## Garbage Collection Rates Increased by City Council

### Photography Show At Bank Jan. 25-29

A one-man photography show which will include approximately 20 salon prints will be staged at First National Bank next week, Jan. 25 through Jan. 29, it was announced Wednesday by James H. Sorenson, Jr., bank president.

The show which will be open to the public without charge, will display the work of Jake Miller, amateur photography of Indianapolis, Ind., who visits Rockport each winter. The prints will be exhibited in the bank's board of directors room.

Miller, who has devoted full time to his long-time hobby since retiring from Naval Avionics, Inc. in Indianapolis two years ago, will be on hand at the show to answer questions of amateur photographers every day from 12 noon until 1 p.m.

As manager of Naval Avionics' special projects department, Miller, directed the work of a staff of photographers and commercial artists.

Miller has an unusual distinction of having won first place in every photography show he has entered, including local, state and national exhibitions, and he recently won the national Eastman award. Miller, with his wife, is currently on a picture-taking trip which will take them from the Mexican border to upper Canada, and a journey of approximately 20,000 miles. During the trip, Miller estimates that he will take some 6,000 pictures from which he hopes to get approximately 10 prints of salon quality.

One of the prints in the bank show is of a floating weed seed. He said he exposed 70 negatives to obtain one print which satisfied him. Categories of prints in the show include architectural, scenic, nature and human interest.

### ROCKPORT RIPS PAST CALLEN

Playing what was perhaps its best game of the season, Rockport ran over Calallen, 74-40, in a 30-2A contest here Tuesday night.

Rockport's point total was its highest of the season and it was the Pirates' first district victory in three tries. Calallen is 0-3 in 32-2A play.

Except for a 6-6 tie early in the first quarter, Calallen never threatened to take the lead over the hot Pirates. Rockport moved out to a 19-11 first-period lead and was in front, 36-30 at the intermission.

Its 23-point third period was Rockport's best and it was 59-31 going into the final quarter.

The Pirates had three in double figures, led by Gary Gray with 15 points, while Willie Kinche and Ronald Sanders contributed 14 each.

Randy Winters posted 17 points and was the game's leading scorer, although he was the only Calallen player in double figures.

### ROUNDTABLE CANCELED

The Roundtable in Portland has been cancelled due to a conflict with the Gulf Coast Council Recognition dinner at the West Oso High School in Corpus Christi. This is a definite cancellation of the Boy Scout activities, according to Mr. Mott in Portland and presumably this includes the Cub Scout activities. Announcement of the February Roundtable meeting will be in the Gulf Coast Scouter.

The City this week voted three to one to increase garbage collection charges beginning Feb. 1 to offset an expected deficit in garbage fund revenue.

Alderman Charlie Garrett, N. F. Jackson and Mrs. J. W. "Tony" Harden voted in favor of the action and Alderman Joe "Pepe" Zambrano voted against it.

There will be a 25 per cent increase in the charge for garbage collection at residences and a 50 per cent increase for pickup at Commercial places.

By raising the fees, the City during the next eight months expects to take in an additional \$4,832 from 1,208 residential accounts and \$3,668 from 138 commercial accounts. The projected revenue shortage for the next eight months had been \$8,376.

As one city official explained, "Picking up garbage always has been a losing proposition for the city since we haven't been charging as much as the service costs. Now, we'll come closer to breaking even."

In other actions, the Council:

—Awarded to Commercial Motors, Aransas Pass Ford dealer, a contract for a half-ton pickup for \$2,664.59 and a 1½-ton truck for \$4,349.70. Low bidder was Azenhoffer Chevrolet of Victoria with a bid of \$2,615.45 for a half-ton pickup and \$4,248.73 for a 1½-ton truck. Geo. Clark Chevrolet of Aransas Pass and Charlie Thomas Courtesy Ford of Corpus Christi submitted higher bids.

—Authorized Mayor Delmar R. Hiller to sign an agreement in behalf of the city for operation of the Key Allegro Island water system. The agreement now goes to Key Allegro Development and Sales Company for its signature. Key Allegro previously had approved the agreement, with one suggested change which the city agreed to.

