Agriculture Needs Rain Throughout The County

Rainfall Loss In Fall Hurts

Moisture conditions on farm and ranchland throughout Mitchell County has been termed "good to bad" depending on the section of the area. In a talk with County Agent Buddy Logsdon and A. V. Logsdon, the current condition and future forecast for the coming crop year was discussed.

Logsdon noted that the eastern part of the county, and particularly the southeast were in pretty good shape moisture wise.

The western section of the county was described as being in the driest condition.

Sheppard explained that 1962 had been a rough year in the county with cotton production falling off. "There were no general rains and the rain that fell was spotted," Sheppard said. He added that this year's crop might be hurt by the lack of rains this past fall.

Both agreed that the rain falling in February in parts of the county would be a boon to farmers and ranchers.

Sheppard said that farmers and ranchers must now decide on when to plant. "If it rains in April, May and June to load the soil with moisture. When we miss the fall rains, it's a long time till April," Sheppard said.

Logsdon added that if rains fail to come in April, May and

June that the area would be in for a short crop.

Each of the men agreed that with the small amount of rainfall generally expected in the county that sound principles and practices of farming and ranching were necessities to making a good operation.

Grain Program Deadline Nears

Total farms numbering 481 have been signed up for participation in the 1965 Feed Grain Program in Mitchell County.

Eligible farms for the program total 809.

To qualify for the program farmers must have grown one or more of the three feed grains — corn, grain sorghum or barley — during the program's base years of 1959 and 1960.

Deadline for signing up for the program is set for Friday

March 26 at the ASCS office. County feed grain acreage signed up for diversion through the program now totals 23,253 acres, including 23,343 acres of grain sorghum and 10 acres of barley. The diversion will be from base acreages of 45,098 acres, or 52 percent of the base, on the signed farms.

Base acreage for all eligible feed grain farms in Mitchell County totals 68,270 acres.

Total diversion payment amounts to \$360,035.37, with \$84,896.63 in advance payments made to date.

Jack Linam, ASCS county committee member, explained that the 1965 feed grain program in general is similar to that for 1964. Growers may participate by diverting at least 20 percent of their feed grain base acreage and devoting it to conserving use for they may plant specified substitute crops upon request, with a reduction in diversion payments.

In return, they become eligible for acreage diversion payments, price support payments, and loans on their entire 1965 production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

This year, for the first time, eligible feed grain and wheat cropland acreage may be substituted provided producers sign up and participate in both programs.

While it is not necessary for farmers to indicate at sign-up whether they plan to use the substitution provision, it is suggested that interested producers discuss details with the ASCS county office people, since the use of substitution provisions can materially affect the levels of payment.

Linam reminds farmers that the program sign-up now under way at the county office will extend through March 26. He urges an early sign-up as the best way to avoid the delays and crowded office conditions which could develop as the deadline nears.

