

Old Rip Scrip Is Now In Circulation

The first crisp, green and negotiable copies were distributed Saturday in Eastland when the Chamber of Commerce staged its first "Third Saturday" drawing on the square.

Getting underway at 2 p.m., preceded by the harmony of a combo, known as the Gems, the event attracted hundreds to Eastland, and there were smiles everywhere, particularly on the faces of those who claimed the give-away scrip.

(Names and pictures of the winners will appear in Thursday's Telegram, it has been announced.)

Evaluation of the program will begin Monday afternoon when the Retail Trade Committee meets to talk about the possibility of staging the event twice a month rather than just once, as is presently being done. Chairman B. W. Robertson will preside at the meeting.

Th chamber board of directors Thursday gave the committee authority to proceed as it sees fit regarding the addition of another drawing day. Many people in town, it is reported, have requested that the event be held more frequently.

A total of 155,000 drawing tickets were distributed prior to Friday, C-C President James Smith told the directors, and the addition of another drawing would cost no more in ticket expense, but would

IN DISTRICT COURT

\$33,000 In Damages Asked Of Collins Construction Co.

Collins Construction Co. of Austin, contractors for the re-paving of Highway 80 between Eastland and Ranger in 1962, are being sued for a combined total of \$33,000 in 91st District Court, and juries are to hear the cases beginning Monday morning.

The company re-topped the multi-lane route and are being sued for damages which allegedly resulted from rock-crushing operations in connection with the work.

A. O. Tindall is asking \$15,000 in damages and Leone O'Donnell is seeking \$18,000 for damage said done by dust and rock from the crushing operation.

The 50-venire panel called originally to hear the Gorman school tax suit, will report Monday morning and a jury will be picked. It was reported that the two damage suits against Collins may possibly be combined.

The Gorman school tax matter has been re-set for May 4th, with Judge E. H. Griffin of Graham to preside in that case. A pre-trial hearing in the Gorman case will be held in Breckenridge before Judge Griffin this week, it was reported.

Mr. Tindall is represented by Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. of the Eastland law firm of Turner and Seaberry, and Mrs. O'Donnell is represented by L. R. Pearson of Ranger in the Collins damage case.

Collins firm is represented by King, Willoughby, Vlete and Dickerson of Abilene.

Judge Griffin will preside in the Gorman case in which residents of that city are asking the school to make adjustments in taxes and evaluations.

Judge Griffin was assigned to this court when Judge J. M. Collie, 91st District Court judge, asked to be relieved from hearing the case. Judge Collie said that he has two sisters who live in Gorman.

Judge Collie will preside in the Monday damage trials.

Property belonging to both plaintiffs in the damage suit is located on the north side of Highway 80 between Eastland and Ranger, and the parties claim that damages resulted from blasting, and the flying rocks and dust.

One of the petitions assert that "over 200 acres of land was covered by dust."

Potential jurors have been called from Gorman, Rising Star, Cisco, Desdemona, Eastland, Ranger and Carbon.

New Autoclave Is Cleanly an Asset At Eastland Memorial Hospital

Good hospitals are identified by cleanliness. Cleanliness of everything — floors, furnishings, fixtures, people.

And not just cleanliness, but real clean, sterile clean, which means completely free from germs.

And most important in a good hospital are the sterile tools and supplies used by physicians in the mending and saving of human lives.

At Eastland Memorial Hospital, the latest and most modern sterilization equipment has just been installed, for keeping surgical (and many other) supplies sterile clean.

