Mitchell County Fair gets underway here Thursday, including a number of special events set for the weekend.

Along with the county fair this year will be a carnival, a pet show, joint Fair-Homecoming parade, old timers reunion and tractor-pull.

Fair catalogs have been printed and are now available at the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce office.

Pottery Factory Newest Industry

Bob and Dale Creighton own and operate the city's newest industry, Iron Star Pottery.

They began the industry as a hobby, which grew and grew, until they are now devoting full time to its operation.

Moving here recently from Big Spring, the couple originally are from Ohio. Creighton came to Big Spring to work in the state hospital there, started making pottery as a hobby and eventually began the full-scale production of handcrafted stoneware items which now reach a wide-ranging market through manufacturer's sales representatives in the nation's major marketplaces.

The pottery factory is located in the brick building on the corner of 4th and Oak which housed Colorado Steam Laundry for almost 50 years.

Creighton said that they are planning to remodel the office area at the front of the building and make it into a small retail outlet for local purchases. They have been so busy getting production underway, that they have not had a chance to get the outlet fixed up.

Creighton's mother, Vivian, also works at the factory, serving as bookkeeper to the growing business.

Besides the handmade stoneware, the firm also manufactures pottery equipment for sale to other pottery businesses, schools, or hobbyists.

Four potters work at the factory here, all from out of state. They are Mary Sue Rightmire from Oregon, Peter Goubeaud from New York, Andy Mordhorst of Oregon and Tom Gardner of Michigan.

Others who work at the factory are local people. They are Cheryl Chavez, who gets the clay ready for the potters; Steve Hamrick, the firm's builder who built the kiln, and Donnie Brown, manufacturer of the pottery machinery sold to other potters.

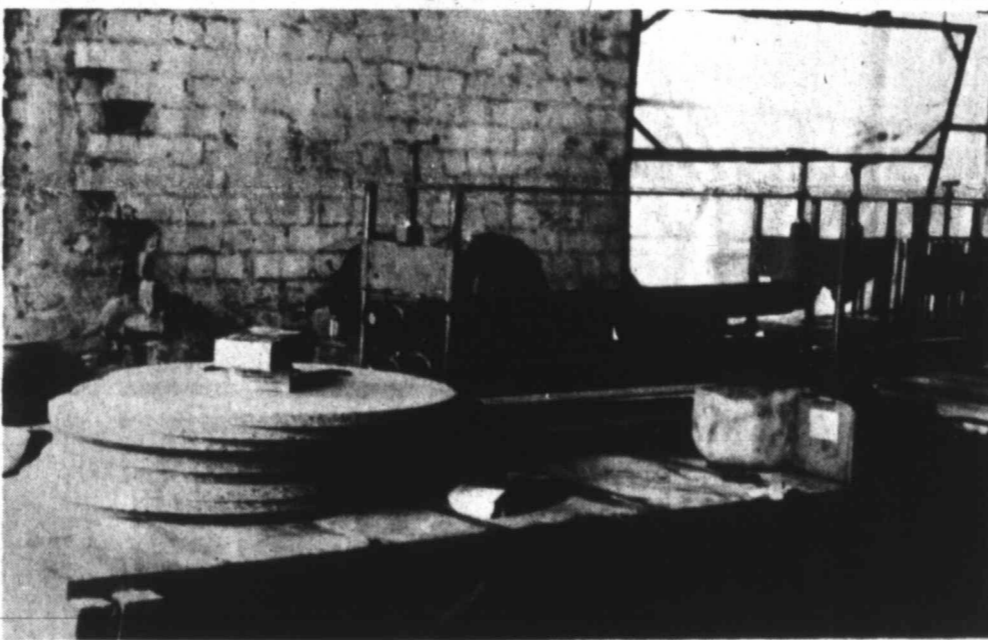
Bob Creighton manages the business and his wife, Dale, is in charge of glazing, packing and shipping items to buyers.

Retail prices for the finished products range from \$12 to \$80. Glazes are of two types, gloss or matte, and come in earth

colors of white, gray, blues, greens, yellows, and rust and brown tones.

Creighton explained that earthenware is a long-lasting product that requires a high temperature for firing. It must be fired at 2,300 degrees in the kiln. Clays used in the items made here are a mixture of clays from Missouri, Tennessee and Ohio and are shipped here by the freight car load. Different clays and temperatures result in different types of products, he said.

Iron Star Potters will have a potter at work on the potter's wheel during the October Occasion at the Civic Center.



Sleeping Sickness Case Reported Here

J. D. Williams Jr., doctor of veterinary medicine here, warns that a case of sleeping sickness affecting horses has been reported in the county.