Class Gives Performance On Tuesday

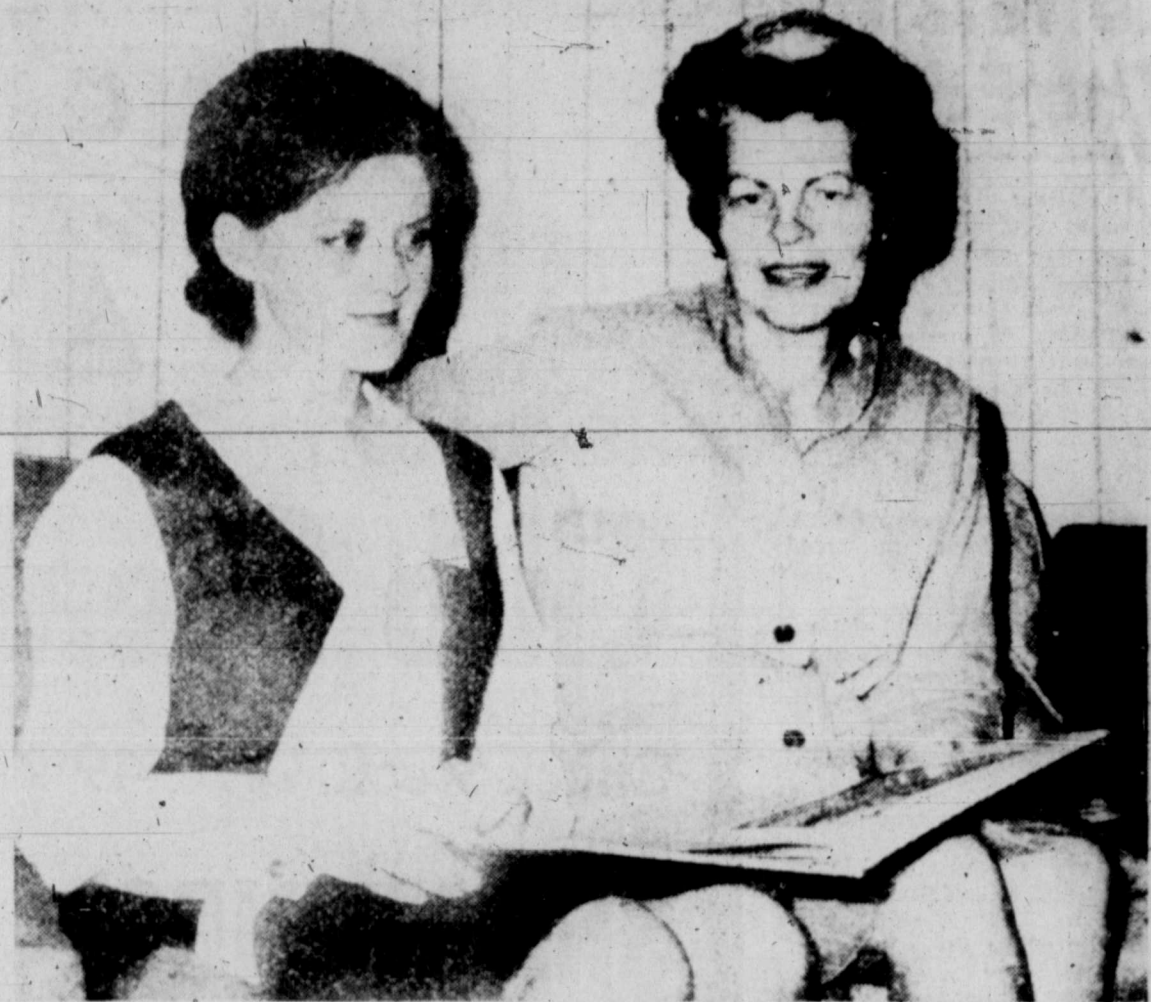

Delinting Operation Is Newest Industry

Colorado City's newest industry — Rogers Delinted Cottonseed Co., is currently in operation in their new \$150,000 plant north of the city.

Manager W. A. Findley is in charge of the 15,000 sq. ft. of machinery and storage facilities in the plant.

Delinting Process
During a tour of the plant with W. A. Findley this week he gave an interesting description of what happens during the delinting process from the time the seed arrive from the gin until they are sacked and ready for the farmer's pickup.

Fuzzy seed brought from the cotton gin are placed into the Bauer machine which separates the seed and rocks from the seed.

Following this process the seed are carried into the delinting machine where a solution containing 98 percent sulphuric acid eats the lint off the seed.

The seed are then agitated and subjected to three washing processes to clean away the acid.

After washing the seed are placed in a blower for drying. An air lift takes the seed from the blower into a cleaner that separates the seed by size and takes out heavy or light material. The seeds are separated from the hulls.

The cleaner used in the process is the largest of its kind available for use in delinting seed.

Next the seed are passed into a gravity grader where they are separated by weight. The grader takes out any light or immature seeds.

