HENRY HELMS TO DIE TONIGHT

CISCO BANK BANDIT MUST PAY PENALTY

EXECUTION SCHEDULED FOR MIDNIGHT; HOPE IS GIVEN UP

(By Associated Press)
HUNTSVILLE, Sept. 5.—Unless some extraordinary act of clemency intervenes, Henry Helms will go to the electric chair here shortly after midnight tonight for his part in one of the most spectacular robberies ever attempted in Texas, the Cisco "Santa Claus" bank robbery of 1927.

Sentenced to death for robbery with firearms, Helms has run the gamut of devices to escape the chair. The court of criminal appeals refused to alter the jury's decision, another jury recently refused to save his life by declaring him insane. The judge refused a hearing and yesterday Governor Moody announced he had washed his hands of the case and would not interfere.

Robbery Unique
Helms and his three companions probably were the most unique bank robbers who ever operated in Texas.

SCHOOLS SHOW LARGER TOTAL

ENROLLMENT IS 4,225 WEDNESDAY; YEAR TO BE RECORD ERA

Showing slight increase over figures for the first month of last year, 4,225 students had been enrolled at the close of Wednesday's session of the city schools, according to M. H. Duncan, superintendent of schools.

A total of 4,200 had been enrolled during the first month of the 1928-29 session, and from present indications this year will record unprecedented figures.

6,000 Expected
"When all adjustments have been made every building will be full and all teachers will have full work before them," said Mr. Duncan. "We feel confident that at the close of the year a total enrollment of over 6,000 students will have been recorded. We expect to have over 4,500 by October 1."

Last year's total enrollment was 3,874.

Tentative plans for the coming year were outlined by the superintendent at a meeting of school principals in Mr. Duncan's office.

RATE REDUCTION TO GULF GRANTED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—The Interstate Commerce commission today granted permission to southwestern railroads to reduce freight rates on grain and grain products from Kansas City to the Gulf of Mexico.

The railroads had applied also for permission to reduce the rates for permission to reduce the rates from Omaha, St. Louis and from various Kansas points, to the Gulf, but this was refused by the commission, which stated the application would have to be made in regular form for these reductions. Permission to revise rates on one day's notice is given only in exceptional cases.

Residents Summoned On City Violations

Continuing their campaign against violators of the city health ordinance, Lubbock police arraigned 15 residents in city corporation court this morning to answer charges of using outdoor toilets in districts where sewer connections are available.

The residents were ordered by the court to make immediate connections with sewer lines.

Scores of complaints have been filed by Dr. J. W. Rollo, city health officer.

DIVORCES FACE HARD TIME

CHICAGO, Sept. 5 (AP)—It won't be so easy to get a divorce in Chicago if Judge Michael Feinberg can help it.

Mrs. Mary Lange, 19, sought divorce, charging cruelty. She and Edward Lange were married in March and separated in May.

"I do not place much credence in your story," Judge Feinberg said. "Divorces are entirely too easy to get in Chicago. Because judges fail to investigate such pleas as yours, we are known as the new Reno."

"If I were to give you a divorce you could turn around and get married again. Then, knowing how easy it is to get a divorce, you could bring suit at the first petty quarrel with your husband."

Judge Feinberg continued the case for two years. Until the case is called again, lawyers said, neither Mrs. Lange nor her husband can bring suit.

MOVEMENT STARTED TO PUT LEADER BACK IN POLITICS

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—The New York World says today a movement has been started to place former Governor Alfred E. Smith in the United States Senate and thus keep him in the national political limelight for eventuality.

Governor Roosevelt would then be called upon to appoint Smith to fill Copeland's unexpired term in the Senate.

The World says Senator Copeland, now in Europe, is anxious to retain his senate seat, but strong pressure would be brought to bear upon him to undertake the city sanitation commission work as a public duty.

LIGHT HAIL STORM IS FELT; TEMPERATURE DROPS 40 DEGREES

Rains in varying degrees interspersed the South Plains and North Panhandle last night, while the moistened sky and a north wind sent the mercury down 40 degrees during 13 hours, causing many to don heavier clothes this morning.

Hail punctured the downpours in many sections, a slight damage being reported as result of an ice

BANKIN, Sept. 5 (AP)—Bankin was visited by a severe wind and hail storm late yesterday which ripped the roofs off a number of business buildings and damaged residences. The wind reached a velocity of more than 60 miles an hour. The damage was estimated at less than \$10,000.

drubbing around Littlefield vicinity. Some damage, although accurate estimate could not be made at noon, resulted in Crosby county.

Hail Falls Here
The hail drubbing in Lubbock was severe for a period of about two or three minutes, but reports this morning from farmers of various sections of the county indicated that very little damage was done to crops.

Starting about four miles northwest of Lubbock, hail wreaked havoc to a strip of land about five miles wide and extending east as far as Ralls. Scores of farms suffered serious damage by the downpour, cotton being practically destroyed in some places in the strip.

With the cotton plant far advanced, many expressed the opinion today that the rains would aid but little in production. The moisture, accompanied by autumnal weather will help some, however, toward producing a better staple, they agreed.

Heavy Roads Encountered
Several Lubbock Kiwanians, returning from the district convention at Tulsa, encountered heavy roads between Vernon and Crowell last night. The rains also extended down the route as far as Ralls, where a good precipitation was reported.

Precipitation at the state experiment station, three miles east of this city, was only .03 of an inch. Hail did no damage at the station.

NO CHANGE IN WELL NOTICED

STATUS REMAINS SAME TODAY; GAS STILL ON INCREASE

Status of the Marland-Slaughter No. 1 test well, in Cochran county, remained unchanged early this afternoon, as hundreds of South Plains citizens, hopeful for a new industry, continued to flock during the day to the scene where eyes of the oil fraternity have been focused for the last five days, according to a telephone report from Morton, 12 miles north of the wildcat.

