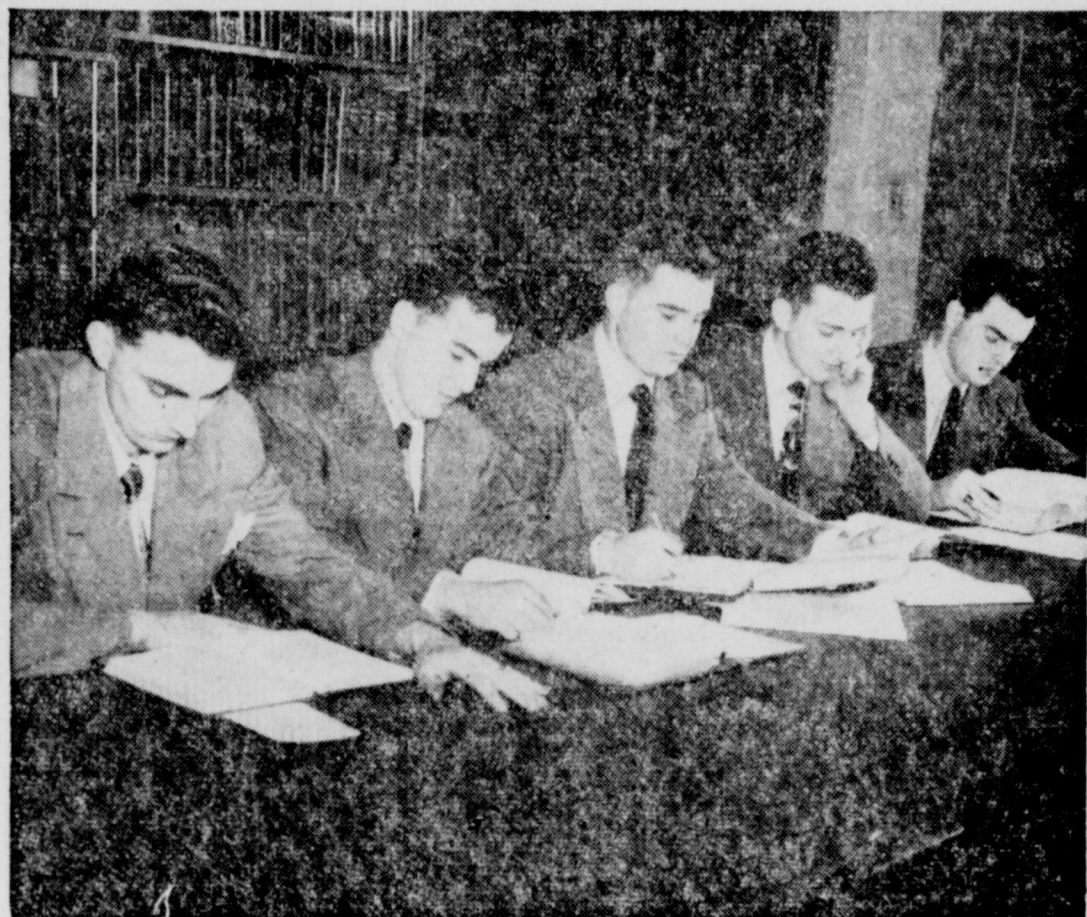

FLIES HELP CAUSE ILLNESS AND DEATH OF THOUSANDS YEARLY

AUSTIN, March 2 — Millions of flies help to cause the illness and death of thousands of children and adults each year in the U. S., pointed out Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, today.

Hundreds of these casualties may be in the state of Texas this year if residents fail in their responsibility for developing the best possible sanitation measures in the area where they reside. Typhoid fever, summer coming.

plaint, and other intestinal diseases can be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of the infection.

Dr. Cox, speaking in this connection, said, "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that flies from a careless neighbor can not endanger your family. Be sure that flies are kept away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food."

"Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infections from this source can be picked up and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places of flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet outlining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly control.

CITY TO HANDLE DELINQUENT TAX COLLECTIONS, MAYOR SAYS

The City of Cisco will henceforth handle its own delinquent tax collections and litigation if necessary, will be handled by the city attorney, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today.

The City Council voted Tuesday night to disburse with the services of Horace Walker, who has handled the collections for the past year, along with those of the county and other political subdivisions of the county.

Mr. Rosenthal advised Walker of the council's action by registered mail. He explained that when the Council agreed for Walker to handle delinquent tax collections the city did not have a city attorney.

Walker has scheduled a property sale for March 7 to satisfy delinquent tax claims of the county and other agencies. It was not known whether any of the property to be sold is located in Cisco. Notices for the sale were published in a Ranger newspaper.

Under Walker's agreement with the city, he received a 15% commission on taxes collected.

Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Curry announced today that their new, modern grocery and market will be opened Friday. The new store is located one door south of their present location in the 400 block of Avenue D.

