No Witnesses Take Stand In Defense Of Lynch Suspects

GREENVILLE, S. C., May 19. (AP)—The defense rested today in the trial of 28 white men accused of lynching a South Carolina negro, without offering any witnesses in its behalf.

The dramatic climax to the week-long trial came a few minutes after Circuit Judge J. Robert Martin, Jr., had directed full acquittal of three of the original 31 defendants, and given acquittal on two of four counts to seven others.

Chunky grey-haired Defense Attorney Benjamin A. Bolt closed the case with the simple statement: "The defense rests."

The words were almost lost in the shuffle of chairs and mumble of conversation which followed Judge Martin's summary of his ruling to the jury.

Judge Martin immediately recessed court for the second time in 20 minutes. Earlier he had halted proceedings after announcing his directed verdicts for 19 of the original 31 defendants.

The court announced the trial would be suspended until 9:30 a. m. tomorrow when defense arguments will begin. He said each side would be allowed four hours for summation and final argument.

Meanwhile, he said, defense counsel and the state will submit opposing arguments on legal technicalities, adding he would receive these at 5 p. m. today.

The judge gave no indication of the length of his own charge, but it seemed likely the case would reach the jury sometime Wednesday.

The court announced directed full acquittals of three defendants and partial acquittal of seven others when the case was reconvened at 10 a. m.

The court, at the same time, announced that statements allegedly made by the 28 defendants at the time of their arrests would be admitted in evidence only against the persons making them. Judge Martin said he would instruct the jury to disregard the allegations.

In the eviction case, an army private unsuccessfully sought to hold possession of a building where he operated a cafe.

Judge Browning said that the news stories and editorial were "calculated . . . to prejudice and influence the court in its ruling" on a request for a new trial of the eviction proceedings. He finally denied a new trial.

The supreme court's ruling overturned a ruling of the Texas court of criminal appeals which had upheld Browning's contempt findings.

Justice Jackson for the majority wrote that "the law of contempt is not made for the protection of judges who may be sensitive to the winds of public opinion. Judges are supposed to be men of fortitude, able to thrive in a hard climate."

McCormick Heiress Dies In California

LOS ANGELES, May 19. (AP)—Mrs. Mathilde McCormick Oser, 41, heiress to two of the nation's great fortunes, died yesterday.

She succumbed at Good Samaritan hospital where attendants declined to discuss the nature of her ailment. It was reported she had undergone surgery last week.

Mrs. Oser was the daughter of the late Harold F. McCormick, son of the late Cyrus H. McCormick, inventor of the reaper, and of the late Edith Rockefeller McCormick, daughter of the late John D. Rockefeller.

She was married at the age of 18 to a Swiss riding academy master, Maj. Max Oser. In a romance that created international interest and drew parental objections, they were married in London in 1923. Maj. Oser died in Switzerland in October, 1942.

Rain Record Set

Torrential rains, totalling 3.25 inches fell in Houston during the past 24 hours, breaking a 58-year record for May 18. Fourteen persons were injured in 36 accidents in Harris County during the storm.

Congress Told Period Of Tax Reduction Near

Treasury Secretary Asks Consideration Of Slashes Later

WASHINGTON, May 19. (AP)—Secretary of Treasury Snyder told Congress today that "a period of tax reduction is approaching."

But he made no recommendations as to what taxes should be cut or when.

Snyder further told the House Ways and Means Committee that Congress should "consider" how to reduce taxes at some later—and unspecified—time.

The 5,000-word prepared statement by the Treasury head made no mention of the \$4,000,000,000 tax reduction bill passed overwhelmingly by the House despite administration opposition.

The bill is now awaiting Senate action. Nor did Snyder's statement say whether President Truman might veto this tax-cut bill if it reaches him.

Snyder was the first witness as the committee began hearings on a general revision of the entire tax setup.

He did not elaborate on his reference to an approaching period of tax reduction, saying simply: "We are nearing lower peacetime levels of government expenditures and continuing high levels of national income, and production. A period of tax reduction is approaching."

Snyder's statement contained thumbnail sketches of 10 levies which have been under Treasury study, but made no recommendations concerning them.

"It is highly unlikely that the fiscal and economic situation will warrant enactment of all the ultimate revisions at the same time," he said.

Phillips To Open All Six Plants

BORGER, May 19. (AP)—A spokesman for the Phillips Petroleum company said here today that all six of its strike-bound plants may be reopened by tomorrow for employees who "want to come back to work."