Rumors circulated late Wednesday in Lubbock that the test had blown in as a gusher were denied by the report.

Gas Increasing
The gas showing, which has been increasing since Sunday, has been estimated at almost 1,000,000 cubic feet.

Reports state that the hole has been drilled to a depth of 4,814 feet and is now in black lime, with indications that the well will be a producer.

The rig is located on the C. C. Slaughter estate land, 67 miles west of Lubbock and about 35 miles west of Levelland.

Bunco Men Get \$450,000 Haul

NEW YORK AND DENVER BANKS SWINDLED BY USE OF TELEGRAMS

(By Associated Press)
DENVER, Sept. 5.—A pair of bunco men, one working in Denver and the other in New York, swindled six New York City banks out of \$450,000 last Saturday, police were advised today.

The six New York banks were correspondents of a like number of Denver banks. Each of the New York institutions contributed \$75,000 to the scheme of the swindlers.

Use Telegrams
Through the use of unauthorized telegrams, the Denver member of the swindle team notified New York correspondents of Denver banks to deposit \$75,000 each to the credit of the Bank of Telluride in the Chase National Bank of New York City.

Each of the telegrams bore the unauthorized signature of an official of the six Denver banks. All of the wires were in code of the American Bankers' association. They were sent from various branch offices of the Western Union Telegraph company by the Denver member of the bunco team.

Appears With Check
Saturday New York City, the New York accomplice of the local swindler appeared at the Chase National Bank and presented a cashier's check for withdrawal of \$450,000. The cashier's check is supposed to have been a forgery.

Discovery of the swindle was made when the Denver banks received from their New York correspondents the usual charge slips. These showed the Denver banks had "authorized" the transfer of \$75,000 to the

NEW NICARAGUAN CANAL SURVEY IS ORDERED BY U. S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—A picked engineering battalion numbering 400 officers and men today was ordered by Secretary Good to duty in the Central American jungle to survey the route of the proposed \$10,000,000 Nicaraguan canal.

Upon the report of these engineers largely will depend the decision of the American government as to whether it shall undertake the stupendous task of constructing a canal stretching 183 miles through tropical mountains and forests from the Atlantic to the Pacific oceans. Government engineers estimate it would require ten years to complete the project, which would give the United States, with the Panama canal, two of the most important waterways in the world.

Approved by Congress
The survey was approved by congress last spring when it was brought to its attention that the Panama canal with its present facilities probably would be overburdened soon if the annual tonnage continued to increase. The commercial tonnage that passed through the canal in

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DIRECTOR OF PET PEEVES GIVEN IN REPORT; FALLING DREAMS EXPLAINED

(By Associated Press)
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 5.—A directory of life's principal annoyances, 507 pet peeves, was given to the International Congress of Psychology at Yale university today by Professor Hulsey Cason of the University of Rochester.

It may be used to minimize some of the day's discontent by learning when to be on guard against undue irritation. Virtually all the annoyances, said Professor Cason, "are learned," or acquired. A few, like the scratch of a piece of chalk on a black board, are inherited.

The average time of life to be most on guard against a state of irritability is between the ages of 40 and 60. Susceptibility to annoyances is least from 10 to 25, rises a little from 25 to 40, is maximum from 40 to 60 and dwindling slightly from 60 to 90. Dr. Cason has not investigated beyond 90.

A tilt in sleeping position explains familiar falling dreams according to Dr. D. B. Klein of the University of Texas. He said he produced a dream in 39 seconds in which a young girl sub-

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 5.—Confusion and mystery drew a double veil today around facts concerning the Transcontinental Air Transport's lost air liner City of San Francisco which previously had been reported by company officials to have been found wrecked in the wilds of the New Mexico-Arizona border region and its five passengers and three crew members dead.

WITNESSES IN TRIAL CALLED

FALL TO FACE CHARGES OF BRIBERY OCTOBER 7 IN CAPITAL

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Scores of witnesses, some whose names were household words long before the tempest began to blow over teat dome and some whom the oil scandals have brought to public attention, are being summoned for the trial of former secretary of Interior Albert B. Fall.

The name of former attorney general Harry M. Daugherty is among the first in the list of persons subpoenaed to appear October 7, the day Fall goes to trial on charge on which he was first arraigned, June 30, 1924—the charge which reads "violation of section 117, U. S. Penal Code. Accepting bribe as secretary of Interior."

Hogan Is Counsel
It is reported, meanwhile, that Frank Hogan—who was successful in the defense of Edward L. Doherty—is to appear as counsel for Fall. Hogan's office, however, declines to comment, explaining he is now in the west and will not return until the middle of the month.

Joseph Daniels, former secretary of the navy, has been summoned to appear as witness. B. L. Leavelle, publisher of the Washington Post, whether with a touch of irony or no, a subpoena has been issued for Harry M. Blackmer whose projected sojourn abroad has held in abeyance his own trial on conspiracy charges in connection with the oil scandals.

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LEADERS ARE GATHERING IN RELIGION ROW

SECRET CONFERENCE IS BEING HELD TODAY IN JERUSALEM

(By Associated Press)
JERUSALEM, Sept. 5.—Forty-eight Arab leaders from all parts of Palestine, comprising the Palestine Arab executive, have been summoned to meet in extraordinary private session in Jerusalem tomorrow to consider recent developments in the Holy Land.
Publicity regarding the meeting was suppressed, but in some quarters it was felt it would afford opportunity for open airing by indignant Moslem chiefs of the resentment aroused in them by certain recent events.

Inquiry ordered
News of the impending meeting emerged shortly after it was learned here the British government had ordered a special Palestine commission headed by Sir Walter Shaw, former chief justice of the Straits Settlements, to make an inquiry into Arab-Jewish clashes, beginning its task this month.

