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SHAKE-UPS IN TEAM STANDINGS FEATURE BIG LEAGUE PLAY

Fourth Annual Abernathy Track Meet Is Under Way

BOTH CIRCUITS SEE NEW CLUBS PUSH TO FRONT

GIANTS TAKE TOP PLACE IN NATIONAL; MACKS GRAB ANOTHER

(By Associated Press)

New York Giants again played in the marching music for the National league parade today after a wild scramble for choice places in the line.

With a flurry of extra base blows that subdued the Braves in a ding-dong melee by 4-3, the Gotham contenders profited yesterday by an overwhelming defeat of the Pirates to clinch undisputed possession of first place. At the same time the Quakers and Cardinals moved up into second place, while there was a general shakeup in the American league which affected no less than five teams.

Got But Seven Hits

The Giants plucked only seven safe blows from the pitching of Bob Smith, but four of them scored for extra bases. One, a home run by Eddie Houch, and another for two bases by Eddie Farrell, figured in rallies which turned the tide in favor of the Gotham entry.

Pittsburgh's tumble from a seat on the peak was no light fall. The Pirates went down hard in a cloud of dust before a blast of seventeen Chicago hits. A nine run rampage in the second inning blew up the contest, which bristled all the way with showers of clouting and ended finally in a lop-sided count of 16-4.

The rebellious Phillies were scarcely less vigorous in their treatment of four Brooklyn pitchers, but it required a home run in the ninth by Russell Wrightstone to clinch the game.

Bases Are Full

Wrightstone's round trip blow arrived while the bases were jammed to capacity and contributed the high-power slam of a five run rally.

The only skirmish in the league unmarked by a parade of pitchers from slush, to showers produced a 3-1 victory for the Cardinals under the brilliant pitching by Flint Rhem. Carl Mays, opposing them on the mound, gave only five hits, but four of them went for extra bases.

Second, third, fourth, sixth and seventh places in the American all held new tenants today as the result of a general spring house cleaning.

An eleven inning defeat of the Browns by the White Sox enabled the Athletics to swing into second position on the crest of another huge hitting wave. The Senators, caught under the billow, were dropped from third to fourth, while Detroit pushed the Indians off the sixth place shelf.

Athletics Win Easily

Six Washington hurlers ran to cover under the Macklin storm of hits, the Athletics winning easily by 15-7. It was the only pronounced slugfest party of the day in the circuit, however, for pitching duels dominated the Cleveland-Detroit and St. Louis-Chicago battles, with the Sox clinching their game in the eleventh by 2-1, and the Tigers staging a five run seventh inning spurt to beat off the Indians at 6-5.

Pacific Coast Track Teams May Not Enter Meets in East and Middle West In Future

LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 29.—The Pacific Intercollegiate to be staged here early in June presages the time when track teams of far western colleges will be absent from the larger meets in the east and middle west.

Western track fans, who have clamored for a big meet of their own, feel that this meet will in time rank in importance with the I. C. 4-A staged at Cambridge, Mass., and Philadelphia in alternate years and the N. C. A. A. staged annually at Stagg Field, Chicago.

The cost of sending twelve to fifteen men to the larger eastern meets and the cry for a meet on the Pacific coast explain why Pacific coast teams may desert the big eastern meets.

California's Big Three—Stanford, California and Southern California—have run things their own way in recent years in the east, while the Oregon Aggies have proved winners in the middle west.

The Aggies have already cast their lot solely with the Pacific coast meet, while it has not been definitely decided whether California's Big Three will journey to the east this season.

They probably will. Southern California and Stanford, who finished first and second last year, feel duty-bound to attend. California's Bears, having three legs on the trophy, wish to obtain permanent possession of it.

But some day, the track teams of the Pacific coast may let eastern and middle-western teams decide their own championships without fear of being outdone.

LUBBOCK TAKES SWATFEST FROM AMHERST ENTRY

WESTERN SLUGGERS IN GOOD FORM AND WIN BY 26-2 TALLY

Swinging heavily against the offerings of the Amherst moundmen, the Westerners added another victory to their season's list by defeating the visiting nine of Lamb County in a free for all hitting exhibition with the final check-up of 26 to 2. The hitters of the homeliving machine sent Dickson, first moundman for the Pooleman, to the showers before the initial frame was finished. Nicholson, hefty hurler, relieved Dickson and would have turned in a good game but for the successive errors made by his teammates. SHANGHAI, April 29. (AP)—Chinese advisers from Nanking say General Chiang Kai-shek, moderate nationalist leader, has decided formally to declare war against the Hankow nationalists, and has ordered General Yang Sung to proceed against them with a punitive expedition of 80,000 men.

