Ten Billion is Sought to Rebuild United States' Fighting War Machine

WASHINGTON—The United States started mustering men, money and materials Wednesday to win the Korean war to prepare for other Communist aggressions in any part of the world.

President Truman shocked Congress and the nation into the seriousness of the situation by asking for ten billion dollars to build and equip the armed forces.

The amount was almost double the highest estimates of what his message to Congress would recommend.

Acting on presidential instructions given in his message to Congress, the Defense Department announced that reserves will be called to active duty immediately on a limited basis, bringing in men having certain skills.

Rep. George H. Mahon of Colorado City, chairman of the House appropriating group handling military spending, called its members together immediately to consider the 10-billion-dollar request.

Mahon considered the price cheap if it will buy peace. He hoped no more will be needed. Speaker Sam Rayburn hopes to obtain House action on the economic controls requested by President Truman.

Mahon said it won't take ten billion dollars to win the Korean war, but the amount was not excessive to meet the world situation.

The President called for paying for the war and preparedness program on a pay-as-you-go basis as far as possible. He pointed out this will offset inflationary pressures and said heavier taxes will make general controls less necessary.

To siphon needed materials to war plants, Mr. Truman asked Congress to grant him broad powers to see that the military program is not hampered by demands for civilian goods. Details of regulations would be left to him.

Amid an almost unanimous acclaim of his program for vast new tax burdens, Congress moved swiftly to meet the presidential demands.

More Production Aids Activities Talco Oil Field

Twenty-one oil producing days is causing work to increase in the Talco field and new activities on the east end in the Pewitt Ranch area are being felt in Talco business circles.

As this editor recalls, we had 17 producing days in January, February and March. April added another day, May another and June and July 21. Talco's allowable is 41 barrels per day and that additional four days production allowable means 820 more barrels per well at \$1.95 a barrel. Not half bad for the well and royalty owners.

School Transfer Deadline July 31

July is the month for transfer of school children who will not attend school in their home districts. Parents of children who are above the grades taught in their home districts or who for other reasons cannot attend school in the districts where they live, should come into the office of the County Superintendent and make application for transfer of such children to other schools.

Children in the above classification will not be eligible for free transportation unless they are properly transferred. And second, the schools which such children attend will not be allowed to count the Average Daily Attendance earned by these children unless proper transfers have been executed.

Parents of children whose grades are taught in their home districts are reminded that their local boards of trustees have the right to protest such transfers. In the event of a protest from a local board, parents are reminded that they have the right to appeal to the County Board of Trustees, which board has final authority in such matters.

Parents are urged to come in as soon as possible and make their applications. July 31st is the deadline date.

In failing health the past year, he was returning from Dallas with his wife after a physical checkup. Mrs. Westbrook, driving the car, swerved to dodge a truck that was stopping on the highway, and collided with another car. This occurred a mile and a half from Garland. Mrs. Westbrook was not seriously injured.

Texans Go to the Polls Saturday to Nominate State and County Officers

Texans go to the polls on Saturday to nominate a governor and eleven other state officers, which with county and district officers make up a lengthy ballot. There are seven in the governor's race, 12 for lieutenant governor, 10 for three places on the supreme court, and eight for a judgeship on the court of criminal appeals.

Outbreak of the Korean war has overshadowed interest in both state and local races. Only in a few local races has there been much activity.

There are an estimated 1,662,599 qualified voters—half a million less than the record electorate in 1948. In 1948 only 53 per cent of those qualified voted in the first democratic primary. Political professions were forecasting a probable vote this time of between 700,000 and 900,000—maybe a million at the outside.

Voting boxes will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday.