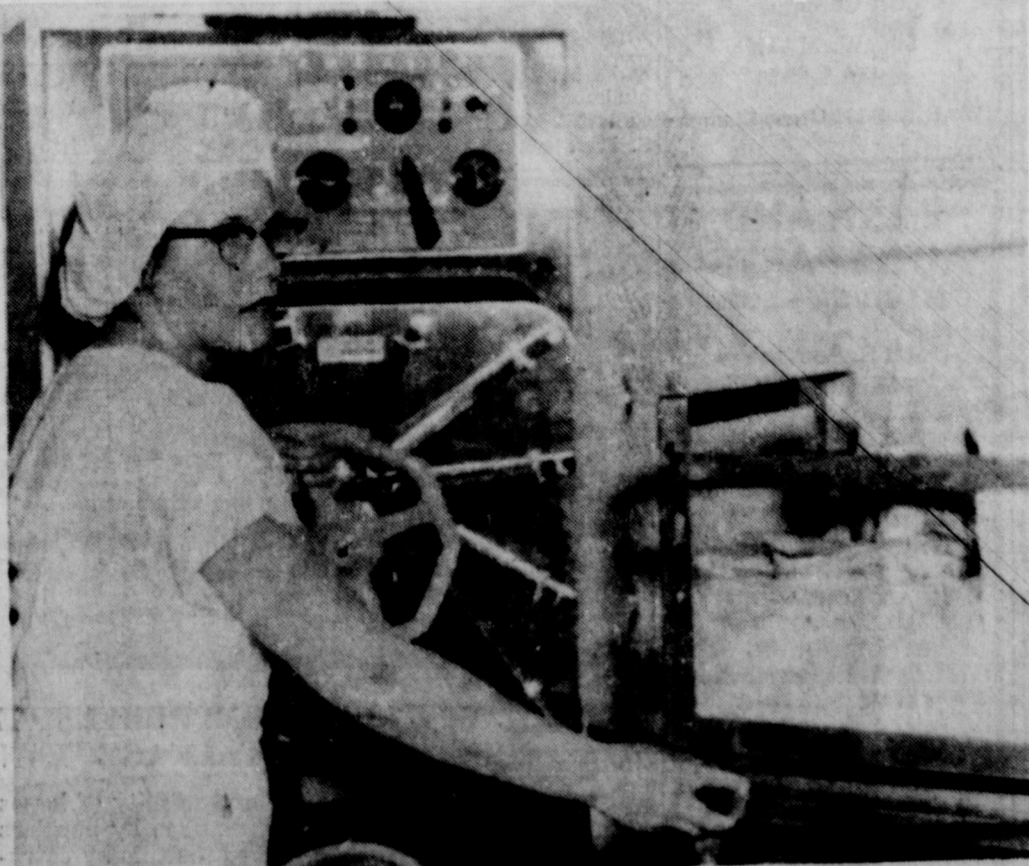
Staff members call it an "autoclave". The hospital has had one all along — but not like this one. Webster describes an autoclave as "a stewpan with a tight lid."

Made almost exclusively of stainless steel, the device is used to clean surgical, O. F. and emergency equipment, as well as supplies for the hallways. Mrs. Eleanor Wright, supervisor of Central Supply where the machine is being used.

"And we clean bandage, needles and syringes too," she said. "We wrap in Kraft paper the necessary instruments for specific operations in individual packs, and tape them with a special tape, she explained. The tape has marks on it which turn a different color when sterilization is complete, so the staff members know when the contents are "sterile" and therefore "safe."

And supplies are never "le un-scrubbed," she said. "As soon as a surgery is completed, the employees in central supply, so that when they are needed again, they're ready. With approximately 45 supplies

All canned foods are not identical in quality, and you may save money by studying the various grades. You will want to learn about the different grades, than study grades which are best for specific purposes.

Some processed foods have been inspected by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and will bear an inspection shield. Virtually all canned vegetables are put up in three grades: Fancy, or Grade A, which denotes highest quality and flavor, uniform size and color, and special care in handling; extra standard, or Grade B, which is slightly below the requirements for the fancy grade; standard, or Grade C, usually about the average run of the crop, somewhat irregular as to size, color and ripeness.

Canned vegetables labeled "substandard", "below standard", or "below Grade C" are wholesome and nutritious, but are so labeled because they do not meet all the requirements for the standard grade. These vegetables may be used in soups, mixed dishes and similar products where a perfect shape or size is not necessary. Grade A or fancy canned vegetables should be chosen for those dishes where shape, size and color of the products are important. Grade B can be used in similar situations where not such a fancy appearance is needed. Standard or Grade C canned

products are excellent choices for everyday meals.

Various companies have some identifying means of labeling their canned goods so grades may be recognized. This is accomplished by a different color label for different grades within the same brand or in the name given to the particular grade within the brand.

Fruits are also canned by grade. The main difference in grades of most of the small fruits is in the amount of sugar used in preparing the syrup. The syrup is described as extra heavy, heavy, medium or light, according to the percentage of sugar.

Water-packed fruits, such as pie fruits and berries, are packed without sugar. Choice of fruit to be purchased should be determined by the use to be made of it.