GIRLS BECOME STARS IN GOLF

"Old Man's Game" Found To Be Good One For Young Girls To Play

PINEHURST, N. C., April 29.—There was a time when golf was known as an old man's game. But this no longer is true, for with ever increasing popularity of the links the kids are having their day of glory.

Since the early days of Alexa Stirling, now Mrs. A. S. Fraser, the girls have been coming into their own in increasing numbers. Two youngsters who are climbing to golf fame are Peggy Wattles, 15, of Buffalo, N. Y., and Jane Broadwell, 14, of Longmeadow, Mass.

Peggy, a sister of Frank Wattles, captain of last year's Yale golf team, holds the Western New York State laurels and was well into the recent United North and South tournament before being halted.

She comes from the same school largely responsible for Glenn Collette's game. Peggy took up golf at Belleaire, Fla., under Alex Smith, following his instruction later at Miami and at the Westchester Biltmore Club in New York.

Her greatest thrill in golf came when she was only 11 years old in this way:

"I was playing in the Western New York championship when I drew Mrs. Joseph Bydolek, the champion. I had no idea, of course, of winning and it was just the thought that I was playing my first important tournament that thrilled me. Most everybody in the gallery thought the match was a great joke and Mrs. Bydolek smilingly suggested she would carry me around the course if I got tired. As it happened, I 'carried' her to the 17th green before losing 2 to 1."

Peggy holds the championship of her Lake Shore club and twice has won the Buffalo title. At present, she is a student at the Warrington Country School, Warrington, Va., and limits her golf to vacation periods.

Miss Broadwell began driving the white ball around the links three years ago under the direction of her father. She played her first major tournament in the North and South last year and

then lasted until the second round in the Shinnecott tournament. Later in the summer, she won the qualifying medal of the Westchester Women's tournament with 89 to get her greatest thrill and finished runner-up to Emily Rockwood, of New York.

said if the commission could grant both of the construction applications it should do so, if it was obliged to deny one, however, the commercial interests and population of the Texas territory immediately concerned preferred to have the Aransas Pass allowed to go on with its extension, they said. This would bring a new railroad into Brownsville they argued and would establish permanent competitive railroad service, whereas the San Benito application merely represented the addition of 68 spur tracks to an existing railroad.

The commission took the case under advisement and will render its decision later.

Explanation Is Made

"All the Southern Pacific proposes to do with its extension is to develop territory that is now rather well supplied with railroads," Andrews said. "It might be said that the Southern Pacific proposes to make two blades of grass grow where one grows now, where as the San Benito construction will result in two blades of grass growing where none grows now. The Southern Pacific line into Brownsville was naturally laid out to pass through the most productive portion of that territory."

In behalf of Texas communities affected, Cole stressed the competitive situation that would be produced by extension of the Aransas Pass line of the Southern Pacific into Brownsville. That city was the best terminal for the Southern Pacific, and located at a logical advance point, he said. The business interests of all the area were awaiting the Southern Pacific, he added, and desired the commission to understand that their interests required the granting of the application.

FEAR IS FELT FOR REFUGEES

Between 700 And 1,000 Who Are Marooned Said To Be Desperate

(By Associated Press)
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 29.—The plight of 700 to 1,000 persons who are still marooned in the flooded lowlands of Chicot county, Ark., was described as desperate today in a report to the Associated Press by Mayor J. C. Gillison of Lakeville.

"They are clinging to small rafts and floating trees in water 20 to 30 feet deep or packed like sardines in barn lofts and other places that have not been reached by the raging water," the mayor said.

"This number does not include 500 negroes I know to be huddled in barn lofts and other places on one plantation."

"Thirty motor boats worked all day yesterday rescuing the inhabitants of the lowlands and today the labor was resumed."

"We got reports of drownings every little while," the mayor said, "but can't verify them. I believe there have been miraculously few, however."

"The situation is as bad as it could be except that we are being blessed with good weather," the mayor continued.