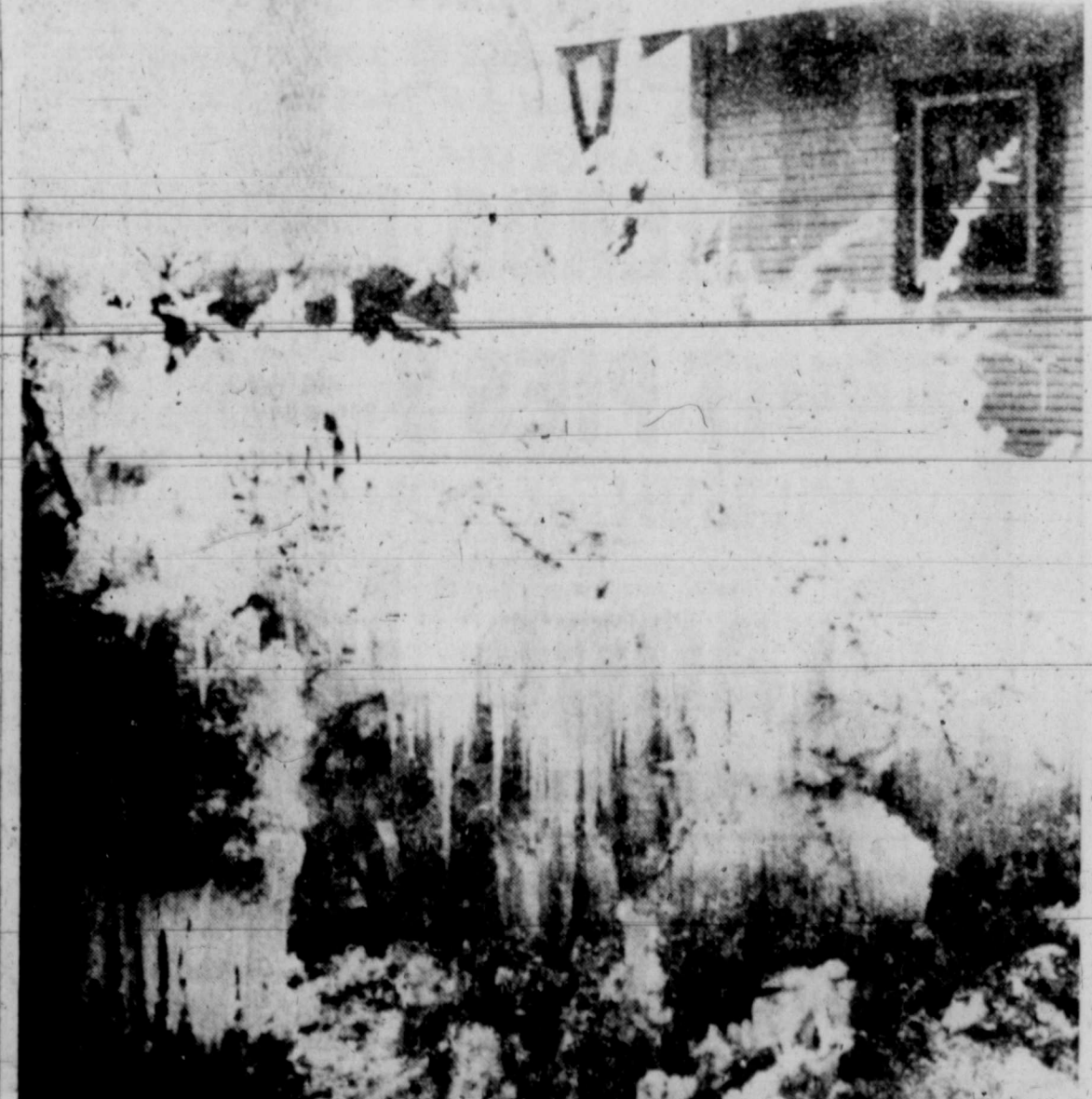
Seed are then subjected to wet treatment and a fungicide is applied to combat seed disease and to guard against plant rotting.

Sacking bin is the next step for the seed. Depending on the choice of the farmer the seed are treated with a systemic poison or left untreated.

Extensive safety precautions are taken in the application of the poison to the seed to avoid any contact by employees with the poison.

Test Plot Sited
At the present time a nine-acre test plot is planned to check results of the various treatments used on the seeds. The test plot will be located on the Royce Heights farm four miles east of Buford.

All seed tested will be delinted. Three acres will be acid delinted and three more will be untreated. See Industry Page 7

Cattle Count On Increase

Cattle and calves on U.S. farms and ranches on Jan. 1, 1965, totaled 107.2 million head—up from 106.7 a year earlier.

This is the smallest yearly gain since 1959 when the current upswing began. Dairy animals decreased 3% but beef cattle increased 2%. In Texas there was no change in beef cow numbers but dairy cows were down. Sheep numbers were down 8% but goats were down by 21% but goat numbers were up.

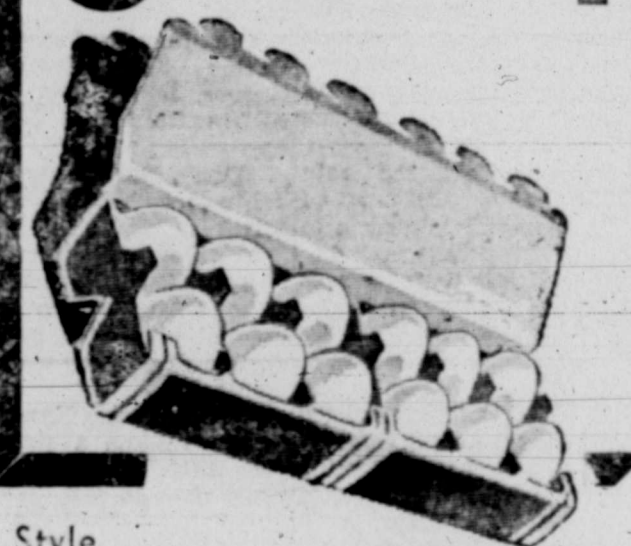

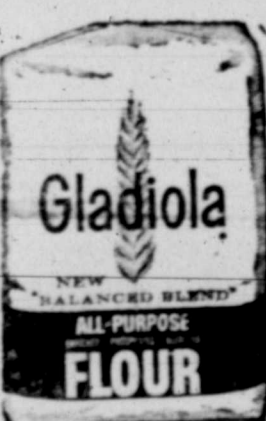

Pre-Irrigation Boon To Crops

PRE-PLANTING irrigation in Arapahoe County this year appears to be of the utmost importance to farmers.