The company estimated that about 400 men reported for work yesterday at two plants reopened Saturday. These are the Plains plant, which makes butadiene, and the Alamo refinery.

Meanwhile, pickets of Local 351 of the AFL Operating Engineers Union remained on duty.

The return-to-work movement started despite a statement by the striking union to its members not to return to work until agreement is reached with the company.

According to company estimates, about 100 men reported to the Plains plant with another 300 reporting at the refinery.

Cuttinghorse Billed For Annual Rodeo

A cuttinghorse contest has been added as a new feature of the annual Big Spring Rodeo, Charles Creighton announced Monday.

Improvements are to be made to the grounds and grandstands, he added. Earl and Jack Sellers, Del Rio, who have staged the last two shows for the rodeo association, will again produce the show.

Truman Cheered As Mother Gets Better

GRANDVIEW, Mo., May 19. (AP)—President Truman cheered up a bit today as he reported his 94-year-old mother, fighting for her life against a "very tired and weak heart," as better.

The President talking with reporters at 6:30 a. m. after his usual 20-minute "before breakfast" walk reported: "She's better this morning."

The conversation took place near the doorway of the Hotel Muehlbach where the President spent the night, 17 miles from his mother's frame home here.

The President, looking slightly more cheerful than last night, said "she is better," as he anticipated reporters' questions. He said he had telephoned Grandview this morning and talked with his sister, Miss Mary Jane Truman.

"My sister said she was better this morning and mother herself said she felt better," he said.

It was his personal physician, Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham who said last night that Mrs. Martha E. Truman was handicapped by a "very tired and weak heart."

Mr. Truman refused to make plans for a return to Washington after his mother "slipped" yesterday afternoon after an unexpected fall Sunday morning.

Because of his mother's grave condition he had important papers and reports flown to him from Washington.

Mr. Truman flew here early Saturday in his plane, "The Sacred Cow," after Graham telephoned him that his mother had suffered a setback something Friday night.

First Concert Debut Canceled

PITTSBURGH, May 19. (AP)—Margaret Truman said today that against the wishes of her aged and seriously ill grandmother—"who wanted me to go on with it"—she canceled her concert stage debut scheduled here for tomorrow night.

Miss Truman made the cancellation because of the grave condition of Mrs. Martha E. Truman, 94. The President's daughter, arriving here from New York, decided to switch from train to plane to rush to Mrs. Truman's bedside at Grandview, Mo.

Miss Truman said her entire tour, which also included concerts in Ohio, Texas, and Oklahoma, had not been cancelled. "The outcome depends on what happens" at Grandview, she said.

TEXAS CONVICT BORES OUT OF JAIL IN EMORY

PARIS, Tex., May 19. (AP)—Police of Northeast Texas have been alerted to apprehend a young armed convict identified by Sheriff Max Osborn of Rains county as William J. Isom, 22, who escaped from the Emory jail yesterday by digging through bricks of the building.

Sheriff Osborn said the man, held on burglary charges, was armed and was fleeing in a stolen car.

Sheriff Osborn said the pistol was his own, taken from his car early today. The convict was said to have stolen a car from the outskirts of Emory and abandoned it at Commerce where he stole a second car.

Supreme Court Okays Guards Joining Unions

WASHINGTON, May 19. (AP)—The Supreme Court today ruled that plant guards deputized by local police are "employees" under the National Labor Relations Act and may join unions which also represent production employees.

The decision involved labor disputes affecting plant guards of Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation's Ots Works in Cleveland, and E. C. Atkins and Company, Indianapolis maker of tools and armory plates.

Jones and Laughlin contended plant guards were "employees" or a part of management under the act's definition of that term as "any person acting in the interest of an employer, directly or indirectly."

The high court handed down two separate decisions.

In the Jones and Laughlin case, the court's 5-4 opinion was written by Justice Murphy. Chief Justice Vinson and Justices Frankfurter, Jackson and Burton dissented.

In the Atkins case, the majority opinion was written by Murphy, with dissents noted by the Chief Justice and Justice Frankfurter and Jackson.

New Texas City Fire Kills One

TEXAS CITY, May 19. (AP)—Flames from the burning of the gasoline tanker Pan Massachusetts yesterday took the life of Louis Homme, 40, of Galveston.

Homme was a crewman on the tug Richard Clarke, which caught fire from the Pan Massachusetts.

Homme and another Richard Clarke crewman, John Burchick, 49, of Logan, Pa., jumped from their blazing vessel and swam through burning gasoline. Burchick was treated for critical burns at the United States Marine hospital at Galveston.