The selection of good frozen vegetables often is dependent on the dealer. There is a line on the inner side of most frozen food cabinets above which foods should not be stacked. So select packages from clean cabinets in which foods are stacked no higher than the proper fill level.

Frozen food packages should be clean and firm. If food has warmed up to a point where much of it has softened, it has already lost quality. The packaging materials should not be torn, crushed or juice stained. Frozen food that is exposed or poorly pack-

JOHN B. CONNALLY EARNS 2nd TERM AS GOVERNOR OF TEXAS

(An Editorial)

Few Texans will disagree with a statement that John Bowden Connally has done an outstanding job as Governor of this state since he took office a little over a year ago.

Unusual success in securing the enactment of his program in the Legislature, able leadership of the state government and a good job of presenting Texas to outsiders marked the first year of his administration. Mr. Connally gave personal leadership to a new industrialization program that has paid rich dividends as many new payroll industries began operations in Texas during the past year.

The strong emphasis that Mr. Connally has placed on the value of progress in all fields of education — from grade school to graduate level — has won much applause. Gratifying indeed is the apparent success of his program in this field of ever-increasing importance.

This aggressive, ambitious and energetic man was born Feb. 27, 1917, on a stock farm at Floresville. He worked his way through the University of Texas to earn a law degree. Incidentally, his political career began when he successfully ran for president of the student body at the UoT. Also, he served as president of his law class and chairman of the publication board. Moreover, he met and married the University of Texas' 1938 Sweetheart — the former Idanell Brill, a native of Austin.

After graduation, Mr. Connally spent a year as secretary to Congressman Lyndon B. Johnson, now President of the United States. He volunteered for duty in the U. S. Navy after Pearl Harbor and served with distinction in both the Pacific and Atlantic theaters.

Since the war, Mr. Connally has practiced law and has served as Secretary of the Navy on the staff of John F. Kennedy. He resigned from his position in 1961 to return home to Texas for the purpose of making his first race for public office. He won election over a large field of well known opponents.

Through the years, Mr. Connally has served in several capacities for Lyndon B. Johnson, including managing campaigns. His distinguished service in Washington along with his fine work as Governor of Texas gives Mr. Connally an effective stature for the office he holds. He is capable of opening more doors throughout the country than most Texans — certainly more than all of his opponents combined.

On the basis of his administration to date, his devotion to duty and his dedication to his native state, Texans certainly should return John Connally to the Governor's office with a large vote of confidence next May 3rd. He has won a "well done" expression from us all.

Two Oil Projects Announced For Area Northeast of Cisco

Two oil projects of considerable interest were announced Friday for the Eastland County area some six miles north of Cisco. One was a wildcat Mississippi test, and the other was a Cambrian sand test.

The wildcat was the Charles Cobb IV of Marshall No. 1 W. H. Groves Estate, located on the old Groves property near the north shore of Lake Cisco. Location was given as 1,650 feet from the south and 750 feet from the west lines of Section 473, SP Survey.

The drilling permit showed that the hole will go to 4,000 feet to test the Mississippian. The project is on a 160-acre lease between two oil test holes that were sunk a good many years ago. Both went to the Lake Sand and one was a gas producer for a number of years, it was reported.

The Cambrian test was announced by Low Drilling Co. of Cisco and W. M. Jarrell of Houston as their No. 1 T. E. Davis, seven miles northwest of Cisco near Mississippian line production on the Gordon Woods Ranch.

This is a re-entry project to deepen a hole that was sunk to 5,432 feet by T. E. Newman in November, 1962. Location was given as 2,250 feet from the north line and 900 feet from the east lines of Section 54, Block 4, H&TC Survey, on a 113-acre lease.

The decision to deepen the hole was based on a study of the log of an old cable tool hole dug nearby years ago, it was reported. The log showed a good Cambrian sand oil show at about 5,600 feet. The permit calls for a total depth of 5,700 feet, which is expected to top the granite

geries at the local hospital a month, cleaning is a full-time job — or was before the new machine was installed. What used to take 16 house hours of constant sterilizing, is now done in four or five loads a day, Mrs. Wright said.

The old machine, which will still be used for stand-by, was first put into use in 1934 at Kilgore Hospital. The cylinder-type sterilizer was brought to Eastland as part of the original equipment, and has been in use for 11½ years here. With its manual controls, it had to be watched constantly, she said. (With the new machine we just put the filled tray in, set the timer and go about our other duties, she proudly said.)