Decision of the British government not to permit the scope of its Palestine inquiry to extend to any question altering the Balfour declaration—that which fixed British policy as establishing in Palestine a national home for Jews—was hailed with joy by the Jews but was resented openly by Arabs.

One of Problems
It was believed this would be one of the problems considered by the Arab executive, members of which have from time to time voiced their opposition to the Balfour declaration and have blamed the Moslem-Semite clashes on Arab feeling against it.

Members of the executive have remained aloof from the British representation in Palestine, no leader or member having yet called upon Sir John Chancellor, the high commissioner, since his return. Sir John's proclamation, issued Sunday in discussing clashes of the last 10 days, was felt by the Arabs to be decidedly pro-Jewish and anti-Arab.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 5.—Where is Lawrence of Arabia?

T. E. Lawrence, British envoy extraordinary and best friend of the Arabs, has disappeared from his usual haunts and secrecy shrouds his whereabouts.

Belief held here is that Lawrence has been sent on a secret mission to Palestine to pacify insurgent Arab tribesmen, many of whom will listen to no other European.

Lawrence is an amazing man, his career reading like that of the heroes of the late H. Rider Haggard and other novelists who have written of strange adventures in far corners of the globe.
He is known as Lawrence of Arabia, Col. T. E. Lawrence and Air-craftsman Shaw, adventurer, scholar, explorer, military agent, author, soldier, friend of kings and counselor to the lords of the great Arabian deserts. A private in the air force he resigned a colonelcy in order to obtain the humbler post. He presents a fine figure in a London drawing room and is a power in the tented cities of Jebel Shammar and the Roba El Khali, which is known

EAST SUFFERING FROM HEAT WAVE

NEW YORK, Sept. 5 (AP).—Rain to fill reservoirs, extinguish forest fires and cool blistering city streets was an acute need throughout eastern states today.

Four days of unprecedented heat which set new temperature records for September aggravated the water shortage and multiplied difficulties of forest fire fighters.

The highest temperature reported yesterday was at Springfield, Mass., where the mercury reached 99.78 degrees. Other parts of New England enjoyed relief from the record breaking temperatures of Tuesday.