Whole County Wiped Out
"There's not a dry spot in the whole of Chicot county except Eudora, which is on a high hill. Not a bridge in the county is left. Our town is virtually ruined—streets are being torn up and sewerage system destroyed."

"It will take two or three years for the town to return to normal and I don't know where the money is coming from to start over. Everybody is broke. Merchants have lost all of their stocks."

"Not a house in town is out of water although there are a few along the lake shore into which the water has not steadily come."

"Our water plant is flooded and we are drinking lake water which is not much better than the flood water. A horrible thing about conditions in the bottoms is that marooned people are having to drink the flood water in which horses and other animals are floating."

"There is no livestock left in the county."

Moody Is Economical RETURNS FUND TO STATE Cuts Expense Account

AUSTIN, April 29.—Reduction in the executive traveling and general mansion expense accounts allowed him was recommended Wednesday by Governor Dan Moody to the house appropriations committee.

Moody appeared before the committee insisting that it cut his traveling expense fund from \$750 to \$250; maintenance of the mansion from \$2,500 to \$2,000; labor and employes for mansion from \$2,000 to \$1,500; fuel, light, telephone and water for mansion from \$15,000 to \$10,000, and contingent expense fund from \$100 to nothing.

Representative Claude T. Granger, chairman of the committee, declared the "governor sought to have \$1,000 a year for traveling expenses" but the governor said \$250 is enough for him.

Representative Lee Satterwhite of Amarillo said he believes the various towns which invite Moody to be present at their gala affairs should pay his expenses.

"I have just returned a \$50 check to such a town," Moody replied.

Would Expand Trade Territory

The highway question apparently is holding full attention of the citizenship at large, and efforts are under way to have the improvement program re-opened.

Water Supply Stressed
Investigation and promotion of a permanent water supply also was suggested, with the remark that deep wells eventually will fail to supply the demands, closer co-operation and a better understanding between the farmer and business men also was mentioned, and meetings similar to

those recently held by the Kiwanis club were specifically cited as good for the creation of such a feeling. Other similar meetings under different captions, and attended by other members of the organization, are to be held in the near future, and simultaneously with these, members of the senior organization also in holding sessions.

FIRE AND BUSINESS COSTS

Another item in the growing list of economic practices by American business to keep down the costs of production—including cost accounting, simplification, and the elimination of wasteful trade practices—is the subject of a bulletin issued by the Insurance Department of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. This is the first publication among industries as carried on through trade associations.

"Experience in America has demonstrated," the Insurance Department says, "that a large part of our annual fire loss, which in 1925 totaled \$560,000,000, accrues in business establishments. Business men should have a direct interest in fire prevention whether they have experienced fire or not, because no property is immune from this prospective danger."

Whether or not this loss is reflected in the cost of the products it is recognized that an industry safeguarded against fire is in a better position to meet the strain of inter-industry competition than one not so protected. Fire, at least has a conspicuous place among the many items that lie in that borderland between profit and cost of production designated as overhead.

Methods by which trade associations can organize fire prevention work are outlined in the bulletin—Brownsville Herald.

Summer Schools To Have Quota Raised

AUSTIN, April 29. (AP)—Biennial appropriations for virtually all summer schools of the state higher educational institutions today were raised slightly from previous recommendations by the senate finance committee.

All state normal schools also were given slight increases. Texas university's summer school fund will be allowed \$75,000 and that of A. and M. college \$25,000, if the legislature accepts the committee's recommendations.

People Are Depressed

An animation of and bustle at Port Davis was in marked contrast to the scenes enacted at the concentration camp at the army base here where hundreds of the several thousand forced from their homes in the two southern parishes were gathered. Gaily from early morning they counted the hours until the flood waters would be released to rush across country inundating the homes where their life interests lay where they had lived and worked and where they ultimately will return when the waters have receded and the state has repaired the breach made in the levee.

State and city have guaranteed all of the residents compensation for the damage the waters may do to their property, but even in the face of this they temporarily gave up their homes with reluctance if not with stronger feelings. Some of the inhabitants of the two parishes refused to leave, preferring to remain and take their chances with the flood waters than to become refugees in a camp for six weeks or more.

