Possibly as much as \$3 million

## '88 crop deficiency payments being made

Final Deficiency payments for 1988 cotton, which may total as much as \$3 million, began being sent out Thursday to local farmers by the Mitchell County ASCS office.

The deficiency payment is the difference in the established target price of cotton and the average market price that was received for the cotton, for those that participated in the federal farm program. This year, the target price was set at 75.9 cents per pound. The average market price was 56.5 cents. Thus, participating farmers are being paid at a rate of 19.4 cents per pound.

The exact total amount of the payments is not available at this time, because the ASCS office is having to deduct for amounts received under the disaster aid program, and some of the farmers elected to take up to 6.4 cents per

pound in advance payments, which also have to be accounting for.

However, it is estimated that the total in Mitchell County may reach as much as \$3 million.

The local ASCS office also reminded local farmers that Friday, February 24 is the deadline for the current CRP sign-up period. As of Friday, 13 additional landowners had submitted bids, which in the past have been around \$40 per acre for the land placed in the conservation program for 10 years.

Prior to the current sign-up period, 176 farms, representing 68% of the allowed amount, had placed acreage in the program. This totals 32,740 acres out of over 49,000 total allowed, of highly erodeable land that has been taken out of production.

## 728-8114 new phone number at airport

As part of the improvements being made at the Colorado City Municipal Airport, a new pay telephone number has been activated.

For any person needing to reach the airport, the new number is 728-8114.

The improvement project nearing completion at a cost of approximately \$6,500 includes the remodeling of the lounge area and restrooms and the installation of a large covered canopy. Mitchell County gave some \$2,500 toward to cost of the canopy, and about \$4,000 in budgeted funds were made available from the City.

Most of the work has been performed by Woody Crabtree, W. A. Findley and Jerry Don Lewis with help from several local pilots.

The new improvements will help to facilitate numerous flights coming into the airport by business aircraft.

## Strangulation involved in Big Spring woman's death

Suspected "foul play" in a reported drowning incident at Lake Colorado City last June, was confirmed the past week with the receipt of an autopsy report that indicated a Big Spring woman's death was the result of an apparent homicide.

Sheriff Wendell Bryant said his office's investigations over the past eight months had been turned over to the 32nd District Attorney's office, and the case was to be presented to the Mitchell County grand jury Friday, Feb. 24.

Tammy Lynn Gray, 30, was pronounced dead about 4:30 a.m. June 23, 1988 at Mitchell County Hospital after the woman's husband took her to the hospital.

At the time, the Sheriff reported that the woman and her husband, Travis Gray, apparently were swimming in an area about a half mile south of Cooper's Cove on the east side of the lake about 3 a.m. when the incident occurred. The Sheriff's office received a call at 3:39 a.m. of a

"drowning", and Deputy O. D. Majors was dispatched to the scene. However, by the time Majors arrived the man had managed to take his wife, clad in a one-piece bathing suit, to the hospital. Resuscitation procedures failed to revive the woman and she was pronounced dead by Dr. Dee Roach. Due to the nature of the death and the circumstances of the report, Justice of the Peace Joan Merket ordered the autopsy. Gray was also hospitalized at the time for treatment of shock.

The autopsy report received early this week indicated evidence of abrasions and bruises on the woman's face and neck areas, and that she had died "as a result of the combined effects of strangulation and drowning."

There had been reports of argument between the couple and they had apparently been drinking the night of the incident.

Mrs. Gray had been employed as a teller at First National Bank in Big Spring.

## City in running for grant

City Councilwoman Dee Hearn has reported that it appears that Colorado City may be "in the money" in its application for a \$181,849 grant from Texas Community Improvement funds, and that Loraine appears to have been assured a grant.

Hearn attended the initial hearing at the West Central Council of Governments in Abilene recently.

She reported that Colorado City is presently in a three-way with Comanche and Rule for the balance of funds available through the program, based on a points system devised to determine greatest need.

She explained that a total of \$1,183,533 is available for this WCTCOG region.

The cities, type of program, amount of requested grant and points for the top places were as follows:

1. Santa Anna, water & sewer area, \$182,109, 297 points;
2. Goree, water & sewer area, \$99,560, 293 points;

3. Woodson, water & sewer direct, \$243,636, 292 points;
4. Miles, water & sewer area, \$229,640, 289 points;
5. Loraine, water & sewer area, \$142,350, 287 points.

The first five places amount to \$897,745 of the total available.

Tied for sixth place for the balance of \$285,788 with 286 points each are:

- Comanche, water & sewer

- direct, \$146,350;
- Colorado City, water & sewer area, \$181,849;
- And Rule, multi-purpose, \$250,000.

The next hearing on the proposed projects and grants will be a technical committee meeting to be held within the next month in Austin. Colorado City representatives plan to be present for See GRANT, Page 2

## Cable alert system installed

A Civil Emergency Alert System has been placed into operation by Landmark Cablevision, local manager Tex Thackerson has announced.

