THREE DIE IN TEXAS FAMILY DISTURBANCES

FORT WORTH WOMAN IS STABBED; COUPLE DEAD IN ANGELO

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, July 23.—Mrs. Willie Malloy, 21, is dead and her husband, 28, is dying in an infirmary as the result of a stabbing at their residence here today.

Mrs. Malloy, with a gash in the back of her neck, was found dead in the front yard. Her husband was lying nearby with knife wounds in his throat. The woman's spinal cord was severed.

JEALOUSY CAUSES DEATH TO COUPLE

SAN ANGELO, July 23 (AP)—Jealousy over her husband's supposed attentions to other women was blamed by officers here today for the death last night of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Houranhan of Dallas. Police said Mrs. Houranhan shot her husband and turned the gun on herself. The husband apparently died at once, but Mrs. Houranhan lived until she reached the hospital. Very little is known about the Houranhan here as they had been here only ten days. The shooting took place at their hotel room.

Nicaragua To Lose 1200 Marine Guards

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—Twelve hundred marines today were ordered withdrawn from Nicaragua. This announcement was made by President Hoover. A total of approximately 2,300 marines will remain in the Central American republic.

TWO SHIPS COLLIDE IN FOG; RESCUE MADE FOR 40

SHANGHAI, July 23.—Sixty-two Chinese passengers of the China Merchants Steam Navigation company steamer Hsinkong were drowned Sunday when the ship collided with the Japanese steamer Tatsuno Maru of Welkhaiwei during a fog. The Hsinkong sank within 20 minutes.

TWO DIE IN LAKE COLLISION LAST NIGHT

CHICAGO, July 23 (AP)—Two speedboats, carrying passengers, collided head-on in Lake Michigan 200 yards off navy pier last night. One was drowned, another is missing and the other 18 passengers swam ashore or floundered about in the water until rescued by nearby craft.

WICHITA, July 23 (AP)—Sponsored by Frank Phillips, Bartlesville, Okla., oil man, the Woolacoe, monoplane which won the Hawaiian flight, will tour the middlewest for the last time with Col. Art Goebel, its trans-Pacific pilot, at its controls.

New High Price Is Paid On Herefords

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., July 23 (AP)—A new 1929 high price for beef cattle was established on the market here today when fifty head of Hereford steers sold for \$16.25 a hundred. The cattle averaged 1447 pounds and the average price for each steer was \$335.

TWO KILLED, THREE HURT IN TEXAS RUM BATTLE

County Rural School Aid Increased

STATE ALLOWS \$16,762 FOR COMING YEAR

INCREASE SHOWS \$3,000 OVER LAST YEAR; RECORD GOOD

Representing a substantial increase of \$3,000 over last year's allotment, Lubbock county has received \$16,762 as rural aid for 1929-30 school year, Miss Mae Murfee, county superintendent of education, announced this morning, following a communication from the State Department of Education at Austin.

Increase in this year's allotment has been based upon increased scholastics and good condition of school buildings, it was pointed out.

Scholastics Total 10,195
A total of 10,195 scholastics was recorded by the 1929 enumeration in the county. Lubbock alone showed an increase of 1,000 scholastics over last year's record.

"Lubbock county has not a single one-teacher school, and there is not a school building in the county which is not made of concrete, stone or brick," said Miss Murfee.

Outlining plans for the coming school season, Miss Murfee announced today that all transfers of students from one district to another should be made before August 1.

STANDARD OIL TO INCREASE ITS CAPITAL

DIRECTORS TO VOTE ON \$75,000,000 PLAN AUGUST 27

CHICAGO, July 23.—Directors of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana today called a special stockholders' meeting for August 27 to vote on a proposal to increase the company's capital stock from \$375,000,000 to \$450,000,000, and to offer stockholders of the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport company seven shares of Indiana stock in exchange for six shares of Pan-American.

The Standard Oil company proposed to acquire all or part of the Pan-American common stock, classes A and B.

VOTE CALLED ON GENERAL LABOR STRIKE

ALLIED UNIONS BALLOT TONIGHT IN ORLEANS ON WALK-OUT

NEW ORLEANS, July 23.—Members of the Allied Unions in New Orleans will meet tonight to ballot on the calling of a general strike in sympathy with the street car men's strike which today continued in a deadlock.

Efforts of the commission council to end the strike on friendly terms previously having failed, the council continued their conferences and asked both sides to hold their executives in readiness for overtures.

After their meetings of yesterday, the council was informed by the railway company that its board would receive for consideration further proposals that the union, whom they declined to recognize, might offer.

The union men have been out since July 2. Cars are being operated on some lines by non-union men protected by deputy United States marshals.

ONE JUROR IN TRIAL NAMED

LEAHY SANITY HEARING MEETS DIFFICULTY IN CHOOSING JURY

GEORGETOWN, July 23.—The tedious process of selecting a jury for the sanity trial of Harry J. Leahy, under death penalty for the slaying of Dr. J. A. Ramsey of Ma, this continued here today. After a number of talesmen had been excused through disqualification or challenge, only one juror had been added shortly before noon to the four selected yesterday.

With the unexpected trouble in choosing 12 men to hear testimony regarding the defendant's sanity continuing, it was expected that all of today's session would be consumed in getting a jury.

