Santa Claus To Visit Lamesa Friday Night

Unveil Windows, Band Music Part Of Celebration

Windows Compete For City-Wide Honors

Grown-ups as well as youngsters are due for a thrilling experience in Lamesa Friday night when Santa Claus comes to town and the Christmas windows are unveiled.

Quite an elaborate program has been arranged, beginning at 7 p. m., at which time the Lamesa High School band will render a 30 minute concert from the band stand.

Promptly at 7:30 all windows of the town will be unveiled, and Santa's arrival should be expected shortly thereafter. He will bring with him a bag, filled with enough candy, so that every youngster may have some. Children are warned against rushing, as there will be plenty of candy for all, and enough time will be given to see that everyone is served.

Business firms of Lamesa have been busy throughout most of this week decorating their windows in the first event of this kind ever staged in Lamesa. This is the first time that the windows will be competing with each other for the most interesting and beautiful. The contest has been divided into several groups so that each firm will be competing with a firm handling similar merchandise. In other words there will be a contest for the dry goods, groceries, drugs, hardware, variety, furniture, and other stores. Ribbons will be awarded the winners and the windows will be judged by laymen, selected from among the citizens of the town, it was announced this week. This is done so as to get the reaction of the average citizen, and the window which has the strongest appeal, to the average citizen will be declared the winner. Names of the judges will not be revealed.

Taken as a whole, Lamesa boasts some of the finest and most beautiful window displays of any town near its size, and with the special effort being put forth at this time, there should be some very attractive displays.

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Fire Completely Destroys Moore Gin Last Tuesday

Loss Estimated More Than Fifteen Thousand

Fire, which broke out in the boiler room from leaking oil, completely destroyed the H. M. Moore Gin in Southeast Lamesa, Tuesday afternoon about 1 p. m.

Trouble had been experienced in getting fuel oil from the large storage to the small storage tank in the boiler room. It was thought that the small tank was empty and the pipe leading to the furnace was taken loose and steam pressure applied to open jets in the tank. Instead of the tank being empty, when the hole was opened, oil flowed out and was ignited from the furnace fire. With fuel oil pouring from the tank, it was impossible to stop the fire.

The loss was estimated at \$15,000 which was only partially covered by insurance.

Polls Are To Open At Nine O'clock, Closing At Five

All Farmers Eligible To Participate In Move

The annual cotton marketing quota referendum will be held in Dawson County on Saturday, December 9, 1939. Five polling boxes have been designated in the county for the convenience of farmers. The voting boxes will be located at Ackery, Patricia, Welch, O'Donnell and Lamesa. The polls will be opened promptly at 9 o'clock, and will close at 5 o'clock. Any person who received a cotton party check or was a cotton producer in 1939 is eligible to vote. An eligible person may vote at any polling place in the county or any other county or state where the referendum is being held. The purpose of the referendum for the cotton producers to determine whether they want to restrict the production of cotton in 1940 as they did in 1939. The vote will not affect the Soil Conservation Act as amended in any respect. The cotton referendum is a control measure placed in the hands of the producers to determine by a two-thirds majority of those voting whether they want to keep the production of cotton down to a normal amount in order to keep the price up to a parity level.

The cotton referendum is an important and democratic piece of farm legislation, said Joe M. Peterson, chairman of the County Committee, and should be recognized by the vote of every cotton producer in Dawson County. There are approximately 3,000 eligible voters in the county and it would materially assist the county, state, and national leaders in securing additional benefits as well as needed changes in the program, said Mr. Peterson.

Election judges have been selected, who have no official connection with the program in order to prevent any prejudice in the election.

Dr. Cox Says:

Isolation placards for the various communicable diseases will be tacked upon hundreds of Texas homes during the coming winter months, but even then there will be not enough of these signs in use.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, declares.

"The reason for this, is that many parents who do not call a physician unless their child becomes seriously ill, will fail to report the case to the local health officer or their family physician.

The physician reports existence of communicable disease when he sees a case, but reporting is the parent's responsibility when no physician is called.

"If parents neglect this duty, their home will not be placarded, and visitors, particularly children, will not be properly warned there is communicable disease within. By entering the house, they risk the danger of exposure and possible illness as a result."

"A number of parents erringly consider an isolation placard to be a sign of disgrace when in reality it is a symbol of honor. Displaying placard indicates that the family in which there is a case of communicable disease is doing its part in helping reduce the spread of infection. Use of the placard where necessary this winter will help protect others against measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, mumps, and other diseases which increase during cold weather."

"Whole-hearted cooperation in the observance of isolation is both desirable and necessary for the control and prevention of communicable disease. The law provides penalty for persons who fail to observe health regulations."