The sleeping sickness, or encephalomyelitis, is probably a form known as the Western variety, Dr. Williams said, as the horse is apparently going to respond to treatment. The Eastern form of the disease results in death, he said.

"Not many people had their horses vaccinated this year because it was so dry," Dr. Williams explained, "but with recent rains, the mosquitoes are bad and they carry the virus causing the disease."

He recommends vaccinating horses now, using a bivalent vaccine which immunizes against both Western and Eastern forms of the virus. A separate vaccine is required for immunization against the Venezuelan strain, VEE.

Two shots are required at intervals of between one week to three weeks.

"If we have an early frost," Dr. Williams said, "then the mosquitoes will be wiped out

and there won't be any problem, but we can't be sure that there will be an early frost."

So far, only one case of the disease has been discovered in Mitchell County, but three cases have been reported in Nolan County.

Hunter Course Set Oct. 1 & 3

Ronnie Aston, game warden in Mitchell County, will be teaching a Hunter Safety Certification course October 1 and 3 in the Medallion Room of Lone Wolf Electric.

Hours for the course are from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. both days.

For late registration, phone 728-5073 or contact Aston. Fee for the course is only \$1, but only 22 persons are allowed in a class, he said.

About 16 people are signed-up now for the course, Aston said.

A person should be 12 years of age or older to take the certification course and after completion, hunters are granted a certificate which is required by some states, notably Colorado, Aston explained.

Range Tour Set In Barnhart

A group of local ranchers and conservationists will attend a tour of the Range Experiment Station at Barnhart, Thursday.

The group will leave from the Soil Conservation Service office about 7:45 a.m. Thursday and there will be rides for persons wanting to make the tour, says Mark Moseley, Range Conservationist.

Tour starts about 10 a.m. at the experiment station, located 10 miles south of Barnhart on Highway 163.

Some of the programs to be inspected include the High Intensity-Low Frequency system and a four pasture deferred rotation system.

A four pasture system has shown a net income increase of 47 per cent, compared to only 33 per cent for a continuously grazed system. It also carried 10 animal units of deer and is still improving, says Moseley.

The Barnhart HILF system, a six pasture rotation program, showed gross returns of \$3,024 per section.

Cost of registering for the luncheon and program is only \$1, but must be completed by the October 5 deadline for sign-up, says Mrs. Fern Brown, president of the Mitchell County Heart Association, one of the sponsoring groups.

Mrs. Janis Choate, county extension agent, explained that the seminar and luncheon are being sponsored by co-ordinated efforts of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System and the Heart Association county unit.

"A luncheon featuring low fat, low cholesterol foods will be sponsored by the home demonstration clubs of the county," said Mrs. Choate.

Menu for the luncheon includes Oven Fried Chicken, Spicy Spring Peas, Carrot-Pineapple Salad, Yeast Rolls, Iced Tea, Coffee and Sugar Cookies.

The key speaker following lunch will be Dr. Martin L. Dalton, noted heart surgeon from Lubbock. (More information on Dr. Dalton will be provided at a later date.) Time will be allowed for questions.

Sally E. Springer, Extension Foods and Nutrition Specialist, will be present to discuss the role of food in prevention of heart disease. Miss Springer holds the M.S. degree in foods and nutrition from Florida State University. She holds membership in the American Heart Association.

Wolves Lose To Post, 27-7

Post's Antelopes proved Friday night why they are favored to win their district as they came from behind in the second half to score three touchdowns and defeat Colorado City's Wolves 27-7.

The game was a fairly even contest throughout the first half with Post getting on the scoreboard on a 29 yard run by the quarterback. The kick for extra point was wide.

On the ensuing kick-off the Wolves Kyle Moore received the ball, faked a handoff to two runners and then handed the ball to Danny Molina who galloped 80 yards behind good blocking for the Wolves only score of the night, Larry Johnson kicked the point after touchdown, giving the Wolves a one-point lead.

The Wolves threatened to score as the half was ending but a strong Post defense stopped the Colorado City team on the Post one-foot line.

Post scored on a four-yard run in the third quarter and a pass was completed for the two extra points.

In the fourth quarter, a Wolves pass fell into enemy hands with the interceptor racing some 25 yards for another Post TD. The try for extra point failed. Post scored again on a seven yard run late in the fourth quarter and the kick for extra point was good.

The Colorado City coaching staff had praise for the Post quarterback, saying he was one of the best the Wolves have seen. The Post quarterback and their tailback, a 9.7 sprinter, were the main differences in the game, according to Colorado City's coaches.

"We played good defense in the first half," said Colorado City Athletic Director Mike Farda. "The defense broke down in the second half."