Four extinguishing the four-hour fire went to Texas City's volunteer fire department which lost 27 members in the fires and explosions that wrecked this town a month ago.

Drunk Driving Test Ruled Out

AUSTIN, May 19. (AP)—The proposed reclassification of Texas traffic laws is constitutional as a whole, but certain sections, including phrases of the breath test for intoxication are not, the attorney general ruled today.

The measure, passed by House and Senate in varying forms, is in a free conference committee to adjust the differences. Chairman Fred Harris of the conference committee requested the opinion.

The bill was written to codify and modernize Texas traffic regulations. It was widely sponsored by safety and police organizations.

Hope Of Holy Land Truce Diminishes

JERUSALEM, May 19. (AP)—Conditions laid down by the Jewish Underground as the price of peace in the Holy Land appeared today to have virtually killed all hopes of a truce urged by United Nations members pending settlement of the Palestine problem.

In a clandestine radio broadcast yesterday, [Argun Zvi Leumi] and the so-called Stern gang declared they would not halt their campaign of violence until the British lay down their arms, "and the arrest of Jews in Palestine, cease deporting Jews to other countries and respect the rights of Jewish citizens in their homeland."

Prime Minister Dies

AUCKLAND, N. Z., May 19. (AP)—George William Forbes, 78, prime minister of New Zealand from 1930-35, died at Christchurch yesterday.

President Asks Action On Federal Health Plan

WASHINGTON, May 19. (AP)—President Truman asked Congress today to give "immediate attention" to enactment of a federal health and disability insurance program.

In a special message to the legislators, Mr. Truman declared such legislation is "crucial to our national welfare."

Under the type of program he asks, a worker unable to work because of injury or illness, would receive government payments.

Mr. Truman told Congress: "Of the four basic risks to the security of working people and their families—unemployment, old age, death and sickness—we have provided some insurance protection against three."

"Protection against the fourth—sickness—is the major missing element in our national social insurance program."

Mr. Truman's message asked, in addition:

1. Adequate public health services, including an expanded maternal and child health program.

2. Funds for research and medical education.

3. More hospitals and doctors, especially in sparsely settled areas.

"The total health program which I have proposed is crucial to our national welfare," he said. "The heart of that program is national health insurance."

"Until it is a part of our national fabric, we shall be wasting our most precious national resource and shall be perpetuating unnecessary misery and human suffering."

Army Bans Private Cigaret Shipments

WASHINGTON, May 19. (AP)—Striking at black market trading the Army today banned private shipments of American cigarettes and tobacco to Germany effective Monday, May 26.

The action does not affect the supply made available through Army post exchanges, which the Army said is sufficient to meet "the normal individual needs" of GIs and civilian workers.

Middle-Of-The-Road Legislation Sought By Jester For Labor Ills

AUSTIN, May 19. (AP)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester today renewed his plea to the 50th legislature to enact middle-of-the-road labor legislation providing for voluntary mediation of some types of strikes, and compulsory arbitration of others.

He formally submitted as a matter of emergency legislation a bill by Rep. George Nokes of Corsicana, suggesting that its scope be widened.

Jester also formally submitted as an emergency matter a bill which would set up a separate state boxing and wrestling commission, apart from the department of labor and commerce. Boxing and wrestling supervision is now under the bureau of labor statistics.

It was the third time this session the governor has asked the legislature for action on this type. The session has approved and he has signed several labor regulatory bills opposed by union forces.

Meanwhile, pressure was being brought to bear on members today from another source, pushing for action on bills designed to make the secret ballot more secret.

Delegations of club women, including the League of Women Voters and the Texas branch of the American Association of University Women, the Parent Teachers Association, the Austin Council of Jewish Women, were here to urge Senate action. A secret ballot bill passed by the house is on the senate calendar, after being approved in committee.

Operators Refuse To Cross Lines

WASHINGTON, May 19. (AP)—Striking installations workers of the Western Electric company today re-established their picket lines, forcing curtailment of telephone service again in some areas.

In New Jersey, the Bell Telephone company reported several main exchanges were "heavily picketed." Service was placed on an emergency basis at points where operators refused to cross picket lines.

Some curtailment also was reported in Illinois, but in New York other workers ignored the pickets and went to their posts.

The Association of Communication Equipment Workers, claiming 20,000 members, sent the pickets back to their beats pending the outcome of negotiations here for a strike settlement. The lines were withdrawn temporarily last week.