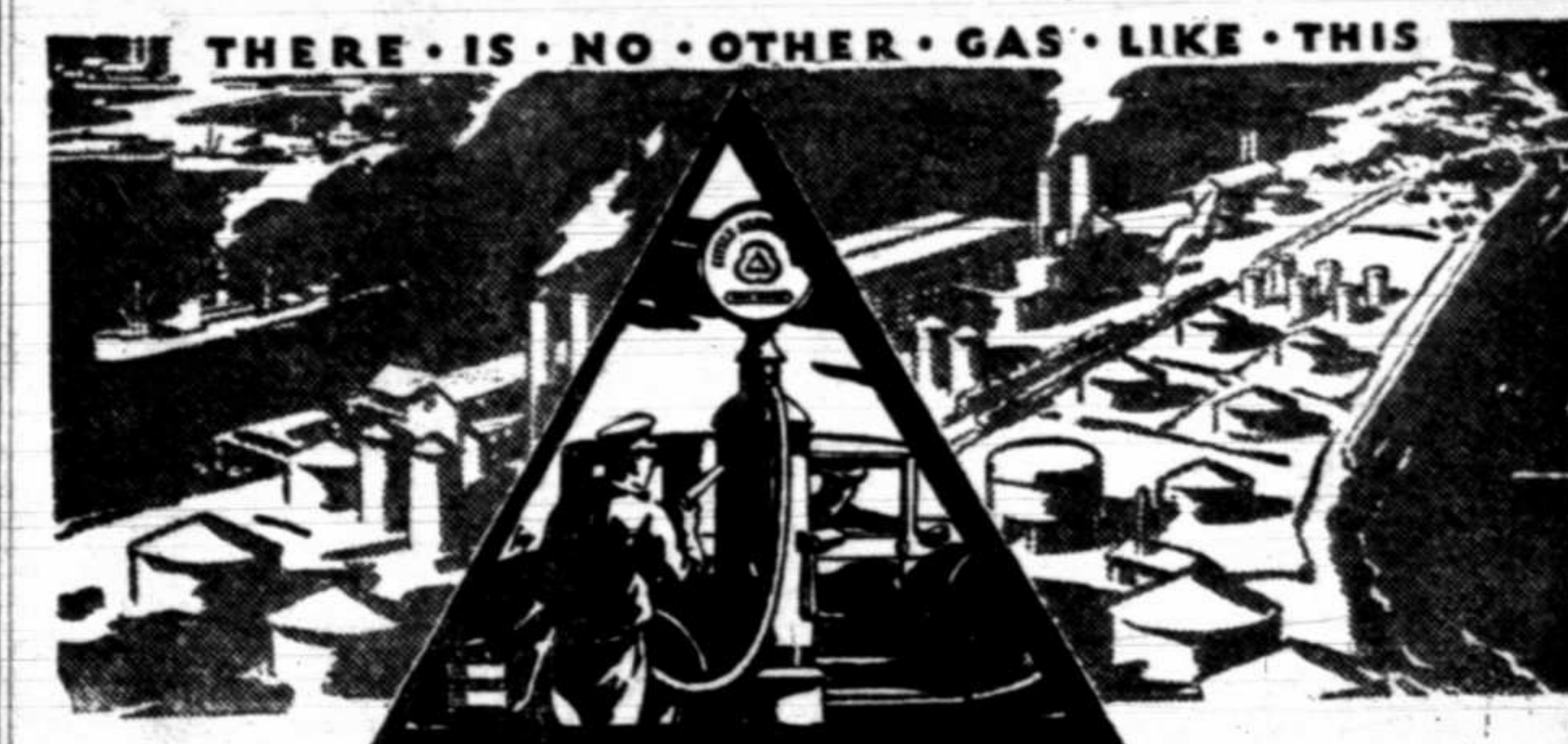

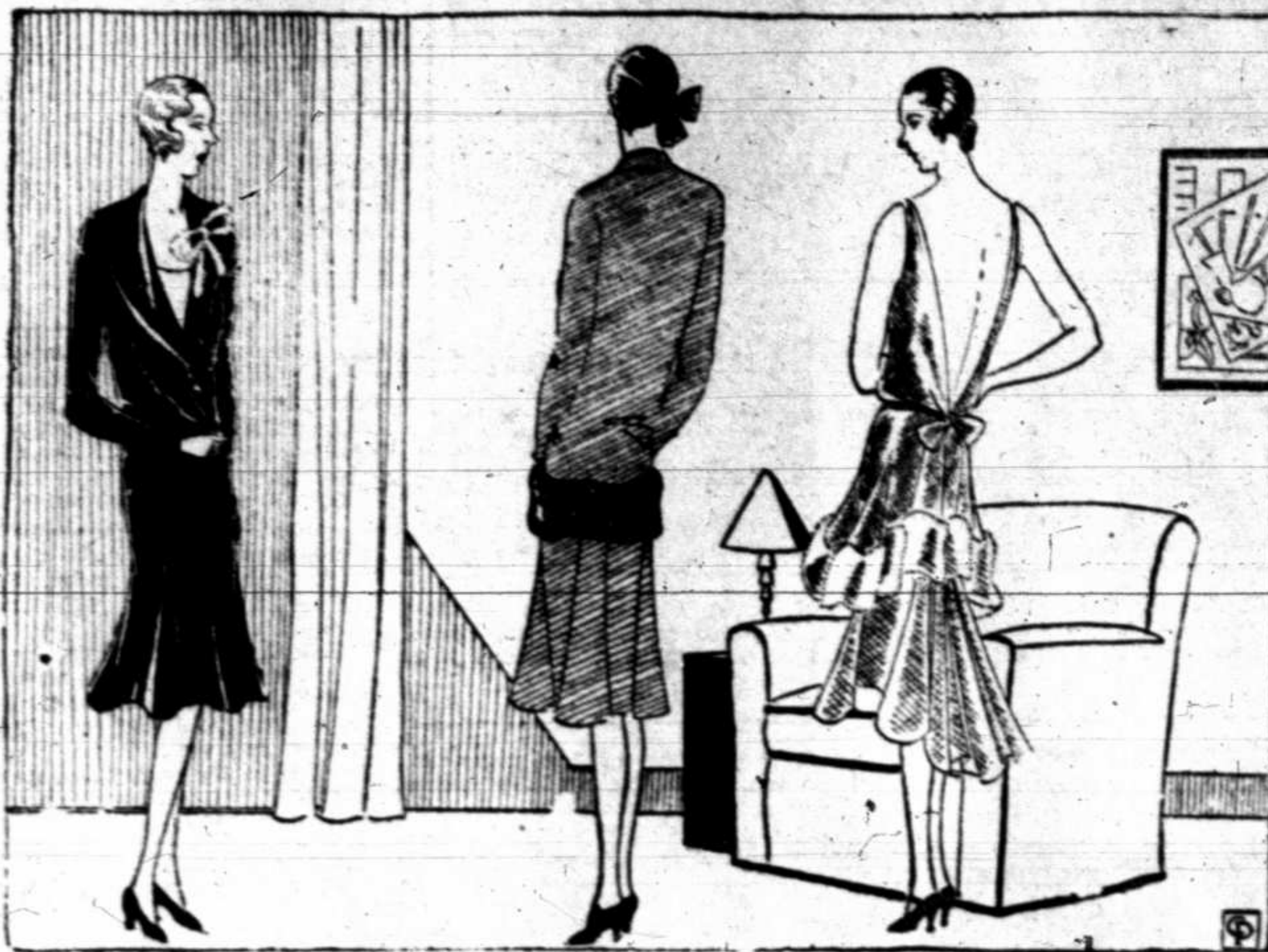

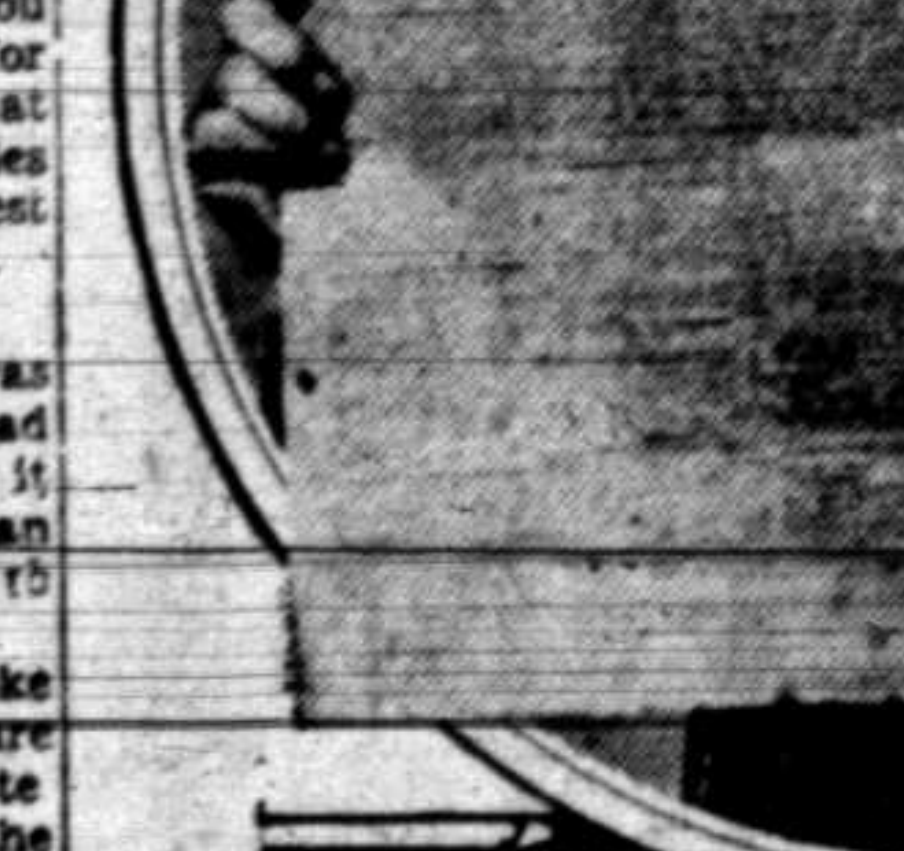

PRESIDENT CONFERS WITH OFFICIALS ON PROBLEM

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—President Hoover and his naval advisors had another taste today of the "hard work" which Secretary Stimson said is a necessary prelude to a naval parity agreement between the United States and Great Britain.

The president was hopeful an understanding could be reached under which it would be unnecessary for the United States to construct the entire 15 cruisers called for in the present authorized program of the navy.

Breakfast Ushers in Work.
Breakfast in the White House ushered in the day's work for the diplomatic and naval officers handling the Washington end of the negotiations with the London government.

1. The number of cruisers which each country must have to cover its needs, but at the same time to give a status of parity between the two navies.

2. The tonnage within which these ships are to be included, with an effort being made to set the tonnage mark at such a point that substantial savings can be made in the naval expenditures of both countries.

One high government official described the result so far attained by the conversations as "encouraging but not tremendous."

AMARILLO, Sept. 5 (AP)—Settlement was announced today of suits brought by Amarillo citizens against the Davidson hotel building corporation for the return of bonus money paid and for damages aggregating more than \$1,000,000.

The schedule of the new system calls for a flying time of 67 hours and fifteen minutes on the westward trip, with an overnight stop at Brownsville, Texas. The return trip would be made in 49 hours and five minutes, with no overnight stops. The service will be inaugurated next Sunday.

Safeway Plane Is Reported Down Safe

WICHITA FALLS, Sept. 5 (AP)—The Safeway plane which left Tulsa, Okla., yesterday for this city carrying two passengers and a crew of two, landed at Goodwin, Okla., last night because of bad weather.

The plane carried Larry Fitch, assistant traffic manager of the lines, Mal Brix, maintenance superintendent, B. Clark, Tulsa representative, and a man named Stellick, in charge of engine overhauling.