Mr. and Mrs. Curry opened their first store in Cisco some three years ago with less than \$100 and have built it up to one of the most modern in west Texas. Their first location was in the Carroll Motor Co. building where they remained a year. They moved across the street two years later and recently purchased the Kleiner building in which their new store is located.

Their first store had only a few second hand shelves and some home-made counters and their vegetable counter consisted of apple and orange crates. Their pockets served as a cash register.

The new store has all new and modern equipment and consists of one 20-foot dry rack for potatoes, dried fruits, etc., one 10-foot electric vegetable case for fresh vegetables, an electric

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Civil Service To Hire Employees

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for filling vacancies in the following positions:

Archives assistant and library assistant, \$2,450 to \$3,100 a year; herbarium aid (plant mounting), \$2,450 and \$2,650 a year; museum aid, \$2,450 to \$3,125 a year; medical officer, \$5,400 to \$6,400 a year; and tobacco inspector, \$2,650 to \$4,600 a year.

The positions to be filled from the examinations for archives and library assistant and herbarium and museum aids are in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. To qualify for these positions, applicants must pass a written test and, in addition, must have had pertinent experience or education or a combination of such experience and education. Age limits except for persons entitled to veterans preference, are from 18 to 62 years.

The medical officer positions are located in Washington, D. C., throughout the U. S., in the Panama Canal Zone, and in Alaska, in such agencies as the Indian Service, Panama Canal Service, Children's Bureau, U. S. Public Health Service, Dept. of Army, VA, CAA, and the Railroad Retirement Board. No written test is required. Applicants must be graduates of a medical school, with the degree of doctor of medicine. For most of the positions paying \$5,400, applicants must have completed a full internship; and for positions paying \$6,400, they must have had professional medical experience.

Details about the above examinations are given in the official announcements. These announcements and application forms can be obtained from the local secretary of the Commission, Sam B. King, at the Cisco Post Office.

DRIVE YOUR GOLDEN SPIKE

A hundred years or so ago in the desolate vastness of the Great Salt Lake Basin, a little cluster of people gathered at a place called Promontory Point. Around them extending hundreds of miles in all directions was an awesome wilderness. The event has been dramatized countless times in stories, paintings, and movies. It was the moment when the continent was first spanned with a railroad. Even in the days of heavy earth moving equipment, construction of a railroad is a major achievement. Then with only hand and horse power, it was nothing short of a miracle.

During World War II much publicity was attached to the construction of the Big and Little Inch pipelines from Texas to the East. Politicians said these projects were too big for private enterprise — only government could afford the expense. Yet last year when a single company began a pipeline from Texas to New York that was bigger and longer than the Inches — at a cost of \$190 million — the event went almost unnoticed. Before 1954 the pipeline industry plans to lay nearly 18,000 miles of line at a cost of almost \$2 billion. Gas utilities will have to spend another \$2½ billion to handle

the expanding supply. Also with no fanfare the electric light and power industry is in the process of spending \$5 billion to \$6 billion for expansion of facilities. The railroads have spent since the war a cold \$4 billion to expand and improve services. And in the same period the oil industry has spent several billions to keep

abreast of soaring demand. All of these billions have come from heavily taxed industries — not the government. These are productive billions that have lifted living standards, created jobs, and new taxable income to help support government. They also helped to create new taxpaying businesses.

There is no mystery about the miracles of America. This is the only major nation where groups of free citizens can drive their own golden spikes and invest billions in new enterprises with a minimum of government interference. As Time Magazine concluded in a masterly summary of the year: "The world needs more freedom. By its progress through 1949, the U. S. had shown where the path lay."

Farm Income Drops In 1949

The Agricultural Department at Washington reports that the total net income from farm products averaged \$783 per person in 1949. The average per person income received was 18 per cent less; the average for non-farm income was \$1555 — or 1% less than the year before.

Per capita income of persons on farms in 1949 dropped for the first time since 1933, the department announced.

In 1946 and 1947 the per capita income of farm people averaged about 60% as much as that of the average non-farmers. This difference widened to 38 per cent in 1948 and 1949.

Texas Draft Board Added 2382 January

AUSTIN, Feb. 16 — Texas draft boards added 2,382 during January to the state's pool of manpower available for military service in case of war or emergency.

This brings the acceptable group of manpower in Texas to 51,427, Col. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, reported today.

The draft boards classified 11,260 men in January for the first time and re-classified others because of change of status under the draft law. Of the 11,260 new classifications in January, 8,878 were classified in a deferred status.

The local boards registered 6,038 youths who reached their

18th birthdays during January. Col. Wakefield said registration each month usually goes above 5,000.

January registrations brought totals on draft board rolls to 530,538. Of this number, local boards had classified 371,168 by the end of January.