Purpose of the CEAS is to alert or give warning to more than 2,500 cable subscribers in the im-

mediate Colorado City and Lake Colorado City area, of any impending dangers from weather, crime threats, chemical spills, flooding, and other disaster that might arise.

Thackerson said that the alert system in no way replaces the

present civil defense or national weather alerts, but is another means of communication for other dangers that might develop.

The system, located at the company's main tower is activated by coded telephone call.

## For The Record...

THE LONE WOLF SAYS "Things turn out best for those who make the best of the way things turn out."

Due to space limitation and the near-midnight writing to least summarize the actions of the 3-hour meeting of the City Council Tuesday night, there were some sidebar incidents deserving some additional comment:

Local television viewers were startled when their programs were interrupted about 9:45 p.m. for a test civil emergency alert message, demonstrated for the Council by Councilman Rex Thackerson of Landmark Cablevision. Mayor Jim Baum, asked to read a prepared script for the demonstration, in his usual style, threw in a couple of ad libs, not realizing that test had actually interrupted EVERY channel of over 2,500 cable subscribers. A pet project of Dale Mathis, the demonstration proved the effectiveness of the newly installed warning system.

Who would have believed that there are numerous fire hydrants that are faulty and will not work, and even some with only enough pressure to provide little more than a tickle of water. Be aware of those that have tops painted black and those covered over and hidden by weed and foliage growth. Even more reason for Colorado City to work to win the 3-way tie for the Texas Community Improvement Grant for a water and sewer project.

At first believing it only a "penny ante" game, the Rev. Ernest Bailey had to quickly withdraw this intended pun "How can WE get this..." after finding out that the Bingo proceeds can pull in as much as \$150,000. But he still protested, indicating that there

must be other ways to raise funds for the good fire department.

The Chamber requested more fund-raising events per organization at the Civic Center. Oscar Ortiz, president of LULAC requested at least four, which was eventually approved. Ortiz also complained that at one or more recent LULAC-sponsored dances, only one police officer was on duty rather than two. Mayor Baum assured him there would always be two in the future. Less than 24 hours later, the State LULAC president charged continuing minority harassment and lack of protection at LULAC events in Colorado City ... news travels fast... almost as swift as that from "a source close to the grand jury".

A bit of "hide and seek" developed with a report of \$15,516 spent thus far on handicap access remodeling expense, which soon turned into \$26,516 and headed for \$51,000 with "do-it-yourself" efforts. Having twice turned down outside bids that had exceeded the approximate \$28,000 budgeted, it left the Council confused.

Good Friday got kicked around a bit and it was doubly tough for the council to reduce the number of holidays from 14 to 10, in light of no pay raises next year. But some city employees had accumulated excessively high "comp time", one as much as \$4,000, for holidays worked. The unusually high number of holidays had developed over the years, given in lieu of other benefits, resulting in unaffordable financial obligations.

It appears that the Council does, indeed, need to open its meetings with prayer by local clergymen as proposed by Thackerson, and approved after he was appointed to head the Chaplain Committee, but not without opposition.

## Jury hears billing dispute between doctors

A 32nd District Court petit jury spent almost two days hearing arguments between Dr. Don R. Bennett and Dr. Richard L. Schaffer, through their respective attorneys in a civil dispute over accounts receivable collections between the two parties.

Although the ruling was in favor of Dr. Bennett, the jury awarded no damages.

## Cong. Stenholm supports revised handgun bill

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced last week that he is supporting legislation which provides local law enforcement a seven day period to check the background of handgun purchasers prior to final sale. The Brady bill, as it is more commonly known, will apply only to dealer sales of handguns and not to personal transfers.

"I am co-sponsoring this bill because I believe this legislation could be an effective, workable law to reduce violent crime associated with handguns," Stenholm said. Congressman Stenholm supported similar legislation in the 100th Congress. Modifications have been made in the new bill to lessen the controversial issues associated with gun laws. The first of two major changes to last year's bill involves the period of time local law enforcement officials would keep records on approved handgun purchases. The new bill allows records to be kept no longer than 30 days and any copy or transfer of the record must be destroyed. The second change has to do with gun description. No handgun description would be required by the new form.

"There are changes in the language of the new bill, some of which I helped draft," Congressman Stenholm said. "The changes ensure that this legislation does not propose any type of owner or handgun registration. Despite claims by the National Rifle Association (NRA), last year's Brady amendment neither

registered owners or their handguns, nor was it a means to confiscate handguns. Last year's legislation was not perfect, but we have cleaned up some of the areas that caused problems with the NRA, creating a better bill. I think the NRA still won't support it, but they're going to have a harder time finding fault with it."

The Brady bill, named for former President Ronald Reagan's Press Secretary, James Brady, who was severely wounded during the assassination attempt on Reagan in 1981. James and Sarah Brady are strong advocates of the bill.