—Approved a number of change orders in connection with the storm sewer project for additional lateral lines and other needed work which will cost about \$32,000. An attempt will be made to get a 50 per cent grant from the U.S. Housing and Urban Development Agency. Herman Johnson reported that the project originally was estimated to cost \$319,880.89, and so far the cost has been \$324,364.81, with the additional cost resulting mainly from readjusting lines.

—Approved a Central Power and Light Company plan for street lighting in Little Bay (Continued on Page 8)

### Freddy Jackson to Be On Ed Sullivan Show

Frederick B. Jackson will sing on national television Sunday night in the Texas A&M Singing Cadets appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show.

The 45-member Texas A&M glee club will be back Sergio Franchi in a guest appearance and perform one separate number. Franchi will sing "No Man Is An Island." The Singing Cadets' separate number will be "Sunshine in My Soul," a gospel rock selection.

The Ed Sullivan Show will be the Cadets' second national TV performance in as many months. The all-male group was featured on the Miss Teenage America Pageant in December. They returned recently from a seven day, 14-performance concert tour in South Texas.

Franchi, a guest star on the Miss Teenage America TV special, made it possible for the Texas A&M group's Sullivan show appearance. The Cadets supported Franchi numbers on the December special.

Jackson, a sophomore pre-medical student, is the son of Mrs. James B. Jackson. The Rockport-Fulton High School graduate sings bass with the Singing Cadets.

### May Offer Driver Education Course

The Rockport-Fulton High School plans to offer a course in driver education if there is enough interest.

The plan would be to start two classes on Saturday morning, Jan. 30, and have each of these classes meet for two one-hour periods during each week from 5:15 p.m. to 6:15 p.m.

These classes would meet until a minimum of 32 hours of classroom instruction had been given. The maximum number of students to be enrolled would be 70. The driving phase would start about a month after the classroom phase had begun.

A third or more classes might be offered if there is enough demand and if teachers can be secured. These classes will probably start on May 31 and run each day except Sunday until a minimum of 32 clock hours of classroom instruction has been given. The driving will be scheduled within a three-week period during the summer.

Those students who will be 15 years old as of the first day of classroom instruction are eligible to take this course (State Law and Texas Education Agency policy). A laboratory fee \$15 will be charged.

If demand is such, students will be placed in class according to highest grade classification and oldest age, starting with the 12th grade and coming down through the 9th grade. Choice of class will be given to the highest grade level student and the oldest on the basis of paying the \$15 laboratory fee before Jan. 27.

Those students, regardless of grade and age, who pay after Jan. 27, will be placed in a class if there is one available. Their names will be placed on a list in the order of date and payment of the laboratory fee.

### Rotarians View Environmental Film

South Texas' wealth of natural beauty was featured in a color motion picture titled "A Day in Nature's School," presented at a weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary Club Wednesday at Corky's Restaurant.

The film, produced for Central Power and Light Co., and presented by Bill Jenecsek, Rockport manager for the company, stressed the importance of preserving our environmental heritage, including clean water and air which make possible the area's wealth of plant and animal life.

Aransas National Wildlife Refuge with its whooping cranes, alligators and many species of birds was featured in the film which was designed to emphasize the need for everyone to help preserve an environment compatible with the needs of nature.

The wheels were officially put into action Tuesday by Aransas County Navigation District for a \$1 million channel and harbor improvement project that would create many new jobs and greatly promote the economic growth of this area.

Navigation District Commissioners Matt Scott, Dick Rox and David Maguglin authorized Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam, Inc., Corpus Christi engineering firm, to complete plans, drawings and specifications for the project and submit an application to the Economic Development Agency for a \$500,000 grant.

E.D.A. will be asked to approve the grant, contingent upon successful passage of a \$500,000 bond issue election to be called by the Navigation District and to be voted on by voters of Aransas County.

Attending the Navigation District meeting, in addition to the commissioners, were many leaders of this community who expressed enthusiasm regarding the project.

Such men as Emory M. Spencer, oil operator and land owner, and James H. Sorenson, Jr., president of First National Bank of Rockport, pointed out that the main industries of this area are tourism, shrimping, boat building, the oil business, real estate and home building and related services, and they added that the project would give impetus to the local economy for many years to come.

Tentative plans for the projects, as outlined by Jim Barnette of Lockwood, Andrews & Newnam, included:

—A new main entrance channel off the Intracoastal Canal into Fulton Harbor.

