First Western Savings building considered ...

Hospital may purchase building

The board of directors of the Mitchell County Hospital District met on Tuesday in the conference room of the hospital for the regular monthly business session.

The board of directors discussed the possibility concerning the purchase of the First Western Savings and Loan building, but tabled action.

"It would make a great Medical Center," said Hospital Administrator Wendell Alford, "the Rural Health Clinic, the Home Health Care Unit and either or both doctors could be located in the building."

The building was described as being in 'good shape with the exception of a few leaks.'

"With very little rearranging, the building could be used effectively as a medical complex," said Alford.

It was discussed that the Home Health Agency had outgrown their existing quarters, that space for the Rural Health Clinic could be available at such a site and that there would be room at such a center to institute a wellness type program.

The location was also cited as being advantageous for the hospital to offer community outreach programs.

It was noted that with the cost reimbursement programs that are available, the hospital could make the cash flow of such a purchase possible.

The board instructed Alford to get more information to bring before the board for a final decision.

Board members discussed a request made to Methodist Hospital, to extend the contract of

Administrator Wendell Alford for three-years.

"We're here to help you guys," said Jim Bullard of Methodist Hospital's Regional Services. "We want to do what you want to do in order to keep our relationship running smoothly."

"The Methodist Hospital organization is proud of the Mitchell County Hospital," he said. "We are willing to discuss and are flexible enough to meet your needs in this matter."

Bullard commended Alford for the work he had accomplished with the hospital, citing the progress in the patient indicators and the service rendered by the facility.

It was noted that Methodist Hospital would be willing to work with the Mitchell County Hospital in structuring an agreement.

The Hospital Administrator's Report was presented to the board by Administrator Wendell Alford.

The hospital reported 67 admissions and 71 dismissals for

the month of January and accumulated a total of 375 patient days.

Total inpatient revenue for the month was listed as \$220,950, outpatient revenue was \$71,414, Home Health revenue of \$71,216 was reported to make a total gross operating revenue for the month of \$363,581.

Total expenses for the same period totaled \$292,573.

"We had a good month," said

Two arrested after truck runs off Interstate 20

Two separate incidents reported to the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office at approximately 8 a.m. on Monday were determined to be related and resulted in the driver and a former passenger of a truck being arrested, said Chief Deputy Patrick Toombs.

Chester Elroy Baugh, 51, of Everman, Texas, is being held in the Mitchell County Jail having been charged with possession of a controlled substance after officers of the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office responded to the location of the 1229 bridge where an eighteen wheel truck had gone off the road.

Before the officers had left that scene, another call was responded to at a convenience store located on

the interstate where a woman told officers about having been a passenger on a truck that got stuck on the interstate and of snorting cocaine while a passenger.

The woman, Tina Marie Christian, 30, who has no permanent address, was taken to the Mitchell County Jail where she was charged with public intoxication. She was then taken to the Mitchell County Hospital because she was experiencing what seemed to be an irregular heartbeat.

Officers investigating the truck found approximately 7 to 9 grams of a substance believed to be cocaine or a derivative on heroin in the cab of the truck and arrested the driver of the truck.

King found not guilty by local jury

Ronnie Lewis King, 39, of Colorado City, was found 'not guilty' by the jury on the charges of delivery of a controlled substance, as had been charged in a Mitchell County indictment.

The case which was heard by a six man, six woman jury in the 32nd Judicial District Courtroom, deliberated for more than 6 hours on testimony of the case, before returning the verdict to presiding Judge Weldon Kirk at 9:25 p.m. on Tuesday evening.

Pat Barber, who represented

King, told the jurors in his closing arguments that there was no evidence to support the concept of constructive transfer that King had been charged with in the indictment.

A total of only four witnesses were called to the stand, two for the state and two for the defense in a trial where the defendant did not testify.

District Attorney Frank Conard told the jury at the beginning of the case that the evidence would prove that King had indirect control under

the definition of the law.

The first witness for the state was an undercover narcotics officer who noted that he worked with the Drug Task Force of Abilene.

The officer told the jury that he had worked in Mitchell County between Nov., 1990 and Sept., 1991.

On May 8, 1991, he reportedly went to the house where Ronnie King was staying and told him that he wanted to buy a half gram of cocaine.