HENRIETTA, Sept. 5 (AP)—H. Eddy, 30, prominent stockman with large real estate holdings in this county and in Arkansas and Oklahoma, died here today.

FIVE MINERS ARE STILL ENTOMBED

STOCKTON, Calif., Sept. 5 (AP)—Somewhere in the Calaveras copper mine at Copperopolis today five miners were entombed under a hundred tons of rock and dirt.

The cave-in was believed to have crushed the life out of at least four. The fifth man, Joe Mendez, a Mexican, was still alive early today although numerous slides so hampered the work of rescue it was feared he would be dead when help reached him.

A sixth man, Ompre Vall, was rescued.

The men were trapped at the 1550 foot level of the mine while ascending the shaft yesterday. Tons of rocks and dirt were thought to have been undermined by recent blasting operations, roared down upon them in a sudden avalanche that cut off all retreat.

Stock Prices Take Tumble Upon Close

NEW YORK, Sept. 5 (AP)—Stock prices took a nosedive on the New York Stock Exchange in the last hour of trading today, after a sharp upswing in a wide assortment of leading issues earlier in the session. Such a flood of selling came into the market that the ticker was halted an hour late at the close. United States Common tumbled \$3 a share, and such issues as Radio and New York Central \$5 and more.

BRIAND GETS BIG APPLAUSE

FRENCH PREMIER GIVES STIRRING ADDRESS BEFORE LEAGUE

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Sept. 5.—Premier Briand of France, whose oratorical triumphs have won him the reputation of the most brilliant orator of Europe, received the biggest acclamation of his long career today before the tenth assembly of the League of Nations, when he made a stirring tribute to the decade of work by the League and scoured war-makers and all those who secretly foster the spirit of war in the coming generations.

When in his memorable address he sent forth an appeal to the women of the world to protect their children from the false ideas of strife and from those doctrines calculated to inculcate prejudice and hatred among peoples, the great audience which packed the assembly hall burst into prolonged cheers.

Pau Hymans, Belgian Foreign Minister, speaking before the assembly advocated a closer linking of the Kellogg-Briand peace pact with the covenant of the League of Nations.

