about hunting leases in Mitchell County. Landowners who have leases available and want to list it with Bullard should contact him at the courthouse.

Bullard said a resident hunting license costs \$10, a special resident hunting license (for Texas residents younger than 17 or older than 65 and for certain disabled veterans) costs \$6 and a resident combination hunting and fishing license costs \$15.

Mitchell County Hunting Seasons are as follows:

Deer - Archer, Oct. 1-31; general, Nov. 3-Jan. 6; 4 deer, limit 2 bucks. No antlerless permit required.

Javelina - Oct. 1-Feb. 24; 2 per season

Squirrel - No closed season; no bag limit

Turkey - Archer, Oct. 1-31; general, Nov. 3-Jan. 6; 2 turkeys, either sex; spring season, Apr. 6-May 5; 2 gobblers (Limit 3 turkeys per license year)

Quail - Nov. 3-Feb. 24
Mourning Dove - Central Zone, Sept. 1-Oct. 24; North Zone, Sept. 1-Nov. 9

Bullard also noted that effective Sept. 1, crappie will have a 10-inch minimum length limit.

Jail kitchen passes inspection

The Mitchell County Jail kitchen passed its inspection with the Texas Department of Health with flying colors, Sheriff Wendell Bryant said.

Bryant said the kitchen, which was remodeled extensively to comply with new jail standards, received a grade of 91 out of a possible 100 from inspector Floyd Maddox.

There were two things cited during the inspection:

- there was not a thermometer to check the temperature of hot foods;
- the water for the dishwasher is not hot enough.

Bryant said the first item can be corrected easily by buying a thermometer.

He said the second item can possibly be corrected by installing a

booster hot water heater for the dish washer.

"The inspector said this was one of the cleanest kitchens he had seen in a long time," said Bryant. "He was particularly complimentary of the dry food storage area."

"I want to compliment the staff for keeping the kitchen facilities so clean and overseeing the inmates to see that it's cleaned properly," said Bryant.

Early childhood testing scheduled

The Plan A office with the West Texas Education Coop has been contacting parents of 3-4-5 year olds who went through the early childhood screening last June at Kelley Elementary.

The education support staff must have a health, home and family information packet filled out by a parent or guardian before any child

can have an in-depth assessment of speech, language, intelligence or motor abilities administered.

Thirty nine children were screened and 29 needed in-depth assessments.

Testing is scheduled for Monday-Tuesday, Aug. 13-14, in

the pre-kindergarten room at Colorado Middle School. It will not be done at Kelley because of renovations.

Advisory committee responds to questions about landfill here

Mitchell County answered the following questions pertaining to the proposed landfill.

1. Did you solicit this company to put in a HAZARDOUS WASTE PROJECT or did they come to you.

Southwest Waste Management, Inc. and National Waste and Energy Development, Inc. approached the Colorado City Industrial Foundation and Mitchell County Officials with this proposed project.

2. Why were the other landfills rejected?

What "other" landfills do you have reference to?

3. What is the estimated cost to the county for building the roads, maintaining the roads, obtaining easements for the roads, and labor?

The county has no obligation to provide any easements or roads other than to maintain County Road #270 to handle whatever traffic moves over it.

4. What will be the cost to the county and city to provide facilities, training, and additional equipment in order to be prepared to efficiently handle spillage, leaks, and accidents?

The Mitchell County Emergency Management Team has already been trained to deal with these type emergencies because of all of the variety of cargo's passing through Mitchell County by truck and by rail.

5. Why, in October, 1988, did the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court pass a resolution to turn down a toxic waste disposal site proposed by Sweetwater Resources (Solid Waste Registration #38368), but a year later welcome a much larger hazardous waste landfill plus incinerators? In what manner was that original site more dangerous to us than the agreed upon site?

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court was of the opinion that the October, 1988 resolution concerning a proposed toxic disposal well site in Fisher County, Texas was not in the best interest of Mitchell County because of the inability to monitor its possible effect on groundwater.

These are two very different types of disposal problems.