An 18-hour negotiating conference failed to beat the 6 a. m. (local time) deadline set by ACEW for restoration of the lines.

It is one of the few unions still at odds with the Bell System as the strike entered its seventh week. The contract negotiations broke up at 3 a. m. (CST) today, to resume at 12:30 p. m.

Ernest Weaver, ACEW president, said his orders for resumption of picketing remained in effect.

John Murray, a labor department conciliator, announced only this:

"At 4:30 a. m. the company submitted a wage proposal. The conference recessed at 6 a. m. until 12:30 p. m. today, at which time the union will make a reply to the company's offer."

Neither the Labor Department, Western Electric nor the ACEW would say what the proposal was. Previously the company had offered pay increases of seven, eight, and nine cents an hour, to be applied in three areas. The union demanded 15 cents across the country.

Two other Western Electric unions—representing some 27,000 workers—reached agreements yesterday and early today. These provide pay boosts averaging about 11 1/2 cents an hour and contain a "no strike" clause.

Plane Crash Kills Schoolboys, Pilot

BURLINGTON, Ia., May 19. (AP)—A cavorting navy plane crashed on a school playground here yesterday, killing the pilot and two school boys and injuring six other youths as wreckage showered the neighborhood over a four-block area.

The plane, one of a fighter squadron from Lambert Field, St. Louis, was being put through a series of barrel rolls as part of a naval air show when it plummeted to the ground where 14 children were playing baseball.

hurdled across the yard, crashed into a tree and exploded.

Commander J. D. Taylor, leader of the squadron, said he would begin today an investigation of the mishap.

LIGHT POST FALL NOT BOY'S FAULT

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 19. (AP)—Paul Carter Burns, 13, leaned against a light post. A short circuit in the wiring melted the anchor bolts and the metal post crashed into the street.

Paul fainted. When he regained consciousness at the hospital, he shouted, "I didn't do it. I was just waiting for a bus."

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Need School Budget Okay For State Funds

If a report expected from the free conference committee on HB 295 is accepted this week, Big Spring Independent School district likely will have to submit its budget for approval before qualifying for the \$65 per capita apportionment payment.

There is little doubt, however, that the local district would qualify since it meets all requirements set up under the bill although falling under standards set for state aid schools.

The measure, which is due to be reported out Monday, calls for a minimum of \$2,007 for teachers with bachelor's degrees, plus increments of \$54 per year for each of 12 years and \$225 for a masters degree. The scale here falls under the level, hence the necessity of submitting the budget for state board approval.

State aid schools (those with 1,500 or less scholars who meet other state aid requirements) may benefit to the greatest extent from the \$36,000,000 measure for the biennium. Tuition payments are raised one dollar to \$6 for elementary students and high school \$3 to a new total of \$12. The local district will benefit a few hundred dollars from this change.

Opportunity To Study City Budget

Citizens have an opportunity to digest a document of imposing figures between now and June 10 when the budget for the fiscal year will be up for public hearing. This is a date to keep in mind, for if any one wishes to speak effectively about expenditures, it is at this hearing. Believing that at equalization or taxpaying time has little point, especially if there has been no interest in the public hearing on the budget. And in previous years there has been little to none.

The city manager has presented a lucid budget which may be had at the city secretary's office for study. It calls for a general fund outlay of \$454,000, plus \$101,000 for bond requirements. This adds up to a pretty big figure and should be convincing proof that the municipal operation is definitely big business.

There are some inescapable ironies in this, as in all similar budgets. For instance, 26 per cent of the total is necessary because we, as members of a supposedly civilized society, fall in some of the better points of civilization. This is to say that this per cent of the budget is necessary because we have crime and fire.

Another 36 per cent is necessary because we have had to extend ourselves to provide one of the most essential of all services—that of water.

Wages for administration, supervision, and labor (the latter being by far the biggest item), consumes no less than 50 per cent of the budgetary demands from the general fund.

All of this operation must be carried on

with a 10 million dollar valuation and a \$1.70 tax rate, plus resources from the water department. The water operation supplies about 41 per cent of the anticipated support of city finances. Hence the futility of talk of lower water rates unless some other means of financing is pulled out of the hat.

Opinions may vary about the budget—and it is provided so that people may form their opinions and express them before the commission—but on the whole it seems to be closely estimated commensurate with the demands placed upon the city of its people. The growing tendency toward greater number of employees (and here again the demands of increased services are largely responsible) might stand the closest scrutiny.