Leahy sat carelessly as the case dragged along, apparently uninterested in developments and unmoved as prospective jurors were questioned concerning their attitude toward the death penalty.

CUSTOMS MEN STAGE FIGHT AT EL PASO

PITCHED BATTLE HELD LAST NIGHT; CLASH FOLLOWS DEATH

EL PASO, July 23.—Two Mexican rum runners are believed to have been killed, and three are known to have been wounded in a pitched battle here last night between four immigration border patrol officers and a band of more than 20 smugglers.

The clash was a sequel to an engagement last Saturday when six border patrolmen were ambushed by rum runners and Patrolman Ivan E. Scotten was killed.

No Americans Wounded
None of the Americans was wounded in last night's battle in which several hundred shots were fired. The banks of the Rio Grande were searched today for the bodies of the two rum runners believed to have been killed. The wounded smugglers were carried across the river into Mexico by their comrades.

H. C. Horsley, chief of the border patrol, said prominent citizens of El Paso were expected to be implicated in a gigantic border rum ring following disclosures made by a negro truck driver, one of five men captured by the patrolmen. For months authorities have been

DANGER OF SLUMPING EXPLAINED

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the thirteenth of the series of "Close-ups" given by famous stars to the public through the NEA. Today a warning of slumping positions is given by Miss Olive Borden, graceful movie star.)

The principles that apply to correct and beautiful walking also apply to graceful sitting. Many of us sink into comfortable chairs, sitting on our backbones with our toes pointed inward.

"Don't slump! That is the greatest warning to give concerning a graceful sitting position," declared Olive Borden. "Keep the backbone straight and the shoulders back. That doesn't mean to sit on the edge of the chair in a stiff, ungraceful attitude. Stiffness is never beautiful. But neither is slumping.

"The hands are attractive if they rest in the lap palms up, instead of flitting about nervously. As for the legs, crossing them is no longer considered bad taste."

Perhaps the most beautiful position to have the legs on a diagonal line with the chair one toe on the floor and the other at ankle of the forward foot, as Miss Borden is sitting in the accompanying illustration. In this manner, the forward foot and leg form a straight line from the knee to the toe, accenting the arched instep.

"This same idea of a straight line from knee to toe should be followed, whatever the position of the legs," Miss Borden said. "If they are crossed, the foot resting on the floor should form the straight line with the right resting on the other half of the foot. If one sits with both feet on the floor, one in front of the other and the ankles slightly crossed, with the line unbroken at the ankle."

"Sitting beside another person to whom one is talking a graceful position is to have the ankles crossed, as described in the preceding paragraph. The front foot should be the one furthest from your companion. This gives a graceful turn of the body toward the one with whom you are speaking."

SEMINOLE HIGH SCHOOL IS RECOGNIZED AS FOUR-YEAR SCHOOL; CREDITS ALLOWED

(Special To The Journal)
SEMINOLE, July 23.—The state department of education has notified the school authorities at Seminole that their high school has been granted five additional units of affiliation and has raised the classification of the school from a three year to a four year high school. Affiliation was secured recently in third year English, one unit each in Ancient History, American History, General Science, and Bookkeeping. Last year the school secured credit in five and one-half units, thus the total now stands at 19 1/2 units secured in two years time. Prior to that time the school had no affiliation or classification.

Schools Consolidated
In addition to securing four year classification and affiliation in two years time the school has this year been expanded by direct consolidation of seven surrounding districts until the district now has a total area of 425 square miles, one of the largest in area on the South Plains. Seven transportation lines will be operated by the school. Four new trucks with modern bus bodies were ordered last week by the school board for immediate delivery to supplement the present equipment. There will be ten teachers for the next school year. Vocational agriculture and home economics are both taught and a commercial department has been installed. Additional building space is to be provided to care for the increased enrollment due to consolidation and the anticipated further increase due to the development of the Hobbs oil field, 25 miles to the west, as well as to increased settlement of this immediate section.

TEXAS FLIERS OVER HALF WAY TO GOAL

HOUSTON, July 23 (AP)—More than half way to their goal, G. L. Loomis and Joe Glasco were still aloft today in their plane, the "Billion Dollar City," in spite of a situation which almost forced them to abandon the attempt to establish a world refueling record. They had 143 hours to their credit at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

With gasoline running low yesterday the fliers called for an emergency supply before the regular time for refueling, but the gasoline could not be transferred because of a kink in the hose. The refueling plane returned to the ground, straightened the hose and made another ascent getting the gasoline to the fliers just in time.

The fuel ran low shortly after the pilots had succeeded in changing spark plugs while in the air. The plane was taken to a high altitude and the motor stopped while one of the fliers crawled out, removed the old plugs and inserted fresh ones.

Rises 17,467 Feet

WASHINGTON, July 30 (AP)—Phoenix Omile was accredited today by the National Aeronautical Association with having attained an altitude of 17,467 feet in a recent flight at Moline, Ill., but the association said it had not been advised as what type of ship was flown and therefore did not know whether any record had been established.