King then took him to a

location where he would be able to buy the cocaine.

The purchase was made and for assisting with the buy, King was given some of the drug which had been purchased.

Barber told the jury that the officer delivered drugs, which is a first degree felony and that the action constituted outrageous governmental conduct.

No control over the contraband can be linked to King before the delivery, said Barber.

He told the jurors that the government agency was committing first degree felonies in order to catch others committing first degree felonies, and argued that two wrongs don't make a right.

"It's outrageous to give

someone drugs and watch them," said Barber, "when your job is to stop them."

He argued throughout the case that, "You can't be a party to constructive transfer unless the state can show that the defendant directly or indirectly controlled those drugs before they were delivered."

Don Taylor, the laboratory supervisor with the Texas Department of Public Safety of Abilene, testified to the evidence that an analysis had been made of the controlled substance and that the results proved the chemical to be .09 grams of cocaine.

The defense presented two witnesses, King's sister and mother who testified about the period and

Hospital medical waste shipped to Oklahoma

The Mitchell County Hospital has begun having its biological medical waste transferred from the county, a system which will eliminate the process of the incinerating which had been done.

Collective Resources, Inc. of San Angelo, has been selected by the hospital and will handle the biological medical waste which is expected to amount to approximately 150 of the 35 pound boxes per month.

"The purpose of this corporation is to provide quality and economical medical waste disposal to small to medium size waste generators," said John Iman.

"Based upon Texas Department of Health statistics," he said, "each of the regions - Central, North and West Texas - will generate 80-100 tons of medical waste per day."

"Within 12 months, our goal is to be effectively handling at least 60,000 pounds of waste daily," said Iman.

He noted that the environmental concern will be the overall objective of the company and that it is the intention of the company to keep continually abreast of all regulations, standards and procedures as part of an on-going operation.

The waste which is taken by Collective Resources will be transported to the Stroud facility which is located in central Oklahoma.

The facility is operated by Midway Environmental Management Company, Inc., who use a method to entirely eliminate the waste.

Alford in reporting the financial condition to the board.

It was also noted that the hospital dietary staff was working to provide the option of varied menus to the hospital's patients.

Under a plan that is now being formulated, it is hoped that within 6 to 8 weeks that the hospital can begin to offer an option of meals.

The Valley Fair Lodge Report was presented to the board of directors by Lodge Administrator Marsha Rickard.

She noted that the census for the month was 49.1 patients per day, nearly identical to the 49.16 which was reported the previous month.

Also presented to the board was information about an organization by the name of National Association for the Exchange of Industrial Resources.

The company provides services to nonprofit organizations in the form of donated merchandise which it redistributes to its members.

The preliminary information which she had received on the program was given to the board members for their information, to see if there would be interest or if the program might be worth checking into for the Hospital, the Lodge and the Home Health Agency combined.

The Lodge reported total income for the month of \$82,708 with total expenses of \$64,504.

The Medical Staff Report was presented to the board of directors by Wendell Alford who noted that the staff had reviewed the hospital's utilization rates and gone over the figures relating to the hospital's patient load for the past month.

A policy concerning organ/tissue replacement was

reviewed by the staff and the policy was approved.

Also approved in the Medical Staff meeting were the protocols for the Mitchell County Ambulance Staff, with the staff reserving the right to make changes at a later date.

The board of directors of the Hospital District called for a May 2 election for three directors places which are expiring.

The positions currently held by board of directors Kay McCarley, Jr., Gene Parker and Virgil Stone will come up for election in May.

The board also approved the accounting firm of Durbin & Company, to help establish and implement a Rural Health Clinic billings system.

Linda Mayes, Regional Services Representative for the Lubbock Methodist Hospital System, met with the board to discuss the possibility of a telemarketing survey for the hospital.

She presented the board with preliminary information on providing for a survey which could provide the hospital administrators with public opinion type material about the facility.

"We are interested in turning around the out-migration of patients," said Alford. "The results of such a public opinion based survey could help us identify the reasons that patients are going elsewhere."

Mayes told the board members that she would bring further information on such a program to the board at a later date.

The hospital board also approved the credentials of two Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists, William M. Harris, Jr. and Arlene

R. Verdier, as recommended by the Medical Staff.

The Quality Assurance report was approved as presented by Linda Mize in the closed door session of the meeting.