—New entrance channel into Rockport Harbor and to Key Allegro Bay.

—Increase size of Cove Harbor.

John P. Mitchell, Jr., vice president of Rockport Yacht and Supply Company, predicts that the local shrimp industry, which now produces approximately \$2 million a year, "could double its income if the harbors and access channels at Rockport and Fulton are deepened so the producers can handle deeper draft trawlers of greater productivity."

He also said that dredging of the access channel to the control depth of the Intracoastal Canal "will materially increase the kind and volume (Continued on Page 8)

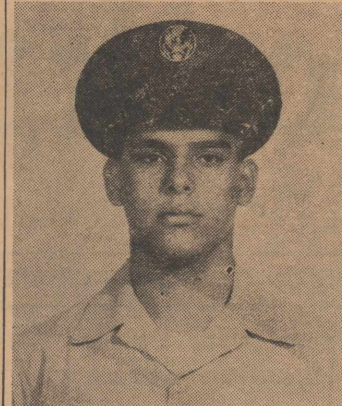

### Education Benefits Signed Into Law By President Nixon

President Nixon has signed into law new education benefits for wives and children of prisoners of war, and for servicemen who have served 181 days of active duty rather than two years as was previously required.

The new benefits become effective Dec. 24, 1970, according to P. J. Mims, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Houston.

The reduction in the active duty requirement to 181 days also applies to the eligibility of servicemen for GI loan guarantee benefits, Mr. Mims said. This broadened eligibility makes it possible for men and women to use their GI Bill benefits sooner still in military service, Mims explained.

Under the new law, the wives and children of those members of the Armed Forces on active duty who have been listed for more than 90 days as missing in action, captured, "or forcibly detained or interned in the line of duty by a foreign government of power," are eligible for educational benefits.

For apprenticeship and on the job training courses under the GI Bill, servicemen are required to take 120 hours of training per month to receive full training allowance, and a lesser number of hours result in a proportionate reduction in the allowance.

Full-time training, Mr. Mims explained, contemplates a work week of at least 30 hours unless collective bargaining has established a lesser standard for a work week.

### Don't Forget W-2's

Tax refunds cannot be paid without required W-2 withholding tax certificates and credit cannot be given for taxes withheld, according to Asa L. Crow, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service, Corpus Christi.

Taxpayers were also reminded that in preparing a joint 1970 return where both parties worked, W-2's for each must be attached. And when either or both parties filing a return held more than one job during the year, all W-2's must be attached. W-2's should be attached to the back and top of Form 1040.

A taxpayer who has not received his W-2 Form should contact his employer before checking with IRS. If the employer has gone out of business, the taxpayer should contact him or the present owner of the business. If the Form W-2 is still not available, then the taxpayer should prepare his income tax return from the best information at hand, file his return by the April 15 deadline, and attach a note explaining why the Form W-2 is missing.

**Draft Calls 1,185 Men for February**

Austin. — Col. Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, announced the February draft call for Texas today. The state will induct 1,185 men, and all will be called from the Extended Priority Selection Group for 1971.

Glantz explained that the Extended Priority Group includes all Selective Service registrants who were classified in Class I-A, I-A-O, or I-O on Dec. 31, 1971 and whose lottery number was reached by their local boards in ordering men for induction in 1970, but who, for one reason or another, were not ordered to report for induction. This group is made up of registrants who were born between 1944 and 1950 and who have not reached their 26th birthday.

The State Director emphasized that local boards will call men from the 1971 First Priority Selection Group only if the call cannot be filled with men from the Extended Priority Selection Group.

Colonel Glantz further explained that the 1971 First Priority Group is made up of registrants born in calendar year 1951 who are currently classified in Class I-A, I-A-O, or I-O.

Glantz noted that the February call of 1,185 men is up from the January call, which was 905 men from Texas. The national call for February is 17,000 men, all for the Army.

Local boards in Texas are ordering 3,337 men to take their pre-induction physical examinations in February.

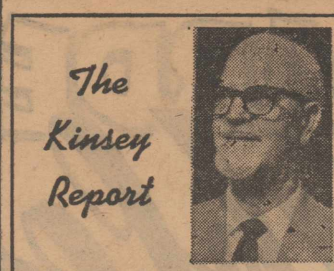
