Lamesa's fourth annual clean up campaign got off to a good start here Monday morning with all committees reporting "Set To Go." Committees reported that they were finding much response from their requests for the cleaning up of the vacant lots. An invoice bearing the date 1865 is in the possession of C. A. Townsend of Inman's Cafe. This invoice for groceries was owned by C. A. Townsend's father, J. L. Townsend who freighted groceries to Oskaloosa, Kansas. The groceries were bought from a firm by the name of Grant and Prest wholesale and retail dealers in groceries, implements and field and garden seeds with the date of Feb. 23, 1865 from Leavenworth, Kan.

FARMERS SHORT COURSE AT A. & M. TO HOLD NOVEL STUNT PROGRAM PUT ON BY THE VISITORS

A new and novel feature planned for the twenty second annual Farmers Short Course at the Texas A. & M. College July 27-August 1st will be the nightly entertainment program on the college drill field. This program will be much in the nature of a county fair entertainment program of days of the past, including such homely sports as ducking stool event, barnyard contests such as hen killing and picking, harnessing work teams, guessing at the production of dairy cows, climbing the greased pole, old time community play and the like. In addition the customary free motion picture show will be given every night.

The short course visitors themselves will participate in the entertainment features, every event to be staged by home talent and to be of a nature that can be duplicated at any county or community fair.

"This should prove wholesome and inexpensive fun for all and serve as a demonstration on how country people can get more enjoyment out of their fairs by entertaining themselves than by resorting to professional entertainers," said Director O. B. Martin of the Extension Service in commenting on the entertainment feature planned.

A large variety of talks and demonstrations, touching virtually every phase of farm and home activity, will make up the program during the daylight hours. Special programs have been arranged during the daylight hours. Special programs have been arranged for boys and girls in addition to the farm ranch and homemaking programs for adults. A number of special conferences are scheduled.

Dairy Problems Will Be Discussed at A. & M. Short Course

American dairymen must adjust production to the requirements of the home market until their products can compete in quality and price with foreign dairy products in the opinion of John W. Luker, dairy specialist, Extension Service Texas A. & M. College and the United States Department of Agriculture, who is one of the speakers for the dairy program at the twenty second annual Farmers Short Course at the college July 27-August 1st. Mr. Luker points out that for the first time in 25 years, prices of dairy products are lower in the United States than abroad, due to a saturation of the domestic market.

"Heretofore this country has been importing dairy products but now we have a surplus to export," he goes on to say. "Our dairy products are not established on foreign markets, we lack the superior dairy products with which to compete, and our production costs are high in comparison with dairy countries."

"The first and most important factor in correcting our position is improvement in the quality of our dairy products. Quality begins on the farm. It is reflected by the character of pastures used for grazing, by feeds and feeding."

Winners in Master Farm Homemaker Are Announced

Five outstanding Texas farm women will be honored as winners of the Texas Master Farm Homemaker title for 1931 on the opening day of the twenty second annual Farmers Short Course at the Texas A. & M. College July 27th. The following have just been announced as winners of the title for this year: Mrs. Noah Staggs, Weatherford; Mrs. Herman Schulze, Kerrville; Mrs. Edgar Lumpkin, Buffalo Springs; Mrs. A. R. Hanna, Floydada; Mrs. J. P. Impson, Beeville.

Selection of the title winners and the public ceremonial in their honor are sponsored by the Farmer's Wife, national farm women's magazine of St. Paul, Minn., with the cooperation of the Extension Service of the college. Judging committees to select the winners was named by Miss Mildred Keaton, state home demonstration agent of the Extension Service. Presentation of trophies will be made by Miss Crinne Johnson of the farm publication.

With the recognition of this year's group, the number of farm women in Texas accorded the master farm homemaker title will reach twenty. Such recognition ceremonies are held in twenty states. Since the farm women's magazine and cooperating colleges of agriculture began naming master farm homemakers four years ago, 3622 names have gone on the rolls. The group in each state have been formed into guilds. In selecting the winners a careful study is made of their answers to more than 500 questions concerning their homemaking records. Emphasis is placed on how well the homemaker managed with funds at her disposal rather than on the costliness of the farm equipment.

Born 64 years ago and reared in the community in which she now lives, Mrs. Skages has taken an active part in the development of her community from a wild, sparsely settled section to one with good schools, churches and community organizations. One of her present interests is a community library project being promoted by the literary society of which she is a member. She has a family of six children who are leaders in their communities.

"The function of a home is to make a place of security for our selves and our children," says Mrs. Lumpkin. She has two daughters and one son. Besides caring for her family and giving attention to community affairs, Mrs. Lumpkin finds time to can fruit and vegetables and to raise turkeys and chickens for market. Earnings for the year totaled \$518.

Mrs. Schulze is a member of three community organizations and holds office in each. She has two sons and a daughter. The daughter is attending college, one son is a research chemist, the other a farmer. Raising garden plants helped Mrs. Schulze earn \$175 the past year.

Mrs. Hanna, mother of five daughters and two sons, is vice-president of the Floyd County Federation of Women's Clubs. She teaches in Sunday School and is active in parent-teacher association work.

U. S. POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT ORDERS 1500 FORDS

The United States Post Office Department today placed an order with the Washington Branch of the Ford Motor Company for 1500 motor truck chassis, of which 500 will be three-fourth ton carrying capacity and 1000 of one and one-half tons carrying capacity. The purchase of the motor equipment was the largest made by a government department since the war. With this order Ford sales to the Post Office Department during recent years reached a total of 2900 units.

The purchase marked another step in the Department's program of building up its fleet of several thousand trucks and also to replace some of the surplus trucks turned over to the Army at the close of the war.

Deliveries are to start immediately and continue as rapidly as

the bodies contracted for are ready for installation. The completed trucks will then be distributed to some 60 cities throughout the United States.

The order was placed with the Ford Motor Company after an exhaustive test conducted by the Department with the cooperation of the Bureau of Standards. The tests were under the supervision of W. A. Jacobs, automotive engineer of the Bureau of Standards and William Wolma of Chicago and Morris Carrier of Brooklyn, motor vehicle engineers of the Post Office Department.
