Morris, Rees Elected 212 Voters In School Election

Tom Rees and S. L. (Mac) Morris, Colorado Independent School District board members, were re-elected Saturday, defeating two opponents for three-year terms.

Voting in Saturday's election was light as only 188 turned out for the school election in addition to 24 who had already voted absentee, making a total vote of 212.

In the Mitchell County Hospital District election, four candidates were re-elected as 79 persons turned out to vote.

Hospital board members re-elected were Preston Morris, 78 votes; Wayne Shawn, 77 votes, and Herb Mearse and Willie Landau, 76 each. All were incumbents except for Mearse who will take the place of Rex McKenney who did not seek re-election.

10 Voters Cast Ballots In Westbrook

Only ten voters bothered to cast their votes in the Westbrook school board election Saturday, but the three incumbent candidates were re-elected.

Receiving 10 votes each were Floyd Ritchey, Jerry Putman and T. A. Whitesides.

They join E. A. Oden, Cleburne Rich, James Dorn and Jerry Webb on the board.

In the school board election, Morris was top vote getter with 140 votes, with Rees receiving 127 votes. Billy Moore received 92 votes and Willis Taylor, 46.

There was no controversy in

the race as all four candidates said they were seeking election in order to help the school district and the young people of the

community get a good education. Rees has served as president of the school board for the

past six years while Morris is currently the board's vice president.

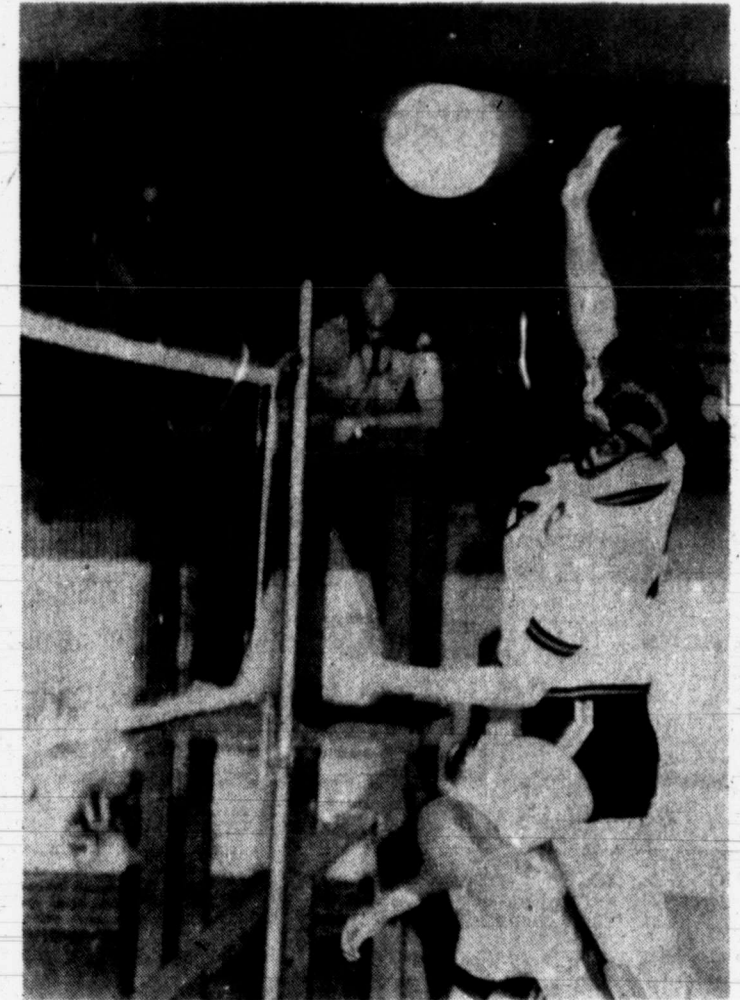


3rd Annual Record Invitational

Girls Lose District

Ballinger's Bearcats came from behind to defeat the Colorado City Wolves for the District 6-AA title in girls volleyball at Wolves gym here Saturday afternoon in the district tournament.

They will go on to represent the district in regional.

Ballinger earned the right to meet Colorado City for the district crown by defeating Stamford 15-1, 15-3 Saturday morning.

In the first game of the championship, the Wolves dominated, taking an easy victory, 15-6.

