Pilot Project Slated

C-City Spot For Arts & Crafts?

Local civic leaders have launched an effort to make Colorado City an arts and crafts center that could attract unique shops and small factories to this area.

The effort was endorsed by the Colorado City Industrial Team after Bob and Dale Creighton, owners and operators of Iron Star Pottery, suggested such a project to industrial team members.

The Creightons, who recently moved from Big Spring with the help of the Industrial Team, said they have talked to a number of artisans and craftsmen who have the knowledge to put out good products but have no idea on marketing the goods. Through his efforts in getting Iron Star Pottery started, Cre-

ighton said he now knows how merchandise can be marketed and where to go and who to see to get products on the market.

The benefits that Colorado City could derive from being an arts and crafts center are many, Creighton noted.

Foremost, he pointed out, making Colorado City an arts and crafts center would help the local economy, creating more jobs. In addition, many arts and crafts shops could be put into local empty buildings and these empty buildings could be decorated around a central theme to give Colorado City a unique look.

It was pointed out that a master plan for Colorado City calls for the redoing of downtown buildings to look like buildings in the 1880's to fit in with the

opera house, police station, museum, all of which could be done at little expense with the use of paint and shingles.

Making Colorado City an arts and crafts center would also help pull people off Interstate 20 and get them to stop here, Creighton emphasized.

He pointed out that travelers are looking for interesting places to stop and shop. Should Colorado City provide a number of unique arts and crafts shops where tourists can stop and shop, they will stop and spend money, Creighton pointed out.

Creighton said that thru the use of placemats at local restaurants, he has been successful in getting people off the Interstate and into his Iron Star Gallery.

The Industrial Team asked Creighton to get one such project underway as a pilot project to determine if the idea would work.

Creighton pointed out that Colorado City is the ideal community for such an arts and crafts center as this area has a very unique history and that

Bale Count At 7,552

Mitchell County's gin have processed 7,552 bales, with about 230 more on the gin yards to be finished during slack time caused by freezing rain and sleet Christmas Day and misting Saturday morning.

All gins show an increase over last week's count, aided by good drying conditions during the early part of the week.

Not all of the ginned cotton was produced from Mitchell County fields. The bale counts from county gins shows the following:

--Buford Co-op Gin, 1,465 bales ginned and a clean yard.

--China Grove Co-op Gin, 1,752 bales ginned and about 20 on the yard.

--Colorado Gin Co., 243 bales.

--Farmers Gin in Colorado City, 472 bales ginned and a clean yard.

--Lorraine Co-op Gin, 1,900 bales ginned and about 200 on the yard.

--Plauters Gin in Westbrook, 466 bales and none on the yard.

--Producers Co-op Gin in Colorado City, 1,254 bales ginned and about 10 on the yard.

Colorado City's girls basketball team entered the Slaton Tournament over the holiday weekend and they lost their first game in the tourney to defending state champions, Slaton, 84-17.

In Friday's second round game, the girls were close to winning over Borden Co. when two guards, Myrtle Scott and Sharon Prince, fouled off in the last four minutes of play, putting the final score at 54-37.

Third quarter score was 30-27 in Borden Co.'s favor and it was 35-34 with only four minutes to go in the game. Co-

ach Carol Dakan said that the loss of the two key guards caused Colorado City to lose control of the ball and they could only score three more points as Borden Co. took the final scoring surge on for the win.

Scoring leaders in the first game with Slaton were Leslie Greenlee with 9 points, Beverly Fuller, 5 and Karen Thomas, 3. In the final game, Greenlee scored 15 points, Fuller, 14 and Thomas, 8.

Keep Production Records Separate

Pointing out that producers need to file production records for each cotton allotment farm each year, ASCS executive director Don Stewart emphasized the importance of identifying all cotton harvested with the farm on which it was grown.

"The producer who is operating more than one farm should take care not to commingle the cotton from his farms. Separate production evidence is required from each farm in order to establish future payment yields. It's also needed in determining eligibility for and amount of disaster payments," Stewart said. One Of Longtime City Businessmen Retires

Luke Thomas has sold his interest in Thomas Brothers Texaco Service Station to his brother, Glenn, and plans to retire Jan. 1.

Luke Thomas first started in the business with Jim Cantrell, Sept. 15, 1930, in the

present location. He was joined by his older brother, Bill, in 1932, and together they bought the business.

In 1938, Luke bought Bill's interest and in 1941, Glenn bought an interest in the station.

