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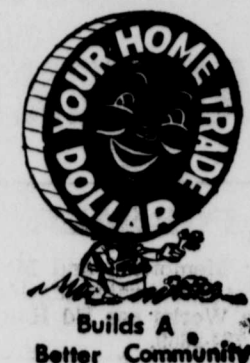

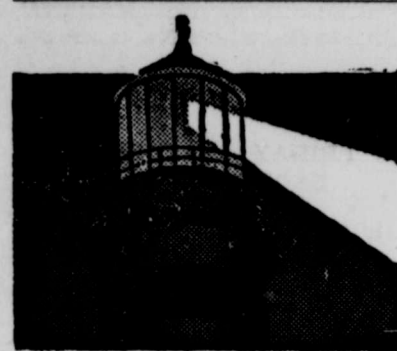

Zip, Zip, Zip. Mail, lots of mail, zipping to addresses all over the country, especially at this time of the year when there is lots of Christmas mail.

The Postoffice Department, including our own Postmaster, urges that you use the zip code when possible to speed the mail on its way. Maybe you believe that the zip code is not important but they assure us that it is. There could be a time when the zip code alone might send the piece of mail to the proper town. For instance if you mail a Christmas card to a friend in Loraine and address it to your friend, "City" and mail it in the box on the outside of the postoffice your card will go to the dead letter office unless the sender is identified for the mail in the outside box is picked up by the truck drivers and taken to Abilene and the local postoffice never sees it. A card or letter addressed in this manner cannot be delivered because in Abilene the postal clerks are not familiar with your friends name and since there is no town mentioned in the address they can't do anything except send it to the dead letter office.

Now if you address your card to your friend, box # @ * @, "City" 79352, your friend will get it for the code number tells the clerk that "City" means Loraine. Of course mail you send to local people should be mailed in the slot inside the postoffice. Then if you just use "City" in the address, the local clerks will know where it goes.

I asked the postmaster this question: "You say the code number is important. If I have a friend who wants to send me a Christmas card and he addresses it simply, Box 157, 79352, would I get the card?" The postmaster answered: "Yes sir, you certainly would." If I had a friend I would ask him to send me a card addressed in this manner so we could see for ourselves if the zip code really works. Loraine's zip code is 79352.

Rate Adjustment For Lone Wolf Electric

According to James Hull, Manager of the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, Inc., a rate adjustment is scheduled to be effective January 1, 1965. This adjustment in retail electric rates will mean an actual lowering of monthly electric bills to 90% of the Cooperative Member-Owners. All rates, including residential, irrigation and commercial will be effected. The combination of all of these rate changes will cause a lowering of annual revenue to the Cooperative of \$10,760.00. While about one meter out of ten will not be helped financially by this change, we were looking to future growth of the Cooperative and KWH consumption on the farm, in making this adjustment.

Loraine Participates In Ira Invitational Tournament

The national average is that the use of electricity doubles every 7 to 10 years. Here at Lone Wolf Electric Co-op, the average KWH use has doubled every 8 years since our beginning 25 years ago in 1939. We found this adjustment economically feasible because the Cooperative is a non-profit corporation and because of the untiring cooperation of the member-owners. It was primarily the Co-op members who made this adjustment possible and credit should be given to them.

Also, Lone Wolf Electric is making a Patrons Capital Credit refund for the last half of 1964 credits. Capital credits will be returned to the Co-op members, another \$28,270.00. Return of Patrons Capital Credits is necessary to assure us a non-profit operation. Since we are chartered as a non-profit corporation we must comply with necessary actions to maintain this status, such as returning the Patrons margins. Co-operative members have been notified of their capital credits which have been credited to them for the years 1957 - 1963, and will have the cash returned to them as soon as it can be economically justified. The 1964 checks will be in their mailboxes before Christmas.

SIX FLAGS CLOSSES FOR SEASON BUT WORK GOES ON



Six year old Rhett Davis of Dallas arrived at Six Flags Over Texas just a little too late as "Indian maiden" Sharon Fulmer sadly explains that the popular theme park, located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth, has closed for the season. It will be open again April 16, 1965.