If adjustments can be made in other accounts, it seems that parks and recreation would justify more than a mere two and a half per cent of the general fund total with only \$1,500 put in as capital outlay. It will be recognized that the paving program could be more pretentious, but it is time for the public to move. So far there is nothing to indicate that public response to paying offers will cause the city to need more than it has provided in this direction for the fiscal year.

This discussion could continue at length, but we suggest that you make the study for yourself and reach your own conclusions. The commission would welcome a group of citizens interested enough in the city's affairs to be present at the hearing on June 10.

Schoeneman To Collect Taxes

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A man who was born in a lighthouse and moved to the White House will now collect your income taxes.

He's George J. Schoeneman, 57, just appointed by President Truman to be the new internal revenue commissioner, starting July 1.

He's worked for the government 36 years and around here he has the reputation of being quite a gladiolander.

He'll have 60,000 people working for him in the bureau, collecting and checking your taxes.

His salary, for seeing that about \$35,000,000,000 in taxes are shovelled in to Uncle Sam will be \$10,000 a year. (About \$20,000,000,000 of that is income tax.)

He was born in a lighthouse, where his father was keeper, off Newport, R.I.

In 1911 he started as a \$300-a-year stenographer in the post office department and worked in the department until 1920.

Then he moved over to the internal revenue bureau and by 1929 was deputy commissioner.

There he stayed until 1944.

In that time, he figures, he supervised the collection of \$109,840,336,419 in revenue for the government.

In 1945 President Truman called him to the White House and made him one of his administrative assistants there.

The other day the present revenue commissioner resigned. He's Joseph D. Nunn, Jr., 50. So Mr. Truman picked Schoeneman to succeed Nunn. Schoeneman, married, has two grown daughters.

Truth Of Marshall's Prophecy

Some three weeks ago, US Secretary of State George Marshall, just back in Washington from the deadlock Big Four foreign ministers' conference in Moscow, warned the nation that the fate of Europe must be settled without delay.

Premier Stalin had told Marshall that compromises were possible on the great issues dividing the Allies, but the latter in his report to the people declared that the fate of Europe couldn't wait on "compromises through exhaustion." The secretary of state added:

"Disintegrating forces are becoming evident. The patient is sinking while the doctors deliberate. Whatever action is possible to meet these pressing

problems must be taken without delay."

Proof of the truth of Marshall's prophecy was trading on his heels. Today the German economic crisis, complicated by a grave shortage of food, makes it only too clear that the "disintegrating forces" are working fast. For Germany is the epicenter of the earthquake which is rocking all Europe.

Within the past few days great statements of Britain and France have echoed General Marshall's Thesis. Only Moscow remains as ever the sphinx.

British Foreign Secretary Bevin, speaking in the House of Commons, declared that if relations between the east and west (between Russia and the

western democracies) aren't improved at the November conference of the foreign ministers, "no one can prophesy what course the world will take."

Friday French foreign Minister Georges Bidault declared that next autumn's four-power conference to achieve "a unified chance for a united world, and peace for a united world."

"One thing is clear. Time becomes more and more precious. The essential for settlement of the grave differences between Russia and the western Allies is, as Stalin himself has pointed out, a desire to cooperate.

Whether that desire exists on both sides is the great imponderable upon which the fate of Europe depends.

'Speed Tax' Starts At 40 Miles An Hour

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Motorists who habitually operate their cars at high speeds are paying a heavy "speed tax" as well as risking their lives, the Aetna Life Affiliated says.

An increase in speed from 40 to 60 miles an hour will increase gasoline consumption 50 per cent, tire wear 350 per cent and oil consumption 400 per cent. Tire wear and gasoline and oil consumption increase comparatively slow at speeds up to 40 miles an hour, but they all increase sharply at this point, making higher speeds extremely wasteful of rubber, gasoline and oil.

Export Fair Is Planned In Germany

BERLIN, (AP)—An export trade fair to stimulate an increase in exports from the Anglo-American zones will be held in Hannover from Aug. 18 to Sept. 7. Lt. Gen. Brian Robertson, deputy British military governor, has announced.

Approximately 2,000 exhibitors from the Anglo-American zones are expected. Because it is aimed at increased exports from the fused zones, foreign buyers will be given preference. Gen. Robertson said, with the general public permitted entry at specified hours only so that genuine buyers will have an opportunity to do business.

Chanute Not In Debt

CHANUTE, Kas. (AP)—You don't have to pay a city tax to live here and no resident has paid one since 1930. But the city isn't in debt. It doesn't owe anybody a cent and has some \$350,000 to \$400,000 in its treasury.