Minutes of the prior meeting were also approved by the board as presented.

Board chairman Marion Bassham and directors Kay McCarley, Jr., Virgil Stone and Junior Smith were in attendance at the meeting. Sybil Stevens, Jay Craddock and Gene Parker were absent.

to the events which they knew. In closing arguments, Conard noted the evidence which supported the charge of constructive delivery of cocaine, but noted the problem that the jury would have dealing with the issue of control - either directly or indirectly - which is part of the definition of the offense.

Barber argued that the defendant did not show control over the cocaine and that no evidence had been shown that he directed any influence on the sale.

There is evidence that the defendant is a drug user, said Barber, but none that he had control of the drug.

**Stock index holding steady**

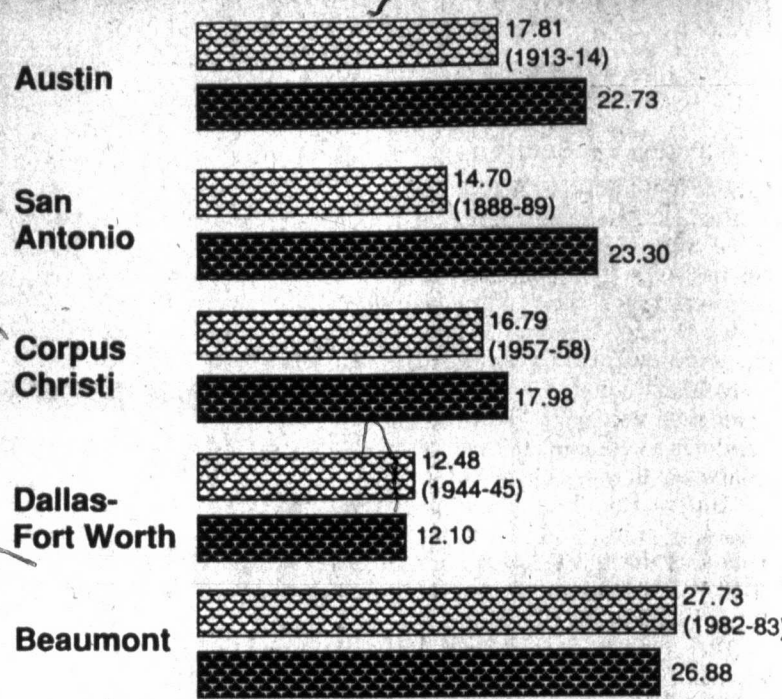
Austin -- "The Texas Stock Index is holding steady, despite tough economic times," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

According to Sharp, all sectors of the Texas Stock Index remain within 2 percent of where they stood in December. The Texas Stock Index dipped only .2 points, or less than 1 percent, to stand at 156.14 in January. The index is 15 percent, or 20,37 points, ahead of its level of 135.77 in January, 1991.

The State Comptroller's Office complies the Texas Stock Index to measure the monthly stock prices of 76 Texas-based companies representing all sectors of the Texas economy. The Texas Stock Index sectors are compiled from energy, technology, finance and general sector stocks.

"By maintaining their current levels across the board, Texas companies indicate they are determined to ride out the recession," Sharp said. "Particularly encouraging was the

**Design Texas Lottery contest set**

Austin -- "The Texas Lottery needs a uniquely Texas logo, and we're asking Texans to give us their ideas--with the chance of winning \$1,000," State Comptroller John Sharp says, announcing a contest to

design a lottery logo. "Every advertising company that wants our business must submit three logo designs, but we think every-day Texans have some great ideas as well," Sharp said in laying out the rules for the contest. "The first place finisher wins a \$1,000 cash prize and a chance to compete against the professionals."

"You can use longhorns or lone stars, blue skies or bluebonnets, or any other uniquely Texas symbols that capture this state's mystique," Sharp said. "The only other rule is that the logo must communicate the fun of playing--and winning--the Texas Lottery."

All entries must be submitted on a standard, letter-sized piece of paper, postmarked no later than March 16. The winners will be announced in late March.

The contest is open to all Texans other than employees of the Comptroller's Office and their immediate families and anyone doing business with the Texas

Lottery or proposing to do business with the Lottery.