Other prominent speakers include Dr. E. M. Davis, of Howard Payne college, Brownwood; Dr. T. L. Holcomb, state Baptist convention secretary, Dallas, and Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist church, Lubbock. He is also president of the encampment this year. Rev. M. C. Bishop of Post is secretary.

"Not quite as bad as last year," Chief Twitty reminded. "An employee of the city, operating a street sweeper on Nineteenth street, was unkind of the impending nuisance. Thousands of the ants, after swarming into the street, were picked up by the sweeper machine. Immediately the driver was covered by ants, and he abandoned the sweeper until he could remove the pests from his clothing."

BREMEN SETS NEW VOYAGE RECORD

HUGE GERMAN LINER MAKES RECORD MARK

CROWDS CHEER GIANT SHIP UPON ARRIVAL IN NEW YORK

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 23.—The giant liner Bremen, symbol of Germany's bid to regain maritime supremacy, came into port on its maiden voyage today, noting in its log new speed records for commercial ocean travel and a successful ship to shore mail transfer.

The Cunard liner Mauretania's record of five days, two hours and 34 minutes for the voyage from Cherbourg to Ambrose light in lower New York bay, was beaten by this new liner, the average daily speed record of 26.06 knots, held by the Mauretania, also fell to the Bremen, and the record speed for an hour, held by the United States liner Leviathan, also was surpassed.

Vessel is Heralded
No vessel that has crossed the Atlantic since the ill fated Lusitania, more than 20 years ago, has been heralded as this new North German Lloyd liner of almost 50,000 tons, and but few vessels have attracted such attention by spectacular performance on the waves.

Preceded by five hours by a mail plane catapulted from its deck off Fire Island, about 80 miles out from the North German Lloyd line pier in Brooklyn, the Bremen steamed into port to a deafening welcome from land, sea and sky. The municipal tug Macin and a fleet of pleasure and commercial craft met the liner at quarantine and while airplanes roared overhead the vessel under its own power eased into its pier to the cheers of thousands of greetings.

The new ocean greyhound passed Ambrose light, the official timing point for westward crossing, at 3:02 p. m., eastern daylight time, four days, 18 hours and 17 minutes after leaving Cherbourg on its voyage of approximately 3,100 miles to New York. Rapidly the big ship covered 13 miles on its last day.

SHIPPERS TO TAKE UP SPEED CHALLENGE
LONDON, July 23 (AP).—The challenge of the North German Lloyd liner Bremen yesterday in its Atlantic crossing of 4 days, 17 hours and 32 minutes probably will be answered.

It is expected here that an international assembly for speed honors will follow almost immediately with Great Britain, America, France and Italy participating, and Germany adding the Europa shortly which should do as well or better than the Bremen.

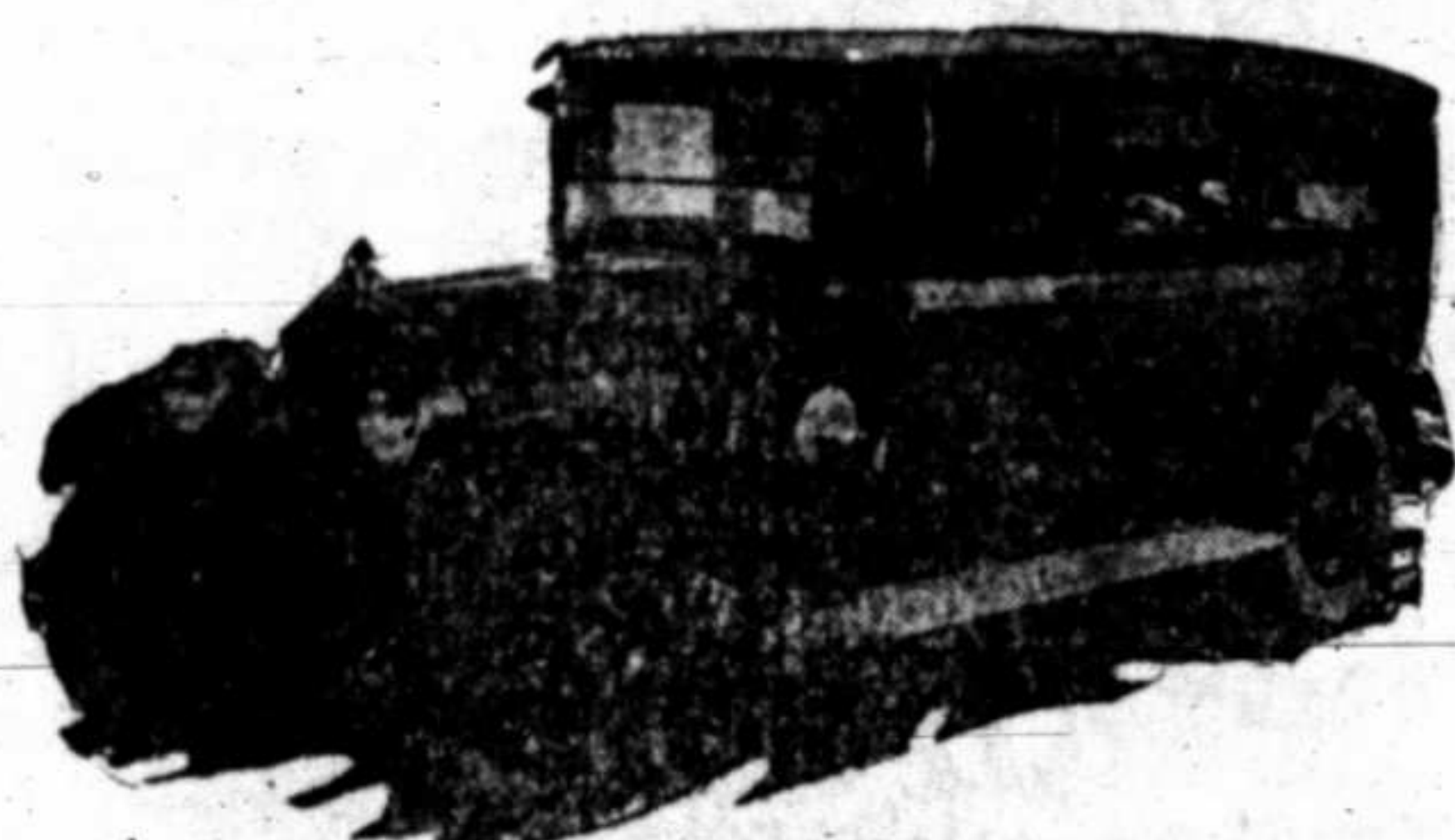
The Cunard line, owner of the Mauretania, whose former record was beaten yesterday, made no statement of attack on the German record, but it is understood the line has a new race under contemplation, and it is expected the Mauretania will attempt to show she is capable of better than she has yet produced.