Chanute, a beacon of civic prosperity in an America of debt-ridden communities, is the only debt-free, tax-free municipality of its size (11,000) in Kansas.

It didn't get that way through siphoning off part of the take from gambling dens and race tracks, as have some Florida and Nevada communities. Gambling is illegal in Kansas.

Chanute put itself into the black ink side of the civic ledger by going into business for itself. It took over the ownership of its own public utilities—water, gas, electricity—and pays for the cost of all municipal government through earnings from these services.

"But our utility rates are well within the average charged by other municipalities throughout the state," said Ross Cooper, 45, city clerk, "and most citizens approve of our way of paying city government costs."

These costs are about \$125,000 a year, including police and fire department expenditures, but they measure only partly the earnings of the city-owned utilities.

Chanute issued \$44,000 in bonds to build a water plant in 1938. It bought out a private gas company in 1939 by threatening to build its own municipal plant.

In 1933 the city took \$32,000 from its municipal gas company earnings to buy out an unsuccessful private electric power company.

"The owner was glad to sell for \$32,000," said Cooper. "Now our electric power plant is worth at least \$2,000,000."

The water and gas plants have similarly increased in value.

The city owed \$480,000 when it ceased levying taxes in 1930. That bonded indebtedness had been reduced to zero by the beginning of this year.

Utility earnings also purchased a \$90,000 municipal airport, one of the first in southeast Kansas, a \$375,000 municipal building and war memorial which serves as a community center, a \$50,000 city swimming pool, with submarine lights, a \$15,000 city warehouse, a \$25,000 municipal library and other improvements.

A \$500,000 program is now under way to double the output of the municipal power plant and permit it to extend its operation further into rural areas.

"We are now selling electric power to four nearby communities and also have about 350 rural customers," said Cooper.

Washington Merry-Go-Round—Drew Pearson

Klu Klux Klan Revived in Ohio

WASHINGTON.—Ku Klux Klanism seems to have had a slight rejuvenation in Ohio judging by a recent meeting of the Klan held at 719 East Market Street, Akron.

Though members were carefully scrutinized in order to ban outsiders, here is a brief summary of what happened at the meeting.

Chief Klansman Sheakley was in Canada, so Perry McClesney acted as chairman. Sixty-two people were present for lunch, including women, though not all stayed for the meeting afterward. Klan affairs and business were not discussed at the table.

McClesney, after opening the meeting, asked for discussion from the floor. Mrs. Higgs stated that on the previous Sunday night she had heard Drew Pearson attack the Klan and that she wished to make a motion that Klansmen boycott Pearson. She also suggested that all people, their friends and relatives, talk against Pearson, and start the rumor that he is a Jew or a Catholic. The motion was seconded and passed 37 to 0.

Roy Waldron said that he had been gratified to note that adverse publicity given the Klan had disappeared from the newspapers. He said he believed Americans now were not worrying too much about what is happening overseas and that this coming summer would see a re-birth of the Klan. The country needs Klan leadership to protect it from the machinations of the Jews and the influence of the Catholics, he emphasized, and predicted that the Klan would soon have the greatest membership of any organization in the United States.

"PRO-COMMUNIST"

McClesney replied that this belief was shared by every Klansman in the Akron district and the Klan was just waiting for the go-ahead signal from Dr. Samuel Green, the grand dragon, in Atlanta. Miss Grable, the secretary, advised that she had received no correspondence from the grand dragon or anyone in Atlanta but believed Mr. Sheakley had exchanged letters with the grand dragon following his visit to Atlanta.

Mrs. Yoho suggested that, in view of the memorial program held that day, the general discussion be cut short. The meeting was adjourned.

After the meeting, the male members had a brief discussion, including Everett Neptune, Perry McClesney, Bill Rutaine and Frank Grannon—all rubber workers—regarding the Rubber Workers Union which they said was agitating for another strike. They accused John Knight, owner of the Akron Beacon-Journal, as being pro-Communist.

Note—Mr. Knight also publishes The Miami Herald, The Detroit Free Press, Chicago Daily News, and is former president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors. The Akron Beacon-Journal was given credit by both the executives of the rubber industry and the leaders of the Rubber Workers Union for helping inspire a settlement of recent labor differences. It was the amiable settlement of rubber-industry labor trouble which set the pattern for subsequent settlements in the automobile, steel, electrical and other industries.

BUMBLING AMBASSADOR

If Soviet Premier Stalin really means what he says about wanting to encourage peace between the United States and Russia, he might start by booting Russia's bigoted, blundering Andrei Gromyko into the salt mines of Siberia.