Along with the \$1,000 grand prize, the Lottery will pay \$600, \$400, \$250 and \$100 to the second, third, fourth and fifth-place winners as well.

"Remember, you don't have to be Leonardo da Vinci painting the Mona Lisa to win," Sharp said. "Entries will be judged on originality, simplicity of design and appropriateness of their concept rather than their artistic execution."

Each entry becomes the property of the Texas Lottery, and the Lottery reserves the right to use all or part of any entry as it sees fit. The grand prize entry will compete directly against the advertising companies' proposed designs for the chance to become the Lottery's official logo.

Under terms of the contest, there can be only one entry per Texan. Accompanying each entry should be the contestant's name, address and day-time telephone number.

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# CHIEF LONE WOLF

Yes, there was a Winston, Texas. Sort of. We mentioned last week that a reader had sought information on the community and several responses were received. A.K. McCarley, Jr., knew Winston was out around the Valley View area and another reader said it was northeast of Loraine, not too far from China Grove.

But, Joe Allen could really pinpoint the former townsite. He bought it in the early 1970's. Joe says there were only four or five acres involved, but he says the community was disbanded in 1914. About all that remained of Winston was a church, and it was moved to Champion.

We appreciate Joe's help and this information will be passed along to the woman who was asking about it.

Now, on with the show. The year was 1976 and a speech for the Bi-Centennial was given by former Colorado City resident, William Robert Smith, Jr., who grew up here. (The following material comes from the archives at the Institute of Texas Cultures, in San Antonio).

"Buford, (in Mitchell County), was originally called Armenderez for an old adobe mill by that name located there," Smith recalled. "Later the name was changed to Belen and then to Buford, honoring Buford Omdorff of El Paso." Smith indicated he found that tidbit of local history in the Texas Handbook, of 1952.

That same source also stated that the Mitchell County town of Loraine was named for "Mrs. Loraine Crandall, wife of a local landowner."

As for Westbrook, the Texas Handbook noted it was named "for John W. Westbrook, an early settler."

And, Cuthbert was named for Thames Cuthbertson, who was a friend of Mr. Bozeman, the postmaster.

One other note about a former Mitchell County community; Iatan, which was placed on skids and pulled to higher ground, was once called "Vista."

Of course all that remains now of Iatan are some ruts on the southside of Interstate 20, where a sidetrack used to be utilized to load cattle.

Getting back to Smith's speech of 1976, he recalled some of the horse and buggy doctors of early day Colorado City. The list included A. R. Smith and L. T. Terrell, (1884-1886), Dr. Compton, (1886-1889), P. C. Coleman, (1889-91), Dr. N. J. Phenix, (1891-93 and 1899-1901), Robert Cooks, (1883), R. G. Davenport, (1895-98), J.B. Gray, (1898-99), Willis Smith, (1913-1914), and T.J. Ratliff, (1914-1927).

And there were others; J. W. Pearson, B. M. Hughes, W. D. Gooch, G. A. Martin and Robert B. Homan. (Gooch was also a town marshal and was slain in an old fashioned shootout).

Smith specifically made mention of two doctors, which he had remembrances. First, there was Dr. Phenix.