6. Will this hazardous waste landfill fall under the criteria to become a tax abatement zone as specified in the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Resolution of November 14, 1988? If so, exactly how will this affect the National Waste & Energy Development, Inc's tax bill in Mitchell County?

National Waste and Energy Development, Inc. has not applied for tax abatement and have agreed that they will not do so.

7. Why did the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court ask the EPA to consider revisions to proposed Subtitle D regulations which would allow flexibility to grant variances in national standards in areas of low population (Vol. 7, P 535)? Does this mean that Mitchell County will sacrifice a few farms, ranches, and the Westbrook Community in order to obtain more dollars?

Mitchell County Commissioners' Court joined in with a number of other counties throughout West Texas, in requesting that the EPA modify proposed Subtitle D regulations to allow city or county owned and operated landfills to not have to incur the expense of monitoring wells at landfill sites, where no potable water existed at less than 100 ft. depth.

This request covered only landfills that were operated by a city or county for their own residence's use and would not apply to a commercial venture.

8. Chromium Dust, coming from a smokestack in Jersey City, N.J., reached an elementary school covering carpeting and duct work. The clean-up bill cost the tax payers \$251,500.00 Should this happen in Mitchell County, would it cost us, the tax payers? Why?

Under the presently proposed EPA regulations, any type of hazardous discharge from the exhaust stack of an incinerator would, after a period of four to six minutes, automatically shut the incinerator operation down, so incidents such as you note would be practically impossible, but in the event of an accident, the tax payers of Mitchell County would have absolutely no liability.

This is a private enterprise, so we would have no more liability here than we would if Texas Utilities were to have an accident at their Morgan Creek Power Plant.

9. Will evacuation routes be established for residents of Westbrook, Lake Colorado City and Coahoma?

Under the present emergency management program, evacuation routes for all cities and populated areas of Mitchell County are in place, dependent upon the location of the emergency.

The citizens of Coahoma and its surrounding area are covered by the same kind of plan in Howard County.

10. How much tax revenue will be involved in the development and/or operation?

The amount of tax revenue generated by this operation will be totally dependent upon the appraised value of their plant on January 1, of each tax year.

The income to Mitchell County from their operations is not tax revenue, but the agreed upon fees in the Host Community Agreement, and will be dependent upon the amount of waste processed by this plant.

11. What financial impact will this place on the city's and county's service agencies?

This question is quite broad, but if it refers to fire protection and law enforcement, these both should be minimally impacted. National Waste and Energy Development, Inc. will have their own fire equipment on site, so would be able to handle most situations themselves, and there should be no reason that law enforcement would be impacted at all.

12. Has the county been fully informed of its liability in regards to the facility's operation?

Mitchell County engaged the Austin Law Firm of Bickerstaff, Heath, and Smiley to draw up and completely review the host community agreement prior to its adoption. This firm specializes in legal matters as they pertain to city and county government operation and the law, so we feel very comfortable with this agreement.

13. What procedures will be used in the event of an incinerator upset?

What is an incinerator upset?

The incinerator in this plant will be built in place, much like a unit in a refinery. Any accident or incident at the plant would be handled just as any emergency situation would anywhere, dependent upon its nature

14. After seeing several video tapes on an incinerator fire, will our fire department and firemen be capable of handling hazardous waste emergency? How?

National Waste and Energy Development, Inc. will have their own fire fighting equipment on site, so the fire fighting resources of fire departments in Mitchell County will only serve as a backup.

15. Why doesn't Mitchell County tax the drums of toxic waste brought into the county?

Under the present property tax laws, ad valorem property taxes can only be assessed on goods of value; that is, materials to be used in manufacturing or products that are ready to sell. As the law presently reads, waste has no value.

This is one reason that the company wants a host community agreement, so that they pay a fee on their merchandise, since it is not taxable.

16. Who is responsible for the transportation of municipal waste? In the event that it is the responsibility of city or county, what will the cost be to the average household?

This decision has not been made as to what entities will transport our municipal waste.

It will be the responsibility of each city and the county to transport our waste to the site, but the citizens of Mitchell County will incur no cost for disposal.