Six Flags Over Texas closed out its 1964 season today. The stagecoach made its last run, the fires on the old narrow-gauge steam engine were banked, the cannons are now silent on the Spanish Fort guarding the river against French explorers.

For all intents and purposes Six Flags Over Texas is closed for another year. But behind the locked gates of the 115-acre historical theme park, a monumental job awaits a corps of engineers, landscape architects, painters, carpenters, artists, electricians and designers.

The long winter months are just too short as far as these dedicated men are concerned for they are charged with presenting to the public a fresh and beautiful park with bold new adventures and plenty of exciting entertainment for the 1965 season which begins next April 16.

1964 stands out as the third consecutive year that Six Flags racked up a new attendance record. Over 1,613,000 people from every state in the Union visited the park. This compares with 1,436,000 in 1963; 1,272,000 in 1962 and 564,000 in 1961.

Perhaps the saddest group of individuals who witnessed Six Flags seasonal closing were the 1,400 college hosts and hostesses who operated all the rides, played all the roles and gave a unique atmosphere of enthusiasm, charm and wholesomeness for the popular tourist attraction located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

There's a little matter of nearly \$2,000,000 which is earned by these young men and women each season, and that money goes a long way towards furthering their college educations.

The Six Flags personnel office reported it had already received over 500 applications for host and hostess jobs next year and expects 20,000 more before the 1965 season rolls around just four months from now.

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Teenagers Learn to Bake Bread in 4-H

Today's young teenagers are plunging right into homemaking tasks and enjoying outstanding success. For example, 13-year old Annette Eachor, a 4-H Club member, already has spent three years on various food projects.

Loves to Bake

Her favorite is baking bread, seven loaves at a time. Not only do her parents and two younger sisters enjoy the freshly baked bread, but so do friends and neighbors. Annette manages to find time to bake and sell bread.

Her recipe printed here is easy to follow, says Annette. She is one of more than a half-million 4-H members from Maine to California who are participating in the national 4-H bread program conducted by the Extension Service and sponsored by Standard Brands.

WHITE BREAD (Sponge Method)

Makes 7 Loaves

1 pkg. active dry yeast
3 1/2 cups warm water (105°-115° F.)
4 tablespoons sugar
Dissolve yeast with water in a bowl.
Add sugar. Stir until dissolved. Stir
6 cups sifted flour into mixture. Cover
and let rise in a warm place until
bubbly on top. Then add:

2 cups scalded milk—
cooled to lukewarm
4 tablespoons melted shortening
2 tablespoons salt
12 cups sifted flour
Knead dough until smooth and elastic.
Place in greased bowl and let rise until
double in bulk. Divide into 7 equal
portions. Let rest 10 minutes. Shape
into loaves and place in greased pans.
Let rise again until double in size.
Bake at 350° F. 40-45 minutes. Remove
from pans and cool.

Tested recipes and baking guides are furnished by the sponsor along with county, state and national awards. The youthful cooks not only learn to bake bread by modern methods, but they also try out recipes for raised coffee cakes, rolls, doughnuts and fancy holiday breads.

Shows Others How

Demonstrations and contests are part of the program. Meal planning, nutrition and balanced diets are studied and put into practice. Success with bread plus general 4-H accomplishments can earn for the member an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in



"Kneading the bread dough is a very important step in bread baking," says 4-H'er Annette Eachor, "and it's as easy as it looks. All it takes is a little practice."

Chicago and a \$500 college scholarship given by Standard Brands. County winners receive medals.

Annette is not yet eligible to compete for the state trip award, but next year when she is 14, she can try. The pretty brunette gets plenty of encouragement at home because her mother was

a 4-H member and attended the Chicago congress as winner in a dairy foods project. Any girl or boy can join a 4-H Club. Depending upon the local club, a member can start on bread immediately or gradually work up to the project in connection with other foods projects.