In the fourteen years of Soviet-American diplomatic relations, no Russian diplomat in the USA has been a worse flop. Some people wonder whether Gromyko has ever smiled at anyone—including his wife. Even some of his Soviet colleagues denounce Gromyko to his face for being so obstinate.

One of those hating him most is Ukrainian Foreign Minister D. Z. Manuilsky, who openly asks why Manuk keeps Gromyko around. Andrei Vishinskiy, Russia's foreign minister, even refers to Gromyko as a "Molotov Stogee" and is equally critical.

NO DATES

Gromyko makes a fetish of being overbearing and a general nuisance. His underlings in the "Brave New Soviet Society" are scared stiff. Recently, he issued a flat edict to all Soviet employees at the United Nations barring them from any unofficial social relations with

Hogan Pockets Top Premium At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, May 19. (AP)—Golf's touring stars with two exceptions departed today for Philadelphia and the Inquirer Invitational as Ben Hogan showed \$3,000, first money from the Colonial National Invitation into his jeans.

Toney Penna, who finished a stroke back of Hogan, left for Florida to visit his family. Henry Picard flew to Massachusetts where his mother died yesterday.

Performing in his usual style for the home folks, Hogan, for the second year in a row, won first money in the \$15,000 Colonial meet, shooting a one-under-par 69, on the final 18 holes to close out with 279—the same score he had in capturing the tournament in 1946.

Penna had a par 70 for each of the four rounds over 6,850-yard Colonial Country Club course.

Picard, the Cleveland veteran, shot 288 for a tie for twelfth place and as he left the eighteenth green, he was handed a telegram telling of the death of his mother, Mrs. Helen Picard, 64, at Walpole, Mass. He immediately made a plane reservation.

Hogan, in winning the \$3,000, closed in on fellow Texan, Jimmy Demaret, who plays out of Ojai, Calif., in the battle for cash along the tournament trail for the year. Ben now has \$14,000—within \$700 of Demaret, who shot 285 for a tie for ninth place, getting \$362.50 here.

Hal Chase Dies After Extended Illness On Coast

COLUMBIA, Calif., May 19. (AP)—Hal Chase, probably the greatest fielding first baseman of all time, is dead.

"Prince Hal," whose brilliant career in the majors ended under the club of the "Black Sox scandal" of 1919, twice was in a coma for 36 hours during his lengthy illness, but twice he rallied. The third strike put him out.

Chase was 64, and a pathetic figure from a kidney ailment, heart trouble and complications of old age. He died at 10:45 a.m. yesterday at Colusa Memorial hospital, which he entered in March.

Chase started in organized baseball in 1903 with Victoria of the old Northwestern league and the next year broke into the Pacific Coast league with Los Angeles. In 1905, Clark Griffith, manager of the New York Yankees, lifted him into the big time.

With the Yankees, Chase was the most agile, quick-thinking first baseman baseball had ever produced. He had an uncanny way of seeing the batter's intention and moved over a wide area, even catching pop fouls behind the catcher. He was a wizard on a punt.

Chase was traded to the Chicago White Sox in 1913 and after a dispute with his bosses, he switched the next season to the Buffalo Federals. He bounced back into the majors with the Cincinnati Reds after the 1945 season. Chase concluded his major league career in 1919 with the New York Giants. He was 37 then, a veteran of 15 seasons, in the big circuits. But he had never realized his ambition to play in a World Series.

Chase was not accused of being in the "Black Sox scandal." But later he admitted he had advance knowledge that the 1919 World Series between the Chicago White Sox and the Cincinnati Reds had been "fixed."

"Sure, I know about that," Chase said not long ago. "But I was no squealer."

Defense Shines As Cats, Rebs Split A Pair

DALLAS, May 19. (AP)—Double or nothing or more seems to be an unwritten rule in the Texas league this season.

Just nine of the 36 runs yesterday were scored without company. And that's the way it has been all year.

Fort Worth and Dallas divided a pair of games yesterday, 3-4 5-0, to wind up a two-day series. Tulsa swept its series with Oklahoma City on an 8-4 win and Houston blanked Beaumont, 12-0. San Antonio and Shreveport had to cancel out because of wet grounds.

Just to keep the pattern of double or nothing, ten double plays were unreeled in the four games, eight of them coming in the Fort Worth-Dallas bill. And Dallas' Gene Markland gave the year's largest crowd at Fort Worth—9,195—something to talk about when he handled 14 chances without a bobble.

