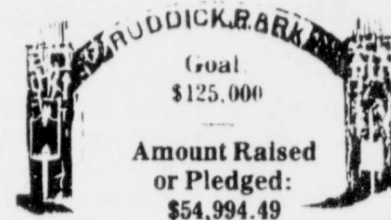

Wolves face Slaton in season opener

Beating Slaton "is our objective," said Colorado High School head football coach Tom Ramsey as the Wolves prepare for the 1985 season opener at Tiger Stadium Friday night in Slaton.

Colorado City and Slaton find themselves in similar positions going into the 8 p.m. kickoff.

District 7AAA coaches have pegged the Wolves, the defending area champions, to finish no better than fifth in a six-team race.

Slaton, which has uncharacteristically missed the playoffs the last few years, is also viewed as the next to last team in eight-member district 3AAA, which includes second-ranked Post.

Both squads find themselves short on experience going into the new season.

Slaton will have new faces on both the field and on the sideline. Ex-Plainview assistant Steve Parr is in his first year as head coach for the Tigers.

Size is listed as Slaton's major weakness, but the Tigers return senior running backs Freddie Robinson, Rodney Taylor and Jerry Copeland.

Offensively the Tigers utilize a Wing T formation and defend with an 8-man front or Split 6 defense.

The Wolves will be looking for their third consecutive victory over the South Plains team, including last year's 10-0 squeaker at Wolf Stadium.

Colorado City opened this year's campaign with a scrimmage at Stanton two weeks ago and scrimmaged Snyder last week.

The defense showed hunger in both scrimmages and appears to be ahead of the offense. That didn't seem to be a real big concern for the coaching staff because a little oiling is more important to coach Ramsey than a premature attempt into second year.

"We're healthy and we're ready," said Ramsey.

"Slaton's a better ballclub than last year. They're improved and running into better and better talent. They're more aggressive."

A look at the starting lineups—beginning with the offense.

Senior Mike Ligon will be a first year quarterback. Last year he was a receiver. In the backfield with Ligon will be All-West Texas ballcarrier Sam Rivera, a 1,000 yard gainer last season, and Ralph Gonzales, who ran for the junior varsity.

Bulldogs host Mertzon

The Loraine High School Bulldogs open the 1985 football season by hosting Mertzon Friday night, but opening against a top ranked team is not the biggest concern for head coach Sandy McSpadden.

"We're very, very thin," said McSpadden, who last year guided the Bulldogs to a 5-5 record—their best in years.

"If we stay healthy, we'll be pretty good. We can't afford any more injuries."

At last Monday's practice there were only 16 players. With only five extra players, obviously the Bulldogs can't even run plays against each other or simulate game situations.

"We can still be competitive going both ways," said McSpadden. "That's all I've ever asked them to do. A lot of things are out of our control, but being competitive is not one of them."

Mertzon, also known as Irion

County, is picked to win district 8A and is ranked as high as number 11 in one state wide poll. The team returns seven players that started offensively and/or defensively for last year's 6-3-1 team.

"They're every bit as good as the rankings say they are," said McSpadden. "They're poised offensively."

"Coach Sid McCown is in his seventh year and has an excellent quarterback and receivers. For the first time they have an offense to go with their defense."

Loraine has pre-season scrimmages against Santa Anna and Big Spring's Junior Varsity under its belt and they have the Bulldogs a little ahead of last year.

"Offensively we're much sharper execution wise," said McSpadden. "Our only disappointment has been not being able to push it into the endzone once inside the 5."

"Defensively we're not as strong as I'd like to be."

Loraine graduated five from last year's team, but has only three seniors on this year's squad.

"It's telling on us particularly on defense. Just about everybody will see action both ways."

"We've got nobody to back up our starting backs." The future doesn't look any different as only one freshman is on the team.

McSpadden said the key to Friday's game would be a strong rush, which he explained has been almost non-existent in the two scrimmages.

"We've got to put pressure on the quarterback."

The lack of depth has forced McSpadden to do some scrambling with the lineup because of injuries.

As of Tuesday morning, this

Deadline set for crop insurance

September 30 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for barley, oats, and wheat in Mitchell County, according to Dotie Sampley, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) in Big Spring.

Crop insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake, or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Sampley.

A new crop insurance plan, called actual production history

(APH), is available this year to producers of wheat, barley, and oats in addition to corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, cotton, rice and other crops. Producers of these crops may now qualify for higher yield guarantees by proving their yield history. Rates have been developed to offer reduced premium for producers with above-average yields.

"With the increased cost of producing a crop, it makes good sense to take a look at this new concept," says Sampley.