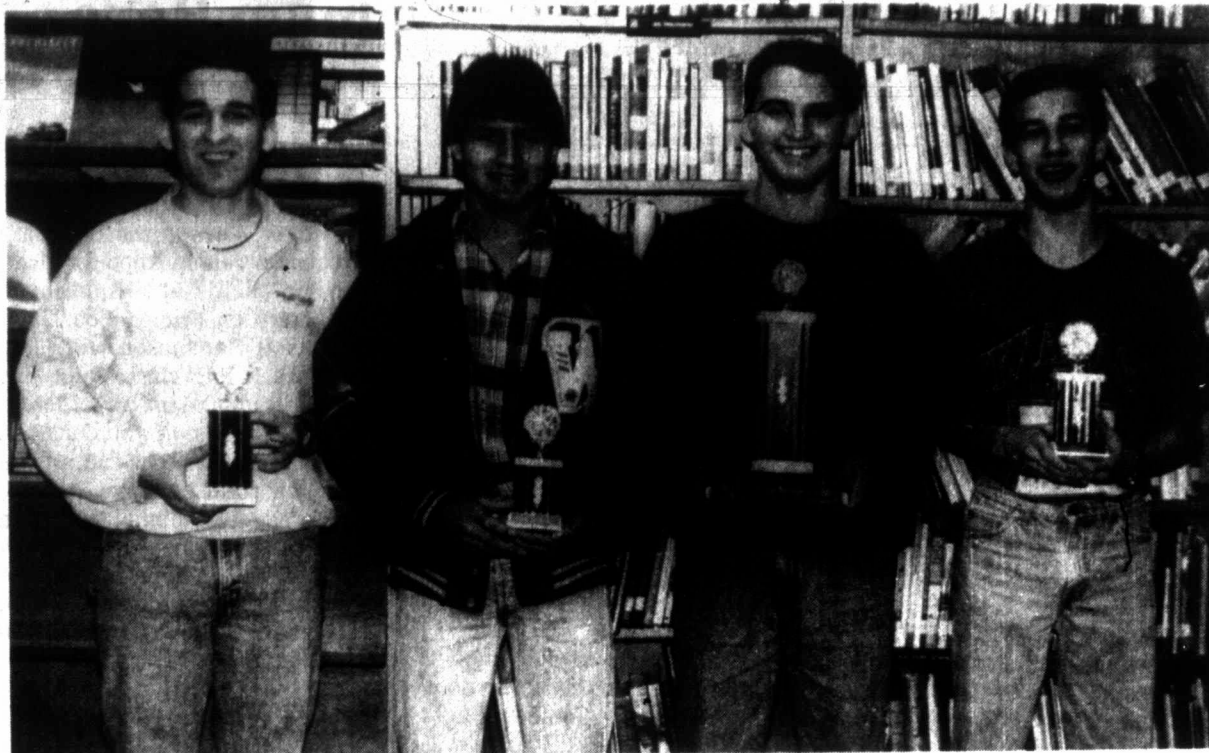
"Dr. Phenix was also a find doctor. He installed the first x-ray machine between Ft. Worth and El Paso," Smith recalled.

And, yet another physician, Smith said, "A Colorado boy, E. W. Berner, studied medicine and afterward practiced at Houston where he became the first director of the world famous Texas Medical Center."

We haven't been able to learn much about Dr. Berner. There's a street in Westbrook which is named "Berner," but Mayor Rees says he doesn't know anything about the namesake.

Also, it's worthy to note that Dr. Berner, was the first director of the Texas Medical Center. Today it is known as the M.D. Anderson Cancer Institute. The first x-ray machine between Ft. Worth and El Paso was in Colorado City. And, the first director of M.D. Anderson was a Colorado City boy.

Pretty heady stuff, huh?

1984, following their retirement from businesses involved with insurance and real estate interests.

Ruth was elected to a three-year term on the Scurry County Senior Center's Advisory Committee in 1987 and is now serving a second term on the Council.

She is serving her second term as president of the local chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons.

Voting for the office will be held in May, for the District 3 area which includes Mitchell, Fisher, Haskell, Kent, Knox, Nolan, Scurry and Stonewall Counties.

citizen issues. The SHL establishes legislative priorities for the Texas legislature to consider.

Members of the SHL serve without pay and candidate qualifications include being at least 60 years of age, a resident of the area which they wish to represent, a registered voter and willing to participate in SHL activities.

Persons elected to the SHL for the 1992-1993 term will go to Austin from August 4-8 for an orientation session.

The first legislative session will be held in Austin from Sept. 15-17.



## Texas awarded 25M to fight drugs, crime

Washington -- The state of Texas has been awarded \$25.5 million to fight drugs and crime by the U.S. Department of Justice, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced.

A majority of the funds, \$15,781,505 will go to the 49 Texas task forces, which serve 215 counties.

"This allocation will continue to support the critical work done by the Texas law enforcement officers on the front lines of the drug war," Gramm said.

The grant represents a 379 percent increase over the amount the state received in 1989, the first year funds were available under the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Program. State and local law enforcement entities apply for funds for task forces, personnel, equipment, information system improvement and financial investigation programs.

To date, Texas has received a total of \$82 million in federal assistance under the Byrne Program.