Workers Are Busy

While a deliberate break was ordered in lower Louisiana, the Mississippi river higher up was smashing at the levees with such force that a large army of men worked night and day to strengthen those on the west bank in the hope that they could withstand the great flood crest bearing down toward Greenville, Miss., today and augmented below by the return of flood waters to the parent stream from the Mississippi delta.

Engineers Labor To Create Spillway

ON THE MISSISSIPPI LEVEE NEAR VIOLET, La., April 29 (AP)—A great spillway to carry off the flood waters of the Mississippi rushing down toward New Orleans was being created here today by state engineers in the dynamiting of a section of the levee twelve miles below the crescent city.

The spot selected for the break was directly in front of a now deserted small farming village and was one hundred yards south of the sharp bend in the river where the 1922 crevasse occurred.

Dynamite Is Sunk

Dynamite was sunk at intervals over a stretch of levee one thousand feet. Engineers sunk 725 pounds of explosives in three widely scattered rows with 48 holes to each row, with approximately five pounds to each hole. Residents of the vast territory to be inundated still were moving out during the morning hours, their household goods piled high on private and military trucks. Here and there men were to be seen driving mules and horses from the danger area. A survey of the territory in the vicinity of the break showed scores of deserted homes. Cross roads shown had been abandoned and their stocks moved to high ground.

200 Marooned When Levee Is Broken

Science Proves Meat Is An Excellent Food

A VEGETARIAN has the peculiar notion that animal foods are harmful to the human body, disregarding the fact that animal foods have been the diet of man since the earliest times and disregarding also that which chemistry, physiology and anatomy have shown relative to the nature of the human body.

As pointed out by Dr. Jesse F. Williams, if one is consistent in his vegetarianism, he will have to live on air alone, for even plants have life and derive much of their life from living organisms.

The vegetarians are not intellectually honest, since they use eggs, milk and cheese to supplement their vegetarian diet of nuts, cereals and vegetables.

Attacks have been made repeatedly on the use of meat on the ground of its possible harmfulness because of bacteria that it may contain, because of possible difficulties of digestion, and for other equally unsatisfactory reasons. Meat inspection serves largely to rule out such samples as are unfit for food.

Proper cooking will destroy bacteria, and will dispose of parasites like the trichinae which are occasionally present in spoiled pork.

The most recent investigations indicate that meat is valuable not only for its iron content, but also for its content of vitamins having relation to the absorption of iron by the body.

Another group of food faddists urge the eating of raw food only. Cooking of vegetables in large quantities of water tends to extract from them important salts. Meat may be boiled to absolute fiber so that the soup made from it contains almost everything that is worth while.

Sometimes certain vitamins are destroyed by overheating, but in general food requires cooking to make it palatable and to destroy contaminated bacteria.

There is not the slightest justification for the raw food fad. Some of the grasses and leafy vegetables, such as spinach, watercress, lettuce and parsley have an important place in the human diet, but man was not made to live on grass alone any more than upon meat alone. A well balanced diet containing some of all of the different food substances that are available to man is the best diet for him.

As A Woman Sees It

I AM impressed more and more by the complexity of life. There are too many "things" in the world.

There are too many books, too many creeds, too many styles, too many things to do, and too many places to go. When I say places, I mean fifteen or twenty miles. A trip to New York or Chicago was like unto a grand tour now. Few people got to Europe and no one got around the world.

In the old days we had little or no choosing to do. We had one way to go, one way to live and we were content. Now it is up to each of us to make a choice, not one choice but hundreds. We may be free, we may be doing our own thinking now, but it is hard on us.

We might try the creed of simplicity. If our tastes are simple and uncomplicated and we get away from the idea that we must keep up with everything and everybody we will be happier. I am sure. We can keep ourselves simple and that is all that matters.