Time was when smallpox was an often fatal disease. As the killer virus swept the nation in the 1880's, the town of Colorado reacted quickly to its first report of smallpox.

On April 26, 1883, the town council met for the purpose of combating the deadly disease. A man identified only as "Mr. Putman" was authorized to buy lumber "and haul the same and erect a pest house 14 feet by 24 feet, at once." (Pest, as in pestilence). Then a citizen, B. F. Mills, was appointed a committee of one to solicit subscriptions from citizens of Colorado to pay for the pest house.

During that same meeting, the council hired "Robertson Brothers" to take care "and nurse the afflicted at a cost of \$4 per day." Apparently only one family was involved at this point, and the council wasn't even sure the victims would cooperate. The council minutes note that the nurses were to "confer with the afflicted man and his family and ascertain if they were willing to be removed to the pest house."

Then, the council settled down to the business of passing legislation to halt the spread of the dreadful disease. Each and every person afflicted or having any contagious disease was to be removed to the pest house, at the expense of the city. And there the matter rested until about a week later.

On May 2, 1883, the council met again and authorized a payment of \$75 to Dr. Hughes for his "medical attention to date." Next, the council decreed that hereafter the good doctor would be paid \$6 per day for his visits to the pest house. He was to check on the smallpox patients once a day or until each member of the family was out of danger.

Eight days later another Colorado family had contacted the malady, it was reported that one of "Mr. Jackson's" children had smallpox and it was thought that his wife and another child would "likely take the disease at any time." Once again the Colorado city council acted. The services of a physician were to be furnished to the Jackson family and necessary supplies were to be made available.

Meanwhile, townsmen were sufficiently concerned with the outbreak of smallpox to cough up \$296. By May 9th, 1883, expenses to fight smallpox had climbed to \$254.17. Town fathers decided it was time to ask county officials to relieve the town "of the great expense that they are not able to meet." There is no evidence the county considered smallpox within the city limits, the county's problem.

Less than a month after smallpox hit Colorado, a Mrs. Robinson, (probably Robertson) was allowed \$5 per day for 13 days of waiting upon Mrs. Jackson and her family. At that same meeting an unspecified amount of money was approved for payment to "Robinson Brothers" for their services as nurses.

Official records available do not show any deaths for either of the smallpox cases of 1883 and apparently the small west Texas town had successfully held its own against the killer disease.

For the time being, in 1886 another outbreak of the virus struck Colorado. For nine months officials fought against the invisible killer. During that time, expenses soared and a quarantine district was created in town. In fact, you may live within that area now. We'll tell you more about that, next week.