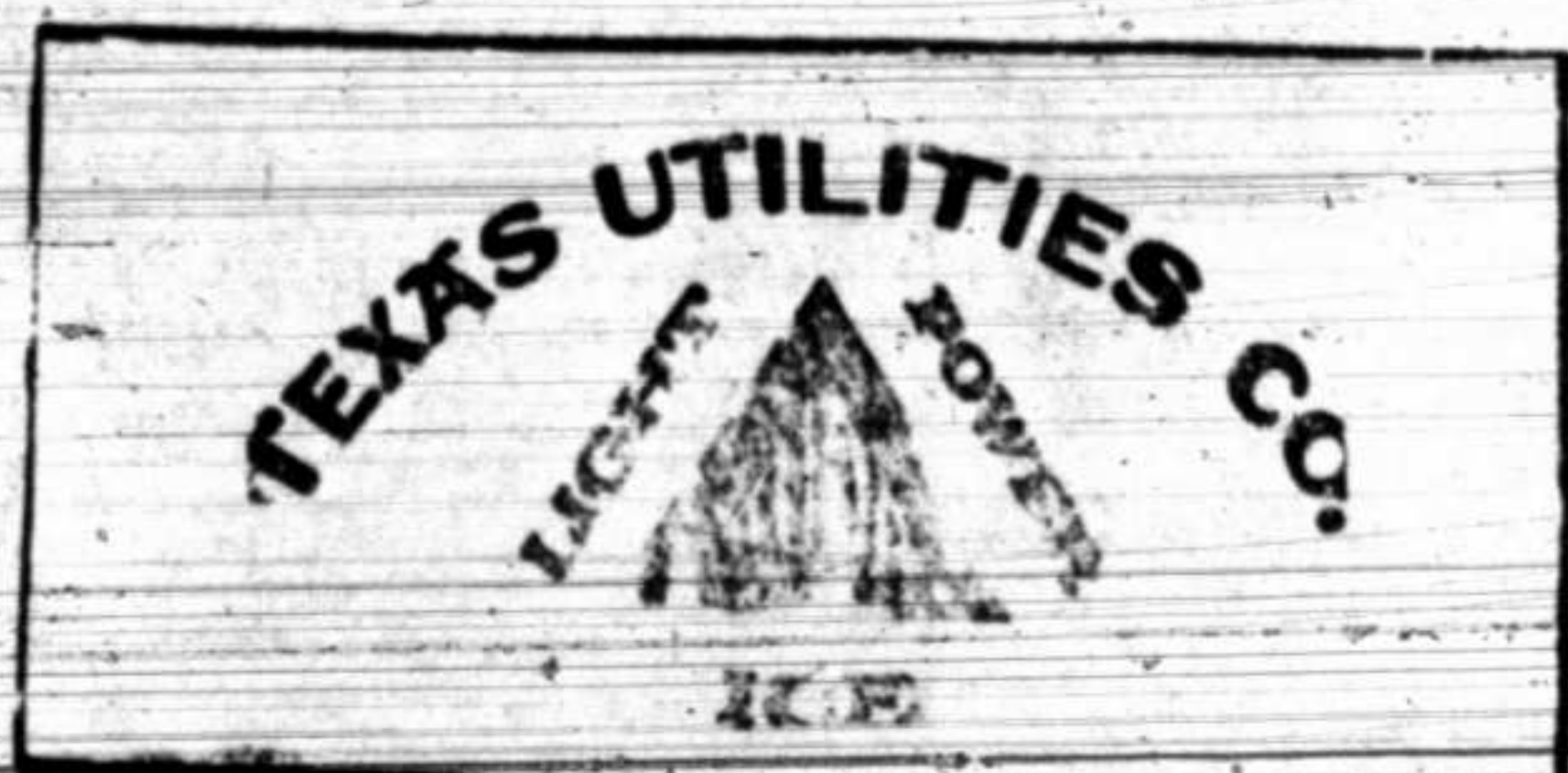

IN THE REALM OF SPORTS

Just a few more days now until the third of the pigskin will break the calm that has hovered over Tech field for the past three months and a horde of scarlet-clad gridiron warriors will rally forth on the fifth football campaign in Lubbock history.

Matador veterans of past seasons have been arriving in Lubbock for the past several days and by Monday the entire squad of candidates for the varsity eleven is likely to be on hand for the opening of the training camp Tuesday. The newly-formed coaching combination of Grady Higginbotham and Victor Payne is facing the hardest schedule a Texas Tech football team has ever looked forward to. Both are well acquainted with the material on hand and the outlook for the impending season is brighter than it has ever been at this stage of the game.

Ransome Walker, Tech's gallop-in gazelle and one of the greatest backfield stars in the Southwest, is in Lubbock and ready to get started on his last football season. Percy has stayed in splendid condition through the summer months on his father's grapefruit farm in the Rio Grande valley and appears to be headed for his most successful year. Levi accompanied the elder Walker and likewise looks fit and fine.

H. C. Chubbey, Dewitt, veteran Matador guard and Dennis Vincent, Tech wingman, were also among the early arrivals. Both are practically assured of regular berths on the 1929 first eleven.

News from athletic headquarters that Harold Critch, one of Coach Higginbotham's leading ground gainers on the 1928 Freshman eleven, will be ineligible for the coming season comes as a stunning blow to the Matadors' hopes. Critch played baseball through the summer months and was in great condition for the grid season. Basil Hall, fullback and running mate to Critch, is back however and ready for the opening gun.

Matador coaches are counting strong on Simmons and Bides, the two giant tackles on the 1928 Tech Freshman eleven. Both are big and strong and are likely to make a strong bid for Coach Payne's forward wall. Big Sidney Knowles will have to be considered before a final reckoning is made on the tackle candidates.

The high school Westerners took on a more promising aspect in Wednesday's workout. More than a half-hundred grid candidates hustled through a lengthy season of dummy scrimmage and saw plays run off with mid-season precision. The most unexpected note of the afternoon's workout was the hustling spirit and high optimism shown by the gridsters.

Two old Westerner letter men have been on hand since the opening of the training season, lending their efforts toward the development of this year's team. Whacker Barton and Ernest Dowell are these voluntary assistants and the latter is likely to continue as tutor of the Pioneer's high school reserves. Dowell has one more year in Lubbock high but has exceeded the age limit for interscholastic competition. Barton plans to enter the University of Texas, fall and will be a candidate for the Freshman squad during his first year there.