Mack Stewart hung up his fifth straight victory—after losing three in a row—in setting Oklahoma City down with nine hits in the seven innings he worked. Before retiring, he drove in one run and contributed a double and single.

The loss was the first of the year for Oklahoma City's Ralph McCabe, giving him a 4-1 record. The league leading Houston Buffs wasted little time or effort with Beaumont, smacking three Exporter pitchers for ten hits. Roman Brunswick scattered five hits to the Exporters and made it four victories against no defeats on his record.

Fort Worth blew a two run lead in the ninth inning of the first game and finally lost the tilt in the tenth. It came back, though, behind the two-hit pitching of Dick Miady to shut out the Rebels in the nightcap.

Today, Oklahoma City drops down to Dallas for a single game, while Tulsa plays at Fort Worth. Houston continues against Beaumont and San Antonio and Shreveport try again.

Cardinals Drop Double Header

Others have called it a slump. Others have called it just "a slow start."

But it was apparent today that the trouble with the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals is that the rest of the National league has been gangling up on them with an unorthodox barrage of left-handed pitchers.

Including their double defeat by Philadelphia yesterday, Redbirds have been beaten by southpaws 11 times against two wins against portside pitching.

In 27 games, rival managers have started left-handers against them 18 times and on 14 occasions were rewarded with victories. One game ended in a tie and the Cards won the other three.

After Ken Heintzelman, ex-Pirate, held the Cards to nine hits in the opener to beat them 6-3, Ken Raffensberger blanked the Cards through 12 innings to win the nightcap 1-0.

Expected for the Cards, the National league pennant race resembles a mob scene with only a game and a half separating the first place Boston Braves and the sixth place Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Braves retained their half game edge over the New York Giants by splitting a double header with the Reds in Cincinnati, winning the second game behind Red Barrett, 3-7 after Ewell Blackwell of the Reds had out pitched Moore Cooper in the opener, 2-1.

After the Pittsburgh Pirates had overcome a 6-1 New York lead in the opener to win 7-6, the Giants came back to take the abbreviated seven-inning nightcap 11-6 to retain second place.

The Dodgers edged a skein of 18 scoreless innings by tallying four times in the seventh to down the Cubs 4-2 before a record Chicago crowd of 46,572.

Bobby Feller made his first start of the season at Yankee stadium a success by turning back the New York Yankees 5-3, gaining his fifth victory against three setbacks.

Scoring two runs in the ninth inning of each game, the Chicago White Sox took the measure of Washington's Senators twice in the Capital City 4-2 and 3-2.

Philadelphia's surprising Athletics moved into sixth place, only four and a half games behind the first place Detroit Tigers, by trim-

Famed 'Biscuit
Death Victim

UKIAH, Calif., May 19. (AP)—The 'Biscuit' is no more.

Charles S. Howard's mighty Seabiscuit, once the greatest money winner of the American turf, died of a heart attack Saturday at Howard's Ridgewood Ranch where he has stired 100 colts since his retirement in 1940. He was 14 years old.

He was buried yesterday in front of the main ranch house, and a life-size bronze statue of the horse will be placed over the grave. "Like losing one of the family," muttered one of the ranch hands as they shoveled the red clay earth over the horse with the "suspicious knees" which Howard bought in 1936 for \$8,000.

Seabiscuit helped put Western racing on the map. In 1936 as a three-year-old he won \$28,995, and by 1940 he had accumulated \$437,730, an earning record until surpassed by Whirlaway with \$561,161.

Other defendants claim Stokes had extracted a confession from the lynch victim, Willie Earle, who was slain in reprisal for the fatal stabbing of a white man.

Judge Martin said evidence was insufficient to convict them on any count.

Fire Razes Alvin Rice Warehouse

ALVIN, Texas, May 19. (AP)—Officials of the Southern Warehouse Company today were figuring up losses from a lightning-started fire that razed the firm's big rice warehouse and dryer here yesterday.

First unofficial estimates were that losses might run as high as half a million dollars.

A. M. Brown, warehouse manager, said the rice stored in the warehouse alone had a valuation of \$239,000. He said a further study would be necessary to arrive at a complete figure.

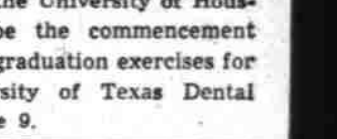
The proprietor said he presumably slipped the package of money into a drawer, but later in the afternoon we reached for his money—and pulled out, instead, the wrapped chicken.