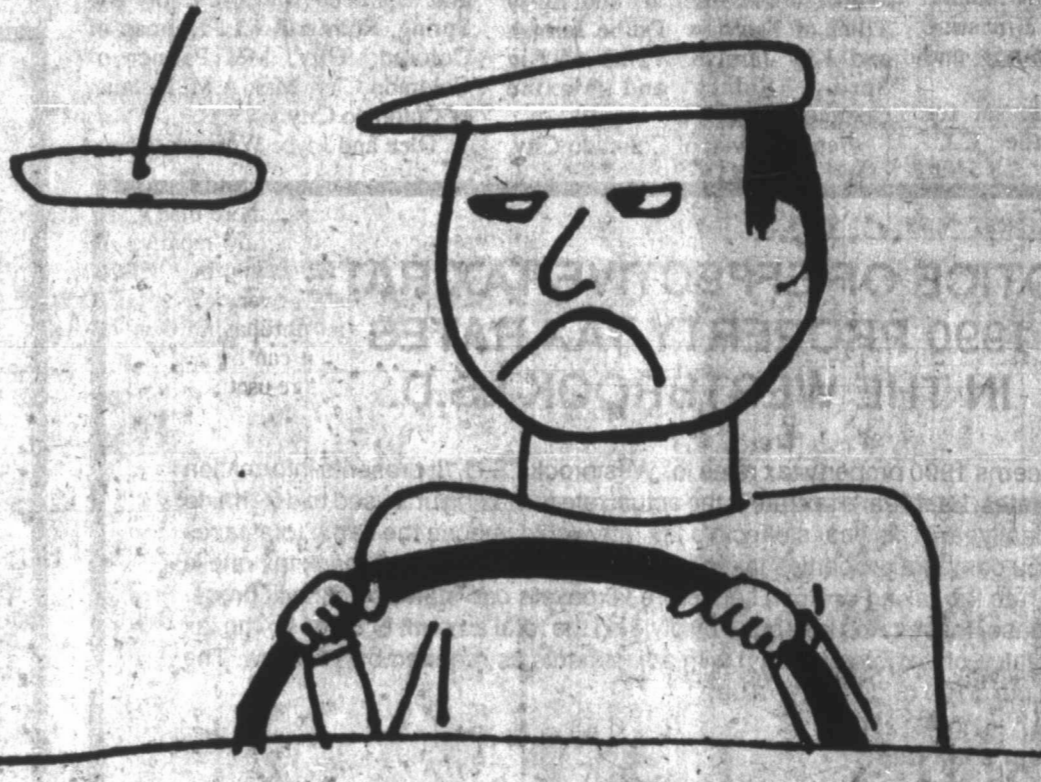

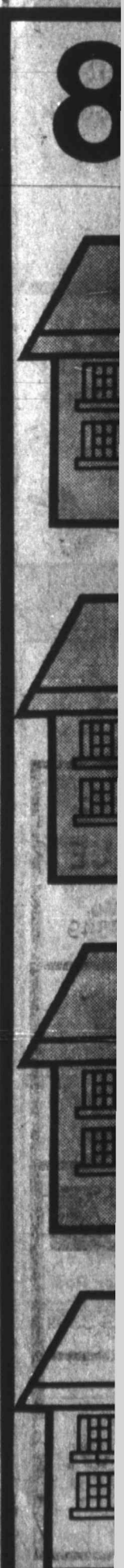

Look for bargains in school clothes

COLLEGE STATION
Although sharp increases in the cost of clothing were seen this spring, parents may find back-to-school prices slightly lower.

"Prices were up this year on clothing for women by 5 percent and toddlers and infants by as much as 10.3 percent," said Dr. Ann Beard, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "But overall, prices have dropped within a year by 1.7 percent for boys and 1.5 percent for girls."

Since clothing prices for boys and girls have dropped, bargains may be easier to find, Beard said. However, style is costly and very important to young people who like to dress similar to their peers.

To get the most for your money when shopping for clothes, Beard suggests following these tips:

- Make a list of specific items needed before you go shopping. Also, include the quantity of items needed.

- Take your child shopping with you. Before you go, prepare him or her for what you are looking for, and shop only for the child since children get tired easily.

- Consider the child's growth patterns. Don't buy more than what is needed. Children grow rapidly and may outgrow what you buy before the school year is over.

- Consider purchasing two or three outfits that can be mixed and matched for a more useful wardrobe.

Consider the special activities your child will be involved in. If special clothing will be needed for each activity, consider these as a share of the clothing budget. Decide if parts of these garments could be worn with regular school clothing as a wardrobe extender. Less expensive tops such as brightly-colored t-shirts can add variety to a wardrobe.

Choose styles and fabrics that will grow with the child. Raglan sleeves, cuffs on pants, adjustable straps and waistbands, large hems in dresses and tops are features that can add to the wear-life of a garment.

Also, consider the care factors. Knits, especially cotton or cotton/polyester, are easy to care for and stretch for comfort. Choose durable fabrics such as denim and corduroy to withstand children's abuse and repeated laundering.

"Take special care when buying shoes for children," Beard said. "Don't ask for the size you think your child needs, have both feet measured by a reputable shoe salesman."

Shoes should be sturdy and provide support, she said. Buy at least two pairs that can be interchanged for longer wear and comfort.

"Your child should never wear hand-me-down shoes," Beard said. "Hand-me-down shoes force the child's feet to conform to the footprint already in the shoe."