The two new ships of the United States lines to be begun soon probably should show as much speed or more than the Bremen, Italy and France, to meet the competition, will almost have to enter the lists.

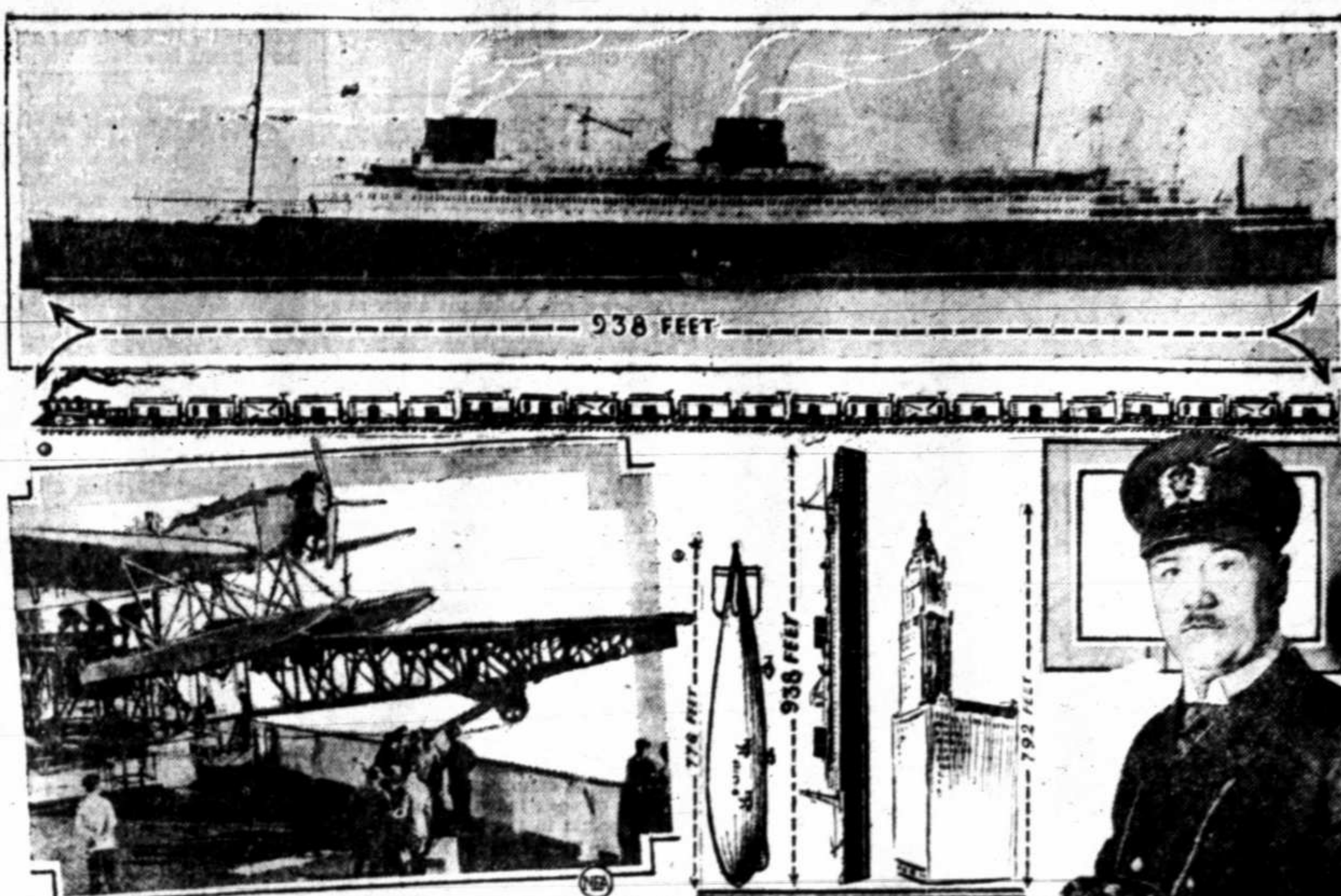

NEW GERMAN PASSENGER LINER IS MAMMOTH OF ATLANTIC



THE MAIL PLANE TAKES FOR SHORE

A FEW COMPARISONS

This art shows the mammoth size of the new German liner Bremen, the largest ship in the world except the Leviathan, which broke all Atlantic speed records on her maiden voyage from Bremen, Germany, to New York. The great vessel is slightly longer than a train of 23 box cars with locomotive, much longer than the dirigible Graf Zeppelin and, if stood on end, would tower many stories above the Woolworth building. It is 938 feet in length, 88 feet wide, of 46,000 tons, carries 2,200 passengers and a crew of 960. Several hundred miles out, a mail plane takes off for shore to expedite delivery. Captain Leopold Ziegenbein is skipper of this new ocean greyhound of the North German Lloyd line.

RAILROADS SEEK TO HALT CHANGE

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, July 23.—Railroads of the southwestern division today filed an injunction in the federal court here to prevent an order readjusting the division of joint freight rates with railroads of the western trunk line division from being effective August 1.

The Interstate Commerce commission on its own motion, in 1923 began an investigation of the equitableness of the apportionment of freight rates agreed upon by the railroads in the two divisions on business originating in one division and handled by railroads in the other division.

Entitled to More
The commission, it was contended, found that although rates on the southwestern division were approximately 25 per cent higher on most commodities than on western division roads, the southwestern

ern division roads were entitled to about 20 per cent more as their share of revenue on the joint hauls. The commission's readjustment order was issued June 19. The southwestern roads allege that the commission's order gives them only about 5 per cent instead of the 20 per cent increase they claim they are entitled to as their share of joint haul revenues.