To find out more about the APH plan, producers should contact a local, authorized agent. To select an agent, producers may check the list of agents at their local ASCS office.

Contributions boost pool fund

More than \$3,000 in donations were added to the Pool and Park Fund for Ruddick Park this past week, to bring the total pledged or raised to \$54,994.49.

The goal of \$125,000 is sought to match a grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission to build a new swimming pool and to make other improvements at Ruddick Park.

Among the list of contributors this week are Bud and Jean Mersing of Palos Verdes Estates, Calif. who donated \$2,000 to the cause. Mrs. Mersing is the former Jean Decker, a former resident of Colorado City, who used to swim at Ruddick Park pool as a child.

The Mersings were in Colorado City over the holiday weekend and are pleased that the fund raising effort is underway to renovate the park so that present and future generations may enjoy the facility.

Mrs. Gay Houston, chairman of the finance committee of the Park Board, said a memorial program for the park has been established and that persons may make memorial contributions at city hall as memorials.

"So many people have good memories of Ruddick Park, and the memorial program is a good way to remember someone

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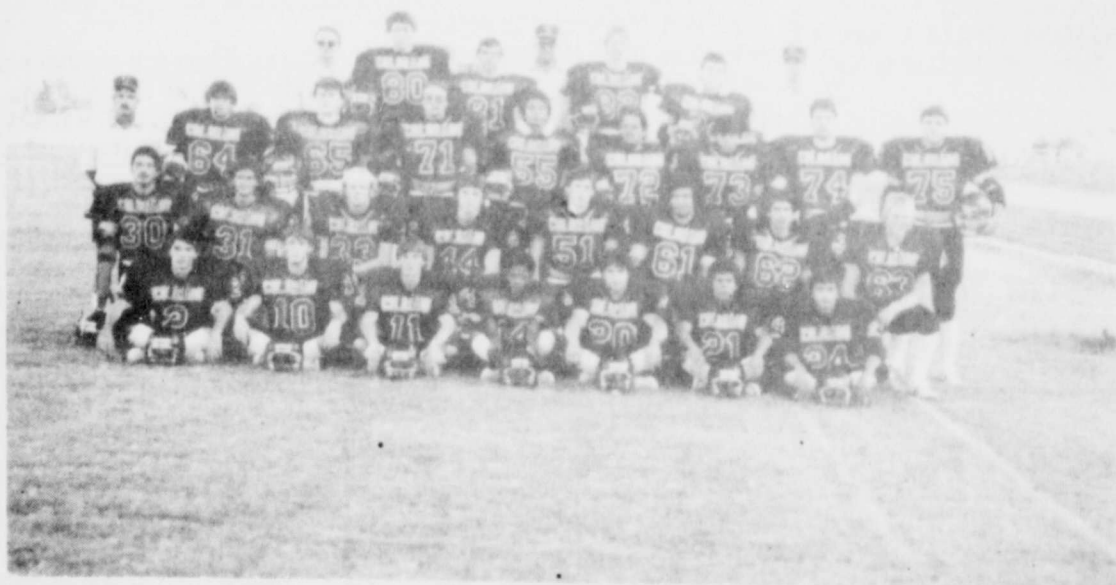

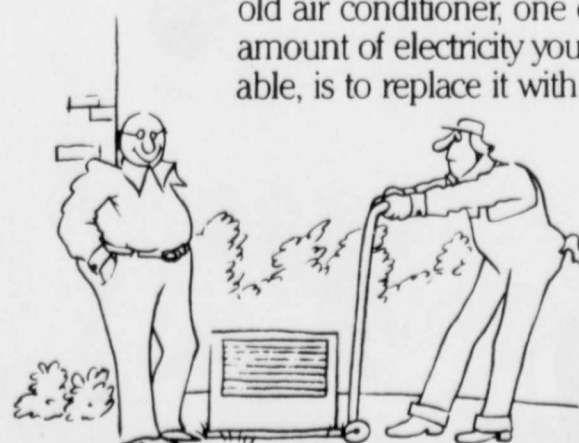

Fever Pitch

Most parents are frightened by a child's fever. It turns out, however, that the real cause for concern may be parental misinformation about this symptom. The fact is that a temperature of less than 101°F. is not a fever. It should not be treated. Fever alone is not a reliable guide to the seriousness of an illness. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, a fever of 102°F. is low-grade; 104°F. is moderate. In spite of parental fears, and except in newborns, any fever under 106°F. is actually harmless. That is, although the child could experience discomfort, it has no neurological consequences. As with any symptom, report fever that persists beyond 24 hours to your pediatrician.