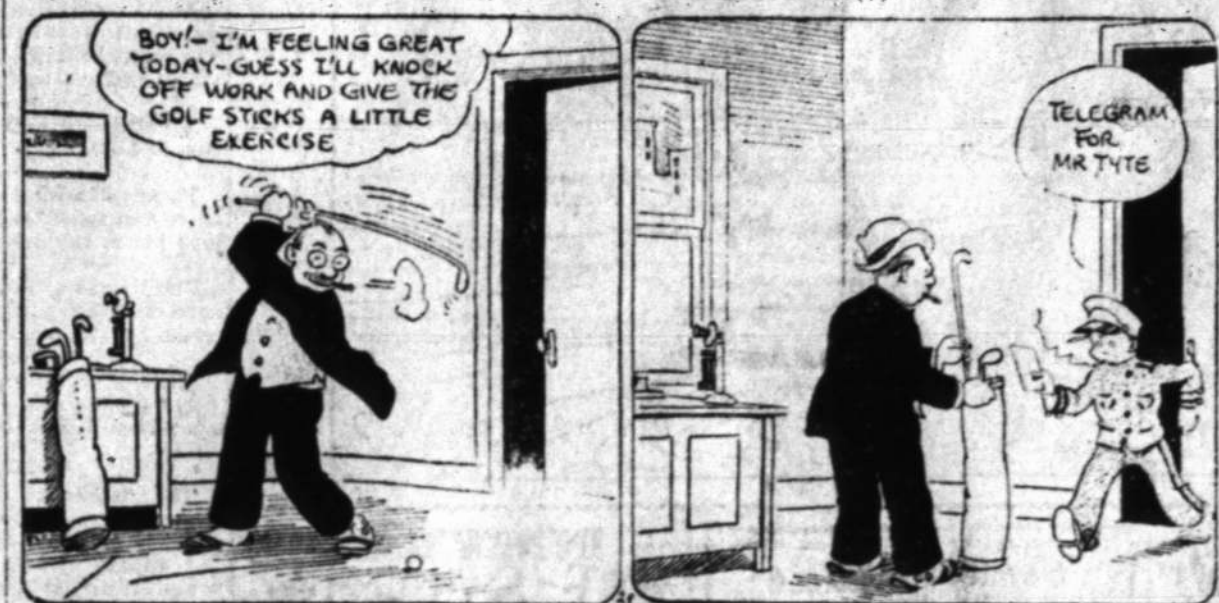

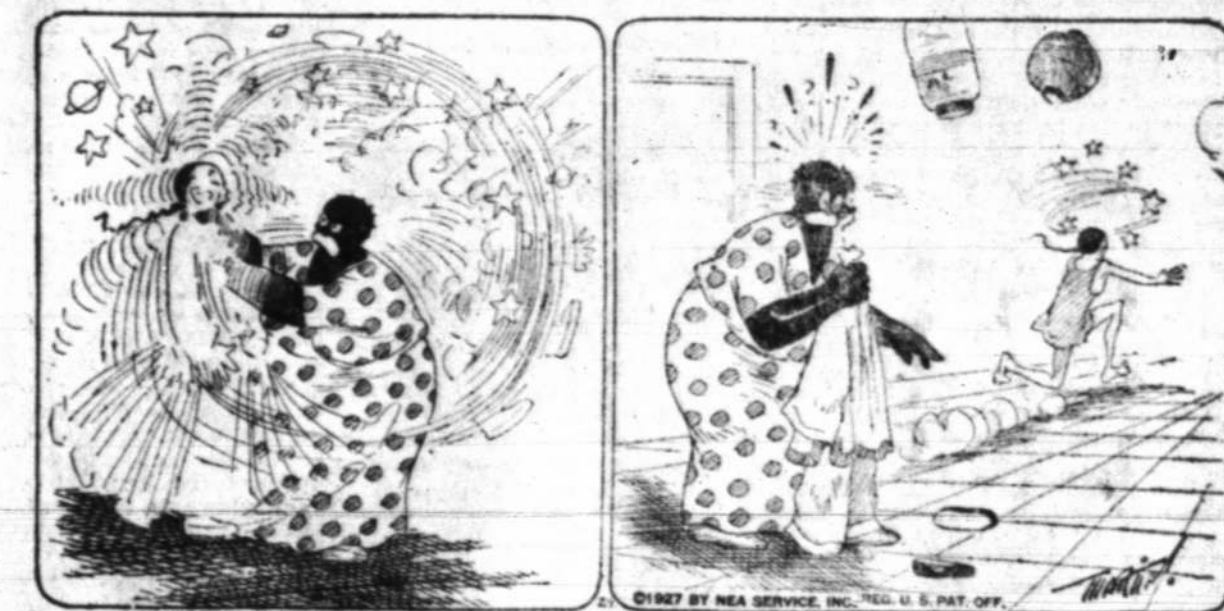

RITCHIE ASKS PRESS TO ACT

Governor Of Maryland Claims
Leadership In Politics
Is Needed Now

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 29.—The public must look to the press, more than to the forum, the pulpit or the classroom, for effective leadership, particularly in politics, Governor Albert C. Ritchie, of Maryland, told the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association last night.