NOTICE OF SCHOOL TRANSFERS

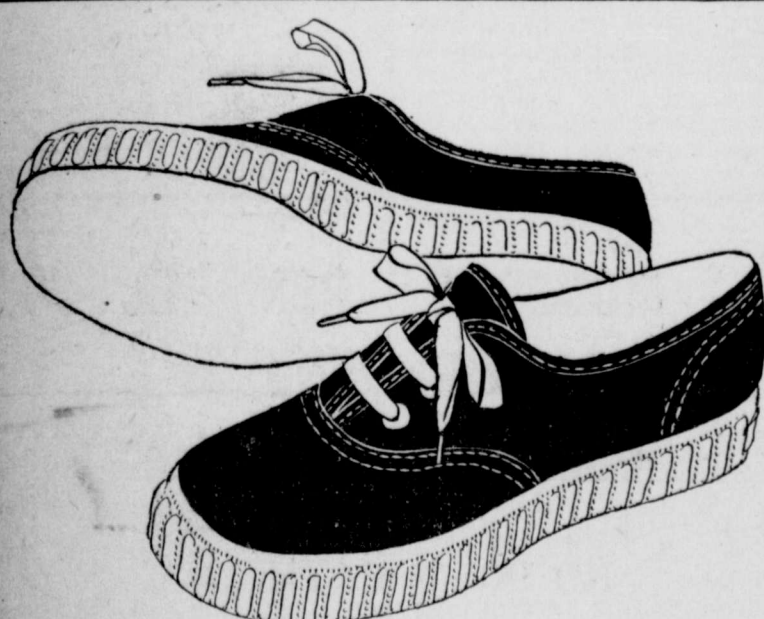

The weather we've had the past two weeks has not been pleasing the cotton farmers who are fighting insects. Only two real hot days in June—on the 24 and 27, when the temperature rose to 97 degrees. First summer we recall when it did not hit the 100 mark before July 20.

New oil wells and locations for wells in the Pewitt Ranch area of the east Talco field is causing considerable sale of real estate, sale of royalty and oil and gas leases, judging from records of the county clerk's office at Mt. Pleasant. It has been more than a dozen years since there was so much real estate activity, occasioned by discovery of oil at Talco in February, 1936.

Home folk should cast their eye down the announcement column of their hometown newspaper. It's none of our business, and you vote as you please, but a candidate who doesn't think enough of your vote to tell you something about himself, and ignores your hometown newspaper with his announcement, would probably ignore you if he was elected. Think it over.

This newspaper never insults the intelligence of its readers by telling them how to vote. They know as much or more about the candidates and their qualifications as we do. We discuss men and measures, advocate this and that for the general welfare of the community and sometimes guess at the outcome of elections. For instance we said that when O'Daniels did not announce for governor that Shivers wouldn't have any trouble. We'll add now that he will probably be nominated next Saturday and there will be no run-off in the governor's race in August. We could be wrong—often are—but that is the way it looks at this writing.

Death of Elbert Westbrook has brought sorrow to many in this area. He was a quiet, unassuming man who never complained about the way fate dealt him the cards of life, and the stoicism with which he met tragedy was beautiful to behold: Death of his first wife, following birth of their daughter; a soldier's dangerous service for his country for three years in the air corps, Pacific theatre, during the war; a return to civilian life, a job and remarriage, and then the dread disease of cancer struck six months ago. No one ever heard him complain. He accepted his burdens and never mentioned them to his friends. His passing has brought sorrow to many.

To the Voters of Titus County:

I have made an effort to see each of you and solicit your vote for Sheriff, but know that I have failed to see many of you. If I have not seen you personally and solicited your vote will you be kind enough to consider this as a personal solicitation by me to you for your vote?

I am well aware of the duties, responsibilities and obligations of the Sheriff's office. I feel that I am capable of assuming and dealing with them. I have had several years experience as a peace officer and have been Constable of Precinct one of Titus County since January 1, 1947. I ask you to consider my record as an officer in this county; to investigate that record, if you are not familiar with it, and if you find me worthy, to cast your vote for me on July 22. 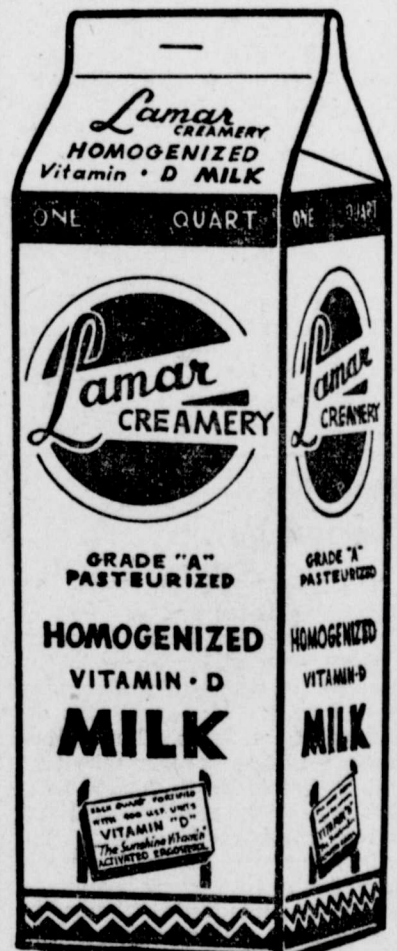