This keen interest displayed by the old men is an unmistakable example of a fighting Westerner spirit. The example thus set fires the newcomers with a zeal to become a part of this troop of gridiron warriors. Other members of District One are likely to feel the effect of this spirit before the 1929 season is over.

Bobby Jones' defeat yesterday by the unheralded Nebraska youth in the first round of the National Amateur tournament at Del Monte, Calif., came as a distinct surprise to the fans of golf. The Atlanta wizard was clearly outplayed by the 20-year-old golfer and it goes to show that even the greatest of champions crack sooner or later. Jones was a top-heavy favorite to retain his amateur title, but the most unexpected thing happened; he was eliminated by the first round by an almost unheard-of entry. CUBS NEARING CINCH ON NATIONAL LEAGUE PENNANT

NEBRASKA 20-YEAR-OLD IS CONQUEROR OF GREAT STAR ON FINAL HOLE WEDNESDAY

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif., Sept. 5.—Like the boxer who left his punch in the gymnasium, it now seems the great Bobby Jones after coming all the way across the Rockies to show the boys out here how he does it, left his par-cracking game in the practice rounds.

Johnny Goodman, 20-year-old Omaha, Nebraska, star, accomplished the downfall of the national open king and four time amateur title holder, by the narrow margin of one up in a match decided on the home hole, but actually tossed away the defending champion on the 14th. Goodman in turn was knocked out of the tournament in the second round by another giant killer, 18-year-old William Lawson Little, Jr. of San Francisco. But for the day, at least, the cornhusker enjoyed the rare thrill of fairly beating the world's most renowned exponent of the royal and ancient game.

The outcome of the hectic first two rounds of match play left eight players—three from the far west, three for the east, one each from the Midwest and England, to battle it out today in the 36 hole quarter finals. In this free for all scramble for the crown lost by Jones, these contestants were paired today as follows:

Cyril Tolley, British champion vs. Dr. O. F. Willing, Portland, Ore.; Jess Sweetser, New York, vs. Chandler Egan of Medford, Ore.; George Voigt, New York, vs. Harrison Johnston, St. Paul; Francis Ouimet, Boston, champion in 1913, vs. William Lawson Little, Jr., San Francisco.

They were to play 18 holes starting at 9 a. m. with ten minute intervals, and another 18—or less—beginning at 2 p. m.

Over the longer route that prevails for the remaining tournament play, the 36 hole distance that has been so much of the liking of the decorated champion in four of the past five years, the favorites of the "last eight" were the Briton, Tolley, and the New Yorker, Voigt. Both on the basis of their sensational scoring yesterday appeared to have regained their best form for the critical stages of the tournament, just as the reverse seemed true so far as Jones was concerned.

The defeat of Jones was not only a stunning shock to the form players, who had made the Georgian an almost prohibitive favorite, but a somewhat melancholy abrupt blow to the expectations of Californians eager to see Bobby do his stuff. It has thus been accompanied with what mingled feelings a crowd of some 5,000 jammed around the last green yesterday to see Jones miss his last desperate putt and Goodman play through with a confident dash that meant victory. Jones was beaten, principally because he lost the putting touch that usually is his in any tournament.

The other principal casualties of the first round were George Von Elm, beaten on the first day for the third straight year since he won the title in 1926; Gene Homans and Gibson Dunlap, qualifying play stars; and Phillips Finlay, a California favorite and 1928 semi-finalist. Finlay was put out by the San Francisco youth, William Lawson Little, who took Goodman's scalp in the afternoon.

Chandler Egan, making a big comeback took Von Elm's scalp 2 and 1, and then eliminated a fellow Oregonian, Rude Wilhelm, 7 and 5. Ouimet won from Dave Martin of California, 4 and 2, then from Clarence Hubby of Texas, 4 and 3.