Discussing the "decay of interest in political thinking," Governor Ritchie appealed to the press of the nation "not necessarily to preach and teach abstract politics, but as the most effective agency there is to assert and exert its enormous power of publicity in an endeavor, through selection, direction, creation and emphasis to re-awaken the slumbering political consciousness of our people."

"If political thinking is at a low ebb, he said, 'may it not be because the press has not been the effective agency it might be to bring it back to its high estate?'"

He Issues Warning
A democracy which refuses to do political thinking, the governor said, "is digging its own grave, and particularly is this true when in the midst of a prevailing prosperity and surface quietness, deep and fundamental forces are at work which, possibly sooner than we think may find expression in political acts and facts which will be conservative or restrictive progressive, according as the people shape and direct them."

Touching on "the power of publicity," Governor Ritchie mentioned the letter written by Governor Smith in answer to the open letter of Charles C. Marshall, in which Governor Smith summed up his creed "as an American Catholic."

"The Smith letter," Governor Ritchie said, "was one of the historic monuments of free government and one of the heroic contributions in the fight for political liberty."

"Service of that letter," he continued, "to the cause of religious and political freedom, and therefore to human welfare, lies not so much in its superb truth, as in the fact that your great power of publicity enables it to do effective work in the service of the nation."

Gas Company Asks Release Of Check

Having complied with its contract to construct a mile of line, the West Texas Gas company is asking release of its contract with the city of Lubbock, whereby it posted a check for \$5,000 as guarantee of good faith, and further extension of its franchise here.

This request was made by Max Cunningham, chief engineer in charge, who assured the commissioners that funds for the construction of the line have been provided, contingent upon certain conditions, and that construction of the gas line will be pushed forward to early completion. More pipe is now ready to be installed, he said.

The matter was taken under advisement.

Big Cattle Deal Is Closed At Victoria

VICTORIA, Texas, April 29.—The largest cattle deal consummated in south Texas in some time was the sale of 4,000 four and five year-old steers by Mrs. Elizabeth H. Welder of Victoria and son, Robert H. Welder of Sinton, to Preston R. Austin of Victoria at \$70 a head or \$420,000 in all.

The cattle were shipped from Sinton to Mr. Austin's pastures in Kansas, seven trains being required to move them. He expects to market them in July or August at more than \$100 a head.

BECKLEY SERVICES HELD

HOUSTON, April 29 (AP).—Funeral services for Stewart D. Beckley, 41, vice president and director of the Second National bank, who died early Wednesday, were held late Wednesday afternoon. The body was forwarded to Lancaster, Texas, Mr. Beckley's birthplace, for burial. Mr. Beckley was born in Lancaster on December 7, 1885, and went to Dallas at the age of 17. He began as a messenger of the City National bank, where he remained for 20 years, and became cashier. He was an active member of the Dallas chapter, American Institute of Banking, and once served as its national president.

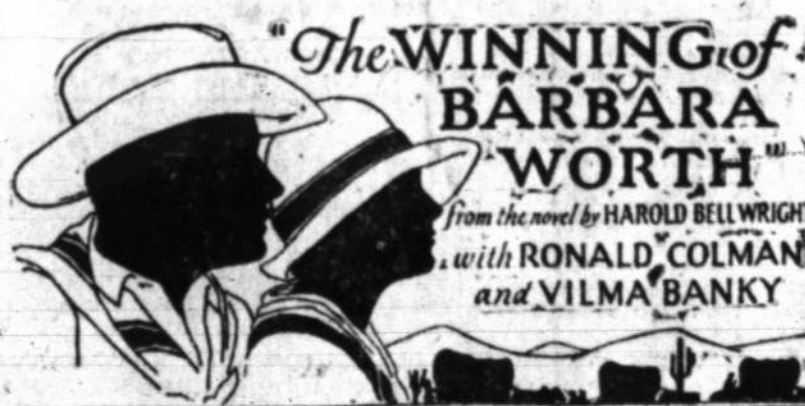


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