Luke said that an interest in playing football led him in a roundabout way into the service station business. He was born and raised in Lorraine and attended school there until the 9th grade, when he transferred to Colorado City in order to play football under coach Jim Cantrell.

The 1925 and 1926 teams were successful, winning district against Sweetwater, Snyder and Big Spring teams. When Luke graduated from CHS in 1928, he attended Texas Tech College in Lubbock for a year but when he came home that summer, he said his father needed his help in getting the cotton crop gathered, so he stayed to help gather the crop, "which wasn't worth much, as prices had dropped," he said. So, to tide him over until he could go back to Tech, Thomas said he started working for his old coach, Cantrell.

"I never did get back to Tech," Thomas said, "because the Depression was on and then I got married and had a family."

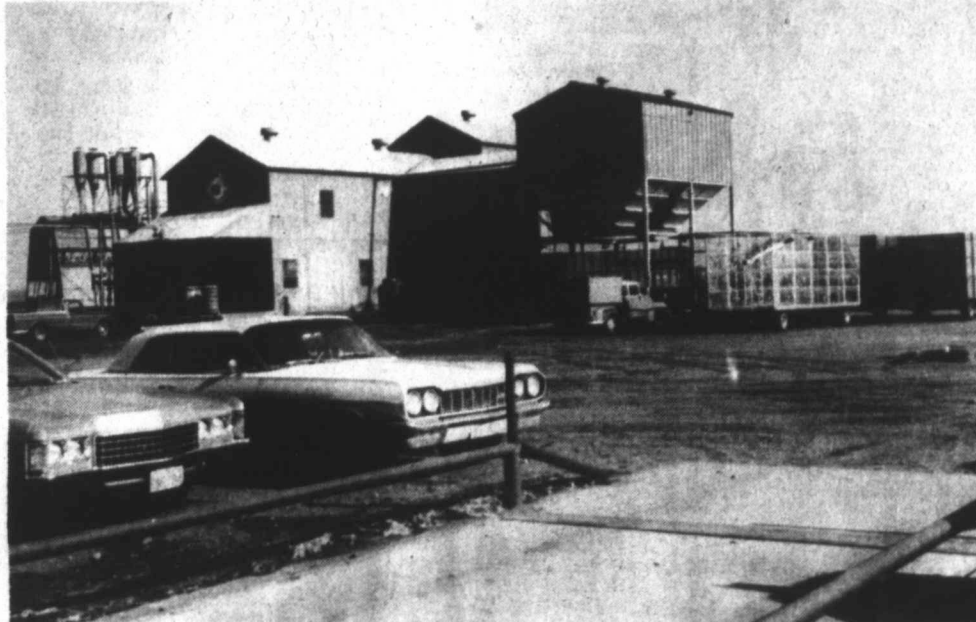
The family is his wife, Lucile, and son Terry and daughter Rosemary, both now living in Dallas. Terry is married and has a 2-year old daughter, Amy. Rosemary teaches in the Dallas school system.

Thomas said that the little granddaughter is one of the reasons he is looking forward to retiring, "so that Lucile and I can go down there to see her more often," he said. He also likes to hunt and fish and might even play some dominoes, he said.

Thomas is particularly proud that some of his customers have been coming in to the station to get their cars serviced since he started in the business. He has sold Goodyear tires for the past 45 years and Texaco gasoline for the past 10 years.

He also mentioned a couple of celebrities who came into the station, Gabby Hayes and Smiley Burnett, movie stars in the Westerns that used to show in Saturday afternoon serials at the movie house that used to be across the street from the station.

"Back then, a sack of groceries cost only a dollar, but nobody had a dollar," Thomas said, "and I sure don't want to see that happen again."

Recipe for using electricity more efficiently for cooking.

When cooking foods in liquid — whether in an electric skillet, crock pot, Dutch oven or on your range — use the lowest heat setting that will maintain a boil.

Don't open the oven door unnecessarily. Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time.

For toasting bread, use a toaster or portable toaster-oven instead of your range oven. The smaller appliances are more efficient for this job.

Reduce cooking time by thawing meats before cooking them. When recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance — usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

Use flat-bottomed pans.

The flatter the pan, the better the contact with the electric unit. Be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. Match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

Plan one-dish meals that can be cooked in a portable electric appliance such as a skillet, deep fat fryer, Dutch oven or crock pot.