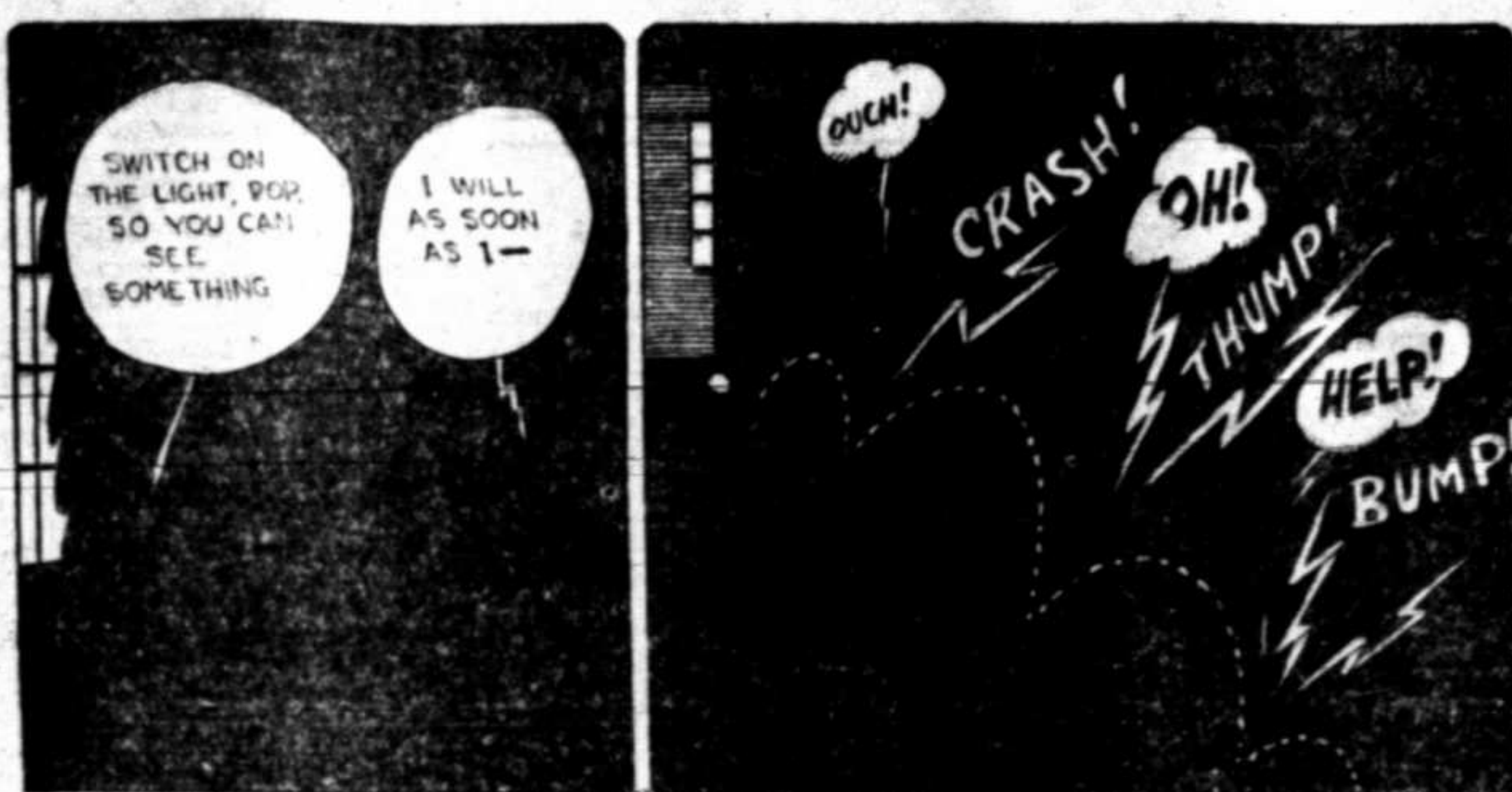

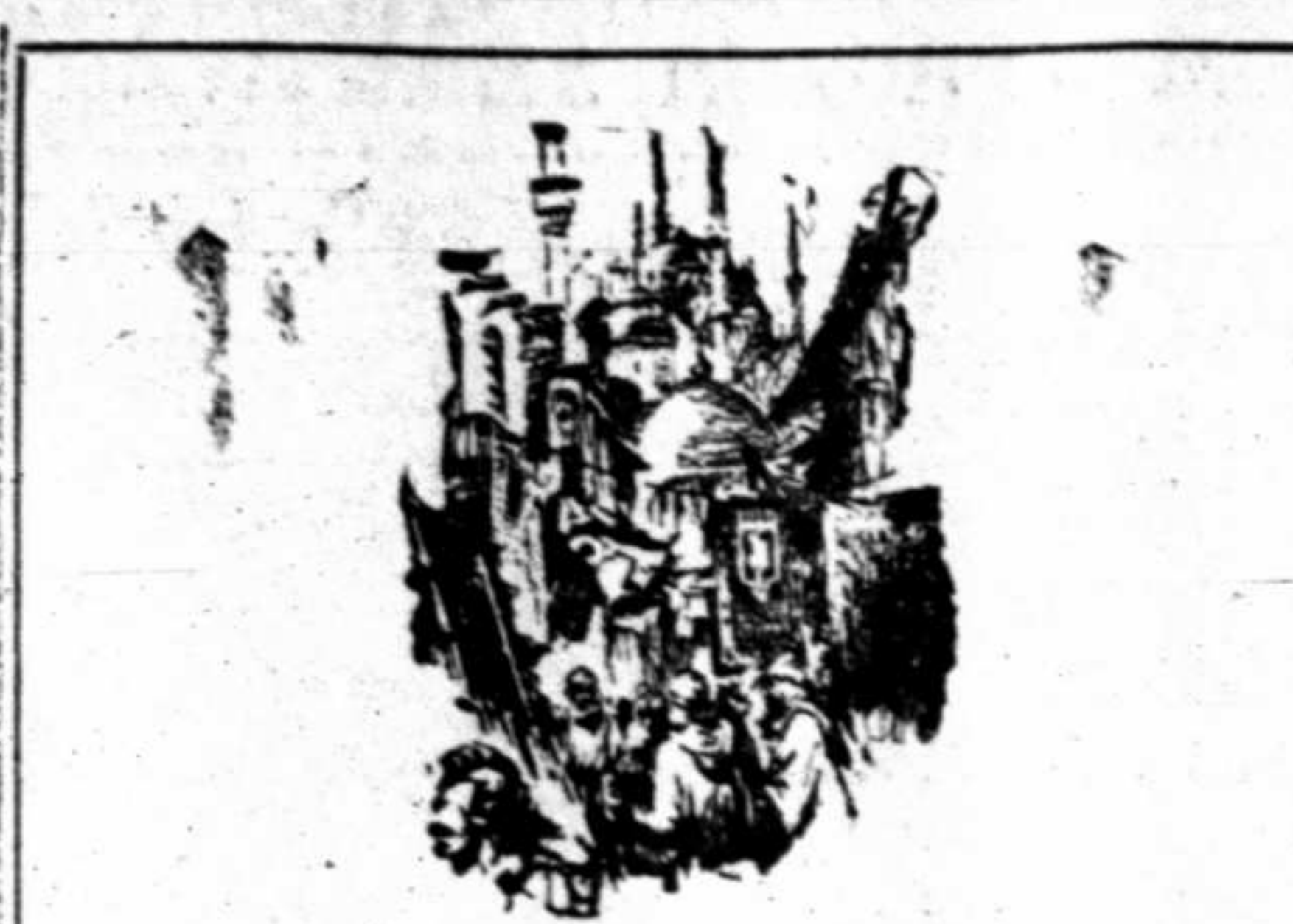

STOCK PRICES
UNEVEN TODAYDEMAND FOR RAILROAD
SHARES RENEWED ON
WALL STREET

NEW YORK July 23 (AP)—Uneven price movements characterized the opening of today's stock market, featured by the renewed demand for railroad shares. Initial gains of a point or so were recorded by Erie common, New York Central, International Harvester, Columbia Gas and Western Union. General Electric, which reached new high ground yesterday, and American Telephone each yielded more than a point in opening transactions.

