WHERE STANDARDS ARE HIGH

Referring to problems faced by business, Augustus C. Long, Chairman of the Board of Texaco, Inc. says: "In recent years the ability of business to operate profitably has severely handicapped by oppressive taxation and by unrealistic depreciation rates, by inflationary wage and benefits demands, and by government pressure and intervention.

"This squeeze on profits is one of the basic obstacles to the recovery and growth of our whole economic system. Profits not only enable corporations to pay a reasonable return to their owners, but also to expand, replace inefficient equipment, employ more people—yes, even pay more taxes."

Mr. Long believes a "complete about-face in the attitude of the public and government toward business in this country" is necessary. "The feeling," says he, "seems to be getting pretty deeprooted that everything business does is wrong."

"Our country is the greatest nation on earth because of the American way of life, which is the free enterprise system. Businessmen are largely responsible for our growth and greatness. We must protect that system, and in doing so industry as well as labor must be treated fairly."

"Once a year, several men, each carrying a dispatch case, walk unannounced into the head office of each firm in the New York Stock Exchange. The men represent America's top independent public accountant organizations and the purpose of their visits is a surprise audit of each broker's books. When their examinations—which may last from a few days to six weeks—are concluded, the New York Stock Exchange is set to determine whether the broker is obeying its and the govern-

ment's strict rules."

Thus writes financial columnist Sylvia Porter. She is describing one of the many ways in which this exchange, the country's foremost, protects the interest of the 15 million or so people who now own stocks listed on its Big Board—and will safeguard the interest of the additional millions who are expected to become shareholders as time rolls on. To quote her once again, "Standards are high, rules are strictly enforced, they're getting tougher—and that's the best safeguard or you."

The exchange's policy is an example, and a fine one, of how responsible enterprise can, if it will, police itself. The whole securities industry is subject to public regulation and long has been. But the New York Stock Exchange has recognized that something more is needed, and it has supplied that need. It demands frequent reports of operations of its member firms, and the partners and employees of these firms must be insured against fraud or dishonesty. Any deviation from the standards bring swift punishment.

Finally, it's up to the investor to take full advantage of the safeguards he is offered—buying on the basis of accurate information and avoiding the tipster and the stock dynamite.

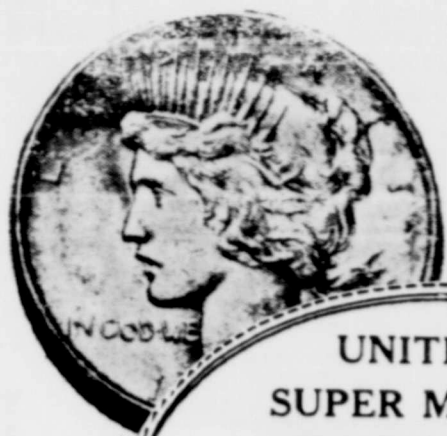

Farm Facts

Production of citrus fruits in the United States increased from about 3 million tons in 1935-36 to a high of 8.2 million in 1956-57. It is expected to attain new heights in the 1960's, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Oranges led in volume produced and in the upward trend. Grapefruit were second in production volume. Production of grapefruit increased sharply until the late 1940's but declined abruptly following freeze damage to groves in Texas. Output of lemons and tangerines has almost doubled since 1935.

The 1959-60 orange crop was about 127 million boxes. Of this tonnage, Florida produced 75%; California, 22%; and Texas, Arizona, and Louisiana, 3%.

About 9% of all citrus was processed in 1955-56 as compared with about 87% in 1959-60. Processors used the following percentages of the 1959-60 citrus crops: oranges, 64%; grapefruit, 42%; lemons, 48%; tangerines, 19%; and limes, 38%.



Citrus fruit production has almost tripled in 25 years.

Per capita consumption of processed citrus in 1960 was about 53 pounds (fresh equivalent basis) and that of fresh citrus was about 34 pounds. Per capita consumption of processed citrus increased until 1944-45 and then declined.

It's The Law In Texas

July Fourth Document Reflects Basic American Principle

What do we mean we say that in the United States we have a "government of law" and not a "government of men"? Basically we mean that we have certain individual rights, guaranteed by our federal and state constitutions and laws, which may not be denied by any governing body.

The early American colonists had their fill of government by men, and the Declaration of Independence, signed 186 years ago, set out their complaints against that type of government and revealed their belief in a principle which we now accept as basic to our American way of life.

These indictments set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charged him with numerous violations of that principle. Among the complaints enumerated are the following:

"He has dissolved Represent-

tative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people."

"He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent for laws for establishing judiciary powers."

"He has made judges dependent upon his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries."

"He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good."

"He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation: . . .

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences; . . . For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments; . . . For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles.

1787, when the framers of our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence has been signed 11 years previously, they set to work to create a system of checks and balances in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; . . .

Some five years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at

one time, specifically detailing various basic rights stemming from the underlying theory of the Declaration of Independence.

Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.

"Operation Motorcade" By State Highway Patrol

The Directors of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that past experience indicates eight persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the coming Fourth of July holiday in Texas.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., announced that "Operation Motorcade" will be in effect from 12:01 a. m. through 11:59 p. m. July 4, and that during this period the regular Highway Patrol force will be joined by units of the License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection services in the general traffic effort.

Garrison called for the "cooperation of all Texas drivers to help prove that the estimate of eight traffic deaths compiled by our Statistical Services Section is too high." He continued: "The Fourth of July marks the mid-point of the summer vacation period, when Texans are really on the move. It is the time of the year when they go more places to see the wonders Texas offers its vacationers."

"With the tempo of travel picking up it is important to drive according to traffic laws and regulations — the rules set down for the protection of the driving public."

"Common sense says it is hard for a person to enjoy a trip if he is constantly squirming out of dangerous traffic situations caused by unlawful

driving — his own or someone else's."

Garrison said the Fourth of July could be the turning point in the battle against death on the highways this year. During the first five months department records showed a six per cent decrease in the number of fatalities as compared with the same period in 1961.

The public safety director cited the large number of bad wrecks which have occurred in

recent weeks. The first few days in June five accidents killed 24 persons and, in each accident at least one traffic violation was a causative factor. As is usually the case, he said, the most common of these were excessive speed, driving while drinking, improper passing or driving with defective equipment.

"Operation Motorcade" program designed to focus attention on the dangers of traveling by motor vehicle during holiday period. Garrison explained, during 24-hour period of the Fourth of July, all fatalities from traffic accidents in the state will be tabulated.

Glaucoma May Run In Families

Q. What causes glaucoma? Is it inherited?

A. Glaucoma (increased fluid pressure within the eye, with "hardening" of the eyeball) is caused by obstruction to the flow of eye fluid which, in health, traverses the eye at all times. Recent evidence suggests that heredity plays an important role in glaucoma. Some doctors urge all patients with a history of glaucoma in the family to disclose the fact when they undergo a routine eye test. Knowing this, the examining physician can perform special tests which will disclose early glaucoma before the eyesight is affected.

Yawning

Q. What makes people yawn? Is yawning contagious?

A. Yawning is a very complex and poorly understood action. Yawning suggests sleepiness, fatigue or boredom. Since members of a group are usually in a similar state of mind, when one member yawns others tend to do the same. It is suggestion rather than contagion which makes yawning spread through the group.

Pain vs. Age

Q. As people get older do they react less severely to pain?

A. Yes. Pain sensitivity seems to decrease with age.