The second game was a close contest as the score was 8-8 as the 8-minute time limit expired. The Wolves were behind two points with 26 seconds to go and tied the contest. Ballinger then took the next two points in overtime to win the second game.

In the final stanza of the best two out of three games, Ballinger was down 10-4 and then scored seven straight points to go out in front 11-10 and then went on to win 14-11 as time ran out.

Changeover In Loraine Council, School Board

A large turnout of voters elected Ronald Bruce, Linton Webb and George Martin to the Loraine Independent School Board Saturday.

A total of 218 voters were casting their ballots for three board members, choosing from five candidates.

Bruce was the only incumbent re-elected while Margaret Mahon was defeated and there was one vacancy on the board.

There was a total of about 80 voters in the Loraine City election as they elected three councilmen and a mayor, all of which were running unopposed. El-

ected to the Loraine council were Evert Henderson, 74 votes; C. H. Hamilton, 76 votes and Lesley Eason, 75 votes. Royce Mahon was re-elected mayor with 67 votes.

In the Loraine school board election, Bruce was top vote getter in the race with 190 votes while Webb received 176 and Martin, 140. Mrs. Mahon received 98 votes and Anastacio Alvarez got 34 votes.

There were a number of write-ins, each receiving one vote each, both Loraine council and school board elections.

Called Session Recommends County Road Improvement

A special session of Mitchell County commissioners' court was held Tuesday, commissioners largely concerned with a discussion of the county's roads and their condition and also legislation pending before the Texas Legislature.

Commissioners W. M. Vest, Precinct 1; Johnny Shackelford, Precinct 2; Paul Hunter, Precinct 3 and Robert Bruce, Precinct 4, went on record as approving the recommendations to the county's road system as outlined in a letter from Roger G. Welsh, district 8 engineer for the Texas Highway Department.

They wanted, however, to add these two recommendations: --"That the county road going west from the north end of FM 2926 to where it intersects FM 670 (approximately one mile north of Westbrook) be eventually absorbed within the State Farm to Market System.

--"That a low water crossing be constructed across the Colorado River where Interstate 20 bisects same."

In a previous article in the Record, Sun., March 28, a map of four proposed new paving projects was printed, along with details of the Highway Department's plans.

The four new locations, in order of priority, are as follows:

--A new road to be constructed from Highway 208 to Highway 163, connecting Lake Cha-

mpion and Lake Colorado City traffic. The location would extend from two miles north of Champion Creek on Hwy. 208, west to connect with Hwy. 163 at the entrance to Texas Electric's Morgan Creek Power Plant.

--Paving a road east from near Silver on Hwy. 208 to the Sun Oil Co. Nena Lucia unit and on east to Maryneal.

--Paving a road to connect the dead-end pavement near Carr Church west to oil fields in east Howard County.

--Paving a connection into the Narrel Road (unpaved) east of Loraine. This last item is last on the priority list as it would be a dead-end pavement into a dirt road, Carter said, and the state is now trying to do away with any dead-end paving in order to find the major collectors and their extensions.

Another road item handled by the court was approval of a motion by Shackelford that the county road now located approxi-

mately two miles south on I-20, leading west off the Dorn Road and extending approximately one mile in an easterly direction, be officially closed.

A petition signed by eight of the property owners in the general area of the road was presented, requesting the closure. Commissioners passed the motion closing the road.

Commissioners set the voting locations and election judges for the April 22 Constitutional Amendment Election as follows:

--Absentee box, county clerk's office, Bob Ratliff, Judge.

--Precinct 1, courthouse, O. B. Trulock, Judge.

--Precinct 2, Westbrook High School, Douglas Barber, Judge.

--Precinct 3, Community Center at 5th and Oak, R. B. Baker, Judge.

--Precinct 4, Lions Club Building in Loraine, Ted Lefevre, Judge.

--Precinct 7, Oak Street Baptist Church Annex, Mrs. M. H. (Naomi) Jordan, Judge.

The court also discussed at length and finally officially went on record as approving two proposed pieces of legislation before the Texas Legislature and opposing one proposal.

Commissioners approved supporting HB 1412-SB 867 which would increase the fees charged for handling of motor vehicle registration. Along with this motion supporting the fee increase, they also passed a resolution officially endorsing passing the increase.