The meeting adjourned. Those present for the meeting were Doris Henderson, Nina

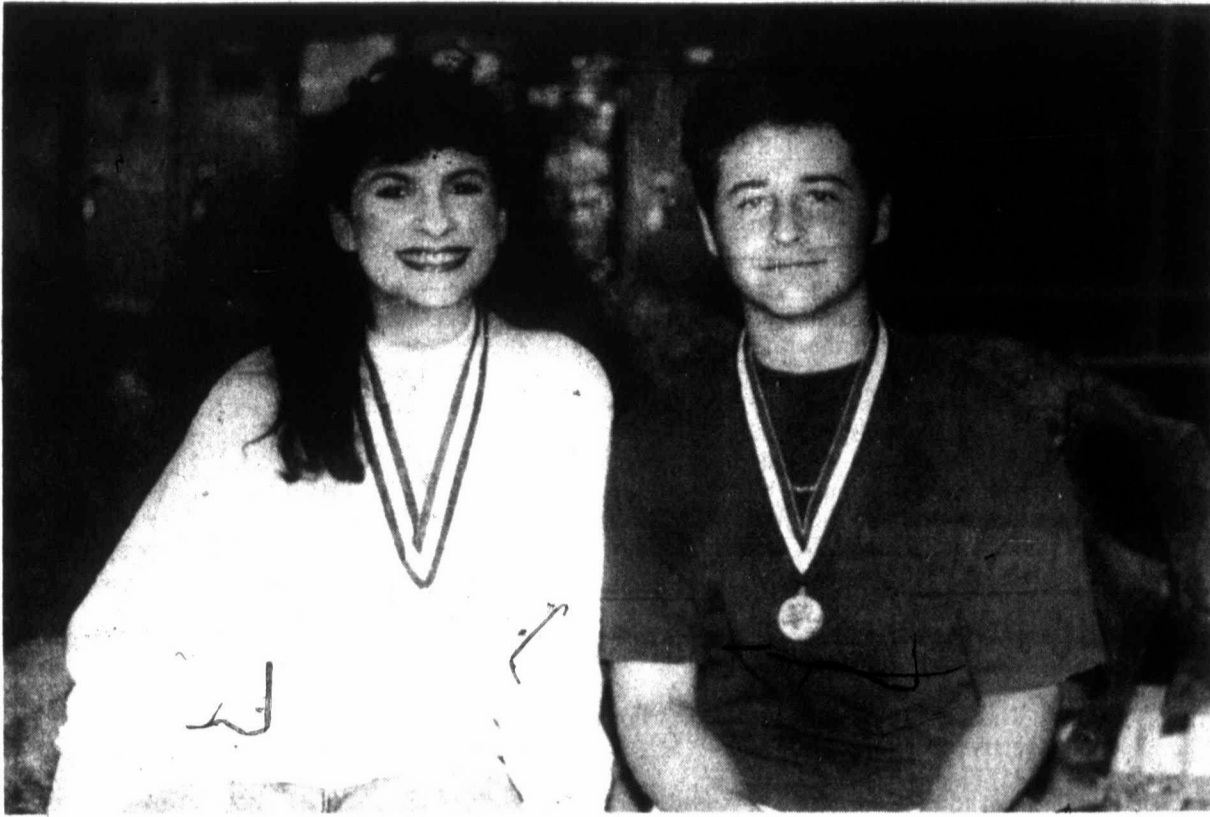

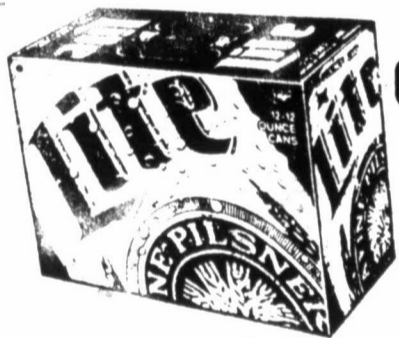

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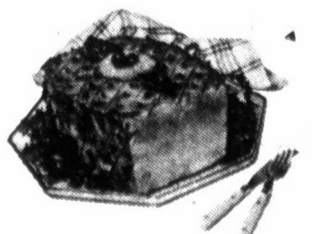
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