With many of the large brokerage houses urging a lightening of long commitments on the theory that a corrective reaction was overdue, the market was called upon to absorb a fairly heavy volume of selling in early trading.

Chrysler Advances
Publication of a record breaking semi-annual earnings by the Chrysler Corp. brought fresh buying into that stock, which advanced 11-2 points, but renewed weakness cropped out in General Motors which touched another new low at 63-3-4. Allied Chemical and American Bank note recorded early gains of 1 and 3-7-8 points, respectively, and U. S. Kansas production was 124,375 as compared to 121,215 for the week ending July 13.

GAINESVILLE, Tex., July 23 (AP)—Much excitement prevailed here today with the drilling in of what was believed to be Cooke county's first "legitimate gusher"—the Kewanee Oil and Gas company's No. 6 R. J. Timmis.

The well, in the E. T. Railroad company survey, abstract 363, which topped and 1,466 feet in the contract depth of 3,500 feet, however, drilling is being continued, the bit now being at 4,000 feet. The Ash Syndicate is owned, principally, by Geo. McCamey of Fort Worth, discoverer of several West Texas oil fields.

Showings of both oil and gas have been found in the well but were said not to be in paying quantities. This is the fourth oil test that has been drilled west of Tahoka, and the second to be drilled on the T-Bar ranch. The depth to which the well will be drilled has not been announced.