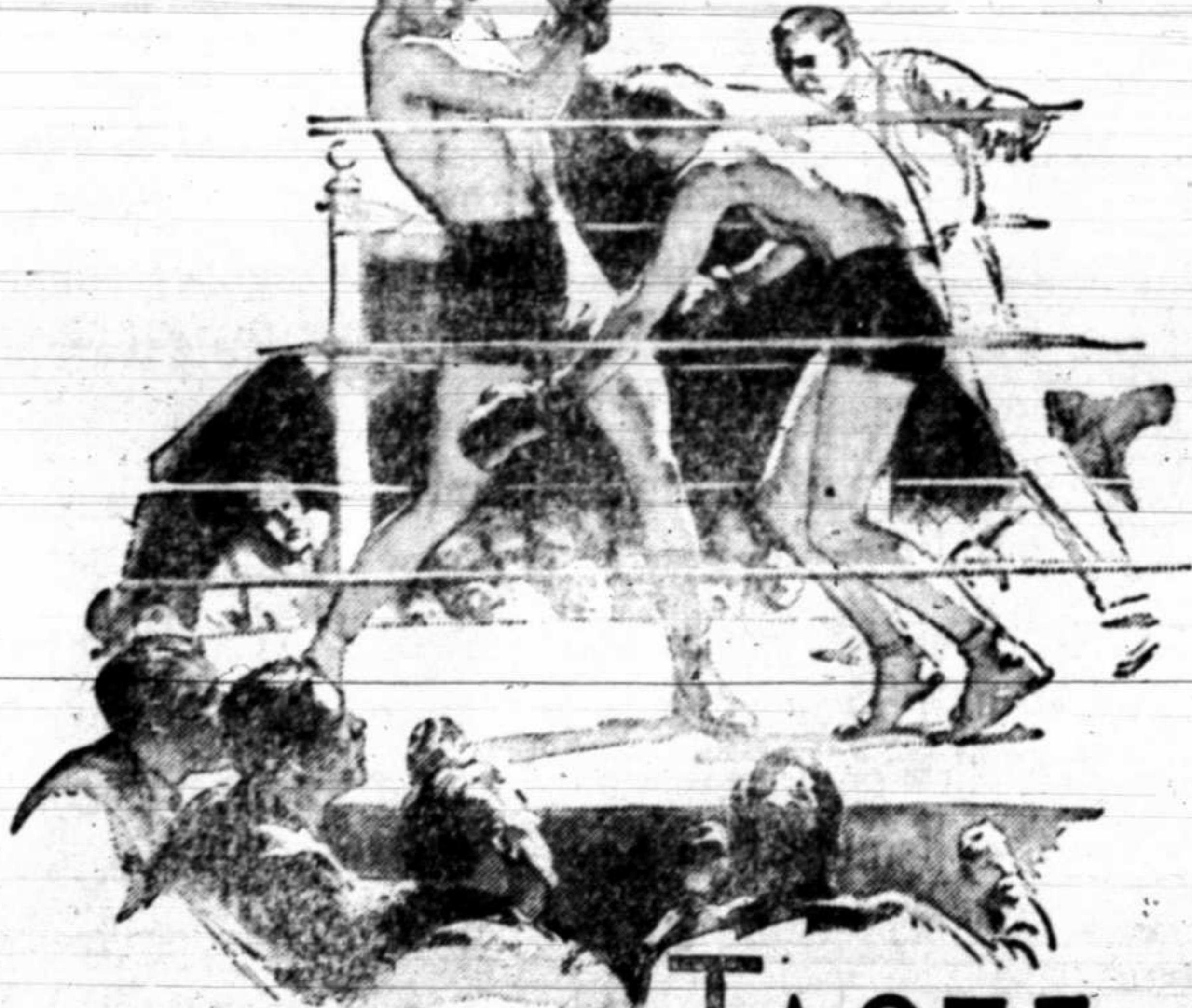
Robins Win Two

BEARS TURN TO FOOTBALL

GRID ACTIVITIES WILL HOLD SPOTLIGHT ON COAST NOW

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 5 (AP).—Back at the top again after a football famine that saw them driven to defeat and disappointment, California's Golden Bears this season begin their gridiron tasks with early prospects of being powerful contenders for both coast and conference and interconference honors.

Little if any change in California's football fundamentals—a strong defensive system—is expected. For the past eight years the teams have been coached to kick and wait for the breaks. Those close to Coach C. M. (Nip) Price, however, believe he will try this season to develop a faster offense, chiefly because of the new rule which makes a fumble ball dead when recovered by the defense.

A tough schedule is made considerably more difficult because of an interconference game with Pennsylvania in mid season. After meeting St. Mary's, Santa Clara and Washington State on successive week-ends, the Bears will journey to Philadelphia for a contest with the Quakers eleven, October 19. It will be the first time a coast football team has played a game on the Atlantic seaboard in mid season.

The football lineup indicated Coach Price would have a squad of great reserve strength and of the heavy artillery type. The biggest loss over last year is at the tackle, position vacated by Steve Benford and Frank Flitz. The only other line hole to fill is at one end, and two first string men are on hand for that job.

Benny Lom, one of the coast's halfback stars last season, is ready for a bigger and better season. Stanley Barr, halfback, and Lee Egan, quarterback, are playing their third year. The fullback prospect list includes Clarence Garrity, a regular last year, and Ralston Gill, line plunging luminary of the 1928 freshman team.

MAKING OVER!
In the midst of the Athletics' stirring success, it sounds almost fanciful to say that Connie Mack already has entered on a program making over his team. But that's exactly what the team leader is doing, according to Bill Dooley, writing in the Philadelphia Record.

Mr. Mack explains that "no matter what a team does you cannot afford to be satisfied with it," he told the writer today.

"In baseball," explained this oracle with the wisdom of almost half a century in the game behind him, "you either go forward or go back. There is no standing still."

Connie plans changes in his infield, outfield and pitching departments for next season. He may not be successful in finding the men he needs to strengthen those posts, some players that he now plans to trade or release before another season rolls around may have to be retained.

The positions that worry Connie Mack the most now are shortstop and second base. No one is more aware than the tall skipper that the Athletics' keystone combination is woefully weak on making double plays.

The weakness of Joe Boley's arm is, in the main, responsible for that. That there is considerable doubt in Connie's mind about Boley being able to go through the balance of the season is proved by the urgency of his orders to the scouts to get sals on the best shortstops available. In case of necessity the shortstop deemed the best in the minors will be bought for immediate service and placed right in the lineup. The shortstop purchased will be one noted more for his fielding than his hitting.

There are several shortstops in the minors who are considered big league timber. Crosetti, on the San Francisco club, is one, Gordon Slade of the Missions is another. In the American association there are three likely prospects.

One is Jack Warner, former Detroit player, now with Toledo. Another is Olivares, a Cuban, who is cutting up a lot of ditches for Louisville. The third is Warbler, starring for the Indianapolis club.

MAX NOT STRONG
Bishop's trouble is mostly physical. Connie Mack is about convinced that the dapper Baltimorean will never be rugged enough to go through a full season at top speed. As long as Jimmy Dykes was available Connie never worried greatly about Bishop's vacations. But since Dykes has been on the sidelines, nursing a severe attack of charley horse, it has been brought home to Connie that he needs more reinforcements for the infield.

In the pitching and outfield departments the competition for the extra berths will be just as fierce. Bill Breckenridge, who is getting his grooming on the bench this season, will be given his chance as a starting pitcher next year. Breckenridge and Liebhart, a recent purchase and a few others will either vie with the veteran pitchers who may come back or compete with each other for the vacancies left by the departure of the veterans.

The Athletics expect to take three or four new outfielders to camp next year. They want young replacements. Players who can cover a lot of ground and can get distance on their hits.
