Funeral services were conducted at the Whiteface Church of Christ last Saturday afternoon, for Herbert C. Stephenson, 64-year-old Whiteface druggist who died last Thursday afternoon in the Cochran County Hospital after a very brief illness.

Cine died at 5 p.m. Thanksgiving Day. He had been proprietor of the Whiteface Drug, in his home of the past 11 years.

Ex-Mobster's Car On Display Here Today Only

The personal car of John Dillinger, gangland kingpin of the prohibition era, will be on display in downtown Morton, today, (Thursday) all day sponsored by the Morton Jaycees.

The car, a fabulous 16 cylinder 1931 Cadillac was considered the most formidable machine for crime in its day. It is being shown inside a truck van on the square, today only.

The car weighs 9,144 pounds—nearly three times the weight of ordinary cars—and was equipped with several anti-pursuit mechanisms.

The big V-type engine had smoke and tear gas generators, and a device in back of the car that sprayed tracks onto the road to puncture tires of would-be apprehenders.

Designed for speed in excess of 100 miles an hour, the car had one and one fourth inch thick bullet proof glass with ports through which guns could be fired.

Inside the quarter-ton steel body special compartments were built to house a machine gun and large quantities of ammunition.

Dillinger and his mobsters reportedly used the car in a total of 29 holdups and 13 murders. The vehicle was finally abandoned near East St. Louis when it ran out of gas during a chase by police.

Dillinger was eventually slain by police July 19, 1934 outside a Chicago theatre on a tip from the gangster's ex-girl friend, known as the "Lady in Red."

Firemen Have Busy Time; Battle A Wind Whipped Cotton Fire Sunday

Morton's volunteer fire department has been kept busy the past few weeks with calls, all of them out in the country, and the most damaging of which cost the Emmett Jones family their farm home on Thanksgiving Day.

The green stucco building was completely gutted early Thanksgiving morning by a fire which apparently started in the hose of a heater. Two small girls at home barely were able to save a few items. They rushed to the highway, flagged down a passerby and he turned in the alarm. But it was too late to save the house when the local fire department arrived.

The object of two fires in the past 15 days was a gin located just about a half mile from the Jones home. The Alamo Cotton Gin had fires in the gin machinery on the Friday evening prior to Thanksgiving at about 6:15 p.m. and a few minutes past noon last Saturday. Neither fire did any extensive damage but the local firemen assisted on both occasions in halting the fire and stood by until sure the fire was out.

Sunday, in the space of less than an hour, the local firemen had two calls. First they were called to a farm again just a short distance from the scene of the Jones fire.

The fire turned out to be in two cotton trailers in a field just south and east of the Alamo Cotton Gin. The trailers and cotton were completely destroyed before local firemen could get to the scene.

About a half hour after they got back to Morton, the alarm summoned them to Needmore, 24 miles north of Morton on the Muleshoe highway where a gin fire was threatening to destroy a large amount of unseeded cotton at the Cooper, active Gin. Muleshoe firemen also responded to the call and both units worked for nearly an hour and a half in the south of a west north, or to water down the cotton burning outside the burs, and two hot bates that had just been pressed.

William O. Trogden, now with the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation of Houston, Texas will be the speaker.

A native of Southwestern Oklahoma, Trogden is well qualified to speak on the important subject. He has a BS degree in soils from Oklahoma A & M College and a Ph.D. degree in soil fertility and management from Ohio State University.

His professional background includes soil work all over the area. He was at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station and then at Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Temple. Later he was transferred to the Soil Conservation Research Division, Blackland Experiment Station, also at Temple. He served as Chairman, Department of Agriculture, Midwestern University and Director, Soil Testing Laboratory. He served with the Wichita County Water Improvement District at Wichita Falls. He is the author of a number of publications on soil fertility, fertilizers and quality of water.

BULA RIPS JAYTON, 49-19; BRINGS 1ST REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP HOME

Hitting hard and fast, making every tackle like it might be their last, the Bula Bulldogs made this past Thanksgiving Day one they'll long remember, by overpowering the Jayton Jaybirds 49-19 to put a fine ending touch on a tremendous season and bring home the bacon—the regional six-man football championship.

But they didn't have to wait until they got home to celebrate. Almost all of Bula was in the crowd that gathered at Jayton to watch the slaughter of the Jaybirds.

And even the score wasn't a fair indication of the way in which Claude Morrison's best—of a long line of good teams—disposed of the Jaybirds. It was just short of murder.

The Bulldogs rang up a 21-0 half-time lead and ran it to 35-0 before the Jaybirds were able to score. Jayton finally scored just before the end of the third period, added another early in the fourth stanza, and sandwiched a final six-pointer in between two Bula fourth period scores. Only on the last TD did Bula fail to make the extra point.

It was a typical Bula win, their 11th without a defeat or a tie this season. Everybody helped. Gerald Neel turned in another classy job of running. Burley Roberts and Carl Hallford ripped Jayton's defenses wide open with their running. Wendell Jones continued his fine record of pass receiving taking a pair of Junior Austin's accurate tosses for touchdowns. And, on defense, Blanton and others hit a crossing Jayton team so hard, they lost their taste for running early in the game.

Neel scored three times on runs of 37, 36 and 10 yards. Hallford was the cog in two TD drives and added two extra points. Jones caught a pass for one TD and two more on extra points. Roberts scored the last two touchdowns.

Two long passes scored for the host team and only once were they able to score on the ground. Most of the time Bula's defense found three or more men in on every tackle.

It was Bula's third time in three years to be in the playoffs, but the first time they were able to take home the Region One title. A total of 800 fans witnessed the Turkey Day struggle played in clear but chilly weather.