Copies of the resolutions were to be mailed to Rep. Elmer Martin and State Senator Ray Farabee.

The other recommendation was to support HB 1529 relating to payment of court appointed counsel by the State Comptroller.

A bill which deals with county-wide tax appraisal districts, HB 1463, was given opposition by the commissioners as they passed a motion made by Shackelford that the court not support this legislation.

The court adjourned the special called session at 4 p.m.

Amendment Election April 22

Two amendments to the Texas Constitution will be voted on in an election set for April 22. Absentee voting on the proposals is now underway in the County Clerk's office in Mitchell County Courthouse and ends April 18.

The two amendments are: --Revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.

--Proposal setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

County Native Troy Powell Earns Conservation Award

Jimmy Harrison, chairman of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District, has announced that Troy Powell of Abilene has won as the outstanding Absentee Farmer in Region II of the Texas Awards Program.

Region II is made up of the 52 southwest counties of Texas which lie in 39 soil and water conservation districts.

An absentee conservation farmer is one who resides outside the district but carries out conservation within the district.

Harrison said that Powell was recognized for his outstanding conservation work on his farm, three miles south of Westbrook, and in related activities. Powell has carried out a complete conservation program on this farm.

A waterway was shaped and established to grass to carry 300 acres of outside drainage.

McKee Vaults 13 Feet In San Angelo

Colorado City's Wayne McKee set a new school record and placed first in the final round in Pole Vault competition in the San Angelo Relays Friday afternoon with a vault of 13 feet even.

The old record for pole vaulters at Colorado High School was 11'7".

Steve Belvin placed sixth in final competition with a toss in the shot put of 45 feet.

The sprint relay team from CHS also qualified for final competition Saturday with a time of 45.5 in the first go-round.

Colorado City's Wolves placed fourth in team points in the preliminary competition with 11 points, trailing Crane, 26; Coahoma, 14; Reagan County, 12, but leading other teams in Division III of the relays: Floydada, 10; Central JV, 9; Hamlin, 6; Sonora, 2; Luckney, 1 1/2 and McGregor, 1 1/2.

A diversion terrace had to be constructed to handle an additional 125 acres of outside drainage. The old stem of terraces were badly broken and were torn down and replaced by 35,000 feet of new parallel terraces.

A conservation cropping system and crop residue management were also carried out on the 105 acres of cropland.

The 54 acres of rangeland were depleted of the better grasses and had a heavy infestation of mesquite. The pasture was root plowed to control the

mesquite. The pasture was then roller chopped and seeded to desirable grasses.

Pasture was rested during the growing season for two years following seeding to allow the seeded grass to become established.

A farm pond was also constructed on the rangeland to provide water for livestock and wildlife.

Harrison also stated that Powell was recognized for his community service work in Abilene. Powell is now serving his third year as a charter member

of the Abilene Environmental Goals Committee. Powell believes the urban environmental considerations are inseparably related to soil and water conservation on the farms and ranches. He serves on this committee with 10 other professional people to advise the city government of Abilene on environmental matters.

Powell grew up on a farm in the Buford community north of Colorado City and has been self-employed as an independent geologist in Abilene for the past 16 years.

4-Hers & Parents To Play Benefit

A fun basketball contest has been arranged between members of the county's Lone Wolf 4-H Club, playing with their parents against school administrators and school board members from the three school districts in the county.

It's all being set up in order to have fun and raise money for the Lone Wolf 4-H Club at the same time, said county extension agent Isob Benson.

The way it will work is as follows:

--4-H boys in the 7th grade and older will team with their daddies and take on the school administrators and school board members from Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook.

--4-H girls and their mamas will play one full quarter in a contest with members of the Business and Professional Women's Club in Colorado City.

Adding to the merriment will be the costumes that the B&PW have made for their team--old-timey "bloomers" that girl basketball teams used to wear.

The B&PW decided on the old-fashioned uniforms as part of their observance of the nation's Bicentennial.

Also, at half-time, there will be a pie and cake auction, with baked items made by 4-H members and mamas for sale.

The time and place for this fun-time event has been set for 8 p.m. Friday, April 11 in the Colorado High School gym.

Don't turn on more lights than you really need.

Ride the bus whenever you can rather than asking your parents to drive you.

Ride your bike or walk to the store for your parents. If they don't run the car, they will save gasoline.