The offensive line for the Wolves did a good job throughout the game, Farda noted. He had praise for the running of Kyle Moore and the kicking of Wayne McKee. The defensive secondary also did a good job, Farda pointed out.

The Wolves suffered some injuries in the game including a sprained ankle for Steve Bolin. Just how serious the injuries are will not be known until next week when the Wolves start preparing for the district opener and the homecoming game at Wolf Stadium with Coahoma.

The Good News About Heaven

The word "gospel" literally means "good news." The Bible is absolutely filled with good news! While the Bible does not limit itself to a discussion of heaven, this subject is definitely a part of the good news the Scriptures declare.

Most of us do not spend very much time giving consideration to the life beyond or "The Home Over There." Perhaps this is because all of our treasures are in this world. We are living as though we were creatures of one world. Jesus, on the other hand, warned His disciples against the peril of investing their time, talents, and treasures in values that were perishable (Matt. 6:19-21). He affirmed that "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Is it possible that our refusal to think about the life beyond is due to the fact that we have invested our everything in this present life?

Although Jesus did not say as much about heaven as some would like, there is much in the New Testament that can bring comfort and confidence to the hearts of those who believe in Him as Lord and Savior.

The Bible tells us in unmistakable terms about the nature of heaven. We are told, for instance, that heaven is a prepared place (John 14:1). The geography of heaven is not detailed nor is there an exact location or address. However our Lord made it clear that heaven is not merely a state, but a definite place. We can assume from the terms employed that it will be beautiful, commodious, comfortable and appropriate for every need for the existence that we will then enjoy with God.

Because the battle with sin will be over, heaven will be a place of perfect holiness and will be free from tears, death and pain. We read that nothing shall enter heaven which will defile it (Rev. 21:17). Sorrow and death will never again touch the lives of those who go to be with God.

Although heaven will be a place of rest it will also be a place of active service (Rev. 14:13; Rev. 22:3). The rest that is mentioned does not mean the saints will spend eternity in idleness. It means, rather, that they will not know the burdens and tensions and discomforts of grueling labor and continuing frustrations that some have known on earth. In some manner the children of God will be able to worship God and serve Him in a way that will bring joy to their hearts ages without end! We will be in the home of the heavenly Father (John 14:2). And as the children of God will enjoy the hospitality of God. His children will rejoice in His love and grace and mercy. Love will be the law of heaven.

Heaven is described in such wonderful terms that it is illogical to believe that one could ever purchase at any price the privilege of spending eternity in the heavenly Father's home. It is illogical to believe that one could live good enough to merit the favor of God or that one could earn the right to spend eternity in Heaven.

It is the testimony of the Word of God from beginning to end that those who go to heaven go because of the mercy and grace of God. There is no other way to reach heaven (Ephesians 2:8-9). The way to heaven is found only through faith in Jesus Christ. It was He who declared, "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the Father, but by me (John 14:6).

It is Christ alone who gives to men the gift of eternal life in the present. That life is received as a present possession by those who receive Him into their heart as Lord and Master. It continues beyond the experience that we call death. It reaches its fulfillment and consummation in the heavenly Father's home described so beautifully in many different ways in the Scriptures.

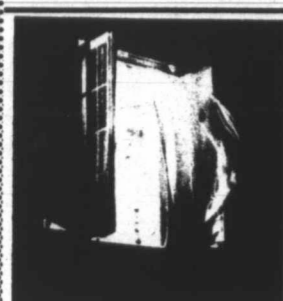

Colorado High School's Junior Varsity team has won a game and lost one in their last two outings, says coach Lonnie Ellis.

They took a 29-0 win from Ballinger a week ago, but lost 34-16 in their Thursday night game with Winters.

The win from Ballinger saw good hitting on defense and good line and backs blocking, Ellis said. Joe Moreno did a fine job on offense and Blake Bodine turned in good performances both ways, Ellis said.

Pete Parham and Drex Grisham caught passes for touchdowns and Key Torrez and Alfred Sierra ran the ball over for touchdowns. Steve Belvin kicked a field goal and two extra points.

Ellis named Kevin Herm, Bodine, Belvin, Moreno and Santos Reyes for outstanding defense and Moreno, Torrez, Grisham, Herm and Eodine on offense.

The loss to Winters saw the young Wolves attempt a field goal shortly before the half, going into the lockers at half-time with a 20-8 deficit, Ellis said that defense was slow and tackles missed. The Winters team has a number of big, quick backs, he said.

Then the Junior Varsity team threatened again three times but were stopped on the 15, 20 and 1 yard lines.

Joe Moreno was hurt during the game, but Bennie Arispe came in at I back and did an excellent job, Ellis said.

Scoring came on a sneak by Rey Torrez and 15-yard pass reception by Pete Parham.