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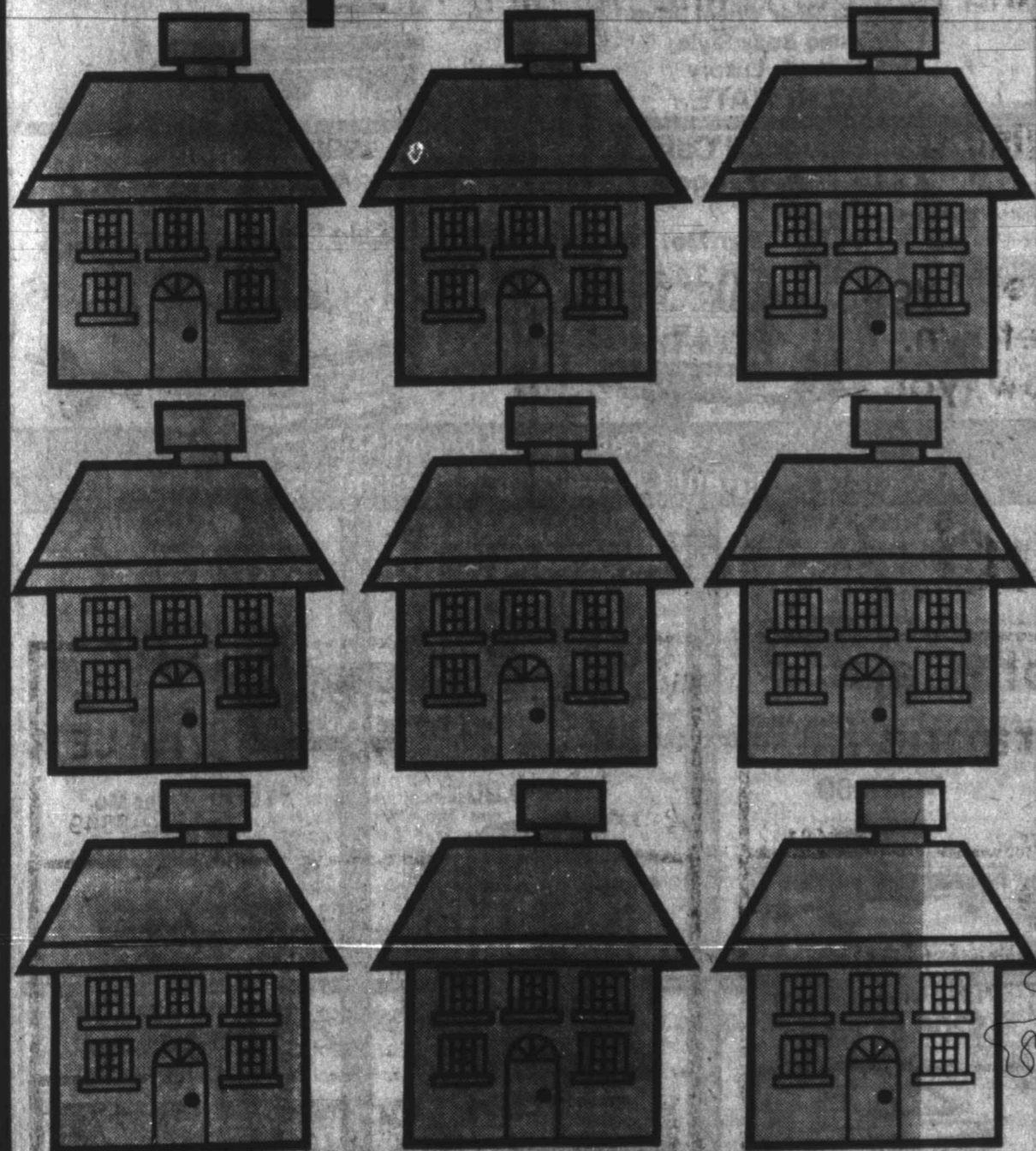

Texas to present program for teacher advanced accreditation

In a major move to support the use of television in the classroom, the Texas Education Agency has designated *Assignment Discovery* for accredited Advanced Academic Training (AAT) for teachers.