The Congressman said, "It concerns me that in Texas and 27 other states, any individuals—regardless of mental state—can purchase a firearm without a verification of his background. What we are seeking is a cooling off period that would apply before the purchase of a firearm; time to find out if the buyer has a problematic background and enforce federal law which already prohibits their possession of a firearm."

When activated the television screens of all cable subscribers on all channels are blacked out, a warning sound is emitted, and then the audio message is transmitted over the telephone.

Thackerson said plans are for only two persons to have the ability to use the system—the City Mayor and the City Fire Chief.

The system that was installed at a cost of about \$4,500, was originally instigated by Dale Mathis, when active manager of the company prior to his health problems, and just recently completed.

The system was first tested in a demonstration for the City Council during its meeting Tuesday night, and obviously worked well in getting the attention of cable viewers. Thackerson said the system would be tested about twice a year, hopefully at least disruptive times, to be sure the system is operating properly.

## Classes For Job

Work-related educational expenses may be deductible. Generally, to claim a deduction for most qualifying work-related educational expenses, a Form 2106, "Employee Business Expenses," must be completed and attached to the Form 1040. Only those educational expenses reimbursed by an employer and reported on Form W-2 or a Form 1099 may be deducted as an adjustment to gross income. Any expenses in excess of such reimbursed amounts generally may be claimed as a miscellaneous deduction on Schedule A (Form 1040). However, miscellaneous deductions are deductible only to the extent the total exceeds two percent of adjusted gross income. 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# CISD educators participating in Effective Schools Project

Eight representatives from the Colorado Independent School District are participants in the Effective Schools Project at Tarleton State University in Stephenville.

Involved in the program are Jerry Reynolds, principal, and Kitten Arthur of Colorado High School; James McLean, principal, and Sonya Hanks of middle school; Juan Espinoza, principal, and Janet Mayo of Kelley Elementary; and Bobby Lemons, principal, and Rita Hardegree of Hutchinson Elementary.

ESP is a school improvement program sponsored by TSU's Department of Education and Psychology. This is the first time the program has been offered and there are some 80 educators representing 26 schools across Texas currently participating.

The year-long program is aimed at helping school administrators and faculty evaluate and improve their current programs. Each school is represented by a campus team consisting of a principal and one

or two classroom teachers. ESP holds seminars once a month on the TSU campus with nationally prominent educators and researchers discussing their areas of expertise. The schools also receive individualized assistance from a Tarleton consultant. The university mentor visits the school and helps make evaluations about what can be done to improve the educational process in their particular situation.

"We were encouraged to develop this program by several of our school districts," said Dr. Jim Boyd, dean of the College of Education and Fine Arts at Tarleton. "We feel that if schools are going to make significant improvements in the teaching/learning process, those improvements must come from within rather than externally mandated. Our seminars and on-site visits to the schools are aimed at helping the representatives examine what they are doing and help formulate ideas for school improvement."

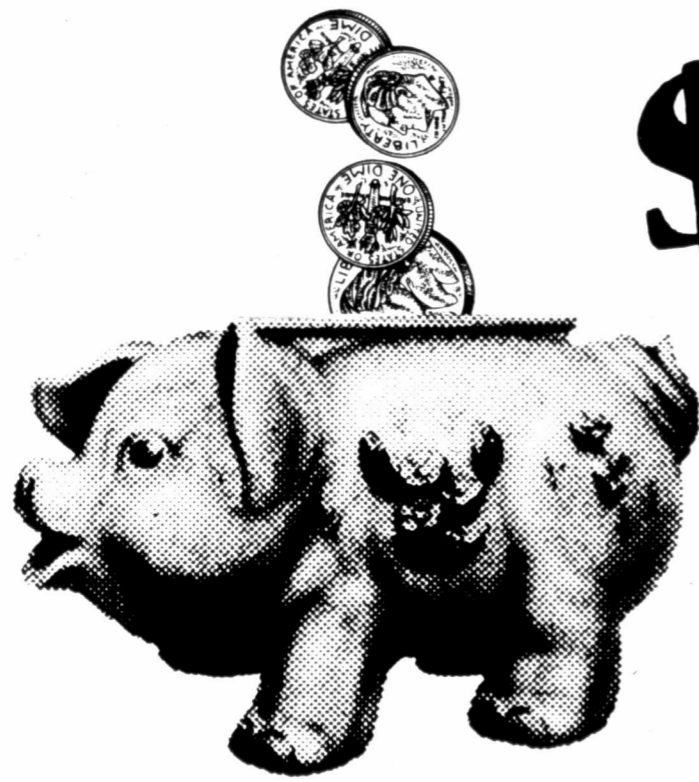

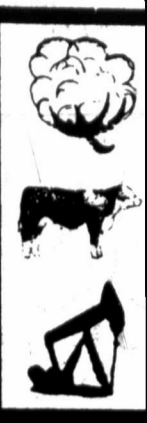