The new machine, which Administrator Leon Musgrove purchased for about \$5,200, represents a savings in personnel time as well as utilities, he said.

After being "autoclaved" the packed instruments remain in their sealed, sterile packs until they are used. On rare occasions, when packs are not used within 30 days, they go through the sterilization machine again. (Tonsillotomy packs are the only packs that ever have to go through twice, because there are fewer such operations at busy Eastland Memorial than any other, the supervisor said.)

Every known safety device is built into the new machine, built and installed by American Sterilizing Co., Musgrove said, and it also features a permanent recording of time, temperature and pressure to insure that sterilization is complete.

The old machine, which had to be manually loaded as well as operated, will still be used as needed, and tested regularly to keep it in working order, but the supply workers won't have to depend on it since the new machine is performing so wonderfully.

Other employees in central supply are Mrs. Julene Casey, Mrs. Veta Lizenbee and Mrs. Christell Gains.

With a seating capacity of approximately 1,000 the beautiful Majestic Theater, is one of the city's most historic landmarks. Built in 1918 by the late Mr. C. U. Connelley, the show-place was bought in 1947 by Interstate, and completely remodeled.

(The accompanying photo shows a sketch of the opening night after the re-decorating.) In its early days it was the site of vaudeville shows in Eastland, (one of the few such steps between Dallas and El Paso at that time), and today, it is known for the up-to-date entertainment featured regularly. It is the entertainment center of the county, and as such is credited by the chamber of commerce as a key to Eastland's position as center of activities.



Present Manager is Bachelor Dick Dixon, who reports the firm's annual salaries payroll is about \$16,000, with eight employees who have a total combined theater service of over 60 years.

Employees besides Dixon are: J. D. Yowell, almost 11 years; Mrs. Charlie Burkett, seven years; Mrs. Gertrude Cushman, four and a half years; Mrs. Audrey Kimbrell, seven years; Larry Earley, 18 months; Billy Wayne Earley, 12 months; Louis Whitley, 17 and 17½ years.

The theater is presently under the operation of Interstate Theatres of Dallas, a division of the American Broadcasting Co.

And according to Manager Dixon, the Majestic is the Showplace of Showplace Eastland.

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FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH — Organized in 1876, the First Baptist Church members met in a sawmill on the Leon River. Later they met in a frame building located on the corner of W. Plummer and S. Lamar, where in 1929 the present building was erected.

First Baptist Church First Organized In 1876 In Saw Mill

Sometime in the summer of 1876, a meeting of the Baptists of Eastland was called in a saw mill situated near where the Negro school building now stands, for the purpose of organizing a Baptist Church.

The church was organized by Rev. Lingo, a laborer at the saw mill. The mill belonged to I. H. Eversole. No seats were available, so the members sat on logs.

The church was re-organized in 1880 as the Missionary Baptist Church, with the Rev. J. C. Finnell, pastor. In the minutes of the church, on September 20, 1881, it was discussed and decided to name the church "The Baptist Church of Christ." On December 25, 1881, the church was again re-organized.

The organization's first house of worship was a frame structure which stood just south of the Alhambra Hotel and was the second church building to be erected in Eastland. The next home of the church was erected on the site of the present building and was also a frame structure.

The corner stone of the present building, located on the

corner of West Plummer and South Lamar Streets, was laid in 1929 and the building was opened for congregational use June 1, 1930. The church has been served by 31 pastors since its organization.

The present building is of brick construction and has an auditorium that is equipped with refrigerated air conditioning and a heating system. The church educational building is located across the street on the corner of West Plummer and South Seaman. The library is located in the educational building.

Rev. Haston Brewer will celebrate his third anniversary as pastor of the church Easter Sunday, March 29th. He came to the church on Easter Sunday in 1961 from the Crestview Baptist Church of Midland, where he had served as pastor for 7½ years.

He is a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University of Shawnee, and the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He is a member of the Executive Board of the Texas Baptist Convention and a member of the Board of Trustees of Howard Payne College in

Brownwood. He is Moderator of the Cisco Baptist Association.

He and his wife, Mildred, and their four daughters, Carolyn Sue, Martha Ann, Jan Elizabeth, and Sarah Jean, live at the church parsonage which is located next door to the church at 100 W. Plummer.