"There has not been sufficient winter moisture to put a season down to the potential root zone of most plants grown in the county," A. H. Jackson, soil conservation technician said.

"When the entire root zone is full of moisture at planting time," the plants put down a good, deep root system and are able to take advantage of all the available moisture.

When the depth of moisture is limited during early growth, plants do not develop deep roots and therefore are not able to take advantage of deep moisture that may be added later in the season," Jackson added.

In further explanation Jackson said, "Pre-planting irrigation pays off on crops to be fully irrigated throughout the growing season and on crops not to be irrigated at all. If land is to be irrigated has a good pre-planting irrigation, another period of irrigation is not usually necessary before

the early fruiting stage of the plants. A good root system is developed and more fruit produced instead of excessive top growth.

"When a dryland crop is planted on previously irrigated land, a good root system is developed capable of taking advantage of moisture the full depth of the root zone whereas plants with shallow roots could only use moisture collected near the surface.

If the soil is wet three to four ft. deep at planting time a fair crop can be expected on a small amount of summer rainfall and with one or two good rains a good crop can be expected.

Boll Weevil Survival Down On High Plains

Early surveys indicate the effectiveness of the all-out campaign started last fall to stop the westward movement of the cotton boll weevil.

Ground traps, collected during January in a 3-county area, showed an average of only 281 live weevils per acre compared with 2,630 found during the same period last year.

One garage owner reported that of 1100 stickers his shop issued last year over 700 were given in the last month preceding the deadline.

As of March 15 a total of 39 percent of registered vehicles in the 49 county Midland Region of the Texas Department of Public Safety remained to be inspected. Only 325,366 of the 533,810 vehicles had been inspected.

Major Leo E. Gossett, commander of the sprawling West Texas Region, said, "With less than 30 days left during the present motor vehicle inspection period, over 208,000 vehicles remain to be inspected within the 49 county West Texas Region."

"The period set by law for securing the 1965 inspection sticker ends at midnight, April 15, and there can be no extension of the deadline," Gossett pointed out. "Any Texas motorist whose vehicle does not display the new sticker after 15 is subject to arrest by any sheriff, deputy, city policeman or by officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety."

"May we encourage all motorists, who have not had their vehicles inspected, to have this done immediately as some of the inspection stations are already becoming crowded," Gossett asked.

Spiritual and philosophical convictions of men like Benjamin Franklin, George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Samuel Adams, James Madison, Alexander Hamilton, John Jay and Thomas Paine were examined in detail as Mrs. Mar-

tin said. "These men were opposed to laws which made church attendance compulsory. Man's approach to God, they believed, was as personal as his own

Heart of her review of Cousin's book was a step by step exposition of the "highly developed religious beliefs" of each Founding Father as expressed in a quote from his personal letters, papers, diary or speeches.

"I never was without some religious principles," was the quote which began the summary of Franklin's principles, climaxed with Franklin's famous lines "God grant that not only the love of Liberty but a thorough knowledge of the rights of man may pervade all the nations of the earth."

Washington's expression was "The path of try Piety is so plain as to require but little political direction," and "It is impossible to account for the creation of the universe, without the agency of a Supreme Being."

John Adams' contributions were discussed after the quoting of his "Ask me not whether I am a Catholic or Protestant, Calvinist or Arminian. As far as they are Christian, I wish to be a fellow-disciple with them all."

Jefferson, author of his own version of the New Testament, "The Life and Morals of Jesus," once wrote "I have never judged the religion of others by their lives," believing in "one family in the bonds of love, peace, common wants and common aids."

"What is here a Right toward Men in a Duty toward the Creator," came from the pen of Madison, often called the "Father of the Constitution."

Hamilton's sketch closed the review. "The sacred rights of Mankind are not to be rummaged for among old parchments or dusty records," Hamilton wrote. "They are written, as with a sunbeam, in the whole volume of nature, by the hands of the Divinity, itself, and can never be erased or obscured by moral power."

The employee who now pays a maximum tax of \$174 annually would find the amount for Social Security benefits and "medicare" increased to \$291 by 1971. Employers would pay a similar increase for each employee, thus resulting in higher prices for goods and services.

The Texas approach of providing medical, surgical and hospital care to those who need it is a more comprehensive, more economical program than "medicare" and it provides more benefits. If you object to paying higher payroll taxes for an undesirable, unneeded program, write your Congressman today. Ask him to oppose the "medicare" tax proposal, mentioning the programs for the aged now available in Texas. Ask him to support the Herlong-Curtis Eldercare Bill (H.R. 3727), which would make possible the broadening of existing Texas program to provide medical, hospital and nursing home care for those few remaining aged who are still in need of help.