- ☐ Don't keep the refrigerator or freezer door open any longer than necessary.
- ☐ Turn off the lights when you leave a room.
- ☐ Turn off the TV set when no one is watching it.
- ☐ Turn off the radio or record player when no one is listening.
- ☐ Be sure the hot water is turned off after you've used it. Remind your mom or dad when a faucet leaks and needs repairing.
- ☐ Don't turn on more lights than you really need.
- ☐ If the furnace or air-conditioner is running, keep the doors closed. And don't make unnecessary trips in and out of the house.
- ☐ Ride the bus whenever you can, rather than asking your parents to drive you.
- ☐ Ride your bike or walk to the store for your parents. If they don't run the car, they will save gasoline.

☐ Help plan family errands that require the car so they can all be done at one time.

☐ If you're a little cool, don't ask your parents to turn up the thermostat. A sweater will warm you up.

☐ Tell your parents if heating or cooling ducts are blocked by furniture or draperies.

☐ If no one uses a particular room, close the heat registers and keep the door shut.

☐ If you're helping with cooking, use an element that is about the same size as the pan. And don't be an oven peeper.

☐ If the sun is shining on a cold day, open the drapes so the sun can help heat up your house.

☐ If you have a fireplace, be sure the damper is closed when there is no fire. Otherwise, heat will escape up the chimney.

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"Time To Pray"

Please think for a few minutes about time and about prayer. Charlie Shedd, a clergyman, wrote a book entitled *The Exciting Church--Where People Really Pray*. I want to share a quote from that with you. He is speaking mostly to ministers (the clergy), but I think we can all hear it and certainly apply it to our own situation and/or vocation. He says:

"Almost everyone these days has too much to do and too little time. So with the pastor. Committees to organize. Calling (visiting). Meetings to attend. Sermons to prepare. Money to help raise. Hurt feelings. Emergencies. Hospitals to check. Bad news. Accidents. Weddings. Wedding rehearsals. Death calls. Funerals. Counseling. Some we can help.

Some too far out for us. Mimeographing. Sunday School. Boy Scouts. Girl Scouts. Denominational programs. Causes. Drives. Meanwhile back at the parsonage our own children needing a father. And a wife wonders, 'How much do I matter?' What man on his own is big enough for all this? Nobody, I know. Which may be one more reason why so many are checking out, breaking down, or staying and suffering. So here's an observation from one who's run the gamut. I've been from little church to medium church, from medium church to big church. I've gone from big church to giant church and then back to little church again. In retrospect, I'm inclined to think that size doesn't matter all that much.

A pastor can be harassed and harried among the masses. He can be harassed and harried with a handful. Or he can be at peace in either setting. And the difference is in his prayer life. This has been my experience and this is my witness: The more time I spend in prayer, the better I do whatever needs doing for Him."

To this I would like to add three verses from Paul's letter to the Ephesians (5: 15-17) "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise men but as wise, making the most of time, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is."

May the year that lies ahead be a good one for you and yours is my hope and prayer.

Mrs. Keith told of the gifts of the Magi: gold, frankincense and myrrh. Gold was a precious metal in ancient times as it is today. When Christ was born, gold was far more rare than it is now and was a noble treasure, possessed only by kings and noblemen. "In any case, it was in love and reverence that the wise men offered to the Christ child the most precious stuff that the ancient world knew."

"Frankincense is a resin from a kind of tree held so sacred of old that in southern Arabia and Ethiopia, where it

grew, only a few particularly pure persons were allowed even to approach it." From this resin, incense is made, and it burns with a sweet, heavy perfume of mystery the wise men through pleasing to God. Frankincense was another gift which they brought to the Christ child.

The word myrrh means "bitter" in Hebrew. It is also sap from a shrub much like Frankincense. The ancient Egyptians used it in embalming and was a strange gift for an infant king.

For her part of the program, Mrs. Dona Reed spoke of the origin of many of our Christmas customs. The Christmas tree originated in Germany, but Christmas legends of trees have been told for many centuries.

She told of how the poinsettia became the flower of Christmas, beginning as a small weed in Mexico, and then cultivated into a brilliant and flamboyant blossom.

Another symbol of Christmas is the candle. "For centuries, the light of candles has symbolized the enlightenment that Jesus brought to the earth."

"An old German belief was that the Virgin Mary and a host of angels passed over the countryside on Christmas Eve. A candle was placed in the window to guide them to a home where they might come in and eat, if they wished, and it was traditional to leave food upon the table."