W. J. Chance is music and

education director of the church. They are from Florida and he is a student at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He and his wife, Jane, and their two children, Patrice and Scott, live at 506 S. Daugherty St.

Mrs. H. W. Sims is church clerk and secretary. Dave Fambrough is custodian. Church officers are: treasurer, Earl O'Brien; organist, Mrs. D. L. Kinnaird, Sr.; pianist, Mrs. M. A. Treadwell, Jr.; trustees, Ed Layton and Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Jr.; Librarian, Mrs. Charles Pylant; and assistant librarian, Mrs. Henry Moore.

The deacons of the church are elected by the members. An ordination service is held by the church. Chairman of the deacons is Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Jr., vice-chairman, Edgar Alton, and secretary, Lee Graham.

The Sunday School is composed of 13 departments with Dr. J. O. Jolly as superintendent and Earl O'Brien as assistant superintendent. C. T. Lucas in Sunday School secretary.

In addition to Sunday morning classes, the Sunday school sponsors a Vacation Bible School each summer and cooperates with the Training Union in holding several study courses throughout the year.

Training Union director is Charles Pylant and associate director is Lee Graham. This organization has eight departments. The Training Union not only teaches its members, but trains them to carry on the work of the entire church.

President of the Women's Missionary Union of the church is Mrs. J. O. Jolly. There are four circles in the WMU proper, three day circles and one night circle, and three girls' auxiliaries under its leadership.

The Junior G.A.'s, age 9 and 10, are under the direction of Mrs. W. J. Chance; Junior G.A.'s, age 11 and 12, Mrs. James Johnston and Mrs. Gene Rhodes; Intermediate G.A.'s, Mrs. Herbert Ekurt and Mrs. R. G. Perkins; YWA's, Mrs. Wade Freeman and Mrs. Kenneth Thompson; and the Sunbeams, Mrs. Eddie Sims, Mrs. Winston Boles, and Mrs. E. W. Ballinger. Mrs. Herbert Ekurt is Girls Auxiliary director.

The First Baptist Church is an independent local body with no ecclesiastical authority over it. Its guide in all matters of faith and practice is the New Testament.

The membership of the First Baptist Church is composed of baptized believers in Christ. ADD Eastland First Baptist. It holds that a regenerating experience in Jesus Christ is a prerequisite to church membership.

The church recognizes and observes two ordinances, Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Baptism is immersion in water and is symbolic of the believers death to sin and resurrection to walk in a new life. The Lord's Supper is a symbolic representation of the body and blood of the Lord as His body was broken and His blood shed for the sins of the world. It is a memorial to His death.

The church believes that Salvation is by grace and by grace alone. All other doctrines of the church are vitally related to this doctrine.

The First Baptist Church voluntarily cooperates with other churches of like faith and order in the Cisco Baptist Association which is composed of the churches in Eastland, Stephens and Shackelford counties. It also cooperates in the Baptist General Convention of Texas and the Southern Baptist Convention. This cooperation is for the purpose of missions.

In this spirit of cooperation the church shares in the support of over 1800 missionaries on foreign fields and over 2100 missionaries under the Home Mission Board. These missionaries are witnesses of Christ at home and abroad.

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COVERED!

There is a great deal of talk these days about providing for the medical care needs of our aged citizens. In Texas, these needs are being met under an effective and efficient program that is unique among all states in the nation.

The State of Texas has established a medical care program which covers over 30 per cent of the State's entire aged population. The program includes surgical and medical care in hospitals, as well as nursing home benefits. Presently covered by the program are some 229,000 recipients of Old Age Assistance. Each has been issued a paid-up, comprehensive health insurance policy.

This program has been favorably accepted by those who are covered, with more than 6,500 aged being hospitalized monthly. Texas' program is paying an average of 80 per cent of the total hospital bill, and up to 100 per cent of the physician's fee for medical service in the hospital.

We favor the Texas program because it is meeting the needs of the aged through a workable, efficient system. We oppose the "medicare" program now being considered by Congress because it is uneeded, highly expensive, and places governmental control between the doctor and his patient.

Write your congressman today and tell him you favor the Texas aged care program (Kerr-Mills). Encourage him to oppose the King-Anderson Bill (H.R. 3920) which would provide a compulsory federal program for the aged, financed through higher Social Security taxes.