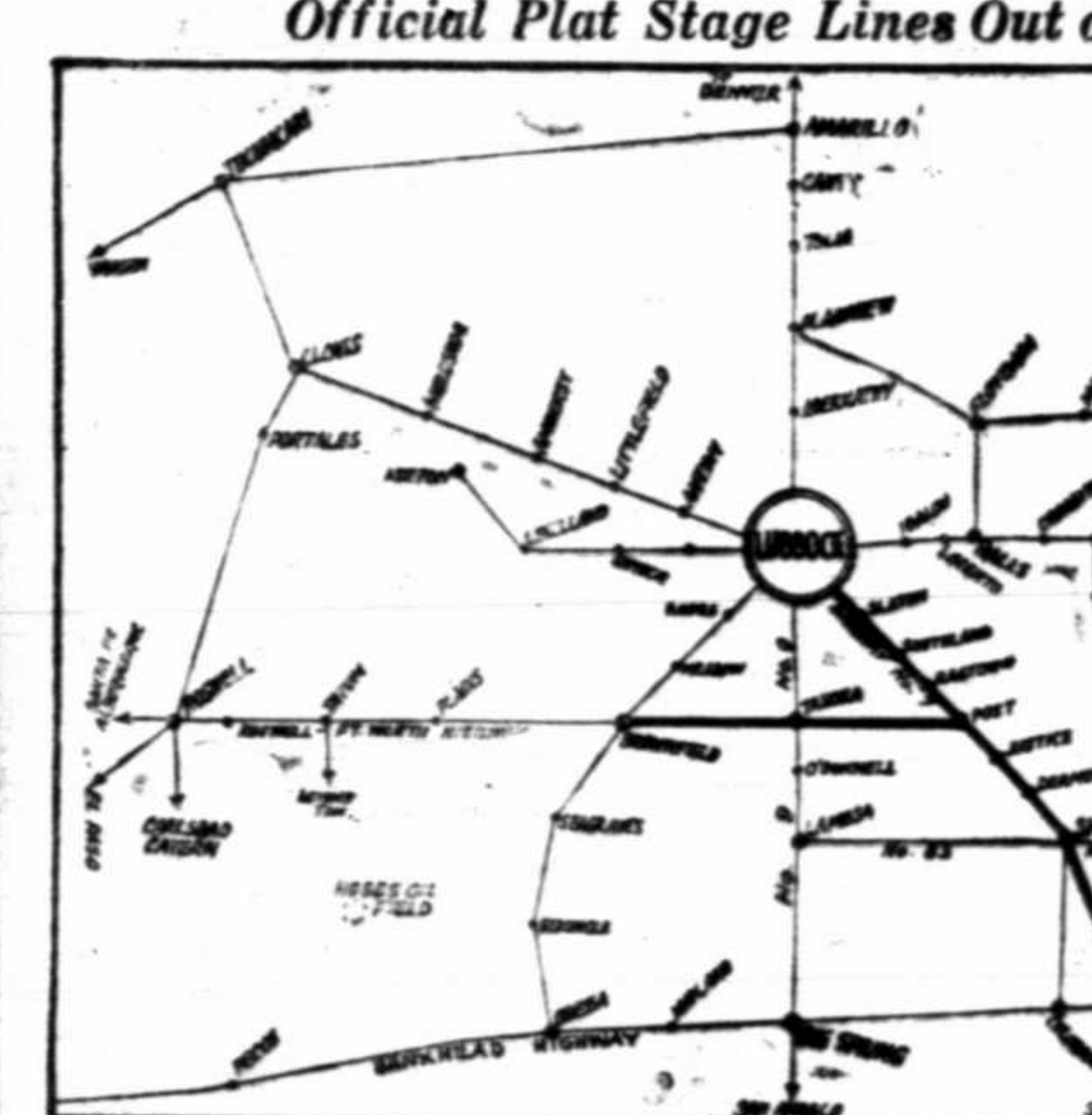

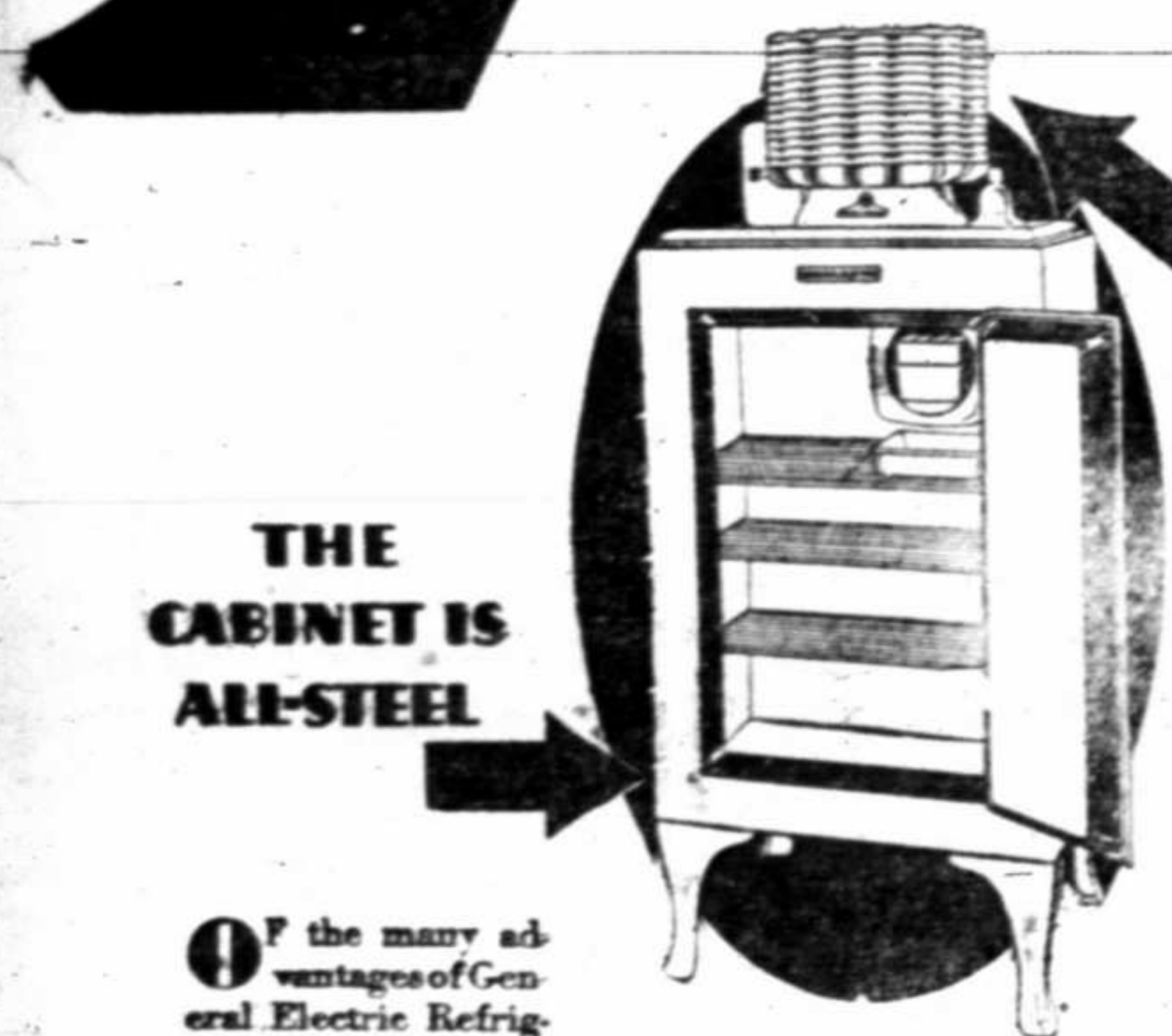

WASHINGTON, July 23.—President Hoover was called upon to give his views on the house tariff bill last night by Senator LaFollette, republican, Wisconsin, as the republicans started revision of that measure in executive session.

"After dictating the terms of the farm bill and condemning the debtors plan in unmeasured terms,"

the Wisconsin senator said in a statement, "The president cannot with very good grace remain neutral and silent on the tariff."

Opposing Measure

Senator LaFollette is a member of the republican independent group which is opposing the house measure and he promised a "determined and uncompromising fight on the floor of the senate."

From the finance committee work room came a statement by Senator Shortridge of California, declaring "the republican party proposes to enact a tariff law which shall have due and first regard for American men, women and children—on the farm, in the mines, in mill or factory—for the producer and consumer alike—who, without adequate tariff protection, will be forced into competition with poorly paid, cheap labor, of other and less prosperous countries."

The California's statement was regarded by some as forecasting about as general a tariff revision by the senate committee as was before the house, although other members of the republican group on the committee continued to predict a downward scaling of some of the tariff increases voted by the house.

Dies Last Night

LINCOLN, Neb., July 23 (AP).—Ralph Emory Johnson, 56, supreme organizer of the Modern Woodmen of America, died last night at his home here after an illness of several weeks.
